Resident questions records, conduct of commissioner

Issues involve use of city gas pumps, fire department pay

CLINTON — A Clinton resident questioned the city council Monday about what he said were unexplained discrepancies with city gasoline usage fire department pay involving a city commissioner.

It was the third time in recent weeks Seth addressed Redington the council about the matter, presenting records obtained from the city he claims show commissioner Ballenger used gasoline pumps multiple times to put fuel in his personal vehicle. Redington also questioned

Ballenger's collection of fire department pay, something he said he considered a conflict of interest.

Ballenger serves commissioner of public health safety, overseeing the fire and police departments.

Redington Earlier, obtained records from the city through Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) showing the number of times during a one-year period in 2020 and 2021 Ballenger put gas in a vehicle recorded as a truck belonging to the fire department. The Clinton Journal requested the same records, which Ballenger gasoline from the city pumps into vehicle 9053 totaling 186.8 gallons during the period.

Sangamon County judge rules on school COVID mask, vaccine mandates

Sangamon County judge says emergency rules were improper

SPRINGFIELD Illinois

Attorney General Kwame Raoul and Gov. JB Pritzker's administration are asking a state appellate court to set aside a lower court order from late Friday that invalidated the mask and vaccine mandates that the state imposed last year for public schools.

On Friday, Sangamon Circuit Judge County Raylene Grischow granted temporary a restraining order blocking schools from enforcing those mandates, saying mitigation rules amounted to a kind of "quarantine" and that the Pritzker administration overstepped its bounds by issuing those mandates through emergency rules.

"The judge's decision cultivates chaos parents, families, teachers and school administrators across the state, and I've asked Attorney General Kwame Raoul to seek to have the ruling overturned with all possible speed," Pritzker said during a news conference Monday.

Beginning in August 2021, Pritzker issued a series of executive orders related to the reopening of public schools. They included a requirement schools enforce a mask mandate for all students, staff and visitors; that they require all school personnel either be vaccinated or submit to weekly testing, and that they exclude from school premises for specified periods of time any student or staff member who tests positive for COVID-19 or who has been in close contact with someone who has.

The Illinois Department of Public Health and the Illinois State Board of Education then issued a series of emergency rules to implement the executive orders.

Parents, students and, in some cases, teachers sued roughly 170 school districts across state seeking to block those mandates. Those cases were eventually consolidated and transferred to Sangamon County.

Nettles responds to judge's COVID ruling

District returning to own COVID policy, for now

CLINTON Clinton Unit Schools superintendent Curt Nettles notified school families this week about a judge's ruling in Sangamon County dealing with the state's COVID mandated rules. The judge issued a temporary restraining order against the rules.

See the story, bottom left, on this page.

Essentially, the judge ruled in favor of the 145 Illinois school districts and against Gov. J.B.

Pritzker, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE).

"Due to strong language from the judge in this case, it appear to us that it gives us the support to go back to our original plan for the school year," Nettles wrote in his message to families. "We also note that it is recommended by health organizations, so we want all of our families to know that masking in our schools for students and staff will be highly acceptable."

Nettles said wearing would not be required until further notice but included a caveat.

"It is possible we could find ourselves in situations to increase our

mitigations at some point. However, those would be announced and explained to families, if necessary."

Policy from the state affecting schools removed most local school district controls regarding COVID mitigation, including the wearing of masks. School districts argued that circumstances varied from district to district, so they should be allowed to use their own mitigation plans.

Nettles said there would "be a lot of pressure" on school boards and staff around Illinois caused by disagreement with the judge's ruling.

"Our community and district should strive to be tolerant of others' opinions on the matter," he wrote in his message. "In regard to the student

we serve, our staff will continue to teach tolerance and all of the character traits that embody what a good CUSD 15 student and staff member should be."

He said the district would support students who wanted to continue wearing masks.

On Tuesday, Illinois Education Association vice president Al Llorens issued recommending districts wait for a ruling from the appellate court before making decisions about COVID safety measures.

