Council hears about grant for **Community Center kitchen**

AMBOY — As the city spit shines the streets in preparation for the 40th annual Depot Days this week, the Amboy City Council was hard at work at their regularly scheduled monthly meeting held back on Aug. 15.

Under Committee Reports, Second Ward Alderman Brandon Klein opened the discussion by asking Mayor John Schamberger if there had been any progress made in regards to the renovation of the Community Center kitchen. The mayor had shared that he recently attended an informational county meeting about grant money for senior programs. There he submitted the required paperwork, answered a few questions, and put in a request for \$4,000 to assist with the purchase of a new refrigerator, plumbing, flooring, and possibly an oven. The Community Center provides activities such as: cards, bingo and the annual Christmas Dinner. Schamberger went on to say that he was comfortable with that grant amount and there wasn't any objection from the county, but no timetable was given as when the money will be distributed

Mr. Leo McCoy stood up and addressed the council about the possibility of putting a wind device on his property. The mayor once again weighed in and read the Illinois Municipal Code that permits a municipality to regulate (but not prohibit) wind devices within its zoning jurisdiction and within 1.5 miles of the corporate limits of the city. If the city doesn't regulate wind farms outside but within 1.5 miles, then the wind farm would be subject to the county wind regulation ordinance. Currently, there isn't a wind ordinance on file in Amboy. Schamberger stated that "this is new technology like solar energy and we need to roll up our sleeves and get going on these ordinances.'

Under "New Business" an ordinance was approved to disconnect approximately 124.62 acres of the Meade Farm property.



Amboy school district learns about new testing program

Amboy News Reporter **AMBOY** — At the most recent regular meeting of the Amboy Community Unit School District #272 held on Aug. 18, after the customary Pledge of Allegiance and roll call, Yvonne Vicks, a junior high teacher and director of the English Arts Curriculum department, gave a very thorough slide presentation outlining the data report for current fifth through eighth grade students for the Star reading and math testing

Star and Easy CBM has been a state benchmark to this point. One slide showed a pyramid of learning where the students were placed from exceeding expectations to those that need a little extra help. Vicks went on to say that a new testing program Learning Renewal Interim Assessment will be instituted and testing will be administered three times a year in October, February, and May. These results will then be tabulated and distributed to teachers to give them a clear picture of each student's strengths and weaknesses.



In the audience 'Open Forum section of the agenda, Tanya Ketchum got up and asked why the soccer program had been discontinued for this school campaign. Superintendent Joshua Nichols explained that due to a number of factors including a lack of interested students, a coach, a bus driver to go to Paw Paw who is the co-op school and adult supervision, they had no choice but to discontinue the team for now. Ketchum stated that there were enough interested kids to participate. Junior High Principal Andrew Full was asked to contact the conference to see when the team might be able to rejoin.

At the last school board

meeting Matt Moore, a concerned grandfather and longtime resident, read a prepared statement voicing his concerns about the possibility of the district adopting the state sex education curriculum. He said that he didn't think it would be appropriate for his pre-school and kindergarten grandchildren. Nichols mentioned that he had recently spoken with Moore and let everyone know that his recommendation to the board was not to adopt the new health standards at this time and that no vote was necessary or takes place. Moore thanked Nichols and

A Look Back At Amboy's Heroes Who Served During World War II

Editor's note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on veterans who served during World War II. These heroes are part of Amboy's history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. This article was researched by Jack Mead and Tom Dempsey, and written by Dempsey.

Staff Sergeant Donald W. Rapp

The Rapp Family of Lee County, are descended from a line of European immigrants who, like many thousands before them, came to America in the mid 1800's in search of liberty and the possibility of a prosperous future for their children. They joined many other immigrants in northern Illinois who by the dawn of the 20th century, were successful farmers and landowners, forming closeknit communities across the heartland

Donald Rapp was born to Edward and Katherine Rapp of Sublette, on March 22, 1921. The Rapps were successful farmers, and owners of farmland outside of town. Donald would eventually have three brothers and three sisters. He attended elementary school at St. Mary's Catholic School in Sublette, and then attended Amboy Township High School. At age 17, he was working as an oil station attendant in

On Aug. 21, 1940, Donald enlisted in the United States Army and received his basic training at Ford Ord, Calif., before being transferred to

the Presidio of Monterey.



