Report gives Illinois' finances an 'F'grade

GLENCOE, Illinois ranks near the bottom of a new analysis of state finances across the

Truth in Accounting's 13th annual Financial State of the States ranked Illinois 48th in the country, the same rank as last year. Only two other states, New Jersey and Connecticut, graded worse than Illinois for fiscal health. The review is of the states' fiscal year that ended June 30, 2021.

The report notes that Illinois had about \$39 billion available to pay nearly \$250 billion worth of bills, a shortfall that breaks down to a burden of \$49,500 per taxpayer. As a result, the state receives an "F" grade for its state finances.

Truth in Accounting noted that Illinois was tardy when extremely releasing its annual financial report. Illinois released its report more than 356 days after the when the standard for timeliness is 180 days.

The report says Illinois' financial problems stem mostly from unfunded public employee retirement obligations. Christine Kuglin, director of the Truth in Accounting Project at The University of Denver, said 2021 was beneficial for pension returns, but things have taken a turn for the worse.

"Those are to the same types of market fluctuations that we who have our own private pension funds, the governments are the exact same," Kuglin said.

Although pension liabilities decreased by \$12.1 billion in 2021 due to the increase in investment value, the report said much of the value increase is only on paper. Until the pension investments are sold, these liability decreases are not real.

New alert system will replace county sirens

System is more advanced and will save several thousand dollars per year

CLINTON The county is moving toward a plan that would replace tornado warning alerts that go out from the countywide siren system with emergency messages sent to land line phones and electronic devices, such as cellphones.

Representatives Constellation and county **Emergency Management** Agency (EMA) director Micah Gallardo briefed the county board last week about the plan.

Gallardo said the goal was to upgrade public emergency warning systems. The plan also would save tens

thousands of dollars a year in siren maintenance costs. DeWitt County has about 40 sirens, which cost about \$2,000 a year each in maintenance.

"Some benefits we're going to see with this; we're going to use more modern-day technologies, and it's going to reach the transient population that travels through the county," Gallardo said.

The system will send alerts out based on a distance range, anyone traveling within that range will receive the

Gallardo also cited the cost savings by removing the sirens.

The county's CenCom system has access to technology similar to that used in "Amber Alerts."

"So, that will be the primary system," Gallardo

The county will use a back-up system that uses pre-scripted templates for

emergency alerts.

"We'll be able to take it (the alert) and send it directly to phones," Gallardo said. "And, also, it will be geo-coded, so it will be connected to any number associated with a house." Residents will be able

to opt-in to a feature that sends alerts to additional devices through emails and phone numbers. Users also will be able to select a preferred language. Gallardo said the plan

was to begin immediately to educate the public about the new system.

Land line phone users also will receive the alerts automatically. Monthly tests will be conducted with the new system as they are with the warning sirens.

The county municipalities will have the option to take over ownership of the sirens from Constellation. But, CenCom administrator

Tony Harris pointed out the goal was to move to a higher level of technology. And, Harris also cited the high cost of annual maintenance for the sirens.

"There's that option, but it's not going to be cheap," Harris said.

Harris supports the change to the new system. CenCom activates the sirens during tornado warnings.

"This also will take a load off us because it's going to be so automated," Harris said.

Harris mentioned, too, part of the change-over would include replacing the current Hyper-Reach system used locally with a new system called EverBridge. This change would save about \$4,500

"I'm in total support of this; I just think we need to get ahead of it and let the public know," Harris

New assessment districts set to start in 2026

CLINTON The county recently approved the township and multitownship districts that will begin for the election year 2025. The periodic establishment of districts is required by the Illinois Department of Revenue. They affect only property assessment and will be in place for 10 years.

"Every 10 years following a census, there has to be a new multitownship district formed multi-township district falls below 1,000

population," said county supervisor of assessments Sandy Schlosser.

Schlosser said it had not been necessary in DeWitt County since the 1990s.

"Creek and Nixon (townships) squeaked by the past 10 years," she said. "I had to write a letter to the department of revenue because they fell to 998. The department of revenue allowed them to stay a district."

For the district beginning in 2026. Creek and Nixon will be merged with a larger district that includes Wilson, Rutledge, Harp and DeWitt townships.







Is it illegal to laminate Social Security your card?

Answer:

No, it is not illegal, but we discourage it. It's best not to laminate your card. Laminated cards make it difficult — sometimes even impossible detect important to security features and an employer may refuse to accept them. The Social Security Act requires the Commissioner of Social Security to issue cards that cannot be counterfeited. We incorporate many features that protect the card's integrity. 



grew up on a farm in very rural Iroquois LCounty. Our nearest neighbors were over a half-mile away. There were the barns, corn cribs and hen house associated with a family farm.

The garden was huge and all the trees were mature and available for a young boy to climb. The night sky was clear and you could see the stars without the glare of streetlights. The feeling of freedom and independence was simply part of life. Were there some down sides? Sure.

If it snowed too hard we might have to wait a day or two for the township road grader to bust through the snow drifts. If the power went off, it was no major problem. We had kerosene lamps. The coal furnace was forced air, but it was large and if the fans didn't work, it was not a major problem. Heat rises from the basement and the house was warm.

We had artesian wells for the livestock and if worse came to be, we could always carry water from the well. Life was good.

I moved off of that farm over 50 years ago, but in many ways always wanted to go back to living the country while living in town. Several years ago we had the opportunity to buy a newer brick home on five acres of land in DeWitt County. Country living has become a little more complex than in my youth. My mailing address is Farmer City, but the DeWitt Post Office is only a mile away. The school system is Clinton. Go figure. It is country living.

