School's open: Amboy students return to the classroom

AMBOY - With Amboy students returning to their classrooms last week, the district's three school principals reported a successful start to the year during the Aug. 24 Board of Education meeting. Amboy High School Principal Janet Crownhart, Amboy Junior High Principal Andrew Full and Central Elementary Principal Joyce Schamberger, each praised everyone's hard work in getting the buildings ready for students and for helping with the move to the new junior high building.

Superintendent Joshua Nichols also thanked all of the staff, board members and others who came in and helped with the move to the new junior high. "There were a lot of last minute details to get done but we got it accomplished," he said later in the week. "It's great to finally have kids in the building - we're very glad to have them here."

Nichols said he expects most of the outside work on the building project to be done by mid September, barring any unforeseen problems. The new high school gym is basically done, as well, but they still have to wait a couple weeks for the floor to cure before it can be used Nichols noted that the high school will have their volleyball season but for now, practices are taking place in the old gym. The other unfinished area in the new building is the storm shelter, which includes the junior high cafeteria and offices. Nichols said they are still waiting for the storm rated

windows, which are supposed to arrive soon. The other missing item is a heavy glass door (storm rated) that will complete the area, but it is still on back order. "Right now, we're not sure how long that will take, so at this point it's just a supply concern," he said.

In the meantime, the junior high offices are set up in the old high school office area and tables are set up in the old gym at lunchtime for junior high students to eat. "We're staggering lunch times and making adjustments to make it all work for now," Nichols said.

Amboy Fire awarded federal grant

WASHINGTON-U.S. Senators Dick Durbin (D-IL) and Tammy Duckworth (D-IL) announced that three rural fire and emergency medical services (EMS) agencies in Illinois have been awarded a total of \$381,091 in federal grant funding. This federal funding was created by Durbin's Supporting and Improving Rural EMS Needs (SIREN) Act, which was signed into law in 2018. Today's funding supports EMS agencies in responding to the opioid epidemic, COVID-19 pandemic, and other rural health challenges, including by training and recruiting staff, conducting certification courses, and purchasing equipment.

"Across our state, rural EMS agencies are on the front lines of responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, the opioid crisis, and treating the emergency needs of an aging population. Yet many face workforce and geographic challenges in their communities and lack steady funding to support their operations. That's why I first introduced the SIREN Act and continue to work to provide much needed funding to our rural communities," Durbin said. "Congratulations to the three Illinois agencies awarded today and I thank our first responders for their tireless work serving our communities."

Masks mandated indoors in Illinois; vaccines required for some workers

SPRINGFIELD – The statewide mask mandate indoors is back, and educators and health care professionals will be required to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, Gov. JB Pritzker announced Thursday, Aug. 26 amid an ongoing surge in the pandemic that first arrived in Illinois in March 2020.

Beginning Monday, Aug. 30, people will be required to wear masks indoors, Pritzker announced.

The vaccine requirement, which goes into effect Sept. 5, will apply to "all P-12 teachers and staff, all higher education personnel, all higher education students, and health care workers in a variety of settings, such as hospitals, nursing homes, urgent care facilities and physician's offices," Pritzker said at a news conference in Chicago.

Sublette woman found dead in cornfield after searching for lost dog

OTTAWA – The body of Rhonda Politsch, 62, of Sublette was found in a cornfield near Ottawa on Saturday, Aug. 28 after being reported missing around 10 p.m. the night before. Ottawa Police were informed that a woman, later identified as Politsch, had her dog run away from her and into a cornfield earlier in the day in the area of Farm and Fleet in Ottawa.

Ottawa Police responded to the area, located Politsch's vehicle unoccupied and immediately began their investigation and a search. The LaSalle County Sheriff's Office was contacted and also responded to the scene along with the Utica Fire Department. The ground search continued into the early morning hours.

Additional help was provided by the Illinois Search and Rescue Council (ISAR) and the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS). The LaSalle County State's Attorney's Office offered technical assistance, and the Illinois State Police provided aerial surveillance during the search. Help was also provided by multiple volunteer search groups that responded from across the state.

