New congressional maps signed into law

Gov.: Maps reflect Illinois' diversity, preserve minority representation

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Gov. JB Pritzker signed legislation last week redrawing the state's congressional district maps, saying they reflect Illinois' diversity and preserve minority representation.

"These maps align with the landmark Voting Rights Act and will ensure all communifies are equitably represented in our congressional delegation," Pritzker said in a statement. Due to the state's declining population, Illinois will have only 17 congressional seats after the 2022 elections, one fewer than it currently has Because most of the state's population loss occurred in southern Illinois, the new maps combine what are currently the 12th and 15th Districts, held by Republican Reps. Mike Bost and Mary Miller, respectively, into a new 12th District that covers most of the southern one-third of the state



Marie Newman's residence in the same district as fellow-Democratic Rep. Jesús "Chuy" Garcia.

Newman, however, has indicated she intends to run in the new 6th District where she would face Democratic Rep. Sean Casten in a primary.

Elsewhere, the new maps link Rockford, the Quad Cities, Galesburg, Macomb and Bloomington into one large C-shaped district.

Illinois unemployment falls to 6%

Employers add 40,900 jobs to workforce in October

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois unemployment rate fell two-tenths of a percentage point in October to 6 percent as employers added 40,900 jobs during the month, the Illinois Department of Employment Security and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics said.

According to the preliminary data, e industry sectors with the biggest job

The October jobless rate in Illinois was 1.4 percentage points higher than the national rate, but it was 2.1 percentage points below where it was a year earlier.

around the city of Champaign and stretching back west and south to an area just west of Collinsville.

It also creates a new 13th District stretching from the Metro East region across a narrow strip of land through Springfield and Decatur, to Champaign.

In the Chicago metropolitan area, the maps create a new largely-Latino 3rd District that currently has no incumbent while also putting Democratic Rep.

Analysts at the Princeton Gerrymandering Project gave the new maps an overall grade of F in the categories of partisan fairness, competitiveness and compactness. They estimate the maps create 14 likely Democratic districts and three likely Republican districts.

The Illinois delegation is currently split between 13 Democrats and five Republicans.

The political reform advocacy group CHANGE Illinois, which has advocated for an independent redistricting commission, also harshly criticized the new maps, saying it was designed to produce "predetermined

Those gains were partially offset by job losses in the information sector and educational and health services.

'Today's data are positive markers indicating a continued recovery to our economy and labor market," Deputy Gov. Andy Manar said in a statement. "IDES continues to work with employers and jobseekers to assist matching businesses with those looking to reenter the workforce or make career changes."

Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity Director Sylvia Garcia said the numbers showed that Gov. JB Pritzker's administration's economic recovery policies during the pandemic have had positive results.

with gains showing up in nearly all major industries.

The leisure and hospitality sector, which was hit hardest by the pandemic, has added back 60,800 jobs while professional and business services have gained back 50,000 jobs. The trade, transportation and utilities sector has added

37,200.

Financial activities, which is still down by 5,200 jobs, was the only industry group that reported jobs losses over the year. Total nonfarm payrolls were up 3.4 percent over the year in Illinois and 4.1 percent in the nation.

Along with the October jobless figures, the Bureau of Labor Statistics made a significant downward adjustment to the September unemployment rate, lowering it to 6.2 percent from the preliminary esti-

LCHD expands COVID booster doses to 18 and up

◆ Local pharmacies also offer COVID boosters

OTTAWA - On Nov. 19, the CDC expanded eligibility for COVID-19 booster shots for all individuals 18 years of age and older. LaSalle County Health Department (LCHD) is now offering booster doses on a weekly basis by appointment only. Please note: local pharmacies are also offering boosters.

Illinois Department of Public Health, following the FDA's decision to open COVID-19 booster shots to all, recommends anyone 18 years and older get a COVID-19 vaccine booster dose six months after receiving their second Moderna or Pfizer vaccine, or two months after the Johnson & Johnson.

To schedule an appointment at LCHD, visit www. lasallecounty.org and click on the "COVID-19 Vaccine Information" icon to schedule an appointment.

Vaccination Record Card LCHD requires individuals to have their vaccination record card for their appointment. If you do not have it, visit IDPH Vax Verify at https://idphportal.illinois. gov/s/?language=en_US to get a copy of your vaccination record.