From there he was moved to Fort Douglas, Utah, where he was appointed to the military police. On Nov. 11, 1941, he was married to Peggy Pendleton at Salt Lake City. Following America's entry into World War II, he was transferred to Company E of the 346th Infantry Regiment, 87th Infantry Division and was based at Fort Jackson,

S.C. In October 1944, he



the Allied push toward Germany following the D-Day Invasion in June of that year. In his youth, he could never imagine that one day he would fight a war against Germany, the homeland of

his grandparents. As Allied troops fought bloody battles across France and Belgium, Hitler decided to make one more major counter-offensive in the Ardennes Forest in Belgium

beginning in December 1944.

For the next two months, in harsh freezing winter conditions, over 8,000 American Troops would be killed in action at the Battle of the Bulge or shortly thereafter in the Ardennes region. In early 1945, Donald's wife, Peggy, received word that her husband was killed in action on Jan. 8 while serving with an infantry unit.



The story of the original Illinois

Central Railroad

The IC was the largest railroad construction project in the mid 1880s. Immigrant workers came to Illinois through the port cities of New **Orleans and New York** to earn a wage of \$1.25 a day.

The majority of these were Irish. – Editor.

settlers in Lee County were part of an Irish crew that was sent up here from southern Illinois by the state to build the roadbed south of Rockyford for the proposed Illinois Central Rail-

road. I believe they worked on the railroad bed for only a few years, when the state had to abandon the project for lack of funds.

The best-preserved part of that roadbed has been incorporated into the Rockyford road. The straight stretch that you can see south of Sleepy Hollow road was built by this crew for the railroad. The land north of Sleepy Hollow road still shows evidence of the intended route of the railroad just west of Rockyford.

When the Illinois Central was finally built, they had moved the route east to cross a bad stretch of Inlet Creek (Green River). This location eventually became the city

The proposed route through Rockyford would

have provided a far better location, on Inlet Creek, for a new town and railroad. The land, for the most part, is high and dry. But as an early visitor to the new town of Amboy described the location, Amboy looked like "several hundred shacks in the middle of a swamp."

When the original railroad was abandoned, most of the laborers returned to southern Illinois to look for employment. Several of them decided to stay and live in the cabins that they had built for shelters. They would plant a

garden and live off the land and wait for the railroad to resume construction. Some of these Irish later bought farms, established "Sandy Hill" cemetery, and built St. Michael's, the area's first Catholic church.

Sandy Hill became an Irish

settlement. The remains of several of the early cabins can still be seen in the woods around Sandy Hill. The cellars, with boulder walls, are still there.

Editor's Note: James Brady Long was born in Amboy on June 12, 1926. Known by many as "Mazie", he grew up in Amboy, served in the army during World War II, then studied forestry at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology. His studies in botany and forest protection continued as he ventured into farming here. A beloved story-teller, his farm became a place of learning and adventure for relatives and friends. In his later years, he contributed a series of local nature articles to The Amboy News. Upon his death in 2000, his many hand-written drafts were gathered and initially curated by Brenda Boyle. The present, renewed series draws from those drafts, both unpublished and previously published.

The Book Nook By: Tatjana Kazan

BEING ELSEWHERE

ears ago, long before the Internet, I read all the books I could get my hands on by the great French writer Marguerite Duras. My friends were decidedly underwhelmed. Recently I watched a breezy French comedy where one of Duras's novels, "The Ravishing of Lol Stein," figures prominently. I had to smile when the high-strung heroine's mother asks her cautiously, "You must explain to me how you can so love this book.'

A description of Lol Stein (her full name is Lola Valerie Stein) illustrates Duras's characteristic prose style: "Her body is tall and beautiful, very straight, made taut by her constant effort to efface herself, a constant conformity to a certain mode of conduct learned when she was a child, the body of a grown-up schoolgirl. But her gentle humility is inscribed in her face, in every gesture of her hand when her fingers touch some object, or when they touch my hand."

