Officials file complaint over law

State's attorney, sheriff file over SAFE-T Act

OREGON – On Oct. 4 in a press release, Ogle County State's Attorney Mike Rock and Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle announced that they have filed a complaint against Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker and Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul in Ogle County Circuit Court seeking to have the criminal justice reform SAFE-T Act declared unconstitutional.

The Safety, Accountability, Fairness and Equity-Today Act passed in the early hours of Jan. 13, 2021. It abolishes cash bail beginning in Jan. 1, 2023, reforms police training, certification and use-of-force standards, expands detainee rights and requires body cameras at all departments by 2025. The legislation has been amended twice since its passing to accommo-

date concerns of law enforcement groups and changes have included moving effective dates back and use-of-force language.

"The The SAFE-T Act, which was passed in the middle of the night by a lame duck legislature, does nothing to improve the safety of the citizens of Illinois," Tuesday's press release from Rock and VanVickle said. "There was not a mandate from the voters for it. It barely had enough votes to pass, even in the extremely-lopsided, Democrat-majority Springfield legislature.

The process that was used to pass the bill was flawed, rendering the bill unconstitutional. The resulting bill

language contains inconsistencies that will only serve to allow

dangerous individuals to remain on the street as well as place even more unfunded mandates on county government."

The press release said VanVickle and Rock are hopeful the courts will declare the act unconstitutional before it goes into full effect Jan. 1.

VanVickle, who is currently the immediate past president of the Illinois Sheriffs' Association, has previously testified against the SAFE-T Act in Springfield. He said since the amendments earlier this year, the legislature has been "not open to any discussions" related to bail reform, which is his chief concern with the SAFE-T

"It's always been, 'Not this session. We'll do it in the next session," VanVickle said. "They've really gotten us to the point where we are today where there's an issue coming Jan. 1. Our concerns are based in statute and the state's attorney feels that [filing a complaint] is the best way to address those. Because the legislature refuses to."

Ogle County's state's attorney and sheriff are not the first in Illinois to file a complaint, and they likely won't be the last. VanVickle expects a "significant portion" of counties to file the same type of lawsuit and believes the eventual number will be around

"I'm not sure that pressure on the state is the goal, but we've tried to have dialogue with the legislature," VanVickle said. "As part of the ISA, we've tried to have this dialogue with them and they haven't been open to it. This was really the result of their lack of response. We had to go a different avenue. It goes back to public safety. What we've seen in New York and Chicago is not what we want in our communities. And that's what we're going to have." VanVickle said a lit-

tle over 50 percent of the current population housed in the Ogle County Jail will be released Jan. 1 due to the SAFE-T Act changes. Offenses of released inmates could include arson, weapons charges, obstructing or assaulting a police officer and threatening a public official, he said. "With the bail reform coming Jan. 1, that's the biggest concern for us," VanVickle said. "That we're going to have violent offenders who won't be held in jail anymore and they're going to be back out in the community reoffending after they've already had charges filed against them. So there's really no onus on their crimes."

The sheriff said there are parts of the initial legislation that he believes are beneficial to the law enforcement profession, but he believes more changes are needed.

"A wholesale change

of not only law enforcement, but the criminal justice system is not what we want," VanVickle said. "The intent of it was to provide more oversight for law enforcement, but it took it a step further and provided the ability for criminals to be out on bond or with no bond and it really doesn't keep the citizens of this state or the people who visit it safe. Those are the primary concerns for me."

As the county prepares for the changes Jan. 1, new policies and procedures have been worked on locally "at a very high level," but have not yet been rolled out to deputies and corrections officers. Law enforcement officials are still waiting on more guidance from the state and potential changes.

When some police reform changes took effect on the past Jan. 1, changes came days later and policy had to be redone at local levels. As far as the complaint, the sheriff doesn't believe an answer will come from the judicial system before Jan. 1.

"That is my concern, what we're going to do between now and Jan. 1 when it becomes effective," VanVickle said. "That's my major concern. The lawsuit is going to take longer to play out and whether it's ruled unconstitutional or pieces of it are, that's yet to be determined. But at this point, my concern is between now and the implementation date."

This event is for Ogle County residents only, no business or institutional electronics or documents accepted.

Residential electronics will be accepted from 8 a.m. to noon at this event. Accepted items include all televisions, computer monitors, computers and computer cords and accessories, printers, FAX machines, desktop copiers, tablets, cell phones, laptop computers, DVD.VCR's, satellite/cable boxes, radios, stereo equipment, shredders (no tubs), video game equipment, rechargeable batteries, printer ink cartridg-

es, digital clocks, calculators, holiday light strands, and other small electronics. Microwave ovens are accepted for a \$5 fee per unit. 

MOMENTS IN TIME

- * On Oct. 21, 1797, the USS Constitution, a 44-gun U.S. Navy frigate, is launched in Boston Harbor. She was built to fight Barbary pirates off the coast of Tripoli and won the nickname "Old Ironsides" during the War of 1812, when British shots merely bounced off Constitution's sides.
- * On Oct. 19, 1931, David Cornwell, known as spy novelist John le Carre, is born in Poole, England. He published his first spy novel, "Call for the Dead," in 1961. The novel, like his second, "A Murder of Quality" (1962), featured spy George Smiley.
- * On Oct. 22, 1957, in Saigon, Vietnam, 13 American military personnel are wounded in three terrorist bombings. During America's official involvement (1964-1973), over 3 million armed forces were deployed to Vietnam, resulting in 58,220 deaths.
- * On Oct. 20, 1968, 21-year-old Dick Fosbury sets an Olympic record at the Mexico City Games when he high-jumps 7 feet, 4 1/4 inches. Fosbury's unique jumping, known as the Fosbury Flop, was described in the press as "a guy falling off the back of a truck."
- * On Oct. 18, 1974, singer Al Green is attacked when an ex-girlfriend pours a pot of hot grits on his back while he was in the bathtub. Green was left with severe injuries but also a spiritual awakening. By 1976, Green had become an ordained Baptist minister and established a Memphis church.

