**SUBLETTE** — It was a tale of two weather days for the 40th annual Sublette Antique Tractor and Toy Show held March 19 and 20. The opening day was rainy, cool, and blustery but that didn't dampen the spirits of the visitors who braved the conditions as they walked down Main Street. The first day of spring, brought sunshine on Sunday and gave everyone a better opportunity to wander around and gaze at the impressive variety of tractors including John Deere, New Holland, Case, Ford and International Harvester the featured brand of the event. Some classics were completely restored, while others were in original condition dating back to the 1940's and 50's.

If your passion is toys, five buildings including the Sublette Community Building, Ellice Dinges Center, and Farmers Elevator Shed were filled with miniature fun size tractors, trucks, and cars. Completely using up every square inch of the stage of the community building, father and son 'Double Collectors' as their business card states, displayed an incredible array of Hot Wheels, Johnny Lightning, Greenlight, and Ertl cars, trucks, toys, and pedal cars, more than two thousand in all. You would think that it would take days to set up, but according to Randy Withrow that wasn't the case.

"My father Paul and I have a good system of setting up and it only takes a couple of hours," he said. "Hopefully we'll sell a lot and the takedown will be even quicker."

If you were looking to buy, items ranged in price from a buck to hundreds of dollars.

If you preferred something a little different there were choices for almost all tastes like; vintage Hesston Rodeo belt buckles. Homemade quilts, made to order decorative wood carvings, gourmet dog treats, and the old reliable Avon products. The passion and dedication of the participants wasn't lost on first time show guest Shannon Sloane from Zionsville Indiana.

SUBLETTE — As I made my way throughout five buildings packed with antique tractors and toys at the 40<sup>th</sup> annual show in Sublette, on Saturday March 19, over in the very far corner of one of many rooms used at the grammar school, I came upon a farm display lovingly put together by 16, year old, soon to be 17 on March 30, Beau Sabotta of Putnam. This young man shared with me that he had been coming to the show every year of his young life. Growing up around farming and being from a family that collects classic tractors he caught the bug early on and was inspired by his Grandpa who enjoyed building displays, and getting the chance to hang around other display hobby enthusiasts. "I've always had displays whether it was on the carpet of our living room floor, or sheets of plywood on saw horses in the basement," he said. "I was always building something."

His exhibit featured a working farm complete with a barn, livestock, pole barn, tractors, haulers, pickups, tillers, a garage under construction, trees, and soybeans being harvested. It was very detailed and took careful planning and time.

"The display as a whole took several months to complete," he said. "As I accumulated more things and started to put the boards together, it took an additional two to three weeks of daily work.'

"The non-harvested beans I made from carpet and the stubble is static grass," he explained.

### Sublette working deal with local wrestling club

**SUBLETTE** — The Village of Sublette is working up a contract for the Clipper Wrestling Club to use the Ellice Dinges Center for practice

starting this fall.

Brent Montavon and Jennifer Phelps from the Clipper Wrestling Club attended the monthly Sublette Village Board meeting on Monday, March 14, in the Ellice Dinges Center. The Sublette board has been looking into the possibility of the club renting the EDC for practice. All members of the board

were present except trustee Jeff Myers. Montavon told the board that the club was looking for a place for practice. He said the season starts November 1 and is done in March. He said the club was looking to use the EDC four nights a week for practice, with practices averages a hour and half to two hours. He said they can use the

Amboy High School for free but if the school is shut

down for any reason, they cannot use the facility.

He added that the Mendota wrestling club shut down, so he was trying to find a central location where the area wrestlers could come together for practice. He said the goal is to grow the wrestling

He proposed the club paying the village \$2,000 for a rental fee and \$400 for a storage fee for the mats. The mats are currently being housed at the Amboy Junior High.

Phelps said the club comes with its own insurance and that the parents of the wrestlers would

sign waivers so the village would not be responsible Board members expressed agreement over the

#### terms presented, and asked for time to fine tune the rental agreement for the club.

**Heartland Cable** Jim Frances of Heartland Cable Broadband spoke to the board about the services Heartland

Cable offers to the Sublette residents. Frances was asked to speak to the board because another company, Surf Broadband Solutions, has approached the village about putting fiber optic internet in Sublette.

Frances told the board that Heartland has more than 22,000 feet of cable in the village. He added that there are currently 95 internet customers and 80 television customers. He said he can sell customers a plan up to 500 mb, adding he has two customers who do 100 mb. Frances said the cost for 10 mb is \$39.99, 25 mb is \$49.99, 50 mb is \$75, and 100 mb is \$100 per month.