The mature trees are still there as is the clear night sky. The water for the house comes from a 180-foot-deep well in the Mahomet Aquifer. The crystal clear water of my youth now needs some massive treatment. Our basement is a water treatment plant. have a water filter with a chlorinator that also removes the methane gas. We then have the dual water softener. That



equipment costs us well over \$100 month. But who cares? This is country living.

We had a power outage on Sunday that lasted over 6 hours. Today we have Ivy's 90-plus-yearold parents living with us. They take a large amount of time and need some extra care. Power outages are no fun. If we had had 20 below temps on Sunday it could have presented a very difficult situation.

Ivy and I had been talking about getting a generator for the house, but hadn't pulled the trigger. Sunday was a crude and rude, but very effective eye opener. On Monday morning I was pricing whole house generators and calling an electrician. This is country living.

Lastly, the driveway needs some rock. What's another \$1,000? The joy of country living.

Reading this one might get the impression that I no longer like living in the country. Nothing could be further from the truth. While I enjoyed talking with my neighbors in town on the alleys and fence lines, the privacy of having your nearest neighbor a half-mile away is something that I deeply cherish.

Yes, we may have to pay for some things that those in town take for granted. But the deer are in my yard on a nightly basis. The possum walks the tree line believing that no one is watching. Even the turkeys believe that they are safe from Thanksgiving dinner, and they are. The sky is still clear and the stars are bright as they are the only light at night.

We enjoy the peace and solitude of DeWitt County on a daily basis. This is country living at its best.




I got grilled

to little my of corner culinary delights. The culinary instructor whom I admired could be fun but in a serious way. He flexible regarding suggestions but firm in what he knew to be a correct procedure. hovered over his students in the kitchen to observe their techniques and correct them. Very little escaped his attention.

One day, he and I were casually talking. He asked for my views on cooking. He does this to better know what is needed in student to become better. I did not know this of him at the time. I told him that I do not care for grilling.

Yes, I know this is considered the thing for men to do in their back yards. But it never appealed to me. I prefer not having smoke blowing in my face or stoking the fire until it is just right. Another problem with me was in knowing when the meat and/or vegetables were adequately cooked. I know it is silly of me to think this, but with my luck, a bird could fly overhead and make its own contribution toward my efforts.

After that discussion, Chef Tucker saw to it that I would be the grill chef during events. There was even a close-up picture of me in the newspaper grilling chicken breasts at one of those events. Two hundred chicken breasts were needed for the event. Only about 20 or 30 chicken breast can be grilled at any one time. He would walk by



to observe my progress. Eventually, I got to be very good at grilling. For another event, I had to grill pork chops. I have even grilled patties made of polenta (course ground cornmeal). I will give brief instructions according to what I learned.

There are two sections to the grill; the hot section and not so hot section. The hot section is for searing your meat as you would in a skillet or sauté pan. After both sides are seared, the meat is transferred to the other section for slow cooking.

determine doneness, you push down on the meat with your finger. My instructor taught me a trick to determine the doneness with the muscle tissue between your thumb and index finger. I do not care to detail that in this article.

Before grilling, it is advisable to drag cooking oil across the cooking grates using a basting mop. This helps to prevent the meat from sticking to the grates. It is recommended to produce a diamond design to the meat. This is easily done by starting the searing with the meat at an angle. Once the blackened lines appear, rotate the meat 30 to 40 degrees for the second set of lines. Then do the same for the other side. Be careful not to overcook the food. Until next time, peace to

The report notes that Illinois had only set aside 45 cents for every dollar promised pension benefits and one cent for every dollar of promised retiree health care benefits. If benefits and funding are not changed, future taxpayers will be burdened with paying the under-funded retirement

promises.

Most governments have very little money to pay promised pension benefits because they follow a pay-as-you-go approach, the report said, paying an amount each year equal to the benefits distributed or claimed in that year. pay-as-you-go The approach pushes current compensation costs and liabilities onto future taxpayers.

The Illinois Teachers' Retirement System this week said the fund's long-term funded ratio has improved, racing nearly 44 percent at the end of fiscal year 2022, despite shaky investment markets and uncertainty in

the global economy. The TRS Board of Trustees gave preliminary approval to a \$6.04 billion state government contribution for the System in fiscal year 2024. That's a 2.5 percent increase from the \$5.89 billion for the fiscal year that ends June 30, 2023.


If the N-S hands look familiar, that's because they were featured in last week's Bridge Bite. But the E-W hands have been changed, and East, who now has four trumps, could not resist doubling 4♥. That was not a wise move, as we are about to see.

Last week, in the absence of a Double, Declarer played for 3-2 trumps, and as that turned out to be the case, 10 tricks could be made by winning the Spade lead, and ducking a round of trumps at Trick 2. Declarer could win the return, draw just one more round of trumps and, leaving one trump at large, could cash winners and cross-ruff his way to 10 tricks. But this week Declarer has to make 10 tricks after East has doubled. Now it

seems likely that East has 4 trumps and ducking a trump at Trick 2 will not work. East wins and returns a trump, and will later get in (with a Spade over-ruff or a Club ruff), draw another round of trumps and leave Declarer a trick short. So, guided by the Double, Declarer does not duck a trump at Trick 2. Instead, she cashes the ♥A and goes for three Diamond ruffs in her hand (confident that West is now out of trumps and cannot over-ruff). The play goes: ♠A; ♥A; ♦A; Diamond ruff; ♣A; Diamond ruff; ♣K; ♣Q; Diamond ruff. That's 9 tricks and when the ♣J is played next, there will be a 10th trick, one way or another.

No doubt East's Double seemed like a good idea at the time, but in fact it only served to give Declarer a road map to the winning line of play, by alerting him to the likely 4-1 trump split.
