New water tower plan explained

Commissioner says plan is to be prepared for the future

CLINTON engineering agreement between the city and Symbiont for water tower water treatment improvements has caused some apparent misunderstanding residents. Commissioner John Wise, on Monday, explained the current position of the city with regard to the plan.

Early October, commissioners approved \$121,695 for the Symbiont agreement, but Wise said during Monday's city council meeting it did not mean the city was immediately ready to replace the old downtown water tower.

Wise said he was approached by a resident who expressed concern the city was preparing to raze the old city water tower, located near Adams and Quincy streets. Wise said some people consider the old tower a local historical landmark.

Wise said replacing the tower was not imminent, but he said it had largely outlived its usefulness. Wise said the city needed to plan now to apply for grant funds to one day replace the tower. In order to do that, the city must have plans for a "shovelready" project.

"It's like every other project we've ever done," Wise said. "When the state and federal government has money available, you have to have a project that is shovel-ready, that has been engineered and is ready to go."

Wise said there were no plans to build a new water tower until the city paid off some current water department loans. These include the west side water tower and some improvements to the water treatment plant and water mains.

He said the engineering firm identified some preliminary projects, such as replacing mains up to the old water tower, so if money became available, a planned project already would be on file.

Wise said a lot of work had been done to the tower over the years, but it still was "an old, old tower."

New congressional maps unveiled ahead of fall veto session

SPRINGFIELD

Democrats in the Illinois General Assembly released a proposed set of new congressional district maps Friday, just days before lawmakers return to the Statehouse for the start of their fall veto session, which begins Oct. 19.

All states redraw their congressional districts following each decennial census. The proposed new maps reflect the fact that Illinois will have only 17 congressional districts after the 2022 elections, down from its current 18 districts, due to the state's loss of population since the 2010 census.

The draft proposal oddly-shaped districts, many of which would create entirely new constituencies incumbent members of Congress, particularly Republicans.

As expected, southern Illinois, which most dramatic population declines, would essentially be compressed from having two districts to just

R-Murphysboro, would see his 12th District nearly double in size geographically to take in almost the entire southern end of the state, from an area just east of the Metro East region all the way to the Ohio River.

Meanwhile, Rep. Mary Miller. R-Oakland, who represents what is currently called the 15th District in southern and east-central Illinois, would be placed in an entirely new 16th District that takes in Oakland, curls around the city of Champaign and stretches west across much of central Illinois to an area just south of the Quad Cities.

The Quad Cities is currently in the 17th District that also includes Rockford. It is represented by Rep. Cheri Bustos, D-Moline, who announced she will not seek reelection in 2022. That area would become part of a new 17th District that takes in Rockford, stretches west to the Mississippi River, then snakes south to Galesburg and back east to take in Bloomington and Peoria, the hometown of Republican Rep. Darin LaHood, who represents what is now the 18th District.



In a statement Friday, Davis did not indicate that he'd made a decision, but he harshly criticized the proposed new maps.

"As expected, lying governor teamed up with state Democrats to draw a shameful, partisan gerrymander in a desperate attempt to keep (U.S. House Speaker) Nancy Pelosi in power," he said. "This proposed map, along with this entire redistricting process, is a

Illinois could play pivotal role in the 2022 congressional elections as Democrats try to hold onto their slim majority. The U.S. House is split 220-212 in favor of Democrats with three seats currently vacant - two last held by Democrats and one last held by a Republican.

Historically, however, the party that occupies the White House loses congressional seats in a new president's first midterm election, a pattern that does not bode well for Democrats.

In Illinois, however, currently Democrats hold a 13-5 majority in the state's congressional delegation, and Democrats are firmly in control of the redistricting process in the state General Assembly, so it is likely they will do all they can to keep as many Democratic seats as

"Call this new Illinois map the Nancy Pelosi Protection Plan," Illinois Republican Party Chairman Don Tracy said in a statement. "It's appalling that fair representation, keeping communities of interest together, and transparency in the mapmaking process in Illinois all had to take a back seat to the demands of national politics."

The proposed new maps were released after the Illinois House and Senate held a series of public hearings around the state that drew surprisingly

little public participation. In fact, several hearings drew no public input at all while others saw only one or two witnesses speak.

Many of the nonpartisan advocacy groups were active during the legislative redistricting process earlier year took no part in the congressional redistricting process, and some of them cited their frustration with the earlier process as a reason for staying away.

"I'm not surprised to see so few people at the recent redistricting hearings, given the exclusionary Illinois state redistricting process that occurred this year, which resulted in a map that harms communities of color," Gandhi, senior counsel for the Chicago Committee Lawyers for Civil Rights, said in an email. "Even the community members who have made the effort to analyze and speak out on the maps - especially people of color - have said they don't feel heard and that their input hasn't mattered. That's a shame because these maps will absolutely affect our communities' options, resources, and rights for the next ten years."

Jay Young, executive director of Common Cause Illinois, said in an interview that there was a general feeling of frustration among many advocacy groups that took part in the legislative redistricting process that has carried over into congressional redistricting.

