

Tech put forward to perform sound study

Land use committee recommends firm to conduct wind project sound study

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CLINTON The county's land use committee voted unanimously on Monday recommend the to county board hire Tech Environmental to conduct a post-construction sound study of the Alta Farms II wind project.

Former zoning administrator Aaron Paque and county board chairman Terry Ferguson recommended the firm in February 2021. Jim Griffin, attorney for Enel Green Energy, told land use committee members on Monday that his company endorsed the selection of Tech for the study.

"We're asking for the committee to recommend approval of Tech Environmental as the consultant to perform the post-construction sound study," Griffin said.

Committee member Aaron Kammeyer said he was in favor of using Tech, citing the company's use of its own, originally-

Local COVID-19 Five county inmates test positive for COVID

CLINTON -Five inmates at the DeWitt County Jail are being treated for Covid-19, said DeWitt County Sheriff Mike Walker.

symptoms. The jail physician was contacted and the inmates were given Tylenol, Walker said. Two days later when symptoms were ongoing, rapid Covid tests were run on the inmates and five were positive.

Walker said finding the tests was a challenge for the department which initially could procure only eight tests. Warner Hospital stepped up and tested all inmates who wanted to be tested as well as all staff, said Walke and only one staff member

tested positive. That person was asymptomatic but has been off work and is quarantined at home.

"We are working with the health department and our medical provider and treating all inmates the same as any of us would be treated," Walker said. "And we are following all health department protocols."

he suspects transporting the inmates back and forth for court hearings may be how the most recent infections originated.

DeWitt County is paid as much as \$40,000 per month to house the neighboring inmates, however, due to this most recent outbreak. Walker is making arrangements to return them to Champaign County. "The money is nice but we are doing what we need to do to keep our people safe."

County reports 447 current active COVID cases

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CLINTON - In his most recent (Jan. 4) COVID-19 update, health department directory David Remmert reported breakdowns of recent cases by town/ county weren't available because of the recent surge in local cases.

The health department reported there were

currently 447 active cases in DeWitt and Piatt counties. Both counties remain on the COVID warning list.

"Active cases are growing exponentially over the past several weeks," Remmert has reported.

The Omicron variant of the coronavirus was first detected in Illinois on December 7, and the local health department

continues to recommend vaccination as the best protection against COVID.

Vaccination for COVID is available through the DeWItt/Piatt **Bi-County** Health Department offices. They are scheduling appointments for 3rd dose/ booster shots, and are also scheduling vaccinations for children ages 5-11. Call for an appointment. In DeWitt Co, call (217) 935-3427 ext. 2141 or in

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

Recipe versus knowledge

elcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Recipes are what they are. Therefore, the chef or cook needs to be a bit better than the written recipe. That is why I harp on the need to learn methodology; basic techniques in cooking.

For example, you wish to create a specific dish to match a wonderful culinary experience at a restaurant. What do you do? You could research and try out hundreds if not thousands of recipes until you found that specific recipe. Or you could ask a real chef. But the chef cannot know the taste from a mere word description. Chefs cannot work the miracles some might expect. There is hope notwithstanding. That hope comes from within you. It comes from you applying culinary knowledge.

This is why I do not waste time parroting off recipes. I teach cooking techniques and practices across the board. If I do use recipes in my columns, it is for two reasons. I either wish to share one that is exceptional and yet rare to find. Or I need one to walk you through the process being taught. By learning methods and techniques, one is able to take a basic recipe and know exactly what changes to make in order to get the desired results. My own experiences might help clarify this.

I love eating in family restaurants. You never know what to expect. I ate at one in Decatur that produced marvelous results. Being an unconventional person, I ordered fried breaded chicken livers and gizzards. It was a taste delight. The livers were comparable to mine. But the gizzards

surpassed any I ever made. I wanted that recipe. But that was not to be; a trade secret. I now had to use my culinary knowledge.

Naturally, I knew well enough how to bread and fry gizzards. But I needed to make the changes to poof them up, tenderize them, flavor them and whatever else needed to achieve my goal. It must have a hint of spice heat, aromatic vegetable blended taste with seasonings and herbs not too pungent. The breading must be nondescript.

I have a good memory for tastes and aromas. My tactile memory from childhood, of my grandmother's bread pudding, allowed me to duplicate it decades after her death. A recipe did exist in her handwriting, but it measured things by "a hand full of this" and "a pinch or two of that". No exact measurements, methods or procedures existed. In time, I got it correct. Now, from my word description above, can you tell what to do about the gizzard challenge? If you say "yes", then you are better than I. To know the desired taste is to duplicate it.

Just following recipes might not produce best results. You need to know how and why ingredients and foods react as they do under various conditions for the desired results. I will walk you through the processes for duplicating that gizzard dish.

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
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Stories, artifacts sought for Prairie Flyers exhibit

CLINTON – Firsthand accounts of wartime sacrifice and a daughter's recollections of her father's career as a TWA pilot are among the stories collected so far for the upcoming C.H. Moore Homestead and DeWitt County Museum exhibit on the county's history of aviation.

Prairie Flyers: A Century of Aviation in DeWitt County shares the stories of those whose lives have been touched in some way by aviation. DeWitt County is home to military and commercial pilots – past and present – as well as mechanics, crop dusters and International Flying Farmers.

Museum director Joey Long is collecting artifacts and memorabilia from families and individuals for the exhibit set to open May 28 and run through July 4. The Carriage Barn just west of the museum will be transformed into a professionally designed exhibit that illustrates myriad elements of local aviation history.

The museum is collaborating with local aviator John Warner and Denis Hambucken, of New Hampshire, a professional historian, author and graphic artist with extensive experience in museum design.

Clinton author and journalist Edith Brady-Lunny is compiling stories for the exhibit.

