Lee County Sheriff's office investigates incident at Amboy home

AMBOY — On Monday, Aug. 1, at approximately 6:10 a.m., the Lee County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the 300 block of West Main Street, Amboy, in response to a neighbor asking for help.

Upon arrival, deputies found a female, Vonna Benhoff, 53, with apparent injuries. Deputies also discovered Michael C. Benhoff, 55, who was deceased inside the attached garage. Lee County Detectives were called to the scene to continue the investigation. An autopsy is being scheduled by the Lee County Coroner's Office.

Vonna Benhoff was transported to OSF in Rockford for treatment of her injuries.

The Sheriff's Office was assisted at

the scene by the Amboy Fire Department, Amboy Police Department, Illinois State Police Crime Scene Services and Lee County Coroner's Office.

More information will be available upon the conclusion of the investigation. There is no immediate threat to the community at this time.

AMBOY – It isn't quite Christmas time, but if the Amboy Ambulance and Fire Protection District had a tree up there would be a pretty lofty gift underneath.

U.S. Senate Majority Whip Dick Durbin and U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth announced three recipients of funding in part of Durbin's Supporting and Improving Rural EMS Needs (SIREN) Act on July 28.

Amboy, which has received a federal grant in each of the last three years, was approved for \$125,463.

"It's pretty awesome. We've been very fortunate," said Amboy Fire Chief Jeff Bryant, Sr. "We received the grant for 2020-2021, 21-22, and now this will be our third straight year in 22-23. That's almost \$400,000 worth of federal funding to assist with EMS training. That's a great thing in recruitment.

Senator Dick Durbin tried to get this grant funded for 10 years before it actuthe need for rural EMS. He finally got it attached to the farm bill. I met with Senator Durbin after we received the first grant and he really believes in the process and the need for rural EMS.

"I was pretty amazed of his knowledge of the rural EMS picture. I would say I was greatly pleased that somebody at his level, No. 3 in the U.S. Senate, had that much knowledge of what is going on in rural America for EMS and that he had a drive to try to help us."

Bryant Sr. said the grant will be used to train additional EMS paramedics and EMTs. He plans to add five EMTs and two paramedics.

The funding will also help with training aids such as Narcan and Fentanyl test strips, a new lab top for the training room, and physicals and immunizations for the new members of the staff.

"I've done about \$25 million in grants and this one is the hardest to administer. It's a challenge to manage. This isn't our first federal grant since we've had almost \$500,000 in grant money.



Editor's note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on veterans who served during World War II. These heroes are part of Amboy's history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. PFC William James Bradley, **Purple Heart Recipient**

William James Bradley was born in Ohio, Illinois, located in Bureau County, on Aug. 16, 1913. His parents were James and Margaret



tornadoes, droughts, and

harsh winters, in addition to

the challenging economics of farming in the early 20th century. With humble roots in a quiet, hard working rural area, who could know that William's life would end too soon due to his heroic actions on the battlefield in France.

William's grandparents, James Bradley and Mary McGora were both born in County Donegal, Ireland, emigrating to America following the Great Hunger of the 1840's. They settled near

Ohio, Illinois, close to East Grove Township. William had a number of aunts and uncles living nearby.

Before the late 1950's public education in many rural areas was localized, consisting of one-room school houses on parcels of land donated by area farmers. East Grove Township had a total of eight school houses, and William likely attended one of them nearest his home. In this era, children walked to and

from school, often in harsh weather across stretches of farm field or along a creek. Census records indicate that William completed 8th grade, but did not graduate from high school. Often the year round responsibilities of farm work were assumed by the entire family in order to make ends meet.

In 1936, following the death of his father, William's family moved to Amboy.

White encourages organ/tissue donation for Virtual **National Minority Donor Awareness Month**

SRINGFIELD — Secretary of State Jesse White is hosting a virtual National Minority Donor Awareness Month to promote organ/tissue donation for multicultural communities at www. LifeGoesOn.com.

"Unfortunately, minorities are in the greatest need of organ transplants, yet they donate at a lower rate," said White. "I encourage everyone to register to become an organ/tissue donor to help give those who are in need of the gift of life.'

Nationally, people of color comprise 59% of the waiting list for organ transplants; however, this year they accounted for only 34% of those who donated organs, according to the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network.

According to the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network in Illinois:

• 1,484 African Americans are on the waiting list, but in 2021 only 139 African Americans became donors.