IEA is the state's largest teachers' union.

Also on Tuesday, Gov. Pritzker announced an upcoming change in mask policy but did not give details.

GOP reintroduces crime reduction package; Pritzker touts public safety spending

Rising violent crime has become major campaign issue

SPRINGFIELD - Senate Republicans unveiled an updated package of crime bills this week that they say will help curb violent crime and provide a morale boost to law enforcement.

It's substantially similar to the package the GOP introduced three months ago during the fall veto session to little fanfare from Democratic supermajorities in either chamber of the General Assembly.

"We were here in October offer reasonable proposals to help reduce crime, but the Democrats who control Springfield

have refused to act since then," Sen. Chapin Rose, R-Mahomet, said at a news conference Tuesday. "We're here again, demanding the Democrats take action to protect the people of Illinois from the violence on our streets."

The proposal includes a "Fund the Police Grant

Act" that would provide \$125 million in funding per year to local governments that will help with hiring, rehiring and retaining officers. Funding would help with the purchase of equipment and storage for body cameras along with other equipment designed to keep officers

communities safe and provide additional training.

Grants would administered by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.

Redington claims, however, he witnessed Ballenger pumping fuel into his own vehicle on some of the dates recorded. Redington lives in the vicinity of the city gas pumps.

He claims the recordkeeping does not reflect how the fuel was actually

Last fall, Ballenger drove to Benton, Ill. to pick up a small boat the Clinton Fire Department bought for water rescue work. Ballenger previously acknowledged he used his own truck to pick up the boat and was reimbursed his gasoline usage using the city pumps.

Redington filed a police report after he said he saw Ballenger using the pumps on Oct. 17. In a response from the Clinton Police Department, Redington was told that then city administrator Tim Followell and Ballenger reported to Police Chief Ben Lowers the fuel was reimbursement to Ballenger for picking up the boat.

In November, Followell forwarded to Redington a response from Clinton Fire Department reporting the boat was picked up a little more than a month earlier, on Sept. 12.

Redington questioned the city council about the discrepancy.

"Danny (Ballenger) never denied that he put gas in it (his vehicle) on that incident," said commissioner John Wise during Monday's council meeting. "And, that was what was told and interpreted as the day (Oct. 17) that he picked it (the boat) up."

"Was that what happened," Redington asked.

"That was the information that I had," Wise responded. "Danny never, ever denied it."

Wise said it was the only incident about which he ever commented, and he asked Redington if he had evidence about the other allegations.

"But, what does this page show," Redington asked, pointing to one of the documents showing gasoline usage

"It doesn't show it going into his truck, (on Oct. 17) it shows it going into a fire truck, 9053. Vehicle 9053 is a 2015 Ford F350 registered to the fire department, Clinton, Ill."

Redington questioned previously whether a reimbursement request

form for the fuel was completed, as required for city council members by city ordinance.

Redington also claimed Ballenger collected fire department pay during watch duty at the Clinton Chamber Haunted House, in October, and that he reported more hours than firefighters were scheduled to be on duty. He also said records show Ballenger was paid an hourly rate higher than the \$22 an hour rate paid to firefighters for the

Redington said he felt it was unethical and a conflict of interest for a commissioner to collect wages from the city.

When asked by the Journal about Redington's claims, Ballenger said he preferred not to comment.

about that provision at a separate news conference Tuesday, Gov. JB Pritzker said his administration will "look at anything that we think will help address the problem of rising crime," but he said his budget contained proposal significant investments to address the "challenges that municipalities are having with crime."

governor's The proposed budget for the fiscal year 2023 includes \$4.5 million to help fund body cameras for Illinois State Police in accordance with the Safety, Accountability, Fairness and Equity-Today, or SAFE-T Act, passed in January 2021.

The SAFE-T certification, reforms use-of-force standards, improves police accountability and abolishes cash bail beginning in 2023 in favor of a system that prioritizes risk of re-offending over an offender's ability to afford release.

