Mendota High School District 280 and Mendota Elementary District 289 will have Friday, Dec. 17 as their last day in 2021, meaning no school next week as originally planned.

Mendota High School will not be having final exams for the first semester, as they were scheduled for next week. Principal Denise Aughenbaugh will be sending out additional information to students and families.

Both Districts will have two days added to the end of their academic years, as a result of this calendar change. Once these changes are formalized by their corresponding Boards of Education, amended calendars will be released.

These changes are being made as yet another intervention during the pandemic in an effort to keep our students, staff and community as healthy as possible. Pritzker enacts milk requirements

He also signed House Bill 106 his office said "creates emergency rulemaking authority for the Secretary of State to extend the expiration dates of driver's licenses, permits, and identification cards" and "makes changes to the Residential Sound Insulation Program."

He also signed Senate Bill 1040, which impacts payments to hospitals that reopen previously closed facilities within certain parameters.

Among the measures remaining on the governor's desk is Senate Bill 2778, which would give school staff the ability to take days off as administrative days, rather than sick days, if it's COVID-related.

School administrators actively opposed the measure.

Peg Agnos, legislative director with South Cooperative Organization for Public Education, told a committee the measure will compound staffing shortages.

"We fear that one of the unintended consequences would be more closures and a reverting back to remote learning," Agnos said during a committee hearing in October.

It was said during debate the Pritzker administration opposed the bill. If he doesn't veto it before the end of January, the measure would become law.

Lawmakers return Jan. 4.

## U.S. traffic deaths hit 15-year high

## □ 30 percent of fatalities are alcohol-related crashes

SPRINGFIELD - Traffic deaths in the U.S. reached a 15-year-high this year and advocates say the trend is moving in the wrong direction.

More than 20,000 people died in crashes during the first six months of 2021, a nearly 20% rise from the year prior. According to Advocates for Highway and Auto Safety, impaired driving plays a big role in many of those incidents

"What we're seeing in Illinois is similar to what's happening throughout the country in that approximately 30% of people who are being killed are in alcohol-related crashes," said Cathy Chase, president of Advocates for Highway and Auto Safety. "That's really a terrifying number when you consider most people know that it's not OK to drive while impaired, and yet people are still doing it."

December is National Impaired Driving Prevention Month, with the holidays providing additional opportunities for

drivers to get behind the wheel while under the influence.

Chase says that, combined with bad habits picked up during the pandemic, are a dangerous combination.

"We know that fewer people were buckling up during that time period," Chase said. "It's a concern of ours is that some people may have gotten used to that behavior and that will continue. There's also a concern that when someone doesn't buckle themselves up, it's possible that they're not buckling up the child passengers properly."

To address the problem, Advocates recommends that states require ignition interlock devices for all convicted drunk driving offenders. Laws to that effect have been enacted in 34 states, including Illinois.

"The problem is that someone has to be convicted of drunk driving [to receive a device], and we all know that there are just

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

Burial will follow at Precinct Cemetery, rural Earlville. Visitation will be from 10 a.m. until the service at noon on Saturday at the church.

Ken was born June 3, 1927 in Sandwich to Wilbur and Frances (Whittaker) Stockley. He married Donna L. Porter on Aug. 10, 1952 in Knoxville, Iowa. Survivors include his wife; one son, Douglas L. Stockley

of Earlville; one daughter, Debra Chatman of Yorkville; two grandchildren, Christine Chatman and Ryan (Jamie) Chatman; two great-grandchildren, Sidney and Oliver Chatman; one brother, Dale Stockley of Earlville; and several nieces

He was preceded in death by one sister, Mary Stockley Kennedy; two brothers, James in infancy and Roger Stockley; and one son-in-law, Sidney Chatman.

