St. Ambrose Bee Happy Hour invading Sublette

"It started out as a joke. A few years ago, I went to the Bee Happy Hour in Davenport (Iowa) and I just wasn't too impressed with the way it went," said Don Dinges, a Sublette native

who graduated from St. Ambrose in 1957. "They also had one in Sterling and a woman I know went to it. She said, 'Where were you, why didn't you go?' I told her, 'I did, but just went to the one in Davenport.'

"I told her I wasn't too happy, and she said she wasn'thappy about Sterling's event either. We laughed and said, 'Maybe we should just have one in Sublette."

The Bee Happy Hour,

Passion and talent found through injury

☐ Kofoed illustrates children's book

MENDOTA—Finding our path in life isn't always easy. For JoAnn Kofoed it was

actually extremely painful. When she was 10, Ko-foed was diagnosed with Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome (EDS), which is a group of inherited disorders that affect your connective tissues — primarily your skin, joints and blood vessel walls.

Kofoed, Mendota High School Class of 2017 who graduated a semester early, has defective collagen in her hips, which has led to four hip surgeries including her last one in January of 2022.

Although she would much rather live life without EDS, she is thankful it helped her find her true passion and career route...art.

"I got into art when I was in high school. I always liked to create stuff. When I was in high school, I had a major hip injury that left me bed-bound for months and months on end," said Kofoed. "I had a lot of free time. I wasn't even allowed to sit up because of the pain. But I discovered I could lay down and draw. By the time I graduated from high school, I realized I should go to college for art.

"EDS causes a lot of health problems. The fact that the first, biggest life-changing injury was the hip injury in high school that forced me to be homeschooled for a while, a big surgery, and it led to me figuring out my career path; I look back at it and smile.

"It was a bad part of my life, but it led to what I'm doing now. I had so much free time and I was trying not to go crazy sitting at home in

bed all day. Art was a great way for me to escape. When I was drawing, I felt like I was somewhere else or that I was someone else. It was great and I decided I wanted to keep drawing."

After graduating from MHS, Kofoed attended Northern Illinois University and graduated in 2021 with a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts and Illustration with two minors, marketing and fashion merchandising.

Along the way, she met professors and others who would help set up her first

City Ordinance

Grass clippings, etc. in streets

No person shall throw, place or leave, or cause or permit to be thrown, placed or left, any ashes, dirt, filth or rubbish, grass clippings, or foreign matter in or upon any street, alley or sidewalk of the City of Mendota.

Penalty: Any person violating this section shall be subject to the penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. Imposition of any penalty for a violation of this section shall not be construed as a waiver of the right of the City to collect the cost of removal of such nuisance where it is necessary for the City to remove such nuisance.











IDPH endorses COVID booster for children 5-11

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced that it supports the recommendation by the CDC of the Pfizer-BioNTechCOVID-19 booster dose for children aged 5 to 11 years old. IDPH issued an advisory to vaccine providers throughout the state endorsing the booster for children 5 through 11 years of age at least five months after completion of a primary series with the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, following the emergency use authorization this week by the FDA and the recommendation of the CDC "We encourage every parent or

guardian of children 5 and older to consider a booster vaccination for their eligible child," said IDPH Director Amaal Tokars. "And if your children have not yet received their primary dose, it's not too late to start now. Especially with cases rising throughout the state, everyone who is eligible for vaccination should be taking advantage of the opportunity to get vaccinated and boosted. Vaccination remains the strongest way to protect yourself and your loved ones from COVID-19."

In recommending the booster dose for children aged 5 to 11, the CDC noted that since the pandemic began, more than 4.8 million children ages 5 through 11 have been diagnosed with COVID-19, 15,000 have been hospitalized and, tragically, over 180 have died.

As cases increase across the country, a booster dose will safely help restore and enhance protection against severe disease, the CDC said. Public health officials said that while COVID-19 tends to be less severe in children than adults, the omicron wave has seen more kids getting sick with the disease and being hospitalized. In addition, children may also experience longer term effects, such as long Covid syndrome, even following initially mild disease. These vaccines, which were authorized for children in November 2021, help protect children from both serious complications and long Covid syndrome. Federal authorities are currently con-

sidering authorization of a COVID-19 vaccine for children under 5.