Appointment Day at LCHD

• If you do not feel well the day of your appointment, do not come to the vaccination clinic. Please arrive at your scheduled appointment time. An appointment is required to get vaccinated.

• LCHD is located at 717 Etna Road, Ottawa. COVID-19 booster vaccinations will be given in the Vaccination Trailer (look for the yellow sign) located next to the COVID Testing Trailer in the health department's parking lot.

• LCHD requires bringing a copy of your printed ticket or a screenshot of the ticket on your phone and your vaccination record card. • Face covering required. • All attendees must follow instructions and maintain social distance (6 feet apart) when waiting in line.

• If the patient is under the age of 18, they must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

• If you need assistance, please bring someone. Otherwise, only people receiving the vaccine should come to.

• Individuals should wear clothing to allow easy access to the upper portion of the arm for injection.

Kish College instructor named as float judge for 133rd Rose Parade

MALTA - Janet Gallagher, AIFD and Associate Professor of Horticulture at Kishwaukee College, was announced as one of three float judges for the 133rd Rose Parade at the Pasadena Tournament of Roses.

The Rose Parade, along with the annual Rose Bowl football game, is part of the annual Tournament of Roses celebration on New Year's Day. This will be Gallagher's first year in attendance, and she said her selection as a judge came as a surprise.

In February 2020, a representative from the Tournament of Roses reached out to Gallagher to ask if she would be interested in being a judge for the Rose Parade. Gallagher said a committee does independent fact-finding to explore potential candidates for the judge positions.

"You can't apply. You aren't nominated. There is a search committee that researches and selects candidates," Gallagher said. "It's

lagher educates her students with real-world demonstrations of the floral industry. Through hands-on application, her students create unique floral arrangements that often support local events like the annual Kishwaukee College Foundation Gala. Under her tutelage, Kish students have received national recognition through events like the American Institute of Floral Design (AIFD) National Symposium.

Along with being a horticulture instructor at Kish for 16 years, Gallagher has been actively involved in the floral industry for 34 years. In the private sector, she is the founder and CEO of Designs by Janet, a special events floral company. As a member of the AIFD for 18 years, she has served as both the National Education Chair and the National Student Chapter chair.

Floral displays created by Gallagher have appeared in various high-profile places and events throughout her career, from the Ellwood House in DeKalb to the White House in Washington, D.C. Gallagher said her selection as a judge for the Rose Parade reinforces the extensive opportunities available to students pursuing horticulture as a career. "I am really honored to be selected. It shows how broad this industry is, and if you stay consistent and involved in your profession, it can really pay off," she said. "Our everyday work can seem ordinary. But if you do it well and go the extra mile, you can turn it into something extraordinary."

The 133rd Rose Parade will begin at 10 a.m. Central time on Saturday, Jan. 1 and be broadcast internationally. This year's parade theme of "Dream. Believe. Achieve." focuses on how education can open doors and change lives. Gallagher said her background in floral design and education made her a strong fit as a judge with this year's theme.

Gallagher joins J. Keith White, AIFD designer and instructor at the Houston School of Flowers, and John Piper, former Vice President





winners and losers in nearly all 17 districts."

"The map is undemocratic and leaves all voters without choices, undermining the very elections that are supposed to allow voters to hold officials accountable," the organization said in a statement.

Pritzker, however, said the maps align with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, which prohibits practices and procedures that discriminate on the basis of race, color or membership in a recognized language minority.

He said they also align with the Illinois Voting Rights Act, which requires redistricting plans to preserve clusters of minority voting groups that are large enough and cohesive enough to exert collective electoral power.

Pritzker's signing of the congressional maps came less than two weeks before a three-judge federal court panel will hear oral arguments in three separate lawsuits challenging the new legislative maps that Democrats pushed through in August and Pritzker signed into law in September.

Plaintiffs in those suits include Republican leaders in the General Assembly; a group of Latino voters in the Chicago area represented by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, or MALDEF; and a group of civil rights organizations that include the East St. Louis Branch of the NAACP, the Illinois State Conference of the NAACP and the United Congress of Community and Religious Organizations, or UCCRO.

Those plaintiffs allege the new legislative maps reduce minority representation by breaking up Latino communities in the Chicago area and Black communities in the Metro East region.

Arguments in those cases are scheduled to begin Tuesday, Dec. 7.

