# Clinton resident questions city's stop sign and parking regulations

Officials cite city and state codes on issues

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CLINTON — Stop signs and parking were on the mind of resident Kenny Atchison when he addressed the city council on Nov. 1.

Atchison lives in the 900 block of E. Johnson Street. He told commissioners he was concerned about the number of intersections in town that had no stop

"There's six or seven or eight that don't have stop signs," Atchison said, referring to a particular "I've neighborhood. never brought it up before, but my granddaughter, one of her other grandparents lives at one of these intersections. I'm afraid there would be a wreck, get up in the yard, run her over or something. Then, I'd hold everybody liable for that."

Atchison said it would be a cheap fix for the city. He suggested removing two stop signs from a four-way stop and install them at the intersection

them at the intersection.

Commissioner Ken
Buchanan said additional

stop signs would not necessarily prevent drivers from failing to stop. Atchison said it might protect the city from liability if an accident did happen.

Public works administrator Steve Lobb, attending the meeting remotely, commented about the issue.

"When it comes to liability, the city adopted the Federal Highway Manual on all stop signs and regulatory signs," Lobb said. "There are some stop signs that have been there for 100 years and they're just grandfathered in and don't fall under that criteria."

He said any new stop signs installed must meet the criteria in the manual established by the federal highway authority.

"A lot of it has to do with the amount of traffic per day," Lobb said. "There is a lot that has to go through that."

Lobb said he understood Atchison's concern, "but you can't have stop signs at every corner."

Atchison said he wasn't suggesting every intersection needed to be a four-way stop, but he felt every intersection should have at least two stop or yield signs.

# Efforts intensify to keep barges rolling on Mississippi River

ULLIN, III. — The traffic jam on the Mississippi River caused by some of the lowest water levels in a decade will likely

continue near term.

About 200 boats and 3,000 barges on the lower Mississippi River were delayed at different points of the waterway mid-October, according to the U.S. Coast Guard.

What does that mean

to farmers and others who depend on barges to ship or receive products? Like many of the other supply chain issues the past couple years, expect slower shipping times and higher prices to move commodities.

"It's a big-time disruption in the supply chain," said Paul Rohde, vice president of the Waterways Council, a trade association for river navigation interests. "The impact is pretty severe for barge transportation."

Tows, which often move 45 to 60 barges at a time, currently are restricted to 25 barges at a 9-foot depth, as previously reported in FarmWeek. And tonnage per barge has been reduced due to low water levels.

As a result, the cost to ship a ton of corn or soybeans down the river jumped from \$29 in early September and \$50 by Sept. 27 to more than \$105 by mid-October, Rohde reported.

"Forty percent of the

world's food supply comes from the Mississippi River basin," Rohde said. "This is a global crisis we could be looking at if the river level doesn't raise in the next month."

In the meantime, efforts ramped up in recent weeks to keep barge traffic rolling on the river. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers deployed dredges that are working in 12-hour shifts and it's doing survey work to look for other methods to ease the issues.

### DeWitt County voters choose Republicans across the board

All state-level Democrats reelected to office

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CLINTON — In contested races in Tuesday's election, in DeWitt County, Republican Kathy Salvi, challenger, beat incumbent Democrat Tammy Duckworth in the U.S. Senate race. Statewide, Duckworth won reelection to the Senate.

In DeWitt County, Republican Darren Bailey beat Democrat Gov. J.B Pritzker. Statewide, Pritzker won reelection.

DeWitt County voters rejected the Constitutional Amendment question on Tuesday's ballot. With 30 percent of the vote in statewide on Tuesday, approval of the amendment stood at about 65 percent to 35 percent in favor.

In the race for state attorney general, DeWitt County chose Republican

Thomas DeVore over Democrat incumbent Kwame Raoul. Raoul won reelection statewide. Republican Dan beat incumbent Brady Giannoulias in Alexi the secretary of state race in DeWitt County.

Statewide,

Giannoulias

won reelection.

