Repair work begins at 34 & I-39

MENDOTA - The Illinois Department of Transportation has announced that work to repair the U.S. 34 bridge crossing Interstate 39 at exit 72 in Mendota began on March 28. There will be some short-term lane closures in both directions at the start of the project.

Work will preserve the life of the bridge by replacing expansion joints and applying a latex overlay onto the bridge deck. Also, the shoulders will be resurfaced and the slope wall will be replaced. One lane of traffic will be maintained on U.S. 34 at the bridge, and traffic on the highway and I-39 exit

ramps will be controlled with traffic signals. The \$1.08 million project is scheduled to be completed by the end of the summer.

Motorists can expect delays and should allow extra time for trips through this area, and be prepared for slow and stopped traffic. To avoid the work area, when feasible, use of alternate routes should be considered. Drivers are urged to pay close attention to changed conditions and signs in the work zones, obey posted speed limits, refrain from using mobile devices, and be alert for workers and equipment.

Over the next six years, IDOT is

planning to improve more than 3,535 miles of highway and around 9 million square feet of bridge deck as part of the Rebuild Illinois capital program, which is investing \$33.2 billion into all modes of transportation. Accomplishments through Year Two included approximately \$5.2 billion in improvements statewide on 3,020 miles of highway and 270 bridges along with 428 additional safety improvements.

Illinois' unemployment rate returning to pre-pandemic levels, still ranks high

SPRINGFIELD – A new report shows that Illinois ranks 25th in the country in

Jill Gonzalez of WalletHub explained why Illinois has seen a decrease in unemployment claims.

"This means that the decreasing COVID-19 cases brought on a high number of new jobs and new workers," Gonzalez said. "These are both signs that the pandemic's hold on the economy is also decreasing." Illinois has been a Democratic state

when voting in elections over the past handful of elections. Gonzalez highlighted how that factors into the state's recovery.

"With an average ranking of 27 of the most recovered states, blue states had worse recovery from unemployment ranks than red, which ranked 25th on average," Gonzalez said

Illinois has received over \$8 billion in

federal tax funds as part of the American Rescue Plan Act to help deal with pandemic-related issues. Gonzalez said with the unemployment rates starting to decline, federal funding could be on its way out.

"The U.S. unemployment rate is now at 3.9%, which is very close to

the pre-pandemic normal of 3.5%, Gonzalez said. "These numbers give the federal reserve room to start withdrawing the economic support that was put in place at the start of COVID-19's onslaught."

The unemployment rate for Illinois in January was at 5%, higher than the national average.

Illinois has shown the fourth fastest recovery in the Midwest with only Iowa, South Dakota and Minnesota ranked above Illinois in terms of unemployment recovery.

Moving company study shows more people left Illinois than any other state last year

☐ Work, cost of living among reasons for exodus from state

SPRINGFIELD - An analysis by a moving company shows people continue to flee the Land of Lincoln.

The Allied Magnet States report shows Illinois had the highest percentage of outbound residents in 2021, more than any other state. The report analyzes moves by Allied Van Lines customers and home-value data from Zillow to provide moving and housing trends.

"Illinois is primarily about work and cost of living," Allied President Steve McKenna said. "People are looking to lower their cost of living by buying the Sun Belt.'

Of the total number of people moving over the Illinois state line in 2021, 68% were moving away while 32% were inbound.

For the past five years, Illinois has been in the top 10 for the top outbound states, along with California, Michigan and Pennsylvania.



Sixty-eight percent of the total number of people moving in Illinois were leaving the state in 2021.

Chicago tops the list of metro areas that originated the most net outbound moves, sending the most people south and west to

Phoenix, Los Angeles and Houston.



Mendota District 280, 289 awarded School Library grants

SPRINGFIELD – Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White has awarded more than \$1.4 million in FY 22 School District Library Grant Program awards to 672 public school districts. More than 1.5 million Illinois students served by school library programs will benefit

from the grants.

Among the grant recipients are Mendota High School District 280 (\$850)

and Mendota Elementary School District 289 (\$878.98).

"As a former public school teacher and administrator, I know our school libraries are critical in helping students learn and prepare themselves for the future," White said. "Illinois was the first state to implement a school district grant program, and I'm pleased that we can continue to provide

school libraries with some of the financial resources they need to produce well-educated students."

