# Rate of food price inflation could ease in 2022

BLOOMINGTON -Shoppers and diners might see some relief from food price inflation in 2022 after absorbing steep price increases the past year.

But prices for many items likely won't go down any time soon.

USDA's Economic Research Service (ERS) predicts the consumer price index (CPI) for all food could increase 2% to 3% in 2022, down from the 2021 forecast of 3-4%.

The CPI for all food increased another half percentage point from October to November and climbed 6.1% higher than November 2020, which marked the highest food price inflation since 2008.

"No food categories have decreased in price in 2021 compared with 2020," ERS noted in its December food price outlook. "The level of food price inflation varies depending on whether the food was purchased for consumption away from home or at home."

Food-at-home prices rose 3.1% from January through November 2021 while food-away-fromhome prices jumped 4.2% during the same 11-month period.

Those who eat at home can expect food prices to increase another 1.5-2.5% in 2022, closer to historical averages, while food prices away from home are expected to increase 3-4%.

"The beef and veal category has had the largest relative price increase (in 2021)," ERS noted.

Beef and veal prices rose 8.7% through November 2021 while pork prices climbed at a similar clip. ERS projects price inflation

in both meat categories could ease to 2 to 3% in 2022.

"Ground chuck and ground beef fell from record prices in October, but still remain elevated," authors of the CME Group's Daily Livestock Report noted. "Retail pork prices continued to climb in November, reaching a new record price for the eighth consecutive month."

Poultry prices followed a similar trajectory as beef and pork, reaching a record broiler composite retail price for the fifth consecutive month in November, according to the Daily Livestock Report.

ERS projects other food categories with some of the largest price increases in 2021 could see a lower rate of inflation in 2022.

Price increases for fresh fruits are projected to decline from a range of 4.5% to 5.5% in 2021 to 1-2% in 2022, while price inflation for fats and oils could ease from a range of 4-5% to 1.5-2.5% during the same time.

# IDPH and ISBE update COVID-19 isolation guidelines to align with CDC

SPRINGFIELD - Illinois schools can expect an update on the COVID-19 isolation and quarantine guidance to mirror the guidance from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The CDC issued new guidance Jan. 4 that shortened the isolation and quarantine periods for the general

Parents across the state were confused why such guidance was not being mirrored by Illinois schools. Some districts were following test-to-stay policies that allows students to test out of quarantine.

On Jan. 6, the CDC released an overview of isolation guidance and quarantine

for K-12 schools. A memo from the Illinois Department of Public Health published last week by the Illinois State Board of Education says the two agencies plan to revise existing regulations and guidance documents to align with the

CDC's update. The guidance says staff or students who test positive for COVID-19, regardless of vaccination status, should isolate for five days after the onset of symptoms, or five

days from the collection of a specimen if no symptoms are present.

Asymptomatic positive cases can be released from isolation after five days. If symptoms are present and persist, isolation should end after being fever-free for 24 hours and other symptoms have improved.

The memo from IDPH says schools should ensure that students and staff who test positive for COVID-19 should wear a mask, including at home, for five days.





"We see a lot of people coming in from the Chicago markets," said Matt Merrill, district vice president of the Dallas Forth Worth

Metroplex and West Texas. "I think that's a lot due to the job growth and a lot of opportunity here. The cost of living here is much lower than in those areas."

According to the latest figures from the U.S. Census Bureau, from July 2020 to July 2021, there were 113,776 fewer people in Illinois. Only the District of Columbia and New York had a greater percent decline in population.

Taking into account the number of births and migrants who moved to Illinois, it is estimated more than 122,000 Illinoisans moved to other states.





# Scamming the scammer

I don't find joy in anyone being swindled, but I do find a bit of irony that the DeVos family, founders of Amway, were bilked out of \$100 million.

Amway is a pioneer of multi-level marketing, a concept where participants are expected to not only sell something but recruit others to sell it, too. Avon, Mary Kay, Tupperware and Herbalife are some other well-known MLMs.

