"This is the first time our school is receiving this state award," said Oregon Elementary School's Principal, Kelli Virgil. Special events building opening

River's Edge Experience can host everything from small events to large weddings

OREGON – It was once considered the ugliest building in town.

But now it will house a new 7,000 square foot wedding a special events business, River's Edge

"It is ... the largest climate-controlled wedding venues in the area," said owner Merlin Hage-

The name is probably familiar to many, as Hagemann owns Merlin's Greenhouse & Flowers and Otherside Boutique in Oregon as well as

Cork & Tap in Oregon. Along with his wife, Cindy, they are now the owners of this new business, which held its first event last week.

They bought the building last year and sat on it for a few months before coming up with a final plan. Hagemann said at first he was going to separate the building, a 103 S. 1st St., into retail space. Someone suggested a wedding venue, and that became the plan.

Work began last August and is now in the final

"It's pretty much done," Hagemann said. And that is a good thing, as there are already events on the calendar, including their first wedding next month. There are other events on the books as well, including the KSB Christmas party and the high school homecoming event. As it can hold a variety of events, the River's Edge Experience is open year-around.

Davis Junction gets \$3 million grant

Money is for land development


 Village of Davis Junction last week announced that it has been selected to receive a \$3 million grant for commercial development of land on Route 72.

As part of the Rebuild Illinois (RBI) Downtowns and Main Streets Capital program, Gov. JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) awarded \$106 million in capital grants to 50 commercial corridors and main streets throughout Illinois, which represents the largest-even RBI investment focused on community revital-

"The Village is honored to receive this Rebuild Illinois (RBI) Downtowns and Main Streets Capital program grant," said Rick Wurm. president of Davis Junc-

Farm Heritage Festival of East Jordan Church, located at 22027 Polo Rd., Sterling, will be held Saturday, Aug. 27.

The admission and parking are free. The day will start with a good ol' fashioned farm breakfast consisting of scrambled eggs, pancakes and biscuits/gravy from 7-9 a.m. Tickets for breakfast are \$10 for adults, \$ 5 for youth to age 13, under age 5 receive free breakfast. Breakfast tickets are available from church members before the event or at the door. The active farm machine demonstrations will begin around 9 a.m. and will occur periodically until 3:30 p.m. There will be static displays all day.

This year's active displays will feature a threshing machine, a elevators, an ensilage cutter, a corn husker/shredder and tractor operations. A blacksmith will be demonstrating some tool making and craft. There will also be an activity center for kids, youth and adults to try their hand at powering hand cranked items such as corn sheller or a rope maker. There will be a bouncy house for children this year.

A farm animal zoo will again feature dairy cows, sheep, goats and more. This is definitely a fun zone for children, youth, and adults of all ages.

A lunch stand will operate from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. featuring sandwiches, baked beans, salads, chips and desserts. Proceeds from the lunch benefit various missions

and functions of the East Jordan Church.

"We enjoy promoting our rural Christian heritage," said Show Administrator Steve Venhuizen. "We hope many people will come out to enjoy the fresh air, learn about farming practices of old, and just have fun visiting with others"

Hagemann said that the venue, which has about 400 feet of river frontage, can host inside as well as outside weddings, depending on the weather and the wishes of the couple. There will be a full-service bar run by Cork & Tap. All food will be catered in.

The building, built in the 1930s, was originally the home of the Ogle County Highway Department. It has been other things over the years, including a fire department, auto repair business and storage building before the Hagemann's bought it.

Not that it looks like the same building inside and out. It has a new exterior, new roof, and the inside is sparkling new as well. It includes a large open space, as well as individual dressing rooms for the bride, groom and their parties. Each dressing room even has a sound system for their own music.

Hagemann said he does not see this venue as competition for wedding spaces like Pine

is near White Pines. In fact, he said they can work together, with weddings at Pine Creek and receptions at Rivers

"We could really help each other, I think" Hagemann said. "That's the plan – not to hurt anybody, just try to help the community.

But with an hourly rental rate, this is about much more than weddings. Any events or meetings can find a home at River's Edge. Hagemann said the

City of Oregon will be doing work on 1st Street, with all new asphalt, curbs and gutters. There will also be 90 parking spaces for the venue.

This is also a way for Hagemann to continue to invest in a city he has called home for more than 50 years. He sees a strong future for Oregon, with more businesses going in downtown and more people calling the city home.

"I think we're on the right path," he said. "City people love it out here – they like the quietness, the small-town feel."



Chicago tribute band to play Jamboree

MOUNT MORRIS – The Mt. Morris Jamboree is pleased to announce the return of Chicago Tribute Anthology to our Bandshell stage for a free two hour concert on August 26th, from 7-9 p.m.

