### Jan. 6, 2021

All means of snow removal, from a City of Mendota plow to a small snow blower, have been used in the last week as the area saw 2020 go out and 2021 come in with the first measurable snowfalls of the winter season. A mixture of snow and ice put down three to four inches of precipitation during the final week of last year, and then backto-back snowfalls of about two inches each welcomed in the new year.

The Mendota City Council handled several items of business at its first meeting of the new year on Jan. 4. The main topic of conversation was whether or not to increase the rent for Mendota Area Senior Services, which occupies part of the Mendota Civic Center. The city currently charges MASS \$250 per month. The city is proposing

to raise the monthly rent to \$450. MASS is asking that the monthly charge go up \$50 per month in each of the next four years. No action was taken.

It was a year like no other, and one most Americans would just as soon forget, but 2020 is sure to last in the history books as one of the most tumultuous in modern history. It was a year when face masks and hand sanitizer became ubiquitous items of everyday life and when major sporting events that many Americans use to mark the passage of time were canceled or delayed. It was also a year marked by racial and social unrest following the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and other Black Americans at the hands of police. And it was a year of economic catastrophe that brought about some of the highest unemployment rates the nation has seen.

When a new year begins in Illinois, there typically are dozens if not hundreds of new laws going into effect. Not this year. Like so many other things in 2020, the legislative spring session was stunted by COVID-19. Once the global pandemic reached Illinois in March, the General Assembly would meet for only four more days wrapping up the odd session during masked and socially distanced gatherings at the Capitol and Bank of Springfield Center. The fall veto session was scrapped altogether. As a result, only three new laws will take effect on Jan. 1, 2021.

### Jan. 13, 2021

While many people yearn for the sunshine and warmth of spring and summer, the winter season offers up a beautiful array of scenery that elicits the wonderful spectacle of the change of seasons. Lake Mendota allows the geese to saunter about on the ice while still being able to seek refuge on the small bit of still unfrozen water. Statewide Tier 3 COVID-19 mitigations could be lifted within the week. Starting Jan. 15, exactly one incubation period from New Year's Day, any region that has met requirements for a reduction of mitigations will be able to move out of the Tier 3 mitigation plan, Gov. J.B. Pritzker announced.

The grant program for small businesses owners in Illinois who suffered losses during the pandemic has run out of money. Illinois' Business Interruption Grant program was the largest state program of its kind, but only

about 20 percent, or 8,974

applicants, received a grant.

# Jan. 20, 2021

Nine of 11 regions in the state's COVID-19 mitigation plan have seen mitigations lifted in the past week, with two moving all the way back to Phase 4 restrictions. The announcement came as hospitalizations and positivity rates continued to decline and the state launched a contracting effort to increase hospital staffing, adjusting the available bed metrics that determine mitigation levels.

A new full-time member was welcomed to the Mendota Fire Department at the regular meeting of the Mendota City Council on Jan. 18. Brady Rutishauser was sworn in as a full-time firefighter/paramedic by Paula Daley of the Police & Fire Commission. He is the son of the current fire chief, Dennis Rutishauser.

The Internal Revenue Service announced that the nation's tax season will start on Friday, Feb. 12, 2021, when the tax agency will begin accepting and processing 2020 tax year returns. The Feb. 12 start date for individual tax return filers allows the IRS time to do additional programming and testing of IRS systems following the Dec. 27 tax law changes that provided a second round of Economic Impact Payments and other benefits.

The Mendota City Council handled several items of business at its Feb. 1 regular meeting. In aldermanic reports, Jim Fitzpatrick presented a resolution for funding the city's portion of the 13th Avenue resurfacing project. The council approved an expenditure of \$17,000 to repair the sidewalks so they comply with the Americans With Disabilities Act. The Illinois Department of Transportation is hoping to start the process of resurfacing Route 251 throughout the city sometime this year. The agreement between IDOT and the city will be null and void if the project is not awarded by June 1, 2023.

With the start of the Illinois High School Association boys' and girls' basketball seasons this week, each school will have to follow guidelines determined by the Illinois Department of Public Health and the IHSA.

Each school may also determine their own policies that are not mandated by either the IDPH or the IHSA.

The snowy January continued over the past weekend when a storm dumped between four and five inches on top of what was already on the ground in the Mendota area. The heavy, wet snow provided ideal conditions for snowman-building, including one sporting an Illinois Fighting Illini stocking hat on Monroe Street.



Arts are being challenged to better understand the rights and responsibilities they have not only as consumers but also as the owners of their own bodies. Sallee believes that Family and Consumer Science (FCS) is especially important in offering students knowledge about nutrition as well as providing them a perfect opportunity to utilize what they have learned in other subject areas such as biology, chemistry, history, math, psychology, economics and physical education.

The state will soon start ramping up the distribution of COVID-19 vaccines as part of its effort to further limit the spread of the disease. In addition to receiving increased shipments of vaccine from the federal government, the Illinois Department of Public Health announced that it plans to redirect 97,000 excess doses of vaccine from the federal Pharmacy Partnership program, which is in charge of administering vaccines to residents and staff at nursing homes, to make them available to people eligible under Phase 1B of the vaccination program.

Whether it is high taxes, crime, cold winters or a combination of all three, Illinoisans continue to leave the state for greener pastures. A total of 80,000 people left Illinois last year, the seventh consecutive year the state has sustained a net population loss. In the last decade, Illinois has recorded the second largest population loss among U.S. states with West Virginia leading the way.

