Still no school COVID guidelines

State has offered no guidance, so Ogle County is stepping in to help

OREGON – With no guidance from the state, Ogle County's public health administrator told the County Board that his office will be releasing its own COVID-19 guidelines for schools "very shortly."

At the board's July 20 meeting, Kyle Auman said that the state has not released anything yet on what school should do when they open, including whether or not students should wear masks. He said his office is trying to work with school districts in the county.

"But this upcoming school year is going to be a little bit more contentious then previous," Auman said, adding they are "...trying to make the best decisions for the students, the people of Ogle County and

people in our region."

In OgleCounty, the COVID-19 positivity rate was 2.9 percent, Auman said. That is up from last month when it was 1.8 percent. The regional positivity rate is 2.4 percent.

He said the reason for the increase has been several summer camps that have led to positive cases of COVID.

In Ogle County, 42.78 percent of the population is fully vaccinated, which is 21,785 people. Auman said that 32.2 percent of the school age population has been vaccinated. He said now that kids ages 12 and up can get

the vaccine, his office has been focusing on them. By winter, a vaccine should be available for kids ages 6 and up, he said.

The county is no longer doing mass vaccination events but does offer the vaccine in its Rochelle and Oregon offices by appointment on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Auman told the board that 14 counties in Illinois have been placed back into a warning status. He said most of the counties are in the southern part of the state or bordering Missouri.

Fair Board president talks about being back after cancellation

OREGON – For Tom Simpson, his first year as president of the Ogle County Fair Board did not go the way he wanted.

Simpson was the president in 2020 when the fair had to be cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"That's not what I had in mind, but understand the reasons why," Simpson said of the cancellation. "Today, we have a great team that is going to make your fair experience wonderful!"

The Ogle County Fair

runs this year at the fairgrounds on Lime Kiln Road

from July 28-Aug. 1. Simpson, who lives in Davis Junction, is originally from Kentucky and moved to Illinois to work for Motorola Solutions. When he married his wife 21 years ago, her dad was then president of the Fair Board. Simpson started out volunteering and eventually joined the board. He was elected president to follow Harlan Holm, who died in August 2020.

Simpson sat down to answer some questions about the 2021 Ogle County Fair.

Question: After missing a year, how excited is everyone to have the fair back for 2021?

The fair is back

Answer: "Everyone I have talked to is very excited and can't wait for the fair to come. They miss the smell of the fair food and ability to sit down to listen to live music with their friends and family. They are looking forward to seeing their kids show again."

Q: How difficult was the decision to cancel last year? Any regrets over that?

A: "Last year was a weird year, there were so many unknowns. Yes, it was very hard for the fair board to make that decision but I believe it was the right one. We want to make

From the queen pageant to carnival rides to the livestock shows, the 167th Ogle County Fair set for July 28-Aug. 1 offers no-stop entertainment at an affordable cost to fair-goers of all ages.

"The fair is family-oriented and affordable," said Tom Simpson, fair board

The fair begins with the crowning the 2021 fair queen on Wednesday, July 28 and features the traditional grand stand shows – truck and tractor pulls on Wednesday and Thursday, Big Hat Rodeo on Friday, and the demolition derby on Saturday.

Simpson said this year's fair will feature a new Sunday event. Popular blues and rhythm & blues band The Jimmys will perform a free concert in the grandstands from 1 to 4 p.m.

4-H project exhibits to be showcased

Ogle County's 302 4-H club members in 14 clubs will showcase approximately 6154-H project exhibits and 750 project animals during the 2021 Ogle County Fair, Oregon, July 28-Aug. 1.

4-H Fairs are held nationally to allow youth the opportunity to exhibit projects that have resulted from in-depth yearlong studies of areas that interest them.

As part of the exhibition, non-animal exhibitors meet one-on-one with project judges to receive feedback about their displays and gather ideas for future project expansion.

Animal judging tests 4-H'ers abilities to produce, maintain, and select healthy animals with excellent breeding and market potential. Animal showmanship classes provide 4-H'ers with the opportunities to develop and refine their animal presentation skills.

At the 4-H Fair, competition exists at two levels. 4-H'ers first compete against themselves for exhibit ratings. Every exhibit--animal or non-animal-is assigned a rating of blue, red, or white. Blue ratings are awarded to youth with entries that meet class guidelines and represent high quality work. White ratings are assigned when entries do not meet class guidelines or exhibits are of low quality. Red ribbons are assigned for exhibits falling somewhere in between.

Once ratings have been assigned, all of the blue award winners compete against one another for the chance to become class champions or overall division winners. A number of blue-awarded non-animal exhibits are also selected each year to represent Ogle County 4-H at the Illinois State Fair.

Beyond the competition and learning, the Ogle County 4-H Fair is a celebration! It marks the end of a year of youth development, club and county activities and community service, new friendships, and family building.

Many thanks go to the hundreds of 4-H leaders, helpers, fair committee members, judges, auctioneers, and supporters who make this annual educational extravaganza possible!