"I don't know if 'jaded' is the right word," he said. "I mean, there's some folks who are just flat out angry. You know, I have friends that I used to work

with in their previous life, who are now part of the General Assembly. I believe that they're still my friends. I know that they care. But even the people that I had better hopes for I don't think did what I had hoped for."

Democrats said legislative maps were designed to reflect the racial and ethnic diversity of the state. But those maps are now the subject of two ongoing federal lawsuits, including one by a leading Latino advocacy group, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, or

MALDEF. In addition, a group of Black leaders from Chicago called Illinois African Americans for Equitable Redistricting recently asked the Justice Department to conduct a civil rights investigation into the policies and practices that led to the maps, which they argue dilutes Black voting

The proposed new maps that were released Friday might be only the first draft of a redistricting plan. The House Redistricting Committee held hearing Friday after the proposal was released, and it drew more public participation than most of the previous hearings. It will hold another at 9 a.m. Wednesday in Springfield.




Strange bed fellows

culinary delights. In the previous article, I explained about methodology and knowledge from disciplines are most helpful for developing viable methods. I shall now list a few. Using medical

procedures in culinary make for strange bed fellows. Starting young, I had an appetite for learning new things and it stayed with me. My doctor was amused that I asked so many questions. From him, I learned about suturing and stripping veins. I became familiar with forceps and hemostats. The list goes on. I learned that a surgical knot had special qualities. The double looping of the suture (thread) served to hold the wound tightly in place. The second double looping would lock it in place. I have used this in trussing birds for the oven and for making rolled roasts. My instructor saw the results and liked it. He now uses it in teaching.

At college, we were taught the traditional way to remove the mud vein from shrimp. Perform an incision along the full length of the shrimp on the outside curve nearest the vein. It leaves a gaping slit that I thought was unattractive. Besides that, the knife could often cut into the vein making it most difficult to remove all of it. It had to be removed in pieces. I made a small lateral incision nearest the tail just deep enough to sever (detach) the vein. I grabbed hold of the opposite end of the vein with my hemostat and gently pulled. slipped out easily. I then sautéed them. When the

instructor came to inspect the results, he took two points off thinking I did not remove the mud veins. It is true no slit was visible. I told him the veins were removed. In disbelief, he took a closer look. He restored the two points. We were taught how

to remove little fish bones from the fillets. They even sale a pair of tweezers exclusively for that purpose. appeared inefficient when the instructor was demonstrating it. I too found it difficult use the tweezers. I resorted to my hemostats. It got the job done faster with less

I played a musical instrument in high school. I once examined an operatic score. I found it fascinating that so many different musicians were able to execute the notes perfectly on time thus being harmonious. I later used this same method of scoring for timing meals. The objective is to have everything that had to be served hot to be ready at the time for serving. Each food item has their own preparation and cooking time. By timing each move as one would do with musical notes on a score, there would be no dead time and everything

There are many other examples I could give. In my articles, I have included those methods so you can learn them.



The Supremes

Lest we forget, there are nine black robes that impact all of us. Not a single Supreme Court Justice received our vote. They have life time appointments and a pretty good salary with benefits.

We do elect our U. S. Representatives and Senators. We argue and debate politics, and those Senators and Representatives change every two or six years as the political whims of the public change. Those nine folks on the Supreme Court just stay and continue their duties until they retire or die in office. That is the way our Constitution is written.

Our founding fathers wanted a government that would last over time. They understood that the public's political opinions would sway over time on current issues. Those founding fathers wanted a nation built on a foundation of law that would endure the ravages of current public opinion.

That public opinion has railed against the Court by both the right and the left. Several years ago right was up in arms that the Supreme Court was an "activist" court that was simply liberals enacting law via the judiciary. Today, the

liberal progressives claim the Supreme Court is too restrictive and does not acknowledge individual rights. The nine black robes keep on, keeping on.

They had their political views, but those were set aside for their rulings based on what the law of the land required, understanding that there would be differences of interpretation. Today we have Justices Clarence Thomas and Soia carrying Sotomayor on that tradition of philosophical divide but unity in the decision making of the Court. The Founding Fathers wanted the Court to be the rock of stability for the nation and not subject to the daily whims of political thought. Over time that

our nation's government. The political hot potato today is police reform. Defund the police and stop excessive force were and are rallying cries of the left. The first event was the Supreme Court's ruling this past Monday upholding the doctrine of qualified immunity for police officer. Qualified immunity affords police officers protection from lawsuits in doing their job when force is used. It basically gives the benefit of the doubt to the officer in all except egregious occurrences. In these two cases a person was struck by a bean bag projectile while brandishing a knife against a police officer and in the second case a person brandished a hammer against the officer. These are the types of cases that the far left progressives politicize to support their defund the police agenda. The Supreme Court ruled unanimously that the officers had qualified immunity for

their actions. Please note

that was conservative

and liberal justices ruling unanimously. Something here is telling all that the Supreme Court does work and the Court will not be swayed by the daily political events that are occurring.