OGLESBY - Students attending Illinois Valley Community College this spring semester could receive payments made possible by the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF), board members learned Nov. 18.

Students enrolled in 12 or more credit hours will receive \$1,000. Those taking 6-to-11 hours will receive \$500. Payments will be made to students enrolled as of April 7.

In addition, high school students enrolled in IVCC dual credit/dual enrollment courses this spring will have all tuition and the registration fee waived. Students who complete a Career and Technical Education dual credit course will qualify for a tuition waiver for three credit hours this summer or next fall.

With the exception of IVCC employees and high school students, any student who enrolls this spring will receive a \$100 IVCC bookstore gift card to use on books and supplies.

"We recognize the importance of supporting students throughout the pandemic and are committed to helping them achieve their academic and career goals," said Vice President for Student Services Mark Grzybowski.

In other business, the board adopted the tentative \$13.9 million 2021 tax levy, a 9.3 percent increase over last year's \$12.5 million levy.

The levy is based on a nearly 9 percent increase in the district's eight-county combined equalized assessed valuation (EAV), said Vice President for Business

Services and Finance Matt Seaton.

"This levy will keep the tax rate nearly flat for all district tax payers," Seaton said.

With the EAV increasing more than 5 percent, the board will hold a truth-in-taxation hearing at its Dec. 9 meeting "to access all funds available to the district," Seaton said.

Homeowners will see a slight increase in IVCC's portion of their property tax bill due to a .0018 cent increase. The owner of a \$100,000 home, for example, will see a 57-cent increase.

The projected 2021 rate of .3588 is up slightly from the 2020 rate of .3557. A public notice will be published and a public hearing held prior to trustees moving for final approval Dec. 9.

IVCC levies taxes in all or parts of La Salle, Bureau, Putnam, Marshall, Lee, Livingston, Grundy and DeKalb counties.

In other action, trustees approved Protection, Health and Safety (PHS) projects totaling over \$2.7 million including:

· Energy upgrades and piping repairs in Building C boiler room for \$206,195;

• Repairs to parking lot 1 for \$53,130;

· Removal and resurfacing of lot 5 for \$718,200;

 Complete renovation of the band room (D201) for \$1.7 million to include elevator replacement, asbestos abatement and replacement of walls, ceilings, lighting and the raised floor.

Seaton said PHS projects could begin as early as this summer.

Trustees also approved: Moving the start of 2022 meetings up an hour to 5:30 p.m. in the board room, C307. Meetings are the second Thursday of each month on Jan. 13, Feb. 10, March 10, April 14, May 12, June 9, July 14, Aug. 18 (the third Thursday), Sept. 8, Oct. 13, Nov. 10 and Dec. 8.

The state with the largest surplus, Alaska, collected 135% of revenue to cover its expenses, followed by Wyoming and North Dakota.

mate of 6.8 percent. That was due to an adjustment BLS had made in January to the way it estimates the size of a state's labor force in order to account for the impact of the pandemic.

IDES said in a news release that the adjustment inadvertently created "distortions" to statewide labor force estimates for Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Wisconsin for January and all subsequent months through September 2021.

BLS said the distortions were only recently identified after Illinois and another state in the agency's East North Central Division raised concerns about their monthly 2021 labor force estimates. The BLS has found that distortions to the Illinois labor force estimates are limited to January-September 2021.

"The fiscal balance indicator gives us a big picture look at whether states have lived within their means over the long term," said lead researcher Joanna Biernacka-Lievestro.

The research shows during the 15 years before the pandemic, Illinois took in enough to cover just 94% of its expenses, the second smallest percentage in the country behind New Jersey. Illinois also reported budget deficits in every one of those years.

The other six states that failed to collect enough revenue to cover expenses were Massachusetts, Hawaii, Kentucky, Maryland, New York, and Delaware.

What's a check?

I was digging around in a barn loft a while back collecting things that had been stored away for half a century.

When I pried open a suitcase, I found a stack of newspapers from November 1963, cataloging the details of the assassination of John F. Kennedy.

I carried the suitcase down the ladder to show its contents to my young daughters. They looked at the headlines: Kennedy, Johnson, Oswald, Ruby, Tippit. They asked the appropriate questions, but then they saw a silver-colored tray stuffed among the pages.