In accordance with the SAFE-T Act, Pritzker proposed \$3.5 million in additional resources for ILETSB's operational costs, which include creating new trainings for officers and creating a public officer misconduct Another \$10 portal. million would go to ILETSB to provide grants for body cameras related to the SAFE-T Act's requirements.

Their package response to rising crime also proposes mandatory sentences of 10 years to life for violent gun offenders, imposes a 10year minimum on those who sell or give firearms convicted felons, and requires defendants who commit aggravated battery against an officer or brings a weapon into a penal institution to serve at least 85 percent of their

"These measures are necessary to not only give law enforcement the tools that they need, but also to send a clear message - go after our police and there will be consequences," Sen. Sue Rezin, R-Morris,

Juveniles who commit crimes related to gun violent violence or carjackings could receive 10 years to life in prison, per the proposal.

But Pritzker, in his budget address, drew a stark contrast between his favored policies and those backed by the GOP.

"With the state and the nation experiencing a rise in violent crime, addressing public safety requires major investments. But too often those elected officials yelling the loudest about public safety concerns are also those voting to defund government budgets," Pritzker said in his speech. "Crime is a complex and multifaceted problem to tackle, and it's cynical and counter-productive simply shout 'Lock them up' while providing fewer resources to the people and programs that prevent crime in the first place."

FY23 budget His includes \$240 million Reimagine the Public Safety Act, which aims at investing in youth-focused violence prevention resources in the state's most dangerous areas. That includes \$235 million from the federal American Rescue Plan Act for grants and \$5 million in general revenue for staffing and operations.

Pritzker noted his budget includes an \$18.6 million increase to allow for three classes of Illinois State Police cadets, about 300

But in their news conference, Republican Senators said local police funding, need more more recruits and the opportunity to provide more input on what police departments need in order to safely do their job.

David Hunt, a retired Piatt County Sheriff who joined GOP Senators at the news conference, said the reason he decided to retire before the end of his term was because of Democrats pushing police reform without the proper funding, as well as the measure end to cash bail.

Christian County Sheriff Bruce Kettelkamp and Chris Southwood, President of the Illinois Fraternal Order of Police, said that the reason for an increase in law

members enforcement leaving is due to a lack of support from lawmakers and an increase in violence against the police.

"Our current system under the anything but SAFE-T Act is failing all of us. Violent crime is surging unchecked in our communities all across the state," Southwood said.

The Senate Republicans' package would repeal the end of cash bail, but that provision, among others in the SAFE-T Act, doesn't take effect until January 2023.

In response to House Republicans introducing repealing legislation the SAFE-T Act last month, Legislative Black Caucus Chair Sonya Harper, House Kam Buckner and Senate Chair Robert Peters said the SAFE-T Act will help improve public safety and accused Republicans of using racial scare tactics.

"We're not saying that we have all the answers to stop crime in its entirety," Sen. Minority Leader Dan McConchie, R- Hawthorn Woods, said. "But we are saying we have good ideas that are derived from the law enforcement community itself that are saying that this will put us on the path to safer neighborhoods and help us defend our police."

Is a Part B premium cutback coming?

By now we know just how much our Social Security checks are going to be for this year, after the deductions for Part B.

The average dollar increase is \$92 per month for singles. The Part B deduction has gone up \$21.60, mostly due to the price of the new Alzheimer's drug, Aduhelm, for a total of \$170 per month. The drug costs \$56,000 per patient per year. And we're all going to pay for it, whether we need it or not.

The news now is that the price of that drug has been cut in half, to \$28,200 per year, after pressure was brought to bear on the manufacturer when it was revealed that Medicare might not pay for it at all. Additional pressure came from doctors who were suspicious the drug didn't actually work and who wanted their own tests run on it. Since it must be given via IV in the hospital or doctor's office, it falls under Part B instead of the Part D drug plan.

