City council gets a double-barrel of residents'questions

Two residents grill commissioners about concerns

CLINTON — The city council faced fire from both barrels Monday as two residents questioned some city practices.

During the council's regular meeting, now held on Tuesday nights, resident Robert Kreitler criticized a shed erected by the hospital. Kreitler lives in the vicinity of the hospital, which is cityowned.

He said maintenance workers built the shed over a weekend, but a building permit was not issued for the structure.

"This thing looks like a deck that somebody just put some sides on," Kreitler said.

Kreitler produced photos for the council

he said showed four extension cords going into the shed for power.

"Who on Earth thought that was going to be a safe idea to run on a building," Kreitler asked. "Especially on a hospitalowned building taxpayers are responsible for."

Kreitler also asked if the city was required to solicit bids for those types of projects, use certified workers and comply with requirements, such as the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

In response to the building permit, commissioner Tom Edmunds said, since it was a hospital project on city property, a building permit wasn't necessary.

"The city doesn't issue building permits itself," Edmunds said.

CLINTON — One of the most ambitious exhibits to ever be presented at the DeWitt County Museum

is taking shape and set to be ready for public viewing in about a week.

Prairie Flyers: A Century of Aviation in DeWitt County, is the cooperative effort of John Warner and the C.H. Moore Homestead & DeWitt County Museum, as well as a long list of volunteers and donors to the project. Local writer Edith

Brady-Lunny photographer, designer, author Denis Hambucken are busy putting the finishing touches on the exhibit set to run May 28-July 3 in the museum barn.

Starting in February, Warner, Hambucken, Lunny museum manager Joey Long



began pulling together the artifacts and stories that will make up the exhibit. Hambucken's experience in designing museum displays has been an important factor in developing the exhibit and also has resulted in a book accompanying the project.

"Some of the pieces extraordinary," Hambucken said. "Like the Norden bombsight."

The Norden bombsight revolutionized effectiveness of Allied bombers during World War II.

The past few years have brought complaints that some residents could no longer navigate Woodlawn Cemetery, forcing them to skip the service honoring those veterans who have passed away. Others noted they had a very hard time hearing the service.

The movement to the Square brings easier access, paved surfaces, and an area designed for an audience to hear those making the presentations.

"Memorial Day is a day of honoring Veterans who have passed. Woodlawn cemetery was a perfect location because of the number of veterans buried there. But, when many cannot attend a service honoring those who have passed, it diminishes the meaning of service, as people will skip what they cannot attend," event organizer Krystal Cicenas

Clinton Police Officer and Marine Corps veteran Mike Bennett will deliver the keynote address this year, with Nelson Thorp as the Master of Ceremonies.

Some of Hambucken's and Lunny's favorite parts of the upcoming exhibit involve the women aviators of DeWitt County, the discrimination they faced in the early days of flight and their subsequent successes.

Local aviator Donna Groves was accepted into the Women' Flying Corps program by famed aviation

pioneer Jacqueline Cockran only to be denied the opportunity before entering the program. Male military pilots protested working with women pilots, and the government cancelled the program.

Local aviators Henry Kleemann, Ernest Thorp, Red Irvin and others also are highlighted in the

exhibit, which includes civilian as well as military aviators from World War II through contemporary conflicts.

The approximately month-long exhibit is expected to be especially popular. Lunny said they are hearing from groups, such as The Flying Farmers, who plan to make special trips to see

the exhibit.

"A group of about 20 of them (Flying Farmers) are coming from across the country," Lunny said.

From aluminum to stainless

little corner culinary delights. More needs to be said about aluminum cookware and then we can go onto stainless steel.

Oxidation of metal can cause damage. When iron rusts, the rust is ferrous oxide or iron This is when oxide. oxygen chemically reacts with iron causing a molecular change. It helps to know chemistry in order to understand how these things work. There is also aluminum oxide. If you leave water in an aluminum pot for days, you may notice whitish spots appearing. Yes, it is eating away at your metal. But what about salt?

Salt is Sodium chloride, NaCl. It appears to work like a catalyst. draws water and works like an electrolyte. As an electrolyte, it affects ions in water and metal to encourage chemical reaction. Not wanting to get too deep into this, the free ions attract bits of aluminum and oxygen to form aluminum oxidizes. It has been a long time since I had college chemistry but I think I got it right.

My suggestion is to not add salt as much as possible while cooking. Salt food after it comes out of the aluminum cookware. If you must add salt, do so toward that end of the cooking process.

Stainless steel is the top choice for metallic stability in cooking. Stainless steel very little anything. with basically is impervious to most chemicals and many acids as well as oxidation. It is an ideal cookware for most any ingredient put into it. Because of its stability

and inert qualities, it is used in making surgical instruments. It would then ideally work as cookware with a few exceptions. Its advantages out weight the exceptions.

Stainless steel comes under various grades. I come from the old school that used such grade identifications as 18/8 and 18/10 in order to identify the two major grades of Stainless steel. The first number identifies the chromium percentage content and the second the nickel percentage content. Since there are several other grades in between, there is now the 300 series. For example, the 18/8 would be 301 and the 18/10 would be 316. To not bore you further, I will leave it at

grades Lower of stainless steel will cause eventual pitting. The oxygen will react more easily with the iron base and thus oxidize. Since the oxide dissolves away, there will be pits left behind.

