County tracking penalties connected to wind project

CLINTON — As construction of the Alta Farms II wind energy project nears completion, the county is in the process of sorting out penalties levied against the construction company and developer of the project. chairman Terry Ferguson reported White Construction had racked up about 50 penalties pertaining to road misuse during the project. He said the assumption had been that each infraction would cost the company a \$5,000 fine, but Ferguson said it wasn't exactly how the procedure worked. then becomes part of the wind farm project, and they have to upgrade that road," Ferguson said. Hospital easing mask rules per CDC

CLINTON — Warner Hospital & Health Services has eased its mask restrictions after Gov. JB Pritzker announced more flexible rules for the state.

Hospital CEO Paul Skowron announced the changes during Tuesday's city council meeting. The decision came after Pritzker announced a change in his executive order on Friday, loosening mask requirements in Illinois to be in line with CDC guidelines.

"County-by-county, as long as you're not in the high category, you can loosen your restrictions," Skowron said. "But, it doesn't say to what extent.

Skowron said that meant mask restrictions could be subject to change from month to month if the county were suddenly pushed into a high risk area because of increasing COVID cases.

"Or, if too many counties in the state get too high, he (Pritzker) could change his executive order."

After a review with medical staff, the hospital approved loosening mask restrictions in public areas of the facility. Masks will not be required in those areas, but visitors and staff may still wear masks if they feel more comfortable. "But, in patient care areas, where there is direct patient contact, the employees and the patients will still be required to wear masks," Skowron said. "Because we are going into a flu season, we want to be careful. We don't know what might change with health conditions as we go into the winter." In other city business, the council voted to vacate a series of alleyways that have become grown over with grass. Each homeowner in the areas affected will assume ownership of half the width of the alley. The city will maintain an easement, but alley access will no long be available. One exception involves a resident with an alleywayaccessible garage located at the end of a block. And, the city recently held a closed session meeting to begin the search for a new city administrator. Belynda Allen, who began as city administrator in September is no longer with the city. Allen replaced Daren Girdler, who was hired to replace Tim Followell. Followell retired in December 2021. Girdler left the post in February this year after just a few weeks on the job.

During the Oct. 11 meeting of the county's land use committee, If construction vehicles are caught using a nonwind project-designated road five times, "that road determine if they were on a road that has over five violations."

He said once the roads involved had been identified, they would have to come to an agreement about how much improvement would

be necessary.

Ferguson said he wanted the issue settled in October.

"I don't want them (Enel

Green Energy) coming in here asking for a permit to operate and claiming they have everything settled," he said.

Social Security announces 8.7 percent benefit increase for 2023

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for approximately 70 million Americans will increase 8.7 percent in 2023, the Social Security Administration announced today. On average, Social Security benefits will increase by more than \$140 per month starting in January.

The 8.7 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits payable to more than 65 million Social Security beneficiaries in January 2023. Increased payments to more than 7 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December 30, 2022. (Note: some people receive both Social Security and SSI benefits). The Social Security Act ties the annual COLA to the increase in the Consumer Price Index as determined by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"Medicare premiums are going down and Social Security benefits are going up in 2023, which will give seniors more peace of mind and breathing room. This year's substantial Social Security cost-of-living adjustment is the first time in over a decade that Medicare premiums are not rising and shows that we can provide more support to older Americans who count on the benefits they have earned," Acting Commissioner Kilolo Kijakazi said.

Some other adjustments that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$160,200 from \$147,000.

Social Security SSI and beneficiaries are normally notified by mail starting in early December about their new benefit amount. The fastest way to find out their new benefit amount is to access their personal my Social Security account to view the COLA notice online. It's secure, easy, and people find out before the mail arrives. People can also opt to receive a text or email alert when there is a new message from Social Security--such as their

COLA notice--waiting for them, rather than receiving a letter in the mail. People may create or access their my Social Security account online at www.ssa.gov/ myaccount.

Information about Medicare changes for 2023 is available at www.medicare.gov. For Social Security beneficiaries enrolled in Medicare, their new higher 2023 benefit amount will be available in December through the mailed COLA notice and my Social Security's Message Center.



