MHS Drama Club to hold Fall play on October 14-15

MENDOTA – The Mendota High School Drama Club will present its Fall play, "The Play That Goes Wrong – High School Edition," on Friday, Oct. 14, and Saturday, Oct. 15, at 7 p.m. in the MHS auditorium. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$10 each for adults and \$5 for senior citizens and audience members under the age of 18.

Written by Henry Lewis, Jonathan Sayer, and Henry Shields, the high school edition of "The Play That Goes Wrong" quickly goes from preposterous to disastrous with hysterical consequences. The production was a hit comedy on Broadway and London's West End, winning the Olivier Award for Best New Comedy in 2015.

The play is set in the 1920s, a comedy of errors featuring a production of "The Murder at Haversham Manor" presented by the fictional Cornley Drama Society. The production goes off the rails the more the actors try to get things back on track. The play-within-a-play features unique special effects, innovative set design, and hilarious physical gags.

The cast includes Sophie Pappas as Annie, Hannah Rich as Taylor, Karli Miars as Christine, Nick Reyes as Jonathan, Em Clark as Robert, Jillian Younger as Denise, Trekker Klema as Max, and Mia Raya as Sandra. The production is directed by James Younger, who is in his first year as Mendota High School Drama Club sponsor. He is assisted by Laura Younger.

Working behind the scenes in the production staff and stage crew are Shelby Bentley, William Bentley, Gracie Botts, Clayton Buffington, Alex Creager, Kylie Donovan, Quin Holland, Trey Lee, and Leah Stamberger.

James Younger said he has enjoyed working with the students on this comedy. "Our cast, crew and design team have all stepped up to make this light-hearted show a success," he said. "After the past few years, we all need to laugh."

The cast has worked hard to perfect the physical humor in the show, which requires a great deal of safety planning. Younger said, "There's a sense of unpredictability, with sets falling, actors messing up their lines, and props breaking. If something can go wrong, it will in amusing ways. We've spent a lot of time on the technical aspects and timing, which requires a solid team effort. Thankfully, this is a great group of cast and crew who are willing to put in the time and energy to create great onstage moments."

A perfect fixer upper

☐ World traveler settles down in his new home in Mendota



MENDOTA – Craig Furlong has seen the world.

Born outside of Boston 48 years ago, Furlong has lived in New York, Chicago, Virginia, Florida, and taught ESL (English as a second language) abroad in China, Vietnam, Thailand, and Mexico.

And now he has purchased a fixer upper, project home on Monroe Street in Mendota.

"It may sound great to travel around the world, but you never adapt 100 percent to other cultures. Now, I know how immigrants feel when they come to the United States of America. It gave me perspective," Furlong said. "When I decided to come back into the states, I went back to the city because I still have a condo in Chicago. With the cost of everything, inflation, you can't do it on a teacher's salary, especially, an ESL teacher. I went back to a company that I worked

for in 2004 as an accountant because they were in need. I've been contracting with them and it pays the bills. I work from my new home in Mendota.

"I'm a part-time accountant because I have my home project. I think I've graduated toward low stress, minimum hours, maximum pay, and other projects that just make me happy. Working

40-hour weeks is not what I want to do."

In terms of keeping busy, Furlong doesn't have to work a full-time job because his new project is giving him plenty of goals to check off a list.

The new Mendotan moved into town May 20 and has been slowly renovating his new home by stripping old paint, layering new paint, hiring contract plumbers, cleaning, and fixing as many domestic areas as possible.

"I'm not bored yet. I would like to complete this house the way I think it should be done in five years. The immediate plan is five years and I think it will take me that long because I am going at a casual pace," Furlong said. "I don't see any future reason of leaving Mendota. I'm hopeful the town will just get better.

"I love rehab houses. This is probably the biggest project and the biggest house that I've ever had. Because my work schedule is part time and because I work at home, I needed something else. I needed something to motivate me away from the television. I love having projects and I love old homes that need cared for."