He also told the board that if fiber was installed

it would probably be 100 percent underground. Stenzel mentioned that if the village ever established it's own sewer system and needed to run

sewer lines to every residents, that would be the time to run fiber lines.



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

#### THY WILL BE DONE

BY PASTOR JOHN KALEBAUGH Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven..." (Matthew 6:10) is certainly a familiar portion of Scripture to most everyone reading this. It is a portion of the Lord's Prayer (The Our Father) which Jesus taught His followers in The Sermon on the Mount... It is the most famous prayer of all of time! A prayer that most of us learned when we were young, and that many churches corporately pray as part of their regular church service. It is a powerful prayer, when prayed with the right heart attitude, which acknowledges that many things in life are beyond our control. We ask our Father in heaven to answer in His power and wisdom.

During this season of Lent, however, as I have reflected upon this prayer and this verse in particular, I thought about how our Lord lived-out this verse in His own daily life by actively participating in submitting to the "will" of His heavenly Father. By doing this it seems that people either loved Him and celebrated Him or

hated Him and wanted to destroy Him. I am reminded of yet another time our Lord specifically prayed these words. It was in the Garden of Gethsemane. The fate of all humanity hung in the balance as Jesus wrestled in prayer saying, "... O My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will." Matthew 26:39

In this instance praying, "Thy will be done," involved Jesus in a very personal way. It would require from Him a great deal of suffering, followed by an excruciating death. And all of redeemed humanity should rejoice in that He said. 'Nevertheless not My will, but Thine be done," for our sins were atoned for through His sacrifice.

I wonder how often (if ever) when we pray... "Thy will be done" do we consider the possibility that we may be part of the answer to the prayer on a personal level and that there may be sacrifice... or even suffering involved on our part? Would we still pray it and really mean it, as Jesus did? If so, I truly believe that God will use it in a

glorious way.

The life of St. Patrick is a prime example. He was kidnapped at a young age and sold into slavery in Ireland. He converted to Christianity while there and eventually escaped back to his home. I don't know if Patrick literally prayed, "Thy will be done"... but he certainly lived it. Most people would probably never even want to see Ireland again after that awful experience... but not Patrick. God gave him a love for the unsaved people of Ireland, and he actually went back as a missionary. In his ministry in Ireland, it is estimated that he founded 300 churches and baptized 100,000 converts. What a powerful and beautiful example of someone yielding to God's will in this life.

May our Lord's example, and Patrick's, inspire us during this season of Lent. Let us consider the possibility and even look for the opportunities in which praying... "Thy will be done," may actually involve us personally...

#### CROSSING THE LINE

ormac McCarthy's "The Crossing," the second volume of his Border Trilogy, is a masterpiece that can, perhaps justifiably, be criticized for its overwriting, for scenes of extreme violence, and for some untranslated Spanish dialogues. Since most of "The Crossing" takes place in Mexico, McCarthy possibly wished to inject authenticity with these Spanish dialogues, or perhaps to make his readers feel like foreigners in such an alien landscape. I found it trying. The overwriting is at times tiresome, but McCarthy's descriptions of the Mexican landscape and its people are so superb and unique to him that they can hold you spellbound. As to the violence, it too belongs to McCarthy's stories, though I found some of it quite unbearable.

'The Crossing" takes place along the border between New Mexico and Mexico before and during the Second World War. The protagonist is Billy Parham, a teenage cowboy who crosses the border three times during those years. A she-wolf is preying on cattle, and Billy goes out with his father and younger brother Boyd to trap her. They use very old traps because by then wolves were extinct. When Billy finds the pregnant she-wolf in a trap, he decides to take the injured animal to the Mexican mountains and set her free. During the journey, Billy bonds with the wolf, though an old man warns him, "The wolf is made the way the world is made. You cannot touch the world. You cannot hold it in your hand for it is made of breath only." The wolf is a sensation in the villages they pass though, but Billy, risking his life, must save her repeatedly from outlaws.

Years later, Billy returns home to New Mexico. The homestead is empty, his parents are dead, but Boyd is alive. Supposedly a group of Indians attacked the farm and stole the horses. Billy and Boyd return to Mexico to find the horses and to exact revenge. After various adventures and misadventures, they come upon the horses and in the harrowing encounter with the thieves, manage to flee with the horses. In constant peril, Boyd is shot in the chest, but survives. He disappears, and eventually Billy undertakes the third crossing to find him.

Desolation has overtaken Billy when he returns home on an Ash Wednesday. In the rain he finds shelter in a dilapidated house. A horribly crippled, yellow dog approaches him. Billy screams at him, and when the dog hobbles away, Billy picks up a water pipe and runs after him. The dog "howled in its heart despair." Billy awakes before daybreak and walks out and calls and calls for the dog. "After a while he sat in the road, he took off his hat and bowed his head and held his face in his hands and wept."

