Community Foundation partnership creates funding opportunities for Amboy Depot Museum

AMBOY — The Starved Rock Country Community Foundation is pleased to announce the establishment of two charitable funds in partnership with the Amboy Depot Commission. The funds were created to attract and facilitate financial contributions to the Amboy Depot Museum by generous donors to support both current operational expenses of the museum, and to ensure that the Museum exists in perpetuity through an Endowment fund.

The mission of the Foundation is to connect people who care with causes that matter by creating individual funds to positively impact charitable organizations who serve LaSalle, Bureau and Putnam Counties.

"It was our mission and a knowledge of community foundations that led to our initial conversations about creating the funds for the Amboy Depot Museum, however, as often is the case, it was the relationships we discovered along the way that solidified it," said Pamela Beckett, Founder and Past President of the SRCCF. Beckett said she learned early on that there was a lot more to the story than a simple inquiry about creating a fund to support the museum. "We created the SRCCF to enable individuals and corporations to support what's important in their lives and in their friends' and neighbors' lives, now and long after those lives have ended," said Beckett.

Peggy Shapiro Horstman, the daughter of the late Illinois State Senator David Shapiro and his wife, Norma, life-long residents of Amboy, initially inquired about the work of the Community Foundation. Peggy then learned that Jay Mc-Cracken, a former classmate of hers, now living in Hennepin. was the first Chairman of the Board of the SRCCF. Jay's father, Kenneth McCracken, was the Mayor of Amboy in the 1970's, the same time when Peggy's father was an Illinois State Senator. Both men were instrumental in the preservation of the Amboy Depot Museum, working tirelessly to secure funding for its preservation and continued operations.

"Peggy was excited to reconnect with her former Amboy classmate, and learn of Jay's role with us," Beckett said, who later learned that Peggy had also been a University of Illinois classmate of Reed Wilson, the current Vice-Chair of the Community Foundation. I

t was quite remarkable to hear about the friendship of David Shapiro and Ken McCracken, their commitment, and that of their families, to the museum. Several conversations and a few presentations later with the leadership of the City of Amboy and the Depot Commission led to the creation of the two funds in excess of \$125,000 to support the Museum. The initial donations were made by a generous Amboy family and other contributors who want the Museum preserved forever. George Carizey, the current President of the SRCCF agrees that, "these are the kinds of wonderful stories we hear at the Community Foundation, and it's heartwarming to partner with so many people who care about what matters in their community.'

The Amboy Depot Museum and its surrounding museum grounds were once a vibrant and vital part of Illinois History. At least six American Presidents, including Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S Grant, Zachary Taylor, William McKinley, Herbert Hoover, and Ronald Reagan are documented as having visited the Amboy Depot.

New congressional maps signed into law

phancock@capitolnewsillinois.com SPRINGFIELD - Gov. JB Pritzker on Tuesday signed legislation redrawing the state's congressional district maps, saying they reflect Illinois' diversity and preserve

minority representation. "These maps align with the landmark Voting Rights Act and will ensure all communities are equitably represented in our congressional delegation," Pritzker said in a statement.

Due to the state's declining population, Illinois will have only 17 congressional seats after the 2022 elections, one fewer than it currently has.

Because most of the state's population loss occurred in southern Illinois, the new maps combine what are currently the 12th and 15th Districts, held by Republican Reps. Mike Bost and Mary Miller, respectively, into a new 12th District that covers most of the southern one-third of the state.

Miller, however, has indicated she might run in the newly-drawn 15th District, which stretches from west-central Illinois eastward across the state, curling around the city of Champaign and stretching back west and south to an area just west of Collinsville.

It also creates a new 13th District stretching from the Metro East region across a narrow strip of land through Springfield and Decatur, to Champaign.

In the Chicago metropolitan area, the maps create a new largely-Latino 3rd District that currently has no incumbent while also putting Democratic Rep. Marie Newman's residence in the same district as fellow-Democratic Rep. Jesús "Chuy" Garcia.