Elizabeth Holmes, the founder of Theranos, who was convicted of fraud charges Jan. 3, sweet talked the DeVos clan into investing in her enterprise that falsely claimed to have revolutionized blood testing.

The problem is the fancy blood-testing machine she said she invented didn't work. And she lied to attract rich investors like the DeVos who had dollar signs dancing in their eyes.

When the Wall Street Journal uncovered the deception, the company's valuation dropped from \$9 billion to less than nothing

The DeVos family may be out millions but things could be much worse. They could have fallen for some other scam and ended up with a basement full of unused merchandise. That's what happens to a lot of folks who get involved in multi-level marketing schemes.

Robert Fitzgerald, of Pyramid Scheme Alert, is an expert on MLMs.

'Think about it. 'Could you possibly make a living today from your home on your own, as an Amway distributor selling laundry soap or anything else like that? So, basically these detergents and other things might be consumed by the salespeople themselves. That's right. You can't make a living.'

According to the Federal Trade Commission, most people who join legitimate MLMs make little or no money. And some lose money.

In 2020, my family got scammed. The sad part is we knew we were being scammed all along and failed to stop it.

It went like this: the mother of one of our kids' friends invited my wife, Joan, to a Touchstone Crystal party. We like the woman who invited her and our daughters are good friends. But Joan wasn't particularly keen on the product. She's a veterinarian and jewelry get snagged by the paws and claws of her patients.

When she was about to attend the online party, I rolled my eyes and said, "You know you're going to be expected to buy something. And it will be overpriced and likely something you don't like."

She nodded her head and gave a look of resignation one might expect of someone heading to the gallows. Unfortunately, in our society too many people are taught to be pleasers. When she returned from her virtual engagement,

she was even more glum. She won the door prize. And what was the door prize? The opportunity to host her own Touchstone Crystal party. I looked at her and said, "Tell them, 'No.' It's a scam."

My wife nodded her head in agreement. And then the emails and phone calls started coming in from someone higher up the Touchstone Crystal food chain. Let's call her Oueen Bee. We were in the middle of a pandemic and the governor

declared a hard lockdown so we said we couldn't host a party. But Queen Bee had other ideas. We would host a virtual party over Zoom.

"Tell her, 'no.' I mouthed across the room. But my wife said 'yes.' Queen Bee seemed to know just what buttons to push to get a mark to acquiesce.

Then my wife came up with her own idea: scam the scammer.

We'd host a fake party. She pointed at our oldest daughter, then her sister and then me and said, "You will be my party guests."

Can't we just tell her no? My wife just gave me The Look. She has trouble telling friends, acquaintances and strangers 'no' but with me it's not a problem.

On Party Day, we all took our phones and computers to different parts of our house and logged on using different Zoom accounts. And there she was, Queen Bee.

When I introduced myself she gave me a startled look. After a long pause she said "You know that Crystal

glove Michael Jackson wore? That was made by our company. So, men sometimes use our products.'

I can see it now, me moonwalking into the newsroom wearing one crystal bejeweled glove and whistling "Billy Jean." At this point, I put on my reporter hat and started

asking questions. "How much money did you make last year, doing this?" Queen Bee sputtered and said, "Well, I'm just not certain."

How dependent is your income on recruiting others to sell? "Well, I just don't know what you mean."


Is this a multi-level marketing program? "I've never heard that term before."

And then Queen Bee said let's do a drawing for a door prize. My wife, God bless her, says, "We aren't drawing for the opportunity to host another party are we?" A look of dejection crosses Queen Bee's face and she says, "Um, no."

At this point, I head to Dollar General, phone in hand and ask questions as I stroll down the cough medicine aisle. My inquires must have proved too much because soon she was closing out the party. I signed off.

# Farm folk fill Opera House – 1904

**Backtracks** 

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Jan. 12, 1994.)

