# Students safety addressed during pickup and drop-offs

Amboy News Reporter **AMBOY** — Last school year was a test run as the new Amboy Junior High was built onto Amboy High School.

There were prior questions surrounding the different intangibles of having all of Amboy's student body in one general area of town before construction ended and school started.

But one question that came up immediately after the school was build was student safety during pickup and drop-offs.

"Since the new junior high was built on the same campus as the existing high school, there was congestion because essentially, you're having twice as many kids, buses, and vehicles on the east side of Metcalf Ave. where everyone gets dropped off," said Brandon Klein, Amboy's Second Ward Alderman for the last three years. "With traffic going two opposite ways, it was confusing for kids to know when to walk across the street. We're trying to lessen the congestion and make it safer for the kids for

both drop off and pick up.

"There was a lot of construction going on and it was all pretty new. But it was noted pretty quickly that the road was a safety issue. This is the first stage of trying to get traffic flow a little more conducive to safety and where kids can get to where they're going without having to worry about getting ran over."

The section of Metcalf Ave. now functioning in a one-way direction is the one city block between Hawley St. and Bacon St. Traffic now only heads to the south. Homeowners on Metcalf

Ave. were spoken with to make sure they were in agreement with the avenue becoming a one-way because now they only have one direction to their homes instead of two.

Although the road is a one-way 24 hours, seven days a week, not just during school hours, the homeowners did agree it was a needed adjustment for student safety.

Other ideas have swum to the surface for additional safety before and after school such as sidewalks being added to the east side of the



school, a crossing guard, or in-town bus pick up for all students.

"We talked about in-town school bus pick up, but that apparently was going to be much more work and more liability than I thought it was going to be," Klein said. "It was mostly because you have to account for every single kid in town being picked up. If they're not on the bus, they have to be accountable.

'Right now, they're only doing bus pick up for students outside of the city limits or further than (approximately) 1.5 miles from the school. I thought it would be nice for in-town pickup because it is extremely congested.

"Amboy Central Elementary School is due south of the junior high and the high school. So, we have every single student in the school district being picked up and dropped off within, essentially, a block and a half."

Klein is one of six Amboy alderman who are challenged with the quest of making Metcalf Ave. and the roads around the school district safe for everyone.

# Trip to Tanzania raises money for African school

**COMPTON**—Jon Yambert has hiked all over the United States of America.

But he had never done anything like the adventure he took on in May as he was one of 15 people to travel to Tanzania as part of a fundraising trip for Tanzania Development

"The trip was unusual, we went there, and it was meeting 15 people who you've never met before. We became friends because we were together for two weeks. You get to know everyone very well.

"We were at a hotel in Arusha, Tanzania and two days later we started a 6 ½ day hike up Mount Kilimanjaro. We hiked 19,341 feet up the (dormant volcano). We spent five days going up the mountain because they want you to go slowly so you can get acclimated

"I'm an experienced hiker, but this was the first I've been above 14,300 feet. I've hiked a lot in Colorado, the Wind River Range (Wyoming), and the Appalachian Mountains (1,500 miles along the United States and Canada east coast), but this was a whole other animal, completely.

"What was also different besides the altitude was, in the United States, you can hike anywhere you'd like without having anyone with you. There, the government requires you use their private company outfitters because it's a great source of employment and they're there to help make sure you're safe."

Yambert, 65, from Compton, was part of

the fundraising efforts for St. Paul Primary School in Musoma, Tanzania, which is ran by Father Robert Luvakubandi. Father Robert earned a Mastor's Degree from the University of Notre Dame and has become friends with Yambert.

The 15 people representing Tanzania Development Support, which is located in DeKalb, were from all over America including DeKalb, Texas, Maryland, Idaho, and Milwaukee. The group raised approximately \$36,000

for the school as it spends its money on people that otherwise wouldn't have opportunities for an education. "In large parts of Tanzania, a family only

sends the oldest son to school," Yambert said. "They concentrate on raising money so girls can go to school also to hopefully increase their economic opportunities also.

On the hiking trip, Yambert and his new friends were joined by 51 porters.

