# Illinois jobless rate falls to 5.7%

☐ Hospitality, trade sectors post biggest gains

SPRINGFIELD—The unemployment rate in Illinois fell three-tenths of a point in November to 5.7 percent as employers added 19,500

payroll jobs to the economy.

Preliminary data released by the Department of Employment Security and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics showed the biggest job gains during the month were in the leisure and hospitality sector and trade, transportation and utilities, with each adding an estimated 8,200 jobs. The construction industry added 3,800 jobs.

Those gains were partially offset by job losses in professional and business services, which was down 5,500 jobs, and the category known as "other services," which was down 200 jobs.

"Today's report reflects the continued positive trajectory of Illinois' economy," Deputy Gov. Andy Manar said in a statement. "IDES remains dedicated to connecting employers and jobseekers to build a stronger



workforce across the state."

The jobless rate in Illinois was 1.5 percentage points higher than the national rate, which stood at 4.2 percent in November. That was down four-tenths of a point from the previous month.

Compared to a year ago, when the state's jobless rate stood at 8.1 percent, employers have added back 230,200 jobs, with gains across nearly all major industries. Over the year, the leisure and hospitality industry, which was hit particularly hard by the pandemic, has added back 94,200 jobs while trade, transportation and utilities have added back 41,600 jobs.

The financial activities industry, which is down 1,100 jobs from November 2020, is the only industry sector to lose jobs over the year.



# IEA calling on schools to comply with safety laws

SPRINGFIELD —Illinois Education Association (IEA) President Kathi Griffin is calling on school districts that are not adhering to Illinois school safety laws to immediately comply. Griffin also announced Rep. Fred Crespo (Hoffman Estates-D) and Rep. Tony McCombie (Savanna-R) are working with the IEA on legislation to track which school districts are not in compliance with Illinois' laws.

"What happened in Michigan two weeks ago is a tragedy. Every incident where someone in a school is injured at the hand of another is heartbreaking," said Griffin. "Violence is increasing in our schools across the state. Our

educators should not have to constantly worry about their safety and the safety of their students. This is not their problem to solve. They're under enough stress already. School administrators need to take immediate action to keep our students, staff and communities safe."

In 2019, the Illinois Education Association initiated, and the state legislature passed, the School Threat Assessment Bill, House Bill 1561 (HB 1561).

The law does several

• Instructs schools to develop a threat assessment team and a threat assessment protocol.

- Expands the use of the 1-cent county sales tax to include school safety improvements, school resource officers or mental health professionals, or allow a district to issue bonds, borrow money or find other ways to pay for the similar needs.
- Requires school districts to implement a threat assessment procedure that may be part of a school board policy on targeted school violence and prevention, which must include the creation of a threat assessment team made up of specific people.



## Paw Paw School Board discusses tax levy, seeks input for planning

PAW PAW - Prior to the Dec. 14 regularly scheduled meeting, Jennifer Warrenfeltz, Principal/Superintendent-Intern, presented an explanation on how the tax levy works. Taxing bodies usually request more than they expect to receive because final assessed valuation figures are not available when the tax levy must be approved.

Three years ago, there was a transition as new wind turbines were being installed. The assessed valuation of the turbines declined, and this caused the tax rate for the school district to go up to \$6.73. The following year the tax rate went down to \$6.63 as the district benefited from most of the new wind turbines being installed. Last year the rate went down to \$6.51 as the final new wind turbines became operational. Based upon current as-

sessed valuation figures from the County Assessor, it is anticipated that next year's tax rate will be around \$6.40. Since the levy request this year is not more than 5 percent, the school district was not required to publish a notice or schedule a hearing. The board decided to publish a notice and schedule a hearing anyway in an effort to be as transparent as possible. The property taxes paid

by members of the community are determined by two variables, the assessed valuation of the property and the tax rate. As previously mentioned, the school district administration anticipates that the tax rate should be lower for taxes to be paid in 2022. Changes in the assessed valuation of property will vary

from property to property.