When word came out that the ninth annual LaSalle County Farmer's Institute would be held in the Mendota Opera House, the Ottawa papers were appalled. They warned that attendance at the Institute if held "elsewhere than at the county seat," would suffer. But from the opening day until the

final evening, attendance was high. On the last night, The Reporter was pleased

# The Opera House has not held such a crowd in 10 years and hundreds were unable to gain

The Institute was held for three days in January 1904. Superintendent W.R. Foster of the East Mendota School and Professor J.A. Wallace, a music teacher, were in charge of programming. This included talks on farm topics, but every speech was preceded and followed by music. Whole classes from Blackstone and East Mendota schools filed on stage to sing. Buckner's orchestra was on hand and a double male quartet sang "How to Make Corn Bread" and "The Whistling Farmer Boy."

One session was devoted to the Boys? and Girls' Association. A paper entitled "Why Should Farmer Boys Attend the Agricultural College" was presented as well as an essay, "The Farmer Girl."

There were awards for corn and Floyd Davis captured the \$3 first prize. In the bread competition, Charlotte Pohl

On the final day, a speaker promoted "good roads," urging farmers and their wives to organize and agitate for road improvement.

A grain buyer from Minonk lost a son and a daughter in the Iroquois Theatre fire in Chicago. That tragedy on Dec 30, 1893, resulted in 602 deaths. The man from Minonk telegraphed to Mendota to arrange a special train to Chicago.

Arriving on the Illinois Central at 11:15 p.m., he boarded Engine No. 1528 of Billy's train, which was kept overnight in Mendota, at 11:23. Thomas

Morrissey of Aurora was engineer, John Mahar, fireman, Dave Williams, conductor, and Frank McMahon, brakeman. There was on coach.

The 83 miles were covered in 87 minutes, including four stops.

#### A remarkable run with an oldstyle engine in the dead of winter. It was recorded that Mahar had shov-

eled six tons of coal. About halfway to Aurora the light went out in the engine cab and the water glass broke, "but they kept right on." The distraught father was accompanied by his family physician.

A red letter day for Mendota was Jan. 14, 1904. Under the headline DARK-NESS DISPELLED, The Reporter was at last able to report that new street lights had been installed and were providing "a beautiful and steady light" that would give satisfaction to "both the company and the city.'

They will be hailed with delight by citizens who have been realizing the darkness of our streets without them. Mendota had been without street-

lights since mid-December.

The Reporter pointed out that investors had expended the enormous sum of \$89,000 in Mendota's electric and gas plants.

When you realize this, there will probably be not so much kicking as there had been in the past, but kindlier feeling toward those who have gone into their pockets to provide the people with modern comfort.

On Jan. 9, 1904, Mendota College celebrated its 11th anniversary. President Nathan Twining stated the condition of the college "gratifying in all departments." Enrollment was increasing,

Dr. J.C. Corbus, Mendota's health officer, received bottles from the State Board of Health in which to collect samples of Mendota's drinking water. These were to be sent to Northwestern Medical School where Professor J.H. Long would examine samples from city wells throughout the state. Locally, there was no concern about the outcome.

We know that it is good because more than one analysis has been made before and more than that, no case of sickness has yet been traced to the use of our city water.

Several grocers announced they

would close every evening at 7 p.m. except on "Saturday and payday nights" from Jan. 18 until March 18. The cooperating grocers were Cooper Bros., Max John, Theiss & Co., Kreiser & Liefeldt and Charles Kohl.

Grocer John Deaner did not join in the agreement as he was going out of business and was offering his stock at reduced prices.

# Chuck Schumer's Jan. 6 cynicism

On Jan. 6, 2021, rioters seeking to disrupt the counting of electoral votes breached the U.S. Capitol and rampaged for hours before order was restored.

This was a disgraceful spectacle that shouldn't be repeated, and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer knows just what is needed to respond to the moment -- passing every progressive voting-related priority that can possibly be jammed through the Senate on an extremely narrow, partisan vote.

The defense of our democracy, Schumer maintains, demands nothing less.