2023 SOCIAL SECURITY CHANGES

Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA):

Based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI-W) from the third quarter of 2021 through the third quarter of 2022, Social Security and Supplemental Security income (SSI) beneficiaries will receive an 8.7 percent COLA for 2023. Other important 2023 Social Security information is as follows:

NOTE: The 7.65% tax rate is the combined rate for Social Security and Medicare. The Social Security portion (OASDI) is 6.20% on earnings up to the applicable taxable maximum amount (see below). Also, as of January 2013, individuals with earned income of more than \$200,000 (\$250,000 for married couples filing jointly) pay an additional 0.9 percent.

Governor's Race

Gov. JB Pritzker is facing off against state Sen. Darren Bailey, a Republican farmer from downstate Xenia. The candidates' views diverge widely on just about every topic, from abortion to state spending to pandemic response to addressing gun crime.

Comptroller's Race

In Illinois, the position of chief fiscal officer is that of comptroller.

Democrat Susana Mendoza has been elected to that post twice, for a partial term beginning in December 2016 before gaining reelection in 2018. She touts the reduction of a \$16 billion bill backlog to a standard 30-day billing cycle, the state's largest-ever \$1 billion balance in its rainy-day fund and a pension payment that went \$500 million beyond statutory levels in the current fiscal year as some of her greatest accomplishments.

Her opponent, Shannon Teresi, is a newcomer to state politics and is currently the McHenry County auditor. It's an experience, she said, that will help her root out "waste, fraud and abuse" in state government – one of her most-repeated reasons for running.

Treasurer's Race

The race for treasurer – the state's chief investment officer – pits two-term incumbent Michael Frerichs against Republican Tom Demmer, a deputy minority leader in the General Assembly and House GOP point person on budget issues. The Libertarian candidate is Preston Nelson.

Frerichs touts more than \$1 billion in investment gains as his greatest achievement while emphasizing his administrative work on unclaimed property, a state college savings plan and other programs overseen by the office.

Demmer has focused his race on being a statewide check on Democratic power when it comes to tax and budget issues, frequently attacking Frerichs for a comment he made in 2020 regarding a proposed graduated income tax amendment: "One thing a progressive tax would do is make clear you can have graduated rates when you are taxing retirement income. And, I think that's something that's worth discussion," Frerichs is quoted as saying in the Daily Herald. The treasurer, meanwhile, has no formal role in setting tax policy and Frerichs has frequently stated he does not support a retirement tax.

Jesse White, the retiring secretary of state who has held the post since 1999.

While Giannoulias has White's endorsement, the outgoing secretary has also spoken highly of Brady. And Brady has the endorsement of Republican former governor and secretary of state Jim Edgar.

Attorney General's Race

Democratic Attorney General Kwame Raoul and Republican private practice attorney Thomas DeVore differ starkly on a number of issues, with the AG's response to COVID-19 executive orders leading that list.

DeVore was a frequent challenger of the governor's executive order authority throughout the pandemic, while Raoul defended that authority in court. But it's not the only issue on which the pair differed.

Constitutional Amendment 1

Voters will decide on whether the state's constitution will be amended to give a right to workers to unionize. The IAPME hosted a forum with one proponent and one opponent on that issue. The full text of the amendment is as follows:

SECTION 25. WORKERS' RIGHTS

(a) Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and collectively to bargain through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours, and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment.

(b) The provisions of this Section are controlling over those of Section 6 of Article VII.

Supreme Court 3rd District

In the 3rd Judicial District, incumbent Michael J. Burke is seeking to maintain a spot on the high court against Justice Mary Kay O'Brien. While this and the 2nd District race could reverse the partisan majority of the court if both Republicans

Clinton Lake youth wingshooting clinics and pheasant hunt Oct. 22

SPRINGFIELD – Young hunters between the ages of 10 and 17 can apply now for youth wingshooting clinics and youth pheasant hunts scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 22 at Edward R. Madigan State Fish and Wildlife Area in Lincoln and Saturday, Oct. 29 at Clinton Lake State Recreation Area in DeWitt.