In other discussions, appreciation was extended to Lisa Tavitas, Title I teacher, for the extra assistance she has given in various capacities throughout the school. Likewise, appreciation was expressed to Kim Siemers, Instructional Coach, for taking on extra duties.

It was announced that the state is no longer providing masks for our students. They have given small ones for the younger grades, but those are too small for the middle grades. Extra masks are, necessarily, being purchased.

An intruder drill was conducted Dec. 13 with Deputy Kyle Kellen of the Lee County Sheriff's Department. He complimented students and staff on their proficiency and mentioned that it was much improved from his last observation two years ago.



## Illinois ranks last for tax friendliness with 'no end in sight'

SPRINGFIELD – High state income, property and sales taxes put the Land of Lincoln dead last in a tax-friendliness ranking for middle-class Americans, coming in behind states like New York and New Jersey.

Illinois has a 4.95% flat state income tax rate and a 6.25% state sales tax with another 4.75% in local taxes added in some areas. The ranking comes from Kiplinger, a business forecasting and personal-finance publisher, which calculated Illinois' average combined state and local sales tax rate to be 8.83%.

Venture capital expert, lawyer and economic commentator Mark Glennon, who is also the founder and executive editor of Wirepoints, a market research organization, said Illinois' position at the bottom comes as no surprise.

"We've been consistently ranked at or near the bottom for a long time; the primary culprit is property taxes in Illinois and those hit the middle class very hard," he said.

Illinois' high tax rates are a result of politicians mishandling money, according to Glennon.

"It's ultimately a spending problem," he said.

Unlike other states, Illinois hasn't used recent federal windfalls wisely to bridge gaps like the gaping hole in its unemployment trust fund, which Glennon said policymakers ignored.

"Illinois has just announced new program after new program," he said. "As soon as that federal spigot shuts closed – and it will – Illinois is going to be back in the same suit that it was."

One large area that could save Illinoisans money if reformed is the rules that municipal governments have to follow for negotiating labor contracts, according to Glennon.

"We have particularly onerous rules that essentially force everything into collective bargaining and arbitration if there's any difficulty, and the outcome of that is consistently that the municipalities lose and organized labor wins," he said.

Pointing to IRS migration data, Glennon said the effect of the Prairie State's exorbitant tax rates is people of all income groups are leaving Illinois for greener pastures, with states like Florida, Texas and Tennessee reaping the benefits.

"Middle-class people are obviously tending to pick places with better job prospects and lower taxes," he said.

And he said there is no end in sight for this problem.

"There's no prospect of a solution in sight because the politicians are not even working on any solution," he said.

- Calls for each district to review each school building's emergency and crisis response plans, protocols and procedures and the make-up of its team.
- Requires each district's assessment team to include mental health professionals as well as representatives from state, county and local law enforcement agencies.

The IEA is now partnering with Crespo and McCombie to sponsor new legislation that will ensure school districts are complying with the requirements in the School Threat Assessment law.

"Keeping schools safe, free of violence, making sure that students have a learning environment that is welcoming and open to all is paramount to having a strong school community. A strong school community leads to a strong community, overall. This legislation was meant to bring a similar assessment plan to districts across the state – no matter the size – and this leads to a better Illinois," Crespo said.

"Ideally, in a situation like what happened in Michigan, the threat assessment team would have been called upon and intervened to get the student the help they need before tragedy occurs. That's the intent of these laws," McCombie said. "The children of our state are our most important asset. We must ensure threat assessment plans are not only created, but also followed to keep our students safe."

Griffin also issued a reminder to school districts advising they can use Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds to hire more staff to address mental health issues students may be facing.

"We need to make sure we are doing everything we can from a security standpoint, but also we need to make sure we are addressing the trauma that our students are going through," Griffin said. "The pandemic is causing additional trauma for many Illinois families. We need to recognize that and do what we can to help."