The latest pitch for the Democratic voting agenda is more cynical and detached from reality than ever. We are to believe that the only way to counteract the furies unleashed on Jan. 6 is by imposing same-day voter registration and no-excuse mail voting on the states, ending partisan gerrymandering, and requiring the counting of ballots that arrive up to seven days after Election Day, among other provisions completely irrelevant to events that day or afterward.

If you're thinking that Democrats supported all of this on Jan. 5 of last year and still supported it on Jan. 7, you're correct. Their agenda has as much to do with Jan. 6 as an annual

appropriations bill or the naming of a post office.

The Democratic drive to nationalize our elections has always been a sweepingly radical step in search of an alleged crisis to address. When a version was first introduced a few years ago, it was sold as addressing "the vile voter suppression practices" of the GOP, in the words of The New York Times. The big lie of the time was that the Georgia gubernatorial campaign of Stacey Abrams in 2018 was undone by such practices. Now, the justification is the Capitol riot and subsequent GOP state-level voting changes that have been portrayed, falsely, as the return of Jim Crow.

In reality, voting has never been easier and voters have never had so many options for how to participate in elections, whether early in-person voting, traditional same-day voting, or mail-in voting. There are partisan disputes about how to strike a balance between convenience and security, but there

is no reason that these differences can't be debated at the state level, with the balance struck differently depending on the policy preferences of elected officials in each state.

Limits on drop boxes or measures to tighten up the identification requirements around mail-in ballots aren't suppressing the vote.

The true weakness of the system that was highlighted last year on Jan. 6 is the poorly drafted Electoral Count Act. It should be revised to make it explicit that the vice president can't decide which electoral votes to count and that states can't discard the popular vote if the outcome isn't to their liking. Even though changes along these lines might get bi-partisan support, Schumer is pushing to eliminate the filibuster to pass the progressive wish list of electoral non-sequiturs (although a few provisions, like prohibiting the intimidation of election officials, have been added to the Democratic package to address the 2020 post-election fight).

To wrap this push in the bloody shirt of Jan. 6 is opportunistic and irresponsible and can only serve to convince even more Republicans that the outrage over that day is in the service of a nakedly partisan agenda.

Schumer has an uphill climb to convince relatively moderate Democrats Joe Manchin and Kyrsten Sinema to go along with kneecapping the filibuster. If the New York senator were to succeed, he would have blown a hole in the traditional practices of the Senate and set the precedent for Republicans -- should they achieve unified control of Washington in 2024 -- to impose all their own favored electoral policies on the states.

This yin and yang wouldn't do anything to restore faith in democracy, rather the opposite. But Chuck Schumer is on a mission to achieve, and to use, the power to rewrite the country's electoral rules -- justifications and consequences

# COVID antiviral prescriptions will soon be available in Illinois

SPRINGFIELD – Two COVID-19 antiviral treatments will be coming to Illinois in the coming weeks.

The Illinois Department of Public Health announced the Pfizer and Merck treatments are for those with mild-to-moderate COVID-19 and who are at high risk of severe illness.

"Both antivirals will be available by prescription only and should be taken as soon as possible after being diagnosed and within five days of the beginning of symptoms," IDPH said in a statement. "Paxlovid [Pfizer's drug] is expected to reduce the risk of hospitalizations by 89% and

Molnupiravir by about 30%. Molnupiravir [Merck's durg] is meant for use when other treatment options are not available."

"While vaccination, including boosters, is still the best way to avoid infection and prevent severe illness from COVID-19, these new antivirals given emergency use authorization by the Food and Drug Administration can help treat those who get infected and have a higher risk of becoming severely ill," IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said.

The state is coordinating

with pharmacies to distribute the drug around the state.

In addition to the coming medications, people can also be prescribed monoclonal antibody treatments.





# Rural homelessness increasing in Illinois

SPRINGFIELD—More people are
living without a home in rural Illinois
this year compared to last.

During a recent Rural Health Summit, a panel of advocates including representatives from the Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA), Affordable Assisted Living Coalition (AALC) and Supportive Housing Providers Association met to address the growing issue of rural homelessness in Illinois.

