

Pritzker signs changes to SAFE-T Act's cash bail provisions

SPRINGFIELD – Gov. JB Pritzker on Dec. 6 signed a follow-up measure to the SAFE-T Act criminal justice reform, the third such amendment since the law's initial passage in January 2021.

The changes approved by lawmakers last week in the fall veto session center on the law's provisions, which will end the use of cash bail beginning in January.

The cash bail system, which in most cases allows offenders to post a dollar amount to be released from custody pretrial, will be replaced

by one in which a judge weighs the individual's risk to the community and potential for fleeing prosecution in determining whether pretrial release will be revoked.

Its opponents have argued that the list of circumstances in which pretrial detention is specifically allowed is too limiting for judges.

Advocates, however, say that a presumption of pretrial release included in the law for lesser, nonviolent offenses will allow the courts to give more thorough hearings to those whose freedom is on the line prior to conviction.

"I'm pleased that the General Assembly has

passed clarifications that uphold the principle we fought to protect: to bring an end to a system where wealthy violent offenders can buy their way out of jail, while less fortunate nonviolent offenders wait in jail for trial," Gov. JB Pritzker said in a statement. "Advocates and lawmakers came together and put in hours of work to strengthen and clarify this law, uphold our commitment to equity, and keep people safe."

In many cases, the changes were more substantial than "clarifications," as the measure, contained in House Bill 1095, expanded the list of offenses in which a judge can deny pretrial release. The change made it so all forcible felonies can lead to pretrial detention regardless of whether the defendant would be eligible for probation if a judge deems them a danger to the community.

It also specified that the changes take effect for those charged after Dec. 31, 2022, but those on the old bail system can petition the court to be placed into the new cash-free system on staggered timelines depending on the severity of their charges.

Sheriff's office takes suspect into custody

LEE COUNTY — On Tuesday, Dec. 20, Jake Verkruysse was taken into custody in rural Henry County, by the Henry County Sheriff's Office and the Illinois State Police. Verkruysse was taken into custody without incident and taken to the Henry County Jail. Verkruysse was later transferred to the

Lee County Jail where he is being held on a warrant for escape. Verkruysse was arrested on Dec. 15, for an arrest warrant charging the offenses of Home Invasion (a Class X Felony), Mob Action (a Class 4 Felony), and Criminal Damage to Property Under \$500 (a Class A Misdemeanor). Verkruysse was later released on the evening of Dec. 16, on a recognizance bond due to ongoing medical conditions. As a condition of his release, Verkruysse was fitted with a GPS monitoring device and was to be confined to his residence in Erie. During the early morning hours of Dec. 17, Verkruysse removed the GPS monitoring system that was a condition of his release.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office investigation in locating Verkruysse was assisted by the Illinois Statewide Terrorism and Intelligence Center (STIC), the Whiteside County Sheriff's Office, the Henry County Sheriff's Office, the Illinois State Police, the Lee County States Attorney's Office, the Erie Police Department, and the Prophetstown Police Department.

2Lt. Lesslie Herman Sanders

Silver Star Award visitor to the Ashton Cemetery in Lee County can find the gravestone of Lesslie H. Sanders. Engraved on that stone are his name, the dates of his brieflife, and the words "Rainbow Division," - nothing more. But his courage and selfless action during the

Lesslie was raised in Ashton where his father owned an electrical shop. After graduating from Ashton High School, he completed three years at the University of Illinois in Urbana before enlisting in the army. Following officers training at Fort Benning, he was sent



Infantry Regiment, 42nd Infantry Division with the rank of Second Lieutenant.

The 42nd Infantry Division was named the "rainbow division" because it was drawn from the National Guards of 26 states and the District of Columbia, reflecting a cross section of American territory as a rainbow reflects the spectrum of color. From Marsille, France,

Lt. Sanders and the 42nd

Division advanced north to

River in Germany by March of 1945. Fighting intensified as Allied soldiers drove toward Berlin during April when Lt. Lesslie H. Sanders was wounded in battle. The details of his gallantry are

revealed in his Silver Star Award: "The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress

July 9, 1918, takes pride in

presenting the Silver Star

(posthumously) to Second

Lieutenant (infantry) Lessie H. Sanders (ASN: 0-551446), United States Army, for gallantry in action while serving with Company F, 222nd Infantry Regiment, 42nd Infantry Division, in action on 27 April 1945, near Schonletten, Germany. While Lieutenant Sanders was leading his weapons platoon along a road near Schonletten, Germany, a concealed enemy force opened fire with

Though hit by fragments of a panzerfaust he responded to a call from one of his men and, although mortally wounded, he crawled twenty yards under intense automatic weapons fire to render first aid. By his undaunted courage and gallant action Lieutenant Sanders saved a soldier's life and brought great credit upon himself and the military service.

Two days after being wounded in battle, Lt. Sanders' rainbow division joined in the liberation of the Dachau death camp near Munich where some 30,000 starving prisoners were discovered. On May 5th, just three days before Germany's unconditional surrender and the end of the European war, Lt. Sanders died of his wounds.