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# Ill. State Fire Marshal advises residents to keep CO detectors in working order

SPRINGFIELD - The Office of the State Fire Marshal warns residents across the state to pay special attention to the distinct signals sent by carbon monoxide alarms when their life has expired. Frequently, people may believe that a beep coming out of their CO means it's time for a battery change, when in fact it means that the device needs to be

replaced.
"It is extremely important to pay attention

portant to pay attention to the different beeps that come out of a dead CO alarm. We want to ensure that our residents understand the difference in order to take immediate action and prevent a tragedy," said State Fire Marshal Matthew Perez. "Carbon monoyide is known to the company of the c

"Carbon monoxide is known as the silent killer. The replacement of dead carbon monoxide detectors is also a life saver."

Since January 2007, it has been an Illinois law to have a properly functioning CO alarm in all dwelling units. The law requires that detectors must have battery power as the primary or secondary power supply. They cannot be solely electric powered. Many carbon monoxide detectors now in service were made prior to the incorporation of the new requirements and may not have an end-of-life signal.

Carbon monoxide is the number one cause of poisoning deaths in the nation, claiming approximately 300 lives a year, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Because CO is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas, it can kill people before they realize its presence. It can be produced by gas or oil appliances such as furnaces, clothes dryers, water heaters, ovens, space heaters or, in some cases, by fireplaces and wood-burning stoves.

OSFM advises consumers that if their

CO alarms were manufactured before August 2009, prior to the incorporation of the new requirements, they may not have the end-of-life feature. In addition, residents who have a carbon monoxide detector installed for more than three years should look for the manufacturing date, which may be found on the outside back of the alarm or visit the company's web-

site for further information. If none can be found, the device should be replaced without any hesitation.

Carbon monoxide alarms should be

Carbon monoxide alarms should be tested every month by pushing the test button. If the alarm goes off, follow the

basic steps:If your CO detector activates,

evacuate everyone from your home immediately leaving the door open for ventilation on your way out and then call 911.
• Do not re-enter until

experts have investigated the problem and declared it safe to return. Other important tips:

• Ensure that house-

hold appliances are installed and running correctly. Have a professional technician

blockages, corrosion, debris and faulty connections.

• Check appliances in the home that use natural gas, oil, wood and kerosene such as water heaters, clothes dryers,

check fuel-burning appliances, furnaces,

chimneys and vents at least annually for

- ranges, ovens, gas-powered refrigerators and pilot lights.

   Never operate unvented fuel-burning appliances in a room with closed doors or windows or in rooms where people
- Check venting systems to the outside for cracks and blockages such as flues, chimneys and fireplaces.
- Make sure space heaters are vented roperly.Never operate generators indoors.
- Never burn charcoal inside a home, garage, vehicle or tent.
  Never use gasoline-powered tools
- and engines indoors.Never use gas-powered appliances
- such as an oven or clothes dryer for heating a home.

- attached garage, even if the garage door is open.

So, what did my new bride do? She enlisted the support of my mother.

And suddenly, I'm hearing it in stereo: "A child needs to experience wonderment at Christmas and you are denying it."

The look of disgust from the woman who birthed me and the one who gave birth to my child was enough to make eggnog curdle.

I caved.

And our baby Gracie and her two future sisters were taught that Santa was real.

And, yes, they experienced wonderment at Christmas. And my wife and mother were pleased. And, no, none of our daughters ever cross examined either of us about the existence of Santa. (That doesn't bode well for us

having any future reporters in the family.)

But speaking of reporters and Santa, my issues with
St. Nick have only grown during my 33 years in the
news business.

Back when I was a young reporter at the Quad-City Times, I decided it would make for a fun feature story to write about what it's like to be Santa.

So, I dressed up in the red suit and cap, attached a beard with an elastic strap, and watched hundreds of kids line up to sit on my lap at the Davenport, Iowa, public library.

I was told the key to being a good Santa is being

noncommittal, which, by the way, is also the secret to being a good politician. Whenever a youngster wiggling on my knee reeled

off their wish list, I would say something like, "Be good and I'll see what I can do."

And then, a little girl crawled on to my lap. I asked, "What do you want for Christmas?"

She looked me in the eye and replied, "I want a new dad. My old dad left, and my mom is really lonely."

