Mask mandate discussion returns to board meeting

Advice sought from State Board of Education

CLINTON - Clinton teacher and parent Shelby Shipley spoke to the Clinton Board of Education at its Oct. 19 meeting to share how mask-wearing is affecting her children's health and asked the district to participate in the "Illinois Health Care Right of Conscience Act."

This allows individuals to make healthcare decisions for themselves and their children verses a mandate from the state.

"If we use the health care consciousness act, what will happen to us?" asked Shipley.

"I don't have exact those questions," Superintendent Curt Nettles responded. "A lot of the lawyers interpret these things differently. The insurance companies are still interpreting it the same way as they did back in August when they told us we'd have no coverage if we didn't follow the mandate."

Nettles said he had taken notes on Shipley's comments and would look further into some of the things she said

Later in the meeting, Nettles said he spoke to the Illinois State Board of Education earlier in the day requesting some guidelines and specific plans to allow areas of the state with lighter virus numbers to adjust accordingly.

"Our state is very large geographically," Nettles said. "Usually what's going on up north is not what's going on down here."

After the meeting, Nettles said he felt more encouraged. "I'm a lot more optimistic."

Board secretary Sondra Baker encouraged Shipley to share her message with

"We all agree with you, and we don't want to do this anymore than you do."

On a different topic, the board learned that thanks to grants and a donation from the Clinton Community Education Foundation (CCEF), Lincoln School will receive a new playground with features designed for preschool age and physically challenged children.

Morgan Ginger presented the information and explained two grants will pay for most of the playground's \$154,296 cost with CCEF donating just over \$16,000 to complete the purchase.

In other business, the board:

- Listened to the swearing in of new board member Wes Cothern who is fulfilling the remainder of Rodney Rogers' term. Rogers resigned from the board a couple months
- Heard a presentation from architects Cordogan and Clark on the renovation to the high school kitchen.
- Approved board member Chris Hammer as board vice president, replacing Rogers.
- Approved employment the of following individuals: Eveland, Deegan Darci custodian; Newman, district nurse; Wilson, **CES** administrative assistant; Bev Mathis, transportation administrative assistant; and Beth Tedrick, district food service director.

Students enjoy connecting with the past

Cemetery project teaching history and empathy

tudents from Clinton Junior High school were swarming Woodlawn Cemetery, researching and cleaning they visited grounds, working an ongoing project by Clinton Junior High teacher Kelbey McMath. McMath, teaches eighth grade, instructs social studies, continued "Cemeterian Project" he started working on more

than three years ago. "Thinking of cemetery, I thought of all the veterans who are buried there and how many were being lost to time," McMath explained. "I thought it would be great to give students a chance to analyze primary sources from the time (period) to see what they could find."

Each student researches extensively to information about the veteran whose grave they clean. They find out when they were born and died, how they died, about their families, and in doing all this, they also learn more about the U.S Civil war.

Students Reese Lyons, 13, and Emilie Blazer, 13, worked on veteran Israel S. Cope.

cleaning the stone," said Lyons. "I think finding information about Israel helped me try to clean it better because I knew stuff about him and he wasn't just a stranger."

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

"Initially, students are very skeptical when I tell them they are going to a cemetery for a field trip," McMath said. "Once students start to find out information about their chosen veteran, they really start to get interested and become engaged in the project."

McMath said he had

many reasons for doing the project, first inspired by a LeRoy teacher Brad Marcy, who does a similar project with his students. It gives them a chance to be a positive part of the community, essential for junior high students. It gives them a better connection and understanding of the community.

"I think a lot of students miss out on the opportunity to take part in community service," McMath said. "Also, there aren't many ways to do "hands-on" history in class and this was a way to bring it alive and get students doing a variety of things related to history."

Eighth-grader Lyons echoed this.

"In all honesty, I really liked the project. It was nice to get out of the classroom and do things for a good cause," Lyons said. "It made me really proud and just happy."

The project has its challenges, one of the biggest being the cost. Ordinary soap or bleach cannot be used on the gravestones. Instead the students use a special and gravestone expensive cleaner designed just for this purpose. McMath has received multiple donations to buy the special cleaner along with scrub brushes, toothbrushes, spray

McMath listed local Honor Guard, the Clinton Community Educational Foundation and the Illinois Education Association (IEA) as big supporters of the project. Four GPS receivers were purchased so the graves can also be accurately located on maps for future generations to find. The IEA also sent out a videographer to document this year's work for a video about the project they working on.

This is the third group of students working on McMath's project. His first year was cut short due to COVID; the students did not actually make it out to the cemetery to clean. This spring, his second group of more than 120 students worked on it.

For this, the third group, he had to refigure things again to accommodate shortened class periods — a change from spring time when COVID had forced his class to meet for longer times, but only every other day.

