A bit of everything

Store opens in downtown Polo with plans for more

POLO – It is pretty clear that Shannan Haenitsch cares about Polo.

He has lived in town for decades and owns a contracting business there. Along with partner Jodi Horner, they own several houses in town and recently purchased four storefronts in Polo.

One of those is now home to the Gateway Big Box Resale store, which opened on April 28. The store sells merchandise purchased from places like Home Depot, Amazon, Lowe's and others at a discounted price.

"We get a little bit of everything," Haenitsch said. "A lot of it is just overstock or discontinued (items).'

But this was not the first business idea for the recently purchased buildings, which also came with seven apartments. Haenitsch said that Horner wanted to open an antique store, and that business is coming next month right next to the resale store.

"We knew we had too much space for just an antique store," Haenitsch said.

So, they came up with the resale store after some brainstorming. He said they get merchandise directly from companies, but it can be hit or miss.

He said they recently received a \$700 pallet and all of it went into the trash. He said 10 percent to 20 percent of every pallet is scrap.

And the items they received change all the time. It can be toys, clothes (including brands like Pink or Vans shoes), furniture and tools.





"Everything for the home, basically," he

The stock changes all the time, and Haenitsch stressed that the best way to keep up with new stock is to check the store's Facebook page, which is updated constantly with new items.

Headon's opening **Davis Junction** location

DAVIS JUNCTION -Headon's Fine Meats Owner Mark Hibshman announced recently that his business will be opening a second location in Davis Junction at the end of this month.

The second Headon's will be located inside a new Benny's Corner Market just west of the intersection of Illinois Route 251 and Illinois Route 72. Benny's is a Rochelle business that is adding another location in Davis Junction.

In past years, Headon's used to work with Sean Considine, a Byron native and Super Bowl champion football player, and had a mobile meat truck that would set up shop in the area in Davis Junction, Stillman Valley, Oregon and Byron. HIbshman said since then, Headon's has seen a lot of customers from that area and has heard comments about the desire for another location.

Hibshman and his co-owner. his son Justin, had already had conversations about a location in the area before talks started with Benny's Owner Tim Hayden. Headon's sells a lot of its products at the Benny's location in Rochelle.

"He said he was opening a new location and asked if I wanted a portion of it," Hibshman said. "I said we wanted to put one out there anyways, and it just kind of all came together. Basically we'll have about 800 square feet in the back and it's going to be part of the store. The store is going to be very well set up. Our area is going to look like a small version of Headon's. We're going to have the antiques up there and an awning out in front of the inside area. Memorial Day weekend is the targeted date right now."

The Hibshmans took over ownership of Headon's in Creston just over a year ago after longtime Owner Lyle Headon retired and sold the business.

The name and recipes of the shop have stayed the

Hibshman called the opportunity to open a second location "awesome." The Davis Junction shop will have fresh meat brought to it each day along with frozen brats, burgers and hot dogs. There will be limited deli items like pre-packaged potato salad and local items like vinegar and oil will be sold as well.

"Lyle is actually pretty excited about it because it was always one of his dreams to have multiple locations," Hibshman said. "Hopefully this is the start of getting a couple more going in the future as well. It's kind of funny, you know the rumor mill flies around. There were rumors that our Creston shop was going to close down. I'm like, 'No way. We would never shut this down.' It's been a good year."

Headon's in Creston recently received a liquor license and has been able to add that type of inven-

tory. The location is holding street fairs on the first and third Saturday of each month through September. Hibshman said it's been good to bring people into the shop and the Village of Creston.

The biggest thing about the second location that excites Hibshman is the chance to sell to people in a new area where Headon's has a "big following." Outside of Benny's locations and at the Creston shop, the only other places to get Headon's products are at Polo Fresh Market and ExpressLane, which are at a lot of the Shell and BP gas stations. Benny's in Davis Junction will be the only non-Creston location with fresh meat.

While the Hibshmans did not own Headon's during the most dire times of the COVID-19 pandemic, he said they still saw effects over the past year.