The homeless population rose 2% in 2021 compared to 2020 while those without shelter increased 22%, according to data from the AALC, the Southern Illinoisan reported.

Bob Palmer, policy director for

Housing Action Illinois, says homelessness in rural areas often flies under the radar because it's less visible than in urban settings. "Because they're very low-density communities, you tend not to have as

There are also fewer homeless shelters in rural communities, he said.

The homeless population rose 2% in 2021 compared to 2020 while those without shelter increased 22%, according to data from the Affordable Assisted Living Coalition.

"Most people who are homeless in rural areas are probably couch surfing, staying with friends, staying temporarily in hotels or motels or just staying in places where they can't be seen by the general public so it's hard to measure rural homelessness."

Lack of data, particularly timely data, is one of the problems facing those attempting to remedy rural homelessness, multiple advocates pointed out at the summit. And this has been exacerbated by the pandemic.

Factors contributing to homelessness in rural areas include a dearth of affordable housing, fewer economic opportunities and increased cost of transportation, Palmer said.

"Many rural areas in general have higher rates of poverty, have fewer job opportunities, they're struggling with issues like overall population loss so there may be just fewer economic opportunities in a rural community for people to find employment and also find housing that's affordable to them," he said.

The lapse of a pandemic-era fix, the eviction moratorium, has also likely contributed to increasing numbers, according to Palmer.

But he says there are some potential solutions on the horizon.

"On January first, the minimum wage increased to \$12 per hour so we know that's going to help people – minimum wage earners – be in a better position to pay for their housing," he said.

Rental assistance from the state is still ongoing and Palmer hopes to see affordable housing resources passed in the Build Back Better plan next year.

"It would provide more money for housing choice vouchers to help people pay the rent and it would provide more money for the National Housing Trust Fund to build affordable rental homes," he said.

Also included would be money for public housing authorities to make repairs to existing housing.






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# Types of retirement accounts

The ability to retire with financial security is a goal for millions of people across the globe. Though people may stop working in retirement, many of their existing bills, and even some new ones, will still need to be paid. Retirement is often imagined as a time of unbridled financial freedom, but that's only possible when individuals, including young professionals, prioritize planning for the day when they call it quits.

Retirement accounts and plans are a popular way to save for life after working. Individuals have various retirement plan options at their disposal, and each is unique in its own way.

#### **Individual Retirement** Account (IRA)

An IRA is a tax-advantaged way to save for retirement. Anyone with earned income can open an IRA. Money deposited into an IRA cannot be withdrawn prior to account holders reaching 59.5 years of age without incurring a steep tax penalty of 10 percent. There are limits to how much individuals can deposit into an IRA. The Internal Revenue Service notes that the deposit limit for all IRA accounts in 2021 was \$6,000 (\$7,000 for account holders age 50 and over). In addition, there are different types of IRAs, including traditional IRAs, Roth IRAs, Payroll Deduction IRAs, and SIMPLE IRAs. Each has its rules regarding taxes, eligibility and withdrawals, and individuals are urged to discuss which type of IRA is best for them with a financial professional.

# 401(k)

A 401(k) is another tax-advantaged retirement account typically offered through an employer, though self-employed individuals plan. When enrolled in a 401(k) plan, employees will have a portion of each paycheck direct deposited into a long-term investment account. Contributions to a 401(k) are made pre-tax, which saves account holders a considerable sum of money so long as they continue to make contributions. One significant advantage to 401(k) plans is that many employers will match contributions up to a certain percentage. For example, some may match up to 2 percent, so employees who contribute 2 percent or more will actually be depositing no less than 4 percent of their income each week into their 401(k) accounts. Perhaps most beneficial is that employer matches do not count toward the annual 401(k) contribution limits, which the IRS notes were \$19,500 in 2021.