Lol Stein grew up in England, in a town called South Thala. At 19, during summer vacation, she meets, instantly falls deeply in love, and becomes engaged to the wealthy, debonair Michael Richardson. But at a ball at the Town Beach casino, Michael dances with an older woman all night, and never gives Lol another look. She falls into a coma and suffers a nervous breakdown. Ten years later she returns to South Thala, where our highly unreliable narrator – he is utterly obsessed with Lol Stein – begins his story.

Lol Stein is married to a musician who loves her "this calm presence by his side, this sleeping beauty who never offered a word of complaint, this upright sleeping beauty, this constant self-effacement." She is indeed the perfect wife and mother to their three children. She spends her afternoons walking and soon begins to follow strangers. She visits her best friend Tatiana who held her hand when Michael Richardson so cruelly betrayed her. One day she follows a man to a hotel and waits in a field of rye to see the light go on in a window. The man's lover is her friend Tatiana.

The man turns out to be our narrator. He befriends Lol, ardently nurtures his obsession and agrees to accompany her to Town Beach. Bored, he speculates about "tales of oblivion, of a vertical descent into the oblivion of memory, of lightning-like access to other memories, of other long nights, of love without end, of God knows what?'

Tatiana is not convinced that Lol has recovered her sanity. That it's all a lie, that she is not really there. Our narrator agrees: "She found that 'elsewhere,' that uniform, insipid, and sublime 'elsewhere' which she cherished more than any other moment in her present existence, that 'elsewhere' she had been looking for since her return to South Tahla.'



Powerful institutions don't want the truth told

The would sacrifice a job they Guest Column leved to reveal a wrong committed against a child?

Very few would. In fact, in my 35 years in journalism, I've met only one such person.

In our society we talk a good game about how much we treasure children. But it's a lie. Kids are violated and large institutions sweep it under the rug every day. As a reporter, I have seen it happen over and over.

The sexual violation of a child is the most horrific act imaginable. I should know. I was violated when I was just 12 years old. It is a pain that has hung over me for decades. I have written about teachers, cops, coaches,

pastors, scout leaders, tutors and others who have sexually abused youngsters.

And time after time, powerful institutions worked hard to cover up the crimes.

But Michael Leathers was a good man who did something. The Chatham man died Aug. 3 at age 62 of a heart attack.

He spent 20 years as a public relations person at Springfield Memorial Hospital. And he did a good job there. But his first love was newspapers.

Back in 2002, he was the editor of Illinois Baptist, a newspaper covering Southern Baptist congregations across the Land of Lincoln. Before that, he was a reporter for the Alton Telegraph.

When he learned that a pastor, Leslie Mason, was criminally charged with sexually abusing girls in the southern Illinois town of Olney, he reported it. One of the girls apparently was only 13 years old.

Instead of receiving praise for informing Baptists about a potential predator in their midst, he found himself in a room with a lawyer and his boss, Glenn Akins, who then ran the Illinois Baptist State Association.

They wanted him gone.

I wish I could say I found this response surprising. But those in power often find comfortable ignorance preferable to hard truth.

During my own career, editors have called me obsessed, pedophiles have threatened suicide, lawyers have threatened to sue and victims keep calling because they want their story told.

My response is always the same: If newspapers don't hold those in power accountable, who will?

Leathers understood this as well.

I learned of his courageous stand in 2019 when newspapers in Houston and San Antonio published a damning exposé of how Southern Baptist churches had repeatedly covered up pastors who abused children. Leathers' story was included. Next the New York Times wrote about what a brave man he was.

And a couple of days later, I found myself having lunch with Leathers and interviewing him for this column.

According to Leathers, Akins offered a peculiar complaint about the story: That writing about one pastor who committed sex crimes was unfair because that "ignores many others who have done the same thing."

Forrest Gump could have come up with a smarter excuse. By the way, I reached out to Akins on Aug. 8 – he didn't get

But sitting across from Leathers, I sensed heartbreak --17 years after he lost his job. He not only lost his career in newspapers but no longer felt comfortable in church.