"Being able to see our customers' smiling faces again and being able to actually talk and everything, it's great," Hibshman said. "I think if the pandemic was still going on the way it was, I don't know that we would've been able to open up another location. It's definitely nice that all that has eased up."

In preparation for the new location, Hibshman said the Headon's brat machine has been running "pretty much all day long" to get stock built up. Over the next couple of weeks it will be "crunch time" with decorating and preparing the Davis Junction shop.

People in the Davis Junction area and Ogle County that are unfamiliar with Headon's that come to the location can expect the same type of business that the Creston shop has done for decades.

"You're always going to have a fresh cut of meat," Hibshman said. "We only use the top beef. We'll have different flavors of brats out there. We have 57 flavors we carry now. And all of our stuff is all-natural. We don't use any preservatives in our beef sticks or brats and that's a key thing. Our beef strips and poultry items and all that are all fresh and top grade. We're going to have the same thing. Just all the unique stuff that you don't get in the big box store."

People can see an item on Facebook, call and buy it over the phone and then pick it up in store. All items must be picked up in person. Haenitsch said it is a great way to get people to come into town.

It is also a great way to see the building which houses the store. It has been refurbished by Haenitsch and has beautiful wood floors and even some of the

original decorative tin on the walls.


He said that people in the region – from Dixon to Oregon and Mount Morris – seem excited about the store and the Polo community members have been very

"The community, everyone who walked in loved the building, loved the floors ... loved that we were doing something in town," he said.


He said that the store will price match if peo-






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

Why not grow our own companies?

Illinois' 20-year dalliance with Boeing came to an end this month, with the corporate behemoth announcing that it is picking up and moving from Chicago to a Washington, D.C. suburb.

It was a shameful relationship from the start. Taxpayers on the local and state level paid the airplane manufacturer \$60 million to move its corporate headquarters here in the first place.

The company brought 500 jobs to Chicago when it moved here from Seattle in 2001. That means taxpayers dished out \$120,000 in tax breaks for each job. And once the incentives ran out, the company decided to up and leave the Land of Lincoln.

Some say politicians are buying jobs when they offer corporate fat cats incentives to move here. Sorry, that interpretation is way too generous. At best, we are renting the jobs until the incentives run

These corporations are adept at playing state against state and city against city. Back in 2001, Boeing made Dallas, Denver and Chicago bachelorettes No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3. They each groveled to see who it might attract the aerospace behemoth. And they found out in a PR

A Boeing 737 loaded with corporate suits sat on a Seattle runway in 2001 and the pilot had

charted routes to Denver, Dallas and Chicago. Most folks aboard had no idea where they were going until the plane was airborne.

It landed at Midway International Airport where a formal announcement was made. The city's newspapers embarrassed themselves. If memory serves, one ran a banner frontpage headline something like "Chicago, a Boeing Kind of Town."

All rationality had gone out the

While Chicago ended up the "winner," one has to ask if any city truly ends up on top when it engages in such bidding. Instead of being a suitor putting its best foot forward. Illinois and the Windy City came off like a John waving the biggest wad of cash.

A recent Chicago Tribune editorial bemoaned the city's loss of status as yet another corporate headquarters disappeared from its downtown.

And Fortune 500 companies are favorite targets of government largess. Why? Well, it burnishes a politician's reputation when a corporate nameplate gets bolted to a building in their city.

It's also a "government knows best mindset" that serves neither the taxpayer nor the economy well.

Folks on the left call it corporate welfare; on the right they call it crony capitalism. Let's just call it what it is: shameful behavior.

The best way to help businesses in Illinois — and any state — is to improve the state's overall business climate. This means doing things like ensuring its workforce is well trained and its taxes and regulatory environment are competitive.

But politicians like to cut ribbons and claim credit for the jobs they "brought" into the state. And incentives have become their means of branding their accomplishments. They are also lousy prognosticators on where to invest the state's money.

