Gov. signs bill to save plant

OGLE COUNTY

Byron nuke station now being refueled instead of shut down



BYRON – The familiar sight of steam rising from the Byron Generating Station continues, although it is down to rising from one tower as the station refuels.

With Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker signing a new energy bill that was favorable to nuclear plants into law on Sept. 15, the Byron Station will continue to operate. It's owner, Exelon Generation, had threatened to close the station on Sept. 13 without the new bill.

"I was both excited and relieved to watch the Illinois Senate provide a concurrence vote in favor of SB2408," said Erin Folk, executive director of the Oregon park District and part of FAIRCOM (Fair **Assessment Information** Resource Committee). "Local taxing bodies, state legislators, community members and so many others have spent the past year working together for a common goal and our efforts paid off. Nuclear energy not only creates the opportunity for clean energy, but it saves jobs, stabilizes the local economy and allows taxing bodies to continue to provide the services our residents have come to rely on."

"We commend the

"The new policy offers a better future for the employees who have run these plants at world-class levels, the plant communities that we are privileged to serve and all Illinoisans eager to build a clean-energy economy that works for everyone."

Todd Tucker, executive director of the Byron Forest Preserve District, said that not only are the nuclear plants needed to reach clean energy goals, but they are economic engines for the local economy.

"It's paramount for our agency," he said. "It's paramount for our taxpayers, our schools." As one of the local offi-

cials dedicated to keeping the plant open, Tucker said the grassroots effort to keep the Byron plant open certainly helped. "You can't lay back

and act like it's going to happen anyway and not do anything," he said.

The new bill was signed more than a year after Exelon announced the

two plants would close. The Byron plant provides about 700 jobs as well as millions in local tax

The Byron CUSD#226 paid for the economic impact study, and it showed that about 74 percent of the district's revenue comes from the Byron Station.

The study showed that the Byron Station's direct contribution to the regional economy (GDP) is estimated to be more than \$288 million. That is 1.6 percent of the total GDP of the region. For the Ogle County, Byron Station's total contribution to the economy is estimated to be \$338 million; 17 percent of the county's total GDP.



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

Be thoughtful when burning waste

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) responds to several citizen complaints each Fall regarding the open burning of landscape waste and other materials.

These complaints range from the illegal open burning of waste and trash to nuisance conditions produced by smoldering leaves, grass clippings, and other landscape waste. The OCSWMD dis-

courages the open burning of landscape waste in Ogle County and encourages residents to either bag up and have the landscape waste hauled away to be composted, or use the lawnmower to mulch up fallen leaves, as opposed to open burning. If you live in or near a municipality there may be more restrictive ordinances in place regarding the open burning of landscape waste. Check your local ordinances prior to any open burning of landscape waste.

In Illinois, most waste materials are prohibited from being openly burned. Materials which are commonly unlawfully burned include furniture, mattresses, carpet, textiles, construction and demolition debris, plastic materials, and garbage. The open burning of most waste in Illinois is in violation of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act and can be punishable through substantial fines and/or a Class A misdemeanor.

Be a good neighbor this Fall and eliminate the nuisance smoke conditions and other problems associated with open burning. 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





Farm Safety

Some safety tips while working on the farm

Tractor accidents, grain entrapment and injuries from ornery livestock are just some of the dangers agricultural workers face every day. In fact, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health says agriculture is one of the most hazardous industries in the United States.

In 2016, the agricultural industry had a rate of 21.4 deaths per 100,000 workers, and each day agricultural workers experienced 100 non-fatal, lost-work-time

Agricultural dangers are not limited to North America. In Ireland, farm accidents have increased by 13 percent in the last five years and by 31 percent in the last decade, according to a national survey of farm accidents conducted by the Teagasc National Farm Survey. Furthermore, 97 percent of all farm accident victims required medical treatment.

Farms are dangerous places, and while carelessness can and does contribute to many incidents, accidents also



take place during routine, seemingly safe activities. These farm safety guidelines can help lower the risk of injuries.

• Know farm equipment. Read and follow all instructions in the equipment operation manuals. In addition, attend local

farm safety workshops to learn more about specific equipment and products.

buildings and grounds for obvious hazards, such as fire hazards and hazardous materials, including farm chemicals that are not stored correctly.