I invited him to join a Bible study I'm a part of, but he shook his head and said, "It wouldn't be like the Southern Baptists – that was special."

Michael's widow, Tammy, said he came to forgive those who fired him and he continued to love Jesus.

"People would ask how his faith had remained so strong after all that had happened to him. And he would say, I put

my faith in God, not in men," she said.

In case you're inclined to mark his dismissal as some sort of misunderstanding, it wasn't. Leathers knew his boss didn't want the story to appear in the newspaper. But he said when he was hired he was assured of editorial autonomy. So, he published the story anyway.

Southern Baptist leaders are hardly unique in how they responded to predators in their midst.

We have seen this story play out time and time again with school boards, churches, scouting groups, teacher unions and sports teams. Powerful institutions often don't want the truth told. "I think there is a tendency for people in leadership to

want to protect the institution by covering things up," Michael Leathers told me. "The interesting thing is that when I wrote the story, I got plenty of positive feedback from laypeople in various congregations. They get it. It was people in positions of authority who had problems with me writing the story."

Leslie Mason, the pastor Leathers wrote about, was sentenced to seven years in prison. Upon being released from prison he began working as a pastor again.

Glenn Akins, the boss who gave Leathers the boot, is now assistant executive director of the Baptist General Association of Virginia.

As for Leathers, a service was scheduled for him at a Chatham reception hall on Aug. 10. No pastor was slated to speak.

Next up was the Principal and Superintendent reports. Central Principal Joyce Schamberger shared that they had received word in early August that the kindergarten had been awarded the 'Gold Circle of Quality' rating from the state. The Gold Standard was based on school compliance visits. We are all very happy and proud," she said.

Basic training was held on Tuesday where the students were taught how to walk in the halls, cafeteria, and assembly. Back to school 'Backpack' night was a big success with 92 percent participation. The new playground equipment was delivered and as of this writing will be installed this week. Teacher Jamie Rodriguez received a grant for a pet in the classroom and will soon have two parakeets chirping and hopping about in their new caged home. A loud roar of laughter bellowed throughout the room.

Junior High Principal Andrew Full reported that goals were discussed for this year along with new teacher evaluations and meetings. CPR and AED training was held for teachers. Basic training and back to school night was a success. Volleyball has started for the fifth through eighth grade girls with 40 signed up.

High School Principal Janet Crowhart reported that some junior and senior students are taking advantage of outside learning facilities both at Whiteside and SVCC. Spanish will be taught virtually this year with 24 students signed up for the class. A new science curriculum will be instituted covering biology, chemistry, physics, and physical science. The faculty and staff are continuing to work on the Education Pathway Project. Bus evacuation safety was presented to all students. All fall sports including: football, volleyball, cross country and golf are underway along with cheer and pom. All principals expressed their thanks to the custodial crews for the great job of cleaning and preparing the buildings for this year's school term. In his Superintendent report Nichols said that he was

pleased with the arrival of the elementary playground equipment and the progress of the outside building project where new outlets, lights, and tables have been installed so far with landscaping next on the list. New kitchen equipment was delivered but without any wiring done to the ovens. Rather than send them back Nichols shared that the staff should be able to wire and get them operational soon.

The final items on the agenda before the board went into Executive Session were the approval of the Return to Learn Plan and administrative procedures for the use of a handheld metal detector at the high school. Nichols went on to say that metal detectors are a less invasive way to do security checks and unfortunately necessary in the current climate of society.

Nichols explained that the new CDC updated guidance stated that no more social distancing or contact tracing was required. Isolation is still recommended. If a student is visibly sick then the school has the authority to send them home. About 500 to 1,000 test kits will be coming from the state for immediate results.

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

"The stands were full and it felt like a real game on our home side," said sophomore starting fullback and defensive end Quinn Leffelman.


After the team experienced first hand how far they got and realized their potential, they came back with a vengeance and at summer camp hit the weight room and worked on overall conditioning.

With four of those guys gone, coach Michael Robinson and the Clippers know a return to state will be difficult. On the other hand, they know they have the talent to make another long postseason run.