Hot off the press is a proposal that Medicare

will cover the drug -but only for those in controlled randomized clinical trials that will settle once and for all the question about whether the drug actually works. They'll likely have a decision on that proposal in April.

And what of our Part B costs, given the lowered cost of Aduhelm? Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra ordered Medicare to look again at the premium we're being charged for 2022. There is the smallest chance it might be lowered, which has never been done before.

Last year it estimated that our Part B premium would be \$158.50 this year. If that \$170 is cut back to that amount, it would net us an extra \$11.50 per month. What shall we spend it on?

A gizzard taste treat

elcome to my little corner delights. In this article, I will show you how your past knowledge from my articles can help you improve upon recipes. Fried chicken gizzards would be a good one.

Basic procedures without saying; pepper and flour the gizzards. Place in preheated oil, enough to come halfway up the gizzard pieces, and fry. deep-frying, gizzards are breaded and submerged into 350°F oil. But we can do much better than this.

Add minced aromatic vegetables; such as onion, celery and garlic into chicken stock. Include one tablespoon each of salt and brown sugar per gallon of water or stock. Allow the gizzards to marinate overnight in order to flavor and tenderize the meat internally.

Boil the gizzards in this marinate liquid for about two hours. Boiling also tenderizes meat. however, boiling can remove some of the natural flavors from the meat. As you learned in past articles, stovetop cooking can dry out the meat if one is not careful. And it does not tenderize. Now, think back on my articles regarding stock

We need to ensure tenderness while retaining their natural flavors and In order to moister. do that, they go into a pressure cooker. Place a pound's worth in a bowl with enough chicken stock. vegetable stock or your marinating liquid to cover. Place that bowl

and pressure cooking.

into the pressure cooker. Bring it up to ten pounds pressure. Cook for thirty minutes. Remove from cooker and drain off the stock. Reserve the stock. Taste a small piece for flavor tenderness and doneness.

The breading can be prepared while pressure cooking the meat. Again, refer to my past article for breading procedures. For gizzards, add half teaspoon each of black pepper and dried Italian herb seasoning, quarter teaspoon cumin and teaspoon of seasoned salt. In the one third cup of reserved stock, mix half teaspoon of hot sauce. Thoroughly mix this into the above dry ingredients. You could mix in a pinch of celery salt and garlic powder per taste. Incorporate the gizzards mixing them around with a fork until well coated and refrigerate overnight in tightly closed container allowing the juices to congeal.

Remove from refrigerator when ready to fry. Coat liver pieces with plain flour. Place into a deep frier at 350°F until golden brown. Let cool and taste. If too dry and/ or too crispy, don't sweat it. Let them sweat. That is to say, a few minutes on the stove.

Notice; I referred to several past articles. This is what I meant when I said, "I write these articles to educate so that you can invent and/or improve upon existing recipes." To just parrot off recipes does not necessarily teach.

1990 - Nelson Mandela was freed after 27 years in captivity.


1990 - In Tokyo, Japan, James "Buster" Douglas knocked out Mike Tyson in the tenth round to win the heavyweight championship.

2002 - The six stars on NBC's "Friends" signed a deal for \$24 million each for the ninth and final season of the series.



Criteria: Black and female

Our Constitution doesn't provide any real criteria by modern standards for what qualifications a justice on the Supreme Court must possess. In theory, one doesn't even have to have a law degree.

Historically, Presidents have appointed individuals with extensive experience in the law. Most appointees have been appellate court judges on the federal bench for many years. Most Supreme Court nominees come from Ivy League schools, which in all honesty subjects the Court to accusations of elitism.

Most appointees have some political background and support of the party in office. Rarely is a Supreme Court Justice nominated from the state courts. While the pool of candidates is nation wide, the advantage goes to those who live and went to law schools in northeast part of the nation. Ivy League schools and D.C. Washington appellate court are the true training grounds for Supreme Court Justices.

