

Starbucks now open in County

National coffee chain opens its first county location in Rochelle

ROCHELLE-The new Starbucks location next to Walgreens on North 7th Street in Rochelle opened on Thursday, April 14.

After that, Starbucks will be open from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. every day. Work inside the location in recent days has been all hands on deck to get everything ready for opening, Manager Matt Willahan said.

"Right now we have store managers from all throughout our district and also some other partners here with us helping

us," Willahan said before the opening. "We had 8-12 pallets come in and we're unpacking everything and setting everything up and cleaning and trying to get everything ready for opening next week. We're going to have it ready for Rochelle."

Willahan said he was impressed with the newly-constructed standalone building and everything turned out well and on-time in one the faster builds the company has done. Ground was broken in August. The 2,000 square-foot store has indoor and outdoor seating and a drive-thru and created 75-80

construction jobs.

Starbucks has hired a total of 30 employees for the location and the majority of them started with the company about three weeks ago and have been traveling to

DeKalb or Rockford for training. Hiring wasn't a difficulty amid employment shortages in all industries, Willahan said.

Farm Bureau scholarship winners announced



"We've had no problem getting positions filled," Willahan said. "We still have quite a few applications on file. Once we get open and we get things assessed on where we're going to be and all that, we'll be looking into hiring even more help."

Starbucks will be prepared for a rush of customers upon opening the new location. Willahan said staff will be "bulked up" in the coming week and more seasoned partners from other locations will be brought in to help the newer employees through opening.

"We're going to bulk up so we can be prepared for a lot of customers the best we can," Willahan said. "It's going to be a learning experience for us all until we figure out what the cadence is for Rochelle."

Willahan said he's excited about the location and its proximity to two major roads in Illinois Route 251 and Illinois Route 38 along with The REC Center, Walgreens and the eventual development of the former site of Hickory Grove.

The Starbucks location's manager said Rochelle and area residents can expect a warm and friendly place where patrons can hang out and relax. Starbucks refers to its storefronts as "the third place" for its customers. "Your first place is your home

and your second is your work," Willahan said. "The third place is here. We want everybody to be able to come in here and feel comfortable and relaxed and feel welcome. People can come in here and just kind of get away and have



a great beverage, a snack, lunch or whatever they want and just enjoy the space. We're all about the community. A lot of times people say we're a coffee business that serves people. We're actually in the people business that serves coffee. That's what our main focus is and that's what we want everybody to feel when they come in here."

Thanks to the Oregon Public Library, the walk featured the book "We're Going On An Egg Hunt" by Laura Hughes.


Families enjoyed the walk and the story and playing some games between the pages to win little prizes which were collected in the kids Easter Baskets.

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) will be hosting a residential electronics recycling event on April 29, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 909 Pines Road in

This event is for Ogle County residents only and a free permit is required in advance of the event. To obtain a free permit

call 815-732-4020 or email solidwaste@oglecounty.org by 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 27. Provide your name, address, and phone number in your email.

Accepted items include all televisions and computer monitors, computers, computer hardware and cables, laptops, tablets, cell phones, printers, FAX machines, scanners, shredders

(no tubs), copiers, video gaming equipment, DVD/VCR's, cable/ satellite boxes, stereo equipment, radios, digital clocks, cameras, calculators, phone systems, holiday light strands, extension cords, rechargeable batteries, printer ink cartridges, CD/DVD's, and CFL bulbs. Microwave ovens are accepted for a \$5 fee per unit. Permits will come with a comprehensive list of accepted items.

Limit seven (7) large or bulky items per permit and one permit per household per month. Business or institutional electronic materials not accepted at these events. Other items which are commonly brought to these events but are not accepted include dehumidifiers, fans, heaters, air purifiers, coffee makers, lamps, vacuum cleaners, alkaline batteries, smoke detectors, toasters, and other types of kitchen appliances.

