Illinois mandates masks at schools, day cares, long-term care facilities

☐ State says COVID-19 proving more problematic for those 20 and younger

SPRINGFIELD – Masks will be required at all Illinois long-term care facilities, day cares and Pre-K-12 schools, Gov. JB Pritzker announced last week amid a nationwide surge of COVID-19.

"Every time we think we know where this virus is headed, it changes and it shifts," Pritzker said at a COVID-19 briefing in Chicago. "For example, unlike before, people

29 years old and younger accounted for 12 percent of hospitalizations. All across the nation, we are seeing young people

with no underlying conditions now on ventilators. I want to say specifically to young adults: Please do not think that the worst case scenario can't happen to you. It can happen. It is happening. Get vaccinated."

Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said youth hospitalizations and infections have been rising.

About 5.5 percent of COVID-19 cases were among those who are younger than 10 years of age in January, Ezike said, but that number increased to 15 percent last month. Approximately 13 percent of cases in January were among those 10-19 years old, increasing to 23 percent in July. Hospitalizations for those 20 years old and younger have tripled from 2.5 percent to 7.8 percent in that time span.

"And yes, while most children who get COVID have fewer symptoms than adults, they absolutely can still get COVID-19 and they can absolutely spread it to others," Ezike said, noting many cases of the virus have spread at youth camps this summer.

The masking requirement extends to indoor but not outdoor activities

While Pritzker said masks are important in schools, especially for students who are not yet eligible for the vaccine, the best approach to limiting the spread of COVID-19 is getting vaccinated. It's also the best way to limit severe illness and death.

Sublette Tractor Drive draws over 30 enthusiasts

SUBLETTE/AMBOY The 2021 Sublette One Day Tractor Drive began at the Ellice Dinges Center in Sublette on Aug. 4. The group left Sublette at 8 a.m. to meet-up with the rest of the participants at the Amboy City Park.

"We could not have asked for a better day," coordinator Don Dinges said. "We will have a small group meeting here and drive to Amboy to meet with the larger Amboy

Among those meeting in Sublette were father and daughter, Joe Phillips of Ohio-1948 Farmall M, and Kristi Phillips of LaMoille-John Deere 3010.

Both Joe and Kristi brought their dogs along for the drive. "Kylie (Kristi's dog) was 3 months old when she went on her first drive. She is now 3 years old and loves to ride on the seat with me," said Kristi Phillips.

"Skippy John Jones (Joe's dog) is 13 years old and I have no idea how many drives he has been on. A lot," said Joe Phillips with a smile.

Scott Keech and Betty Haas of Princeton-1945 Farmall H and Michael Fischer of LaMoille-1948 Farmall M also left from Sublette with the group, which was led by Doug McLaughlin of Sublette-1971 John Deere

"Scott built the iron frame for our double seat and I have a custom footrest. We found an upholsterer to make it comfortable and water-proof," said Haas. "This is the fourth drive for us this year.'

The Amboy group was headed-up by Hank Gerdes of Amboy-1950 Farmall M. Gerdes would lead the drive on the route to the east, around to the south and

then west to the lunch stop at Green River Oaks Resort. After lunch, the group would travel north and then back east and south to meet at Amboy City Park where they would have dinner.

"The drive will cover over 60 miles if we depart on time. I will adjust the route if needed," commented Gerdes. "We will travel at about 12 mph and average 10 mph with stops and crossing the highway.'

Tractors from all over northwest and northcentral Illinois participated. The oldest tractor in the drive was the 1943 Farmall M driven by Dan Nelson of Fenton. Many of the participants had been on multiple drives already this year. Glen Werkheiser, Prophetstown, has 10 2021 rides so far.

Three generations of the Gillan family participated with eight different tractors. Nanette and daughter, Jessica Carls, were participating for the first time. Sons Jeff, Neil and Andrew and grandsons Grady and Gavin all drove alone while Grayson rode with grandpa, Dennis. Dennis and Nanette Gillan own and operate Green River Oaks Resort that would provide the tractor drive lunch for the third time.

The drive ended with one less tractor than it began with after a breakdown.

"We ended up traveling 63 miles," said Gerdes. "The gravel roads were dusty so having the lead meant I had it good!"

Dinner at Amboy City Park was organized by Dean Stephenitch and included sweet corn provided by Mark Streit.

The Sublette One Day Tractor Drive is sponsored by the Sublette Farm Toy and Tractor Show and is held each year on the first Wednesday of August.



Mendota Museum & Historical Society to honor hometown hero, Stan Gehler on Aug. 14

MENDOTA - The public is invited to join the Mendota Museum and Historical Soci-



hler this Saturday, Aug. 14 at 9 a.m. on the main stage at 901 Washington St., Mendota.

