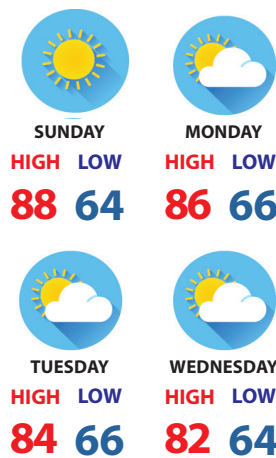

Putting on a fireworks show

‘It takes a lot of orchestration to get it off the ground’

ROCHELLE — On the night of 4th of July after putting on the fireworks show, Rochelle Fire Department Firefighter/Paramedic Ben Johnson can be found watching the show back on YouTube.

“We don’t actually watch much of it,” Johnson said. “We’re too busy making sure stuff goes up and watching to make sure nothing is falling and everyone is safe. My wife asks me why I do it, ‘Didn’t you just shoot it? Weren’t you there all day?’ Yeah, but I didn’t see any of it.”

Rochelle Fire will put on its annual fireworks show Sunday night after last year was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Johnson will lead a group of 10-15 firefighters in a 15-hour long effort on the holiday to get the show set up and shot.

It takes 100-150 man hours to do the fireworks show, depending on the size of it and weather complications. Firefighters must stay with the fireworks all day to pre-

vent tampering. The crew sets up on 20th Street across from Atwood and Cooper Park, where many of the town’s residents will gather to watch.

Depending on the size of the fireworks, the mortars are set up 300-800 feet from the park.

“Our smallest shells are 2.5 inches,” Johnson said. “Our 10-inch shells are

like basketballs going into the air. It’s pretty intense. But we no longer reload. We preload everything. Every year they roll out guidelines and rules to make it safer. It’s a pretty progressive industry. Nobody is having any fun if someone gets hurt.”

The city budgets about \$10,000 each year for the fireworks show. This year,

Rochelle Fire has faced the challenge of fireworks being in low supply and they were more expensive. The city will have a full show on Sunday, Johnson said.

After last year’s fireworks shows were canceled, demand went up for 2021 with cities like Rochelle trying to put on a good show for their firework-starved spectators.

“Overall, I think everyone was really disappointed,” Johnson said. “This is the highlight of the summer for us, one of the things we really look forward to. It draws a large crowd. The people are together at the park. I think people are more eager to see it this year.”

Pritzker visits the ‘Hub City’

Illinois Governor tours Kennay Farms Distillery

ROCHELLE — Gov. JB Pritzker visited the ‘Hub City’ on Thursday afternoon.

Pritzker was in town visiting Kennay Farms Distilling with a film crew in tow. He recognized the distillery for its work early in the COVID-19 pandemic when it adapted to making hand sanitizer rather than spirits. A member of Pritzker’s video team reached out to Kennay Farms Owner Rick Kennay and asked in the days before to set up a tour and interview, Aubrey Quinn, in charge of marketing at the distillery, said.

“It was a pretty cool experience,” Quinn said. “We were pleased they picked us out. We felt pretty special. It was cool to meet them. They were shooting video for four hours. They wanted to see products bottled.

We bottled a single barrel whiskey. They filmed shots around the tasting room and we walked across the street to eat lunch. It was casual. We talked about the transition that we made last year.”

Quinn said that when the Kennays made the choice to switch to hand sanitizer last year, they didn’t think they would still see the impact and recognition over a year later. The family enjoyed bringing in the people that did the work to be recognized on Thursday.

“Keep the family safe and the business running,” Quinn said. “We’re still talking about it. It was a big part of our lives when that happened. It was a good recognition of our team. It was quite a commitment for us. It was long hours. It was a good day for everyone and the recognition of their hard work.”

Ogle County recycling event set for Aug. 14

OREGON — The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) will be hosting a latex paint, used motor oil and aerosol can recycling event on Saturday, Aug. 14 from 8 a.m. to noon at 909 Pines Road in Oregon.

This event is for Ogle County residents only and no permit is required. Identification will be checked upon entry to the event and a short survey will be taken.