Registrants will participate in а wingshooting clinic during the morning. Wingshooting instrutors certified by the National Sporting Clays Association and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) will lead the clinic. Young hunters will practice safe shotgun handling and operation while advancing their wingshooting skills. The youth pheasant hunt will take place during the afternoon. Participants must have successfully completed an approved hunter safety course and have a valid hunting license.


Permits are available through IDNR's controlled pheasant hunting online reservation system. Applicants should review the Illinois Youth Pheasant Hunt Information and the Illinois Youth Pheasant Hunt Regulations prior to applying at https:// d n r 2.illin o is.gov/ controlledhunt/.

Once the information has been reviewed, hunters may apply for their preferred area and date https://dnr2.illinois. at gov/PheasantHunt/ ApplyYFCFS.aspx. An information packet will be mailed separately following successful application for a permit. Co-sponsors assist the IDNR and Edward R. Madigan and Clinton Lake staff with the wingshooting clinics and pheasant hunts. They provide funding for the clay targets, target and field shot shells, and lunch for participants. Throught the assistance of some of their members, cosponsors also provide bird dogs, bird dog handlers, and hunting guides. At Edward R. Madigan, the 2022 co-sponsors are Logan County Chapter of Pheasants Forever and the Logan County Chapter of the Quail and Upland Game Alliance. At Clinton Lake, the co-sponsor is DeWitt County Chapter of Pheasants Forever. Clinic participants will be required to observe all guidance from the CDC and Illinois Department of Public Health at the time of the event regarding face coverings and social distancing.

Former state treasurer Alexi Giannoulias and state Rep. Dan Brady each have a long list of initiatives they would like to implement to modernize the secretary of state's office. They're vying to replace



Supreme Court 2nd District

In the 2nd District, longtime Judge Elizabeth "Liz" Rochford, a Democrat, is facing former Lake County Sheriff Mark Curran, a recent Republican U.S. Senate candidate who has never served as a judge.

They're vying for a 10-year term on the Supreme Court in a seat which includes DeKalb, Kane, Kendall, Lake and McHenry counties. It's one of the state's seven Supreme Court seats. Three of them are from District 1, which is Cook County, while four other geographic districts across the rest of Illinois each have one seat.

than other groups –an estimated \$113.7 billion a year!

Reporting fraud can be difficult and older adults tend to underreport– especially when money is lost. Many older Americans are unsure about the reporting process or feel too embarrassed to report. Understaffed Adult Protective Services offices can also cause long processing times and underreporting.



child's our education matters. It matters a lot. Children will spend the majority of their formative years in school, learning and socializing. The yearslong experience will shape them into who they will become. Knowing this, it is no small task for parents and all adults to place this enormous responsibility in the most capable of hands.

That is not what is happening in Illinois. The state's public school system is failing miserably to prepare its students for the future, and in our own backyard only 9 percent of Decatur's public school 3rd graders can read at

grade level. Similar results can be found across the state, and no one seems to be taking responsibility. Decatur school officials and the Illinois State Board of Education are especially adept at pushing 'feelgood' numbers on parents while simultaneously promoting children to the next grade level, regardless of ability. An extensive report by Wirepoints. 'Poor Student org, Achievement and Near-Zero Accountability', lays it all out.

Adding insult to injury, while being woefully derelict in their duty to teach students the most basic of elementary skills, schools are aggressively promoting а sexual agenda. With the Illinois legislature's recent passage of Senate Bill 818, considerable course material and instruction has been added to the state's curriculum. The sexual education

program mandated in SB 818 was developed by a private group, SEICUS (Sex Ed for Social Change) without any input from parents or the public. According to its website, they believe that sex education has the power to spark large-scale social change. Is this a priority for Illinois parents? Is this what taxpayer dollars should be funding?

It's time to be laserfocused on what is going on in our children's classrooms and at our school board meetings. The children of Illinois are counting on us.





Final exam

elcome to little my corner of culinary delights. Ready for a final exam of what we have learned? Don't worry. A final examination can mean an explanatory summation. Not necessarily an inquisitorial.