Police said Politsch was last seen at Farm and Fleet around 11 a.m. on Friday by members of the public, who assisted her in searching for her dog inside the cornfield. Police were notified that Politsch may be missing later that night, when an acquaintance was unable to get in touch with her after seeing a Facebook post about Politsch's missing collie, Quinn.

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
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Politsch was located deceased in the cornfield by a search team around 1:30 p.m. on Saturday. The missing dog was found on Monday and taken to a veterinary hospital for treatment.

The incident remains under investigation by the Ottawa Police Department and the LaSalle County Coroner's Office. They expressed their appreciation to each agency, group and person that assisted in the search.

Politsch was a long-time employee of Pioneer State Bank in Sublette, formerly Sublette Farmers State Bank.

Stoller's S.A.L.T. deduction bill becomes law

PEORIA – Nearly 400,000 small business owners could potential see tax relief thanks to legislation sponsored by State Senator Win Stoller (R-Germantown Hills) that just became law.

"We live in a state which has one of the highest overall tax burdens in the entire nation," said Stoller. "While we still have more work to do when it comes to alleviating our state's high tax problem, I'm proud to have passed legislation that will ease some of that burden for our struggling small business community."

Senate Bill 2531 utilizes an IRS-approved method that allows pass-through businesses, such as S-corporations and partnerships, to avoid the \$10,000 cap on the State and Local Tax (SALT) deduction that was created by the federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act in 2017. Until now, owners of passthrough entities reported their share of business income on their individual income tax return. This meant that they were subjected to the \$10,000 deduction cap on state and local taxes. With a simple change to the state's tax code, SB 2531 allows up to 400,000 Illinois small business owners to save thousands of dollars on their federal taxes.

"This legislation is a common-sense approach to help out our state's small businesses as they deal with the effects of the ongoing COVID recession," said Illinois Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Todd Maisch. "Senator Stoller's bill has the potential to help thousands of Illinois business owners while they try to recover."

Stoller's S.AL.T. deduction bill allows a small business to elect to be taxed at the entity level, instead of letting the income pass through to their personal return. The owner would then claim an offsetting credit on their state return. While the new law has the potential to save thousands for struggling small business owners, it would have no cost on the state of Illinois.

"Federal investments like these help Illinois's dedicated rural EMS workers serve on the front lines in their communities," Duckworth said. "First responders across our state need support to make their important work possible, and I'm proud to announce this infusion of federal funding alongside Senator Durbin."

Amboy Ambulance & Fire Protection District (Lee County): \$116,432


Nauvoo Fire Protection District (Hancock County): \$115,835

Jersey Community Hospital District (Jersey County): \$148,824

Durbin helped to secure a \$500,000 increase in the Fiscal Year 2021 Omnibus Appropriations Bill, for a total of \$5.5 million, for SIREN Act grants to rural fire and EMS agencies. Each year since the SIREN Act was signed into law, Durbin has led efforts in the annual federal appropriations process to fund this program.

In 2019, Durbin visited the Nauvoo Fire Protection District to discuss passage and implementation of the SIREN Act. He was joined by Mark Kennedy, a paramedic for the Nauvoo Fire Protection District and Chair of the Illinois chapter of the National Association of EMTs, whose advocacy efforts helped with passage of the SIREN Act.

A decline in primary care and hospital service availability, great distances between health care facilities, and low insurance reimbursement for transport and emergency treatment have all strained rural EMS agencies. At the same time, EMS agencies today are tasked with ever-greater responsibilities—addressing the COVID-19 pandemic, preparing for natural and manmade disasters and bioterror threats, supporting the chronic and emergency care needs of an aging population, and responding on the front lines of the opioid epidemic.

"Effective Sept. 5, individuals working in these settings who are unable or unwilling to receive their first dose of vaccine will be required to get tested for COVID-19 at least once a week, and IDPH and (the Illinois State Board of Education) may require more frequent testing in certain situations, like in an outbreak," he said.

Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said the state is seeing 220 hospital admissions per day, a number on par with a surge in May. Pritzker said 98 percent of cases, 96 percent of hospitalizations and 95 percent of deaths since January have been among unvaccinated people.

While vaccines are the best defense, Ezike said, "wearing a mask continues to be one of the simplest, cheapest ways to reduce the spread of COVID-19."

Intensive care bed availability in southern Illinois is at 3 percent, he said.

"That's because the regions with the lowest vaccination rates are the regions where there are fewer hospitals, and lower hospital capacity," Pritzker said. "And those hospitals are sometimes the least well equipped to handle cases as they become more acute."

He added, "We are continuing to rely on experts at the (U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) and (Illinois Department of Public Health), but you don't need to be an epidemiologist to understand what's going on here. This is a pandemic of the unvaccinated."

The current vaccination rates – nearly 53 percent of the state's population is vaccinated – "are not enough to blunt the ferocity of the delta variant," which has led to hospitals "again fighting the battle that we had hoped would be behind us by now."

Republicans, meanwhile, continue to call on the governor to further involve the General Assembly in his COVID-19 response.



The Green-Eyed Monster

suppose I should have avoided a thriller that has its own ad in the title. In Freida McFadden's novel "The Wife Upstairs: A Twisted Psychological Thriller That Will Keep You Guessing," the twists are predictable and the ending isn't much of a surprise. Sylvie Robinson, the heroine of this tale, is so exceedingly unaware (to put it charitably) to what is going on around her, irritation rather than engagement with her story takes over early on.

We meet Sylvie in a small diner in New York City where she saves an old woman from choking on a sausage. The woman is outraged by Sylvie's good deed, she's sure one of her ribs is broken. To the rescue comes the tall, dark stranger in the person of Adam Bennett. With eyes "the exact color of freshly cut grass" and an irresistible crooked smile, Adam is moreover a best-selling author, as Sylvie discovers later on: "There are articles online that say he's one of the best modern writers of our time. The next Stephen King.' Sylvie is bashful: "I bite my lip to keep from mentioning I was always a solid C student - and that was in a good year. I dropped out of high school, and although I did eventually get my GED, I never would have considered college, even if it were an option."

Adam is of course very rich. How serendipitous that a millionaire sits in a dingy diner waiting to offer our downon-her-luck heroine a job at \$1,500 a week. He would like to hire Sylvie as a live-in caretaker for his invalid wife. The

mansion in Montauk on Long Island is not described - there is no atmosphere to speak of in the novel - but for a twisting white staircase. Victoria, Adam's wife, once beautiful and sophisticated, now lame in a wheelchair, unable to articulate more than one word per day, accidentally fell down the staircase. Adam is the saintly husband who will do anything for her. Victoria soon insists that Sylvie find her diary. The diary in which cultured Victoria sounds exactly like uneducated Sylvie, describes Adam as a monster, starting on their wedding night in Las Vegas. Evil personified, or rather jealousy personified: the green-eyed monster.

Blithely unconcerned, Sylvie spends evenings with Adam eating TV dinners in front of the TV. Why super-rich Adam buys TV dinners rather than hire a chef is a mystery, though Sylvie reports, "I'm sure Adam thinks TV dinners are lowbrow food, but it's sort of a treat for me." Naturally, she sleeps with him. Even the plot of Adam's breakout best seller does not alarm her. Victoria describes it in her diary. It's called "All in the Family" in which the hero murders his parents. I couldn't help but think of poor Archie and Edith Bunker.

"I wasn't asked." If you are reading this, you are being asked.



For some families, the cost of war can be immeasurable

s Americans fled Kabul and des-perate Afghans sought to follow, Guest Column ^{could} have been created with that money. Of course, those figures understate the Jerry and Brett Young stood in the yard of their rural Rochester home Friday and remembered their boy who never got to see his 26th birthday.

