'Seven Days a Week'

Reutner a fishing fixture of Lake Mendota Sunday to Saturday

MENDOTA - There are fixtures of Lake Mendota.

There is the lake itself, along with parks on the north and south side, the bridge to cross the street, the dam, the geese, ducks, swans, and of course the dock

And with the dock comes Fred Reutner (Right-ner).

"This little girl was at Ziggie's and she kept waiving at me. When it got quiet, I heard her ask, 'Mom, is that the guy that helped me catch my first fish,"" Reutner said. "The mom answered, 'I don't know, let me look.' She picked up her phone and found the picture from nine years ago.

"She showed me the picture. I don't know her name. I don't know half of the kids who come out here. Just two days ago, I caught a fish, saw a 4-year old boy and a 5-year old girl, and I let them reel in the fish. I put the little bass back in the water, we talked for a little bit, and they said, 'Thank you.'

"I've done that I don't know how many times. Anybody that wants to catch a fish or needs help, I'll set them up."

Reutner, 76, has been Mendota's fishing guru, teacher, spokesman for decades

Born and raised in Dimmick, he began fishing at the Vermillion River when he was 4 years old. He ventured to Lake Mendota when he was 13 and has been coming to the dock ever since.

"I think fishing is really important for people. It gives them an opportunity to just take their mind off of things," said Reutner. "It's peaceful out here at the I'm usually on the dock, but sometimes I'll go across the lake.

"I used to bring kids from the daycare and residents at the nursing home down to the lake. I had fish fries on Tuesdays. I like to help people and see them happy. I had a person come up and tell me I helped them catch their first fish 26 years ago. Then they asked me, 'Can you help my 4-year-old daughter catch her first fish. 'Yeah, bring her over here and let's catch a fish.'

Reutner owned Fred's Bait Shop for 30 years where he helped every kid and person with a fishing license get ready to fish. He threw in tips and advice free of charge.

He is also a large part of many expositions in the area as he again gives

□ MASS director gives dire report to council

MENDOTA - The Mendota City Council heard a report on the progress of road construction in the city and approved several requests at its June 6 regular meeting.

ALDERMANIC REPORTS

Alderman John Hessenberger presented numerous items for the council's consideration. Hessenberger said a Plan Commission meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, June 23 in the council chambers to hear a request from MD LLC for a conditional use at 4380 E. Fourth Road for an automobile wrecking yard.

In other action from Hessenberger's report, the council approved hiring Roberto Martinez for the city's street department.

Three requests were approved by the council. Mendota High School will use Veterans Park and close appropriate streets around the park for a Mendota Band Block Party on Thursday, June 23. Scott Bickett will hold a Lake Mendota Car Show from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 28. The Mendota VFW Auxiliary will have its annual Poppy Days on Friday, June 24 and Saturday, June 25.

Alderman Jay Miller informed the council of a request for a Class A liquor license for Tony's in the 700 block of Main Street. The council approved the request

subject to the passing of life-safety code requirements for the building.

Mayor David Boelk said that the 13th Avenue road construction project should be completed by June 17, which is ahead of the original schedule.

The council approved a donation of \$8,000 to the Mendota Area Chamber of Commerce for its annual 4th of July fireworks show.

The council also authorized a professional services agreement with the economic development group for TIF 2022.

DEPARTMENT **HEAD REPORTS**

Police Chief Greg Kellen asked the council for permission to utilize a shuttle service for the Sweet Corn Festival, which will benefit Special Olympics Illinois. The council approved the request.

Kellen said police officers Will Hansen and Austin O'Sadnick are tentatively scheduled to graduate from the police academy on July 1.

Kellen presented a proposal for a 20-camera security system to be installed at Strouss Park that would cover the swimming pool, ball diamonds, concession stand, playground and other areas. He said the estimated cost for the project is \$90,000. No action was taken.

Stonecroft Village folds old flag; new flag flies high

MENDOTA-Stonecroft Village Retirement Community had the chance to place a check mark next to two listings on its to-do list.

On May 19, Stonecroft accomplished the feat by replacing its Flag of the United States of America and by presenting a flag-folding demonstration for the residents.