Scheduled to speak at the event will be Ken Gehler, Stan's older brother; Jay Miller, Third Ward Alderman, City of Mendota; and Tom Henson of the Mendota Museum and Historical Society. In 1991, then-President

George H.W. Bush recognized Mendota native Stan Gehler and his team of civilian employees of the U.S. Army for identifying and implementing ways to save the military millions of dollars on aircraft contracts. The purpose of Saturday's event is to recognize Stan's contributions to the nation including his service as an artillery officer during the Vietnam War and his post-retirement career as a civilian employee with the U.S. Army.

"I want to tell people of Mendota that we have a hero," said Ken Gehler about his brother.

Ken and Stan, born two years apart, grew up in Mendota. Each attended Mendota High School and graduated in 1956 and 1958, respectively. They both enrolled at the University of Illinois to study agriculture. Instead of pursuing careers in that field, the brothers, who also had been part of the university's ROTC program, each elected to serve as officers in the U.S. Army following their graduations. Following a 20-year career that included a tour in Vietnam, during which he served for a time with older brother Ken, Stan retired from the Army as a Colonel, as Ken also did after 20 years of service.

At Saturday's event, Ken intends to share his memories of his late younger brother. He chose the weekend of the Sweet Corn Festival because it is a time of homecoming for many Mendota natives, and the brothers, who each had retired to southern states, often would reconnect in person at past festivals.

coordinated with the Veterans' Home and Munford family. The joy of seeing it and running again brought a tear to Munford's eye. His nephew drove the tractor and commented that he wished it had power-steering on it when he used it for chores so many years ago. Munford passed away on

his 100th birthday in 2017. His 1950 Farmall M continues to carry a history shared by so many in rural Illinois. Gerdes and others like him keep the history alive.

Show some kindness

SPRINGFIELD – Sometimes hearts rather than policies need to be changed.

A good case in point is how we as a society address homelessness.

Mark Kessler, an owner of Recycled Records in Springfield, has said he and his brother, Gary, are selling their business in part because panhandlers are driving potential customers away from their store.

"Let's say you are a 60-year-old woman, if a panhandler comes up to your car, you may be too frightened to get out and shop," he said.

Kessler said he would like to see the Springfield police roust panhandlers out from the area near his shop.

"Why do people panhandle? Because they are too lazy to work," he said. "You can't convince me, that with as many job openings that there are now that these people can't find a job if they want one."

During the decades I've been a journalist, I've spent a lot of time talking to homeless folks. At one point in 1988, I went and lived on the streets with them just so I could share with readers the challenges they face.

My observation: Many end up panhandling to feed an addiction. Also, because of addiction or mental illnesses, some have become unemployable and use panhandling to survive.

Now, please note the homeless folks I'm talking about aren't the ones sleeping on the sofas of friends or residing in a temporary shelter because of a missed rent check.

I'm talking about those sleeping on sidewalks.

It's important to remember that not all homeless people panhandle. And not all panhandlers are homeless. But there is a pretty big overlap between the two.

Interestingly enough there is a business a little over a block from Kessler's record store that is taking a radically different approach.

Café Moxo is showing the downtrodden hospitality. "I believe in the Golden Rule: treat others the way you would like to be treated," said Brandon Hughes, who manages the Springfield restaurant.

On many mornings, the café is full of business people, politicians, lobbyists and community power brokers eating breakfast, sipping coffee and opining on the problems of the world. And often sitting among them is an older woman talking to herself. She always has a hot cup of coffee and warm meal in front of her. "She pays us when she can. When she can't, we make

sure she has something to eat," Hughes said.

This approach of radical hospitality reflects the philosophy of the restaurant's owner, Mark Forinash. During the pandemic, the restaurant partnered with Springfield businesses and gave away thousands of sack lunches to those in need.

"At the end of the day, we are all people and we all deserve to be treated with dignity and respect," Hughes said.

And there is the rub. In the American caste system, the homeless have become our untouchables.

They are the ones many folks want out of sight and

I've fallen into that trap myself. Last winter, I was in the Springfield public library researching used car prices. (I'm too cheap to buy a Kelly Blue Book.) A man wearing a bathrobe kept coming over to the reference desk and asking questions while I stood there. The reference librarian was patient and humane.

But I became a bit annoyed and thought: Why is he getting more attention from this librarian than me?

As soon as that thought crossed my mind, I knew I needed to check my middle-class privilege at the door. After all, I don't have any more right to use a public amenity – whether it's a public library, a sidewalk or a street—than the fellow wandering about the bookshelves in his bathrobe.

And, hey, I've devoted my life to free speech and free expression. Every week I get letters from those who like what I write – and those who don't. If all speech were popular, it wouldn't need to be protected.

So, if someone wants to use a public sidewalk to ask for money, who am I to say they can't? Or for that matter what standing does a local government have to prohibit such a thing? After all, panhandlers have the same First Amendment rights as anyone else in society.