From FY 22 appropriations approved by the General Assembly and the Governor, school library grants were awarded based on a formula of \$.885 per student, with a minimum grant award of \$850. The School District Library Grant Program is used for:

Bureau Co. 4th-graders attend Ag Fair

PRINCETON - In an effort to demonstrate to all the fourth graders in Bureau County the importance of agriculture in their lives, the Bureau County Farm Bureau Women's Committee held its 26th Annual Ag Fair on March 17, after a two-year break due to COVID.

The Ag Fair is a daylong event at the Bureau County Fair Grounds in which students make timed stops (9 minutes at each station) to 14 different learning centers. These stations range from dairy, embryology, safety, pork, corn, seed science, conservation, beef, soybeans, pollinators, ag technology, equipment, large animals, and small animals.

The Farm Bureau Women's Committee and the Bureau County Ag Coalition Committee originally started Ag Fair. The Ag Coalition Committee consists of a member from each participating Ag Fair station. This committee was originally formed to develop and oversee the goals set for the Ag Fair. Over time, the Ag Coalition Committee has handed the organizing process over to the Women's Committee, where the chairperson takes the lead on final decision-making. The Ag Coalition Members then handle the planning of their individual presentations. Each year the Ag Fair is evaluated. Any considerations for changes come through observation of the event, teacher's input from evaluation sheets and suggestions made by

The committee begins the planning process about six months in advance of the Ag Fair each year. The committee works with local businesses, farmers, county commodity groups, U of I Extension, our local FS and SWCD as well as state commodity groups to make presentations at each station. Volunteers are recruited, a total of 75, to serve as presenters, leaders of the classes, timekeepers, bus directors, goodie bag distributors and several other jobs including set-up and clean-up workers.

The day prior to the fair the presenters take time to set up their displays and the setup crew put up tables, chairs, and partitions at each station. The day of the fair coffee, juice, doughnuts, lunch and snacks are provided by Farm Bureau and served to all the presenters and volunteers.

Following the Ag Fair, each student was given a bag of goodies that the committee put together, which contains items donated by each of the presenters from coloring books to balloons and pencils. The teachers were given an evaluation that will assist not only the committee, but also the presenters next year. As a follow up, the committee is sponsoring a thank you card drive for all the volunteers for the event. Students are encouraged to draw about their favorite part of the educational event.

A teacher attending a past Ag Fair best sums up the event, "Ag Fair is the best-kept secret in Bureau County." This year approximately 300 students from 18 classrooms attended the Ag Fair.













March 31, 1973 - A devastating tornado took a nearly continuous 75-mile path through north central Georgia, causing more than 113 million dollars in damage, the highest total of record for a natural disaster in the state.



Lyle was born in Bloomington/Normal, Il. on May 3, 1938 to James and Dorothy (Thompson) Younglove. He grew up in Arlington. Lyle married Barbara J. Heward on July 3, 1956 in Princeton. Lyle is survived by his son Don (Peggy) Younglove and his

Lyle started the Agricultural part of R & R Flight Service. His hard work and loyalty helped to build the business to last the test of time. Lyle also mentored many young pilots including his son Don. Until recently Lyle was very active in the business and helped maintain the airplanes.

Lyle was also a member of the Mendota Elks and was a lifelong member of the NAAA (National Agricultural Aviation Association) and the IAAA (Illinois Agricultural Aviation Association. Lyle was one who loved to go for coffee with friends, stop for a beer on his way home from the airport, grab a bite to eat from the Elks. He didn't like small talk but loved in-depth conversations. Two additional northern Illinois counties placed under Lymantria dispar quarantine

Destructive pest known as 'gypsy moth' destroys trees, shrubs

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) announced two additional northern Illinois counties will be placed under quarantine to control the spread of Lymantria dispar, the destructive pest historically known as "gypsy moth" that destroys trees and shrubs.

Boone (Belvidere) and Winnebago (Rockford) counties in north central Illinois will join Cook, DuPage, Kane, Kendall, Lake, LaSalle, McHenry, and Will counties in the Department's quarantine order. Lake County was the first county in Illinois to be quarantined, which was established in 2000.