"I went to quite a few military funerals and have watched how they folded the flag," said Diana Dahlgren, who performed the flag-folding. "I've read about it, too, because it was part of military training. We had to know everything about the flag of the United States of America.

Dahlgren has worked at Stonecroft for the last 15 years.

But before she was assisting residents, she was serving the United States of America as she wore fatigues from 1983-1997.

For her, it was an honor to fold the old flag and fly the new flag.

"It was the first time I folded the flag at Stonecroft. They enjoyed it," Dahlgren said. "Some of them didn't come all the way to the flag, but they were watching. There was a big crowd outside.

"We had to put a new flag up because the one we did have on the flagpole was pretty ripped. In order of Memorial Day, we decided to show them how to properly

fold the flag. I would do it again if they wanted me to; I'd love to.'

Jon Stuckert has only been the Stonecroft Executive Director since the first week of April, but long-tenure under his belt or not, he saw a perfect opportunity to switch out a tattered flag and give the residents a learning opportunity and entertainment at the same time.

"I thought it was awesome and the residents really liked it," said Stuckert, who became familiar with Stonecroft as a home health therapist hired by residents. "We have residents who served in the military and everyone has at least one family member who has served. I think everyone really appreciated it.

IDNR says use of backyard bird feeders & bird baths may resume

SPRINGFIELD - Bird lovers may resume using backyard feeders and baths effective, wildlife biologists at the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) advised.

IDNR originally recommended the use of bird feeders and bird baths be suspended through May 31 in response to the EA H5N1 strain of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in Illinois.

With the annual spring migration of non-resident waterfowl and other migratory bird species complete, the risk of further disease outbreaks among wild bird populations has been minimized. To date, HPAI has not been detected in songbird species.

"The IDNR would like to thank the public for their assistance and cooperation in potentially reducing the spread of HPAI during this critical time," said Chris Jacques, the agency's wildlife disease program manager.

IDNR continues to encourage regular

cleaning of bird feeders and bird baths. People who keep domestic poultry should remain extra vigilant. Further guidance for poultry owners can be found at the following USDA website: USDAAPHIS | Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI).

And because HPAI may still occur in resident waterfowl, people should avoid feeding ducks and geese. Even under normal conditions, feeding waterfowl can lead to nuisance problems and, consequently, increase rates of disease transmission in wild bird populations.

IDNR first announced HPAI was detected in wild migratory waterfowl (Canada geese) in Illinois in March 2022. Since that time, experts have documented HPAI-related mortalities in wild eagles, double-crested cormorants, snow geese, American white pelicans, red-tailed hawks, mallard ducks, redhead duck, lesser scaup, Canada geese, Ross's geese and turkey vultures in Champaign, Cook, Fulton, Lake, Madison, Peoria, Sangamon and Will counties.





pointers and demonstrates how to clean fish.

Reutner performed his cleaning demonstration at the Baker Lake Expo on May 16 in La Salle, was at the Lock 14 Fishing Tournament on June 4 in La Salle and will be at the Mendota Lions Club Kids'Fishing Rodeo on June 12 at Lake Mendota.

Over the years, he has also helped kids in Ottawa, DePue, Spring Valley, and Cedar Point...to name a few.

"At the Baker Lake Expo, we went through about 300 pounds of fish. We did that in one day. We fry them up right there. I caught some of the fish ahead of time to make sure we had enough," said Reutner, who estimates he cleans 60,000 fish per year for himself and others. "I always keep a stock. It gives the kids something better to do than doing drugs. I've been out here helping little kids since I started. I've been helping Lock 14 for a long time. I became a member in 1987.

"I can clean 120 fish in an hour. We were down at Baker Lake when we first started down there. She had a stopwatch. I was showing the kids how to clean fish and it was taking me 45 seconds a fish. She said, 'Sir, there is no way that you're going to do two fish per minute by going that way.'

"I said, 'Mam, I'm not here for show and tell. I'm here to teach the kids how to clean a fish.' I told her to come back at 4 p.m. and I'll have 100 Bluegill ready to go and you can put me on your stopwatch. I cleaned 100 Bluegill in 37.98 minutes. One guy asked, 'Now mam, do you think he can do 20 more fish in the remaining 22 minutes?" I haven't seen that lady since."