One of my teenagers carefully examined the artifact and asked what it was. Her two sisters looked on equally perplexed. Then they looked at me with expectation.

I explained what they held in their hands was called an ashtray

I couldn't help but be amused. When I was growing up, a pack of Old Golds was always in my dad's shirt pocket and an ash tray in most every room.

But, today, my daughters are never around anyone when they smoke. Springfield banned smoking in restaurants and other public places before they were born, and all of Illinois soon followed suit. So, the once ubiquitous ashtrays on every restaurant table are gone.

When I entered the newspaper business 33 years ago, I could always tell when one particular editor proofread my copy because there were singe marks from his cigar on the bottom of each page that he had marked up.

A few years later, workplace smokers were relegated to the outdoors. Today, smokers have become lonely distant figures puffing away near curbs – just off their employer's property.

What was once a cultural touchstone has become an artifact of another era.

The conversation got me thinking about what other cultural talismans that will disappear in coming years. (If you are thinking newspapers, I'll smack you upside the head.) Here's my prediction: bank checks.


A couple of years ago, I had this conversation with a young man I had a business relationship with: "Just mail me a check."

The twenty-something paused and finally said, "I don't have any checks. And I don't have any envelopes or stamps."

This was no ordinary person. He's an accomplished entrepreneur and a college graduate.

And he ran a business.

But he didn't have a checkbook?



Sixth Regiment mustered out – 1898

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Dec. 2, 1998.)

On Dec. 3, 1898, The Mendota Reporter relayed information that the Sixth Regiment had been mustered out and paid the previous week in Springfield. The men of The Sixth had served seven months.

The boys are once more plain citizens.

While still in Springfield, Captain Foster was presented by his men with a gold watch and chain and a Masonic charm. He also received a badge with four leaf clover design, the emblem of the Second Army to which the Sixth Regiment was attached.

The Reporter observed that while the experience of spending time in a semi-tropical climate would doubtless be of value to the veterans, even more valuable would be their appreciation of peace after engaging in warfare.

Stern war is not what it is cracked up to be by the novelists.

In Mendota, the Baptists invited "all who have been soldiers for the U.S. in the Cuban war, their relatives and friends" to a special service on Dec. 4, 1898, to remember those who lost their lives Also -

To aid in erection of a national monument in their memory.

In national news, a commission from Cuba was in Washington discussing steps toward establishing "a free and stable government." The Cubans were willing to see U.S soldiers in Cuba during a transition period, but -



"to keep drunkards out of the way of disturbing church-goers on Sunday, stop fighting in saloons on Sunday and get rid of prostitution.

The Reporter had an opinion about that, deeming the extra officer not necessary.

The mayor and council can enforce all laws with present force.

"If the present officers are derelict in performance of their duty, they can certainly be made to do what they are hired for."

At the next council meeting, the mandate to appoint a special policeman was reconsidered and referred to the judiciary committee.

Dec. 1, 1898 was "sparrow day." The amount paid for sparrow heads during 1897-98 exceeded \$1800. A LaSalle man killed 2,870 sparrows and received \$47.40 for the season. Presumably this was a LaSalle County project.

The grand opening of Eckart's Hall on Dec. 8, 1898, featured the Wills orchestra, which introduced the new Cake Walk Quadrille. The spacious hard maple floor was 47 1/2 feet by 57 1/2 feet, with a platform for the musicians on the west end. Located on Illinois Street (now Illinois Avenue), John Eckart's carriage business occupied the ground floor. In 1937, at which time it housed F.R.

In business news, it was told that the Hastings & Wylie drug store had been transferred to George D. Denison. · Pohl's Hotel was offered for sale as part of Mr. Pohl's estate. • G.J. Keller had purchase the former Clark photography gallery.

Unusual weather was experienced in November 1898. In early November, storms called "the severest in archives of the weather office" were followed by one day of Indian Summer, then a cold wave on Nov. 22.

The sudden changes were among the most remarkable weather phenomena on several years.

The Mendota city council heard Berry & Walch explain that weather had prevented completion of work on the filter bed. The firm was granted an extension of its deadline to the summer of 1899. A charge of \$189.78 for "work thus far" was honored. ***

J.H. Black's offer of land to be used as a city dumping ground at rental of \$50 per year was accepted.

Illinois farmland was advancing in price. Sale of two 160-acre pieces in Eureka brought prices of \$98.75 and \$91 per acre, respectively.