We shouldn't punish someone for being homeless.

That said, the New York Times reported Monday that the nation's most populous city has undertaken an aggressive campaign to push homeless people off the streets of Manhattan so tourists will feel more welcome.

In other cities, including Springfield, city officials

have pondered doing something similar.

But here is a better approach: kindness.

I've noticed that Café Moxo is changing customers attitudes. It's not uncommon for a business person or other professional to buy a meal for a needy person they see on the street.


When approached by a panhandler, I'll say, "I won't

MHS manual arts boys build houses – 1948

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Aug. 12, 1998.)

It was 50 years ago that the Mendota High School board launched a program of house building by boys in the manual arts department, taught by Gilbert Gehler. For the boys, it was an opportunity to get hands-on experience in construction. Wiring and plumbing would be supervised by local contractors.

The project has been encouraged by state and federal government as a program to further housing. In Mendota, the first step was no

In Mendota, the first step was purchase by the board of two lots on Lincoln Avenue across from the high school. The dimensions were 45x150 feet each, with the possibility of altering to 90x75 feet if more frontage was desired. The houses would be of two-bedroom, one-story design with no basement. Upon completion, they would be shown at an open house, then sold at auction.

A state fish conservation officer inspected Lake Mendota where no large fish were being caught. He said the lake was "overstocked."

The large fish are feeding on the small ones and will not bite on bait.

The officer recommended removal of small fish by draining or seining and restocking with large fish only. In the meantime, he suggested that when small fish were caught they should not be thrown back in.

Bids were received for materials to extend water service to the Illinois Grain & Supply Service site and to Conkeys, south of town. Both Ladd Excavating and Advance Construction of Hinsdale entered bids in excess of \$8,000. Since the cost estimate had been "around \$3,000," further study was required.

Rising prices were indicated in many areas. Landlords were eager to have rent increases authorized to cover their increased costs. Mendota Building Service took advertising space to explain that the only way to protect prices quoted to customers was to use steel already in stock. New shipments would cost 10-15 percent more.

A 40-hour course to qualify teachers of driver education was conducted in Indiana. Among early graduates were Joe and Marie Rollins from Mendota High School. The only other Illinois

schools represented were in Des Plaines and Batavia.

ed by Howard Yenerich. Purchase of additional kitchen equipment was approved. Members were asked to consult their wives about serving arrangements.

At a Kiwanis meeting, Carl Wret reported on the current state of television.

He said the receiving range was short because of the curvature of the earth. Another problem was presented by local interference from auto ignitions and electrical appliances. His prediction – TV is still in its infancy and it

will require years for research to develop its practicability.

A new art teacher was engaged at MHS. Victor J. Wedemeyer, a recent graduate of the University of Wisconsin, came highly recommended by the university faculty.

He is well qualified to be a fine

teacher.During the summer he had been a

counselor at a Wisconsin boys' camp.

Building on its success the previous year, The Mendota Reporter sponsored another soap box derby on Aug. 12, 1948. The derby was held on Burlington Street between 13th and 14th avenues. Manager Ernie Dunn announced three

Manager Ernie Dunn announced three classes of entries: Class 1, 11-14 years; Class 2, age 10, Class 3, 7-9 years. Vic Demler of Alexander Lumber Co. offered facilities of the yard in con-

structing the ramp.

During the showing of the "Soap Box Derby," a feature short at the State Theatre, three entries in The Reporter derby were on display at the front entrance.

Two properties were sold at auction: a house at 1115 Pennsylvania Ave., \$7,425, and a house at 1206 Fifth St., \$6,450.

The Clyde Beatty Circus arrived in Mendota by rail on Aug. 2, 1948, and

unloaded at the Eighth Street crossing. An elephant was towing loaded vehicles down a ramp, but when the cable snapped, cars descended out of control and youngsters who had gathered to watch, scattered in all directions. However, they soon appeared at the fairgrounds to help erect the big tent, water animals and perform other choses to earn free passes to the show.

Starting Aug. 12, 1948, the motor speedway at the Tri-County Fairgrounds began a series of car races, to be held every two weeks. These races took the place of midget car races, which manager Phil Tyrell said had reached their peak. Among the racers was Mendota's foremost driver, Allen "Dutch" Morehouse, number 33.

The change will be of great interest to fans.

Mendota Cemetery Association announced new rates. A lot with space for five burials, including perpetual care, was now \$200. Digging services and closing adult graves was \$30. Lower charges were made for infant burials.

Conco Engineering Works appointed Zimmerlein Sheet Metal Shop as the area distributor for Conco Furnaces (coal, oil or gas), stokers, oil burners, boilers and water heaters.

A route for delivery of groceries, meat, baggage, etc. was advertised for sale as well as a panel truck, if needed.