I had worked for Revere Ware both in the tool room and in engineering. It was easy to note that their earlier products were of high quality. The cookware was of heavy gauge top quality stainless steel. I have never found any pitting in them. As other companies took over to make a fast profit, the quality suffered greatly. The metal pitted easily. A good way to test the quality is to put a magnet to it. If the magnet clings to it, do not buy it.

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

He had a love for animals and worked at a veterinarian office for a few years. He suffered a stroke and relocated to Clinton, to be closer to his




family.

The family suggests that memorial contributions in Larry's name be directed to Eastview Christian Church, Normal.



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
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

purchases that Amazon could bring to our door. We roamed YouTube in search of exercise videos for seniors and took free classes of all types.





The bill

As many of you know, I have had some rather extensive treatment for prostate cancer over the winter and spring. With that treatment comes a bill. A bill that, without insurance, Medicare or Medicaid, has the real potential to bankrupt the average American.

The liberals in Washington tell that the United States should have universal coverage for all paid for by the government. The conservatives tell us that we need to adjust the insurance industry and that each individual or family should be able to choose their insurance provider.

No surprise to the American taxpayer, neither group has been able to articulate a viable health care plan for the country. The liberals seem to ignore the costs and conservatives seem to ignore the poor amongst us. Both sides play to their base and seem to forget about the need for medical care, something that is needed by almost all of us at some point in our lives.

In the past year, I have spoken with two very reputable surgeons in central Illinois who have entirely different views of medical care. One surgeon is a hospital employee and he loves not having to manage a medical practice. He loves his

hours and benefits and not having to chase clients for payment. The downside with this type of practice is when the market becomes saturated with patients and not enough doctors, there are inherent delays in treatment. This is very similar to the models used in Canada and Britain. Both countries have decided delays in providing services and a form of rationing has evolved.

The other surgeon is purely self-employed. He wants nothing to do with what he views as socialized medicine. This surgeon works long hours and expects to be paid for his time. Now, I know this surgeon has done free work for some in need, it was his choice. The problem with this model is that if the patient has no funds, the patient may well receive no treatment.

This brings us to THE BILL. My bill at Barnes Hospital from November 9 through May 5 was \$257,566.00. That bill included a biopsy, consultations, and radiation sessions. serious, but not unusual treatment for a man of my age. There are a few reductions in fees for my Medicare, but remember assumes the patient will pay 20 percent of the bill. Medicare advantage plans normally have



deductibles and the patient pays that amount and the insurance plan pays the balance. I happen to have a Schedule F supplement plan. I pay more for my premiums than most other Medicare supplement plans. The difference is that I have no out of pocket deductibles and the plan pays 100 percent of Medicare approved procedures. To date I have had to pay nothing beyond my premiums and the travel expenses to St. Louis. My wife and I count that as a blessing.

What caught my eye was that bill of \$257,566.00. Only the very wealthy could afford to pay that bill without insurance and even those with insurance may well be paying \$50,000. That medical bill could well bankrupt many American families, or place them in debt for years.

We have a serious medical and mental health situation in this country. A growing number of Americans can simply no longer afford to pay for medical and mental health treatment under the current models.

I look at my bill and see

what may be a solution, based on a Medicare premium model. If all taxpayers simply paid a small percentage of their income into a medical plan pot with the federal government which would guarantee a amount for medical care for each citizen then basic needs would be met.

The individual or his/ employer could purchase additional coverage at their expense for expanded coverage. That is essentially what my Medicare plan does. I have paid into Medicare over the years, and now have a basic premium taken out of my social security check. On top of that I have

purchased the Schedule F supplement, which literally paid the balance of my bill. People with a lot more smarts than me could then adjust premiums and coverages to make this model work.

This model provides the universal coverage that my first surgeon wants and provides incentives that my second surgeon believes are needed to assure quality of care.

Medical care is a leading, if not the leading, cause of bankruptcies in this country. Republicans and Democrats need to work on a model that serves all citizens and one that is affordable to the public.

In response to Executive 13985, Department of Veterans Affairs has now released its Equity Action Plan.

awards to women-owned businesses and small disadvantaged businesses, -- And address health equity for underserved veterans (which impacted by race, gender, income, education and more).

VA officials already have started taking steps. For example, they have expanded the genderaffirming care and benefits package for LGBTQ+ veterans. (The VA provides all medically necessary

gender-affirming care to transgender veterans, short of surgical interventions.) Additionally, they've instructed VA adjudicators to classify as eligible for benefits any veteran who was discharged due to sexual orientation, gender identification or HIV status. Medical records now display the patient's birth sex, self-identified gender identity, sexual orientation and preferred pronouns.

State senator wants special session to cap Illinois' sales tax on gas

SPRINGFIELD - A Republican state senator is pushing for a special legislative session in Illinois to address high gas prices across the state.

As of Monday, according to AAA, the average price for a gallon of gas statewide was \$4.83. In Chicago, the average price reached \$5.11 per gallon. The average price nationally is \$4.48.