### Collateral damage when a politican gets in trouble

always feel bad for the spouses.

When politicians get charged with a crime, the political powers that be go after their mates too.

Early this month, Gov. JB Pritzker booted Shirley Madigan from her position as chair of the Illinois Arts Council. It's a position that she served well and ably in for 37 years.

When she took that job, Ronald Reagan was president, J.B. Pritzker was in high school and House Speaker Chris Welch was in the third

In the decades I covered state government, I've never heard a bad word about her. Ever.

She has done remarkable work on behalf of the people of Illinois bringing art programs throughout the Land of Lincoln. For example, last month my oldest daughter competed in a poetry recital sponsored by the Arts Council.

And she has developed partnerships with public television to educate viewers about Illinois artists. The job is voluntary. She has never received a dime for her work but has contributed mightily. But this month Pritzker said he wants to take the council in

a new direction and fired her. No one believes the governor. He gave her the boot because her husband former Speaker Mike Madigan is in trouble and Pritzker wants to distance himself. So, a few hours before Mike Madigan was indicted on

corruption charges, Pritzker picked up the phone and called him to let him know his wife was fired. Oh, they dressed it up a bit and let her submit her resignation. But you get the idea.

The implications of the conversation were clear: a power-

Guest Column know his wife's fate. She wasn't a part of the conversation. She was treated as an appendage, not someone contributing in her own right, not even worthy of being spoken to directly when being let go.

It smacks of sexism.

Now, I'll be the first to say that the governor has every right to put whoever he wants into that job. And no one owns a job forever. But one has to ask if this is a gracious way to cut someone loose. Her only transgression would appear to be that she is married to the wrong fellow.

No doubt, some will say she almost certainly wouldn't have received the position if it wasn't for her husband. I won't argue that. But I'll also point out that anyone who gets elected to high office in Illinois or serves in a prestigious post like heading the Arts Council is there because they have the backing of powerful, influential

people.

A few years ago, I heard similar sentiments expressed against Illinois Chief Justice Anne Burke.

"Illinois voters should be appalled that Justice Burke has been named chief justice in the wake of her husband being under federal investigation. It's scandalous that we would have a couple like that, the wife of an indicted alderman sitting as the Chief Justice of our Supreme Court. In Illinois, you just can't make it up," former state Rep. Jeanne Ives told the DuPage Policy Journal.

Anne's husband, Ed Burke is Chicago's longest-serving alderman. He faces 14 federal corruption charges.

And let me emphasize this: Both Burke and Madigan are merely accused of breaking the law. They have not stood trial or been convicted of a crime. In the United States of America, a person is innocent until proven guilty.

Regular readers of this column know my strong libertarian sentiments. I'm skeptical of government. I'm not a fan of either Mike Madigan or Ed Burke's political philosophies. That's OK. In a democracy, we want diverse points of view

in the public forum. While I admire the work and intellect of Anne Burke and Shirley Madigan, I haven't always agreed with their positions, either. But this isn't a defense or an endorsement of either person's policy positions. It's merely an observation that in the American legal system relatives of those accused of crimes are not punished

simply for their kinship. And the American sense of fair play would seem to command that should be the case for public Even after her husband, former Gov. George Ryan, went to prison, his wife Lura Lynn continued to serve on the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission. She was instrumental in



### MARCH IS SEVERE WEATHER REPAREDNESS MONTH

### THE SEASON IS HERE. BE PREPARED.

As a record number of tornado outbreaks in December clearly demonstrated, severe weather can happen at any time of the year. To help people better prepare for weather emergencies, IEMA and local emergency management agencies will be promoting Severe Weather Preparedness Month throughout the month of March.

The National Weather Service and state and local emergency management officials strongly encourage people to have a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) All Hazards Weather Radio with battery backup. These radios can be programmed to receive alerts for specified counties to keep you

and your family apprised of impending weather and post-event information for all types of hazards including natural (earthquakes), environmental (chemical spills) and public safety hazards (AMBER alerts). When an alert is issued for the programmed area, the device will sound a warning alarm tone followed by the essential information. In this day and age of families constantly on the go, it is also critical for people to have multiple ways to receive notifications and updated information about

severe weather warnings. FEMA offers a FREE mobile app that provides fast and reliable weather alerts from the National Weather Service (NWS). The app can be tailored to offer alerts for up to five different locations nationwide. The mobile app can also help you locate open shelters and disaster resource centers near you in the event of an emergency.