Many have seen Reutner cast his No. 18 treble hook with either Velveeta cheese, wax worms, trout worms, night crawlers, or artificial tube steak attached.

But no one has been told to watch their bobber by the fisherman than his daughter Alice Reutner McGraw.

Everyone has a Fred story

MENDOTA - When speaking to Fred Reutner's daughter, Alice Reutner Mc-Graw, and his friend, Steve Schank, for the story, 'Seven Days a Week,' there seemed to be more to the legendary fisherman's story.

Actually, it's more to do with the stories everyone else has about Reutner (Right-ner).

The 76-year-old local icon who was the first Mendota resident to be selected for the All-American Outdoorsman Hall of Fame (2011) has been fishing since he was 4 and has casted into Lake Mendota since he was 13.

Along the way, Reutner has helped any child, teenager, or adult who has ever wanted to speak to him or ask him a question.

Here are a few stories or comments the community had to say about Reutner: Elizabeth Gleim Zinke, Mendota

"I love Fred. This isn't a fishing story,

"My dad and Terry Ramer had a joke when my son (Tyler Stewart)) was born (he is now 19). My dad would always get Terry's grandchildren to come to the lake and put a pole in their hand," Reutner McGraw said. "Terry would always say, 'Fred, you beat me to it.' Terry said, 'When you have a grandchild, I'm going to beat you to it and get them out there with a pole in their hand.'

"Dad made sure that didn't happen. My son was literally only months old and in a car seat carrier and my dad took him out to the lake and put a pole in his hand. He took a photo and sent it to Terry Ramer and said, 'Got cha'.'

"Dad does it because he loves fishing. He instilled that in us kids. I was the second born. I had two brothers (Henry and Freddie Reutner, mother of all three is Fred's ex-wife Kathy Reutner) and both of them have passed away. When we were younger, he would take us fishing. I didn't really appreciate it at the time, but I do now. We all helped dad in the bait shop. He would give us all different jobs to do.

Her job was to run the numbers in the books for although he has always showed the kids the fish he caught and taught them when we see him at the lake. One day at Sullivan's Foods when Teague was a baby, I ran into get a few things and was holding Teague while pushing the cart. Fred offered to hold T and walk around with me as I shopped." Michael Galijatovic, Peru

"He always shares information like where to fish, what bait to use, and how to cast. I bet he could rig up a pole in his sleep. He's a super cool guy. He always stops and talks to everyone.

Tanya Gunnoe, Sabraton, West Virgina

"Growing up in Mendota, I have so many memories of Fred. And 20 years later when I came back to Mendota, I got to see him at a fish fry. That man is a legend." Ariana Navarro, Mendota

"I see him almost every night I work at Ziggie's. Tap water with ice, bowl of soup with a tea spoon – not a soup spoon.'

Reutner McGraw appreciates it now because she was such a wiz, she became a CPA (certified public accountant).

As a child she didn't get to see her father as much as she would have liked because the Army veteran who served during Vietnam worked long hours at Wayside Press (R.R. Donnelly) and Motor Wheel.

It wasn't until he approached retirement that Reutner McGraw saw more of her dad and they saw more of the lake.

"He does so much for so many people and doesn't ask for anything in return. So many people look at him, see he's a big guy, and think he's intimidating," Reutner McGraw said. "He's really just a big teddy bear. He's always looking out for the kids. He makes squirrel noises and tries to get the little kids' attention. He has so many wonderful characteristics. He loves kids and he loves sharing the love that he has for everything, including fishing."

When Steve Schank moved from La Salle to Mendota 10 years ago, he met Fred Reutner at the dock.

He had never met Schank before, but Fred greeted him like he has everyone else over

the last 72 years of fishing; with a handshake, a smile, and love for fishing.

"I saw Fred on the dock and I instantly felt comfortable. He reminds me of my grandfather. My dad's dad was a fisherman. I was the first-born grandson. Fred and my grandfather were raised on farms in the same area and coincidentally are both German. I could really

relate to him. "In my opinion, he's an extremely intelligent guy. He's extremely interesting to talk to. The stories that he tells are extraordinary. You can't believe the amount of fish that he harvests from Lake Mendota. There are a lot of kids, teenagers, adults who have a story about Fred. Everyone has a story about Fred.