I looked into her hopeful eyes and sputtered. I finally

said, "There are just some things beyond Santa's power."
The next day the top editor of the paper wandered over

to my desk and suggested I stick with the "hard news" stories and leave the human-interest features to others. Several years after that was by far my most trauma-

tizing Santa experience. I was writing about homeless children for the Las Vegas Sun.
I quoted an 8-year-old boy saying, "I don't know if

Santa will know where to go this year. We keep moving every week. I guess I've been good. I go to sleep on time every night."

Although I turned the story in several days in advance,

the editor didn't get around to reading it until 45 minutes before deadline.

He wandered over to my desk, "Is this kid kind of

slow? Eight seems awfully old to believe in Santa. Go find out if he thinks Santa is a real person or an idea."
Huh? Within 45 minutes?

I've been asked lots of questions, mostly good, by

editors throughout the years. But this is without a doubt the dumbest.

I found myself racing across Las Vegas on deadline to

a school that served the homeless. I talked the principal

into calling the boy into the office.

When the perplexed youngster entered the office, I dropped down on my haunches and asked, "Richard, do

you think Santa is a real person or just an idea?"

He gave me his answer and I found myself barking into a telephone receiver minutes before the presses

began to roll, "He says, 'Santa is real!'"

Yes, Santa is real, not just in the hearts of all good

# The year in review – 1982

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Dec. 18, 2002.)

Once an objective is achieved or a problem dealt with, the time frame is sometimes forgotten. An interview with Mayor Ken Roling pinpointed certain events in 1982 – 20 years ago.

In January 1982, the bridges on First Avenue and Monroe Street were reopened after being "brought up to capacity." They had been closed when cited by the Illinois Department of Transportation as "below capacity" for the loads that crossed them.

The issue as to whether or not to

ban liquor in certain areas of the Lake Mendota grounds was debated in city council meetings for several months. In April, the matter was put to a vote, resulting in a 4-4 impasse. Mayor Roling cast the tie-breaking vote. His decision against establishing an area in which liquor would be banned was based largely on a police department commitment to increase patrols at Lake Mendota as well as near taverns at closing time. In 1978, there had been only six liquor-related arrests at Lake Mendota, in 1979 none, in 1980 two and in 1981 none. At this time in 1982, there had also been no arrests at Lake Mendota.

In February, representatives of Osco and Hornsby met with city officials to discuss a possible shopping center on Washington Street, west of 13th Avenue. It was stated that about 35 percent of shoppers were doing their shopping out of town. It was believed a shopping center in Mendota would bring them back. In December, the matter had not yet been decided.

In March, the city accepted a 20-channel cable system, for which the current \$9 fee would be frozen for three years, until December 1985. In April, ground was broken for a new fire station on Main Street, between Fifth and Sixth streets. A BMX track was dedicated at Lake Mendota in May.

In June, arrangements were made to lease Illinois Central Gulf property on Main Street for parking, at \$200 per year. An increased cost of \$35,000 for operating the sanitary system in 1980-81 led to an increase in water rates. Those

rates were the only source of income for the system.

In July, many residents were angered that the city had signed a contract to pave over the last brick street in town. The work proceeded, despite the protest. August found Mendota busy with the Sweet Corn Festival. September and October saw repairs to U.S. 34 completed. In November, plans were being worked out to rid Lake Kakusha of sunfish and restock it. During December, plans for racquetball courts in the old fire station on Sixth Street were going forward.

Mayor Roling have a year-end assessment –

"I think we're at the point where we have financial control. We're doing things without digging into peoples' pockets, and that's what I'm really proud of."

With the opening of the new fire station on Main Street, the city accepted bids on the old building on Sixth Street. The lone bidder at each of the two offerings was Tom Kindler. His first bid was \$3,310, his second was \$6,620. While the site was being discussed for possible parking, the building had been appraised at \$17,000 and cost of removal estimated at \$9,000. Kindler's bid included making the building "safe and usable" and opening three racquetball courts. The courts would not compete with any other existing business. The city would have 24-hour access to the street light panel, located in the building. Renovation is to be completed

this year.