"He loved to skateboard when he was younger. And he loved all kinds of music. He especially liked jazz, the blues and hard rock," Brett recalled of her son Chad.

His father Jerry pointed to two road signs hanging on a nearby shed.

One designated a portion of Illinois 4 as the "Cpl. James 'Chad' Young Memorial Highway." Another recognized him as a 2003 Glenwood High School graduate killed in that distant land.

This nation honors its war dead, as well it should. I admire the willingness of our servicemen and women to sacrifice for this great

nation. But I'm left wondering if our nation is too willing to send men and women into harms' way.

I'm not a pacifist but I find myself often skeptical of our government's intentions.

Jimmy Carter, perhaps the best person to be president in my lifetime, annoyed many when he said the U.S. is the most warlike nation in history. That's a tough pill to swallow. But it's worth noting that of the 245 years the nation has existed, we have been at war 226 years.

A Brown University study found that since 9/11 the U.S. has spent more than \$6.4 trillion on military actions in the Middle East.

Think how many schools, highways, bridges and parks

Of course, those figures understate the cost of war. For families such as the Youngs, the cost has been immeasurable. Tears still flow freely 11 years after his death. And his was one of nearly 7,000 American service men and women killed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

At least 801,000 people have been killed by direct war violence in Iraq, Afghanistan, Syria, Yemen, and Pakistan. Many were civilians.

'You know all politicians lie," Jerry Young said. "They will say things that aren't true or they will vote for something they really don't believe in because someone did them a favor."

While he had a strong opinion about the integrity, or the lack of it, exhibited by our elected officials, his opinion on the Afghanistan war is muted.

"I really don't have an opinion on what is happening over there other than its sad. It's like when Osama Bin Laden was killed, some reporter called and wanted our opinion. What are we supposed to say? We are glad he's dead?"

For Rock Island native Tyler Carroll, the war was almost half his lifetime ago. The 41-year-old, was one of the first soldiers to fight in Afghanistan after 9/11.

"I had friends killed over there and I know others who were badly wounded. And others came home with mental issues," he said.

The Afghanistan war is the longest in U.S. history.

"It's not affecting me as much as others," Carroll said. "It was so long ago for me. Was it worth it? Well, our initial mission was to destroy Al Qaeda and make sure the Taliban was not in control. Al Qaeda was damaged, Osama Bin Laden has been killed but the Taliban is back in control. Perhaps they weren't ready for democracy. But many of the people we interacted with there seemed to want it."

Democracy runs in Carroll's blood. He's a scion of a Quad-City political dynasty. His grandpa is former state Sen. Denny Jacobs, his great grandfather was state Rep. Oral Jacobs and his uncle is former state Sen. Mike Jacobs.

Still, he is skeptical whether the U.S. should impose democracy on other nations.

One shouldn't be surprised. Most wars end in ambiguity. We honor the abstract causes for which men and women fought -- freedom, patriotism, service -- but we can also question the wisdom of policies that deployed them into harm's way.

When I was a child in the 1970s, I didn't think much about war. I was in 4th grade when Saigon fell in April of 1975.

Not long after that, I was canoeing down a river with my parents and we met another family paddling downstream -- a husband, wife and two little girls.

The man in the other canoe had no legs.

For the rest of the trip my mother was quiet and contemplative

Finally, I asked her, "Why doesn't that man have any legs?" Her voice cracked and she said, "He lost them in that awful, awful war. We should never have been there.'

Last week, when I saw the hurt in Chad Young's parent's eyes and heard the reports from Kabul, I couldn't help but think the same thing.

SPORTS Clipper Highlights: #44 Scott Montavon

his week's Clipper epitomizes one of our most iconic positions in our program's history. Toughness, hard-nosed, and selfless are qualities that made this Clipper one of the best at this storied position in our program. I am honored to announce the week's Clipper, State Champion, Fullback, #44, Scott Montavon.

Scott was a 1985 graduate of Amboy High School. In speaking with Scott, I had asked him the reason for wearing #44.