"He's involved with the lake itself and keeping the lake in balance, which is one of the reasons it's such a great fishing lake. He's a wealth of knowledge when it comes to fishing. He's a real life, along the lines, of a Grizzly Adams. He's a gift and a beautiful thing to Mendota. The day that I don't see Fred on the dock will be a hard day for me. I'll always see Fred on that dock even when he's no longer with us."

Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker made a big deal out of "finding" 250,000 hidden Illinoisans during the past decade, claiming the state population was over 13 million in the 2020 Census head count.

"I look forward to celebrating this development with all Illinoisans, including those who routinely badmouth our state," Pritzker said in a press statement.

Two interesting observations here.

First, Pritzker cheerily embraces the idea of population gain, despite plenty of evidence Illinois is rapidly losing people, and he misinterpreted what the U.S. Census Bureau was saying. Of course, you'd expect him to grab onto the "Illinois is growing" theme, because it lets him ignore the public policy issues that he's made worse, including \$2,165 in new taxes per family that are driving those families out.

"Move along. Nothing to see here," Pritzker is saying.

Second, he tried to hush anyone who calls him out for his mistake by expecting even those who "routinely badmouth our state" to join him in his glee. Facts can be troublesome things, but telling the truth is far from badmouthing.

So now for some truth telling.

The U.S. Census Bureau knows counting every person is a problem. For decades, they and experts have argued that there are better, more accurate ways than spending \$14.2 billion to send surveys, knock on doors and try to find every homeless person under a bridge. "One, two, three... 331,893,745."


So, after they try to count every person in America, they conduct a survey to assess the accuracy of that count. They make a new survey of 160,000 households over 10,000 blocks across the country and gauge the accuracy of the whole count based on that sample count. That survey, the Post-Enumeration Survey, showed Illinois' total count was likely off by about 2%.

Pritzker's magic math translates that into 250,000 extra Illinoisans.

All that number really means is there could be more Illinoisans. How many remains a question, because the survey said the head count might have been off by as many as 440,000 people or only 64,000 people. The 2% figure is the midpoint of the accuracy range.

Now let's look at Pritzker using his number to declare Illinois grew during the past decade.

The U.S. Census Bureau, for the first time, let



Medal of honor comes to Hume-Carnegie

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from June 12, 2002.) **By Jessica Nashold**

Though is arrived by a circuitous route, the Congressional Medal of Honor earned by James W. Larabee during the Civil War was donated to the Hume-Carnegie Museum the Sunday before Memorial Day this year.

It had long been known that Larabee was the only recruit from Mendota to receive the medal. A booklet distributed by State Auditor Michael J. Howlett in 1973 listed all of the Medal of Honor recipients from Illinois. At that time, Mary Larabee Frey, a granddaughter, and grandsons Sam and Louis Larabee of the Earlville area did not know what had become of the medal. Mrs. Frey did have the bible that Larabee carried throughout his years in the service.

Enlisting at the age of 17 at Mendota, for three months with Co. H Regimental Illinois Volunteers, Larabee's first assignment was guarding rail lines in southern Illinois. At the conclusion of his three months, he enlisted in Co. I. 55th Regiment, Illinois Infantry. Participating in the Battle of Shiloh, he was wounded in the arm and given a short furlough. He rejoined his unit in Memphis, and took part in several campaigns, then volunteered to join the May 22, 1863 assault on Graveyard Fort, occupied by Confederates. He was the only man in his unit to do so. Here he suffered neck injuries, which kept him hospitalized to several weeks. He then rejoined his unit and took part in Sherman's famed March to the Sea.

Larabee received his discharge in



Although James W. Larabee had left the area at the time of his marriage, one of his sons, Charles D. Larabee, moved his family to Mendota. One of his sons was another James W. Larabee, and Charles was entrusted with the medal to keep for his young son. Tragically, Charles D. Larabee, a contractor who completed work on the Mendota Township High School (following the death of the original contractor during construction), was killed in a car accident, while hurrying home for lunch from a job in Amboy. Not long after that, young James died.

Another of Charles D. Larabee's children, Mary Lou Larabee Nagel, now living in Arizona, remembers that a decision was reached to place the medal with her brother, Thomas, who also had a son James. Again, fate intervened, with the death of James, at a young age.