The Illinois Recovery Group (IRG) <http://www.illinoisrecovery-groupinc.com> will be on site with their vacuum truck to collect and recycle used motor oil, anti-freeze, and used oil filters. There is a limit of 200 gallons per vehicle, and 55-gallon drums will be pumped out on site.

All containers will be returned for reuse or proper disposal. Plastic containers with used oil or other automotive fluid residues cannot be recycled. There is no charge to residents for this service. For amounts over 200 gallons, contact the OCSWMD at the number below for information on direct service from IRG.

Earthpaint <http://www.earthpaint.org> will also be on site collecting containers of liquid latex paint for recycling. The OCSWMD will subsidize a portion of the recycling costs for residents.

The cost to recycle latex paint are as follows for up to 10 containers: Quart, \$1/container, gallon, \$2/container and 5-gallon pail \$8/container.

Residents will pay full price to recycle over 10 containers, which is: \$2.50/quart, \$5/gallon,



and \$18/5-gallon pail. Bring paint in original containers only, and do not mix paint together as then it cannot be recycled.

Only liquid latex paint is accepted, no dried out containers or oil-based paints will be accepted. Cash, card or check made out to Earthpaint accepted for payment.

FlatCan Recycling <http://www.flatcanrecycling.com> will also be on site to collect aerosol spray cans and single-use (14-16 once) propane tanks.

The OCSWMD will fully subsidize residents' first 10 items brought in for recycling. For additional items residents pay \$1/can and \$2/propane tank. Accepted aerosol products include spray paints, insecticides, auto care/lubricants, personal care products, household cleaners and food products.

See the OCSWMD website or Facebook page for a full list of accepted aerosol products. Some aerosol products will not be accepted. Cash, card or check payable to FlatCan accepted for payment.

Johnson said Rochelle is one of the few cities left that has their own fire department do the show. Many now contract it out to private businesses. Training and licensing is required for Rochelle Fire to put on the show.

“Not a whole lot of fire departments get to do this,” Johnson said. “It makes you feel kind of like a little kid. You get to go out and shoot fireworks off and people cheer for it. At the end of the night, people are all over Facebook saying that was awesome.”

Rochelle Fire aims to make the show last 20-25 minutes, which Johnson said is the sweet spot for keeping a crowd’s attention. About 1,000 shells are shot into the air. Firing is done electronically to be as safe as possible.

Johnson said putting on the show is a point of pride for firefighters. A lot do the job to be involved in the community. Some of that interaction has been lost during COVID-19.

“Doing the fireworks show, people look forward to it and it’s fun to be a part of that,” Johnson said. “That’s the best part of it. There are a lot of folks around town who really get a kick out of the fire department being the one that does that. Some never miss a show. It’s a point of tradition.”

Johnson said the show will kick off around 9:25 p.m. on Sunday night. He said if weather becomes an issue, residents should watch the city and fire department’s Facebook pages for information. He advised residents not to call the fire department or 911 and tie up the line.

Johnson also said those that watch in cars should make sure to park off the road where it’s legal to prevent accidents. He said no fireworks should be brought to or lit off in parks. Rochelle Fire sees at least one fireworks-related fire at a residence each year.

“The risk is definitely there,” Johnson said. “And fireworks injuries are very ugly. The ER sees that. It’s not worth it. Your tax dollars pay for a free show. Come watch it.”

Firefighters do safety briefings before putting on the show. They all wear personal protective equipment like coveralls, gloves, helmets and ear and eye protection. After everything is set up, the tradition is to eat Country School fried chicken be-

fore firing the first shell.

Johnson said despite higher costs, the city never considered skipping the show this year.

“People would be let down,” Johnson said. “This is one of the most fun ways we can give back. It’s pretty rewarding, but a lot of work. Especially when it’s 95 degrees. It takes a lot of orchestration to get it off the ground. I look forward to it every year.”

History

Tom McDermott was the Rochelle Fire Department Chief for 24 years before retiring in 2009. He always felt Rochelle was as good as it gets as far as firework shows in small towns.

Towards the end of his time as chief, putting on the show became safer and less repetitive loading was done.