Each individual had their own day bag, but the porters set up the tents, talked to the travelers to make sure they were coherent in the altitude, made sure people were hydrated, and read oxygen levels in their blood to make sure they could handle the climb.

Yambert was aware society and the environment in Africa was going to be different than Compton.

Now, the visions he saw on TV and movies, or read about, are now real life images and memories.

# A Look Back At Amboy's Heroes Who Served During World War II

Editor's note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on veterans who served during World War II. These heroes are part of Amboy's history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. # **Lt. Warren Earle Gilbert**

Shortly before the United States entered the first world war, Cleveland and Jennie Gilbert gave birth to their second child, Warren. Born Feb. 23, 1916 in Bradford Township, just north of Lee Center, Illinois, Warren would join an older brother, Thomas, and would eventually have a younger sister, Mildred. Warren's parents made a living for the family by farming throughout the early 1900's.

During Warren's early child-



hood, the family moved to

a farm at Binghamton, in Amboy Township. Three of Warren's grandparents were immigrants from European countries, making his parents first generation Americans.

During his early years, Warren attended Binghamton School, located near the corner of Lee Center and Shaw Roads near the Green River. Most children growing up in the area would have spent most of their time outdoors, working on the farm, fishing in the river, or



walking alongside the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad tracks that wound through this region of Illinois.

In 1933, Warren graduated from Amboy Township High School and went on to attend the Northern Illinois State Teachers College in DeKalb. After attaining his teaching certificate, he was employed as a grade school teacher in Maple Park, near DeKalb. On March 17, 1941, Warren enlisted in the Army Air Corps and was assigned to the 16th Observational Squadron at Sparta, Oklahoma. His next training assignment was at Lowry Field near Denver be-

fore being sent on to Lawson

Field in Augusta, Ga., where he served as an instructor in aerial photography. Later he served at Daniel Field in Atlanta, Morris Field in Charlotte, and Langley Field in Virginia before shipping overseas in October of 1942.

While stationed in Atlanta, Warren married Irene Krol of Chicago. Miss Krol was teaching in West Chicago during this time. The couple had met while attending the teachers college in DeKalb.

Warren's squadron was attached to the 73rd Observation Group (68th Reconnaissance Group after February

1942), which was an intel-

ligence and reconnaissance

unit. His duties included gathering essential information needed for planning successful military operations including aerial photography of troop placements, topography, roads and bridges, and other critical intelligence needed for battle readiness. Most of this information was gathered by Army Air Force Personnel using B-17 or P-38 Lightning Aircraft.

By 1942, Hitler had abandoned the idea of occupying Great Britain, and instead became determined to control the Mediterranean and its

access to Southern Europe and North Africa. See GILBERT page A4

# Tri County Opportunities Council announces the start of the energy assistance program

ROCK FALLS - The Tri County Opportunities Council, as administrator of the Home Energy Assistance Program in Bureau, Carroll, LaSalle, Lee, Marshall, Ogle, Putnam, Stark and Whiteside, is pleased to announce that funds are available to assist income-eligible households with their natural gas, propane and electric bills and furnace assistance.

The program will begin Sept. 1, 2022 for all income-eligible households. Applications will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis through May 31, 2023. There will be no priority groups this program year. Households in need are encouraged to apply.

Households must be at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level to receive a benefit from the LIHEAP Program. Beginning Sept. 1, 2022 there will be an option to accept a onetime payment to your utility provider. Median Income and the number of persons living in the household. The income guidelines are as follows: 1-\$2,265, 2-\$3,052, 3-\$3,838, 4-\$4,625. Go to tcochelps.org to know income limits for households with five members and more.

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides one-time benefits to income eligible homeowners and renters to help with energy bills and for reconnection of energy service. Propane customers are encouraged to apply when the program opens in September to take greater advantage of lower propane prices. Propane prices typically increase during the winter months so by applying early propane customers will see their LIHEAP benefit go further.

Applications will be taken at Princeton,

Savanna, Streator, Ottawa, LaSalle, Dixon, Lacon, Oregon, Rochelle, Wyoming and Rock Falls offices and applications can be taken by appointment, fax, email, and mail.