In April of 1969, a new rock 'n roll band burst onto the scene garnering nationwide attention. Born in the midwest and infused with elements of jazz, blues, and latin influences, the first album by "Chicago Transit Authority," or CTA as they were commonly known, went double platinum. Such hits as Beginnings, Does Anybody Really Know What Time It Is?, and Question 67 & 68 propelled the band to popularity.

With a rock rhythm section led by the brilliant guitarist Terry Kath, a powerful horn section, and unique vocals, the band now known simply as "Chicago" released their second album in January of 1970. Considered by many to be the band's breakout album, Chicago 2 would also go platinum with hits like: Make me Smile; Colour My World; and 25 or 6 to 4.

Chicago became a dominant force in popular music during the 1970's, producing at least one new album each year. This period was marked by the release of classic songs like, Free, Saturday in the Park, Dialogue, Just You 'n Me, Feelin' Stronger Every Day, Call On Me, and Old Days, to name a few.

CTA brings to life the golden age'of Chicago by meticulously recreating many of the great songs from the first 11 albums. Members include Tom Anderson, Paul Bata, Terry Geraci, Paul Mabin, Chuck Parrish, Reed Pauley, Dan Peters and John Springbrunn.

Property Tax Freeze

This exemption "freezes" your assessed value at a certain level and base year, depending on what year you originally applied. Your future real estate tax bills are calculated at this "frozen" assessed value, thereby slowing the increase of your property taxes. You must re-apply for this exemption every year.

Although your assessed value is frozen under this exemption, tax bills can continue to increase if spending by any of the local units of government (like schools, cities, parks, etc) goes up. Also, please be aware that you may, later in the year, receive a "change of assessment notice" if the township assessor has re-evaluated your property. This will in no way affect your status under this senior assessment freeze exemption. Real estate taxes are calculated on your "frozen" assessed value.

You must be 65 or older, own and use the property as your principle residence Your total income, and the income of any other individuals using the property as their principle residence, must be less than \$65,000.

Armory continues legacy of memories, technology of WWII

ROCHELLE-Chuck Roberts started collecting World War II memorabilia in about 1987.

He served in the Army and worked on a lot of equipment during his service. His parents served in WWII. His father was in the Battle of the Bulge and his mother was in the Army nurse corps.

Roberts was always interested in WWII history. He bought one historical vehicle from the second world war, and he promised his wife, Lydia, that it would be the last.

What has resulted since for the Rochelle couple is the Roberts Armory, a WWII museum that specializes in the acquisition and display of armored vehicles, artillery and other artifacts used by the U.S. in WWII.

The museum participates in WWII-related displays, parades, motion pictures and reenactments throughout the United States. The purpose of the museum is to preserve the history of World War II and to honor those who

"It's sort of a labor of love on the history of WWII," Chuck said. "We get a lot of people that come in with post-war equipment. And we just can't handle more. We're overflowing with just the WWII stuff. When I walk in here after all these years, I'm sort of shocked and I say, 'Holy cow, what are we going to do with all of this stuff?"

"We say it's a hobby that got out of control," Lydia said.

Exhibits at the Roberts Armory include: An M5A1 light tank "Stuart", MM22 light tank "Locust", M8 light-armored car "Greyhound", M16 half-track, 75 MM gun motor carriage M3, T-16 universal carrier, M29C cargo carrier "Weasel", M7 snow tractor, WC51 and WC52 weapons carrier, M6 37 MM gun motor carriage, Willys-Overland MB ¹/₄-ton truck "Jeep", Ford 1.5-ton truck GTBA "Burma Jeep", 1941 Buick Century series 60 staff car, 1941 Plymouth P11 staff car, 1939 Cadillac staff car, 1942 Harley-Davidson type II, Army bicycle, Multiple cal.



0.50-machine gun mount M45 "quadmount", 37 MM anti-tank gun M3, 40 MM automatic gun, M1 (anti-aircraft), 75 MM pack howitzer M8, 75 MM recoilless rifle M20, LCVP Higgins boat, DUKW 2.5 ton amphibian truck and Singer roadster SM 1500.

The museum will be open to the public this Saturday from 1-4 p.m. and is two other times a year on Memorial Day and the Sunday before Veterans Day.

"It takes us probably a day or two of work just to open it up," Chuck said. "We do maintenance on the vehicles. Everything here runs and all the guns have simulated fire. It's getting to the point now

where we're the only experts that know how to fix these things. People call and email us from all over the world with questions. We do 3-D printing of parts that can't be found anymore."

The walls of the museum are lined with pictures and stories of Rochelle veterans and it has historic copies of the Rochelle News-Leader that have pictures of the soldiers and information from when they were in the service. Other than local veterans, the museum has a lot of things relating to the 70th tank battalion, which is a group the Roberts' reenact.