Ken attended Dinsmore Country Grade School north of Earlville for eight years and graduated from Earlville Community High School in 1945. He was known by many for his love of flying. He recently told his grandchildren he wished he would have gotten his pilot's license when he was 14 instead of 16 years of age. He bought his first plane at age 16 and sold it a few years later to pay for college. He graduated from Iowa State University in 1951. He was a member of Earlville United Methodist Church and the Methodist Men's Club and served on the United Methodist Foundation. He served his country in the U.S. Army Medical Service Corp during the Korean War. He was a past president of the Earlville Lions Club, the Earlville School District #9 Board, served on the LaSalle County Board, the Earlville Library Board, and the Board of Review for LaSalle County. He was a member of the Mendota Elks Lodge and the LaSalle County Farm Bureau. He was also a Past Master of Freedom Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite Consistory, Mohammed Temple Shrine in Peoria. His first job after college was working for the U of I Extension Service as a farm advisor, then he farmed in the Earlville area for 60 years. Most of all he loved spending time with his family.



## Good pension news doesn't alleviate underlying financial pressures

SPRINGFIELD – The state saw its unfunded pension liability decrease in fiscal year 2021 for the first time in four years, due in large part to investment returns exceeding 20 percent, according to a new report from the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability.

Measuring by the current-day values of the pension fund assets, unfunded liabilities – or the amount of debt the state pension funds owe that they can't afford to pay – dropped by nearly 10 percent, to \$130 billion in FY 2021 from \$144 billion in the previous fiscal year. That put the state's five pension funds at 46.5 percent funded, up from 39 percent the previous year.

It's the best funding ratio since 2008 and only the third decrease to unfunded liabilities in the last 15 years, the last occurring in FY 2017 at 0.5 percent, the other in FY 2011 at 2.9 percent. Otherwise, unfunded liabilities have risen annually from \$42.2 billion in 2007.

But the report also noted that not much has changed to alleviate the underlying financial pressures that have caused unfunded liabilities to triple since the financial crisis of 2007-2008, meaning the good financial news was more anomaly than trend.

The returns of 22.9-25.2 percent for FY 2021, which ended June 30, far exceeded the anticipated 6.5 percent to 7 percent returns, according to the report.

Aside from the good investment news, the report was substantially similar to countless other pension reports in recent years, particularly because it once again called on the state to revamp the much-maligned 1994 "Edgar Ramp" plan for paying down pension debt.

That's the name commonly used to refer to Public Act 88-0593, or the state's 50-year plan to bring its five pension funds to 90 percent funded by 2045.

The actual target for that

ramp should be a 100 percent-funded pension system within the next 25 years or preferably sooner, according to a letter attached to the COGFA report from its actuary, Segal Consulting.

The letter also faulted the Edgar Ramp for "back-loading" pension payments, providing for smaller contributions in the early years leading to the current reality, which sees 20 percent of the state's discretionary spending going to pension payments each year. It also highlighted other times the pension system was shortchanged, including during the tenure of former Gov. Rod Blagojevich.

Only after the target is increased to 100 percent, the report noted, would the state begin to see sustained reductions to its unfunded pension liabilities.

"(T)he funding plan under (Public Act) 88-0593 produces employer (State) contributions that are actuarially insufficient, meaning if all other actuarial assumptions are met, unfunded liabilities will still increase due to the State contributing an amount that is not sufficient to stop the growth in the unfunded liability," according to the report.

But increasing pension payments is easier said than done, Alexis Sturm, director of the Governor's Office of Management and Budget, said in a letter accompanying the report.

She was unavailable for comment, but her letter to COGFA's co-chairs said consideration of changes to the current 90 percent target "needs to be reviewed carefully within the context of the impact on the state's budget."

The \$8.6 billion pension

The \$8.6 billion pension payment in FY 2021 was 20 percent of the state's \$42.9 billion General Revenue Fund budget, and pensions are routinely the state's largest GRF expense outside of K-12 education. In fiscal year 2022, COGFA estimated the GRF payment at \$9.4 billion, or over 21 percent of the operating budget.


FY 2023's Edgar

Ramp-mandated GRF payment is estimated at more than \$9.6 billion, or nearly \$10.8 billion including other state funds.