Gov. JB Pritzker's office says he will propose a budget with no tax increases for the upcoming fiscal year, and the deficit is now projected at about \$2.5 billion less than previously thought.





# March 3, 2021

The Mendota City Council awarded a bid and handled several other items of business at its March 1 regular meeting. Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick announced that four bids were received for disinfection improve-

ments to the city's waste water treatment plant. The low bid from Whittaker Construction of Earlville was accepted in the amount of \$507,150.

Two Republican law-

makers on March 1 unveiled legislation to strengthen internal policies at state-run veterans homes in the case of a disease outbreak, such as the COVID-19 outbreak at the LaSalle Veterans' Home that resulted in 36 resident deaths since the pandemic began. Senate Bill 2251 would require the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs and Illinois Department of Public Health to conduct an on-site visit at a veterans home where an outbreak has occurred no later than the following business day after the home staff or administrator was notified.

This winter, Special Olympics Illinois invites youto "be bold and get cold" at home for the athletes of Special Olympics Illinois. This year's event will be

a Law Enforcement Torch Run Polar Plunge At Home. All proceeds collected by plungers benefit the more than 23,000 traditional athletes and 13,000 Young Athletes of Special Olympics Illinois.

Gov. JB Pritzker said the state expects to be receiving up to 100,000 doses of a COVID-19 vaccine daily by mid-March, up from the approximately 60,000 it is currently receiving on average.



City of Mendota workers Kevin McPheeters and Nick Stremlau fixed a water main leak in the 700 block of Illinois Avenue on March 3. The leak occurred in the stretch of Illinois Avenue that was redone last summer and fall.

More than 3 million COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered statewide as of March 5, and Gov. JB Pritzker announced a new \$10 million public awareness campaign aimed at encouraging residents to get vaccinated. While the governor expressed optimism amid the improving vaccination picture and declining rate of transmission in the state, he said misinformation and hesitancy to receive the vaccine pose potential problems as availability continues to increase.

A new survey of Illinois school districts shows most are continuing to have trouble filling open teaching positions with qualified teachers and even more

On March 14 at 12:07 p.m., the Sublette and Am-

Kessel scaled the back fence and climbed to the second story window, grabbed the child by the ankle and lowered the child down to Wilson, saving the child's life before the window was enveloped in smoke and flames.

Mendota High School students will have a few less COVID-19 restrictions in the coming days. Reporting at the March 18 District 280 Board of Education meeting, Superintendent Jeff Prusator said the rules for social distancing, cafeteria service and temperature checks have all been relaxed by the state.

The Mendota City Council approved several ordinances and requests at its March 15 regular meeting. Also, the council approved a resolution for the annual Sweet Corn Festival street closures in compliance with the Illinois Department of Transportation.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there will be no toy or craft vendors at the 39th annual Sublette Farm Toy and Antique Tractor Show. The event will be held on Sunday, March 21 as a tractor show only.

Another change to Gov. J.B. Pritzker's COVID-19 reopening plan is expected

this week, but it won't be the full reopening initially laid out in May 2020.

The so-called "bridge phase" to reopening can begin when 70 percent of seniors 65 years of age and older have received at least their first dose of the vaccine, according to the governor. As of March 22, that number stood at 64 percent.

The Illinois Department of Public Health announced that more groups of people will be eligible to receive COVID-19 vaccinations ahead of April 12 when everyone over age 16 will

become eligible.





# March 31, 2021

The Mendota Area Chamber of Commerce will be holding the 2020 Sweet Corn Festival Queen Pageant on Saturday, April 3 at 6 p.m. at the Mendota Civic Center. This will not be a public event. Parents of the





candidates will be allowed to attend and Studstill Media will be live-streaming the event. There will be four contestants in the pageant – Kassidy Barkman, Anna Bokus, Bianca Espinoza and Theran Schmitt.

At a special Mendota City Council meeting on March 22, it was announced that the city has come to an agreement with Del Monte Foods to take ownership of approximately 77 acres of Del Monte land plus retention ponds. And the best part of the deal is that Del Monte is paying the city \$3,950,000 to do so.

The Illinois Education Association, one of the largest teacher unions in the state, last week released its third annual state of education report examining attitudes toward public education in Illinois. The poll, conducted by Normington Petts and Next Generation Strategies, surveyed 1,000 different Illinois adults of varying backgrounds and regions of the state by phone or online. One of the main takeaways from the poll, according to IEA, was that nearly 8 in 10 adults believe the COVID-19 pandemic has made teaching and learning more difficult.

Over the past several weeks, the General Assembly has considered various bills on the subject, including emergency rental assistance, lifting the state

ban on rent control, and subsidizing future affordable housing construction in the state.

State education officials made their case for a funding increase above and beyond what Gov. JB Pritzker has recommended, arguing that schools need the additional money to overcome the effects the COVID-19 pandemic has had on student learning.

Gov. JB Pritzker signed into law a measure that expands vote-by-mail and curbside voting for all future elections.



The General Fund budget revenue is anticipated to be \$6,575,815 and expenses are proposed to be \$6,673,465 for a deficit of \$97,650. Monte paid the city \$3.95 million for the deal.


Towing attempted to resolve the sticky situation. The viaduct was closed to traffic for several hours.




Illinois is now in Phase 5 of the COVID-19 reopening plan, meaning businesses and organizations can


