Park district partners with KSRA

Association provides opportunities for people with disabilities

ROCHELLE — The Flagg-Rochelle Community Park District joined the Kishwaukee Special Recreation Association as a partner agency in 2016.

The organization, which works in the communities of DeKalb, Sycamore, Genoa, Sandwich and Rochelle, strives to enhance the lives of people with disabilities by cultivating diverse recreational opportunities within those areas. Among the programs KSRA offers are field trips, cooking class, bowling, a seven-week camp, parents night out, sports, dances and fitness.

"Recreation is something that is difficult sometimes for individuals because of their needs," KSRA Executive Director Dawn Schaefer said. "But it's so important. A lot of kids and adults, anyone who is learning, learns better through play. You don't realize you're working towards a goal.

Social interaction, you do that by playing games and being with your peers. All the things you learn with social emotional health.

Schaefer said KSRA

works on a whole person through recreation so they don't realize they're working on their skills. They're too busy having fun. KSRA also provides

inclusion support for those with special needs that want to sign up for programs within the park district. "We'd send an aid or a

sign language interpreter," Schaefer said. "I'd talk with staff on how to better organize the program."

CITY: Council votes to continue permit waiver program

Small

businesses

The city council unanimously voted to continue its small business permit fee waiver program. The program began on Dec. 9, 2019. The program was designed to assist small businesses with fees that are associated with opening a new business or expanding a business within the city that include electric, water, sewer and building permits. To date, \$6,748 in permit

fees have been waived. The program was extended for five years until Dec. 31, 2026.

Railroad park

The findings of a survey done of visitors to the city's railroad park were detailed at the meeting. Director of Marketing, Public Relations & Tourism Jenny Thompson said improvements are planned for the park like replacing siding, redoing the doors and upgrading the restrooms.

Some long-term ideas include more parking and an extended viewing area. The city plans to allocate \$60,000 in American Rescue Plan funds towards improvements of the park.

Good News

Fiegenschuh presented Good News awards to Rochelle Police Detective Terry Inman and City Finance Director Chris Cardott.

Rochelle Police Chief Eric Higby said Inman took a call of theft of over \$39,000 from CHS Ethanol on Feb. 22. Inman conducted an investigation that involved numerous banks, businesses, municipalities and law enforcement agencies across four states and several search warrants were executed for records. Inman's work ultimately resolved the case.

Cardott was awarded after the city recently retained its A+ credit rating.

"The reason we were reaffirmed with the A+was strong management with good financial policies and practices, strong budgetary performance, very strong budget flexibility and very strong liquidity," Fiegenschuh said. "That says a lot about the council and staff. This award is for Chris and everybody else."

Exelon preparing to refuel Byron plant

SPRINGFIELD-The

Illinois Senate put the final legislative stamp on an energy regulation overhaul bill Monday, sending it to Gov. JB Pritzker, who says he will sign it.

The culmination of years of negotiation, the measure passed by a 37-

"After years of debate and discussion, science has prevailed, and we are charting a new future that works to mitigate the impacts of climate change here in Illinois," Pritzker said in a statement after the bill's Senate passage. "(Senate Bill) 2408 puts the state on a path toward 100 percent clean energy and invests in training a diverse workforce for the

jobs of the future. Illinois will become the best state in the nation to manufacture and drive an electric vehicle, and equity will be prioritized in every new program created."

The final proposal forces fossil fuel plants like Rochelle's Prairie State Energy Campus in Marissa, Illinois offline by 2045 and spends billions of dollars to subsidize renewable and nuclear energy to prevent the closure of facilities like the Byron nuclear plant.

The bill provides \$694 million in total over a fiveyear period to subsidize three nuclear plants owned by Exelon Corporation, preventing the closure of the plant in Byron that Exelon said it would take offline Monday in the absence of legislative action. It issued a statement after the bill's passage saying it would begin the refueling

Prairie State Energy Campus, which the City of Rochelle has \$150 million in debt with until 2042, and another municipal coal plant had caused a stalemate, as the plants and the lawmakers within their districts pushed back on the hard 2045 decarbonization date.

The final bill provides that the facilities must be carbon-free by 2045, and must reduce carbon emissions by 45 percent by 2035. If they can't, they have three years to comply or shut down part of their generation capacities to come into compliance.

Other fossil fuel plants are required to go offline between 2030 and 2045, depending on the energy source and the level of carbon emissions.

"We'd work with the individual who requests the accommodation to make sure they are successful at any level they want to be within the inclusion program. We support all choices of recreation. KSRA just has more experience in working with kids and adults with disabilities so we look more in-depth into the programming.'