The vehicles at the museum participate in local parades and car shows. The Roberts' have written five books on World War II history and currently have two more in with a publisher. Lydia's specialty in collecting is women's WWII uniforms.

"My closet is more packed with uniforms than regular street clothes," Lydia said. " I kind of got interested because of Chuck's interest. In high school, I hated history because it was just memorizing places and dates. And these things we have, you can touch and feel them and find out the history behind it all. It's much more interesting than just opening a book."

People have come from "all over the world" to visit the museum, Chuck said. He enjoys meeting people

and sharing a common interest. Sometimes families of veterans that have since passed bring in items from

their service. "We're continuing the legacy of the memories and technology of WWII," Chuck said. "Once the veteran passes away and leaves behind things related to it, sometimes the family comes here and we can tell them what the photos meant to the best

of our ability." The large vehicles at the Roberts Armory have been purchased through a broker. They've come from countries like Portugal, Chile, Norway and France. Chuck works on all of the equipment himself and enjoys the machinery aspect of it.

* On Sept. 3, 1783, the American Revolution comes to an end when representatives of the United States, Great Britain, Spain and France sign the Treaty of Paris. He was a good man who did something

Who would sacrifice a job they loved to reveal a wrong committed against a child?

Very few would. In fact, in my 35 years in journalism, I've met only one such person. Just one. In our society we talk a good

game about how much we treasure children. But it's a lie. Kids are violated and large institutions sweep it under the rug every day. As a reporter, I have seen it happen over and over. The sexual violation of a child

is the most horrific act imaginable. I should know. I was violated when I was just 12 years old. It is a pain that has hung over me for decades. I have written about teachers,

cops, coaches, pastors, scout leaders, tutors and others who have sexually abused youngsters.

And time after time, powerful institutions worked hard to cover up the crimes.

But Michael Leathers was a good man who did something. The Chatham man died Aug. 3 at age 62 of a heart attack.

He spent 20 years as a public relations person at Springfield Memorial Hospital. And he did a good job there. But his first love was newspapers.

Back in 2002, he was the editor of Illinois Baptist, a newspaper covering Southern Baptist congregations across the Land of Lincoln. Before that, he was a reporter for the Alton Telegraph.

When he learned that a pastor, Leslie Mason, was criminally charged with sexually abusing girls in the southern Illinois town of Olney, he reported it. One of the girls apparently was only 13

Instead of receiving praise for informing Baptists about a potential predator in their midst, he found himself in a room with a lawyer and his boss, Glenn Akins, who then ran the Illinois Baptist State Association. They wanted him gone.

I wish I could say I found this

response surprising. But those in power often find comfortable ignorance preferable to hard truth. During my own career, editors

have called me obsessed, pedophiles have threatened suicide, lawyers have threatened to sue and victims keep calling because they want their story told. My response is always the

same: If newspapers don't hold those in power accountable, who Leathers understood this as

I learned of his courageous stand in 2019 when newspapers in Houston and San Antonio published a damning exposé of how Southern Baptist churches had repeatedly covered up pastors who abused children. Leathers' story was included. Next the New York Times wrote about what a brave man he was.

And a couple of days later, I found myself having lunch with Leathers and interviewing him for this column.

According to Leathers, Akins offered a peculiar complaint about the story: That writing about one pastor who committed sex crimes was unfair because that "ignores many others who have done the same thing."

Forrest Gump could have come up with a smarter excuse. By the way, I reached out to Akins on Aug. 8 – he didn't get back to me.

But sitting across from Leathers, I sensed heartbreak -- 17 years after he lost his job. He not only lost his career in newspapers but no longer felt comfortable in church.

I invited him to join a Bible study I'm a part of, but he shook his head and said, "It wouldn't be like the Southern Baptists – that was special."

Michael's widow, Tammy, said he came to forgive those who fired him and he continued to love Jesus. "People would ask how his faith

had remained so strong after all that had happened to him. And he would say, I put my faith in God, not in men," she said. In case you're inclined to mark his dismissal as some sort of misunderstanding, it wasn't. Leathers

sponded to predators in their We have seen this story play

out time and time again with school boards, churches, scouting groups, teacher unions and sports teams. Powerful institutions often don't want the truth told.

"I think there is a tendency for people in leadership to want to protect the institution by covering things up," Michael Leathers told me. "The interesting thing is that when I wrote the story, I got plenty of positive feedback from laypeople in various congregations. They get it. It was people in positions of authority who had problems with me writing the story."

Leslie Mason, the pastor Leathers wrote about, was sentenced to seven years in prison. Upon being released from prison he began working as a pastor again.

Glenn Akins, the boss who gave Leathers the boot, is now assistant executive director of the Baptist General Association of Virginia.

As for Leathers, a service was scheduled for him at a Chatham reception hall on Aug. 10. No pastor was slated to speak.