The potato teaches us the need to always keep in mind a food item's makeup; their composition. Unfortunately, many cookbooks are lacking that education. As a result, their recipes might need improvement. Therefore, to follow merely the recipe does not necessarily teach one how to improve upon culinary procedures. By gaining education, you can better improve upon such recipes or make your own. With this in mind, we are ready for our explanatory summation. See if you get from it what I did.

One of the things we learned is that with everything being equal (temperature, oil & potato), the cut and size can make a big difference in structure and taste (potato chip, potato soufflé, French fry & American fry). Knowing this, we can apply it to onions as explained in article January 13, 2017. Even a thick French fry (batonnet cut or larger) as opposed to a thin one (little larger than an allumette cut) takes longer to cook but tastes better and keeps its freshness longer. Mashed potatoes compared to potato salad taught us that the type of potato plays an important part.

By knowing how blanching works with potatoes, we have a better chance knowing how to apply it on other food items to gain particular desired results. We the need to learned research various types in order to be sure we have the right combination for the best results (Katahdin is best for fries as opposed to Russet).

The potato also taught us that blanching requires starch to produce exterior toughness. Since sweet potato fries lack starch, no such exterior can be created. The potato souffle and potato casserole taught us the importance that internal water plays. All we have learned from the potato can be applied to other foods and situations.

Another important reason for learning how things work is to eliminate In some problems. cookbooks, especially those on baking, you might find a section on troubleshooting. However, knowing how things act and react, problems are unlikely to occur. Thus, no need for troubleshooting.

Keep in mind that the humble potato, being so fabulous, was merely our example; our teaching tool. There are many other food items that can teach us much provided we pay attention. A student limits themselves if all they do is follow routine. Do not get into the routine of merely following recipes or instructions. Learn how things work and experiment. Get into the habit of asking why certain foods and processes act and react as they do. Ask yourself what, why, when, where, and how. This is the result of curiosity and curiosity introduces learning. Experimentation is part of that learning process. Knowing how to apply what we learn from being curious is wisdom. Become wise. Until next time, peace to all.





PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE 1970 ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION

EXPLANATION OF AMENDMENT

The proposed amendment would add a new section to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution that would guarantee workers the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate wages, hours, and working conditions, and to promote their economic welfare and safety at work. The new amendment would also prohibit from being passed any new law that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and workplace safety. Welcome to the season of increased scam telemarketer phone calls, either political or holiday related.

The National Do Not Call Registry is a government program intended to block unwanted sales calls. It's a free service, and all you have to do is sign up either on your phone or on the internet.

Call 888-382-1222 from the phone you want to block and follow the steps. Or go online to donotcall. gov and read the info. A word of warning: If you register your number online, you are also required to enter an email address. They'll send you a note asking you to click a link in that email to finish the registration to stop unwanted calls -- if they stop.

Blocking scammers on the registry doesn't take care of the whole problem. The FAQ on the site says that certain types of calls are allowed: political, charitable, debt collection, informational and surveys. Think about the holes those leave. I maintain that receiving

a political call is still a sales call -- they're trying to sell us on the idea of voting a certain way, and therefore political calls also should be blocked in the Do Not Call Registry. Surveys can be just as bad if the questions they ask are clearly skewed in one direction or another.

I see charitable calls as scams if they take your personal banking or credit-card information. Additionally, if you've ever done business with a company, they're allowed to call you.

So, there are holes in the system. But you can take steps to stop at least some of the calls by registering with Do Not Call.

As an aside, I called the registry to verify that my phone is already listed. Yes, despite all the calls I get, it's been listed as a do-not-call number since 2006.







Weather History

October 22

Frost occurs when the surface temperature cools to the dew point temperature, and both are at or below 32 degrees. Water vapor in the air turns directly into ice, without becoming a liquid first, producing visible ice crystals on surfaces. Freezes occur when the air temperature (measured about 6 feet off the ground) falls below 32 degrees; temperatures of 28 degrees or colder are considered to be a hard freeze.

October 23

Clouds were not formally named and classified until the early 19th century. Clouds were classified using Latin words to describe how the clouds appear to a ground observer. The initial classification had four basic cloud types; this was expanded in 1887 to also account for the height of the clouds above the ground, or their vertical appearance. This system of grouping cloud types is still in use today.

er entered the game and kicked the extra point for a 7-6 Maroon lead.