"The Lymantria dispar population in these counties has reached a critical level where steps need to be taken to protect other areas of the state from this destructive pest," said IDOA Plant Regulatory Official, Scott Schirmer. "These counties will remain eligible for participation in the Lymantria dispar control program, and the Department will contin-

Lymantria dispar is a non-native pest. Large populations of the pest are capable of stripping plants bare, leaving them susceptible to disease and environmental stressors. Severe defoliation can cause tree death. Unlike the emerald ash borer, another non-native pest, which feeds exclusively on ash trees, the Lymantria dispar is not a picky eater. It will devour almost anything

leafy and green as it feeds on over 250 species of plants, but especially prefers oak and willow trees.

Under the quarantine, all nursery and lumber products must be inspected or certified before they can be transported out of the 10 counties. In addition, residents of these counties must personally inspect vehicles, tents, outdoor lawn furniture, bicycles and other outdoor items for Lymantria dispar egg masses, live moths and caterpillars before taking them from the quarantine zone.

Anyone convicted of illegally removing prohibited items from the quarantine area may be fined up to \$500 and the items themselves must be either immediately removed from the non-infested area or immediately destroyed.

Male Lymantria dispar are brown with black chevron-like markings and have a wingspan of an inch-and-a-half. Female Lymantria dispar are slightly larger and typically white or cream-colored with similar markings. The females cannot fly because of the weight of their eggs.

Infested sites will be treated with applications of either BtK (Bacillus thuringiensis var. Kurstaki), a naturally-occurring bacteria used by gardeners as an environmentally-friendly alternative to chemical pesticides, or mating disruption (MD), a Lymantria dispar-specific pheromone that acts as a sexual attractant and prevents male Lymantria dispar from breeding.

Attorney General Raoul encourages residents to be alert for scams tied to relief efforts for Ukraine on the Attorney General's website.

CHICAGO - As the Russian invasion of Ukraine and resulting humanitarian crisis continue, Attorney General Kwame Raoul urged Illinois residents interested in supporting relief efforts to be on the lookout for fundraising scams by individuals seeking to exploit the crisis for their personal profit.

"Many Illinois residents are looking for ways to help people of Ukraine, and while making a charitable donation is a great way to do so, it is important that people exercise vigilance and research the charity before donating," Raoul said. "It is reprehensible that individuals would exploit this humanitarian crisis for personal gain, but taking the time to research a charity will help ensure that your donation goes to legitimate organizations engaged directly in providing aid to the people of Ukraine."

As Illinois residents seek out ways to support relief efforts in and around Ukraine, Attorney General Raoul is encouraging people to do some research before making monetary or in-kind donations. Raoul recommends that individuals interested in making monetary contributions first find out whether the charity is providing direct aid in the region or raising money for other groups. Donors have a right to know how their money will be used, so Raoul also advised potential donors to ask questions to determine who will ultimately receive donations and whether the organization is equipped to effectively provide aid.

For instance, unless the organization has staff and infrastructure to distribute clothing, food or other in-kind donations, those items may not reach the intended recipients. If a charity is requesting in-kind donations, Raoul urges donors to obtain information about the organization's transportation and distribution plans, and be wary of organizations that are not experienced in providing such relief.

Under Illinois law, fundraisers and charitable organizations are required to register each year with the Attorney General's office. To assist potential donors in making smart giving decisions, Attorney General Raoul provides important information about charitable organizations, such as income, expenditures and programs. This information is available

Attorney General Raoul also offered the following tips to help people ensure their donation will be used for its intended purpose:

- Ask how much of your donation will go to the charity and how much will be used to pay fundraising costs. Solicitors must give you this information if you ask. • Pay close attention to the name of the
- charity. Some fraudulent charities use names that sound or look like those of legitimate organizations to mislead you.
- Ask questions about the charity. Donate only when your questions have been answered and you are certain your money will be used according to your wishes. Ask questions like whether the charity is registered with the Illinois Attorney General's office and what percentage of the money the charity takes in goes to fundraising, administration and charitable programming.
- Exercise caution when giving online. Spam email solicitations that appear to be linked to relief groups could be from persons attempting to take advantage of those who want to help as the crisis in Ukraine continues. Be wary of any online solicitations from unfamiliar charities.
- Do not pay in cash. For security and tax record purposes, pay by check. Be sure to write the full official name of the charity on your check – do not abbreviate.
- Request written information. A legitimate charity will provide information outlining its mission, how your donation will be distributed, and proof that your contribution is tax deductible.
- Do not donate if the solicitor uses high-pressure tactics, asks for cash payment or insists on sending someone to pick up your donation. These are all hallmarks of a scam.

