Doing it for family

Pine Creek Escape owner makes summer events free to celebrate her grandmother's 'miraculous' recovery

MOUNT MORRIS – To say that family means a lot to Rebecca Jones is quite an understatement.

As owner of Pine Creek Escape – which includes a wedding venue and cabins – and the Rink at Pine Creek, Jones has a strong bond with the community as well

But last year was a tough one for her and her family, with her grandmother Pat suffering from an accident that cost her both of her legs and had her on life support for several days. Not long after the accident, her grandfather, Pat's husband of 63 years, died.

"We were told that someone of her age would not survive that sort of trauma," Jones said. "After she was released from intensive care, they explained she would most likely never leave the nursing home, if she even made it at all. That simply was unacceptable for Granny and my family. She chose to fight and build her strength and her mental capacity back up. Just four months after her accident, she came home to her own house where she still lives by herself. She has learned how to move from her wheelchair to bed, the bathroom, the shower and her living room chair."

To celebrate this miraculous recovery, Music in the Canyon and Yoga in the Canyon are free this



year. But Pine Creek is accepting donations that will go toward equipment to help Pat in her daily life, as well as pay musicians and

Yoga is every Tuesday through Aug. 9 at 7:30 a.m. and live music is being held on Friday Aug. 19 and Friday Sept. 16 from 6-9 p.m.

"Our events have been going very well," Jones said. "We are almost halfway to our goal from donations so far this season. Granny loves going to live music and attended our last concert." If collecting donations works well this season, Pine Creek is looking to find a charity each year to raise money for.

It has been a challenging few years for Jones, who bought the wedding business in 2019. She added the cabins and later the skating rink as well.

Just a year after she opened

the property, the COVID-19 lockdown hit her business and most others. That put a real damper on weddings, but Jones is seeing the light at the end of the tunnel.

"Weddings and events take a bit longer to come back and this year we are seeing the uptick," she said. "2023 is looking very strong!"

Thankfully, the Rink and cabins did well during the pandemic, she said, and have gained in popularity.

"The Rink has been really busy hosting birthday parties and we have been adding extra sessions in season by request," she said. "Skating in general is making a popular comeback. The Cabins hosted a lot of families from the city that have now made The Cabins a yearly retreat."

Jones said her grandmother attended as an adult skate night at The Rink, where she skated back in the 1950s.

"It is truly a miracle that she is not only alive but also thriving," Jones said. "There are still a lot of hard days, and it takes the help of care takers, family and friends to help her enjoy her remaining days. Her support is still important to me and the inspiration I have taken from her on my hard days is incredible."

Paint recycling for county is Aug. 13

Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) will be hosting a recycling event for used motor oil, anti-freeze, latex paint, aerosol spray cans, and used child car seats on Saturday, Aug. 13, from 8 a.m. to noon at the County Annex Building located at 909 Pines Road in Oregon.

Liquid latex paint will be accepted for recycling and there is a fee per container of \$1/quart, \$2/ gallon, and \$8/pail up to 10 containers. Paint should be brought to the event in its' original container and not be bulked together so it can be properly recycled. The OCSWMD will subsidize a portion of the cost to recycle your paint up to 10 containers. The full cost of \$2.50/quart, \$5/ gallon, and \$18/pail will be charged for additional containers over the first 10.

Aerosol spray cans and single-use propane tanks will also be accepted at this event. Aerosol products such as paints, lubricants, cleaners, insecticides, personal care products, and food products will be accepted for recycling, along with the single-use (14-16 once) propane cylinders. The first 10 items are fully subsidized by the OCSWMD and any additional aerosol cans will be charged at \$1/can and \$2/propane cylinder. Not all aerosol products will be able to be accepted, please call the OCSWMD at 815-732-4020 for specific questions or see the county website.

Something new for this event will be the acceptance of used children's car seats. There is no limit or fee for the recycling of car seats. This is very advantageous as used car seats cannot be donated for reuse. All types of car seats are accepted, please remove the padding and cushioning prior to arrival at the event.

Used oil, anti-freeze, and used oil filters will also be accepted for recycling. There is no fee for this service. Small containers of used oil and/or anti-freeze will be bulked together and your containers returned to you for future use. Large drums also accepted and will be vacuum-pumped out. Limit 200 gallons, if you have more than 200 gallons please call the number above for recycling options.

This event is for Ogle County residents only and there are no permits required.