To start the 4th quarter, Meridian had control of the ball, but lost it, and the fired up Maroons marched down the field for their





West's 2♠ (showing long Spades and not much else) pushed N-S into the precarious contract of 4♥. Look at what happened in actual play, and then figure out how you would have done better as Declarer.

West led the $\star K$, won by Declarer's Ace. With six side-suit tricks it would be necessary to score four trump tricks, and as the trump suit was so weak it was apparent that some ruffing would be required. One line that would clearly not work would be to get the enemy trumps out of the way first, that would leave Declarer a trick short (scoring only three trump tricks). So Declarer cashed the $\bullet A$ at Trick 2, and then, leaving three enemy trumps at large, he played on the side-suits. His general plan was to let the opponents take their trumps whenever they wished, but that was all they would get. He started with Dummy's high Clubs, but West ruffed the third round and played another Spade. Dummy ruffed, East over-ruffed and cashed her high Heart, leaving Declarer with just 9 tricks.

Declarer needed to time the play better if he was to score 10 tricks. At Trick 2 he must duck a trump! Now, he wins the Diamond return, plays the Ace of trumps and (leaving one enemy trump at large) goes about his business of cashing winners and cross-ruffing. Altogether Declarer has 11 potential tricks via the \mathbf{v} A, four ruffs and six side-suit winners, but that enemy trump will rub out one of those tricks and reduce the total to 10. Making $4\mathbf{v}$, thanks to careful timing.



SECTION 7. From and after the effective date of this ordinance, there shall be assessed against any person who is liable under Section 15 of the Emergency Services Response Reimbursement for Criminal Convictions Act (730 ILCS 185/15) to the Kenney Fire **Protection District** for its response to a fire resulting from an arson offense in an amount not less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00). 



tornadoes, floods and other storms can damage homes, businesses and communities. The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) offers tips to help everyone stay safe during cleanup and recovery efforts-and on how to be best prepared for when the next bad weather hits.

ready for a storm is before it hits. But even then, the ensuing cleanup can be taxing. It's important to pay attention to safety and follow some simple protocols when recovering from storm damage," says Kris Kiser, President and CEO of OPEI.

He offers the following to communities beleaguered by bad weather:

Figure out where to start.

(NAPSI)—Hurricanes, Survey property and damage, as well as safety risks such as downed power lines or unstable structures. Consider what will be needed to clean up. You might need a chainsaw, portable generator, pole pruner, water pump, or utility vehicle to get the job done.

Use safety gear. Sturdy shoes, safety goggles, "The best time to get hard hats, chaps, reflective clothing and work gloves can help protect people cleaning up from a storm. Follow manufacturer's directions for equipment

operation. Operate equipment safely and follow directions from the equipment manufacturer for safe usage. Consult the owner's manual and check online for it if the manual can't be found. Make sure equipment works well and that

safety guards have not been a planned retreat path if disabled.

Trim trees safely. When using equipment such as chain saws or pruners, keep both feet firmly on the ground, and observe the safety zone, which means keeping bystanders and power lines (those above you and any that might have fallen down) at least 50 feet away from your work area. If necessary, call a professional landscape contractor or tree care service for downed trees.

Use precautions with chainsaws. Always stand with your weight on both feet and adjust your stance so you are angled away from the blade. Hold the chainsaw with both hands. Never over-reach or cut anything above your shoulder height. Always have

something falls. Be aware of potential chainsaw kickback, which may happen when the moving chain at the tip of the guide bar touches an object, or when the wood closes in and pinches the saw chain in the cut.

Keep the right fuel on hand. Store fuel in an approved container. Use the type of fuel recommended by your equipment manufacturer. Use fuel with 10% or less ethanol in gasoline-fueled outdoor power equipment (for more information see www.LookBeforeYouPump.com).

Have the right batteries. Use only manufacturer-approved charging systems. If possible, have a couple of extra batteries on hand. Do not use off-brand batteries.

Generators should never be used in an enclosed area or placed inside a home or garage, even if the windows or doors are open. 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