The remains of this young hero were finally returned home to Ashton on Nov. 2, 1948, his funeral at the Methodist Church on the following day. While his gravestone may not reflect

Members of House and Senate working groups worked for months on the changes with state's attorney and law enforcement groups, but Republicans said during floor debate that they were not included in the process. Many concerns cited by opponents in the recent election

season were addressed, however.

For example, the follow-up bill specifies that police maintain the authority to arrest trespassers.

While it maintains language instructing officers to issue a citation in lieu of custodial arrest for cases below Class A misdemeanors, it also specifies that police maintain discretion to make an arrest if the person is a threat to the community or they continue to break the law. "We understand that public safety is not a static issue,"

House Deputy Majority Leader Jehan Gordon-Booth, D-Peoria, said in a statement. "This legislation strengthens the underlying SAFE-T Act with valuable feedback from survivors, law enforcement, prosecutors and other public safety advocates. If we want to make our communities safer, we have to work together. This update is a step in the right

The measure clarifies judicial authority to revoke pretrial release if the defendant violates electronic monitoring conditions and specifically states penalties may be imposed for intentional tampering with monitoring devices. The SAFE-T Act specifies that defendants have a right

to a public defender from their first appearance in court, a change that is expected to increase justice system workloads. The measure creates a grant program to aid public defenders with increased caseloads, but allocation of funding for the program would be up to future General Assemblies. Asked at an unrelated news conference Wednesday how

he would gauge the effectiveness of the bill once it takes effect, Pritzker said he'd be looking to the Illinois Supreme Court and state's attorneys to outline unforeseen challenges.

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

Expanded bereavement leave rights take effect Jan. 1

SPRINGFIELD – The Family Bereavement Leave Act will go into effect on Jan. 1, 2023, expanding unpaid leave rights for employees across the State. As the New Year approaches, employers should be aware of the new requirements under the Act.

The Family Bereavement Leave Act (FBLA) is an amendment to the Child Bereavement Leave Act (CBLA) that expands leave time requirements to cover pregnancy loss, failed adoptions or surrogacy agreements, unsuccessful reproductive procedures, and other diagnoses or events negatively impacting pregnancy or fertility. The FBLA also requires employers to provide leave time after the loss of family members previously not covered by the CBLA, including spouses, domestic partners, siblings, grandparents, and stepparents.

Employees may take up to two weeks, or 10 working days, of unpaid leave time for any of the events covered by the FBLA to grieve, to attend a funeral, or to make arrangements necessitated by the death of the family member.

Employers may require reasonable documentation to certify that an employee requesting FBLA leave experienced an event covered by the Act, but employees are not required to identify the specific event that qualifies them for the leave. Reasonable documentation includes death certificates, published obituaries, and documentation from an adoption or surrogacy organization. A

Bereavement Leave form is available on the Department's website that may be used as reasonable documentation.

Workers who experience the death of a loved one or other kinds of loss such as a miscarriage or a failed adoption should be able to grieve without the fear of losing their job," said Illinois Department of Labor Acting Director Jane Flanagan. "The Family Bereavement Leave Act ensures that those workers will be afforded time off from work to process that grief."

All employers and employees subject to the federal Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) are subject to the FBLA.

A Winter Walk Along paths taken and not taken, our winter birds share the way

₹ veryone should ∡take a quiet walk in the woods in winter. Near the edges you will see tree sparrows and juncos. A blue jay is sure to flash by. A downy woodpecker may be tapping on the stem of a ragweed. And every woods



has a red-bellied woodpecker. Red-headed woodpeckers are here one day and gone the next, constantly moving to another woods. In some winters they are abundant, and in others they are completely absent. The red-tailed hawk may be seen soaring overhead, and he may call as he does in the spring mating season. The white-breasted nuthatches are usually there, their "yank-yank-yank" calls will echo through the stillness. Even louder is the "peter-peter-peter" call of the tufted titmouse.

During a winter walk, you will never encounter a happier group than a flock of chickadees. Even if it is snowing and the weather is cold, the chickadees are happy and carefree as they search for larvae and the eggs of insects. Their musical chatter -- "dee-dee-dee" -- will temp you to follow along with them. They will not mind your company.

I can remember following a flock of chickadees through a creek bottom as they worked their way to a cavity

in a tree where they would spend the night. They were going in the opposite direction that I wanted to go. They were going south to the woods and I was going north to my home in the city. I could not go along with them and they could not

come along with me. We had to part, but it was a pleasant experience to follow a flock of chickadees on a cold winter day.



A RACEHORSE FOR THE AGES

in the Afterword to her recent novel, "Horse," about the greatest racehorse in American history, Geraldine Brooks explains that in the decade before the Civil War, "this thriving [horseracing] industry was built on the labor and skill of Black horsemen, many of whom were, or had been, enslaved...it became clear to me that this novel could not merely be about a racehorse, it would also need to be about race." As often happens, the question is whether a white author, in this instance, a 66-year-old white Australian woman, can bring it off. In my opinion, her story of Lexington, the record-breaking Kentucky thoroughbred, is a vibrant account of a fabulous racehorse, whereas the parts having to do with slavery and present-day racism are flat and uninspired.