Skating on Henning's pond had been a popular pastime during a week of "beautiful moonlight nights."

At Lake Senatchwine, a fishing crew with a single haul of "their big seine" brought in the following: 4,680 carp and buffalo (actual count), 1,000 bass, also croppies and sunfish. They filled 17 barrels with total weight of 80,000 pounds.

How on earth can someone operate a household, yet alone a business, without checks?

Many millennials simply pay with plastic. A debit or credit card more often than not will suffice. And they have apps like PayPal and Venmo on their phones that allow them to pay in ways without a pen.

My young friend ultimately dropped by his bank to have a half dozen checks printed. But before he filled one out, he watched a YouTube video showing him how.

When he shared that with me, I felt old. Really old. For me, getting a checking account was a rite of passage. I grew up on a farm, and when I was 11 years old, I opened an account so I had a mode of paying for the feed and supplies for the calves I was raising.

I can remember my mother standing over me at the kitchen table as I worked to balance my checkbook. It was hard work — at least for an absent minded 11-yearold who kept forgetting to enter transactions into his check register.

Federal Reserve data shows that checks are becoming less popular with Americans. And in countries such as Germany, Denmark, Switzerland, Finland and Netherlands, bank checks have essentially been eliminated.

If the trend continues, someday the written check will go the way of the telegram.

Still, there is something to be said for holding a check in your hands. I still remember my first paycheck as a journalist. I was a summer intern at the Galesburg Register-Mail when an editor walked by my desk, handed me a check and said, "Congratulations."

I assure you, \$3.35 an hour never felt so good.

Future students will ponder these words in Martin Luther King's, "I Have a Dream" speech: "America has given the Negro people a bad check, a check which has come back marked 'insufficient funds."

Will those future young scholars marvel at the great man's eloquence or ask: "What's a check?"

Harris v. Buttigieg would be the GOP's dream primary

The GOP has had plenty of reason for good cheer in recent months.

Nothing can compare, though, with the glad tidings of a potential showdown between Vice President Kamala Harris and Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg to be Biden's successor in 2024 should he decide not to run for reelection.

Surely, there would be other serious candidates in that circumstance, but there is no doubt that Harris and Buttigieg would be high on the list of potential contenders, as various journalistic outfits have noted over the past week.

As it happens, they exemplify the contemporary Democratic Party's electoral deficiencies, while bringing their own flagrant personal political weaknesses to the equation.

If this is really the choice Democrats would face should Biden decline to run, they better hope he defies age, bounces back to robust political health, and is prepared to serve again well into his 80s

Harris flamed out in the 2020 Democratic nomination well before the Iowa caucuses, unable to settle on a message or political identity. Her staff was obsessed with the progressive hothouse of Twitter, which is a powerful device for creating a false sense of what real voters, even Democratic primary voters, care about.

As vice president, she's basically picked up where her desultory campaign left off. In the latest USA Today/Suffolk University poll, Harris had a dismal 28% approval rating. It's difficult to rate that low without getting indicted or suffering some other embarrassing scandal.

Her allies, of course, complain that she's being treated unfairly because she's a woman of color. This fixation on race and gender plays much better with the left-wing activist class than with the public. The simpler explanation for Harris' woes is that she's a below-average politician serving under an unpopular president.

Pete Buttigieg has had a happier tenure. With his surprising success in the 2020 Democratic primary, he bootstrapped himself into a Cabinet position and is now enjoying a windfall of resources thanks to the infrastructure bill.

He embodies, to a fault, the party's growing strength among college-educated whites. He's smooth, credentialed, hyper-articulate and a quick study who knows enough -sometimes just enough -- to charm and impress journalists and other white-collar creative types.

If a management consultant were to design a progressive white Democrat in a bottle, the result would look a lot like Buttigieg, himself a former management consultant.

It's become increasingly clear, though, that the Democratic Party's new base among college-educated voters is a trap if it is pursued to the exclusion of an appeal to working-class voters. The party's poor standing with non-college-educated voters has begun to show up in eroding support among Latinos, a constituency that was presumed to be a key pillar of the Obama-crafted "coalition of the ascendant."

A successful post-Biden Democratic future is more likely to be found in the likes of New York Mayor-elect Eric Adams than Harris or Buttigieg.