For more information about what to do before, during and after a storm, please visit www.Ready.Illinois.gov. There you will find a Severe Weather Preparedness Guide, developed by IEMA and NWS, which provides tips on how to prepare for all weather emergencies. Additional tips and information are available on the Ready Illinois Facebook page (www.facebook.com/ReadyIllinois) and Twitter page (www.twitter.com/ReadyIllinois).

#### Tornado Watches and Warnings

Two key alerts relate specifically to tornado conditions.

Tornado Watch - Conditions are conducive to the development of tornadoes in and close to the watch area.

Tornado Warning - A tornado has actually been sighted by spotters or indicated on radar and is occurring or imminent in the warning area. In addition, severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes, or cause damage of their own from wind gusts of 58 mph or greater and/or hail 3/4-inch in diameter or larger.

**Severe Thunderstorm Watch** - Conditions are conducive to the development of severe thunderstorms in and close to the watch area. Severe Thunderstorm Warning - A severe thunderstorm has actually been observed by spotters or indicated on radar, and is occurring or imminent in the warning area.

While tornadoes can still occur without a watch or warning being in effect, advances in the science and technology have greatly increased the ability of meteorologists to provide advance notice of them.

It is difficult to generalize the clues that portend tornadoes, and even potentially dangerous, because people looking for given conditions may be led to a false sense of security when these conditions are not present.

#### When a Tornado Threatens

You can improve the odds of your home surviving high winds by taking these precautions, but you won't make it tornado-proof. Nor do these measures guarantee your safety. Take these additional steps to protect yourself and your family as fully as possible:

- Decide in advance where you will take shelter (a local community shelter, perhaps, or your own underground storm cellar or inresidence "safe" room). When a tornado approaches, go there immediately. If your home has no storm cellar or in-residence "safe" room and you have no time to get to a community shelter, head to the centermost part of your basement or home —away from windows and preferably under something sturdy like a workbench or staircase. The more walls between you and the outside, the better.
- Become familiar with your community's severe weather warning system and make certain every adult and teenager in your family knows what to do when a tornado "watch" or "warning" sounds. Learn about your workplace's disaster safety plans and similar measures at your children's schools or day care

• Study your community's disaster preparedness plans and create a family plan in case you are able to move to a community shelter. Identify escape routes

- from your home and neighborhood and designate an emergency meeting place for your family to reunite if you become separated. Also establish a contact point to communicate with concerned relatives. • Put together an emergency kit that includes a three-day supply of drinking water and food you don't have to refrigerate or cook; first aid supplies; a
- portable NOAA weather radio; a wrench and other basic tools; a flashlight; work gloves; emergency cooking equipment; portable lanterns; fresh batteries for each piece of equipment; clothing; blankets; baby items; prescription medications; extra car and house keys; extra eyeglasses; credit cards and cash; important documents, including insurance policies.
- Move anything in your yard that can become flying debris inside your house or garage before a storm strikes. Do this only if authorities have announced a tornado "watch," however. If authorities have announced a tornado "warning," leave it all alone.
- Don't open your windows. You won't save the house, as once thought, and you may actually make things worse by giving wind and rain a chance to get
- Don't try to ride out a tornado in a manufactured home. Even manufactured homes with tie-downs overturn in these storms because they have light frames and offer winds a large surface area to push against. In addition, their exteriors are vulnerable to high winds and wind-borne debris. Finally, review your homeowner's insurance policy periodically with your insurance agent or company representative to make sure you have sufficient coverage to rebuild your life and home after a tornado. Report any property damage to your insurance agentor company representative immediately after a natural disaster & make temporary repairs to prevent further damage.

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

### Clipper Highlights: #5 Adam Lusz

we highlight a former Clipper Quarterback, it is always a little more special for me. Not only was this week's Clipper a former Clipper signal-caller but lived across the street from my family home. I not only got to watch his Clipper career, I, then as a little boy, would have one of my first role models. I am so proud and honored to announce this week's Clipper, #5, Adam

Adam was a 1998 graduate of Amboy High School and two-year Varsity starter at Quarterback.

We rarely write about our career's as Rowboats, but Adam's is important. Adam's Freshman season, he and his classmates got to practice against the 1994 Clipper playoff team. Adam and the under classmen dressed for the playoff's that season.