The domestic areas are just the beginning.

Furlong realizes the beautiful wood floors need refinished, the electrical units are outdated, and many architectural areas could be improved.

He also knows this takes money, patience, and some time with the home.

"It's only been four months. I want to see how the house deals with winter," Furlong said. "I want to see how well the windows are insulated. It's going to be interesting. I'm not going to make any big purchases until I see how the home reacts."

Expenses the accountant will not need to calculate are a car, car insurance, or gas.

IVCC awarded \$3.5 million grant for agriculture education facility

☐ New building hoping to be ready for classes by 2024

OGLESBY – Illinois Valley Community College has learned it will be the recipient of a \$3.5 million U.S. Department of Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant to construct a new agriculture education facility.

The grant will cover about 80 percent of the cost of an ag classroom and lab building south of campus. Two years ago, IVCC opened phase 1 of its ag complex, a 60x100-foot storage facility to house tractors, tillage tools, planters and other high-tech equipment.

IVCC President Jerry Corcoran lauded the EDA news and said the college hopes to be in the building for classes by 2024.

Regarding the construction timeline, Vice.

Regarding the construction timeline, Vice President for Business Services and Finance Matt Seaton said final designs could be ready within three months.

"After that, we would proceed to con-

struction," Seaton said. "If everything lines up as we hope, we should be complete in 12-to-18 months."

This grant will allow IVCC to train and upskill agriculture workers, aid in the development of new technology, and develop sustainable practices. The grant will be matched by \$1.1 million from IVCC and is expected to create 100 jobs, retain 15 jobs and generate \$500,000 in private investment, according to college estimates.

"President Biden is committed to supporting local efforts to create new opportunities and jobs in communities facing nuclear plant closures," said Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo.

Fessett began her career in nonprofit conservation in 1999 working for the Illinois Chapter of The Nature Conservancy. She served as the Community and Economic Development Coordinator in the Havana office and focused on the Emiquon Project. In 2000 she joined the Illinois Audubon Society Board of Directors as an At-large member and left that post in 2006 to become the Assistant to the Executive Director for the Society. Fessett holds a B.A. degree in Business Administration (1998) from Lewis University in Romeoville.




She was preceded in death by her parents, three brothers

U of I names Dean's List, graduates

CHAMPAIGN — The University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign has announced 9,193 Dean's List students and nearly 10,000 graduates for the 2022 spring semester.

Flu clinics scheduled at LaSalle Co. Health Dept.

OTTAWA-The LaSalle County Health Department is offering walk-in flu vaccinations over the next several weeks. Flu vaccines will be available Wednesdays, Oct. 26, Nov. 2, Nov. 9 and Nov. 16, from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. each day. The Health Depart-

ment is located at 717 Etna Road, Ottawa. Flu vaccinations will be given in the Vaccination Trailer (look for the yellow sign), which is located next to the COVID Testing Trailer and is in the Health Department's parking lot.

Seasonal Influenza Vaccine and Influenza HD (High Dose) Vaccine for persons 65 and older are available. In addition, VFC (Vaccine for Children or CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Program) Flu vaccine is available. This would be for children 6 months through 18 years of age who have Medicaid. All LaSalle County

Health Department influenza vaccines are preservative free. The fee for the seasonal flu shot will be \$25. The fee for influenza High Dose will be \$62.

The health department offers insurance billing or cash only payment. Debit or credit cards will not be

accepted. You must have your insurance card and a Photo ID with you. No Doctor's order is required. Children under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Please wear a mask. To lessen your chances

One of the best ways to protect yourself and your children is through frequent and thorough hand washing. People who are exhibiting "flu-like" symptoms should stay home from work, out of childcare and school to minimize transmission.

Remember the 3 C's: clean, cover, and contain:

- Clean frequently wash your hands with soap and warm water.
- Cover cover your cough and sneeze. • Contain – contain
- your germs by staying home if you are sick.