Good, steady income to a go-getter.

Illinois High School Association

Masks temporarily required for all IHSA indoor sports events

☐ Mandate applies to all attendees

BLOOMINGTON - On Aug. 4, Governor JB Pritzker announced an update to the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) All-Sports Policy that will require masks to be worn for all indoor IHSA athletic events regardless of an individual's vaccination status. This mask directive for indoor athletic events applies to student-athletes, coaches, officials, game personnel, and fans.

This masking mandate applies to all IHSA fall sport practices and contests that are conducted indoors. Swimmers and divers do not have to wear masks while competing, but must adhere at all other times. The masking directive also applies to any winter or spring IHSA sports that may be conducting open gyms, general conditioning,

or weightlifting indoors.

There are no restrictions to scheduling or spectator limitations as a result of the announcement, nor are there any changes to the IHSA calendar for any sports.

"Today's announcement will not deter us from our mission of safely offering high school student-athletes in Illinois the opportunity to participate in sports and activities," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "Illinois high school student-athletes and coaches have been resilient in dealing with myriad mitigations and unexpected changes over the past year. We hope all Illinoisans do their part to stop the spread of COVID-19 so we can quickly move beyond this and remove masks from indoor athletic events."

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The Holy Spirit: Can you hear him now?

As born-again believers in Jesus Christ, we serve a triune God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In Genesis 1:26 (AMP) God says, "Let Us (Father, Son, Holy Spirit) make man in Our image...." This verse reveals God as the Trinity, and we need to worship and have relationship with each Person of the Godhead.

It seems more common to hear people talk about God and Jesus, but the Holy Spirit does not get enough of our attention. It's important to understand that He is a person who has a personality, a will, knowledge, a mind, and He thinks and knows things. For example, 1 Corinthians 2:11 (AMP) tells us that "no one knows the thoughts of God except the Spirit of God."

In John 16:7 we learn some of the facets of His personality and how we need Him to work in our lives. In this verse Jesus says, "...If I do not go away, the Helper (Comforter, Advocate, Intercessor – Counselor, Strengthener, Standby)

will not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him (the Holy Spirit) to you [to be in close fellowship with you]" (AMP).

This scripture teaches that He is our...

- Counselor—Always go to God first for counsel and let Him speak to you His way, through the people or things He chooses.
- •Advocate—Hepleads our case when we're in trouble.
- Intercessor—He prays for us and through us when we don't know how to pray on our own. • Standby—He stands
- by us, ready to act on our behalf when we need something.
- Strengthener—He gives us God's grace, which is His power and ability to do whatever we need to do in every situation.

He's all these things and so much more! God is literally everything we need, and as we fellowship with the Holy Spirit, we can have "the mind of Christ [to be guided by His thoughts and purposes]" (1 Corinthians 2:16 AMP).

Learn the Sound of His Voice

The Holy Spirit is the only One who fully knows the mind of God, so when we pray for God to give us wisdom or the knowledge we need, it's important for us to realize the Spirit is in us (1 Corinthians 2:12; 6:19). And He

communicates to us what He hears God say. John 16:13 (AMP) explains that He is "the Spirit of Truth" and He guides us into the Truth. "For He will not speak on His own initiative, but He will speak whatever He hears [from the Father...]"

One way we learn how to hear the Holy Spirit is by understanding that He has emotions and He can be grieved. Ephesians 4:30 (AMP) says, "Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God...." Because He lives in us, when He feels grieved, we will feel it too.

Ephesians 4:29-31 (AMP) lists some behaviors that cause Him to be grieved: unwholesome (foul, profane, worthless, vulgar) speech, bitterness, wrath, anger, and clamor (perpetual animosity, resentment, strife, faultfinding), slander, every kind of malice (all spitefulness, verbal abuse, malevolence).

When we choose to think and speak in ways that go against His nature, we will feel conviction, and the best thing we can do is confess our sin and repent immediately. James 3:8 teaches that

no one can "tame the human tongue" and sometimes we make mistakes and say wrong things. But we can learn from our mistakes; we can pray and ask God to help us only say things that are right and pleasing to Him.

I know it's easy to be insensitive and say the wrong things sometimes. The other day I was wearing a blouse that didn't fit me right, and I said to someone, "This thing is way too big for me but it would probably fit you." Afterward, I couldn't believe I had said it!

We need to pray for God to help us hear His voice, giving us wisdom and direction in the thoughts we choose to think about and the words we speak. As our Counselor, He wants to guide us in everything we do, and we can learn how to hear His voice.

Listen for the still, small voice of the Holy Spirit speaking to your heart. You can hear it as you wait quietly in His presence, while you're studying His Word, in the midst of your circumstances, and even through nature. God is talking to you!

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
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
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