Since the COVID-19 vaccine became available to the public, millions of eligible adults and children across the state of Illinois have received their COVID-19 vaccine or booster dose. Illinois remains among the highest in the Midwest for its vaccination rates, with more than two thirds of the population fully vaccinated.

More than 22 million vaccines have been administered in Illinois and among children 5 to 11, more than 40% have at least one dose; more than 36 percent are fully vaccinated. Of the total population, more than 76% has received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose; more than 69% of Illinois' total population is fully vaccinated; and 52% of the vaccinated population is boosted according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Data indicates that the risk of hospitalization and severe outcomes from COVID-19 is much higher for unvaccinated people than for those who are up to date on their vaccinations.

"It is important to re-

view basic safety tips to ensure grillers and backyard enthusiasts are prepared to keep their family and guests safe from any unintentional burn injuries or fire-relate incidents,' said Philip Zaleski, Executive Director of the IFSA. "Identifying firesafe locations for grills, firepits, and outdoor burning areas is crucial. They should be safe distances from your home and other areas that can burn."

Outdoor Burn Prevention Tips:

- Supervise children and pets while the campfire/ firepit is burning
- Make a 3-foot "Kid-Free Zone" around the campfire/firepit
- Always have a hose, bucket of water, or shovel with dirt or sand nearby to put the fire out
- Apply water to all







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Keeping the giant slide

Should the government subsidize nostalgia?

I've been thinking about that a lot recently. The Illinois State Fair was in danger of losing my favorite attraction. No, not the butter cow or Turasky's thin cut ribeye sandwiches or the annual steer show.

We are talking about serious high-brow entertainment: the Giant Slide.

Just about any ride in Happy Hollow is vomit inducing for me. But I love that old slide. I've ridden down it with each of my three daughters as soon as they were old enough and brave enough to take the plunge.

The 40-foot-tall slide is for sale again, and several prospective buyers want to take the thing apart and move it out of state.

But Doug Knight, of Knight's Action Park, wants to keep it intact and on the fairgrounds. The Springfield City Council voted to support his

purchase with a paid sponsorship of the slide, at \$30,000 a year for the next four years. For those who aren't mathematically inclined that's \$120,000 in taxpayer dollars. The idea is that the attraction could be embossed with

advertising and that would help promote Springfield as a destination. The slide, which was built in 1968, could be decorated with a Route 66 logo and become part of the upcoming Mother Road 100th anniversary observances. Sorry, I'm not buying it. Advertising isn't the goal of this project. The goal is to keep a beloved icon on the

state fairgrounds and the advertising is a means to an end. While the city may get some benefit from the ad, I could point to a half dozen more cost-effective mediums. Also, the slide isn't in Springfield. Yes, the fair is a wonderful local institution, but the Illinois State Fairgrounds has never been annexed into the city. So,

despite the subsidy the fair attraction will not contribute to city sales taxes. Cities often subsidize private enterprises in the name of entertainment or just as a community amenity. Just think of the number of professional sports stadiums erected by tax dollars. This type of subsidy is not

without precedent. But where do you draw the line? Give money to the Giant Slide and then you are on that slippery slope of subsidizing just about anything.

But sometimes we fund things because they have historic significance.

Well, the most newsworthy thing to happen on the

slide was in August of 1978 when then-Gov. James R. Thompson took his newborn daughter down the slide while holding her in his arms. I was in junior high at the time and my mother was

so outraged she mentioned it just about any time the governor's name came up. "How could he endanger his own child that way?" she would say with a tone of bewilderment bordering on disgust. Flash forward 21 years and I'm a statehouse reporter

interviewing the now former governor about his lobbying activities. During the phone interview he was in Las Vegas with his daughter Samantha celebrating her 21st birthday.

The state fair was going on at the time of our conversation. I did the math in my head and it dawned on me that Mom wasn't exaggerating. Samantha was fresh out of the womb when Big Jim took her plunging down 130-feet of fiberglass.

So, I asked Thompson if he remembered the con-

He laughed and said he still had mothers stop him on the sidewalk in Chicago and tell him he shouldn't have taken his daughter on that slide.

After that interview, I didn't give the Giant Slide much thought until I had children of my own.

I first went down the slide with my oldest, Gracie, when she was 3 or 4. We were on the same burlap sack together at the top ready to make the plunge. She was afraid but reassured by my presence.