KSRA plans to work with the park district to do a parent's night out one Friday a month at The REC Center where youth and mid-teens will go swimming and play in the gymnasium. The three hour program is also open to siblings of those with disabilities.

In the past in Rochelle, KSRA has done a parent's night out at Teen Town along with bowling at T-Byrd Lanes.

Maureen Stevens, superintendent of administration & finance at the park district, has been on the KSRA board for three years. She said with Flagg-Rochelle being a small district, its programs aren't always geared specifically towards people with disabilities. KSRA's programs and inclusion services help to accommodate those that need it.

"Instead of having to turn people away because

we can't accommodate whatever disability it is that they may have, KSRA steps in and saves the day and lets them participate," Stevens said.

Rochelle area residents can also participate in KSRA programs in the other areas it works in like DeKalb or Genoa without having to pay out-of-district fees. Stevens said she enjoys being able to broaden the park district's reach, which doesn't often happen.

Stevens believes the

new REC facility lends itself well to special recreation. It's one-level and wheelchairs or accessibility devices can be used on the turf. The flooring on the courts is durable.

"It opens up the door to all sorts of activities that could happen there rather than just basketball and volleyball," Stevens said. "The pools are really nice because there are ADA-accessible lifts to get into both pools."

Schaefer agreed and said having The REC as an option is "really exciting" and she thinks it will allow KSRA to build more programs in the Rochelle

pandemic "screeched KSRA to a halt," Schaefer said. She tasked staff with keeping people involved and engaged. Some virtual programming was done. KSRA was able to bring its largest program, Camp Maple Leaf, back when guidelines allowed.

"Our parents said it wouldn't work virtually,"

Schaefer said. "We had it and went the full seven weeks following guidelines with 30 kids. It was a great time. A lot of the parents were thankful the kids could get out and be around their peers."

Schaefer called the need for special recreation "wide and far-reaching." When she started with KSRA four years ago, she spoke with all of the school districts and got the numbers of kids in special education. Not every child in special education needs

KSRA's services, but she knows based on those numbers her organization has room to grow.

"Being able to have somebody take a swimming lesson or participate in a program that they wouldn't normally be able to is huge," Stevens said. Especially now more than ever. You don't really realize it until you're someone who is needing it or has a child who needs it. And then once you receive it, it's just a weight off your chest."





City of Rochelle confirms A+ bond rating

ROCHELLE — The City of Rochelle recently held a bond rating call with Standard and Poor's for an upcoming Electric System Alternate Revenue Source General Obligation Bond sale. The city's current bond rating of A+ was reaffirmed, a press release said.

"For a rural community our size this is an above average bond rating," a press release said. "Some of the of the reasons for the

reaffirmation of the current rating include: Strong management with good financial policies and practices, strong budgetary performance, very strong budget flexibility and very strong liquidity.'

"A strong credit rating is an important piece of our strategic plan," City Manager Jeff Fiegenschuh said. "The ability to take advantage of lower interest rates and current construction costs to complete

projects today will save our residents money in the long run."

In the coming months, the City of Rochelle anticipates extending \$18 million of Electric System Alternate Revenue Source

General Obligation bonds to fund top priority electric infrastructure projects through the community. This transaction will not affect property tax rates as the bond payment will tie to electric revenues.

One such woman was Laura Fessler. Born Laura Sechler in Pennsylvania, she and her family moved to Rochelle when she was very young. Laura was educated in the Rochelle school system.

In 1879, Laura married James Fessler. James was a successful businessman and banker. Though James was a very prominent member of the community, Laura was not going to live in her husband's shadow. She had a light of her own and was not going to hide it beneath a bushel. Laura Fessler was committed to improving her community and the lives of those who lived and worked there. Laura founded the Hu-

mane Society in Rochelle. She was instrumental in securing the Iron Fountain that today sits in front of the Flagg-Rochelle Museum on 4th Avenue. The fountain serves humans, dogs, cats, birds, and horses. Many who grew up in Rochelle have slaked their thirst at the fountain. Laura pushed for legisla-

tion at the state level for the adoption of a state tree, bird, and flower. She also fought to have the school children of Illinois determine the winners. It was Jan. 29, 1908 that the State of Illinois passed legislation adopting the Oak, Cardinal, and Violet, in no small part due to the efforts of Laura

In 1915, Laura Fessler became the first woman candidate for city council in a local election. With no woman's vote, she missed being elected by fewer than 180 votes. The 19th Amendment, or Woman's Suffrage, was passed in Illinois on June 10, 1919. Illinois was the first state to pass the right of women to vote and that was four years after Laura was almost elected.