This past Friday, he split all six of his classes into two groups for two field trips to the cemetery to map and clean.

"The students have really run with the project, and I've been very proud of them. It is the first time many have used primary sources to research and also the first (time) many have actually been to the cemetery," McMath said.

McMath has taken on extra work to prepare himself for the project. He attended a professional conference, where Fairbury teacher Andrew Quran presented how his kids mapped out cemeteries in their

county. He also learned from other colleagues in Bloomington.

"I thought this was great, as many cemeteries have been lost to time," McMath said.

The efforts are currently focused on Woodlawn, but he plans to continue this project into the future. He will expand to other small, often overlooked cemeteries in the area at some point in time.

Many students have found themselves captivated by the project and expanded outside of just their assigned gravestones. Their work has revealed names, dates and other written words on gravestones lost to the ages. The students remove dirt, fungus, moss and other contaminants. The final result has actually had quite an impact on many

of the students.

"I've heard many students say it was so much fun, and they wish they could do it every day," McMath said.

Several students also wanted to clean other graves just because they were dirty.

"I think it brings out a sense of empathy that is often missed with junior high students," McMath explains.

This alone makes the project take on a new meaning. McMath hopes at some point to begin to enter the data the students collect into one place for others to access. But that is still coming.

For now, getting the stones to go from unreadable to legible is the goal, while discovering the lives of those who lived in the 1800s.

A family matter

elcome to my little corner of culinary delights. We have different families in culinary. We have families of species, groups and types. A type can be the differences between similar food Apples are part of the fruit family. Within that is the apple family of types such as Gala, Fuji, Granny Smith, etc. We have the grain family and vegetable family and many others. Types allow us to better identify, in a recipe, that which might serve our purpose best. But there is another class of family I wish to include. Whereas, families

indicate a relationship, subfamilies identify the structure and type of food. There is also a need to identify certain chemical properties of foods. This in particular helps at a health and nutritional level as well as to their cooking properties. Two important families this nature would be the sodium family and the carbohydrate family. This identifies their properties. As an example, culinary property of starch and sugar is to thicken and adhere. This would also suggest the type of cooking procedures necessary. Although both salt and pepper are in the seasoning family, salt is also in the sodium family whereas pepper is not. Although Russet potatoes are in the tuber family, they are also in the carbohydrate family along with alcohol, sugar, roux and pasta. They all have the carbon/hydrogen chain with oxygen. For this article, I wish to cover the carbohydrate family.

Carbohydrate identifies foods having the oxygen, hydrogen and carbon chain. The chemical formula proves this as follows. Alcohol is $\rm C_2H_6$ O. Glucose and fructose



are $C_6H_{12}O_6$. Sucrose is $C_{12}H_{22}O_{11}$. Starch is $C_{12}H_{25}O_{11}$. Although glucose and fructose have the same formula. the difference is in the molecular structure. Because the carbon, hydrogen and oxygen atoms are exclusive in the formulas, the relationship is strong. You can therefore expect a strong similarity in their culinary affects. Although this ties in with health and nutritional matters, I wish to center upon their culinary values. Having covered flour, sugar and potatoes in earlier articles. we can use them as our test examples.

Mechanical action upon chemicals can have affect. As an experiment, put a large piece of white bread into your mouth. Now chew on it. Keep chewing on it. Eventually, it will begin to taste sweet. As you can see from the chemical formulas above, starch has a very long chain. It also has all of the chemical elements required for making sugar. Therefore, to break the chain can produce sugar. The mechanical stress caused by chewing eventually breaks that chain. Therefore, this proves a relationship within the carbohydrate family. If then sugar can make you fat, so can

starchy foods.

Next time, I shall outline how carbohydrates work act and react. I shall show how heat is a huge factor as a catalyst for restructuring molecules. To know how things work is to know how to make them work for you.





Cyber crimminals have vets in their sights

Veterans are victims of cybercrimes at a much higher rate than civilians. And it's not just veterans, included are military spouses, survivors, activeduty personnel and our families. This is no doubt because of our benefits and the goodies to be had after stealing from us.

To tackle the problem, Department the **Affairs** Veterans is stepping in and partnering with outside groups the Cybercrime like Support Network (cybercrimesupport.org), whose motto is Recognize, Report and Recover. It's about time ... over the past five years, veterans have reported cybercrime

losses of more than \$420 million.

recent Fight webinar Cybercrime touched home for many of us: How to keep your business information safe when you're working from home and sharing your online connection with children. Past webinars are worth watching as well: staying safe on social media, avoiding a scam from a government tax imposter, and COVID scams, which seem to be everywhere.