Dan Maman Ol

Rep. Myron Olsen of the 70th House District, or his aide, would hold office hours in the municipal building, the fourth Thursday of each month, starting Jan. 27, 1983.

The Dec. 14 visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile in 1982 marked the first use of lightweight lounges, much easier unload and reload. Earl Waldorf and Lucille Jacob were 10-gallon donors that day. There had been 126 donors, 15 of them first time. The Optimist Club took care of loading. Nine volunteer nurses were coordinated by Dr. Robert Patterson.

Members of Camp Fire groups entertained residents of Mendota Lutheran Home, Heritage Manor and the Hi-Rise. They also made ornaments and decorated the tree in front of the VFW Post home, with a Christmas party there to top off the day.

An Audrey Lawrence profile for the Chamber of Commerce featured the 11th Street Nursery. Their landscape design service planted trees and shrubs, also keeping them trimmed. Bob Hagemann, his wife, Lorraine, and son, Dale, kept the business going. They reported having some success in rescuing ailing trees.

Dan's Food Mart, at the junction of U.S. 51 and U.S. 34, advertised cigarettes at \$6.69 per carton plus 29-cent tax.

The Elks advertised a New Year's dinner dance at \$20 per person or \$12 per person for dancing and drinks after 9:30 p.m.

A few of the clubs around town having Christmas parties in 1982 were Jolly Country Club, Idylle While Neighborhood Euchre, West End Club and Happy Eight Club. \*\*\*

The Hi-Light named a few of the staff responsible for custodial chores at MHS – Beryl Fox, Fred Radefeld, Ed Scott. They worked three eight-hour shifts. Serving in other non-academic capacities were John and Barb Radke and Mr. and Mrs. Bott.

Brownie Troop 237 visited Heritage Manor where they sang and delivered hand-made candy canes to the residents. Among the recipients that day was Miss Ethel Hickok, niece of the well-known Wild Bill.

So, when it was decided in the precincts of fashionable opinion that the term "Latino" would be retired in favor of "Latinx," one could have been forgiven for thinking that this hideous neologism would, like so much else in American life, go from a fringe cause to mainstream soon enough.

But a funny thing happened on the way to the Latinx ascendancy -- Latinos have rejected the term, at the same time that a big swing toward the GOP among these voters has highlighted the perils of high-handed cultural politics for the Democrats.

Latinx may end up being a woke experiment that failed,

showing the vast gap between the identity-politics-obsessed progressives earnestly talking to one another in seminar rooms and on social media and the Hispanics in whose name they presume to speak.

Latinx is a project out from the same cloth as the endless

Latinx is a project cut from the same cloth as the endless extension of LGBTQ, which, as of this writing, is now more properly and comprehensively rendered as LGBTQQIP2SAA.

The alleged problem that Latinx was invented to fix is that is Spanish has gendered nouns. This means that using the male Latino as an adjective to describe men and women of Latin American ancestry, let alone transgender and non-binary people, is supposedly exclusionary, hateful and downright dangerous. As a handbook on the terminology by a Princeton scholar explains, "To default to the masculine gender promotes interpersonal violence against women and non-binary individuals."

Latinx rose from the ashes of its predecessor neologism Latin@, an attempted amalgamation of the -o at the end of the Latino and the -a at the end of Latina. But no one knew how to pronounce the word. It was deemed insufficiently woke because the "o" was supposedly graphically dominating the "a" (yes, this is how some people think). And it

caused confusion on social media where the at sign is used to tag someone.

Enter Latinx, which is only slightly less ridiculous.

As Giancarlo Sopo of The Daily Wire, who has been on a one-man crusade against the rise of the term, points out, Latinx is incomprehensible to any Spanish speaker without some knowledge of English. Most Spanish-speakers don't think there is something desperately flawed about their language, or that Spanish grammar is a proto-hate crime. The Real Academia Espanola, Spain's official institution charged with maintaining the integrity of the language, has ruled against the -x appendage.