In DeWitt County and districtwide, Republican Mary Miller won election to the U.S. House from the newly-created Illinois 15<sup>th</sup> Congressional District. Miller will represent roughly half of DeWitt County.

All local candidates ran unopposed.

The unofficial results were posted from all of DeWitt County's 23 precincts reporting.

another issue, Atchison said a Clinton Police officer told him, along with other residents on his block, they could not park their vehicles perpendicular to their houses or the roadway. They were told they must park parallel to the street.

"That eliminates half the parking for all of our houses," he said.

Atchison asked why the city "encourages illegal parking" on the square but prohibits residents from parking similarly in front of their homes.

Police chief Ben Lowers

said Atchison could read the regulations regarding city parking online on the city's website.

"Parking in a residential area or along the street is different than parking on the square on in a municipal parking lot," Lowers said.

He said the ordinance differentiated between the square and other areas. Lowers added the city code regarding parking along the street "mirrors that of the state."

"State law requires parking parallel to the roadway," Lowers said.

"The good news is the industry is resilient from an operational standpoint and working to make sure navigation continues and, more importantly, it's safe navigation," Rohde said. "With all the challenges, it (river transportation) is still the best way to move products north and south.

"This really harkens back to 2012, when we had the last real low water crisis (on the Mississippi)," he noted. "A decade ago, we had rock pinnacles to remove. We don't have anything like that at this point, it's just a matter of low river levels due to a lack of rainfall."

The Mississippi River collects water from about two-thirds of the country, according to Rohde. But 81% of the continental U.S. was abnormally dry or in a drought as of mid-October, up from 68.7% three months ago, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

Recent low water levels surpassed some of the key milestones during the 2012 drought. But the lowest mark on the river of the past generation for navigation purposes remains 1988 when tows were restricted to 16 barges at a 9-foot depth, according to Rohde.

Farmers and grain handlers have responded to the situation with alternative storage transportation plans.

"We haul all our grain to an inland elevator," said Brent Clair, a farmer from Loraine (Adams County), not far from the Mississippi River at Quincy. "They're hauling more further inland rather than going to the river."

Ken Taake, who farms in Ullin (Pulaski County), near the convergence of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, reported river terminals in his area stopped taking corn and soybean shipments for

a day and were limited to contracted grain for additional days, as of Oct.

"The low river levels have been playing havoc with local markets," Taake said. "Even when (local terminals) have been buying grain, the basis has been terrible."

CPAP machines: Two dozen different CPAP machines have recalled. The list includes Bilevel PAP, BiPAP or BPAP machines, as well as the CPAP. The reason is a bit frightening. Black foam pieces can come loose and be breathed in or swallowed.

While the recall was issued quite a long time ago, the Food and Drug Administration updated that information with this alert: If you now have one of the repaired or replaced machines (due to the previous recall), testing is currently being done to ensure that the

repair foam used is OK.

The reason for the concern and the current testing: There been deaths, far many deaths, from the breakdown of the foam used in the machines.

The recall says not to stop using the machine until you talk to your doctor, whether you have an original machine or one that was repaired or is a replacement.

Bedrails on portable beds: The Consumer Product Safety Commission (and several companies) issued a warning for thousands of portable bedrails, the ones that attach to the sides of beds to keep someone from falling out. The problems are so serious that deaths were reported when people became wedged between mattress and the rail.

bedrails were under various names. Your best bet is to call the Consumer Product Safety Commission and ask about bedrail recalls to be sure you learn about all possible brands. Contact



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

### Mary Kate 'Katie' Fraley

TAYLORVILLE, III. — Katie Fraley, a dynamic elementary school teacher, who influenced countless students over four decades in the classroom and was an exuberant force in the civic life of the Taylorville community, has died. She was 85.

Mary "Katie" Kate Reeder was born on November 2, 1936, in DeWitt, Ill., just outside of Clinton, to Inez B. and John H. Reeder, who farmed in the area. She was the youngest child and had seven brothers.

After graduating from Clinton High School, she went on to earn a bachelor's degree in education from Illinois Wesleyan University, where she was a member of the Sigma Kappa sorority.