But, according to the report, if the state wants to contribute at a rate approved by actuaries, it will need to contribute nearly \$14.9 billion in FY 2023, which begins July 1, or 38 percent higher than what is provided for via the Edgar Ramp.

"An increase to the goal

"An increase to the goal would result in higher payments, but eventually lead to a reduction in the unfunded liabilities in the systems," Sturm wrote. "Given the current fiscal pressures facing the state, this too is inadvisable to consider

until Illinois can eliminate the unpaid bill backlog, borrowings undertaken to pay off the debts remaining from the budget impasse and the COVID-driven recession and address the underlying structural deficit."

The backlog currently sits at about \$4.8 billion, according to the website maintained by Illinois Comptroller Susana Mendoza, who said in a public appearance last week that the oldest unpaid voucher was 21 days old.

Still, the 90 percent goal, Sturm said, is "reasonable and achievable," given the circumstances. Gov. JB Pritzker's administration has fully funded the pension system at Edgar Ramp levels in each of his first three years, although he briefly considered lowering the payment in his first year before quickly dropping the plan.

In their letter to COGFA's

director, leaders at the state's "big three" pension funds – the State Universities Retirement System, State Employees' Retirement System and Teachers' Retirement System – all also endorsed the 100 percent funding target and shorter ramps to full funding.

"Earlier funding, in addition to a targeted funding ratio of 100 percent, would make the retirement systems more secure and would substantially reduce financing costs due to interest accruing on the unfunded liability, the primary driver of the state contribution re-

quirements," the leaders of the pension systems wrote.

The report also noted that a pension buyout program initiated in 2018 and extended for three years by the General Assembly under Pritzker created a \$213 million reduction in unfunded liability for FY 2021.

not enough police officers and law enforcement efforts to catch all of the impaired drivers," Chase said. The organization also is

pushing for proactive, passive technology to be added to new vehicles "because if people are going to drive dangerously the vehicle has to have the capability to protect the driver and everyone in the cars," Chase said.

Chase says features like

automatic emergency braking, lane departure warning systems, and forward-collision warnings all could make a big difference. And she says the costs for those features, eventually, could be minimal.

"Just like everything else,

when something is mandatory, by the economies of scale, the costs go down," Chase said. "We've seen that with every safety feature, most recently with rearview cameras. So we want to see those as standard equipment with minimum safety standards."

The organization also is pushing states to lower the legal blood alcohol level to .05%.

They argue doing so could

reduce alcohol-related fatal crashes and injuries between 5% and 10%.

## A justice's religious beliefs

SPRINGFIELD – As the U.S. Supreme Court ponders whether to overturn Roe vs. Wade, all eyes are on Justice Amy Coney Barrett -- and her religious beliefs.

Vanderbilt University Law Professor Suzanna Sherry said recently in The Hill newspaper that Barrett shouldn't ponder abortion cases because her Catholic faith prevents her from rendering an impartial judgement.

It's one of the dumbest arguments I've heard from a law professor in a long time.

Judges aren't interchangeable cogs in a machine called justice. Each views the law through the lens of their own life experiences, knowledge and philosophy.

Personally, I always admired the late U.S. Sen. Paul Simon approach.

The Lutheran minister's son rarely talked publicly about his personal faith, but he lived it.

I remember talking to him years ago when he mentioned having visited former Chicago Alderman Thomas Keane in a federal prison in Kentucky. Kean was there after being convicted of 17 counts of mail fraud and one count of conspiracy in secret land deals.

Newspapers criticized Simon for associating with a convicted felon. But Simon did it because he believed Jesus commanded his followers to visit those in prison.

The senator told me he met so many other former Illinois politicians during that penitentiary visit that it "felt like old home week.'

His approach to faith was void of any sanctimony. But it certainly affected how he conducted himself as a senator. You could also see it in his own personal integrity and how he chose to treat others.

I pressed him once about whether those in public office must ever set religious positions aside to govern others. He said they do. He noted that if they didn't, a Catholic judge could never preside over a divorce case. (Catholic dogma does not allow for divorce.)