Furlong hasn't owned a car since he was 16 because he really hasn't had a need for one living in big cities, working for big companies, or being a part of a teaching agency in foreign countries where travel is included or regularly available without owning a vehicle.

Instead, he walks or rides his bike to meet new friends he's made through Re-Imagine Mendota — a volunteer group dedicated to bringing attention to Mendota and making positive improvements in order to make it more attractive—or to dine at restaurants, which he finds all of Mendota's dining options to be delicious.

Sure, there are not as many options as say Chicago, but, it's different and enjoyable.

Just like the difference of small town and city living.

"People I've known who grew up in Chicago don't know where Mendota is on the map. They joke and say I'm living in Iowa," Furlong said. "I've always been in real estate. The prices in the city are inflated, too high, so I started looking out of the city. I don't have a car and I don't drive.

"The city or wherever I decided to go needed to have Amtrak or a commuter rail. I looked for a place as far south as Macomb and as far north as Milwaukee.

I had been looking for three months and lost a few homes to other bidders. I saw this home in Mendota on a Friday. I came out Monday on the train. I looked at the house and it had everything I was looking for.

"It's on a great street in a great town. I put in an offer that Monday and it was sold." Furlong hasn't ventured

the Illinois Valley outside

of Mendota.

Not only is it because he doesn't drive, but he also wants to learn the ins and outs of his new home before he journeys further.

A person can't be a fullblown Mendotan without knowing absolutely everything about the town and the community.

"I love my neighbors. I love the community. I love that everything is accessible by walking. I find everything that I need," Furlong said. "All of the people I have met are fantastic. It's a beautiful town. I meet people all of the time. I love that it's a small town. I like that Mendota is quiet and has space. There is nature surrounding me every day and there are animals in my backyard.

"I think it's with age, but I can't even see myself in the city. It causes me anxiety if I have to go into the accounting office. I don't know how I did it before. In retrospect, it was fun while it lasted."

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

Helping the wrongfully convicted

Every once in a while, you meet someone who changes the trajectory of your life.

For me, that person was Darell Parker, a gentle, kind man who worked in the Moline Parks Department.

Back in the early 1990s, I just had begun covering Moline City Hall and a friend told me that Darell was a convicted murderer who maintained his innocence.

I was just 25 and had never thought much about people serving time for crimes they didn't commit. It was a different era, a time when people put much more faith in institutions. Some folks have this misguided notion that news-

rooms are full of bleeding heart liberals. In my 35 years in the news business, that has not been my experience. When I was a young reporter in Texas, my managing editor made news decisions based on the color of a crime victim's skin. When I worked as a police reporter in the Midwest,

someone was accused of a crime, they were automatically a "mope." Perched on his throne of white privilege, never was

the night city editor was a man not prone to nuance. If

there an iota of doubt expressed that the person was guilty. We might as well have slapped the word "guilty" across the accused forehead.

But then I met Darell Parker.

He was a lot like me: white, male, a farm boy and an Iowa State graduate. He'd gone to prison when he was about the same age as I was at the time we met.

Parker suffered the tragedy of having his wife murdered in 1955 and the misfortune a few days later of being interrogated by John E. Reid, a so-called "expert" in police interrogation. After more than 24 hours of coercion, Parker confessed to a crime he didn't commit.

Even though he immediately recanted, based on that confession alone, a jury convicted him. The confession made Reid famous. And what is now known as the "Reid technique" has become the standard form of suspect interviews for police departments across the country. It all started with a false confession.

Decades later, a serial killer on death row confessed to the murder. And a search of police files found that the killer's car was parked in front of the Parker home the day of the murder. That and other information was never shared with the defense.

It took the state of Nebraska more then 60 years to acknowledge they made a mistake in Parker's case and hand him a check for \$500,000.