In 1958, she married Earl Thomas "Tom" Brandon, of Clinton. The couple lived briefly in Clinton and in Shelbyville, Ill. before moving to Taylorville, where Tom was a farm loan manager at what was then the First Trust Bank on the Square.

1965, In following Tom's death at the age of 31, Katie worked to earn a master's degree in education from the University of Illinois by attending night school in Springfield and summer school in Champaign, while teaching school in Taylorville and raising her young daughter.

In 1967, she married Taylorville attorney, Vance Fraley, who survives her.

For nearly 40 years, she taught fourth grade at North Elementary School, where she arrived every day flamboyantly dressed and raring to go. A creative and charismatic teacher, she cared deeply about her students, and she took great pride in their accomplishments in the classroom and in all stages of their lives.

At North School, she was well known for directing the school's Christmas musicals, holding annual Hawaiian luau, and instructing students in the fine art of assembling scrapbooks Abraham Lincoln. Indeed, after so many years of teaching students about the life of Honest Abe, she became a self-taught authority on him.

After 41 years in the classroom, she "retired," leaving teaching not education. She was elected to three four-year terms on the Taylorville School Board. Her vision, she always had one, was for the school district to build a fine arts center, a goal that, while not realized during her tenure on the board, is now in early planning and fundraising phases.

Katie was an energetic fixture in many facets of community life - at the Taylorville First United Methodist Church, with the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), and through P.E.O., an international



women's education and advocacy organization.

In the mid-1970s, she was one of a small group of families who helped revive the tradition of hosting foreign-exchange students in Taylorville. Her initiative led the Fraleys to become the American Field Service (AFS) host family for a Swedish student, Lena Hallgren, for a school year; more than four decades later, Lena and her family in Sweden remain a part of the extended Fraley family.

Katie played piano well, and she loved to sing. She delighted in music of all kinds, and she was a presence at virtually all Taylorville music events and musicals over the years, usually nodding her head, tapping her foot, and singing along.

She is survived by her husband of 55 years, Vance Fraley, of Taylorville; daughter, Karen Brandon (Christopher Woodruff), Oxford, England; of daughter Lenee Soto, of Lake Zurich, Ill.; son Derek Fraley (Melissa Fraley), of Edwards, Ill.; and AFS daughter, Lena Kolvik (Jonas Kolvik), of Gothenburg, Sweden; grandchildren Jackson Woodruff and Avery Woodruff, of Edinburgh, Scotland; Samuel Soto and Nic Soto, of Lake Zurich, Ill.; Madelyn Fraley and Landon Fraley, of Edwards, Ill; and AFS granddaughters, Julia Kolvik, of Gothenburg, Sweden, Linnea and Kolvik, of Stockholm. Sweden; cousin. Dorothy Addison (Ken Addison), of Paris, Ky.; many nieces and nephews; many grandnieces and grandnephews; countless former students who have said that she was an influential figure in their education and in their lives.

She was preceded in death by her first husband, Earl Thomas Brandon; her seven brothers; her son-inlaw, Rafael Soto; a niece, Joan Diaz; and a nephew, Galen Reeder.

Visitation will be held from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, November 12, at the Shafer-Perfetti & Assalley Funeral Home, in Taylorville. If active-duty military service members unable to work due to a disabling condition and continue to receive pay while in a hospital or on medical leave, they should consider applying for SSDI. Active-duty status and receipt of military pay doesn't necessarily prevent payment of SSDI benefits. webpages

Stop and think about what she was actually Their finances saying. were/are so tight that they have put their hope in the lottery. Remember the odds of winning are one in 230,000,000. Her comment and the action on it almost certainly guarantees that they will never be able to save for retirement or to truly provide for their family. They have put their limited money in a false hope—the lottery.

It is one thing to play a game of chance as entertainment and an entirely different thing to place your financial future on a game of chance. The lottery is pure chance. There is no skill involved. People win and lose and the state gets its money. I accept and acknowledge

that the purchase of a lottery ticket is a voluntary act of the buyer.