When they learned that Mendota had a museum, the Larabees reached a collective decision to make their grandfather's Congressional Medal of Honor available for viewing there.

Tom Larabee, his son Tom, and their spouses brought the medal to the Hume-Carnegie Museum on May 26, 2002, the Sunday before Memorial Day.

Local coverage of the Civil War years was incomplete. The Mendota Observer had been taken over by Beck & Crook (lawyers), in October 1860. In May 1861, they warned that if advertising did not pick up, they could not continue "drawing on our own pockets" to publish. In mid-June, a group calling itself the Mendota Light Infantry, was drilling on the "commons" east of the Passenger House. The last Mendota Observer appeared on June 26, 1861.

There was no Mendota paper in 1862.

The Mendota Bulletin appeared in 1863. The oldest surviving copy is dated March 31, 1863, and numbered Vol. I, No. 4. Ruggles and Golliday were publishers. The March 31 issue carried a letter dated March 10, 1863, from the commander of a company from Illinois serving in Corinth, Miss. He stated the company had numbered 96 at the outset. It now numbered 51. He wrote that 10 had been killed, four had died of wounds, two of sickness, one had drowned and two had been missing since a battle at Fort Donelson. The rest had been demobilized because of disability.

In March 1864, Captain Heslett returned to Mendota, having been wounded in battle at Hartesville, Tenn., and demobilized. He resumed his former position as head of the Union School in midtown Mendota.

The Chicago Sanitary Commission asked people in the Mendota area to donate onions, potatoes, pickles, sauerkraut and dried fruit for the Hospital Fleet near Vicksburg. Donations left at Black's store in Mendota would be picked up by Soldiers' Aid. The troops were suffering from scurvy. ***

people report their household information online. It offered surveys in 47 languages. It nearly doubled its advertising for the 2020 count over the 2010 spend.

All that argues for a much more accurate 2020 count, which the Census Bureau said still might be off by 2%. Chances are the 2010 count was much less accurate, and it missed a lot of people the 2020 count found.

Why does all this matter? Because Pritzker wants to pretend Illinois is not losing people. It is, according to other census estimates, surveys by two major moving van companies and the Internal Revenue Service's numbers.

Annual Census Bureau estimates that start with the 10-year head count and use other federal data plus birth and death records show Illinois is losing. Eight consecutive census estimates have shown Illinois losing people, including a record 114,000 lost in the 2021 estimate. Births and deaths basically cancel each other out in Illinois, so that loss is people moving away.

Zach Meiborg is part of the exodus. He has growing children and a booming trucking company, and he doesn't see much future for either in Illinois. He's moving to Houston, Texas.

"Corruption and distrust of the state are corrosive to our further business investment in Illinois. With Gov. Pritzker constantly trampling our constitutional rights in particular around attempting to mandate masks, vaccines and redefining the existing laws on the books, the state's constant corruption scandals, complete administrative mismanagement of unemployment and reckless workers' comp laws, and an absurdly unbalanced budget are putting Illinois in our rearview mirror," Meiborg said.

Jobs. Housing. Taxes.

Meiborg has said it. Surveys have said it. And common sense says there's a problem when your property taxes are No. 2 in the nation and eat the equivalent of nearly seven monthly house payments, your pandemic jobs recovery lags the nation, and you make no effort to control your state spending or nation-leading pension debt of \$313 billion.

Someone in Springfield better start listening. Otherwise, there really won't be anything to see here.

Larabee died in 1907 and his grave in Four Mile Grove Cemetery, northwest of Meriden, originally carried a marker designating him a Medal of Honor recipient. At the time the booklet was published, 1973, the marker had disappeared. June 28, 1973 account of James W. Larabee's military service was taken from the booklet, which had been compiled by Robert C. Higgins, Springfield. At that time, copies could be obtained by writing the auditor's office.

The medal will be of particular interest to descendants of James W. Larabee, when they assemble in Mendota, July 27-28 for the first ever James W. Larabee reunion. It has been organized by Ken Larabee, son of Don Larabee, a MTHS graduate with the class of 1931.