Parker, who died in February at age 90, never sued. He just asked the state of Nebraska to do the right thing. It would be easy to believe Parker's case is an anomaly.

But I don't believe that is the case. I've met too many factually innocent people who have done time.

Within the past several weeks, Adnan Syed had his murder conviction thrown out by a Maryland judge. He became famous during the first season of the podcast "Serial." His defense attorney was bad. Police didn't pursue alternate suspects. And worse yet they never informed the defense of the existence of these alternate suspects. An innocent man may have served more than 20 years in prison for a crime he never committed.

In 2016, I had never listened to a podcast. But when I was driving across Illinois with my wife we decided to listen to "Serial." About halfway through, I exclaimed, "This is really interesting, but I know a case that is even more interesting."

Before the week was out, I was on the phone with Jay Pierce, the head of the NPR affiliate WVIK and together with producer Lacy Scarmana we produced a podcast that rose to No. 2 in the world on the iTunes charts. Subsequently, I investigated the case of Barton Mc-

Neil, a Bloomington man who was convicted of murder and is currently serving a life sentence. I believe he is innocent and was convicted based on faulty police work and poor legal representation.

I continue to work for his freedom. If you are interested in the case, listen to season two of the podcast "Suspect Convictions."

In the dozens of wrongful convictions I've written about, it's rare to see a police officer disciplined even in cases involving perjury or incompetence.

Folks sometimes want to know why I ask tough questions of the police. Many work hard and do a good job. Others don't. None are infallible.

I have met many victims of violent crimes whose cases were not vigorously pursued. Worse yet, I've looked into the eyes of too many people convicted of a crime they didn't commit.

If journalists don't hold those in power accountable,

Front page politics in 1894 election

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Oct. 5, 1994.)

Political commentary was on the front page of the Mendota Bulletin in October 1894 as election day drew near. Signing his remarks "Dick," a contributor had much to say about the "Democrat rings," which in his view controlled the state and county. One Mendota candidate was singled out for comment.

"Dick" called upon voters to note that John Goedtner, a candidate for county treasurer, would be under the influence of "ring."

"Down here it is well known," he said, "that nothing is done by the ring in the northwestern portion of the county without the consent and advice of the Maddens.

It is known that Mr. Goedtner is a partner of one of the Maddens and I am of the opinion that we had as well elect the partner Madden treasurer, for the ring will control the office and derive benefits from such a combination.

Goedtner and Madden operated the Germania Bank in Mendota.

The public was reminded that under Illinois election laws, voters were required to register every two years. In 1894, registration days in Mendota were Oct. 16 and Oct. 30. Every voter should see that his

name is on the list.

Over at the Methodist church, the spire was removed and repairs made to the belfry.

This change was made from the standpoint of safety as the spire had stood so long as to be considered somewhat shaky.

Samuel Edwards, whose nursery in LaMoille had been around for 50 years, established a nursery in Mendota at Second Avenue and Seventh Street, east of the East Side School. Between the spring of 1893 and autumn of 1894 he had planted hundreds of evergreens

and many varieties of fruit trees. He called his enterprise Ashland Nursery, To him are the people of LaSalle,

Bureau, Lee, Whiteside and adjacent counties largely indebted for the beautiful groves that now dot the prairies. Edwards built a house in Mendota,

"almost a model in its arrangements and completeness." If it still stands, that house will be 100 years old this month.

Mendota College called attention to the date Oct. 20, 1894. On that date, Mars would reach its nearest approach to earth and it was hoped astronomers might be able to learn something about "our much-talked-about-of cousins, the Martians." The question of whether the

great red planet is really inhabited may be solved. If inhabited, something might be

learned of "the kind of people and with what degree of intelligence."

A hundred years ago, products to cure smokers of their habit were being marketed. The Sterling Remedy Co. at 45 Randolph St., Chicago, was prepared to mail their free booklet entitled "Don't Tobacco Spit or Smoke Your Life Away," advertising "no to bac."