It was 1979, 64 years later, before a woman was elected to office in Rochelle. Laura owned one of the first electric cars in Rochelle. In 1915, she was driving "green."

A member of the Daughters of the American Revo-

lution, Order of the Eastern Star, Rochelle Woman's Club and the Rochelle Civic Council, Laura kept busy.

With the outbreak of World War I, Laura became active in the support of our troops at Camp Grant

in Rockford. The troops could count on Laura and her friends to organize book collections, baked goods, knitting, sewing and social activities for the warriors. If the soldiers had a need Laura found a way to answer their call.

She was trained in surgical dressing and nursing and when the Spanish Flu was decimating our troops Laura was at Camp Grant working in the camp hospital trying to save lives. In a war where 45,000 soldiers died from flu, Laura was on the front lines.

From her home at 520 N. 6th St. Laura established an impromptu park on the empty lot across the street from her house. She began a new mission, create a city park that could be utilized by all of the citizens of

Through her involvement with the Woman's Club she began work toward acquiring land for a city park. Unfortunately, time was not on Laura's side. She became ill and passed in 1920.

The Woman's Club was successful in buying land on the south side of town in 1922. Initially called Oak Park, the land was given to the City of Rochelle and re-named Memorial Park. It became the first park for the City of Rochelle fulfilling one of Laura's greatest dreams, a place where every person could go and be surrounded by nature.

Laura lived a life devoted to giving and we all enjoy the fruits of her labor.

The painful legacy of a crime covered 31 years ago

find myself grieving for Jennifer liked to twirl around someone I've never met every Sept. 17 — for the past 31 years.

Back in 1990, I was working as the night police reporter for the Quad-City Times when I was dispatched to a fire at a school playground at 9 p.m.

I was one of the first on the scene. I walked to where I saw smoke rising from some tall weeds

on the edge of the playground, looked down and was met with the body of a child that had been doused with gasoline and set on fire. I staggered backwards gasp-

ing for air. I could feel the bile rise in my throat and my knees go weak. It was the last thing I expected to find on a crisp autumn evening in Davenport, I was there when the firefight-

ers, the detectives, the medical examiner and a horde of reporters arrived. And I stood a few feet from

the smoldering remains wondering: Who would do such a thing?

What evil lurked in the shadows that committed such an act? We later learned that the vic-

tim was Jennifer Ann Lewis, a

pugnacious tom-boy from Rock

Island's west end. She was last seen buying gum from a neighborhood store. She never came back. Year after year, I've learned a bit more

about this girl. And the more I learn, the sadder I become. I've wondered what her life would have been like if she had

A teacher's aide told me how

in frilly dresses hiking the hem higher and higher as she spun. Her best friend told me how they

played with "My Little Ponies" together. Her mother recalled

her daughter's sweet disposition, how she loved her newborn baby brother and her dog, Bowser.

We name buildings after wealthy benefactors, bridges after politicians and streets after celebrities.

But our collective recollection of children who die at the hands of others fades. A granite monument funded by the community was placed on

the playground where Jennifer's corpse was found. Awhile back, I went looking for it only to learn vandals long ago destroyed it. Even in death, she isn't ac-

corded the respect her life was due. No one that night walked

away from that school yard unchanged.

One former police lieutenant froze on a witness stand years later as he suffered a "flashback" to that horrible night. A police sergeant, who I knew well, had a fit of rage years later when Jennifer's name was evoked.

A corporal at that scene descended into alcoholism.

For me, slumber was elusive for weeks following that fateful night.

Another reporter who was there confessed to her teenage sons, decades later, that it is the one image from her journalism career that she can't rid her mind of. During the past five years,

I spent much time researching the case. I've found myself interviewing vagrants beneath underpasses in New Orleans, knocking on doors of Mississippi shacks and wading through thousands of pages of Iowa court

documents. I now know much more. But am I any closer to understanding? Well, I certainly don't understand what would possess

someone to commit such evil.

I produced a podcast on the case and Jennifer's name is now known by many. I want to write a book about the crime. But each time I sit down to write, I'm met with the image of a bucktoothed smile and the unassuming brown eyes of a child who never turned

That photo haunts me. To this youngster, whom I've

never met, I can only promise: Your memory will not be lost. A man is serving a life sentence for her murder. He's

been tried four times for the same crime – three convictions and one hung jury. His appeals Although three juries have

found him guilty, when I think of Jennifer, I prefer to think of innocence.

I think of a child without guile who was raped, strangled and burned. I think of a youngster who ran down school hallways telling teachers and classmates alike about her upcoming birth-

She just didn't know that was the day she would be buried.