In the case of Barrett, law professors have pointed to a law journal article she wrote as a young lawyer about Catholic judges and the death penalty.

In the article Barrett noted that judges are "obliged by oath, professional commitment, and the demands of citizenship to enforce the death penalty," but they are also "obliged to adhere to their church's teaching on moral matters." They are therefore "morally precluded from enforcing the death What's a Catholic judge to do, then? According to Barrett's

article, the judge must recuse herself. She can neither enforce the death penalty and violate her religious conscience, nor fail to enforce it and violate her oath of office.

What does all this have to do with abortion? Barrett tells us in the same article that in the context of abortion the case for a Catholic judge's recusal is even stronger. Unlike the death penalty, the Catholic church's "prohibitions against abortion and euthanasia are absolute.3

On the current abortion case before the court, Professor Sherry says Barrett should recuse herself "if she has any integrity at all.'

The scribes and pharisees would be hard-pressed to produce the level of sanctimony of an outraged American

It's not particularly surprising that Barrett's views on recusal as a 49-year-old Supreme Court justice are different than when she was a young law clerk. It's also worth noting that when an appellate judge chooses not to vote she is still impacting the case by denying her vote to one side or the other. So, in effect, it's not really a neutral stand.

In our democracy, there is a constant balancing between the clauses of the Constitution that prohibit the establishment of religion and those that guarantee the free exercise of it.

Some religious conservatives have bought into the false notion that our founding fathers intended for the United States to be a Christian state. That's a myth. Some of our founders like Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Paine did not identify as Christians. In fact, Paine called Christianity a "fable." Thomas Jefferson used his razor to slice passages out of his Bible that he didn't agree with. That's hardly a conventional approach to scripture.

On the other hand, some secular liberals contend it was the intent of the drafters of the Constitution that matters of faith should in no way inform those governing the nation. This ignores the deep religious beliefs of men like Patrick Henry and Samuel Adams.

So, the tension between the religious and the secular dates back to the beginning of the republic and the Supreme

John Jay, our nation's first chief justice, was president of the American Bible Society.

What did he say of the role of religion and the judiciary: 'Real Christians will abstain from violating the rights of others.'

## **Annexing the Triangle – 1970**

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Dec. 13, 1995.)

After a lengthy council meeting on Dec. 7, 1970, the Triangle was annexed to Mendota. North of the city limits and east of Lake Mendota, The Triangle included both businesses and residences. Three of the businesses had liquor licenses – Vic & Thelma's Tavern, Sam's Steak House and Lakeside Liquor. In order to accommodate these three

licenses, the city had to pass a new ordinance, increasing the number of allowable licenses within the city limits from eight to 11. This was done.

The city agreed to extend the sewer main where necessary, but property owners were required to take care of the cost of running pipe from property to main.

Licenses were \$300 for Class A, \$250 for Class B and \$200 for Class B2.

A meeting was called with the local snowmobile club to set up regulations governing operation of these popular vehicles.

Voting on a new state constitution was Dec. 15, 1970. There were a number of local objectors. An association of county officials urged rejection. There is no limitation on taxing

## The IOC as a craven handmaid of Beijing

It should be a rule of thumb that the Olympic Games shouldn't be held in countries that operate concentration

If this strikes you as a reasonable demand, you aren't suited to serve on the International Olympic Committee. The IOC has doggedly defended Beijing as the host of the 2022 Winter Olympics even as the Chinese Communist Party pursues its campaign of unrelenting barbarity against the Uyghurs.

The Biden administration just announced a so-called diplomatic boycott of the games, a gesture of disapproval that won't dent the propaganda coup the IOC is handing the most dangerous regime in the world. The IOC is the World Health Organization of sports.

When China disappeared female tennis star Peng Shuai for the offense of making an accusation of sexual assault against a former high government official, the IOC happily assisted in the regime's crisis PR, lest the shocking incident derail the games. The president of the IOC, Thomas Bach, had a video call

with Peng where she said all was well and Bach pretended to take her assurances at face value. Of course, Peng wasn't free to speak her mind, but part of Bach's job now is to look the other way at China's blatant abuses.