Newman, however, has indicated she intends to run in the new 6th District where she would face Democratic Rep. Sean Casten

Elsewhere, the new maps link Rockford, the Quad Cities, Galesburg, Macomb and Bloomington into one large C-shaped district.

Analysts at the Princeton Gerrymandering Project gave the new maps an overall grade of F in the categories of partisan fairness, competitiveness and compactness. They estimate the maps create 14 likely Democratic districts and three likely Republican districts.

The Illinois delegation is currently split

between 13 Democrats and five Republicans. The political reform advocacy group CHANGE Illinois, which has advocated for an independent redistricting commission, also harshly criticized the new maps, saying it was designed to produce "predetermined winners and losers in nearly all 17 districts."

"The map is undemocratic and leaves all voters without choices, undermining the very elections that are supposed to allow voters to hold officials accountable," the organization said in a statement.

Pritzker, however, said the maps align with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, which prohibits practices and procedures that discriminate on the basis of race, color or membership in a recognized language minority.




The village will have punch cards made for people to get punches from each business, and then if they fill the card, their name will be entered into a drawing for \$100.

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

Situated on what was the railyard of the Northern Division Headquarters of the Charter Line of the Illinois Central Railroad, it was the first line built by the railroad, running from Cairo, at the southernmost tip of Illinois, northward through Galena, to East Dubuque, in the extreme northwest corner of the state. When completed in 1855, it was the longest railroad line in the world. The primary building of the museum is the railroad depot, built in 1876, as a replacement for the original combination depot/hotel which had been constructed in 1854, but had been destroyed by fire in 1875. This current structure was built as a 19-room, two-story depot and division headquarters with an architecturally unique combination of brick and cut Joliet limestone. The Depot provided all facilities for a small-town depot, and as a division headquarters, it also contained two large walk-in vaults for storage of valuables and cash as well as additional rooms for dispatchers, civil engineering staff, accountants and all other workers needed to keep a division headquarters functioning.

However, in 1894, although having been described as "the finest IC division headquarters outside of Chicago," the division headquarters functions in Amboy were discontinued by the railroad. The eight-foot tall and elaborately trimmed windows and doors, the eleven-foot-high ceilings, and the grand curved central stairway have all remained unmodified from their original design. The depot has thus been preserved in its nearly original configuration and provides a prime

example of 19th century railroad architecture. The depot operated in this scaled-back configuration until 1967, when the last station agent, Carl Edwards, died and the depot was closed by the railroad. Amboy's Mayor, Kenneth McCracken, became concerned about the deteriorating landmark and took the initial steps to reverse its decline. By 1973, he had negotiated a long-term lease of the depot from the Illinois Central. He formed the Amboy Depot Commission to undertake what stabilization could be done. Commission members turned to local townspeople who donated everything from glass to replace the broken windowpanes to treasured

family items donated for display in the fledgling museum. This basic restoration gradually allowed the depot to re-open in 1976, as a museum in what became Amboy's Bi-Centennial project. The City of Amboy took title to the depot when the Illinois Central abandoned its Charter Line through Amboy in 1984. By 1991, after 115 years of exposure to the elements, Cold Weather

Plaintiffs in those suits include Republican leaders in the General Assembly; a group of Latino voters in the Chicago area represented by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, or MALDEF; and a

group of civil rights organizations that include the East St. Louis Branch of the NAACP, the Illinois State Conference of the NAACP and the United Congress of Community and Religious Organizations, or UCCRO.

Those plaintiffs allege the

minority representation by breaking up Latino communities in the Chicago area and Black communities in the Metro East region. Arguments in those cases

are scheduled to begin Tuesday, Dec. 7.

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The numerous things we give thanks for

BY PASTOR JOHN KALEBAUGH know that at the time this is published, Thanksgiving Day is already past... yet I feel that 'Thanksgiving" should be part of our DNA as Christian's anytime of the year. And all year. Last Sunday, I spoke to our church from the passage of Luke 17:11-19. This passage tells us that there were 10 men who had leprosy – an awful skin disease which isolated them from the rest of society. All ten cried out to Jesus for "mercy" and He told all of them to go and show themselves to the priest. And "as they went, they were cleansed." All 10 of them were healed! Afterwards however, only one of them came back to thank Jesus... only one. Jesus Himself seemed astonished. He even asked, "Were there not 10 who were cleansed?"