We enjoyed our ride downward and have made it an annual family tradition.

Today, my girls are 11, 14 and 16. It's no longer cool to be seen riding the slide with your Dad even if he is a few lanes over. I find myself begging my own kids to go to the slide. I get eyerolls in response. But usually on the final day of the fair we take the plunge.

While I may think city tax dollars could be better spent, I can guarantee you when I ride down the Giant Slide this year with my three girls, I'll be glad it's still here.


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Another big summer storm – 1971

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from June 5, 1996.)

Among memorable summer storms in Mendota was a major wind and downpour on June 6, 1971. It was a Sunday, and an open house in the American Legion's new James Hume Memorial Building was in progress when high winds began to topple trees and storm sewers were unable to carry away the rain.

The open house had been intended to show what progress had been made in adapting the building at 812 Main St. to the needs of the Legion. The public was asked to use the alley entrance for access to the basement and upper room. Those who were trapped by the storm were served refreshments by the Legion Auxiliary. At Main and Burlington, a pond

quickly developed and a Reporter camera caught Carl Bliesener's canoe afloat, with six passengers aboard: Brian Corrigan, Rich Borelli, and Jeff, Tom, Kevin and Martin Cassidy.

Commonwealth Edison had crews at work from 4 p.m. Sunday to 3 a.m. Monday restoring power. General Telephone service was disrupted from 3:30 to 4:30 Sunday, but by Monday afternoon all but 40 phones were functioning.

Mendotans were instructed to pile downed limbs along the curb where city crews would cut them up and haul

It will take about a week to completely clean up the city.

The street department published a thank you note to citizens for helping clear debris following the Sunday storm.

On Memorial Day 1971, a parade formed in Library Park at 2 p.m. and marched across town for an observance at Lincoln School. Led by the police car and fire department units, the parade included the Veterans' Memorial Council and Auxiliary units, MTHS band, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Blue Birds and grade school band.

The speaker was State Rep. David Shapiro, a former Mendotan. He commented on the lack of communication between generations. "Both sides are shouting, neither side is listening."

Backtracks Sidetracks

He was persuaded to model them and stand on stage in a huge orange tub. While being doused by choir members, he sang "Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head" to thunderous applause.

The American Legion sponsored an Explorer's Club to provide information to teenagers on various locations. At their first meeting in June 1971, the Legion Auxiliary served a picnic lunch at the lake to 42 members, after which they attended a demonstration on radio and electronics at the airport, and enjoyed a plane ride.

At the height of Dr. Allen De Weerth's struggle to secure a zoning variance for his dental office on 13th Avenue, the council denied his request despite planning commission approval. Three members of the commission resigned and several Mendotans who deplored the council's action, submitted their opinion in rhyme. It was published in

chestnut tree in front of the Sunrise Nursing Home. In order to spare that tree, the plans for the home had been altered and it was moved 40 feet north of the intended site. The seed had been brought from Germany 80 years before by John Truckenbrod. At the time the Sunrise was built, the tree was 80 feet high with a branch spread of 50 feet. It continued to give pleasure to residents and visitors for a number of years.

Don't be penny-wise on Ukraine

Populist critics have gone after the new \$40 billion in aid to Ukraine hammer and tongs. Donald Trump has complained that we are sending billions to Ukraine "yet America's parents are struggling to even feed their children." Republican Sen. Josh Hawley calls the assistance "unfocused globalism."

There's no doubt that \$40 billion constitutes a vast sum, even in Washington, D.C., circa 2022, but the expenditure

At the end of the day, there's no getting around the fact that it costs lots of money to support a country fighting a war in the 21st century against an advanced, if incompetent, military foe We would have saved tens of billions of dollars, at least

initially, if we had never aided Ukraine and contented ourselves with letting Russia overrun it. But a victorious Putin would have posed a more direct threat to NATO. That would have caused an even bigger military build-up in the West than we are seeing now, and we would have been part of it, unless we were to decide to give up on our most important alliance. The Ukraine war might be expensive, but it is the Ukrai-

nians doing the fighting. They are degrading the military of an adversary of the United States and trying to push it away from NATO's borders without a single U.S. or Western soldier engaged in the fight. All things considered, this is a deal. Nearly \$9 billion of the package replenishes U.S. stockpiles

after Biden sent U.S. weapons to Ukraine on an emergency basis using Presidential Drawdown Authority. It'd be perverse not to replenish our supplies of Javelins at this point in the name of economizing over Ukraine. Likewise, several billion dollars in the package pay for

the U.S. deployment of troops to NATO countries.

