LaHood easily wins County

Bailey also has strong local showing for Republicans; incumbent Bowers loses bid to stay on County Board

Republican Darin LaHoodhad a strong showing in Ogle County in the June 28 primary election, taking nearly 53 percent of the vote on his way to securing the nomination as 16th Congressional District representative.

There is currently no Democrat running. LaHood is seeking to replace U.S. Rep. Adam Kinzinger in the newly re-drawn district. Kinzinger is retiring.

"Thank you to the Republican voters in the 16th Congressional District for delivering us a resounding victory in the primary election," LaHood said in a statement. "It's clear that 16th District voters want a strong conservative voice and local advocate in Congress who will defend our Midwestern values. I look forward to the work ahead to earn the trust of 16th District voters in the general election this November."

Gubernatorial candidate, Republican Darren Bailey, also carried the county with more than 64 percent of the vote. He will face incumbent Democratic Gov. J.B. Pritzker in November after beating a crowded Republican field vying for the governor's office.

Locally, Tiffany O'Brien, who took over as Ogle County Treasurer/Collector on June 30 after Linda Beck resigned, garnered 5,817 votes running unopposed.



Fire departments get life-saving equipment

The Ogle County Farm Bureau Young Leaders through financial support from COUNTRY Financial recently donated grain bin rescue augers to three area fire departments serving Ogle and Lee

Augers were purchased by COUN-TRY Financial and distributed to the Byron, Rochelle and Rural Dixon Fire Departments.

The augers are used in conjunction with grain bin rescue tubes in extracting individuals trapped in collapsed grain inside of grain bins. The rescue augers allow first responders to extricate grain more rapidly saving vital minutes in life saving situations.

"This effort is one that COUNTRY Financial has dedicated itself to over decades providing necessary equipment to local communities to assist them in emergency response situations. As someone who lost a family member in a grain bin accident I'm glad to see that this donation may save other families from that tragedy," said COUNTRY Financial's Phil Hasz. 





MOMENTS IN

- * On July 15, 1606, the great Dutch master Rembrandt van Rijn is born in Leiden. Rembrandt completed more than 600 paintings, many of them portraits or self-portraits. By the age of 22, he was accomplished enough to take on his own students.
- *On July 14, 1789, Parisian revolutionaries and mutinous troops storm and dismantle the Bastille, a royal fortress built in 1370 that had come to symbolize the tyranny of the Bourbon monarchs. This dramatic action signaled the beginning of the French Revolution.
- * On July 11, 1922, the Hollywood Bowl, one of the world's largest natural amphitheaters, opens. Its stage was a wooden platform with a canvas top, and audiences sat on moveable benches set on the hillsides of the surrounding canyon. In 1926, a group of Los Angeles architects built the Hollywood Bowl's first shell.
- * On July 16, 1935, the world's first parking meter, known as Park-O-Meter No. 1, is installed in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Indignant opponents of the meters considered paying for parking un-American, as it forced drivers to pay what amounted to a tax on their cars without due process of law.
- * On July 12, 1957, Dwight D. Eisenhower becomes the first president to ride in the newest advance in aviation technology: the HMX-1 Nighthawk helicopter, administered jointly by the Army and the Marine Corps.
- * On July 13, 1960, Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts is nominated for the presidency by the Democratic Party Convention. Four months later, on Nov. 8, Kennedy won 49.7% of the popular vote, edging the 49.6% received by Richard M. Nixon, a Republican.
- * On July 17, 1975, as part of a mission aimed at developing space rescue capability, the U.S. spacecraft Apollo 18 and the Soviet spacecraft Soyuz 19 rendezvous and dock in space. During the 44-hour Apollo-Soyuz embrace, the astronauts and cosmonauts conducted experiments, shared meals and held a joint news conference.