Out in the real world, "Latinx" polls even more poorly than Joe Biden does. A Politico poll found that only 2% of Hispanics prefer the term, while 68% opt for Hispanic and 21% favor Latino or Latina. The term is considered offensive to 40% of respondents and 30% said that they are less likely to support a politician or group using it.

Pen Puber Gallago, an Arizona Democrat, tweeted in

Rep. Ruben Gallego, an Arizona Democrat, tweeted in reaction to the poll that he forbids his staff from using Latinx in official communications. "When Latino politicos use the term, it is largely to appease white rich progressives who think that is the term we use," he wrote. "It is a vicious circle of confirmation bias."

Still, elite media outlets and other institutions susceptible to progressive influence, as well as many elected Democrats, have dutifully defaulted to the term. It's one thing if an individual prefers to be called Latinx (or, the even more cutting-edge Latina/o/x or Xicanx), it's another thing to apply the term to a large group of people who have no interest in being called a name that makes no sense to them.

The pushback is a heartening sign of the limits of elite cultural power, and of the lack of interest of most Latinos in being pawns in the ever more strained and obscure progressive politics of perpetual victimology.


not seeing your smiling face and not saying, 'Good morning, Jim!" said director of purchasing Michelle


"I really enjoyed it here and I'm going to miss you all so much," he told the assembled staff. "Keep on doing what you're doing - you're good at it."



Q: How is Michael J. Fox doing since he was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease years ago? Will he ever return to television? -- **R.V.** A: Michael J. Fox became

a household name when he played Alex P. Keaton on the hit NBC sitcom "Family Ties" and transitioned into movie-star status with the film "Back to the Future." At age 29 he was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, a neurodegenerative disorder that usually strikes in middle to advanced age. Fox didn't go public with his diagnosis until seven years later, after he felt pressure from the paparazzi. Fox eventually returned to

acting with recurring roles in prime time shows like "Rescue Me," for which he won an Emmy; "Curb Your Enthusiasm," where he played a version of his real-life self; and "The Good Fight" and "The Good Wife," where he played an attorney who used his Parkinson's symptoms to his advantage.

He's written four books, including his most recent memoir, "No Time Like the Future: An Optimist Considers Mortality." I would imagine that Fox, now 60, is most proud of what The Michael J. Fox Foundation has done for research.

Eighty-eight cents of every dollar the organization earns goes to research programs for Parkinson's disease. You can read more

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
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
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# Two keys to enjoying your life every day



# Dairy farmers could see \$20 milk in 2022

#### By DANIEL GRANT FarmWeek

Dairy farmers who endured paper-thin margins in recent years have reason for optimism in the year ahead.

USDA's current price projections for 2022 surpass the \$20-mark (at \$20.25 per hundredweight) for all milk, with Class IV and Class III average price estimates close behind at \$18.70 and \$17.75, respectively.

If realized, the price increases for the three milk classifications would range between 80 cents and \$2.70 per hundredweightabove USDA's November 2021 estimates.

"There's reasons to finally be upbeat in dairy," Dan Basse, president of AgResource Company in Chicago, said recently at the annual Agricultural Bankers Conference. "It's taken us eight years to get back to where we were in 2014 (if milk prices surpass \$20)."

Basse estimates Class III and IV milk prices could reach as high as \$21 to \$23 next year, driven by surging demand, a possible smaller supply and inflationary pressure.

Longer-term, a proposed shift in ag policy in the European Union could shift the EU market from a net exporter to net importer of dairy.

"World demand for dairy products remains strong, Basse said. "I believe exports are the bullish driver of the

The U.S. exported an alltime high of 16% of milk solids produced nationwide in 2020. And, exports so far this year,



from January through September, bubbled a whopping 14% above last year's record pace.

"As we head into 2022, we'll have another record year for dairy exports," Basse said. "One of the bigger buyers is China. They use a lot of whey as a milk replacer for piglets."

U.S. dairy cow numbers increased 2% from 2020 to July 2021 to 9.5 million head. But, Basse believes the yearly total could decline due in part to strength in the beef market, with slaughter up 14%.