He is an African American former cop with a hard-knocks upbringing that gives him working-class street cred. He knows that woke bromides aren't the way to appeal to African American voters, who put him over the top in the Democratic primary. He's a standard progressive in many respects, but he has proven immune to fashionable left-wing causes. He not only defused a hot-button cultural issue -- namely, crime -- he campaigned on it and made it a strength, an ability that most national Democrats have lost as the party has moved left since 2016.

It's far too early to know how his City Hall tenure will actually turn out, but Adams has the qualities and approach that, in theory, could be fruitful for Democrats nationally.

Meanwhile, even if the GOP is on a roll at the moment, it shouldn't get its hopes up. At the end of the day, a 2024 Democratic primary dominated by Harris and Buttigieg is probably too good to be true.







Officials urge Illinoisans to prepare for winter emergencies

SPRINGFIELD-If your car gets stuck in the snow or if the power goes out at home, do you have what you need to stay safe?

Now is a good time to think about how prepared you and your family are for winter, said Rebecca Clark, communications manager for the Illinois Department of Emergency Management.

"Being unprepared for winter weather is not only inconvenient, it can be dangerous," Clark said.

The Illinois Department of Emergency Management recommends that people put together two emergency supply kits – one for your home and one for the car.

Clark recommends assembling the kits gradually. "When you are at the grocery store, maybe pick up some canned goods and batteries. Assemble what you need piece by piece by piece. Get an ice scraper for your car. A cell phone charger. Some trail mix or nuts," Clark said.

A leading national insurance company has found that nearly 1 million motorists every year wind up stranded in their cars for an hour or more. A shovel and some sand or kitty litter can help you get yourself out of a snowbank or a ditch. Sleeping bags or blankets, flashlights, water and some kind of food can keep you from getting really cold while you are waiting for help.


Mendota Police Department offers safety tips for driving in the winter

Drive more slowly and carefully in the winter months, The Department of Emergency Management said

"Whether it is rain, ice or snow, in the winter we need to adjust our driving," Clark said.

It takes ten times longer to brake and stop on an icy road.

In your home, get your furnace serviced. Buy a 12pack of filters and change the filter every month. If an ice storm knocks out the power, have flashlights, phone chargers, plenty of blankets, and non-perishable food.

Be aware of the risk of hypothermia. Babies that sleep in rooms that get too cold can get hypothermia, a serious medical condition where the body loses heat faster than it can produce heat. Hypothermia is also a risk for hunters, hikers, anyone who works outside for extended periods and kids who get wet and cold.

Hypothermia comes on gradually, sometimes causing disorientation or mental confusion that prevents the person from getting help. Learn CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation). In a case of severe hypothermia, many times CPR can revive an unconscious victim who appears to be dead.



Second firearm deer season set December 2-5 in Illinois

Chronic wasting disease check stations will be open

SPRINGFIELD-The second weekend of the Illinois Firearm Deer Season will be Dec. 2-5.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) reminds hunters in counties where chronic wasting disease (CWD) has been detected that Firearm Deer Check Stations will be open this year in CWD-testing counties. Check stations were not open in 2020 due to health and safety protocols in place at that time.

Check stations are used by the IDNR to monitor CWD in Boone, Carroll, DeKalb, Grundy, Jo Daviess, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, LaSalle, Livingston, McHenry, Ogle, Stephenson, Will, and Winnebago counties.

A list of check station locations for CWD testing can be found on the IDNR website Firearm Deer Hunting Information for CWD Counties page. The list this year includes a Carroll County check station at Mississippi Palisades State Park. Hunters harvesting deer in Kane County should take their deer to a check station in an adjacent county.

In those counties, hunter-harvested deer must be taken to a designated firearm deer check station by 8 p.m. on the day the deer is killed. All persons at the check stations will be required to follow guidance from the CDC and Illinois Department of Public Health in place at the time of the hunt regarding use of face masks and social distancing.

Successful firearm deer hunters in all

other counties must report their harvest by 10 p.m. on the same calendar day the deer is taken by using the online checkin system at https://www.exploremoreil. com/wildlife/harvest or by phone at 866-452-4325

Successful deer hunters in all other counties may have their deer tested for CWD. Hunters can visit participating vendors (taxidermists and meat processors) or drop deer heads at self-serve drop off sites.