China has the great fortune to deal with international organizations -- except the Women's Tennis Association, which is suspending tournaments in China -- that lack all self-respect.

The IOC is following in the well-trod footsteps of corporations, financiers and sports leagues that start out wanting to do business with China and end up complicit in the regime's crimes by staying silent or explaining them away.

The difference is that the IOC claims to be acting in support of high ideals. Bach likes to quote the Olympic charter that says Olympism exists "to place sport at the service of the harmonious development of humankind, with a view to promoting a peaceful society concerned with the preservation of human dignity."

Placing sport at the service of China does the opposite on all counts. China's autocrat, Xi Jinping, has been open about the political importance of the Olympics, "Hosting an excellent 2022 Games is a major task of the Party and the country, and it is a solemn commitment to the international community." Here, the interests of the CCP and the IOC -as well as the corporate sponsors of the games -- coincide.

The last time China hosted the Olympics, the Summer Games in 2008, it used the opening ceremony to stage a gigantic and memorable regime-enhancing spectacle. Beijing promised reforms to get awarded the games and then, true to form, engaged in yet more heavy-handed repression.

If the 2008 Beijing Games were ill-advised, next year's Winter Olympics are a complete travesty. The atrocities in Xinjiang province are a matter of public record and the quashing of Hong Kong proceeds apace. No one who crosses the regime is safe from imprisonment or worse. China openly menaces Taiwan with an invasion. Indeed, China could conceivably be in a shooting war with the United States within a year or two of using the presence of our athletes, among others, to enhance the rule of its dictator-for-life.

Bach insists that the IOC must always be politically neutral. As Michael Mazza of the American Enterprise Institute points out, though, the IOC banned apartheid-era South Africa from the games. There is no such thing as neutrality when dealing with an all-encompassing police state for which politics is a life-or-death matter. The games aren't being hosted by Switzerland or Norway -- nice, law-abiding countries with good ski slopes -- but a revanchist power that tramples on human dignity and is a clear and present danger to international peace.

The IOC could have taken an off-ramp from these games at any point. Instead, its attitude is going to be, "Enjoy the snowboarding, never mind the concentration camps.'



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




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OGLESBY - Illinois Valley Community College has extended its tuition payment deadline out more than a month to allow students and parents more time to prepare for the spring semester.

## Meat sticker shock hits as labor shortage continues

SPRINGFIELD - Prices for prime cuts of meat are up by as much as 25% with farmers and consumers taking the hit.

Tom Eikman, owner of Eikman's Processing in Seward, Illinois, a small-sized, third-generation meat processor, said that a shortage of skilled meat handlers and rising costs are plaguing the industry.

'We need those individuals that can take a front quarter of a beef and can break that down into ribeyes and chuck roasts and ground beef. We've been constantly trying to find that labor source and striking out," Eikman said.

Eikman has a theory that many of the longtime guys who did the skilled meat processing jobs retired early because of the pandemic. Workers make \$18 an hour at Amazon. Some are not keen on standing on their feet in icy facilities, lifting 70-pound meat carcasses for less money.

The solution to the labor shortage problem in the meat industry is not simple, Eikman said. He hopes community colleges will teach meat science - not just to people seeking management level jobs. Frustrated employers are also looking to Mexico for blue collar

workers, hoping that the federal government will expand work visa opportunities.

Eikman said he expects high meat prices to continue into next year. Because of big time consolidation, most of the meat in Illinois stores comes from four giant meat processing conglomerates. Mid-sized meat processors who used to provide competition have all been absorbed by the big four.


Big Agriculture dictates the meat prices, Eikman explained. His processing plant could undercut them in the short term and sell steaks below their market rates. However, word would quickly get out and Eikman would run out of the inventory.

So his hands are tied. He has no choice but to fall in line and charge market rates, he argued.

