# New security cameras approved for CUSD schools

CLINTON — At its Dec. 21 meeting, the Clinton school board of education approved the purchase of a new security system for its

Board members listened to a presentation from Beck Tech on a new security system that would provide 105 new cameras and new software. The new system will include security inside Lincoln and Douglas schools, something these schools have been without. It will also provide better images and detailed search capabilities.

A \$350,000 grant will pay for the majority of the new security with the school district footing just over \$61,000. Board member John Heinlen said the upgrade is "well worth \$60,000."

The new system will be installed in the summer of 2022.

matter, In another Superintendent Curt Nettles reported that he, along with other superintendents, recently secured a meeting with Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike.

"I will tell you that Dr. Ezike was easy to talk to," said Nettles. "She repeated our concerns back to us so there is

zero miscommunication on what our concerns are and the fact that we would like more local control over what we're

doing."

During the meeting, only board member Chris Hammer wore a mask, despite a state executive order requiring masks be worn indoors by all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to pre-K-12 schools, regardless of vaccination status.

"(Dr. Ezike) is obviously a staunch supporter of masking." said Nettles, but, "she understands our concerns."

# Teamwork in action

elcome to my little corner of culinary delights. You have read in my articles how I have used what I learned in other fields as being applicable in culinary use. I have use medical chemistry, procedures, physics, etc. Many of you, in one form of business or another, may be able to use your training and experience in your culinary efforts. A prime example of that, which has become internationally besides being famous used internationally, is Escoffier's Brigade de cuisine system. This is a classic form of teamwork as defined for kitchen use. It is therefore apropos that it follows the two previous articles regarding groups and teams.

Escoffier is known as the king of chefs. He was the father of the higher form of public dining, the de cuisine of dining. One of his biggest contributions to this higher form of commercial cooking and dining is the "brigade de cuisine system". He got this idea of a brigade system for the commercial kitchen from his stint in the arm forces. In point of fact, his experiences as

a soldier encouraged him to come up with several culinary innovations as well as discoveries. Yes, he was able to use his experiences in one field to better another field of work. And so, he introduced the brigade system to better organize the kitchen duties. I shall now detail and explain this.

There exists in the brigade system five major control areas controlled by five chefs designated to work in and oversee those areas. They are: chef executif, chef de cuisine, sous chef de cuisine, chef de partie, and commis chef. As one can expect from the title executif, This would be the executive chef that is in control of all areas. This chef needs to be the most knowledgeable of all in his or her company. The chef de cuisine is equivalent to the chef executif but with precise duties. That chef has a supervisory role seeing

to it that the commands of the executive chef are carried out and reporting back any difficulties. They see to it that all areas are running smoothly and helps out wherever needed. Therefore, they too must know all culinary procedures. They are often called "head chef".

Because a commercial kitchen is very involved with their work, those chefs responsible for their area of work have not the time to discuss problems for a solution. The sous chef de cuisine works as an intermediary for all departments to ensure that things are running smoothly and efficiently. It is they that relay major problems so others may come to the rescue. They are seen as second in command.

The chef de partie is not one person. It is made up of all the production chefs. These chefs are over one area of production and named accordingly. You can have a pastry chef, soup chef, entrée chef, etc. The commis chef or common chef, is available offer assistance to wherever needed.





# **HISTORY ALMANAC**

1891 - New York's new Immigration Depot was opened at Ellis Island, to provide improved facilities for the massive numbers of arrivals.

# The high-water mark of Biden era progressivism

Joe Manchin and London Breed have nothing in common.

One is an old-school Democratic senator from West Virginia, surviving and thriving in an increasingly red state; the other is the progressive mayor of San Francisco, a city that is a byword for cutting-edge left-wing politics.

Yet both, in their own ways signaled that Bidenera progressivism has reached its high-water mark. Manchin, of course, delivered an emphatic thumbs down to Joe Biden's signature Build Back Better plan, while Breed reversed field on crime in a stunningly frank endorsement of lawand-order in a jurisdiction infamous for the opposite.

The de facto pincer movement by the wildly different Democrats from wildly different parts of the country -- San Francisco is roughly 19 times as large as the biggest city in West Virginia -- shows that the progressive tide that built in the Trump years is finally colliding with political reality and the real-world consequences progressive extravagance.

This doesn't mean that progressivism is spent obviously. It dominates

media, academia and almost all the rest of elite culture. At the same time, Democrats still control the elected branches of government in Washington. But a growing backlash against progressive excess has found expression in two notable acts of Democratic defiance.

By now, the context of Manchin's "no" on Build Back Better is familiar. Joe Biden campaigned as a pragmatic Democrat only to reverse field after his election and develop a heroic image of himself as the next transformational Democratic president in the line of FDR and LBJ.

This drove the mistake of not realizing that Manchin or any other Democratic dissenter in the 50-50 Senate had the power to derail Build Back Better and accordingly scaling it back from the outset. Instead, the White House and congressional leadership acted as if Manchin could be cajoled or bullied out of his oftrepeated qualms.