Free oak trees available to county residents April 22

The 52nd anniversary of the first Earth Day, a day dedicated to preserving our environment, is on April 22.

Arbor Day, a day designated in 1872 to promote the importance of planting trees, is recognized this year on April 29. What better way to celebrate these days than to plant an oak tree for future generations to enjoy.

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) will have free oak tree saplings available for Ogle County residents on April 22 and 2 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 909 Pines Road, Oregon, while supplies last.

There will be a total of 900 bur oak, red oak, and swamp white oak trees for distribution on a first come first serve basis. Residents can take up to 10 (total) saplings per household to plant on their property while supplies last. Take only what you can plant and care for. This means caring for it after it is planted (watering, weeding, wrapping) and protecting it from animals and mowers.

The free saplings will be located in the garage on the south side of the parking lot at the OCSWMD. They will be individually wrapped bare rooted saplings, should be kept cool and moist, and must be planted as soon as possible. Information about each species, planting instructions, and tree posters will also be available. The site is under video surveillance. The limit per household is ten trees. Those wanting more trees can put their name on a list to be contacted if extra trees are available. The trees were donated by Living

Lands & Waters (LL&W) Million Tree Project in East Moline. The Million Trees Project was initiated in 2007 to help further the Living Lands and Waters mission to protect, preserve and restore the natural environment of our nation's major rivers and their watersheds. Their mission is to not only clean up the river ways but to also enhance the watersheds by planting native trees and removing invasive plants.

OCSWMD and the Rock River Trail Initiative have supported this mission for several years by facilitating and distributing over 10,000 trees per year to units of government, forest preserves, and conservation groups in all of the eleven counties that border the Rock River in Illinois and Wisconsin. Planting the trees along rivers, streams, and waterways is strongly encouraged by these groups. This should have a long-lasting positive impact on the Rock River watershed.

Residents are encouraged to submit digital photos of their trees after planted and in subsequent years to LL&W or OCSWMD, to verify the success of the program and to help to sustain donors to the program.

Spring and summertime ordinance reminders:

12.16.020 Weeds

Grass or any weeds such as jimson, burdock, ragweed, thistles, cocklebur, or other weeds of like kind, that are more than six inches in height, on any lot, block tract or parcel of land situated along any street or avenue in the city, or in the space between the curbline and the sidewalk line of any street, alley, or avenue in any such lot, block, tract, or parcel of land in the city, are hereby declared to be a nuisance; any owner, occupant, or agent of any such lot, block tract or parcel of land shall allow said nuisance to exist shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this Code.

Unlawful Burning

Only dry branches, leaves and grass clippings can be burned in the city limits. Branches shall not exceed 1 1/2 inches in diameter. No burning shall commence prior to 10:00 a.m. nor shall it be allowed later than sunset. All non-recreational fires must be extinguished by sunset. Smoldering is not allowed at any time. Burning permitted no earlier than March 1 and shall end no later than November 30 of each year. No burning shall take place on any right-of-way, street, or alley in the city limits. All fires and burning shall be supervised and attended at all times by an adult. No yard waste shall be transported into the city limits from outside of the city.



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

More transparency in state budgeting process measure, snuck \$10 mil-

Illinois politicians talk a lot about transparency but rarely practice it – even amongst themselves.

State budgets are negotiated behind closed doors between whomever is governor and legislative leaders. Sometimes members of the minority party are included, but other times, such as this year, not so much.

This month, once a budget agreement was reached behind those locked doors, lawmakers found themselves voting on a 3,400-page, \$46.5 billion operating budget a few hours later. Think any of them knew

exactly what they were voting on? No way. Is this unusual in Spring-

field? No. But it has never served the public well.

Whether the governor's last name happens to be Pritzker, Rauner, Quinn, Blagojevich or Ryan, the secrecy persists.