Braces nicotinized nerves, makes weak men gain strength, weigh and vigor. Positive cure or money refunded.

Under the heading, "Ball Season is Done," an account of 1894 baseball stated: "Comiskey's team has been farther from the pennant than ever before." Chicago finished in eighth place, playing 132 games of which they won 57 and lost 75. Baltimore was at the top with 128 games played, 89 won, 39 lost.

The 12 cities making up the National League, in the order of their performance, were Baltimore, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Chicago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Washington and Louisville. In news from other parts of the coun-

try, the Mendota Bulletin reported that 108 Kentucky moonshiners, ranging in age from 15 to 50, had been taken to Louisville by U.S. Marshal Greer and "a score of deputies" to stand trial. The lawmen had destroyed 37 stills and thousands of gallons of moonshine. Some (moonshiners) have grown

old and gray in the business. Some boldly labeled it (the moonshine) sorghum and brought it out by the barrel in push boats. It was remarked that the boys were

usually sons of old operators and "sev-

eral women were among the lot."

President Grover Cleveland issued a proclamation granting full amnesty to polygamous Mormons in Utah.

Charles D. Powell and W.O. Bender made a trip to Chicago "on their wheels." In 1894, those were bicycle wheels!

Mendota College offered a short commercial course with tuition of \$1 per week. Pupils could enter at any time. Instructor was George H. Dewing.

E. Munson, the Mendota jeweler, opened a branch in Earlville to be managed by his brother, N.O. Munson.

In world news, it was speculated that Queen Victoria, who had ascended the throne on Nov. 8, 1837, might abdicate on Nov. 8, 1894. Queen Victoria was suffering from rheumatic gout.

She goes up and down stairs in a sort of litter and is rolled about her rooms in a vehicle that resembles an enlarged baby carriage. Even in 1894, the royal family was

allowed little privacy. It was commented that the Prince of Wales was 53 and it was "about time for him to take up his natural heritage."

However, Queen Victoria reigned on until her death in 1901 and Edward VII became monarch at the age of 60.

Crime is a legitimate issue

There's been a wave of violent crime the last couple of years, and the best way to address the issue is for everyone to pass over it in silence. That's the implication of the liberal pushback against the GOP attacks on Democrats as soft-oncrime in the closing weeks of the midterms.

The Democrats are running defensive ads and have passed a police-funding measure in the House, but a big element of their case for themselves -- as always -- is that it is unfair and racist to call them out on crime.

The Washington Post just ran a piece headlined, "GOP strategy elevates clashes over crime, race in midterm battlegrounds." In its own report, The New York Times says the Republican offensive "has swiftly drawn criticism as a return to sometimes deceptive or racially divisive messaging.'

Exhibit A is the advertising barrage against Mandela Barnes, the 35-year-old African American lieutenant governor of Wisconsin who is running against the Republican incumbent, Sen. Ron Johnson. The Post relates that allies of Barnes "have derided the attacks as racist messages that feed on stereotypes."

There are a couple of counts against the anti-Barnes ads. One is that they associate him with "The Squad," the group of left-wing congresswomen. But this is hardly dirty pool since Barnes has gladly associated himself with them. He went to an event with Rep. Ilhan Omar in 2019, and said about her in a tweet afterward, "She's exactly who we need in Congress right now fighting for what's right.

The idea is that it is racist to portray Barnes in an ad with an image of the Squad because all its members are non-white. But what's most notable about The Squad is that it exemplifies out-of-the-mainstream progressive politics. Are attacks on the group supposed to be off limits until it recruits a more diverse membership?

It is also supposedly wrong to depict Barnes' name written in graffiti. This is an attempt, according to one Democratic operative, to "ghettoize him." The case against Barnes isn't

that he's a graffiti artist, though; it's that he supports policies that have made the wave of disorder in American cities worse.

Graffiti is a symbol of such disorder. If this sort of imagery is illegitimate, no Democrats should be able to use footage of violence on January 6 against Republicans.