The above background is provided as Justice Stephen Breyer announced his retirement from the bench effective at the end of the Court's term late this spring. Most Supreme Court judges leave office by death or by submitting a letter to the President advising the President of their resignation. That Justice Breyer chose to make his announcement at the White House with the President present on January 27 is interesting.

Breyer certainly knows the political situation his resignation entails. Breyer is a consistent member of the liberal wing of the Court who is deeply respected by all members of the Court for his intellect, friendship and desire to keep the Court unified.

The progressives in the Democratic Party have been imploring him to resign ever since President Biden took office. With the Senate split 50/50 they fear another nominee stall in the Senate if the Republicans regain control of the Senate. There is certainly some merit to their concerns, but Breyer took great offense at the thought of him being forced out of office before his choosing. Breyer wants the decorum of the Court to prevail while understanding what his vacancy will entail.

During the Presidential primary Joe Biden was losing ground before the Georgia primary and debates. Biden needed assistance and James Clyburn, Congressman from South Carolina, was a key to that assistance.

Clyburn wanted a Black female to be appointed to the Supreme Court and was withholding his endorsement of Biden

until he got that pledge. In that debate, Biden stated he would nominate a Black female as his first nominee to the Supreme Court. Then, next day Clyburn announced his support for Biden as the Democratic nominee for President.

this is true affirmative action at its basic definition. The nominee must be black and female to even be considered. National polling indicates that 75 percent of the Americans question the criteria. I do not doubt that President Biden can find a competent black female to be his nominee. There are many black females who deserve and warrant consideration for nomination. I question the end game and the fairness to the nominee and the nation and ultimately to all black females.

No matter how qualified and competent the nominee is there will now always be the criticism that you got the appointment only because you are black and female. Her qualifications and skills will take second chair to that complaint. That is a terrible burden that our next Supreme Court Justice will carry with her for her entire tenure in office.

President Biden's nominee will have to have a tremendous backbone and thick skin to survive the personal attacks that are sure to come. I wish her the best.

Inclusivity at the VA

The Department of Veterans Affairs now has a cultural transformation action plan with an 18-member task force created last year under a presidential executive order. That task force (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access, or I-DEA) made 20 recommendations and subrecommendations to be considered over the next four years. Per their mission statement, the goal is to ensure that all employees, veterans, families, caregivers and survivors have equitable treatment and experiences when interacting with the VA.

The task force initially focused on existing policies and programs, barriers, gaps institutional access points. One of the first things it accomplished was to raise the Pride flag at the VA Central Office. Another was to address the rulemaking process to modify the Code of Federal Regulations to expand the VA's gender-affirming care and benefits for veterans.

Additionally, the task force has changed the Experience Veterans (VEO) Trust Office Surveys to include questions about gender identity and sexual orientation, and medical records choices were added that include transgender male, transgender female, nonbinary, other and "does

not wish to disclose." Veterans Health Administration's LGBT and Related Identities health program is now called the LGBTQ+ Health Program.

One of its goals (on the list of 20) is to integrate I-DEA into hiring, position management, talent development and coaching. executive Allied with that is their of evaluating goal symbols, "institutional mottos, expression of values displayed and used by VA to ensure inclusiveness and diverse

representation." One of the guiding principles is to deliberately and consciously embed I-DEA the into institutional memory and organizational culture of the VA. To ensure that this happens, overseeing all this will be a proposed I-DEA Office and Chief Diversity Officer (DCO) position that will report directly to the Secretary of the VA.







A TRUMP DEMOTION

If you've been following this month's series of articles, then by now you are familiar with trump promotions. They are not so difficult once you get the hang of them, but it takes real talent to organize a trump demotion! Observe this tragic E-W performance:



E-W Vulnerable West North East South Pass Pass 1♣ 3♠ **Pass** 2♠ **Pass** Pass **All Pass** 4♠


Looking just at N-S, playing in 4♠, you can see 3 top losers in the red suits. Of course, when tackling the trump suit, Declarer plays the A first. Most (89%) of the time trumps will be 2-1 and there will be 10 easy tricks. But this deal is in the unlucky 11%, and so Declarer is destined to go down one.