“It was and can still be very dangerous,” McDermott said. “For the spectators it’s all good fun, but there really is a whole lot of risk involved. It’s explosives sitting with things blowing up next to them. It can ignite the next mortar. There’s sparks coming down. Some don’t lift high enough. You’re never 100 percent sure where the next explosion will be.”

McDermott said not many other towns shoot the show as close to where spectators sit as Rochelle, hence why firefighters have moved further out

recently.

“You’ll feel the fireworks in your chest if you’re in the park,” McDermott said. “That’s the concussion from the explosions.”

McDermott echoed Johnson’s sentiments about not ever being able to watch a show while working. He never found time to look up while making sure every firefighter on site was safe.

After the show, firefighters sweep the area to make sure there aren’t any dangerous shells or debris left that came down from the sky or never left the ground in the first place.

“The spectators all get in their cars and go home and firefighters have to check every mortar to see if there’s a live one,” McDermott said. “It’s very dangerous. But they’ve done it for years and years.”

McDermott said the idea of shooting fireworks as a firefighter can seem counterintuitive to the job, which is to prevent fire and injuries.

“It’s a conscious decision to blow stuff up,” McDermott said. “And there honestly is fun in it. Rochelle Fire has been doing it since the 1950s and 1960s. Residents have done it here since 1896. They used to do it downtown at Lincoln Highway and Cherry Avenue in the street next to wooden buildings. So, we’re not as crazy as we used to be.”

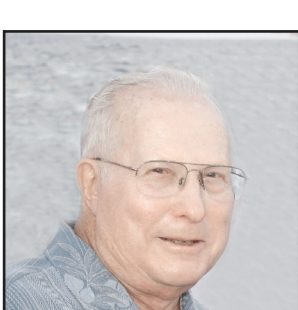

CHILDREN WILL BE CHILDREN

When families gather after a death, one characteristic seems to hold true: however somber the adults may be, young children, after a while, cannot resist the urge to scamper around, play and, in general, act like children.

That's because they are children, and their reactions to grief don't match those of adults. That doesn't mean children don't feel grief or know that something sad or final or tragic has occurred. Children are highly attuned to the emotions of the people around them, but they grieve in their own way, and it's important that adults recognize a child's need for honesty, love, and reassurance when death occurs.

Sometimes adult's

preoccupation with grief prevents them from seeing that a child's reaction to death is just as deep as theirs — even though it may be expressed differently, depending on the child's age and stage of emotional development.

Trade Your Pain for God's Promise

Everyone deals with emotional pain to some degree. Whether it's a difficult relationship, an addiction, abuse, depression...it can cripple us and prevent us from moving forward. But regardless of what's happened in our past, God still wants us to have a great future.

For years, I thought I had to settle for a second-rate life because I had been sexually abused by my father. I thought my future would never be as good as it could have been. That's what our enemy, Satan, wants us to believe. He wants us to believe that our past pain has permanently damaged what God can do with our future.

Maybe that's where you are today. You look at everything you've been through and think, My situation's just a hopeless mess. Maybe it would be different if God had done something sooner, but

now it's beyond repair.

If so, I want you to know that God can fix the unfixable and bring dead things back to life. (See Matthew 19:26.)

If you are brokenhearted—if you've been hurt, abused, disappointed or unfairly treated in any way—it doesn't limit what God can do in your life. In fact, God can give you a future that's better than it would have been if you had never gone through painful experiences.

Isaiah 61:7-8 has meant so much to me over the years. It says, "Instead of your [former] shame you will have a double portion; and instead of humiliation your people will shout for joy over their portion. Therefore in their land they will possess double [what they had forfeited]; everlasting joy will be theirs. For I, the Lord, love justice..." (AMP).

This scripture helped

me understand that no person could pay me back for what I'd gone through—but God could. And He'd even give me double for all the pain I'd been through.

I've witnessed this firsthand in my own life. God has used His Word to transform me from the inside out. Instead of anger and bitterness, I now have peace and joy. Instead of being a victim of past abuse, He is using my experiences to help many find healing and total restoration from emotional pain.