Finally, there's an ad that calls Barnes "dangerously liberal on crime." But another ad also calls John Fetterman, the Democratic senate candidate in Pennsylvania, "dangerously liberal on crime." Fetterman, it must be observed, is a large, tattooed white man.

Crime isn't a racial issue; it's about affording all Americans, and especially vulnerable communities, the protection they deserve from lawlessness. Obviously, violent crime is not a blight on the lives of upper middle-class white people.

In Milwaukee, 87% of the victims of homicide this year have been Black or Hispanic, according to the Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel's tracker.

In Philadelphia, there have been more than 1,750 shootings this year. According to the count maintained by the city's office of the controller, 92% of the shooting victims have been Black of Hispanic.

Democrats like Barnes and Fetterman reflect the anti-incarceration ethos that's been ascendant in the Democratic Party for years now, especially in the wake of the killing of George Floyd. Barnes was on board two of the worst and most destructive

public policy ideas in contemporary America. In 2020, when defunding the police was all the rage, Barnes said money could be taken from police departments and given to neighborhood services. He also introduced legislation to end cash bail when he was in the Wisconsin state assembly in 2016. He, and other Democrats, have the choice of trying to

defend their ideas or to rule out any pointed discussion of them. It tells you all you need to know that they are heavily invested in the latter.



Volunteer Fire Service Fact Sheet

The National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC) is the leading nonprofit membership association representing the interests of the volunteer fire, EMS, and rescue services. Organized in 1976, the NVFC serves as the voice of the volunteer fire and emergency services in the national arena and provides invaluable resources. programs, education, and advocacy for first responders across the nation. Each state firefighter's association elects a representative to the NVFC Board of Directors.

This Fact Sheet was produced in order to provide an overall picture of today's volunteer fire and emergency services.

- Volunteers comprise 67% of firefighters in the United States.
- Of the total estimated 1,080,800 firefighters across the country, 722,800 are volunteer.¹
- Communities served by volunteer firefighters depend on them to be their first line of defense for many types of emergencies.

Volunteer firefighters are summoned to a wide array of emergencies across the country every day including fires, emergency medical incidents, terrorist events, natural disasters, hazardous materials incidents, water rescue emergencies, high-angle and confined space emergencies, and other general public service calls. The public relies on the volunteer emergency services to be their first line of defense in these emergencies. Volunteers spend an enormous amount of time training to prepare for these emergencies.

• The majority of fire departments in the United States are volunteer.

Of the total 29,537 fire departments in the country, 19,067 are all volunteer; 5,148 are mostly volunteer; 2,533 are mostly career; and 2,789 are all career.²

• The time donated by volunteer firefighters saves localities across the country an estimated \$46.9 billion per year.3

The cost savings provided by fire service volunteers is tremendous. For many communities, switching to a career staffing model is not feasible.

Many local volunteer fire departments are struggling to meet staffing needs.

The number of volunteer firefighters in the U.S. reached a low in 2019. At the same time, call volume has more than tripled in the last 34 years, due in large part to the increase in emergency medical calls. Major factors contributing to recruitment challenges include increased time demands, more rigorous training requirements, and the proliferation of two-income families whose members do not have time to volunteer. Fire departments today are also expected to provide a wide range of services and multi-hazard response, creating further challenges for resource-constrained departments.






Two killed in crash near Sublette

SUBLETTE – Two people were killed in a two-vehicle accident at the intersection of LaMoille Road and Maytown Road at 3:03 p.m. Oct. 1

Dane Moorman, 27, of Arlington, and Bonnie Ackert, 72, of Dixon, were both killed in the crash. A passenger in the Moorman vehicle, Victoria Moorman, 23, of Arlington, was transported to KSB Hospital in Dixon and treated for injuries.