If a call or other solicitation seems suspicious, Attorney General Raoul recommends that donors keep notes detailing the date and time of the contact, the organization's name and the name of the solicitor whenever possible. Raoul encourages donors to contact his office's Charitable Trust Bureau at (312) 814-2595 to report suspicious

The analysis shows Springfield residents have packed up and headed to cities like St. Louis, Charleston, S.C., and Punta Last year, Peoria res-

idents headed to Dallas, Tampa and Nashville. According to a study by

the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service in Virginia, Illinois' population is projected to contract by 3.1% from now until 2040 – a decrease of nearly 400,000 people. If that holds true, Illinois will go from being the sixth most populous state to the eighth most populous. Population decline con-

tributes to the lower economic prospects of the state, as working families move on leaving fewer residents to shoulder increasing tax According to the Allied

report, for those who had work-related moves, Texas and California are the top destination states for the last five years, as both have strong economies and a large workforce. McKenna said compa-


nies have been on the move as well. "Corporations have

moved their facilities and locations to other places, especially to the Sun Belt from Texas over to Atlanta," McKenna said.

last year were South Carolina, Tennessee, North Carolina and Florida.







The battle with inflation

The problem with inflation is that there is more than enough blame to go around.

Some folks will say it's Joe Biden's fault, others blame Donald Trump or Russia or Congress or the Federal Reserve. Maybe everybody is a little bit right or a little bit wrong.

I don't know.

I grew up on a farm. And no one appreciates the dynamics of commodity pricing better than a farmer. Every morning my folks would turn

But that didn't keep me from asking annoying questions. At age 10, I might ask my father why the price of pork was high or low. And he would try to explain it in language a child could

understand saying something like, "Fewer baby pigs were born six months ago and that means the supply is down and prices are going up." Or he might explain that we had favorable weather

for raising corn and that had brought the supply of the grain up and price for it down. And sometimes he might just scratch his head and

say, "I don't know why it's doing what it is doing."

My point? Rarely are there simple solutions to complex problems like inflation.

But here are a few contenders in my book: the Federal Reserve has kept interest rates far too low for too long; Congress has been spending like crazy since the beginning of the pandemic; the labor market is tight and labor costs are rising; the pandemic has really messed up supply chains and left store shelves bare and made prices for what is left higher; and Russia invaded Ukraine upending the petroleum markets.

Inflation is a thief that steals from families and leaves us poorer.

So how can an individual combat inflation? Here are some thoughts: negotiate everything

When I make a major purchase, I negotiate. For example, I purchased a wall-mounted fireplace from Ace Hardware last week. I asked an assistant manager how much she could knock off the price. She told me they don't negotiate prices unless the item is damaged. After jokingly offering to whack it with a hammer, I got to dickering with the store's top manager and he carved \$75 off the purchase price.

Be pleasant but persistent.

With the inflation rate between 7 and 8 percent, it's smart to assume what you buy now would cost more later. So, for consumables, things you are certain to use no matter what, look for good prices and buy in bulk.

For example, I recently bought 18 bottles of Arm and Hammer detergent when I saw a good price at Menards. Or I bought a 6-pack of Colgate toothpaste at Sam's Club when I saw a good price.

I know that no matter what the economy does, I'll be washing my clothes and brushing my teeth. By buying now and using later, I'm hedging inflation. It's like buying a 7 percent bond. It's not a flashy investment, but it is a pragmatic one.

With labor prices escalating, it may be an appropriate time to consider spending money on that project you have been putting off. For example, I have a plumbing project that I have continually put off, but I know will eventually have to happen. I got an estimate from my plumber several months

ago that is good for six months. I have watched labor rates shoot up since then. So, I gave the greenlight to the project at the price it was bid at six months ago. Again, it's like buying a bond paying at the rate of inflation.

I'll be the first to admit, these aren't easy undertakings. It requires spending savings now in anticipation of those dollars in your bank account being worth less if they go unspent.

It's hardly an ideal situation. But the economy is giving few alternatives to staying ahead of inflation.



Coping with voter rejection – 1954

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from March 30, 1994.)

In 1954, Mendota voters rejected a proposal to accommodate seventh and eighth grade classes in an enlarged high school building. Soon after this rejection, a citizens' committee was formed to study a number of alternatives to alleviate overcrowding.