• 880 Hispanic Americans are on the waiting list, but last year only 90 Hispanic Americans became donors.

• 239 Asian Americans are on the waiting list, but only 9 Asian Americans became organ donors in 2021.

People of color are disproportionately affected by illnesses such as hypertension and diabetes, which can lead to the need for dialysis or a kidney transplant, increasing the number of patients on the organ transplant waiting list, according to United Network for Organ Sharing.

Transplants can be successful regardless of the ethnicity of the donor and recipient; however, the chance of long-term survival may be greater if the donor and recipient are closely matched in terms of their shared ethic background.

More than 7.4 million people in Illinois are registered as organ/tissue donors, yet there are approximately 4,000 people waiting for transplants. Each year, 300 people in Illinois die because of the shortage of organs.



Commendations:

Depression, the family could no longer support themselves with farm work, making it necessary to move into town. He and his three siblings, all young adults at this time, had taken jobs to support themselves and their 62 year old mother, Margaret.

John worked in a gravel quarry, Katherine worked at the local library, Charlotte did office work, and William took a job as janitor for the Amboy Public Schools.

On Dec. 7, 1941, Japan attacked America's Naval Base at Pearl Harbor, and our country was officially in the war. During the weeks that followed, as many young people flooded their local enlistment offices, William must have been thinking about his eligibility for the draft, or making a decision to enlist. On Jan. 29, 1942, William enlisted in the U.S. Army at Camp Grant, Rockford. Following his basic training, he was assigned to the 4th Armored Division, 37th Tank Battalion.

Following the D-Day Invasion of June 6, 1944, U.S. Army and other Allied

French countryside town by town with the goal of directly invading Germany to end the war. On Dec. 6 of that year, about a dozen U.S. Army tanks commanded by Col. Creighton Abrams attacked a group of German Panzer tanks at the town of Singling, France. In one of those tanks was Lt. Farese and P.F.C. William Bradley.

As their tank topped the crest of a slight rise just south of a stone farm yard wall, it was hit three times by armor piercing shells and immediately was set on fire. Both soldiers were killed. The final reckoning of the battle at Singling involved a total of 22 U.S. casualties, of which 6 were killed. Eventually, Allied Forces would press through to Germany by early spring of 1945, leading to victory in Europe.

William James Bradley died a hero's death in pursuit of freedom and democracy throughout the world. He is buried at Lorraine American Cemetery near Singling, France. A little boy from East Grove Township left a legacy of duty and honor for all Americans. "That one wasn't as difficult. But it isn't bad, there are checks and balances to make sure you're doing the right thing with the money," Bryant Sr. said.

Amboy was the only department who received SIREN for 2020-2021, one of two in 2021-2022 and one of three for 2022-2023 as Jersey Community Hospital District will receive \$193,453 and Gibson Area Hospital and Health Services was approved for \$200,000.

"Across Illinois, rural EMS agencies are first on the scene to respond to community emergencies, the opioid crisis, and the Covid-19 pandemic. But for EMTs to properly respond to these emergencies, we must ensure they are equipped with the necessary supplies, training, and steady funding to support their operations," Durbin said in a press release. "I worked hard to pass the SIREN Act to meet the needs of EMS agencies as they care for their communities. I hope to see today's grant recipients put this federal funding to good use."



A TASTEFUL TALE

ecades later I still remember the humiliation I felt when in my freshman English composition class, the instructor told us that he handed out two A's and the rest of the class got D's. The first A (mine) was a perfectly constructed story, flowing smoothly from paragraph to paragraph, whereas the second A, though grammatically unpredictable, teemed with life in all its messiness and possibilities. Anita Shreve's "Light on Snow" reminds me of my freshman composition - tasteful, earnest, and bloodless.


"Light on Snow" has more than enough potential for a great story – saving a newborn baby abandoned in the deep New Hampshire snow during the Christmas season - but Shreve's tasteful prose harnesses her imagination and ours to keep our emotional responses safely tucked away. I think the problem is the choice of narrator. The events of that winter are narrated by thirty-year-old Nicky Dillon when she was twelve and had not yet submitted to the disapproving proprieties of adulthood.