Investigating Deputies learned that a 2009 Ford, driven by Dane Moorman, 27, was northbound on LaMoille Road at Maytown Road and a 2017 Buick driven by Ackert was eastbound on Maytown Road at LaMoille Road when the two vehicles collided. The intersection of Maytown Road and LaMoille Road is controlled by stop signs for north and southbound traffic on LaMoille Road.

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


with no time left on the clock and Mendota trailed 28-27 at intermission.

How old is "Take Me Out to the Ball Game"?

Baseball fans likely know its familiar refrain by heart, and even non-fans can probably identify it the moment it begins playing. "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" has long been part of the fabric of American culture, but even the most ardent fans of America's pastime may be surprised to learn just how long the song has been around. According to the Library of Congress, the United States Copyright Office first received two copies of "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" on May 2, 1908. The song has proven so influential and popular over the years that legendary broadcaster and journalist Walter Winchell

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once asserted that it embodied the very popularity of the sport by painting the ballpark as an "island of innocent excitement in a world of wild despair." The song is still routinely played at ballparks across the country, and perhaps no park has become more synonymous with the song than Wrigley Field, home of the Chicago Cubs. During the seventh inning stretch of each game at Wrigley, fans are led by a celebrity and join in singing the song. That nightly sing-along is widely considered one of the most festive traditions in North American professional sports.

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

How to prepare for a child's first hunting trip



So bring some books along or encourage kids to keep a diary of their first trip, describing it in detail so they have something to look back on as they get older.

• Purchase comfortable hunting attire. Kids will likely be wearing new attire on their first trip, so parents should have them try the clothing on prior to the trip. When shopping for hunting clothing, make sure it meets all safety standards and is functional for hunters, but don't overlook comfort. Hunting involves a lot of waiting, and the trip will be more enjoyable for everyone if kids are comfortable throughout the slow periods.

• Recognize the day could be emotional. A child's first hunting trip can be an emotional roller coaster, as kids may feel excited, bored, nervous, sad, and even guilty at any point during the day. Parents must allow kids to express any of these emotions during the day and emphasize that it's alright to express their emotions.

Illinois fall trout fishing season opens Oct. 15

SPRINGFIELD - The 2022 Illinois fall trout fishing season will open Saturday, Oct. 15, at 59 ponds, lakes and streams throughout the


An early opportunity at select trout sites, the fall catch-and-release fishing season, will open Oct. 1. No trout may be kept during the catch-and-release period, but anglers can keep trout after the opening of the regular season beginning

The Illinois Catchable Trout Program is funded by those who use the program through the sale of Inland Trout Stamps. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) stocks more than 80,000 rainbow trout each year in bodies of water where trout fishing is permitted during the fall season. An additional 80,000 trout are stocked for the spring season which begins each April.

For the 2022 fall trout season, no trout may be taken from any of the stocked sites until the season opens at 5 a.m. Oct. 15. During the season, the daily catch limit is five trout. For more information, visit www. ifishillinois.org.

The fall trout season offers opportunities for families to get outdoors and enjoy fishing. Resources are available for taking kids fishing at https://www.ifishillinois.org/Kids_Fishing/ kidsfishing.html.

All anglers, including

those who intend to release fish caught before Oct. 15, must have an Illinois fishing license and Inland Trout Stamp, which are available at IDNR license and permit locations, including many bait shops, sporting goods stores and other retail outlets. Check the IDNR website for locations at https://www. exploremoreil.com/agentlocator.

Fishing licenses and trout stamps also can be purchased with a credit card online at https://www.exploremoreil.

For information about site regulations, anglers should contact individual sites that will be stocked with catchable-size trout. Not all sites open at 5 a.m. on opening day. Anglers should confirm the opening time of their favorite sites prior to the open date.

IDNR announces 2022 waterfowl hunting updates

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) is reminding waterfowl hunters of key dates and other information regarding the 2022-2023 waterfowl seasons.


