State champions

Byron football team goes undefeated, wins Class 3A title

DeKALB – In the end, there was just no stopping the Byron High School football team.

During the 2021 season many had tried, but all had failed. And that includes Tolono-Unity, who met Byron in the IHSA Class 3A Championship game on Nov. 26 in DeKalb. The Tigers sent a message early and never let up, winning the state championship

"I am just so proud of all of these kids and all of the hard work that they have put into this program," said Head Coach Jeff Boyer. "Their hard work paid off and they have made a lifetime of memories."

And what memories: The win not only sealed the championship for Byron, but also a perfect - and dominant season. The Tigers were 14-0 overall, and 9-0 in the Big Northern Conference. The team

scored 587 points on the season and gave up just 149.

Making it this far was

not new for the Tigers. Byron also made it to the championship game in 2019 but fell to Williamsville 46-42.

That was not going to happen this year.



The Tigers came out strong, with Senior Ethan Palzkill scoring on a 32yard pass from Braden Smith early in the game. Byron also scored twice in the second quarter -a2-yard run by Senior Andrew Claunch and a 1-yard run by Smith – which was ultimately all the Tigers needed.

Tolono-Unity scored once in the third, but Palzkill put the exclamation point on the win – and championship - with scoring runs of 20-yards and 5-yards in the fourth.

"The post season run

storybook finish," Boyer said. "They won two games in the last 10 seconds and were able to cap it off with a State Championship. The Byron Community will be talking about this for a long time."

For the game, Palzkill had 9 carries for 78 yards. Byron was led by Senior Chandler Binkley, a highlight player all season, who had 178 yards rushing on 21 carries.

Defensively, Claunch had three solo tackles and three assists, Smith had three solo tackles and three assists, and Palzkill had four solo tackles and one assist.

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
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Frederick W. Harmon



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MOMENTS IN TIME

*On Dec. 25, 1776, Gen. George Washington crosses the Delaware River with 5,400 Patriot troops, hoping to surprise a Hessian force celebrating Christmas at their winter quarters in Trenton, New Jersey. friends. It is a wonderful, joyful time. But gathering can mean older and not as healthy people will be in our personal space bubble.

This can be dangerous with a pandemic still raging in our country, of course. My wife and I did not gather last year as we usually do with family in Wisconsin due to COVID but hope to this year. What will that look

like? Well, it will mean masking a social distancing. Is it inconvenient? Sure, it is, but is that worth the health of those around me? To me, that is a clear "yes."

I hope everyone will do the same. Please, be cautious around potentially vulnerable family members and friends. You can sit around in your masks and talk about how ridiculous it is that you must.

The old saying, "Better safe than sorry" comes into play here. I don't like wearing masks either. Well, in the winter they can give some extra warmth, but they can clearly be uncomfortable to say the least.

But wearing one over the holidays if you gather with family won't be such an inconvenience that it will ruin your holidays, I promise. You can even make biting remarks about family members you aren't particularly fond of under your breath and have a great chance of getting away with it.

A 5-point plan to revive democracy

Democracy is in retreat. We can see it in two surveys completed last year, one from the Economist Intelligence Unit and the other from Freedom House. Both reveal a steady and continuing decline in democratic institutions around the world over the past 15 years or more, even in traditionally democratic countries.

America is an important part of the remedy to this crisis, because, sad to say, it's part of the problem. The Economist's annual Democracy Index identifies only 23 nations out of 165 as being fully democratic today and the United States isn't one of them. It's a "flawed democracy," due to its low scores in "Political Culture" and "Functioning of Government," for the fifth year in a row.

The damage reaches beyond our shores. In a survey of citizens in 17 advanced economies throughout the world, released by the Pew Research Center earlier this month, only 17% of those questioned agreed that our government is "a good example for others to follow." Another 57% affirmed that we "used to be a good example but not in recent years.'

Former diplomat Elizabeth Shackelford, in a

5-19-21 Chicago Tribune article, explains why this matters. Her review of a Eurasia Group Foundation survey, covering over 5,000 people in 10 countries, reveals that responders most often pointed to our cultural, diplomatic, and economic activities as having a positive effect on their countries. Military sales and involvements came in last.

The image that we project to the world is our most valuable foreign policy asset. When we fail to live up to democratic ideals, that image, and with it our influence, even our national security, is damaged. Ms. Shackleford concludes that "Biden was right when he told Congress that America must prove to the world that our style of democracy still works."

But as we've seen, that's a questionable proposition. The many and complicated causes of our downward slide boil down to one simple one, identified by Gerald Sieb in the 10-5-21 Wall Street Journal. "The center," as he puts it, "has been hollowed out."