I first began covering the General Assembly in 1988. I can say both Republicans and Democrats

are guilty of this practice. "Good-government-type" politicians and political hacks are equally guilty,

"They didn't talk to Republicans during the budgeting process at all, and they don't need to," Sen. Neil Anderson, R-Andalusia, said. "Why would they? This is kind of the result you get: a closeddoor budget to make sure everybody in their caucus is happy."

In politics, knowledge is power. Taxpayers and bond-

holders deserve to know how our money is being spent. But the budget document is so opaque it is often hard to discern whether major new initiatives have been slipped into the spending plan - even if those voting on it had adequate time to review it.

For example, back in 2005, the General Assembly rejected spending state money on stem-cell research. Gov. Rod Blagojevich, who favored the

lion in stem-cell research spending into the budget by labeling it "scientific research." Lawmakers were un-

derstandably angry when

they figured out they had

been tricked into voting for something they had opposed. Blagojevich shrugged and said the end justified

the means. And there is the rub.

Deception is often the key to legislative success. The closed-door process benefits political insiders, legislative power brokers and a host of special interests. But it rarely benefits

It shows contempt not just for the minority party but also for the rank-andfile lawmakers of the majority party, who are derisively referred to as "mushrooms" because they are kept in the dark and fed a lot of er, um

The budget was hurriedly debated and voted on during an all-night

session. Why? Well, if they act fast – before lawmakers and constituents have reviewed the spending plans contents – they can beat any possible new opposition.

"You're trying to track everything and there's a lot of last-minute changes because you know, amendments get filed at the last possible moment," state Rep. Tim Butler, R-Springfield, said. "And it does make it very difficult to know exactly what's in there. I'm sure we'll see things coming out over the next several weeks about things that were tucked in there or mistakes that were

His view was echoed by state Rep. Sandy Hamilton, R-Springfield. "We can do better than this to improve transparency. Afterall, the budget is spending taxpayers' money. The people of Illinois should have far more input."

Park commissioners comment on investigation

Dear Editor,

As many of you know, various former employees of the Oregon Park District and other members of the community have alleged the existence of a negative working environment created and facilitated by Park District leadership. The same group has alleged that there are irregularities in the District's financial practices. The Park Board takes these allegations very seriously. It does so because it is fully committed to maintaining a safe, respectful, rewarding and enjoyable workplace. The Board is equally committed to ensuring that its financial procedures are legally compliant, and its practices are maintained to the highest standards, with integrity and transparency. The Park Board has carefully considered the statements and documentation provided by the former employees and community members concerning these allegations. Each Commissioner has been provided copies of and responses to over 20 Freedom of Information Act requests submitted by the group making these allegations.

After evaluating the allegations of a negative work environment and poor employee morale, the Park Board arranged for an independent workplace climate investigation related to these allegations to be conducted by legal counsel. The investigator was given complete access to all full-time employees. All employees were encouraged to be candid in their comments, and we thank them for providing honest feedback.

The workplace climate investigation has been completed, and the Park Board has had the opportunity to review the facts and deliberate. The Board is satisfied that there is no evidence to indicate the existence of any unlawful workplace discrimination or harassment. The Board did identify the need for certain remedial action to address the legitimate concerns and input provided by our current staff. Specifically, in addition to positive culture-building actions, Park District leadership will participate in management coaching and training.

The Park Board investigated the allegations of financial wrongdoing

and is satisfied that no material impropriety has occurred. The District has received a favorable audit every year since its inception. Further, the Park Board is satisfied that employees' expenses on behalf of the District are fully and appropriately documented and in total compliance with applicable law and the policies of the Oregon Park District.

It is time for the Oregon Park District to move forward. Since September of 2021, the District has responded to 35 FOIA requests, all from four individuals closely aligned with the group raising these concerns. The Park District's small team has responded to these requests at significant financial cost and resulting in a diversion of manpower within the organization to meet the demand. The Park Board looks forward to resuming its work providing for the recreational needs of the residents of Oregon.