Meeting March 30, 1954, in the H.D. Hume Co. office, the committee members were drawn from six service clubs and the community at large, reflecting, they hoped, "all points of view."

William Ashley was chairman, Leon Burright was vice chairman and Mrs. Josephine Coss served as secretary. The options were to be explored by sub-committees.

Option 1: Enlarge Blackstone and/ or Lincoln to include kindergarten through eighth grade. Chairman: Fred Option 2: Enlarge Blackstone and

Lincoln to kindergarten through sixth grade and construct a new junior high school. Chairman: Charles Fahler. Option 3: Construct a new school to receive students in kindergarten through

sixth grade in excess of those taken care

of in Lincoln and Blackstone, plus a junior high school system. Chairman: Vernon Setchell. Option 4: House kindergarten through sixth grade classes in one building and

seventh through 12th grade in a second

building. Chairman: Millie Lippincott. After many months of discussion. Option 3 was favored and voters approved purchase of a site on Guiles Avenue in October 1954. Construction of a new school and a bond issue to finance it was approved in a special election in January 1955. Classes in Northbrook began in October 1956.

A four-inch downpour on March 24, 1954, followed by 65-mile-an-hour winds, closed the subways on South 13th Avenue and just off Route 34 on the east side. Water was eight feet deep beneath the Burlington tracks and Curley Herman ferried youngsters on their way to school through the subway in a row boat when trains blocked the **Sidetracks**

tracks. They loved it. Water in the basement of the

new General Telephone building on Washington Street behind the library interrupted the charging of batteries to be used in connection with the dial system. Workmen pumped water from the basement for 10 hours, after which the drains were plugged. Charging of batteries was resumed.

Surprisingly, there were fewer flooded basements than usual after a heavy rain. It is believed that cleaning

the creek last fall played an important part in keeping at minimum the troubles of those with property along the banks of the Mendota river.

The Reporter was host to MHS Trojans named to all-conference teams at a banquet sponsored by the Northern Illinois Sportswriters Association. The banquet was held in Joliet. Coaches Ted Lewis and Lloyd Doenier were also guests. The all-conference Trojans were Wayne Rich, Jim Brown, Dick McMahon, Curt Truckenbrod, Glen Faber, Gary Beardsley, Charles Harmon, Leon Schlesinger, Denny Krenz, Ed Klinge and Walt Klinge. Another eligible Trojan, Wayne Lemmer, was unable to attend the banquet

Lions sponsored a performance by Gamma Phi Circus in the MHS gym. Sandra Montagnoli was crowned queen. Her attendants were Karen Doenier, Shirley Jones, Barbara Long and Jean Garrity. Proceeds from the circus were earmarked for improvements at the Kanteen.

Another Kanteen benefit was a dinner at the Lions Den attended by 240. Mrs. Lawrence Watson was chairman. Entertainment featured Connie Lee Burnett of Paw Paw, age 6, singing to accompaniment on the accordion by her sister, Bonnie Jean.

On March 24, 1954, automatic gates

were installed by the CB&Q at the Sixth

and Eighth street crossings. This included automatic signals, electric flashers and bells. The Illinois Central planned to install automatic signals as well. On March 25, members of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign

Wars and Catholic War Veterans met to consider what lots might be available for the new veterans' headquarters, or what existing buildings might be adapted for this purpose. Mendota Community Hospital

announced opening of a special room for expectant fathers. The Women's Auxiliary had furnished it with ash trays, chairs, magazines, soft light, a radio and a cot. If the hour of arrival proves

Ron DeSantis and the new Republican Party

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis had another moment that lit up the right, this time pushing back against Disney's critique of the so-called "Don't Say Gay" bill.

In his statement, DeSantis was absolutely stalwart, saying that the chances are "zero" that he's going to back away from his support for the law. And he didn't hesitate to go on offense against Disney. He said it had made a fortune off being family-friendly so should understand that families don't want inappropriate material injected into the curriculum at schools and smacked the company for making money in China without denouncing the brutal practices of the Chinese Communist Party.

DeSantis had been equally forthright a few days earlier, contesting the dishonest "Don't Say Gay" characterization by a reporter at a news conference. "It's why people don't trust people like you," the governor said, "because you peddle fake narratives, and so we disabuse you of those narratives."

This is the voice of the new Republican Party.