Our political parties have failed us

Nothing is more annoying in public policy than people who complain, but don't offer solutions. The U.S. Senate effec-

tively has 50 Republicans and 50 Democrats. Vice President Kamala Harris can cast a tie-breaking vote giving the Democrats an ever-so-slight edge. So, what complaint do

wehear expressed continually on social media? That the Senate doesn't equally represent the American people. That's certainly true.

But, then again, it never was supposed to.

Half of the nation's people have 18 senators representing them. On the other hand, there are 52 senators from the 26 smallest states, where just 18% of Americans live. The individuals who

drafted the Constitution feared big states would dominate small states. So, they gave states equal representation in the Senate and based representation in the House on population.

They also added a provision to the Constitution, that says the clause giving each state two sen-ators can never be amended. So, most constitutional scholars concede, it's an arrangement we are stuck

Instead of griping about it, we need to ask: Why after 233 years is it an issue now?

The short answer is our political parties have failed us. Diversity of thought has evaporated from both the Republican and Democratic parties.

Ideological litmus tests have become more important than legislative effectiveness among party

Don't believe me? Look at how many times in recent weeks Sen. Joe Manchin, D-West Virginia, has been called a traitor to his party. Or, for that matter, how many times has Mitt Romney has been called a RINO -- Republican in Name Only.

Once upon a time, the world's greatest deliberative body was full of people like Romney and Manchin -individuals whose beliefs didn'talwaysfitneatly into an ideological box.

There once were liberal Republican senators such as Charles Percy and conservative Democrats like Alan Dixon. Both men served the Land of Lincoln ably in Washington, D.C. And both would be oddities in today's upper chamber.

South Dakota, a socalled "red state," for years elected a liberal Democrat, Sen. Tom Daschle. And New York, what most folks now call a "blue state" elected Al D'Amato, a conservative Re-publican.

Voters were willing to look past party labels and even positions on issues to elect those they just considered quality people. Today, that happens less and less. Social media has not only made voters more partisan but the parties themselves less ideologically diverse. Both parties have far fewer moderates holding elected "Asmuchas Democrats

talk about the need for diversity, there is very little tolerance for ideo-logical diversity in the party," said Robin Johnson, a political science instructor at Monmouth College and a consultant for Democratic campaigns. If you think the Republi-

cans are any better, look no further than what happened to U.S. Rep. Liz Cheney of Wyoming. She was booted from leadership when she dared to dissent from a spurious narrative about a "rigged election."

Democrats complain that Republicans do better in rural states, which gives them an unfair advantage in the Senate. Nonsense. Whattheyshouldbeasking is why they aren't doing better in those smaller states they once won.

Years ago, I remember how college students from elite universities on both coasts came to work on an Illinois congressional campaign. They went to a Democratic Party event at the Illi-nois State Fair, stood at the gate and ridiculed working-class Democrats walking by in overalls, trucker hats and work boots.

It is the sort of elitism that has driven rural working-class voters into the Republican column.

The same could be said for Republicans in urban areas. Time and time again, I've seen wealthy men opine on what ails inner-city neighborhoods. They do plenty of talking but not much listening.

We have a deadlocked Senate because some leaders in both parties have stopped trying to serve significant portions of the American people.

The problem isn't how the Senate has been set up for the past 230 years: it's political elites unwilling to listen to potential constituents whom they disagree with.

And until they start listening, nothing is going to get better.

Conspiracies real and imagined: What's the difference

There are real conspiracies. Majortobacco companies engaged in "a massive 50-year scheme to defraud the public," according to a 2006 ruling by the U.S. District Court in Washington D.C. Their conspiracy to conceal tobacco's deadly effects and to market their product to children is well documented.

But then there are "conspiracytheories," as they're called, irrational stories about evil plotters and complicated schemes. They include the belief that Barack Obama isn't a U.S. citizen and allegations that the September 11 attack took place with the knowledge and/orassistance of the U.S. government.

Conspiracy theories breed distrust, polarization, and extremism. The recent conflict over claims of a stolen 2020 election highlights the importance of distinguishing between them and more credible accusations. Stephan Lewandowsky's and John Cook's Conspiracy Theory Handbook explains the difference.

Conspiracy theorists start by over-interpreting, or just inventing, their evidence. They ignore inconsistencies in their story, and dismiss unfavorable facts as ruses planted by the conspirators. Even when an accusation doesn't pan out, they still insist that "something must be wrong."

Things don't just happen by chance for conspiracy theorists. It's all part of the scheme, another brick in the wall of belief. RanGuest Opinion

dom events and facts can them seem meaningful, but conspiracy theorists are especially vulnerable to such illusions of orderliness.

Dutch psychologist Jan-Willem van Prooijen demonstrated this in experiments reported in the European Journal of Social Psychology. He found that conspiracy theorists had a heightened tendency to see non-existent patterns in coin tosses, visual designs, and world events. Van Prooijen concluded that "illusory pattern perception" is at the core of conspiracy theory thinking.