"We have four seniors this year and only two sophomores," Robinson said. "We're kind of in a rebuild mode, but the good news is the seniors we have, have been around the program for awhile and they know what it takes to get back to state, which is the ultimate

"They've been real motivated this summer to get that goal achieved. Our two sophomores, Atticus Horner, ran on the varsity level last year, and Jaden Haley is a little new but he's motivated. With only six guys, everyone will be running varsity and they have to make up for what we lost. It's going to be hard because we lost some big talent with Brock Loftus, Ian

> At last year's Oregon Sectional, Loftus won the sectional title at 16:19.30.

> Not far behind was then-junior Kyler McNinch, who helped the Clippers finish with 100 points with his seventh-place finish in 17:13.9.

"They were learning from Brock. He left big shoes to fill but he also left them with the motivation they needed," Robinson said. "Kyler McNinch, one of our seniors this year, has kind of taken over the reins from Brock. He's worked really hard and he's being that driving force that Brock was last year.

"He's set up a good system. He ended last year very well as he was top 90 in the state out of 260 runners. When you can return a runner like him for a year, that's great, and he's keeping all of our other runners hungry. He's keeping them motivated and goal-focused."

McNinch is joined by fellow seniors Charlie Dickinson, Garrett Pertell, and Kelton Schwamberger.

Between the four seniors and the two sophomores, Robinson knows their talent but he understands the ebbs and flows of a season.

He's one injury and one bad grade away from not having a boys team.

"We're farther along than I expected. We didn't have a lot of time together this summer because of different things we had going on," Robinson said. "When I couldn't make it, Kyler picked it up and led the team. He went to several different camps and convinced some of the guys to go to camp with him that didn't attend last year.

"They have that team motivation aspect down. They're pushing each other to be better. The first week of practice went very well. It wasn't what we were used to because we were only in the 70s and the 90s last week. This time of the year, we are usually in the 90s and 100s. We're taking advantage of this cooler weather and getting a good base underneath us.

"I'm looking forward to a good season with them. They have a big goal of getting back down to the state meet. It's going to be tough not knowing where we're at for regionals right now. It's a long season and there is a lot of attrition with it. Hopefully, we can stay healthy and keep things at a good pace. They also have to keep their grades up. It doesn't matter the reason, when you only have six we need everyone at every race."

Girls Robinson is the coach, but he's also a recruiter.

There are four girls on

the Amboy girls cross country team and it takes five to record a team score. He will continue to look for a fifth Clipper, but he's also happy with the youthful excitement his team already has.

'We have four girls and two of them ran last year in sophomores Natalie Pratt and Addison Pertell. Two of them are incoming freshman with Samantha Nauman and Anna Carlson," Robinson said. "It's kind of hard when there is four of them, they can't do much as a team, but they've been working to build that team relationship with each other.

"It might be hard for them to see things now, but when we get into those meets they will be able to see what they can do and maybe surprise themselves a little bit. Hopefully, they can use it as motivation to try harder."

Robinson has seen improvements in body language and conditioning every prac-

He knows they want to compete and are putting in the work to improve their times. They've also been a support to each other as they're cheering and pushing each other to be better.

"You never know what can happen at the end of the year. Somebody doesn't run well or someone could run very well. You just never know," Robinson said. "I know they want to

succeed. It's hard right now because when you're running with four girls you don't have that team aspect to push each other to get better. They have to find that individual will and push themselves internally.

"I think they have been doing that. They complain a little bit here and there, but at the end of the day, they go out there and do the work. They know what they need to get done. Cross country is a team sport with individual aspects. When you only have four runners and you need five to score, it truly is an individual sport."



Dixon awarded grant to renovate **Historic Dixon Theatre**

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo announced the Department's Economic Development Administration (EDA) is awarding a \$1.2 million grant to the Historic Dixon Theatre Group, Dixon, to boost tourism by renovating the 100-year-old Historic Dixon Theatre. This grant is funded by the American Rescue Plan. This grant will support improvements to

"This EDA investment underscores the Biden-Harris Administration's commitment to helping this critical sector not only recover from the economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic but build back stronger and more equitably for the future."