Which is not to say that the party wasn't socially conservative before (George W. Bush ran against gay marriage in 2004), or that it didn't criticize the media (one of George H.W. Bush's best moments in 1988 was slamming Dan Rather during a live interview). But there's a new combativeness that is clearly a reflection of how Trump underlined the power of cultural issues and changed the rules around how you deal with controversy -- by doubling down and hitting back harder.

Perhaps DeSantis would be just as inclined to rumble if Donald Trump had never emerged -- Chris Christie, for instance, had considerable success with a "bring it on" attitude toward criticisms during his governorship. What feels new, though, is the zest for combat on cultural

issues, as well as a willingness to bring to bear public power to the fight where possible (government has every right to control what is and isn't taught in government schools).

There's also a complete intolerance for playing along with false media narratives.

And, lastly, there's zero hesitation to stand up to corporations siding with the left in policy disputes. It seemed several years ago in the debates over religious-freedom restorations acts at the state level that corporations held the whip hand over state officials. Not anymore. Not after Republicans have learned that the appropriate response to such pressure

If this new approach draws on Trump, it should vitiate one of the arguments long made for Trump: "At least he fights." Now, the party is full of people who want to fight in a broadly similar fashion -- however, with important differences from Trump.

In the "Don't Say Gay" controversy, DeSantis isn't relitigating what happened in the last election; he is freshly litigating a defense against a cutting-edge progressive cause.

He isn't defending the indefensible; he's defending the eminently defensible, in fact the unfairly maligned.

He isn't dragging anyone through a fight occasioned by his personal failings or dubious practices; he's standing up for a well-considered conservative initiative. And he isn't jousting with reporters who know more about

the contested topic than he does; no, on this and pretty much everything else, he knows more than any of his antagonists. So, DeSantis opens up a vista offering an important element

of Trumpism without the baggage or selfishness of Trump. The same can be said of Arkansas Sen. Tom Cotton. He

gave a speech the other day at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library that thoughtfully integrated Trumpian populist themes with traditional GOP thinking. Here is another vista, of a policy vision with a strong element of Trumpism that might have broad appeal to GOP

voters of all stripes without the distracting obsessions of the This gets at what could be one of the most persuasive arguments to Republican voters for Trump not running again -- not that he needs to go away so the old party can be restored,

but that he's unnecessary because a new party has emerged.

Illinois spring trout fishing season opens on April 2nd

SPRINGFIELD – The 2022 Illinois spring trout fishing season will open April 2 at 57 ponds, lakes and streams throughout the state.

An early opportunity at select trout sites – the spring catch-and-release fishing season—opened March 19. No trout may be kept during the catch-and-release fishing period, but anglers can keep trout after the opening of the regular season beginning April 2.

The Illinois Catchable Trout Program is funded by those who use the program through the sale of inland trout stamps. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) stocks more than 80,000 rainbow trout each year in bodies of water where trout fishing is permitted during the spring season. An additional 80,000 trout will be stocked for the fall trout fishing season, which begins in October.

For the 2022 spring trout season, no trout may be taken from any of the stocked sites until the season opens at 5 a.m. April 2. Anyone attempting to harvest trout before the legal harvest season opening will be issued citations.

All anglers, including those who intend to release fish caught before April 2, must have a fishing license and an inland trout stamp unless they are younger than 16, blind or disabled, or an Illinois resident on leave from active duty in the Armed Forces. The daily catch limit for each angler

For information about all site regulations, anglers should contact individual sites that will be stocked with catchable-size trout. Not all sites open at 5 a.m. on opening day. Anglers are reminded to check the opening time of their favorite sites prior to the open date

Taking a child on a fishing trip easier. For young children,

A fishing trip is much more than just going to catch fish. The excitement of getting the boat ready, packing a lunch, going over the checklist, picking out lures for the tackle box, buying worms, etc., is all part of the fun. The fishing experience teaches a child about patience, makes them aware of the sights and sounds of the outdoors, and provides a great sense of accomplishment from baiting a hook to catching that first fish. We all need to take the time to bring our children outside and teach them about taking ownership in caring for the natural environment. Help our Illinois youth get excited about fishing—if you can pass on your knowledge, you will be continuing a great tradition of exploring Illinois lakes and rivers.

Here are some ways to teach young people of all ages to fish and have a successful fishing experience:

Fishing License

Anyone under the age of 16 in Illinois does not need a license to fish.