#### **Simplified Employee** Pension (SEP) Plan

An SEP plan is typically established by a small business owner or self-employed individual. However, small business owners can set them up for their employees as well. Contributions to an SEP will reduce taxable income, and the money will grow tax-deferred. Individuals enrolled in an SEP will only pay taxes on the money upon withdrawal. One of the advantages to an SEP is it has significantly higher contribution limits, which the IRS notes were \$58,000 or 25 percent of the employee's compensation, whichever was lower, in 2021. However, SEPs are employer contribution only, so they rely a lot on employers' available cash.

No retirement accounts are the same. Individuals are urged to conduct their own research and choose the plan that best suits their

Availability of assets as well as income level are some additional determining factors. Conventional loans are traditionally 10-, 15- or 30-year notes and will require a certain percentage as the down payment to secure the loan. The bank will determine the down payment requirement, which is typically somewhere between 3

#### and 20 percent. FHA loan

A Federal Housing Administration loan is issued by an FHA-approved lender. These loans are designed for low-to-moderate-income borrowers, according to the financial guide Investopedia. FHA loans require lower minimum down payments and lower credit scores than many conventional loans.

FHA loans also require mortgage insurance up front, plus annually for 11 years or the life of the loan depending on the length of the loan.

A Home Equity Line of Credit, commonly called a HELOC loan, borrows against the available equity in your home to create a line of credit, much like a credit card. It may be possible to use a HELOC to secure funding to make improvements to a home for those who want to flip it as an investment property.





# Explore these college savings strategies

Enrolling in a trade school or college is widely considered the next step after a student graduates from high school. College is especially popular, as the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that 62.7 percent of high school graduates went on to colleges and universities in 2020.

Finding ways to pay for higher education has long been a goal for students and their families. PrepScholar, a college testing preparation resource, calculates that, by 2033, students can expect to pay around \$237,000 at instate public universities and \$464,000 at private colleges or universities for four-year degrees. 529 college savings plan

Four-year schools, community colleges and vocational/trade schools accept 529 accounts as payment sources. The only requirement is that the school must participate in the U.S. Department of Education student financial aid programs. Education savings

# account, or Education IRA

The financial experts at Ramsey Solutions say an ESA works like a Roth IRA but it is designed specifically for education expenses. Individuals can invest up to \$2,000 (after tax) per year,

per child. The account grows tax-free. The rate of growth varies based on investments in the account. Ramsey estimates that at an average return rate of 12 percent on a \$36,000 investment (\$2,000 per year for 18 years) would grow to around \$126,000 by the time the child starts college. An ESA also can be used to pay for K-12 private school tuition, school supplies, tutoring, or textbooks. It also can be transferred to a sibling if the money is not needed for a particular

# UTMA/UGMA plan

This plan is different from ESAs and 529s because it is not specifically designed for college savings. The Uniform Transfer/Gift to Minors Act is in the child's name but is controlled by a guardian until the child

reaches age 18 or 21. This mutual fund account can be used to save for college with reduced taxes, or funds can be used for other expenses, such as a car or housing.

Data from Statistics Canada indicates that consumer prices rose 4.1 percent and 5.3 percent in August 2021 in Canada and the United States, respectively. A 2020 survey from TD Ameritrade found that 47 percent of Americans feel that cost of living is the biggest threat to their financial security and long-term investments. It's worth noting that the survey was conducted prior to the pandemic. Since the onset of the pandemic, cost of living has increased considerably.

Though the fight against a rising cost of living can feel like an uphill battle, individuals can take steps to prepare for such increases.

prepare for such increases. Apply lessons learned during the pandemic. A recent Pew Research Center analysis of U.S. government and Eurostat data found that roughly 9.6 million workers in the United States lost their jobs in the first three quarters of 2020. That period coincides with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. When forced to confront sudden and unexpected job losses, millions of individuals learned how to get by on less income. Cost-saving measures adopted during the pandemic can be continued or reimplemented, helping individuals to combat higher

energy costs and other rising expenses.