If there were eight giant meat processing conglomerates rather than just four, the situation might be a little better for farmers and consumers, Eikman said. In Southern Illinois, Saline River Processors is setting up a large meat processing plant with the power to compete with the big four. The company hopes to be up and running in the fall of 2022.

"It's become more economical to buy half a beef and put it in the freezer at home," Eikman said. "Then the hard part: There is no labor to do it. So we are in a continual circle."

## Trojans notch 1 win in Colmone Classic

SPRING VALLEY-The Mendota Trojans returned to the hardwood after a twoweek layoff and suffered a 59-24 setback to LaSalle-Peru in the first round of the Colmone Classic on Dec. 7 at Spring Valley. The rust was evident for

the Trojans as they connected on just eight of 40 shots from L-Popened up a 19-3 lead

after the opening quarter. Mendota was able to climb to within seven (21-14) with three minutes left in the first half, but the Cavaliers ended on an 8-0 run to assume a 29-14 advantage at intermission. The count was 45-19 after three periods.

Mendota concluded tournament play with a 46-36 loss to Stillman Valley on Dec. 11.

The Trojans owned a 12-11 advantage after the first-quarter buzzer and then Stillman Valley pulled in front at halftime, 22-21. The seesaw affair went back in Mendota's favor after three periods, 36-35, but then came a disastrous fourth frame for the Trojans. Mendota failed to score over the final eight-minute session while the Cardinals put up 11 points to win by double-digits.

Guzman dropped in three three-point field goals and finished with 11 points, followed by Bond with eight points and Romero with six. Romero gathered in 12 of Mendota's 21 rebounds.

on which they walk.

4. Improves cardiovascular health: The American Heart Association recommends adults get at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity each week. Walking can fit that bill. Walking five days a week can reduce risk for coronary heart disease by roughly 19 percent, according to a report in the European Journal of Epidemiology. 5. Counteracts effects of

weight-promoting genes: Researchers at Harvard Medical School looked at 32 obesity-promoting genes in more than 12,000 people who walked briskly for about an hour a day. Walking reduced the effects of weight-promoting genes by 50 percent.

6. Tame cravings: People who have a sweet tooth can take notice that walking may steer people away from overindulgence. A pair of studies from the University of Exeter found a 15-minute walk can curb cravings for chocolate and reduce the chocolate consumed in stressful situations. Walking also helped to reduce cravings for other sugary snacks. 7. Reduces joint pain:

Walking improves blood flow and helps protect the joints. This can keep people from developing arthritis and other stiffness.

Walking has many health benefits that can support the entire body.





## IVCC dental students hone their skills by offering clinics

OGLESBY - Illinois Valley Community College's Dental Assisting Program will once again offer free/reduced-cost dental clinics for IVCC students, staff and the community.

Clinics are 8 a.m. to noon on Fridays, Jan. 28 through May 6 (excluding Feb. 25, March 4 and March 11) in the Dental Lab (B214).

Screening days for new patients only are Jan. 28 and Feb. 4 and include x-rays, a comprehensive exam, treatment plans and oral hygiene instruction. Recommended treatment will be scheduled.

Treatments are free for IVCC students and employees and qualifying patients are charged \$30. The May 7 clinic is for small restorations at \$25 per restoration.

The clinics do not provide any oral surgery, removable or fixed prosthetics (dentures/ partials), orthodontic procedures or prescribe any medications.

IVCC Dental Assisting students have

terim Dental Infection Prevention and Control Guidance for the COVID 19 Response.

All IVCC faculty, staff, student and volunteering dentist will be following proper CDC guidelines, and wearing the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment.

Patients will be required to fill out a pre-screening form before entering the building, temperature checks at the door, and antimicrobial mouth rinses before treatment begins. Patients must present alone, unless they are a minor.

Dental assisting program coordinator Heather Seghi said, "Our students are excited to start their clinics to hone their skills. They need a required number of patients, so reliable patients are desired as there is not time for rescheduling missed or canceled appointments.

"We do have outside resources for those unable to have the cleaning completed in our clinic, and we are very happy to help in any way we can to ensure they receive the best care," she added.