But, no! Here come E-W, galloping to Declarer's rescue! West's opening lead is the ♥K, followed by the ♥A. This sequence of plays cleverly shows a doubleton in the E-W methods (with a longer suit, this pair would lead the Ace first). Then a Diamond switch is won by East's Ace, and a Heart comes back. Declarer ruffs resignedly with the Nine and, when that unexpectedly holds, the jig is up! Declarer now has no trouble working out the trump position, and crosses to Dummy (twice if necessary) to finesse East out of his &QJ3. Making 10 tricks!

It was not too smart of West to advertise a doubleton Heart when he had no trumps with which to ruff the third round. And East, knowing the trump situation, might have done better not to play that third round of Hearts (although a suspicious Declarer would surely have smelled a rat if East had not done so). So, there you have it, the dreaded trump demotion!

Trim trees, shrubs in the dormant season for stronger, healthier

URBANA, Ill. - Throughout the growing season, gardeners and arborists talk about the benefits of pruning woody ornamentals while they are dormant, and that time is almost here.

"Pruning can seem like a daunting task, but it is an important cultural practice for the health and vigor of many trees and shrubs," says University of Illinois Extension Horticulture Educator Sarah Vogel.

Pruning is done to reduce the size and shape of the plant, increase flower or fruit production, and promote sound structure.

The correct time to prune deciduous shrubs and trees is determined by the plant's growth habit, bloom time, and health or condition. Timing will depend on the species, but any time is a good time to remove dead, dying, or broken branches. Be sure to sanitize tools between plants with a 10 percent bleach solution or undiluted 70 percent isopropyl alcohol. Sanitize between each cut if a disease is sus-

Spring flowering shrubs, such as lilac or forsythia, will bloom on the growth from the previous last growing season, sometimes called "old wood". The best time to prune a healthy plant is immediately after flowering in spring. Overgrown shrubs may need more extensive pruning through rejuvenation or renewal methods in late winter or early spring. Heavy pruning methods may lead to fewer blooms for a few years but will improve the overall health of the shrub.

Summer blooming shrubs, or those that bloom after July 1, produce blooms on the current year's growth. These are best pruned in late winter or early spring.

"Do not prune deciduous shrubs in late summer as that will encourage a flush of new growth that will not have the opportunity to harden off before winter, leaving the plant susceptible to frost damage and dieback," Vogel says.

Many of the same rules for shrubs also apply to deciduous trees. Most will respond well to late winter pruning, including fruit trees. Performing this task on trees in the dormant season gives the pruner an increased visibility of the tree's shape without any leaves and enough time for proper wound closure for the plant. When branches are cut correctly at a node or at the branch collar, the plant will seal wounds properly to prevent the spread of decay and entry for potential pests and pathogens.

There are some exceptions to early spring pruning. To reduce the spread of oak wilt disease, oaks should not be pruned from March through October. River birch will respond best to cuts made in late fall or early winter after leaves have fallen and when sap flow is reduced.

Pruning techniques on evergreens will vary depending on the species and desired effect. Fall pruning is not recommended for evergreens, as any new growth will be susceptible to winter injury. Evergreen shrubs such as juniper and yew can be pruned in March or April before new growth emerges. Evergreen trees such as pine, spruce, and fir generally require very little pruning, and removing lower branches is not advisable as it compromises the structural integrity of the tree.

Spruce and fir trees have lateral buds on the newest growth. These are buds that grow from the sides of the branch, not the ends. To create a more dense form, prune back to these lateral buds in early spring. Pines only grow from terminal buds at the end of the branch. Pines are prunes are pruned in spring or early summer at the candle stage by removing two-thirds of the elongated bud. Do not cut branches back to older growth as they will not develop new growth from those areas.

Relieve the winter blues by choosing the next calm, sunny, 40-degree day to put on boots and get some sunshine. The improved health of your trees and shrubs will