What also has to be acknowledged is that the lottery is also the favorite source of tax revenue for the government. We don't call it a tax, but in reality that is what it is. The down side is that the "tax" impacts the lower economic segment of society in far greater amounts than it impacts those with higher earnings. Unfortunately the social costs to the poor buying lottery tickets is high, At the same time, it is a choice they have made. I don't see a winner in the current situation.

ELECTIONS — The elections will be over tonight. The attack ads will stop. We can have peace. Whatever results, the nation will go forward. If your candidate won, congratulations. If your candidate lost, there will be another election. Regardless, the winner is now our elected official and we as citizens need to accept and respect the results of the voting populace.



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# Trussing

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Trussing is rarely an article considered for teaching in cookbooks. It is assumed by many that it is straight forward; thus, having few concerns. Be that as it may, I find a need to present it. Let us start with a turkey.

The turkey would be the simplest since it is generally preconditioned for you. Large birds are easier to handle. legs are held down with a plastic strap and the indicator temperature stuck in its breast. To start, do not trust those indicators, I never do for good reason. All that is left to truss would be the wings. Do not bother with sting. I simply use toothpicks to secure the wing tips to the body.

The purpose for trussing a bird is to hold its extremities closer to the body so it all bake evenly. Chickens are usually the main concern since they are not usually prepared in this way. The legs as well as the wings must be restrained. In one of Julia Child's shows, I noticed that she used a grain sack needle with a cord to secure the wings. I see this as overkill. Since the legs must also be secured,



it is a simple operation to secure both in one stroke. I will explain how this is done efficiently.


For chicken, you will need about four feet of cord. I use the old quick technique of measure. I measure out a yard from my nose to my out stretched hand. I then add to it about half that stretch. In the old days that is how cloth was measured and I am from the old days and proud of it. One starts with the leg joint. By folding the cord in half, the center is found. The center fold goes under the leg joints and crisscrossed up and over. It is then crisscrossed under the back of the chicken and brought up around the wings. It is tied across the chest with a surgeon's knot. This is something I taught one of

my instructors. A simple square knot does not hold; it can slip before the second knot can be looped. A surgical knot is a double loop. This holds. A second double loop is done to secure it. The job is done. It helps

if the cotton cord is moist. To truss a rolled roast is different. Roll it as required. Tie up one end securely. Now bring our cord up an inch or Circle the roast and interlace the cord. Interlacing means to bring it up over and under the cord. Everything must be pulled tightly with each interlacing. A most helpful hit is to use hemostats for securing each interlacing. Knowing how to use your hands and fingers will work as well. The final execution is to bring the cord over the end of the roast back to the base and

baby step at a time and West led the ▼K. Seeing the danger of Heart ruffs in Dummy, East overtook with his Ace and smartly shifted to a trump. That was sensible defense, now what would be sensible Declarer play?

It may seem routine to finesse the Spade, but that would be fatal. West wins his King and returns another trump. Oops! Now Declarer has only one Heart ruff in Dummy and is down one! The correct play is easy enough if Declarer counts his tricks. He has three side-suit winners, and if he can get two Heart ruffs in Dummy, then he can make do with just five trump tricks in his own hand. Ten easy tricks, but only if Declarer makes certain of both ruffs by hopping up with the A at Trick 2. The full line of play is: ♥A; A; Heart ruff; A; Diamond ruff; Heart ruff; Diamond ruff; then play on trumps.

As Declarer was engineering those Heart ruffs he did well to return to hand with Diamond ruffs. If he had attempted to use the ♣A and ♣K as his entries then he'd have got a nasty shock when West ruffed the second Club for down one.

How about an opening trump lead? Does that set 4♠? Actually, no! Declarer wins and plays a Heart. If East wins that trick he cannot play another trump, and Dummy gets the two ruffs ... and if West wins he can lead a trump to stop the second ruff, but only at the expense of his natural trump trick. A Club opening lead is no better for the defense because, although the defense is able to arrange a Club ruff, that comes at the expense of their natural Club trick.