"U.S. dairy cow slaughter has been elevated. Cull prices have been strong," Basse said. "That's a big margin enhancer for dairies.'

But what effect will price inflation have on demand for dairy products and beef?

"Inflation is not going to be leaving us any time soon. I think it will be around at least the next 12-18 months," the analyst said. "There's no indication of protein switching. World demand for dairy products remains strong."

That includes surging demand for cheese and butter, with global butter demand growing at a 7% clip.

"U.S. butter supplies are ample. It's an export opportunity now," Basse said. "World butterprices have been rising."

Price inflation also represents one of the biggest risks for the dairy industry heading into 2022, as well, with feed costs near historic highs.

"We're bullish for the milk market. But, my biggest concern is the price of feed. It could be the Achilles heel of the dairy industry," Basse said. "It's how you manage risk. Lock up profitable margins.'

Potential growth in the dairy industry also could be squeezed by processing bottlenecks.

"We're almost at maximum (milk processing) capacity," Basse said. "We need more capital and investment."

Overall, Basse believes farmers are in the midst of a commodity supercycle that could last 2-3 years.

# Climate Change EGLOBAL WARMING

USDA releases adaptation & plan to address climate change threats

## By TIMOTHY EGGERT

A changing climate poses a serious threat to American farmers and the future growth of agricultural productivity.

That's one of five topline conclusions listed in a 40-page climate adaptation and resilience plan released by USDA.

"We are operating in new territory, and the changing climate creates immense uncertainty and threatens the resilience of the American agriculture and forestry sectors," Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack wrote in the plan.

Not only does climate change have a direct impact on a producer's ability to plan and manage risk, it has wider impacts on the natural systems we rely on to support production of food and fiber, keep our waters clean, and maintain cultural resources," he wrote.


The department's plan released alongside plans from 23 other federal agencies - dovetails a 90-day progress report published in May detailing recommendations for a climate-smart agriculture and forestry strategy.

Both follow executive mandates from President Joe Biden directing and codifying a whole-of-government approach to addressing climate change.

The threat to agricultural productivity, according to the department's plan, stems directly from changes in temperature and precipitation patterns, increased pest and disease pressures, decline in pollinator health, reduced crop and forage quantity and quality, and infrastructure damage.

It also can be vulnerable to impacts to water supply and increased frequency and intensity of extreme weather events, the plan reads.

Other than crop and livestock production suffering from climate change, soil quality can decline, pest and diseases can spread more easily and pollinator health can deteriorate, the plan warns.



"Even with some adaptation actions taken by producers, climate change could lower domestic production of major commodities, leading to higher prices, higher premiums and, consequently, higher (Federal Crop Insurance Program) subsidies," the plan reads.

To address those vulnerabilities, the department intends to:

- Increase implementation of on-farm adaptation strategies and practices. Support active land-

## Application period open for 2022 Cover Crop Program

SPRINGFIELD-Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) opened the third year of the Fall Covers for Spring Savings Program on Dec. 15. Applications are available at https://www2.illinois.gov/ sites/agr/Pages/default.aspx. Funding of eligible acreage will be on a first-come, first-

Due to the program's success 100,000 acres are available for 2022, up from 50,000 the previous growing season. In 2020, the 50,000-acreage allotment was met in 12 hours and a total of 185,000 acres were requested by the time the application period ended.

The program is applicable for acreage in Illinois planted to cover crops in the fall of 2021 that will be planted to an insurable crop in 2022. Eligible applicants receive a premium discount of \$5 per acre on the following year's crop insurance for every acre of cover crop enrolled and verified in the program.

Applicants will be required to certify that their cover crops are approved through their local Farm Service Agency office before applying. Applicants will also need their current FSA-578 and federal crop insurance policy number(s) for the 2022 application process.

The discount program was designed to promote additional acres of cover crops that are not covered by other state or federal incentives. IDOA will use a United States Department of Agriculture Risk ManagementAgency (USDA-RMA) crop insurance program. Confirmed applications will be forwarded to the US-DA-RMA for processing and for application of premium discounts to 2022 crop insurance invoices.