MOMENTS IN TIME

- * On July 31, 1715, a hurricane strikes the East Coast of Florida, sinking 10 Spanish treasure ships carrying tons of gold and silver coins and killing nearly 1,000 people. About 80% of the treasures had been recovered by April 1716, but the rest remained lost until the 1960s.
- * On July 25, 1832, the first recorded railroad accident in U.S. history occurs when four people are thrown off a vacant car near Quincy, Massachusetts. The victims had been invited to view the process of transporting loads of stone when a cable on a vacant car snapped, throwing them off the train and over a 34-foot cliff.
- * On July 28, 1868, following its ratification by the necessary three-quarters of U.S. states, the 14th Amendment, guaranteeing African Americans citizenship and all its privileges, is officially adopted into the U.S. Constitution.
- * On July 29, 1921, Adolf Hitler becomes the leader of the National Socialist German Workers' (Nazi) Party. Under Hitler, the Nazi Party grew into a mass movement and ruled Germany as a totalitarian state from 1933 to 1945. The Nazis controlled every aspect of German life, and all other political parties were banned.
- * On July 26, 1931, a swarm of grasshoppers descends on crops throughout Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota, devastating millions of acres. The swarm was said to be so thick that it blocked out the sun and one could shovel the grasshoppers with a scoop. Cornstalks were eaten to the ground and fields left completely bare.
- * On July 30, 1976, American Bruce Jenner wins gold in the decathlon at the Montreal Olympics and sets a world record in the event. After his win, Jenner was voted the 1976 AP Male Athlete of the Year. The 1976 Olympics was his last decathlon. In 2015, he became Caitlyn Jenner and is an American media personality.
- * On July 27, 1981, Adam John Walsh, age 6, is abducted from a mall in Hollywood, Florida, and later found murdered. Adam's father, John Walsh, became a leading victims rights activist and host of the long-running television show "America's Most Wanted."

Facts clearly won't settle the gun debate

It's past time to admit that if facts and statistics could settle the issue of gun violence, they'd have done so long ago. Emotions overrule knowledge and reason in matters that are most important to us. The path forward requires us, then, to search for mutual understanding, if not agreement, regarding how we feel about guns and gun violence.

The first hurdle along that path is tribalism, or the loyalty that people feel toward those who are on their side. Attitudes about guns fall along liberal and conservative tribal lines, as shown by a Pew Research Center survey last September. 81% of Democrats and those who lean Democratic favored stricter gun laws, while 80% of Republicans and Republican leaners felt that gun laws should remain the same or be less strict.

Guns are likely to mark which side people are on in regard to an array of other issues. Many researchers and writers, most recently Professors Verlan Lewis and Hyrum Lewis in the June 18 Wall Street Journal, have explored the ways that group identity shapes political positions. It is, they find, stronger than any political philosophy.

Jonathan Haidt, in his book, "The Righteous Mind," reveals how those tribal allegiances come about. He starts with the phrase, "Genes make brains." Our heredity has, in other words, a lot to do with our tendency to be liberal or conservative. It accounts for a third to a half. It's much more influential than the political beliefs of our families.

Haidt cites research regarding how genes affect the brains of liberals and conservatives, including their tendency to feel under threat as well as how they respond to fear. "This finding," he says, "fits well with many studies showing that conservatives react more strongly than liberals to signs of danger..." Liberal beliefs, on the other hand, are strongly linked to genes that "have long been tied to sensation-seeking and openness to experience." Heredity isn't neces-

sarily destiny. Our life experiences also play a role in shaping our politics. But these two factors - how we feel about newness and change and how strongly we react to possible threats - have, Haidt reports, "consistently been found to distinguish liberals from conservatives."

A survey by Gallup, Inc. in August 2019 reveals the role that the perception of threat plays in gun ownership. 63% of gun owners identified personal safety or protection as a reason they own a firearm. This is far above other motives, including hunting, at 40%, and recreation, at 11%.

Joseph M. Pierre, a psychiatrist specializing in community mental health, emphasizes the role that fear often plays in the decision to own a gun. "From a psychological perspective," he said in an October 2015 Psychology Today article, "it's less important whether guns actually make us safer and more important whether guns make us feel safer." The sense of emotional security that many owners associate with guns can make even modest regulations seem threatening, provoking fears that more restrictions are on

the way. Liberal gun opponents are capable of their own kind of biased thinking about guns and gun owners. Haidt has found that liberals are less successful at identifying conservatives' true beliefs and feelings, and more likely to place them in an unfavorable light, than conservatives are in regard to liberals. And people who, like me, have never felt the need for a weapon of any kind in order to feel safe, are likely to find it hard to appreciate how threatening the prospect of gun restrictions is to people who rely on them for a

sense of personal safety. This perhaps places the greater burden on those of us who favor stricter gun laws. Until we can respond to the true feelings and beliefs of gun owners, we can quote facts and statistics by the ream, but will never convince them of the benefits of reasonable firearm regulations.