To submit an application, you must submit all documentation required:

1. Proof of gross income from all household members for the prior 30-day period beginning with the date of application.

2. Proof of Social Security numbers or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) for all household members. Individuals without an SSN or ITIN can still apply and Tri County Opportunities Council will advise accordingly.

3. A copy of current heat and electric bills issued within the last 30 days.

4. A copy of rental agreement (ifrenting) showing that utilities are included, the monthly rental amount and landlord contact.

5. Other documents may be needed based on your household situation. If you have questions regarding this, please call our office.

Water and sewer cost assistance is available this year in the Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHW AP). You can apply for water and sewer assistance on the same application as LIHEAP. Bring your water bill(s) with you to your LIHEAP appointment. Help with arrearages is available as well as rate reduction assistance of \$100-\$400, depending upon your income level. Prior year recipients are eligible to re-apply.

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

James is preceded in death by his parents, and one brother, William Lewis.


He is survived by his two sisters, Carolyn (Roger) Sargent, of Rockford,

It would be essential for the Allied Forces to control Gibraltar and French Morocco, which formed a narrow sea passage into the Mediterranean. In 1942, the U.S. Army, including Warren's 16th Squadron, would be assigned the task of seizing this critical sea entry. Under General George Patton's leadership, this invasion was code-named "Operation TORCH," and was scheduled for late 1942.

After studying maps and intelligence reports (some of it likely provided by Lt. Gilbert's team), General Patton launched landing teams of infantry and tank battalions to come ashore at different points in Morocco and Algeria beginning on Nov. 8. At some point that night or early the next morning, Lt. Warren Gilbert was killed in action, drowning as his landing barge overturned in darkness and rough seas.

With his body finally repatriated to the United States, Lt. Gilbert's funeral was held at the Methodist Church in Amboy on March 25, 1949, officiated by Reverends Norman C. Miller, and Earl M. Edwards. Burial services were held at the Franklin Grove Cemetery. A grateful nation honors his memory. Citations:

### **VOICES IN THE EVENING**

atalia Ginzburg's novel "Voices in the Evening' reads more like a memoir than a novel. Rather than a novel's conventional narration, it jumps around, much like our memories do, laden with ambiguity and open-endedness. Its first-person narration conjures up an unsentimental, skeptical aunt commenting on old pictures in a photo album, skipping some, elaborating on others, so that by the end, a remarkable portrait of an Italian village at the end of the Second World War emerges. In the Author's Note, Ginzburg underscores that "The places and characters in this story are imaginary. The first are not found on any map, the others are not alive, nor have ever lived, in any part of the world. I am sorry to say this having loved them as though

they were real." 'Voices in the Evening" is told by Elsa, an observant young woman who, except for the story of her sad love affair, never takes center stage. She is the daughter of the accountant at the Balotta factory. The whole neighborhood lives by the factory, which produces cloth as well as an awful smell that permeates the streets. Old Balotta, a Socialist, has five children. Elsa's story is about those children after old Balotta dies. The war is peripheral to the village's daily struggles, though one of the most appealing young men is dragged off and killed by the Fascists. Still, the villagers only "made fun of Purillo [the factory manager] because he was such a Fascist, and they mimicked him receiving the Party officers at the works, and being lavish with the

Roman salute."

Family is Ginzburg's great theme in all her novels. In an essay, she describes her central, animating idea: "We have come to recognize that no event, public or private, can be considered or judged in isolation, for the more deeply we probe the more we find infinitely ramifying events that preceded it, all the way back to its source." When Elsa and Tomassino, the youngest and rather enervated of the Balotta men, become friends, he describes his predicament: "It is because I have the feeling,' he said, 'that they have already lived enough, those others before me; that they have already consumed all the reserves, all the vitality that there was for us. Nothing was left over for me.""

The eccentric wife of one of the Balotta sons has a typically contradictory "thought that all men, if one observed them rather closely, had that air of being unprotected, solitary and absorbed, and that troubled a woman: and she thought that that was very dangerous." Elsa too needs to escape: "It has a weight of lead, with all its dead. This village of ours, it just gets me down; it is so small, a handful of houses. I can never free myself from it."

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