Bulletin carried extensive coverage of an observance in Mendota on April 19, 1865. It involved closing all places of business, draping the town in mourning and a function procession. Details can

Biden – Long-winded & misleading

The president of the United States is a blowhard -- again. If the country thought that it was getting a buttoned-up, by-the-books communicator after four wildly undisciplined years of Donald Trump, it knew nothing about Joseph R. Biden's long career as Washington's standout long-winded, seat-of-the-pants, poorly informed, and misleading talker.

Biden blew up two presidential campaigns with his verbal idiocy, and no one thought during his decades as a senator that he was just the statesman the country needed to handle sensitive international questions with precise, cogent communications.

Winston Churchill famously mobilized the English language and sent it into battle. Joe Biden tries to muster the English language but confuses and dispirits it, until the poor language slinks off ready to get its discharge papers and return to civilian life.

Biden's handling of Russia and China in recent months has been marked by a basic inability to stay within the lines of U.S. policy -- by seeming to give a kind of greenlight to a "minor" Russian incursion into Ukraine, by calling for Vladimir Putin to go, and by committing to defend Taiwan by force.

All these wayward statements required immediate and utterly predictable clean-up by a White House staff that must be on constant alert to explain on a moment's notice what the president meant after he says something completely different.

Rarely have so few had to clarify so much.

Biden the other day related how a trauma doctor had supposedly told him once that a .22-caliber bullet might, say, lodge in the lung and be removable, whereas a 9 mm "blows the lung out of the body." It should be stipulated, first of all, that all bullets are dangerous. Still, this was a ridiculous explanation of the relative dangers of the two calibers and gave the impression that Biden was moving on from seeking to ban so-called assault rifles to wanting to prohibit 9 mm pistols, too.

The gaffe joined other notable Biden miscues on guns,

including his bizarre advice several years ago to shoot a shotgun in the air as a means of self-defense and his erroneous insistence that there was a prohibition on the ownership of cannons during the Revolutionary War.

Biden clearly believes that he is some sort of expert on gun policy when he has managed to demonstrate over and over again that he has no idea what he is talking about.

His anecdotes and personal stories are invariably studded with exaggerations or outright fictions. As The Washington Post wrote of a story Biden told about Afghanistan on the campaign trail in 2019, "It appears as though the former vice president has jumbled elements of at least three actual events into one story of bravery, compassion and regret that never happened."

An NBC News report about Biden's White House relates that -- showing colossal but typical lack of self-awareness -- Biden resents his staff following him around with a broom and dustpan: "He makes a clear and succinct statement -- only to have aides rush to explain that he actually meant something else." This, according to Biden, "smothers the authenticity that fueled his rise."

Uh, no. The sentiment that motivated voters to switch to Biden in 2020 wasn't, "We're going to vote for this blustery guy who says anything that comes into his head because that will be such a refreshing change." Rather, it was, "This guy in his basement seems relatively restrained compared to the blustery guy who says anything that comes into his head."

Biden is less flagrant than Trump -- he's not firing top officials on Twitter or making pronouncements based on the last thing he saw on TV. But he's also less entertaining. Biden imagines himself the adult in the room at the same time that he routinely beclowns himself and makes potentially consequential verbal missteps.

This is, indeed, the authentic Biden, but it's not inspiring, praiseworthy -- or reassuring.



Mendota City Ordinance



Grass clippings, etc. in streets No person shall throw, place or leave, or cause or permit to be thrown, placed or left, any ashes, dirt, filth or rubbish, grass clippings, or foreign matter in or upon any street, alley or sidewalk of the City of Mendota.

Public Nuisances

MENDOTA-The Mendota Police Department would like to remind home and business owners of city ordinances regarding public nuisances.

It is against city ordinance to have accumulations of trash, building materials, abandoned automobiles, machinery, scrap metal, discarded tires, vehicle batteries or any other material that creates a public health hazard on your property. It is also a violation to permit weeds, grass or plants other than trees, bushes or flowers or other ornamental plants to grow to a height exceeding six inches anywhere in the city. Also, all multi-family structures, including structures that consist of both residential and commercial units, and structures which share a wall or walls with another structure, shall be kept free from infestations of insects (including but not limited to bedbugs, cockroaches and disease-carrying insects), rats or other vermin.

The city of Mendota requests anyone who is in violation of the above mentioned nuisance regulations to remove the item(s) from your property. Anyone found in violation will be subject to receiving a citation, which involves a court date and fine.