• Look for a new job or fresh income streams. Arising cost of living is a concern for people from all walks of life, but it may be especially concerning for retirees or individuals with costs like childcare that can be hard to pare back. In such instances, individuals can look for new a job or fresh income streams. According to the Q3 2021 CNBC | Momentive Small Business Survey, 50 percent of small business owners say it's gotten harder to find qualified people to hire compared to a year ago. And nearly onethird of survey respondents indicate they have open roles they have not been able to fill for at least three months. Individuals can explore local employment opportunities in an effort to find a new, more lucrative job that can help them combat a rising cost of living. Others who want to remain in their jobs can look for part-time work to supplement their existing income.

 Consider relocating The pandemic forced many companies to transition from in office working to remote working overnight. That trial by fire could have lasting results. A 2020 survey of 317 Chief Financial Officers and leaders in the finance industry found that 74 percent will move at least 5 percent of their previously on-site workforce to permanently remote positions after the pandemic ends. The survey, conducted by Gartner, Inc., also found that nearly one-quarter of respondents will move at least 20 percent of their onsite workers to permanently remote positions. That could make it possible for millions of working professionals to relocate to regions with a lower cost of living than their current towns or cities.

The cost of living might be on the rise. But individuals can combat that increase in various ways.

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# Three simple steps to activate your faith

What is faith? And what does it look like to actually live by faith?

These are important questions, because we receive and experience the blessings God has for us through faith.

Hebrews 11:1 says, "Faith is the assurance (title deed, confirmation) of things hoped for (divinely guaranteed), and the evidence of things not seen [the conviction of their reality – faith comprehends as fact what cannot be experienced by the physical senses]" (AMP).

I like to define faith as the hand that reaches out and receives what God

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has for us. By faith we believe what God says in His Word is true, that it's for us, and that we will receive everything He wants to give us. We believe we have His promises before we get them or experience them.

Everyone has faith, but not everyone puts their faith in God. For example, when a person sits in a chair, they have faith that the chair will hold them. People drive to work because they have faith in the traffic laws that make it possible to travel on the roads.

But first and foremost, we need to put our faith in God and the truth of

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the Bible.

Romans 1:17 says, "For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed, both springing from faith and leading to faith [disclosed in a way that awakens more faith]. As it is written... 'The just and upright shall live by faith."

This verse reveals that we're saved by faith and we are created to live by faith. In order to live by faith, we have to release it, and there are three ways we do that: praying, saying and doing.

The Privilege of Prayer

Prayer is the greatest privilege we have! It's amazing that we can personally communicate with Almighty God, the Creator of the Universe. That means we can talk to Him and He hears us, and He wants to talk to us.

One of the main ways we hear God's voice is through His Word, which is why it's critically important for us to study the Bible. When we diligently study the Word, we get revelation of who God is, how He loves us, and what His will is for our lives. We learn how to pray for the things He wants to give us...the kind of life Jesus died for us to have.

James 4 says that people live in strife, quarreling and fighting, because they try to get what they want and they're jealous of what others have, but they



can't make it happen for themselves. Verses 2-3 say, "You covet but cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures" (NIV).

Have you been trying to get something or make something happen and you're frustrated because you can't achieve it? Maybe you're struggling because you're striving to do it in your own strength or you're going after things that aren't right for you or in God's plan for your life.

We need to pray and ask God for what we want, but we need to ask for the blessings He wants to give us. I often pray like this: "God, I'm going to ask You for everything I want, but if I ask for something that's not right for me, please don't give it to me. I really only want what YOU want for me, because You know what's best for me."

# Praying for the Promises of God

There are some situations where we may not know for sure what God's will is, and that's when we need to trust that if we don't get what we think we want, it's because He has something better for us. But there are many things we can ask for with assurance and confident expectation that God will give them because He promises them to us in His Word. Here are a

• You can have peace in every situation (John 14:27; Philippians 4:6-

 You can have God's wisdom for every decision (James 1:5).

• You have the strength, in Christ, to do whatever you need to do (Philippians 4:13).