Part of the military aid is billions of dollars in financing for Ukraine and NATO countries to buy U.S. weapons, something that Trump has supported strongly in the past on

"America First" grounds. Indeed, it is strange that critics of the bills are invoking nationalism in their opposition. Hawley worries that the bill doesn't represent "a nationalist foreign policy."

By what definition? Assisting a sovereign country in defending its borders against a nation bent on restoring its imperial glory is a broadly nationalist project. So is resisting an adversary of the United States that, together with its de facto ally, China, wants to reduce our national power and influence, and end the preeminence of the U.S.-led Western

It's not as though the assistance keeps us from pursuing urgent domestic priorities. We don't have a baby formula shortage because we've sent too many weapons to Ukraine, and the shortage -- in large part, a regulatory problem -- would still exist if our new level of assistance to Ukraine were \$0. The same is true with the border. Biden is not interested in the policies that might restore order there, which was true


prior to the Ukraine war and will presumably be true after. There's certainly more Europe could do, especially regarding general support for the Ukrainian government and food assistance to Ukraine and countries most affected by war-related disruptions. Our other allies who don't have an interest in taking sides between Ukraine and Russia should be providing food assistance, as well.

There should be no mistaking, though, that the stakes in the war are large. The outcome will profoundly affect the future of Ukraine, the robustness of the Western alliance, perhaps the nature of the Russian regime, and China's consideration of whether or not it is too risky to try to take Taiwan by force.

"Paris is worth a Mass," Henry of Navarre supposedly said before converting to Roman Catholicism and becoming king of France in the 16th century. Similarly, staving off Russia, and perhaps defeating it without firing a shot, is worth \$40 billion.

IVCC offers study abroad program

OGLESBY – A new partnership between Illinois Valley Community College's World Language program and Study Abroad program gives students the opportunity to complete two years of German or Spanish in one year and then study abroad in the summer in Salzburg, Austria; Seville, Spain; or San Jose, Costa Rica.

Study abroad is available to students through IVCC's membership in the Illinois Consortium of International Studies and Programs (ICISP). While studying abroad, students can take more classes in German or Spanish and improve their fluency. History and culture courses are also available.

Study abroad is fully accredited and its courses transfer to four-year colleges and universities. Partner colleges are English speaking so students do not need to be completely fluent to participate.

Students also take cultural excursions, including visits to museums and historical sites, volcanos and hot springs, a working coffee plantation, or even a trip to Morocco.

"Studying abroad is a great way to safely travel in summer while earning college credit, making new friends, and improving language skills," said IVCC Study Abroad coordinator Amanda Cook Fesperman. "Our language courses prepare students for the experience."

IVCC also has study abroad to England, Ireland, France, China and Ghana, West Africa is expected to be added in 2023. In most cases, students can study abroad for a 3-4-week summer program or for an entire semester.

To qualify, students need to be at least 18, have a minimum 2.75 grade point average, have completed at least 12 college credits and have passed English Composition I or II with a C. A graduating high school senior who meets the requirements could study abroad this fall.

Mendota woman, 39, dies in UTV crash in northern Wis.

MERCER, Wis. – A Mendota woman died in a UTV crash in Mercer, Wis., on Sunday, May 29. Lyndsey Delao, 39, was pronounced dead at the scene after being involved in a single-vehicle crash, according to the Iron County Sheriff's Department.


The Iron County Emergency Dispatch received a call of a UTV crash in the town of Mercer at approximately 5:20 p.m. The reporting party stated the UTV had gone off the road and was upside down under the water. Responders were immediately dispatched to the scene.

According to an Iron County Sheriff's Department report, the UTV was traveling southwest on Popko Circle West with six occupants. It appears the UTV operator lost control negotiating a curve, crossed the center line and

rolled into the Turtle Flambeau Flowage. Four of the occupants were able to get out relatively quickly and two were trapped under the water. Efforts began immediately to remove the trapped occupants. Once freed, they were taken ashore and life-saving efforts began immediately. Resuscitation efforts

Resuscitation efforts for Delao were unsuccessful and she was later pronounced dead on scene by the Iron County Coroner.