Adam shared, "We got to scrimmage them that season and for playoffs and it was fun. They were a good team and it was fun to be a part of." Adam's Sophomore sea-

son, he led the Rowboats in rushing yards from the Quarterback position. Adam recalled the 42/43 option accounting for most of the offensive plays. Adam's class was not whole that season as a few Sophomore linemen were called to aid the Varsity

Riding the momentum from a successful Sophomore campaign, Adam went into his Junior season confident, a needed quality for any Quarterback. Adam started for the Clipper's all season, minus one contest due to a concussion. At a time in the prime of the Big Rivers conference, the Clippers played a "playoff-like"

opponent each week. Add in the non-conference games against Burlington Central and powerhouse Stillman Valley and that makes for a grueling nine game season. To add difficulty, the Clippers would lose Running Back, Whitey Streit, during the first contest of the season to a leg injury. Adam recalls a highlight of that season being his aerial connection with Jason Cook, especially his multiple touchdown game against Erie-Prophetstown. Adam and Cook were among the top in passing and receiving at the season's end. The 1996 Clippers finished 3-6 overall but not because a shortage of talent or hard work. The Clippers never were out of a game. Due to mostly everyone playing both ways and special teams, opponents could rely on greater numbers to seal victories. Adam began his final

season as the Clipper signal-caller and again faced a loaded conference and non-conference schedule including Burlington Central and Stillman Valley again. Midway through his Senior year, Adam moved from Quarterback to Wide Receiver and Safety on defense.

Adam shared, "The move was a good change of venue on the field. Our offense was focusing a little more on throwing the ball and it was great to have an impact in aiding our passing game. I also played Safety which was a lot of fun because I got to hit people and have an impact defensively also. I was on offense, defense, and special teams. I never came off the field it seemed."

The schedule that season again proved too much for our sails. However, as I shared with Adam, Amboy

Friend and former teammate, Nick Nauman, shared, "Adam was a pure leader. We were a close knit group of kids and Adam just brought us all closer. He was as solid of a teammate as you could ask for as he did whatever he needed to in order to benefit the team. He was always doing what he was supposed to. A great team guy.

Immediately upon graduation, Adam began coaching in our Junior Tackle program.

'We didn't have a Junior Tackle program, we almost did a couple times and then a flag league, but it never came to fruition. It would have helped us so much because at that young age you have to start learning the offense and defense you will run at the high school level," Adam shared.

Adam was my brother Wes's first football coach in fifth grade.

Wes shared, "Adam Lusz

was just an all around great guy. He played his heart out every game, in a very tough era for the Clippers. He was so nice to Spencer and I growing up. Playing football with us in the front yard and later coaching us in Jr. Tackle. He invited me one time to go watch his flag football game and after he bought me donuts. I thought I was so cool riding in his truck that day. Congrats Coach Lusz. You deserve this honor." I remember it like yester-

day, my dad, Wes, and I were pulling into our driveway one night and saw Adam getting into his truck. My dad said, "If I was that kid I would be over throwing passes to you guys everyday". My dad's comment stayed with me and one afternoon, I was outside kicking the ball over the phone wire that hung in the middle of our yard when I saw Adam outside. I yelled, "hey kid, do you want to come over and teach me to throw and I'll teach you to kick?" I was no more than eight or nine years old at the time. Adam, without hesitation came over and proceeded to play catch with me. I am unsure which season (Jr/Sr) it was, Adam hosted team dinner before the game and my brother and I were the most excited kids in Amboy to have the entire Varsity across the street. I forget the exact details, but before I knew it, the entire Varsity Clippers were in our yard playing catch with my brother and I. I remember before they all left, my dad, being the Clipper fan he is, gave them one of his famous speeches about the opportunity they had to go out and beat a more favored opponent. The details of the game

that followed have escaped me but I'll never forget that moment, seeing all the white jerseys in my front yard, with #5 captaining the ship.

Amboy Football to Adam is more than just time spent between the sidelines. It is something that is still with him to this day.

Adam concluded, "We grew up with the old stories from the 80's. There was so much pride in the program with all of those great teams. We longed to be them. We longed for our trophy to sit with theirs. Nick and I would spend hours as kids playing football in the yard and we would look to the old field (The Boatyard) and share our excitement for our time under those lights. We couldn't wait to represent Amboy. The work ethic that Amboy and our program instills in you will stay with you all of your life. It has for me in my career in sales. Amboy Football brought you up that way. When you think you are done or have given it all, you haven't and you push on. You got the absolute most out of yourself. I'm blessed as that work ethic continues with me

and so many of us today."

So, to my fellow Clipper Ouarterback, first Clipper role model, #5, Adam Lusz, thank you for your contributions to Amboy Football. You gave back to the program you care so much for and without men like you, who devote their energy, effort, and time, a program cannot grow. Above all, thank you for the kindness and humility you showed me all those years ago with a simple game of catch. That simple act made my day back then as it does now to have the honor of

writing this article. Sail on!