 Practice cleanliness. Maintain clean and neat work areas with tools stored properly and out of the way after use.

 Be mindful of your clothing and hair. Many accidents involve a power take-off system, or PTO, which is a common component of large rotary mowers, tractors and forage choppers. Clothing can easily get caught in an engaged but unguarded PTO stub. It's easy for laces or coveralls to become wrapped around a spinning stub shaft. The PTO driveline and other protrusion points also can be dangerous if people do not pay attention.

• Use rollover protection structures. ROPS can be used on tractors and other equipment to prevent injuries. In addition, wear seat belts and employ other safety equipment as advised.

• Avoid extra passengers. It can be tempting to take the kids for a spin,



Pretty much everyone who worked there was a teenager. I think the manager was 21. Needless to say, we had a great time. I had no problem taking as many hours as they would give me. I had to pay for my own insurance and gas, so I needed the job.

But this job was not only fun, it was a way of life. When we weren't working, we would hang out there. I ate there even on my days off. The pizza was incredibly good. I even made the dough and sauce myself many times. Gary was in his 30s and

was a super fun guy. One unique physical feature about him was he had huge thumbs. And I mean sideshow size thumbs. We would tell the new employees to give Gary a thumb's up, just to watch him nail them in the face with a glob of cold dough. We had some great

and probably dangerous pranks we pulled on new hires. When you walked in the back door after a delivery, there was a long counter on the right. That is where you tossed your car keys. Between deliveries you would fold boxes, roll dough or answer calls. Well, we would take

the keys from the counter when the newbie wasn't looking and put them in the oven. After a few minutes, we get the keys out and toss them on the counter. Next up, simply tell

a delivery and watch him

grab his keys and scream

Oregon Board can still make right decision

Dear Editor,

(Disclaimer, I am a MMHS graduate from 1976.)

An open letter to the Oregon Board of Education Members,

To start, thank you all for your service. Public service is difficult and vital! Thank you for your sacrifices.

I am told the Oregon Board of Education has already voted on the future of the DL Rahn Junior High as of August 16, 2021. That said, no decision is ever final till it's too late to change, and it is not yet too late to change this decision, should reason enough be discovered to change course.

Based on my experience as a former elected official, I would caution the Oregon School Board not to make an educational decision in a vacuum or bubble. It appears, though, that is exactly what has happened. Consider the following:

If the School Board invests a few million dollars today inside the Oregon city limits to accommodate the District's Junior High students, now being educated in Mt. Morris, and thus abandoning DL Rahn, it will:

* Cause little to no increase in the EAV's of the properties in Oregon.

* Cause severe decrease in the

EAV's of properties in Mt. Morris, undoubtedly by more than the combined Oregon property owners will increase, if they increase at all, which is unlikely. The result of this scenario is a net

loss in total EAV for the property owners "throughout" the school district. This makes it a bad civic investment. In addition, every other taxing unit funded by Mt. Morris and Oregon residents will incur problems because the School Board is effectively lowering the total EAV.

A further result of these two effects will be to shift the tax burden for the Oregon School District to those with a higher percentage the District's total EAV, which means Oregon residents will pay higher taxes and Mt. Morris residents will pay less. I doubt this was intended by the School Board, and perhaps not even considered.

Thus, there are no winners in the decision to move the Junior High students to Oregon. Oregon residents will pay more tax, and Mt. Morris residents will lose EAV. Everyone loses.

On the other hand, if the School Board should choose to invest a few million dollars today into the city limits of Mt. Morris at the DL Rahn School, leaving the education sharing division between Oregon and Mt. Morris in place, it will:

* Cause no change to the EAV's of properties in Oregon.

* Cause slight to modest increases in the EAV's of properties in Mt. Morris by keeping the last remaining vestiges of an educational system within its city limits.

The result of this scenario is a net gain in the total EAV for the School District. This makes it a good civic investment!

A further result of this strategy will also be to shift the tax burden for the Oregon School District to those with a higher percentage of the District's total EAV, which means Oregon residents would pay less tax than in the currently-adopted strategy, and Mt. Morris residents would pay more.

Everyone wins in this scenario. This is why the decision on where to invest Junior High dollars is best for all if that investment occurs in Mt. Morris at the current DL Rahn Junior High.

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