Back in 2011, Illinois and local governments put together a \$250 million incentive package to keep Sears headquarters in Hoffman

Today there are about 23 Sears stores in the country and none in Illinois. The 243-acre corporate office park will soon be sold. It just goes to show you, no matter how much money government throws at a poorly-managed business, it can't keep it from going under.

Not so long ago, outfits like Dell Inc., Amazon.com Inc. and Microsoft Corp. were tiny startups. Now they are corporate giants.

Instead of paying big bucks to prop up or pay off established companies, why not grow our own?

Our government meant to be functional, decentralized

There is agreement on the question and subject of Mr. Harp's recent opinion piece on whether our style of government will endure if it can't respond to its people. The premise is a bit backward. 'Our government' does not have 'it's people,' We the People have our government.

We are in a constant ideological battle where a few attempt to control the many. Our design of government is meant to be functional yet decentralized.

The Treaty of Paris in 1783 recognized 13 free Sovereign independent states, not a collective nation. In organizing a new style of functional governance the Founding Era did more than "look to the ancients" for inspiration, but looked all across history for successes and failures.

Of the 3 institutions listed in Mr. Harp's article as undemocratic, two – the Electoral College and the Senate need to be understood. At the federal level a congress was devised with a House of Representatives, for the people at large, and a Senate to specifically represent the state interests. Over time manipulation has distorted the original intent of these institutions.

Decentralization of power was to be the federal theme with 17 limiting enumerated powers in Article 1 section 8. Congress itself is responsible for distorting this power.

Congressional districts are meant to be small, 50,000 max per representative. Proof is in the very first of original 12 Articles of the Bill of Rights regulating house districts. The Irony is the 1924

congress passing a law contrary to this amendment arbitrarily fixing the number of districts at 435. In 1788, 30000 per representative. Today almost 750000. No wonder we don't really know our reps AND they do not know us.

The Electoral College is based on the number of Congressional districts. Today we should have 6590 districts and 6590 electoral College votes. That is the great missing equalizer and would make the presidential process representative of America as a whole, not just urban areas.

Editorial space limitation leaves the Senate for a later discussion, but similarly the concept of a senator has changed and not for the better.



Oregon's Crandall inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame

OREGON – Oregon High School's wrestling coach, Kip Crandall, was inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association Hall of Fame on Saturday, April 30. The induction honored all Lifetime Achievement winners and Hall of Fame inductees. The IWCOA is a professional organization for wrestling coaches and officials in Illinois.

Crandall was athletic director and assistant high school principal for six years at Oregon High School before becoming the junior high school principal and head wrestling coach. Crandall's overall record stands at 89 wins and 69 losses. He and his staff produced nine state qualifiers during those five years, with seven earning placements, one as a runner-up to the state title.

Crandall is a 1984 Tremont High School graduate where he played football and wrestled for four years. Under coach Dale Schaidle, Crandall was a four-year varsity letter winner accumulating a record of 73 wins - 38 losses, and 2 ties. He was a sectional qualifier as a sophomore and the Class A 185 lb. state champion his senior year. He is also a member of the Tremont Athletic Hall of Fame.

He continued his football and wrestling career while attending Millikin University. Under coach Carl Poelker, he was a three-time All College CCIW offensive lineman and was twice named to the GTE All American team. He was a four-time CCIW HWT Champion and four-time Division Three national qualifier. Crandall was inducted into Millikin's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994.

Crandall's first head coaching position was at Burlington Central High School. Crandall's overall record at Burlington was 133 wins, 104 losses, and 5 ties. In the eleven years spent at Burlington, Crandall had sixteen state qualifiers, six of those in his last season.

"Attending the Illinois Hall of Fame Induction was truly amazing," said Crandall. "I saw some coaches and supporters of Illinois Wrestling I had not seen in a long time. It was great to be able to spend a night talking and catching up with them. My high school coach, Dale Schaidle, and his wife, Sue Schaidle, were there, too. It was a very special night!"

When not involved at school and coaching, Crandall helps his wife, Nancy, with her youth ministry programs. Together, they have led Sycamore and Oregon teens on more than two dozen mission trips and countless community service projects.