The exhibit will feature many stories and artifacts from all areas of aviation history.

Anyone with a story or item to share is encouraged to contact Long at the museum. Information may be submitted as a short biography or narrative of an individual's connection to aviation.

Stories collected so far for the community-based project include Vietnam War era helicopter pilots and mechanics and pilots captured or lost in World War II. The experience of growing up with a commercial airline pilot as a father has been shared, along with his uniform and other mementos. Women wholeft their mark as pilots, stewardesses, and ticket agents are also represented.

Is Telehealth all it's cracked up to be?

Medicare started paying for telehealth medical visits last year and will continue through the end of 2023. With telehealth, we sit in our homes and talk to our doctor on a screen, and Medicare pays for it. In the beginning, the number of telehealth visits skyrocketed -- and then fell dramatically. Is that because we learned the hard way just what the limitations of telehealth really are?

There are people on both sides of the "should seniors use telehealth" debate. They both say they offer solid evidence for their opinion.

Those who claim it's a great thing for us to consult with our doctors via a little screen say it's helpful because it keeps us out of the doctor's office. We don't have to go in among all the germs, and we don't need to worry about transportation.

On the other hand, those who are against telehealth appointments for seniors argue that many of us can't even afford the very devices we would need for telehealth. Even if we have a cellphone, the screen is so small as to be



worthless, especially if we have a vision or hearing problem. Then there are the plan fees needed for that device. And what of privacy when we need someone at hand to help navigate the software for us? Do we really want our grandchildren sitting there when we discuss a personal issue with our doctor?

Even if we have a computer, one with a large monitor, how is that going to work when we need the doctor to look at a rash on our back? Or if we really ought to have a stethoscope pressed to our chest because of that ragged cough we've had for days?

Note: If you have original Medicare, you'll pay the same amount for the telehealth appointment as you would if you got the services in person.

Surge of COVID-19 cases stresses Illinois health care

SPRINGFIELD – As omicron surges across the state, Gov. JB Pritzker warned last week that hospitalizations were about as high as they were last winter before vaccines were widely available. About 85 percent of those hospitalized with COVID-19 across the state are unvaccinated. "It is frustrating and tragic that two years into the pandemic, with multiple widely available and free, life-saving vaccines, that we are once again in this horrible position," Pritzker said during a news conference in Chicago.

Illinois The Public Health Department reported 6,294 people hospitalized were with COVID-19 as of Sunday, the most since the pandemic began.

again," A.J. Wilhelmi, CEO and president of the IHA said.

Though hospitals have become accustomed to managing bed capacity and the needs of COVID-19 patients over the course of the pandemic, Wilhelmi said the best way for people to provide relief for health care workers and facilities is to get vaccinated and boosted. More than 19 million have vaccines been administered with about 60 percent of Illinois residents fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Pritzker fears the rise COVID-cases will in continue to increase as the virus incubates in those who were exposed during

the holidays. He urged individuals to get tested as soon as possible.

Pritzker also announced that starting this week, community-based free testing sites will expand operations to six days a week. There is a full list of site locations and times on IDPH's website.



Dr. Ngozi Ezike, IDPH director, said an average of 550 people are being admitted to hospitals each day.

Mail delays prompt VA to extend deadlines

The Department of Veterans Affairs ran into a big snag with a printing vendor and a lot of notification letters to veterans were delayed. But fear not -- the VA is extending your response time.

The Government Printing Office, which provides printing services via contracted vendors, couldn't get out the notification letters dated from July 13, 2021 and Dec. 31, 2021. Some of those letters, which required a response from veterans, could have dealt with required exams for compensation and pension, or for making an election about services or benefits, or more.

Typically, there are problems if you don't respond in time. However, at this point, because of the delayed mailings, the VA isn't going to terminate, reduce or deny services and benefits unless you've been contacted and there's documentation about your right to respond; or the information it asked you for has been received; or the response period has ended.

If you haven't received an expected communication from the VA, call 800-827-1000 to ask about the

status of any letters you should have received. Be certain they have current cellphone, home phone, email and address info for you.

If you've filed an appeal, the Board of Veterans' Appeals also is experiencing significant delays in getting information to you about hearings and decisions. As of last month, the board is figuring up a workaround to get information to you and your representatives. If you're waiting on a notice about a hearing, they'll try any number of methods to reach you. If you have to postpone, call them ASAP. If you're waiting on a decision, ask your rep to access Caseflow to see if your decision information has been included yet.



The Maroons were led by Mason Walker (#3) with 32 points (with 6 3-point baskets) and Brooks Cluver (#12) with 14 points.





This recent deals have been about finessing. In earlier columns, we were trying to avoid them in favor of better alternatives. But this time, we are actually going to take a finesse. Eventually.


N-S take the express lane to 6Ψ and West leads the AQ. You will win that and draw trumps in two rounds, but then what? You have 11 tricks, can you find the 12^{th} ?

This hand appears to depend on a successful Spade finesse and, if the ♣K is with West, then 6♥ makes. But that King is with East on the actual lie

of the cards. Does that mean it's down one? Not at all! Having drawn trumps, Declarer cashes those minor suit winners, and leads a Spade to the *Ace*. Then he crosses back to hand with a trump and leads a Spade towards the Queen. East wins the King but has no safe exit. With nothing left but minor suit cards, whatever he plays will give Declarer a ruff and sluff. Declarer will pitch the Spade loser from his hand and ruff on the board. Making 12 tricks.


Taking the delayed finesse gave Declarer a second way to win. He would still make his slam whenever West had the $\pm K$, and he would also succeed when the King was doubleton with East. But only if Declarer cashes his minor suit winners first, forcing East to concede that ruff and sluff after winning the doubleton King.