Nicky and her father, Robert, live in a small town in New Hampshire. They arrived two years earlier after Nicky's mother and three-year-old sister Clara were killed in a car crash in New York City. Their cabin in New Hampshire is isolated and virtually impossible to access in a snowstorm. Robert, who was an architect at a Manhattan firm, now builds furniture to occupy his time. He is still emotionally frozen, incapable of engaging in any sort of meaningful exchange. The family had shattered and Nicky still feels bereft and desolate.

One day in mid-December, Nicky and Robert are snowshoeing when they hear a tiny wail. They assume it's an animal, only to find a newborn baby left to die in a bag in the snow. They rush the baby to the hospital, where the doctors save her, including her toes and all but one finger. Days later, a young woman, sick and disheveled, shows up on their doorstep. Her name is Charlotte and she has come to thank Mr. Dillon for saving her baby's life. Nicky is thrilled to have a guest, especially a nineteen-year old college student. Robert wants to toss her out. But a towering snowstorm keeps Charlotte safely there until Nicky manages to talk her father into taking care of Charlotte.

Charlotte tells her story of how her boyfriend had tricked her into believing that her baby had died after she gave birth in a motel not far from the Dillon cabin.

He is a rich pre-med student who leaves soon after to go skiing with his pals in Switzerland. Shreve's choice of an ending is decidedly disappointing, not least because she stops at Christmas without a word about what happened in the 18 intervening years.

The Jan. 6 Committee reminds us of what Congress can do

atching the hearings held by the Guest Column Jan. 6 committee as it delves into the events at the Capitol last year and what lay behind them, I've been struck by what you might think of as the "meta-coverage." It's been fascinating to see.

Most news stories, of course, have focused on the alarming revelations uncovered by the committee—in essence, the lengths to which a sitting president and his allies went in trying to short-circuit the clearly expressed will of the American people. But some coverage has instead focused on how the select committee has gone about its work: the technology it's using and its careful structuring of the hearings to create a clear narrative of the events leading up to and following the attack on the Capitol.

As Axios' Mike Allen put it recently, "The committee ditched the flabby traditional format and has methodically built a taut, colorful narrative with a prosecutor's precision and a cinematographer's flair." He and others cite the influence of former ABC News president James Goldston, who, as Allen writes, "has been producing each hearing as if it were a '20/20' episode," as well as the committee's discipline in building an easy-to-grasp accretion of facts and testimony.

There is much about this that's new: the use of relevant footage, maps, and reconstructions that are available instantly when needed; interweaving videotaped and in-person testimony to deepen the narrative; production values that make

the hearings seem up-to-the-minute, rather than a throwback to an earlier era. But there is also much about this that is, in fact, time-tested congressional process.

What the hearings are doing is what congressional committees at their best have always done: focus on a complicated topic, present the facts about it to the American people, leave us all better informed than we were before, and possibly have an impact on how government operates. It's not hard to come up with a list of high-profile congressional hearings that have had this kind of effect, from the 1954 Army-McCarthy hearings to the Watergate hearings in 1973 to the 1987 Iran-Contra hearings and the 2019 hearings on special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation into Russian

interference in the 2016 elections. But I would argue that even low-profile committee work-hearings aimed at checking in on the operations of the executive branch or how well policy initiatives have performed—have held similar value for our democracy


I've always believed that part of the job of a politician is to educate the public—about the facts and about their meaning for the US and for public policy. It is incredibly difficult these days for voters to sort out information-we're all bombarded with facts, opinion, information and misinformation and even disinformation. But if, as a country, we're to build consensus based on the real world, then you have to start with the facts.

Ultimately, a democratic society depends on the ability of citizens to form good judgments based on the realities facing us; if they don't, the country suffers.

The same, of course, goes for policy-makers. In that case, the country depends not just on their ability to ground their work in the facts, but to explore an issue and then deliberate on what to do about it. The deliberative process-which in Congress was once rooted in the work of committees-produces better law: It forces members of Congress to understand an issue, accommodate different interests, and ultimately knock out bad ideas and bad proposals in favor of initiatives that can command a consensus. Overall, as congressional power has consolidated in the hands of a few strong leaders, committees have lost that kind of influence; Congress generally holds far fewer hearings than it did a few decades ago.

So I take the Jan. 6 committee's innovations as a good sign. It has updated the mechanics of the process to create a compelling lesson in the value of thorough research and leveling plainly with the American people about what the facts show. In short, it has demonstrated what Congress is capable of achieving. Here's hoping other committees are taking note.