Spring '22 wild turkey harvest totals announced for Illinois

SPRINGFIELD - Turkey hunters harvested a preliminary statewide total of 13,701 wild turkeys during the 2022 Illinois Spring Turkey Season. This year's preliminary harvest total compares with the 2021 statewide turkey harvest of 13,613.

A total of 81,903 permits were sold this year compared to 83,240 in 2021.

The statewide preliminary total includes the 2022 Youth Turkey Season harvest of 1,258 birds, which compares with the 2021 youth harvest of 1,304 turkeys (the record for youth season harvest). The statewide record total harvest for the spring turkey season was set in 2006

when 16,569 turkeys were harvested.

Spring turkey hunting was open in 100 of Illinois' 102 counties. The 2022 season dates were April 4-May 5 in the South Zone and April 11-May 12 in the North Zone. The Youth Spring Turkey Season was March 26-27 and April 2-3 statewide.

The top five counties for spring wild turkey harvest in 2022 were Jefferson (422), Jo Daviess (416), Pike (368), Randolph (315), and Pope (312).

Totals from area counties include: Bureau (169), DeKalb (15), LaSalle (95), Lee (90), Marshall/Putnam (104), Ogle (191) and Whiteside (130).





The key to controlling your feelings

I've learned from experience that feelings are fickle. One day they can be up, one day they can be down, and other days they are just all over the place!

God gave us feelings, and they are not wrong in and of themselves-they are an important part of enjoying life. We don't need to deny that we have them, but we do need to prevent them from controlling us.

In 1 Corinthians 3:3 (AMPC), the apostle Paul is talking to new Christians, and he says, "For you are still [unspiritual, having the nature] of the flesh [under the control of ordinary impulses]."

The flesh is our desires—what we want, think and feel. And Romans 8:8 says that "those who are living the life of the flesh [catering to the appetites and impulses of their carnal nature] cannot please or satisfy God, or be acceptable to Him."

The Bible is saying that always doing what we feel like doing will hinder us from doing what God wants us to do. We need to get to the place in life where we are not controlled by our emotions so we won't miss out on His good plan for our lives.

I realize that some people are more emotional than others. However, with God's help, we can get to the point where we obey God and do what His Word says to do --regardless of our feelings.

Let me give you an example. You may know I was sexually abused by my father for years. My mother eventually found out but never confronted him because she was afraid of him. Needless to say, the abuse and pain I experienced as a child deeply affected me, and it took years for the Lord to help me receive emotional healing and truly forgive my parents.

When they reached a point where they needed someone to help take care of them, the Lord spoke to my heart that He wanted us to bring my parents to St. Louis, buy them a house, and take care of them until they died.

I shared it with Dave, secretly hoping he would resist the idea. But he said, "If you think this is what God is leading you to do, then we better obey Him."

We didn't have a lot of money in the bank, and it was going to take most of it to do what God was asking. But the more I prayed, the more the Lord made it clear that He wanted us to take

So we moved my parents to a house just eight minutes away from us, bought them a car and furniture, and met their every need. My father showed some appreciation, but he still remained the same mean and cranky man he had always been.

father had been crying

all week and asked if we

could come over. Dave

and I went to their house,

and that day my father

asked me to forgive him

for what he had done to

to his death at age 86, I saw a true change in my father. I know without a doubt that he's in Heaven. My mother had asked my forgiveness years before this, and I had the joy of knowing her last years were peaceful. The point I'm trying

to make is when the Lord asked me to help my parents, I certainly didn't feel like doing it. I had a choice to obey Him and do what I knew was right or follow my feelings and miss out on what He wanted to do in their lives and mine in the process.

I want you to take a moment and think about this: Are your feelings preventing you from doing something God has asked you to do? In the moment, it may seem that getting "your way" is the most important thing or that you'll be giving up too much if you go along with God's plan.

But the truth is while you can't always control how you feel, with God's help, you can control what you do. And when you obey God,

He always rewards you beyond anything you can imagine.

I encourage you to pray and ask the Lord for strength in this area. Ask for His help to choose His will over what you want, think or feel in the moment. Because you'll never regret making good decisions, doing things God's way!






