Deerwester, Tom Farris, Patrick Ryan, John Werts and Joe Witte. Returning members include Buck Carter, Terry Ferguson, Dan Matthews, Megan Myers, Jamie Prestegaard, Brian Riddle and Melonie Tilley.

Terry Ferguson nominated Dan Matthews for board chairman. The board elected Matthews unanimously. Matthews also is the Unit 15 school board president.

Ferguson was elected vice chairman over Megan Myers.

Matthews and the board appointed Melonie Tilley finance chairman, Jamie Prestegaard road and bridge chairman, Buck Carter land use chairman, Terry Ferguson property chairman, Megan Myers public safety chairman, and reappointed himself marina chairman.

# City tax levy 3.66 percent lower

CLINTON - Because the city has done such a good job of fully funding its pension funds, the annual tax levy approved Tuesday by the city council is 3.66 percent lower than last year.

City treasurer Clint Lichtenwalter also told commissioners during Tuesday's city council meeting the tax rate was reduced by about percent.

"Overall, (Equalized Valuation) is projected to be up to \$77 million from right around \$72 million," Lichtenwalter said.

He also said city should realize an additional large increase in EAV in a few years when the TIF I district expires.

"Because TIF I has done very well," Lichtenwalter said.

# Fall planting cycle adds 18 trees in Clinton

CLINTON — Boulevard areas along Clinton streets have the added shade and beauty of 18 new trees following the fall planting cycle, according to the city's Tree Commission.

"We are very pleased with the progress made over the past several weeks to replace trees along city streets," said John Baker, chairman of the Clinton Tree Commission.

Each year, the boulevard areas lose trees to age, disease (like emerald ash borer), storm damage and construction, such as the Center Street Project . For more than 20 years, the city has averaged 20 new trees planted. For various reasons, no trees were planted on boulevards in 2020 and 2021.

The new trees were recently planted on North and South Center Street, along with three on Portland Place, one on North Jackson Street and one on South George Street.

The 18 new trees were purchased by the city from Jason Reynolds, a local landscaping contractor, planted the

selection of trees on city boulevards.

Local monetary donations towards the purchase of trees helped with the fall planting campaign, said Baker. Jim Redding, Nan and Mike Crang, Helen and Steve Michelassi and John Baker were the initial participants in a new program being developed to provide support for the boulevard tree program.

The Clinton Tree Commission established in 2001 by the Clinton City Council to initiate a forest management program on city property and to help the city earn a Tree City designation from the National Arbor Day Foundation.

Since its founding, the five-member commission has conducted an initial inventory of trees on city property, developed the city Arboretum and worked to protect and preserve existing trees. The commission also works with the city to set priorities for removals, pruning and planting of trees. Commission members recently completed an update to the city tree inventory.



The city was able to push its pension funds to nearly fully funded by moving some levy line items in the past. This providing the funding needed without increasing taxes.

Lichtenwalter said those items now can return to their original spots in the levy. These items included a portion of the city's reinsurance, and a working cash fund levy, which is capped at a specified amount.

A new levy line item included this year is for water operations.

In additional council business, commissioner Ken Buchanan said this week would be the final run for the city's leaf vac. After that, residents should bag their leaves and place out for city pick

"We'll pick up bags throughout the year," Buchanan said.

City brush pick up has now ended for the season until March, except in the event of a winter storm.

Commissioner Wise said the city will plan to reroute a portion of water main along N. Street that Mulberry crosses Woodlawn Street at the cemetery. Wise

cited the difficulty in accessing the main to repair leaks because of its present route and location. He said he hoped the

elcome to my corner culinary delights. This should be my last coverage on canning. As a reminder, my intention is not to parrot what has already been say but to add to it or at least explain it.

Continuing on with the process of

canning, it is suggested that one puts their

lids into a bath of boiling water. It is

further suggested that the sanitized jars be

removed from the boiling water and lined

up inverse on sanitized towels ready for

use. I suggest that these jars remain in

the boiling water until needed. Also to try

and fish out lids from boiling water is not

fun. In fact, it is silly. What I suggest is

jars, one at a time, from the boiling water

when needed. I use tongs for this. Pour

the water from that jar into the pressure

cooker. Fill the jar with the desired food

leaving an inch of head room. Then

assemble the lid into its screw band.