Give it a chance to succeed or fail

The SAFE-T Act is not making a lot of friends in law enforcement.

The act, which will abolish cash bail at the beginning of next year among other things, has drawn the ire of many law enforcement officials across the state, including in Ogle County. Last week, Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle and Ogle County State's Attorney Mike Rock announced that they have filed a complaint against Gov. J.B. Pritzker and Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul in Ogle County Circuit Court. The aim is to have the act deemed unconstitutional.

Time will tell if this move is successful or not. but to me, there is not just one way to feel about the new law. That is often the case, but people do seem to simply fall on one side or the other. Nuance is certainly not popular in

This is really aimed at overhauling the pre-trial system in the state. Would criminals of all kinds just simply be dumped onto the streets while awaiting trial? Of course not. The law abolishes cash

bail and provides what is called a presumption in favor of release for misdemeanors, traffic offences and other offences that are deemed petty. This is not for murderers and rapists and molesters as some would like you to believe.

The goal is to keep poor people from being stuck in

jail for ages before a trial because they can't afford bail. We see plenty of rich people brought up on horrible charges simply bail out and enjoy life. That is clearly an unfair system. And the law also states

that judges will still decide whether a person will remain detained or not. This does not take away their power. So, is this portion of

the law good? Well, it could be good for keeping people who really don't need to be in jail out of jail. But I am no legal expert. I can see where there could be problems, and I am sure there will be some problems while the system is new.

But let's be clear people out on bail have re-offended for years. I am not sure this will make it worse. In New Jersey this system has had some success, but we will see here in Illinois how it works.

But cash bail is one portion of this crime reform package that was

passed. The law addresses police training and equipment. It includes requiring all law enforcement agencies in the state to have body cameras by 2025. And those cameras must be turned on when an officer is in uniform and responding to a call. I think that is good,

for the public and police. Look, the vast majority of officers are professionals who are focused on protecting and serving the communities they work for. But we also know that some are doing bad things in the line of duty. Having a body camera on will protect the good officers and either stop the bad ones before they act or provide evidence of malfeasance on the job.

If this law turns out to be a horrible mistake. it can and should be repealed. But I tend to think we need to see how it works before we pass judgement.

Election will be a referendum on democracy

The political party that defines the issues wins the election. Democrats are defining this one as a fight to save democracy. That strategy may help to save them from the complete disaster that many had predicted for the Nov. 8 vote.

The Congressional January 6 hearings have kept a spotlight on this issue with accounts of the White House's Big Lie, its campaign to overturn the election, and the threats and harassment it aimed at officials and election workers. So have state and Federal investigations of Donald Trump's alleged wrongdoings. Mr. Trump has also helped, unintentionally no doubt, by ceaseless-ly repeating the Big Lie about the 2020 election.

President Biden, calling Donald Trump's "MAGA" movement a threat to "the very foundations of our republic," shifted the Democratic strategy into high gear in a September 1 speech. He insisted that many Republicans aren't MAGA Republicans. But he also declared that they're the dominant group nevertheless, implying that the Republican Party itself is a threat to democracy.

A September 3-4 Wall Street Journal editorial responded that, "...the people who really saved American democracy after

the 2020 election and on Jan. 6 were Republicans." The editorial was referring to Republican state officials and legislators, Trump-appointed judges, White House and Justice Department lawyers, and Vice President Mike Pence. All of them resisted the former Presi-dent's demands and threats, often at great personal cost.

It's true that President Biden's speech was colored by political calculation. Sorting out who is and isn'ta MAGARepublican, and whether or not American democracy is truly in peril, can be hard in these contentious times. Yet events in the here and now, as well as in those dark days in 2020 and 2021, reveal that the threat is real.

The Associated Press, on Sept. 9, reported that, "Nearly 1 in 3 Republican candidates for statewide offices that play a role

in overseeing, certifying or defending elections supported overturning the results of the 2020 presidential race." The AP also found that, "Only 40% would directly say that Biden was legitimately elected." An AP-NORC survey of voters revealed that 2/3 of Republicans believe that Joe Biden didn't win the 2020 election.

Election deniers are now trying to take control of the election system at the local level. Charlotte Alter reported at time.com on July 27 that "they've flooded local precincts, signed up en masse to be poll workers, and orchestrated harassment of existing [local election] officials." One in five election workers, in a March survey by the Brennan Center for Justice, said they were very or some-what unlikely to serve through the 2024 election. Almost one in three knew a worker who left be-cause of fears for their safety.

Some Republican state legislatures are, in the meantime, considering laws that would allow them to overturn the results of presidential elections in their states, as reported in the February 18 issue of The Week Magazine.

This isn't the first time in our history that democratic institutions have come under attack. The 1960's comes readily to mind for this 75-year-old witness to that era. We can find reasons for op-timism in the fact that democracy has always survived.

We can also take comfort in the overriding emphasis that many Americans place on this issue. 81% of respondents to a Yahoo News/YouGov poll, which came out on September 28, said that they were very or somewhat worried about the future of democracy. A Reuters-Ipsos poll, as re-ported by Jason Lange at reuters.com on Sept. 8, revealed that 58% of Americans see Donald Trump's movement as the source of that threat.

The 2022 election could thus go down as the moment when America rejected the Big Lie, and the tide turned back toward democracy. Or it may be remembered as one more chapter in a dismal story of decay. It all hinges on the importance voters will attach to this issue on