Note: The adult accompanying a child fishing does not need a fishing license if he/she does not participate in fishing at all. Usually the adult casts, sets the hook, and/or helps the child reel in, in which case, that adult would need a valid Illinois fishing license.

Safety

Many fishing related accidents can be avoided with some forethought. Act on the side of caution, watch over children diligently, and teach by example.

- Young children should always fish with an adult.
- When in a boat or canoe, ALWAYS wear a life jacket.
- If weather turns stormy, be cautious and seek shelter or end your trip early. If you hear thunder, it is time to get off the water!
- Protect young eyes and skin on sunny days. The sun reflects off the water surface,

and it can be easy to get a sunburn or damage eyes. Always have young anglers wear a hat, sunscreen, and sunglasses.

- Those hooks are sharp! Teach children to always be aware of where their hook is and not to let it get near anyone else. Set good rules about looking around before
- It is a smart practice to use barbless hooks or pinch down the barbs on your own hooks.
- · Be very careful of Poison Ivy. This often grows along disturbed areas around boat ramps or in the woods. If you go on a hike, stay on the trail.

Conservation

Always teach and practice the Anglers' Code of Ethics. Our lakes and rivers belong to everyone and we all must do our part to preserve them for future generations.

· Children and adult alike should keep only what you will eat and never wastefully discard any fish.

For those fish you want to release, teach about best angling practices from the Department of Conservation's Catch-and-Release Guidelines.

- It is everyone's responsibility to protect the outdoors. Do not throw gum wrappers, sandwich wrappers, soda cans, bait containers or any other trash in the water. Pack your trash out or dispose of it in a park garbage can.
- Teach kids that fishhooks and line can snag and kill fish, birds, turtles, small mammals and frogs when thrown into the water. These should be discarded in appropriate trash containers.
- Knowing the size and number of fish it is legal to keep is important for all. Talking about regulations with your child provides a great opportunity to discuss why these are necessary and how they can help keep fish populations healthy.

Child-Sized Equipment Small hands can handle a kid-sized rod and reel much

toddler to preschool aged, a beginner fishing rod and reel combination can be found in the sporting good area of most department stores at a low price. Do not, however, choose the prepackaged rod sets with comic heroes on them for school-aged children. Instead, choose an ultra-light rod and reel. For kids, the most fun

Fun ways to celebrate the arrival of spring

· Host a spring potluck. Put fresh spring vegetables and fruits on display. Options include artichokes, apricots,

asparagus, carrots, dandelion greens, and radishes. Put together apasta primavera, which essentially is a spring pasta dish laden with fresh vegetables.

• Decorate with flowers. Bring fresh flowers indoors and put them on display in vases or table centerpieces. Cut stems on a 45-degree angle underwater to help flowers last longer. In addition, choose floral themed curtains and throw pillows to add some spring decor.

• Create a water feature. The sound and sights of cascading water can be both relaxing and picturesque. A water feature can be something as simple as a small fountain or more elaborate like a koi pond.

Practice safe boating

Along with boating inspections and water rules, some other ways to stay safe involve educating oneself of the larger dangers on the water. These generally involve risky boater behavior, such as failing to wear a life jacket or having an inadequate number of life jackets for passengers. Alcohol use while boating also can be problematic. Being under the influence can adversely affect boaters' reaction times and decision-making abilities. According to the 2018 U.S. Coast Guard Recreational Boating Statistics Report, alcohol continued to be the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents in 2018, accounting for 100 deaths (19 percent) of total fatalities. Curbing alcohol use while boating can help avoid accidents and deaths.

Excessive speeds also can derail nice days on the water. Excessive speed can cause accidents in crowded areas. Speeding makes it difficult to react to obstacles — including underwater wildlife — and bring the boat to a stop within a safe distance of others.

Boating season is heating up, and that means making safety a big part of operating and enjoying a vessel.

How do sellers choose among multiple offers?

Answer: Usually the highest is the best one to accept. But there are other factors to consider too- such as:

*All-cash offer. This offer is NOT dependent on a mortgage lender so they can close much faster!

Few to no contingencies — this type of offer may have mortgage, home inspection, or even the contingency that their home has to sell first before they can go through with the next sale.

*Higher down payment. By having a higher down payment this shows the buyer is in a strong financial position, and are serious about buying a home.

*Commonly called "the love letter." This is a letter that the buyer writes to the seller, although discouraged because of the fair housing act, but it can be a way to connect to the seller.