So, we have the tools. The information and resources are out there. But we need to take advantage of all that's offered to avoid becoming another cybercrime statistic.

One of the biggest problems with cybercrime is that we don't always report it. We're embarrassed because we thought we couldn't be fooled ... until we are. Do your part. If you get scammed, report it.

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The new missle gap

The Biden administration is hesitant to call our competition with China a new Cold War, even though Beijing has zero qualms about making the parallels with our decadeslong struggle with the Soviet Union abundantly clear.

We are once again discussing a "Sputnik moment," a nuclear arms race, and a missile gap -- all throwbacks to the 1950s-1980s -- thanks to China's aggressive pursuit of military capabilities designed to deter and defeat the United States.

Whatever Beijing may say and however we may try to comfort ourselves with cushioning delusions, the Chinese have repeatedly made it plain that they intend to hold U.S. bases and our homeland at risk.

The example of Sputnik, primitive Soviet the satellite launched in 1957 that raised the prospect of the U.S. losing the space race, was on everyone's lips with a bombshell Financial Times report over the weekend.

According to the FT, the Chinese tested a nuclearcapable hypersonic missile that circled the Earth once before descending on its target, thus demonstrating "an advanced space capability that caught U.S. intelligence by surprise."

It's not clear why

anyone would be shocked. It wasn't a secret that China and Russia were developing these technologies, and indeed, it wasn't a secret that China had leapt ahead of

(The Chinese, bringing the same transparency they've shown regarding the origins of COVID-19, say it was just a routine space launch.)


Hypersonic missiles bring a new element to the ever-evolving competition between missile offense and defense.

former As state official department Christian Brose notes in his book "The Kill Chain," ballistic missiles travel fast but in a predictable parabolic path. Cruise missiles, on the other hand, travel relatively slowly but are maneuverable and therefore unpredictable.

Hypersonic missiles are both unpredictable and fast -- six times faster than a Tomahawk missile.

That means they are uniquely suited to defeat our missile defenses. Not only can't we counter them, we can't track them adequately at the moment.

Over the summer, the head of North American Aerospace Defense Command -- yes, that's NORAD of Cold War fame -- said that the new missiles would pose "significant challenges to



my NORAD capability to provide threat warning and attack assessment."

The FT reports that

the test missile missed its target by roughly two dozen miles. That's a significant miss but wouldn't necessarily be that much comfort if the missile were carrying a nuclear payload. And the targeting will presumably be improved -- that's one reason to carry out the test in the first place.

An MIT professor told the FT that just because China tested the capability doesn't mean that it will deploy it. But the history of expansionistic totalitarian states forbearing from advanced fielding weapons after pouring significant time and resources into developing them is not, to say the least, very encouraging.

It'd be best if we abandon all wishful thinking and admit the obvious.

We've had a zombie arms control policy focused on deals with Russia, while China has been aggressively adding new weapons and delivery systems.

We've allowed China to rob our technology and pour it into developing threats against us. We've been much

too slow in developing the next generation of weapons, including missiles, hypersonic and are modernizing our nuclear triad at a glacial pace while China is rapidly adding new capabilities.

The response to the new circumstances should reflect a Cold War-era urgency. The Biden administration has proposed more spending on hypersonic missiles, but the latest news should mean even more of an emphasis on their rapid deployment, so we can hold at risk Chinese assets and maintain our deterrence.

We should, with an eye to the growing Chinese missile threat, deploy missile-defense interceptors in Australia and more sensors in space, as well as work toward directed-energy weapons that would be the best counter to hypersonic missiles.

If we aren't going to call it a new Cold War, we must -- or risk falling further behind -- treat it as

West leads the ♥A and, when Dummy goes down, who would blame Declarer for thinking "Yippee! What a terrific slam, and on just a combined 25 HCP! Nicely bid, pard!"

Declarer ruffs that ♥A opening lead and, without pausing for thought, cashes the ◆A and ◆K. When East shows out on the second round of trumps, Declarer ponders awhile (it's a bit late now!) before realizing that "Oops!" and not "Yippee!" is the appropriate exclamation. Yes, indeed, Declarer has goofed mightily. He cannot draw the last trump (that would let the defense score a Heart and a Diamond), so he ruffs a Heart on the board and exits with the ◆K. But that doesn't work, either. East wins the A and returns a Diamond which must be won in Dummy. Now Declarer has no way back to his hand to draw that last enemy trump. He'll cash a Diamond and lead another one, but, when East follows to the third round, Declarer will know that his goose is cooked. Whether he ruffs high or low, West's ♠J will score a trick. Down one!

Of course, the winning line is to ruff the opening Heart lead, cross to the ♠A, ruff another Heart, and then draw trumps. Now is the time for that yippee. Trick 1 was the time for thinking.