Perhaps Democrats will reunite with the senator on a scaled-back spending bill in the new year, but the era of FDR fantasies is definitely over. Democrats should ask themselves, if they had a mandate to

remake the country, why the entire project depended on the approval of a single conservative Democrat from West Virginia?

Now, Democrats are looking down the barrel of a mid-term election wipe-out that could give the GOP a durable House majority that will put paid to any thought of BBBstyle legislation for years.

Manchin "enough" to big-spending federal aggrandizement, London Breed said it the soft-on-crime consensus in blue cities that has led to spiraling disorder. The Bay Area, home to the smash-andgrab robbery and other routine offenses against basic human decency, has been Exhibit A.

Concluding that even the tolerant people of perhaps country's tolerant city wouldn't put up with it much longer, Breed had her Howard Beale moment. In a speech clearly meant to set down a political and rhetorical marker, she called for an end to "the reign of criminals who are destroying our city."

The Breed turnabout, police-defunder a year ago to wouldbe Rudy Giuliani now, marks an end to the period George Floyd's death when anti-police sentiment was ascendant. There are other signs

the progressive momentum is beginning to give way. A rightward shift among Latinos shows the limits of paintby-the-numbers identity politics. That the left's response to the grassroots movement against critical race theory in schools has been to deny there is any critical race theory in schools speaks to a telling defensiveness. Next year, the Supreme Court may well knock out Roe and Casey, cornerstones of the progressive social agenda.

Of course, the political and cultural war will continue apace. Still, December 2021 looks like an inflection point when, as Breed put it in her speech, "the bull\*\*\*t" finally got a reality check.







### February

The county reported it was about to contract with Tech Environmental to conduct a sound study of the Alta Farms II wind energy project once the project was completed.

The health department reported it was vaccinating 1,300 residents a week. Residents who participated in the vaccination clinics complimented efficiency of the program.



involved what some board members considered vague passages in the ordinance that could make it difficult to enforce the code in some cases.

## April

The county board voted to suspend issuance of special use permits for 180 days for the Alta Farms II wind energy project. During that period the board planned to conduct a review of the wind energy ordinance. Opponents of the wind project were asking the county to declare the project's special use permit and application null and void.

The Vault teen and community center began "Envision U," a summer career camp in which students were able to explore career paths, such as culinary construction trades, engineering and mechanics.

County board members were caught off guard by the appearance of a "laydown" yard for the Alta Farms II wind project. Some board members said they were frustrated because they didn't know about it. The ordinance did now require a building permit, according to the administrator zoning at the time, and county board chairman Terry Ferguson said plans for the site were included in Enel's application.

Hospital CEO Paul Skowron reported the hospital budget especially challenging during the 2020 period toward the end in May. # Weather History

### January 1

1876: A tornado briefly touched down in Springfield, tearing the roof off a factory and damaging several homes. The iron girders of a steel mill were reportedly bent in half by the F2 strength tornado.

1965: The new year started out very wet in Peoria. 4.43 inches of precipitation was received, making it the wettest January day on record in the city.

1999: A major winter storm paralyzed much of the region, during the first few days of 1999. Snow began falling

across portions of central Illinois before noon on New Years Day, and continued at moderate to heavy rates for most of the following 24 hour period. Areas from Charleston southward also saw the snow mixed with rain or freezing rain at times. Once the snow ended, high winds developed, causing severe blowing and drifting snow and dangerous wind chills. The heaviest snow band extended from near Quincy, to Virginia, then through the Peoria and Bloomington areas to Champaign, where 14 or more inches of snow were common. The weight of the heavy snow caused many roofs and porches to collapse, causing one death and one injury.



### **BRIDGE BITES**

### FINESSES ARE EASY

Of course they are! You just lead towards the AQ or KJ or some such holding, and, when fate is kind, an extra trick materializes. But, if they can, experienced players will avoid the whims of fate, as in this deal.



Both Vulnerable South West North East Pass 3♣ Pass All Pass


West leads the ♥Q, and Declarer can see a certain loser in Hearts and another in Diamonds. So, if 4♠ is to make, then Declarer must avoid losing two Clubs. Any ideas?

One way to play Clubs (after drawing trumps) is to finesse the Ten, hoping

that West has the King and the Queen. That's somewhat unlikely (around 25%). Another possibility is to finesse the Eight, and later finesse the Ten, hoping that West has K9 or Q9. That's a 37% chance. Or, Declarer might run the Jack, giving himself the extra chance that West might neglect to cover with his honor.

Which finesse will you choose? The correct answer is that you don't care for any of these finesses, you much prefer the 100% method! Draw trumps, cash the red suit winners and exit with a Heart (or a Diamond). The defenders can take their Heart and Diamond tricks but now their goose is cooked. If they lead another red card then Declarer pitches a Club loser from one hand and ruffs in the other hand (the so-called "ruff and sluff"). And if they break open Clubs then Declarer will lose only one trick in the suit. Yes, finesses are easy, especially when you can avoid taking them!