Moderates in the Democratic and Republican parties have lost power to their left and right wings. Voters as a result often have to choose between hard-core liberal and conservative politicians who reject compromise. The country lurches back and forth with each shift in political power, unable to keep a steady course, or get much accomplished at all, and democratic principles dissolve into cynicism and extremism.

This problem is too entrenched to be defeated by good intentions alone. It calls for changes in our political framework. Here are some reforms that could help:

1. Outlaw gerrymandering, which allows politicians to create safe districts where there's' little or no need for them to compromise with the other party.

2. Reform primary elections. Open primaries and ranked choice voting are promising alternatives that could discourage extremism and polarization in each party.

3. Replace the current state-based system of representation in the Senate with one that instead gives an equal voice to each citizen, and more accurately embodies the broad political core of the country.

4. Abolish the Presidential Electoral College, which grants extra voting power to some citizens at the expense of the rest, so that the President can justifiably claim to truly represent the whole country.

5. Abolish the filibuster, which allows Senators to veto popular laws instead of compromising on them.

These measures won't

automatically produce a new age of civility and good government, but they can help revive the center in a political system that too often enables our worst political behavior. With a stronger democracy at home, we can again become the example that we used to be throughout the world.

That's our best defense in a world that's increasing hostile to democracy.

Winter Survival



Navigate around these four winter hazards

Fresh snowfall can bring a hush over any landscape and, temporarily at least, create a perfect picture scene. As idyllic as such landscapes can be, snow-covered sledding hills can pose various threats to outdoor lovers' health and safety.

Frostbite

Frostbite occurs when the soft tissues of the body start to freeze. It most commonly affects the fingers, toes and nose. The Cleveland Clinic says single-digit Fahrenheit temperatures are cold enough to cause frostbite. Frostbite affects skin cells and tissues and can cause severe damage. Frostbitten skin turns black as cells die from freezing. Numbness and a painful feeling of "pins and needles" occurs in areas that are exposed to the cold or cold water for too long. Dressing appropriately for weather, limiting time spent outdoors in very cold temperatures and maintaining strong blood flow can reduce risk for frostbite.

Be safe on the road this winter

Winter weather causes many people to retreat indoors until the spring thaw. However, for those who embrace the cooler temperatures or find that life must go on despite snow and ice, taking inventory of their vehicles is a must before the first snowflakes start to fall.

- Drive slowly. Slow down on winter roads. Allow a greater distance for stopping than for dry conditions. Slippery conditions can make it more challenging to stop, and excessive speeds can make the situation worse.
- Shift into low gear. On hills, rely on low gears to maximize traction to travel up and down hills. This can minimize skids or sliding.
- Get the vehicle a tuneup. In addition to tires, be sure the braking system, battery and other major components of the vehicle are in good working order.
- Replace windshield wipers. Reduced visibility can compromise the safety of drivers and their passengers. Replace windshield wiper blades before winter arrives. Consider purchasing winter-rated windshield blades.
- Know how to recover from a skid. When skids occur on black ice or slush, drivers should take their feet off of the pedals and steer gently in the direction they want to go.

Falls

Winter weather can lead to slippery conditions. Falls on snow, ice or wet floors are common. When walking, wear shoes with sufficient traction, avoid icy patches and invest in walking poles or microspikes. Promptly wipe up melting puddles in the home to avoid slipping inside as well.

Thin ice

Winter activities may include skating or fishing on a frozen body of water. But it can be challenging to determine just how frozen a lake or a pond might be. Safety experts advise against going out onto the ice alone, and to heed any thin ice signs posted. If you fall through ice, try to gain a grip to pull yourself up (ice picks are a good investment) and spread out on your belly once you get out of the water. Anyone who ventures onto ice can carry a whistle to signal for help, which is louder than yelling. Hypothermia sets in within 10 to 15 minutes,

so acting fast is key. Ropes, boogie boards, a spare tire and other items also can be used to save someone from ice without going onto the ice itself.

Depression

The lack of sun and short days of winter can affect individuals' mental wellness. Those with seasonal affective disorder, or SAD, find winter challenging, according to the Cleveland Clinic. SAD surfaces in late fall or early winter and may not subside until early summer. Make time to get outdoors, even when it's cold, to take advantage of at least 30 minutes of morning light. Doing so can improve mood. Exercise and find ways to engage in social activities to stave off depressive feelings. Do not turn to food or alcohol to address depression.

Winter brings great beauty but also potential hazards that should be kept in mind and addressed.

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