2022-2023 waterfowl seasons

This is the second year of a five-year waterfowl season plan that was developed in 2020. This fall, Illinois will open the regular duck, Canada goose and snow goose seasons on Oct. 22 in the North Zone, Oct. 29 in the Central Zone, Nov. 12 in the South Central Zone, and Dec. 3 in the South Zone

White-fronted goose (specklebelly) seasons will open Oct. 24 in the North Zone, Nov. 5 in the Central Zone, and on the same dates as duck season in the South Central (Nov. 12) and South zones (Dec. 3).

The daily limit is six ducks of any species, however, daily limit can consist of no more than the following: four mallards (of which no more than two can be hen mallards), three wood ducks, two redheads, two canvasback, two black ducks, one pintail and one mottled duck.

Scaup (bluebills) will have a daily limit of two for the first 45 days of the season in each zone and one for the last 15 days of the season in each zone.



species and sex. During the regular season, Canada goose daily limits will be three with a possession limit of nine. White-fronted goose daily bag limits will be two with a possession limit of six. The snow goose daily bag limit is 20 birds, with no possession limit, during the fall and winter seasons.

The spring Light Goose Conservation Order will open Jan. 20 in the North Zone and Feb. 1 in the Central, South Central, and South zones, ending April 30 in all zones. There is no daily bag or possession limit on snow, blue, and Ross' geese during the spring conservation order.

Waterfowl seasons currently open

Rail (Sora and Virginia only) is open statewide in all zones from Sept. 10 through Nov 18 with a daily limit of 25 and possession limit of 75. Snipe is open statewide in all zones from Sept. 10 through Dec. 25, with a daily limit of eight and possession limit of 24.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) reminder

In coordination with other state and federal agencies, IDNR continues to monitor for outbreaks of the H5N1 strain of HPAI that was observed in Illinois during spring 2022. Similar mortality events may occur as waterfowl arrive in Illinois from northern breeding grounds during the fall migration.

IDNR reminds waterfowl hunters to take precautions and thoroughly cook game meat to an internal temperature of 165 degrees Fahrenheit. Avoid handling sick or dead waterfowl found in the field. Do not allow dogs and other pets to consume waterfowl that died from unknown causes. 
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

Winning the battle in your mind

If you have received Christ as your Savior, then you have an enemy. Did you know that? I know some people feel uncomfortable talking about the devil, but he is real and it's important for us to face the truth about him so we can have a victorious life in Christ.

We Are in a War

Ephesians 6:12 says, "For our struggle is not

And 2 Corinthians 10:4-5 says, "The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they have divine power to demolish strongholds. We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to

against flesh and blood,

make it obedient to Christ." There is a battle raging and the battlefield is the mind. That's why it is critical for us to learn how to renew our minds with the weapon of God's Word.

Romans 12:2 exhorts us to "not be conformed to this world...but be transformed (changed) by the [entire] renewal of your mind... (AMPC). The Word of God is the most powerful thing on the earth, and if we will really learn the truth in it, then the power of the Word will literally transform our lives by "demolishing strongholds" in our minds.

Know Your Enemy

The Bible teaches us that the devil "is a liar [himself] and the father of lies" (John 8:44 AMPC). He comes against us by bombarding our minds with cleverly

Before I learned about being transformed by the renewing of my mind according to God's Word, I believed things that weren't true, and they created a mess in my life. I'm always going to have a second-class life because I was abused by my father and I'm damaged goods."

It's taken years of diligently studying God's Word and prayer, but God has set me free from those strongholds and I have come to the place where I can live in His righteousness, peace and joy every day. And like John 8:32 says, the truth has set me free! Wield Your Sword

Let's go back to Ephesians 6. Verses 12-18 tell us who our enemy is and that we need to put on the armor of God so we can stand our ground and resist him. Verse 17 says to "take the helmet of salvation and the sword that the Spirit wields, which is the Word of God" (AMPC).

So how do we "wield the Word"?