Liberals who see this as a product of the conservative mindset should think again. Democrats, independents, and Republicans were all within the 70 to 80 percent range on a survey measuring strong or medium tendencies to believe in conspiracy theories, according to political researcher Alfred Moore and his colleagues (washingpost.com, 8-21-14).

Studies headed by Yale law professor Dan Kahan demonstrate a similar point.

Kahan found that his subjects' ability to accurately analyze statistics declined markedly when political issues were involved. Liberals and conservatives alike "connected the dots" to see what they wanted to see, the core fallacy in all conspiracy theories. A Vox article reporting these results was aptly titled, "How Politics Makes Us Stupid."

One more ingredient completes the recipe for today's conspiracy theories. Melinda Warner Moyer explains it in the March 2019 edition of Scientific American. She reports on surveys showing increased anxiety and uncertainty about a range of issues, both personal and political, here and around the world.

Experiments have shown that people are more likely to believe conspiracy theories when they've been made to feel stressed and out of control. When these feelings extend to a sense that their group or the entire society is in crisis, tribal loyalties kick in and people experience what Moyer calls "a conspiratorial double whammy." She presents evidence that this is what many of us feel today.

When the world seems random and out of control, conspiracy theories offer the appealing illusion that it all makes sense. We and our tribe now have an enemy to fight. We can take action and be in control once again.

This is how liberal conspiracy theorists came to focus so much of their emo-

tional energy on Donald Trump. The resulting delusions include the belief that he blackmailed Supreme Court Justice Anthony Kennedy to resign, and that Russia blackmailed him over supposed relations with Russian prostitutes, both debunked by fact-checker Snopes. It also explains how so many supporters of the former President can embrace the Big Lie that the 2020 election was stolen.

Under the right circumstances, any of us can be seduced by conspiracy theories. Those who are under their spell deserve our sympathy and understanding. Most of all, we need to be on guard against falling for them ourselves.

We need to be leery of information that doesn't come from established and credible sources. We need to resist the temptation to see meaningful patterns in random events. We need to watch out for reasoning tainted by belief. We need to distrust explanations that offer more certainty than a complicated world will allow.

Finally, we need to look inside ourselves, and stay on guard, along with everyone else, against allowing our emotions to overrule logic in these uncertain and anxious times.

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) will be hosting a latex paint, used motor oil, and aerosol can recycling event on Saturday, Aug. 14, from 8 a.m. to noon at 909 Pines Road in Oregon.

This event is for Ogle County residents only and no permit is required. Identification will be checked upon entry to the event and a short survey will be taken.

The Illinois Recovery Group (IRG) http://www. illinoisrecoverygroupinc. com will be on site with their vacuum truck to collect and recycle used motor oil, anti-freeze, and used oil filters. There is a limit of 200 gallons per vehicle, and 55-gallon drums will be pumped out on site. All containers will be returned for reuse or proper disposal. Plastic containers with used

oil or other automotive fluid residues cannot be recycled. There is no charge to residents for this service. For amounts over 200 gallons, contact the OCSWMD at the number below for information on direct service from IRG.

Earthpaint http://www. earthpaint.orgwill also be on site collecting containers of liquid latex paint for recycling. The cost to recycle latex paint are as follows for up to 10 containers: Quart, \$1/container, gallon, \$2/ container, and 5-gallon pail \$8/container. Residents will pay full price to recycle over 10 containers, which is: \$2.50/quart, \$5/gallon, and \$18/5-gallon pail. Bring paint in original containers only, and do not mix paint together as then it cannot be








Oregon action plan improves athletics, academics

OREGON – Oregon High School saw each of its 18 varsity athletic teams meet the criteria for the IHSA Team Academic Achievement Award, which requires each team's members to maintain a grade point average of at least 3.0 during their respective seasons, a feat only nine percent of Illinois high schools attained with one or more of its athletic teams.

Oregon High School's success can be attributed to the Oregon School District's Athletic Action Plan. The plan was launched in 2019 with a three to four year implementation cycle, but the district is seeing results in just under two years.

"It has been a wonderful victory given the pandemic and everything our athletic department went through this past school year," said Dr. Heidi Deininger, principal of Oregon High School. "Our programs are experiencing great success, and coaches, parents and student-athletes are growing together. It has been a bright spot."

OCUSD began work on the plan in

2019, consulting various stakeholders including student-athletes, parents, coaches, community members and administrators, to gather information and make improvements to the district's athletic department.

The result was the OCUSD Athletic Action Plan, a set of strategies based around the five core values of an OCUSD athlete - accountability, selflessness, coachability, integrity and toughness—to improve all areas of the athletic department over three to four years.

The pandemic halted the plan's timeline in March 2020, but the district resumed work on it in August 2020, implementing several of its goals including updating its philosophy statement and creating a reference guide for parents of student-athletes.

The district also hosted a professional development event for OCUSD coaches, expanded its social media to highlight athletic accomplishments, and completed skills guides for coaches of Oregon High School feeder programs.