This passage serves as a reminder that it does not go unnoticed when we give thanks to God. In fact, it seems that those who did not give thanks to Him were the ones who surprised Him. Another interesting thing about this passage is that the man who came to give thanks to Jesus was a Samaritan, or a "foreigner" as Jesus referred to him as. But those who did not give Jesus thanks were Jewish – as was Jesus.

In other words, they were the ones of whom it was assumed would respond with the obvious courtesy of saying "Thank you" for such an incredible gift of healing.

This is a good reminder to all of us as we enter the Holiday Season. We can and should be "intentional" to remember to say, "Thank you" to God for all that He has bestowed upon us! Some things are obvious of course. Like saying, "Thank you" for our salvation in Christ, our families, church families, and our nation... But then there are the numerous other

things... perhaps even common things, such as a beautiful flower that burst forth through a broken piece of concrete. Or a warm cuddly puppy or a loyal old dog... Perhaps it could be something as common as a normal (even boring) night at home.

Something we may experience hundreds of times, yet something we would also miss if it were denied to us. The examples are endless... but I think you know what I mean. We Christians should be the first to see the numerous things (obvious or not) to give thanks to God for.

How about if during this Holiday season we take a little extra time every day to be intentional and look for things to say "Thank you" to God for. In so doing, we may find that we see the normal and mundane things of our lives in a new and fresh light and appreciation.

A Bridge Too Far

ax Byrd's "Pont Neuf" (2019) is such a terrific historical novel that I had to put everything aside (mountains of leaves in the yard, far too many bulbs awaiting their burial) and sit down to read it straight through. It takes place the summer after the Normandy landings in June 1944. Two women war correspondents are trying to get to the front. One of the reporters is fictional; she is the novice Annie March, writing for the utterly inconsequential "British Vogue;" the other is the famous war correspondent Martha Gellhorn, writing for the "New York Times." Martha is also the third wife of Ernest Hemingway, though by then divorce was inevitable. Martha, who is fearless, gets them into a field hospital at

the front. "She had morals but not scruples," she tells Annie, who can barely look at the blood soaked horror they've come upon. In Paris, Annie meets two friends of Martha's – two officers, Adams and Shaw, known as the Twins, have been best friends since their days at Harvard. Adams analyzes Army intelligence and interrogates prisoners, whereas Shaw is a much-decorated captain in the 101st Airborne Division. Both men fall for Annie, and their rivalry becomes the parallel theme to the two massive battles on the Western Front.

Byrd's close-up description of Operation Market Garden in mid-September 1944 and the Battle of the Bulge three months later is masterful. Market Garden was a famous failure in which 9,000 British paratroopers were dropped near Arnhem, Holland to secure six bridges to provide a clear path into the heart of Germany. Nearly all the paratroopers were killed or captured. The phrase "A bridge too far" comes from this battle. As with the Battle of Arnhem, the Battle of the Bulge was based on miscalculation and hesitation and cost the Americans 90,000 casualties. We experience the tensions and killings in both battles through Shaw and his men.

Pont Neuf – New Bridge –is the oldest (built in 1578) and most famous bridge across the River Seine. It appears in the novel's Prologue and and again in the Epilogue, where Annie and Adams and Shaw meet a year after the Battle of the Bulge. Annie thought bridges carried one from one world into another, one life into another, and that is certainly true in war. The lives of the young correspondent and the two soldiers have changed tragically, irrevocably, and crossing a bridge is its most apt metaphor.