Sen. Dave State R-Cherry Syverson, Valley, said his legislation to cap the state's sales tax on motor fuel at 18 cents per gallon could provide real relief to consumers.

"Illinois is one of just seven states that charges a sales tax of 6.25% on top of the regular gas tax," Syverson said. "As the price of fuel goes up, so does the tax. A state that used to be getting sales tax

based on \$2.80 a gallon, and now they're getting sales tax based on \$5.00 or more a gallon. They're reaping an increased profit of 13 to 15 cents per gallon."

In additional to the sales tax, Illinois also assesses a motor fuel tax of nearly 40 cents a gallon after doubling it in 2019.

Syverson says the sales tax on top of the gas tax adds up to about \$2.5 million more each day going into the state's coffers than before the price surge began.

"All we're saying is you didn't plan on this money, so let's roll the sales tax back to where it was last year," Syverson said. "Let's cap it and let's leave that money in the taxpayer's hands and not give it to government."

He says the gas tax, by law, has to go to local and state roads and can't be used for any other purpose. However, the sales tax on fuel enters into the state's general fund and can be spent any way deemed appropriate.

The legislation to cap the sales tax amount, Senate Bill 4195, has been adopted by the full Senate Republican caucus. It was introduced in March, but lawmakers instead agreed to delay until January 2023 the state's automatic annual increase of the gas tax tied to inflation, which amounts to about a twocent increase per gallon.

Syverson argues the delayed two-cent a gallon increase is not much relief for drivers and the increased cost of filling up is a big deal for Illinois communities located near other states.

"The majority population lives close to the border," Syverson said. "When you charge a sales tax and our surrounding states don't, that extra 15

cents makes our prices more even dramatic. When it gets to be more than 50 cents a gallon difference, consumers will drive a few miles to buy that gasoline. Truckers will fill up in other states. Then the state of Illinois loses all those revenues."

He argues capping the sales tax on fuel could mean up to \$1 billion of relief to consumers over the next year and keep more gas sales and ancillary purchases inside the state.

"We can do this within a couple of days," Syverson said. "The governor could call special session. We could be down there within 48 hours. We could pass my bill and the governor could sign it. The tax could be rolled back by this weekend, and consumers could be saving."




Clinton Maroons two for three in recent games



3NT is the normal contract and 9 top tricks are available. But this event was duplicate bridge where it's not always enough just to make your contract, it's also important to make overtricks. So, the question for you South players is "How do you make 10 tricks after an opening Diamond lead?"

Hearts are the best place to get that extra trick and there are two ways to tackle the suit ... either finesse the Ten hoping that West has the Jack ... or lead towards the Queen hoping that East has the King. As you can see both plays work and will earn that valuable overtrick. But playing East for the ♥K is dangerous! If it turns out that West has the King then he can shift dramatically to the \$J and South's cold contract is down one! The correct play is to win the opening lead in hand and finesse the ♥T, forcing East to win the trick. On this deal, East is the "safe hand", the one that cannot make the deadly Spade shift through Dummy's King.

Post Script When Declarer led a Heart towards Dummy's AT West could have made a brilliant and spectacular play! If he rises majestically with the Jack then Declarer will fear that West started with the King as well. If that's the case then the 10th trick cannot be developed without letting the danger hand gain the lead and the play of the ♥J might persuade a nervous (aka chicken) Declarer to settle for 9 tricks. But a bold Declarer will go for the gusto, playing a second round of Hearts and risking the contract for the precious overtrick.

Magnolia blooms, beetles are nature's spring flower odd couple

URBANA, Ill. - Every spring, magnolia trees across the Midwestern landscape offer some of the most spectacular flowering displays of any woody plant. These beautiful ornamental trees, native to Asia, are some of the first landscape plants in our area to deliver such a showy display; truly one of the most endorsing signs that spring is finally here.

Most of Illinois' native, deciduous trees are primarily wind pollinated and many bloom even earlier than magnolias, although often unnoticed by many of us says University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator Rvan Pankau. Their strategy is to produce a lot of pollen in the hopes that wind dispersion will spread their genes far and wide. Wind pollinated species do not need a showy display to attract pollinating animals or human attention. They typically lack aroma and nectar which, along with color, are the primary means plants use to attract pollinators to their flowers.

"Since most of our native trees, like oak, ash, and maple, evolved flowers for wind

When plants evolved flowers, it was a game-changer for plant reproduction. So, there is no reason to totally discount beetles as "dumb" since magnolia flowers would not be possible without these grunts of the pollinator world.

Consequently, magnolias evolved to accommodate their "less educated" pollinators with some specially tailored adaptations. Beetle mouthparts are made primarily for chewing, not pollen collection from delicate flower parts. Thus, other plant parts are often consumed in the process of harvesting pollen or nectar from the flowers.

"Magnolia flowers leathery, thick leaves along with seeds that are well protected to handle this kind of sloppiness," Pankau says.

Magnolias and their beetle friends are certainly an odd couple in the plant and insect world. However, their relationship has worked out wonderfully to produce some of our most exquisite flowering orna-