The novel is structured around two young Black male protagonists. Jarret is the enslaved groom of Lexington in the antebellum South, who, after the Civil War, becomes a renowned horse trainer in Canada. Theo is an art history graduate student living in Washington D.C. in 2019. The son of distinguished diplomats (his mother is Nigerian, his father American), he is a Londoner and former star polo player who left the sport after enduring vicious, unremitting racist harassment.

Handsome, gifted, and educated (Jarret learns to read), Theo and Jarret are often described as socially exemplary. Animals love them: the intimate connection between Jarret and Lexington is one of the pleasures of the novel; Theo and his shelter dog are inseparable. But the women in the two men's lives are curiously flawed. Whereas Jarret and Theo are meticulous in all they do and have "impeccable manners," the women, both white, are often sloppy, unkempt, emotionally brittle, and unwittingly racist.

I found an episode in which Jarret is forced to work in the cotton fields rather questionable. Jarret is whipped and mistreated, along with the two hundred slaves disfigured by unrelenting labor and housed in crammed, foul-smelling shacks. "He felt a new understanding for the folk who bore it, and an admiration for those brave enough to risk everything to run away from such a life. An empathy grew in him. He began to watch people with the sensitive attention he'd only ever accorded his horses ... Even as his world contracted and pressed in upon him, in equal measure his heart expanded."

When Jarret is reunited with Lexington and they leave that plantation, "he wasn't sorry to have seen what he'd seen, and learned what he learned. Not just the book learning. He felt larger in spirit. There was a space in his soul for the suffering of people. He resolved to take account of their lives, the heavy burdens they carried." Is this not a white delusion that unspeakable cruelty will elicit tender emotions, even gratitude, in the victim?

Weather can change quickly in Illinois, so whether you're driving a short distance or taking a longer trip, GettingAroundIllinois. com is an essential resource to keep you updated 24/7/365 on road conditions throughout the state all winter long.

"Our No. 1 priority is making sure roads are safe for the motoring public, but you should always prepare yourself before taking any trips," said Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman. "Completely clearing roads during and after a weather event can take some time and depends on a variety of factors. We will get the job done, but ask the public to please remain patient during winter weather and always check GettingAroundIllinois.com before driving anywhere for the most updated road conditions."

GettingAroundIllinois.com is available on your computer and optimized for smartphones. The site includes the ability to identify and zoom in on a location, travel route or destination on a state map. Road conditions are recorded by plow drivers out in the field and relayed to GettingAroundIllinois.com through a cloud-based system to provide a general overview on IDOT-maintained highways.

The road conditions map averages more than 2.5 million pageviews during snow-and-ice season, featuring a color scheme of pinks and blues to differentiate from the red, yellow and green of traffic congestion reporting, as well as to increase accessibility for those who have difficulty distinguishing colors. Like others in the transportation industry, IDOT has seen the demand grow for workers with commercial driver's licenses. SPRINGFIELD - Hunters in Illinois took a preliminary total of 76,854 deer during the seven-day 2022 Illinois Firearm Deer Season that concluded Dec. 4, according to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

Comparatively, hunters harvested a final total of 70,411 deer during the firearm season in 2021.

The preliminary harvest for the second segment of the 2022 firearm season Dec. 1-4 was 24,500, compared with 21,477 during the second season in 2021. The preliminary harvest for the first segment of this year's firearm season Nov. 18-20 was 52,354 deer.

Remaining 2022-23 deer season hunting opportunities in Illinois include:

• Late-winter antlerless-only deer season and Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) deer season, in designated counties only, Dec. 29, 2022, through Jan. 1, 2023, and Jan. 13-15, 2023.







ICC offers consumers winter energy savings tips

SPRINGFIELD – The war on Ukraine and supply chain constraints are key drivers of rising energy costs globally and here in Illinois. To keep your home warm this winter and save money by reducing energy costs, the Illinois Commerce Commission is offering a few tips to help homeowners prepare for freezing temperatures.

- Install smart thermostats that automatically adjust heating and cooling temperature
- Check with your utility company about enrolling in time-based electricity rates programs to reduce energy usage during peak hours or to learn about energy efficiency services they may offer.
- Set your thermostat at 68 degrees while you are awake and home, lower at night and when you are away.
- · Water heating accounts for 14-18% of homeowner's utility bill. Turn down your water heater to 120 degrees to save money.
- Cover the inside of drafty windows with heavy plastic and seal tightly to the frame to avoid air infiltration. Check exterior door and window

frames for leaks, use caulk or weather stripping to seal. Use insulated curtains, shades, or other energy-efficient window treatments.

• Schedule a maintenance service call for your heating system. Be sure to change filters on furnace and heat pumps at least once a month.

For wood and pellet-burning heaters, clean the flue vent regularly, and clean the interior of appliances with a wire brush.