A short-hand description of "Pont Neuf" does not do justice to the pitch-perfect prose, the assured handling of the action, or the luminous love affair once Annie picks one of the men. The shattering tragedy in the battle for Arnhem bridge finds its intimate parallel on Pont Neuf, the New Bridge which, like love and war, is as old as time.

second weekend of the Illinois Firearm Deer Season will be Dec. 2-5.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) reminds hunters in counties where chronic wasting disease (CWD) has been detected that Firearm Deer Check Stations will be open this year in CWD-testing counties. Check stations were not open in 2020 due to health and safety protocols in place at that time.

Check stations are used by the IDNR to monitor CWD in Boone, Carroll, DeKalb, Grundy, Jo Daviess, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, LaSalle, Livingston, McHenry, Ogle, Stephenson, Will, and Winnebago counties.


A list of check station locations for CWD testing can be found on the IDNR website Firearm Deer Hunting Information for CWD Counties page. The list this year includes a Carroll County check station at Mississippi Palisades State Park. Hunters harvesting deer in Kane County should take their deer to a check station in an adjacent county.


In those counties, hunter-harvested deer must be taken to a designated firearm https://www.exploremoreil. deer check station by 8 p.m. on the day the deer is killed. All persons at the check stations will be required to follow guidance from the CDC and Illinois Department of Public Health in place at the time of the hunt regarding use of face masks and social distancing.

Successful firearm deer hunters in all other counties must report their harvest by 10 p.m. on the same calendar day the deer is taken by using the online check-in system at com/wildlife/harvest or by

phone at 866-452-4325. Successful deer hunters in all other counties may have their deer tested for CWD. Hunters can visit participating vendors (taxidermists and meat processors) or drop deer heads at self-serve drop off sites.

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

Christmas tree tips and tricks

(METRO) — Freshly cut Christmas trees are farmed specifically for the holiday season and support local economies. They also tend to last a bit longer than pre-cut trees available elsewhere.

Christmas trees are an iconic symbol of the holiday season. Whether they are personal trees nestled in the corner of a living room for families to enjoy or towering evergreens serving as the focal point of a town square, Christmas trees are a wonder to behold.

Many people have fond memories of time spent around the Christmas tree sharing gifts and family traditions. Live trees and their pine-like aroma can be especially nostalgic trees to include in holiday plans.

The National Christmas Tree Association says that approximately 25 to 30 million real Christmas trees are sold in the United States every year. North American trees hail from all 50 states and areas of Canada.

While freshly cut trees can be particularly beautiful and aromatic additions to the season, they require a bit more work than artificial trees in order to remain beautiful and thrive throughout the holiday season. Maintenance can help keep Christmas trees as perfect

Even though it is tempting to buy a real tree as early as possible, their shelf life is limited even with the best care. Dural Christmas Tree Farm advises that, under the best conditions, a real tree should last up to four weeks before drying out.

Consider the needles when looking for a real tree. Pull your hand toward your body along the branches. If many needles fall off, the tree is past its peak.

Think about the room in which the tree will be located. Leave at least 6 inches between the tip of the tree and the ceiling, accounting for the height of the tree stand as well.

If needle retention is a goal, the Scotch pine variety has the best needle retention and a high survival rate, lending to its popularity, offers Precision Tree and Landscape. Douglas fir and balsam fir are other durable trees.

· If possible, buy a freshly cut tree from a reputable nursery or tree farm, advises The Old Farmer's Almanac. Many pre-cut trees sold elsewhere were likely cut weeks before and may not be fresh.

· Cut the bottom of the tree trunk before bringing it home to facilitate the uptake of fresh water daily. Trees can absorb as much as a gallon of water in a day, so make sure the tree gets fresh water every day.

Keep trees away from as many heat sources as possible and away from direct sunlight to prolong longevity.


· According to Karabin Farms in Connecticut, to make a Christmas tree last longer, boil a gallon of water and then dissolve one cup of sugar in the water. Allow to cool. After freshly cutting the trunk, pour in the warm sugar water. Continue to add fresh, cool, plain water to the tree stand afterward.

Once needles begin to fall off with frequency, the tree is reaching its prime. Remove it so it does not become a fire