Using tongs, dip that into the boiling

water to sanitize. Screw this onto the jar

and place that jar into the pressure cooker.

Repeat this process for each jar. As the

jars increase in the pressure cooker, so

does the hot water. There is no waste of

not wish to overcook any vegetables or noodles in a Culinary soup concoction. We must Corner also keep in mind the herbs that can be damaged by overheating. Naturally, salt and pepper are examples impervious to extended

periods of heat. There are also other forms of soup that are not adversely affected. I have often canned tomato soup, squash soup and split pea soup. Most any soup that is a puree can withstand long periods of heating. Such soups as French onion cannot be canned and taste right. All possibilities and conditions must be taken into account when canning.

Since canning is not what a professional chef is expected to do, it is not generally listed as a need for a chef to know. As a result, it was not taught in culinary school. A professional chef can add a lot of expertise to canning, notwithstanding. I personally find canning most interesting and useful. I feel that one who is interested in culinary should investigate all interests and possible related angles. Although culinary arts is most ancient, it is forever progressive and thus exciting.

From the domestic or home aspect, I highly suggest canning for improving the home economy, health and general pleasure. It is a great way for having something quickly available for serving unexpected guests. A well planned out pantry is an innate blessing in any home.



# Do you feel isolated?

Researchers must be worried about us. There are hundreds of studies done around the world on the topic of isolated seniors and how it's bad for our brain and physical health. While we can appreciate their concern, it would be nice if they could all agree on the facts they report.

A Norwegian university has released the results of a report on maintaining brain health and preventing cognitive decline. They've concluded, after reviewing 101 other studies, that social activity is important, along with physical exercise interesting hobbies.

One study praised us for following the Covid rules and staying home and not having face-to-face social activity, saying we mentally weathered our isolation better than any other age group. Another

study said that we didn't do well, that we suffered from sleep disturbances, depression and anxiety. Another study analyzing

information from before and during the pandemic concluded that there was physical and social isolation, but not digital isolation. In other words, we've been online communicating

One serious study looked at 12 possible relationships (friends, neighbors, family and so on) and concluded that being socially isolated made one more susceptible to the common cold.

Yet another study said that it was when the Covid rules were lifted, when we could go to stores and back to our meetings, that our real stress started.


In the U.S., 27 percent of seniors over the age of 60 live alone, as opposed to several other countries where multiple generations live together. One thing researchers need to consider: Some seniors might like the peace and quiet of living alone, might like having control about who comes over and when, and might prefer the independence.


This deal was played in a team-of-four game. At both tables South opened 2NT, showing a balanced hand and 20-21 HCP, and North raised to game. West's opening lead was the ♦K. Do you see how to make 9 tricks?

Clue: There is some trickery involved!

At the first table, Declarer counted eight top tricks and the only prospect for a ninth was to score a second Diamond. One possibility was to let the ♦K win the first trick, in the hope that West would be lured into continuing Diamonds, allowing Declarer's Jack to score (the so-called Bath Coup). But that was unlikely to work, as West (who had not been born the day before) would surely shift at Trick 2, presumably to a Club. Another chance for the ninth trick was to establish a second Diamond winner by force, eventually setting up Dummy's Eight. So, Declarer took the ♦A on the first trick and returned the ♦J, won by West's Queen. However, that line of play was also doomed to failure when West promptly shifted to a Club and the defense got their five tricks before Declarer could rustle up his nine tricks. Down one.

At the other table, West also led the ♦K, but this time Declarer found a rather surprising play. She smoothly dropped the Jack! Playing Declarer to have started with doubleton AJ, West confidently led a low Diamond to East's presumed Nine. It was a joy to behold the look of astonishment on West's face when it was Declarer who produced the Nine and claimed her nine tricks.