To help show that home prices don't fall every time there's a recession, take a look at the historical data.

There have been six recessions in this country over the past four decades. As the graph below shows, looking at the recessions going all the way back to the 1980s, home prices appreciated four times and depreciated only two times. So, historically, there's proof that when the economy slows down, it doesn't mean home values will fall or depreciate.

Recession Doesn't Equal a Housing Crisis Home Price Change During Last 6 Recessions



The first occasion on the graph when home values depreciated was in the early 1990s when home prices dropped by less than 2%. It happened again during the housing crisis in 2008 when home values declined by almost 20%. Most people vividly remember the housing crisis in 2008 and think if we were to fall into a recession that we'd repeat what happened then. 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



Trustees remind residents of village ordinances

MT MORRIS — The Mt. Morris Village Board of Trustees is reminding residents of a few ordinances that are sometimes overlooked.

Residents should keep their property in a condition as to not diminish the value of neighboring properties. This includes keeping your property free of trash, garbage, rubbish, building material, car parts, or anything obnoxious or offensive in nature.

Vehicles parked on your property, outside in public view, must be in running condition, licensed, insured and moved on a weekly basis. Vehicles cannot park

across a sidewalk or upon the village terrace. Vehicles parked upon a street, in a legal parking zone, should be parked with the flow of traffic with the right tire not less than 12 inches from the curb.

Vegetation and weeds should be maintained and grass should be kept to a length less than 8 inches. At no time should lawn clippings be discharged into the street. All swimming and

holding over 24 inches of water must be approved by permit and be surrounded by gated fencing at least 4 feet 6 inches in height. Open burning is pro-

overseen recreational fire. contained within a fire pit or ring no greater than 30 inches in diameter, and extinguished by 12 midnight.

Garbage, recycling, and landscape waste receptacles shall not be placed curbside prior to 6 pm the night before garbage pick up days, and shall be removed from the curb by 6 pm on the day in which they were emptied.

Unused medications should be disposed of properiv

OREGON — Often overlooked but present in most homes are old, unused, expired, and unneeded prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medications. Medications around the home can be abused, or be accidently ingested. Flushing medications down the toilet can introduce these substances to our water supply, as water treatment facilities are not designed to handle this sort of water contamination. Sending medications to the landfill is discouraged as well, as the medications end up in the leachate (water which has come into contact with waste) and then poses a similar problem at the treatment plant as if the medications were flushed down the toilet.

Drop-offs

In Ogle County, there is an on-going program to collect unwanted prescription drugs, so that they do not fall into the wrong hands and are disposed of properly. Police departments in Byron, Forreston, Mt. Morris, Oregon, Polo,

and Rochelle, as well as the Ogle County Sheriff's Office in Oregon, have permanent, secure, dropoff boxes so residents can properly dispose of their unwanted medications. The drop-off boxes at the Ogle County Sheriff's Office, as well as the dropoff box at the Polo Police Department, are available 24 hours a day, while the other police department locations are available during normal business hours. This is a free program for area residents. The drop boxes provide Ogle County residents with a safe and convenient disposal program for prescription and overthe-counter medications.

Accepted items include all prescription and over-the-counter medications, vitamins, supplements, and pet medications. Place pills into a sealable plastic bag and place into drop box. You may recycle the empty containers with your regular recycling material after removing the labels. For liquid medications or ointments, block out any personal information, place bottle into sealable plastic bag, and place bag into drop box. Items that are not accepted include needles or sharps, thermometers, aerosol cans, hydrogen peroxide, and medicine from businesses or medical facilities.

The drop boxes provide Ogle County residents with a safe and convenient disposal program for prescription and overthe-counter medications.

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) encourages residents to clean out medicine cabinets and closets of unwanted or expired medications. Doing so can prevent the medications from being abused, or accidently ingested, and can help protect our water supply and the environment. If you have questions regarding this program, please call the OCSWMD at 815-732-4020, visit www.oglecounty.org, or you can contact the Ogle County Sheriff's Office or your local police department.