Scott shared, "I liked that number and it fit the tradition of great Fullbacks we had in our program to that time."

Scott would not only add to that tradition, but his play, alike that of Kaleel and Lyons before him, would serve as a benchmark in our program for decades of great fullbacks. The iconic position and number would be shared the following year with Clipper great Dennis Nauman, and again years later with other Clipper great, Brandon Miller.

Scott's Junior season, he rotated in at Linebacker on one of the greatest Clipper Defenses in our history.

"It was incredible to be a part of that defense. It was made up of a good combination of Juniors and Seniors," Scott shared.

That defensive unit was made up of some of the toughest Clippers to wear the uniform. Sadly, Scott broke his hand during the final regular season game of his Junior season which sidelined him, out of uniform. for the first round playoff game against Ottawa Marquette. This injury leads to Scott being, potentially, the only Clipper in our history to never lose a football game in any contest he played in, was suited up for, or on the field for. Being a neat statistic is all it holds to Scott to this day as he and I agreed that given a couple factors being different that Wednesday night in Amboy, our 1983 Clippers could also be State Champions.

We spoke of the summer going into his Senior season at length.

"It was full of electricity.



only had four or five carries but compiled 85-90 yards. One of Scott's best statistical games came in the playoffs against Kewanee Wethersfield as he rushed for 130 yards and two touchdowns. Midway through the season, Scott, a 200 pound Fullback, began returning punts and hardly ever let the ball hit the ground. Scott was the returner in the State game against Paxton where the infamous punt hit the Paxton player's helmet and then ruled Paxton football. Scott shared the official who made the call, later admitted to making the wrong call.

Scott ended the perfect, State Championship season, earning 1st Team All Conference, Second Team All Area, and Honorable Mention All State honors. However, what most may not know, and one of the greatest compliments to an Offensive Line, is that RB Dennis Ely averaged 7.7 yards per carry and Scott averaged 7.6 yards per carry. As I've said in previous highlights, as a Fullback, in a "three yards and a cloud of dust" offense, 7.6 yards per carry is unheard of.

Scott has been the only State Champion Clipper that I asked to compare/ contrast the two, incredible, feelings. The first of which being the palpable buzz that made all 205 Amboy School District square miles feel like an electric force field at the beginning of the 1984 campaign. The second feeling being the bittersweet, overwhelming satisfaction, joy, and accomplishment that came with bringing the State



of the community support. I remember older members of the community coming up to all of us and saying 'you'll all have this and remember it forever."

Former teammate, friend, and backfield partner, Dennis Ely, shared, "Scott was a good, strong, powerful fullback. He broke through the line and was a great blocker for me. He was a great teammate and we all got along. I remember one play, it was a Power I, 23 power, and Scott and I hit this big Kewanee lineman so hard that he did a summersault. I'll never forget it because he was a big guy and both of us hit him, hard, at the same time.'

Former teammate and friend, Scott Meadows, shared, "What can I say about 'Mot' He has been a great friend both during our days playing football and still to this day! He like all of us on that championship team played for each other, no I in team. Mot knew he had a job to do and he got it done. I don't recall his stats, but I know Mot ran hard when his number was called and was definitely a huge part of our success that season. He also was a great lead blocker as well. Congratulations Mot for making this weeks pick. You definitely deserve it and I'm very happy for you." Former teammate and lifelong friend, Dan Etheridge, shared, "Scott was one of my best friends in school and to this day. Scott was just a natural all around athlete. Scott was a prototypical fullback. He ran like a tank. He would run over the first would-be tackler, then had the speed to outrun the rest. He had several breakaway runs for touchdowns. He was one of the fastest on the team. He was a great lead blocker for the Ely tandem. Scott also had great hands. He had soft hands as a receiver and

strong hands handling the ball. I don't remember him ever fumbling. If we needed a few yards for a first down, with our line and Scott running up the middle, it was a given he would get it. Scott was a key component of what I believe was one of the best backfields in Clipper history. He is deserving of the honor."