Additional responders arrived and tended to the injuries of the other individuals. Several medical helicopters were called to the scene to transport the more severely injured, and landing zones were set up. Two of the occupants were transported by helicopter and three by ground ambulance. One occupant was in critical condition at the time of transport.

- Parking is prohibited on both sides (north and south) of Washington Street from Iowa Street to U.S. Route 251.



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
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

IDPH warns public to watch for rabid bats

SPRINGFIELD -With the weather warming up, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is warning the public to beware of rabid animals, especially bats, as they become more active this time of year. IDPH has received reports of four rabid bats in the state since May 15 from Champaign, Jackson, Macon and Will counties.

"While there is a preventive treatment for rabies, it is one of the deadliest diseases we know," said IDPH Acting Director Amaal Tokars. "Bats are the most common carriers of the rabies virus in Illinois and are responsible for the vast majority of human rabies cases in the United States in recent years. But they are not the only carrier of rabies. The public should be not approach bats or any wild, unfamiliar or stray animal, and any animal that appears to be sick."

IDPH stressed that a bite from a rabid animal can be potentially fatal if not treated and that public should take precautions to keep bats out of their homes.

IDPH is also reminding the public make sure that rabies vaccinations are upto-date for pets and any valuable livestock and horses for whom a rabies vaccine is available. If a pet is exposed to a high-risk wild animal such as a bat, skunk, raccoon, fox or coyote -- you should contact a veterinarian for advice immediately.

Rabies is a virus that affects the nervous system (brain and nerves). People can get rabies after being bitten by an infected animal. Rabies can also be contracted when saliva or spit from a rabid animal gets directly into a person's eyes, nose, mouth, or a wound. People usually know when they have been bitten by a bat, but bats have very small teeth and the bite mark may not be easy to see. If you find yourself in close proximity to a bat and are not sure if you were exposed, for example – you wake up and find a bat in your room, do not kill or release the bat before calling your doctor or local health department to help determine if you could have been exposed to rabies and need preventive treatment (i.e. vaccines or other products to stop you from getting Rabies). If the bat is available for testing

and test results are negative, preventive treatment is not needed. If you have been bitten by

any animal, seek immediate medical attention. Animal bites may also become infected with bacteria. Rabies preventive treatment, if needed, must begin quickly. An animal does not have

to be aggressive or exhibit other symptoms to have rabies. Changes in any animal's normal behavior can be early signs of rabies. A bat that is active during the day, found on the ground, or is unable to fly is more likely than others to be rabid. Such bats are often easily approached, but should never be handled.

The following tips can help prevent the spread of rabies:

• Do not touch, feed, or unintentionally attract wild animals with open garbage cans or litter.

· Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home. Do not try to nurse sick, wild animals to health. Call animal control or an animal rescue agency for assistance.

• Teach children never to handle unfamiliar animals, wild or domestic, even if they appear friendly. "Love your own, leave other animals alone" is a good principle for children to learn to reduce the risk of exposures to rabid

· Maintain homes and other buildings so bats cannot get inside. • If a bat is in your home,

do not release the bat outdoors until after speaking with animal control or public health officials. · After consulting with animal control or public

health officials, the bat may need to be captured for rabies testing to determine if you need preventive treatment. Steps you can take to capture the bat if animal control


is not available are: · When the bat lands, approach it slowly, while

wearing gloves, and place a box or coffee can over it. Slide a piece of card-

board under the container to trap the bat inside. • Tape the cardboard to

the container securely, and punch small holes in the cardboard, allowing the bat to breathe. Do not come into phys-

ical contact with a bat.





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


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Growing into your full potential

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So, little by little, by God's grace, I began to change. The Lord transformed me from being rude, critical, harsh and rebellious into someone who has real peace, love and joy. But it was a process—it didn't happen overnight.

Second Corinthians 3:18 says we "are constantly being transfigured into His very own image in ever increasing splendor and from one degree of glory to another."

This means that the Lord changes us a little at a time. None of us will ever be perfect until we get to Heaven, and that's okay. But as long as we're here on this earth, God desires for us to continually learn more about Him and grow in our faith.