Scott was nominated this week by his nephew, Westin Montavon. Westin will undoubtedly have his day on this page for his great Clipper career but shared the following about his Uncle Scott.

"Hearing the stories of Uncle Scott's State Team growing up, I was always amazed," Westin said. "Then seeing their highlight film in Coach Nauman's basement my sophomore year, it all made perfect sense. It was really special to see how well they played and it gave me a sense of pride knowing that my uncle was an essential cog in the Big Red Mean Machine. I know myself and many of the players on our teams looked up to those guys and wanted to carry on

the tradition to the standard that they had met and set."

I've never personally met Scott, but like the 60+ Highlights thus far, Scott spoke highly of all of his teammates. Scott spoke at length about their unbreakable bonds, not only on the field, but off as well.

Scott shared, "We were just a phenomenal group. There was never any animosity or jealousy amongst any of us."

It's been frequent where we have highlighted a member of the 1984 Championship team, as our only championship team it's to be expected. Their success not only produced the hardware in the trophy case or the wall of fame at AHS. Their success teaches something, something more powerful than a football game or a season. The two greatest qualities a team or person can possess were held, acted upon, and passed down in our program from that season forward; first, the ability to stare adversity in the face, wink at it, and tell it "I'm coming right here, stop me" and second, a selflessness that makes the team or collective greater than any individual glory or pride. Our success as a program has been hinged on these principles. Amboy Football to Scott

as a Senior in high school meant everything, "It was the reason to go to school, the reason to get good grades, the reason to stay in shape, and the reason to come together as young men."

Today's meaning is shown in Scott's continued friendship with his teammates. Scott admitted it's not always the topic of discussion but the memories of that season are discussed whenever he and his former teammates get together.

So, to State Champion, All-State Honorable Mention Fullback, #44, Scott Montavon, thank you for your contributions to Amboy Football. As fond as you are of the great tradition in our program, whether it is listening to Queen postgame in the locker room after a big win, a jersey number, or the great support from the Amboy community, your own exploits have inspired tradition within your position. With Fullbacks and Running Backs being among the best, most decorated players, in our program, it would be a hard argument to keep your name anywhere other than near the top of the list. Sail on!

Spencer Morrissey, is a former resident of Amboy and 2009 graduate of Amboy High School. In April 2020, he created a private Facebook group specifically for Amboy Clipper Football Alumni. To have played Amboy football for any period of time, 1 year or all 4 years, is the only membership requirement. The group features photos, stories, and memories of past Clippers and Clipper teams. The best feature of the group is every Friday, he highlights a former player.



It was really something special," Scott shared of the Amboy community prior to the 1984 season. Being as close to the "Friday Night Lights" feel as any of us, it was all football, all the time, in Amboy.

Scott shared, "People who you didn't know, knew who you were as a Clipper and there would be yard signs all through town and all the way out to the country. They stayed up all year round."

Scott was only able to make a couple of the pre-season workouts as he was relied on at the family farm.

"My dad said, 'if you have time go in there you have time to do extra chores around the farm, and I guarantee you I can get you in better shape than workouts could," Scott said.


Scott came into the 1984 season at 200 pounds and ready to earn the Clippers four yards and a cloud of dust with every carry.

The 1984 season opened against Spring Valley Hall and it was in the first possession of the game that Scott knew just how powerful the Clipper offense would be. Scott got one of the opening handoffs and was head down ready to run through a group of Red Devil defenders. There was just one (good) problem, the defender's weren't there. The Clipper offensive line opened a hole so big that Scott saw nothing but green grass.

"I was head down but looked up briefly and saw a gigantic hole. I ended up falling down because of my momentum was forcing me down, I got some grief for that one," Scott shared. The semi-truck size hole was an indication of the success to come. Scott remembers games where he may have

The Lady Clippers dropped a 25-12, 25-5 decision at Mendota on Aug. 26.


Clippers begin eight-man football, by pummeling Peoria Heights