Leave It All Behind

Isaiah 61:1-3 says Jesus came "to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound..."

to give them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness..." (NKJV).

Jesus has already opened the prison doors. We no longer have to stay in the "prisons" of emotional pain, rejection, disappointment, worry, depression, anger, addictions or bad habits.

If you've ever dealt with any of these things, you know they can have long-lasting consequences. Pain from the past has a way of lingering and even affecting your future.

But you don't have to live stuck in the pain of your past. You can make an exchange—you can trade your pain for God's promise and have beauty instead of ashes.

God offers each one of us healing and restoration,

but we also have a part to play in the process. We can't expect to keep our "ashes" and still receive God's beauty. We have to choose to move forward and leave things like bitterness, resentment, and self-pity behind.

Self-pity was a hard thing for me to give up. I used it for years to comfort myself when I was hurting; however, the Lord showed me that it's actually idolatry—it's turning inward and pitying ourselves when we should have compassion flowing out of us to other people.

Self-pity is a major trap that will keep us stuck in our pain. It's the same with bitterness and resentment. It took me a long time to get past the point of thinking, Someone owes me. I was bitter and angry about my past, and I ended up taking it out on the people around me, trying to "collect" from those who had

no way of paying me back.

I had to decide to let go of my anger and resentment and trust God to restore what I had lost. He alone could make wrong things right...in His way and in His timing.

Whatever you've gone through or wherever you are today, your pain doesn't have the final say in your life. God can take any situation and turn it around for His good.

If your life is a fragmented mess, let Jesus gather up the pieces. Be determined to maintain a positive, grateful attitude, focusing on God's blessings and the great things He is doing in your life.

As you do, your pain will become someone else's gain, your mess will become your message, and what you've walked through will become someone else's miracle. You'll have a life of beauty, joy, and praise.

Rochelle Mayor John Bearrows spent about five hours with Pritzker during his visit. He was sworn to secrecy upon learning the Governor would be coming to town three days earlier. They ate lunch together at Acres Bistro.

Bearrows and Pritzker walked downtown and talked about the city's history and what it's doing with infrastructure, Bearrows said.

"He was very impressed with Rochelle," Bearrows said. "He liked what he saw. I talked about what we've done for our busi-

nesses during the pandemic. It was very humbling to me. I will say he's just a genuine, simple, down-to-earth guy. We had a burger and talked about anything and everything. I had 1.5-2 hours of one-on-one time. It meant a lot to me to meet with somebody that has the influence he does."

Bearrows said he and the Governor talked about issues concerning the city, including the potential early closure of the Prairie State coal plant, which the city has \$150 million in partial ownership debt, that has been talked about for inclusion in a potential energy bill.

"I feel we made some headway," Bearrows said. "There are some issues we're dealing with and I wanted clarification on some bills that are on the house floor."

Rochelle City Councilman Bil Hayes and his wife, Julie, also met with Pritzker.

Bearrows called Thursday and the chance to meet with the Governor a highlight of his mayoral tenure.

"I appreciated being able to ask questions and address my concerns," Bearrows said. "He seemed very concerned and interested in what I had to say."

Rooney's marks end of 75-year drought

— In 2019, two local men joined together in a partnership to open a bar/restaurant and gaming facility in the village of Franklin Grove, ending the 75-year drought in the village. They started with two months of demo in the summer of 2019. They then decided to do the business in stages.

Rooney's opened recently with the first stage of the business, a quaint bar that is full of local history. It pays homage to the history of the small farming community. The building was built in 1868 by P. C. Rooney, who was a founding member of the local Masons, housed the Masonic Hall on the upper level of the building.

Over the course of time, the partners, Ron Horn and John Lauer, discovered just how much history that building held. They are enjoying the fulfillment they have had from doing much of the work themselves, with the help of Matt Hunt, an Ashton resident,

who worked side by side every day with Lauer on the renovation. Horn and Richard Major, an Oregon resident, made deliveries of building materials, installed insulation, assembled all the tables, chairs and barstools, and kept the job site clean and organized.

They have incorporated much of the history into the décor. The bar is made from the original hardwood floors, the underside of the bar area are planks that came out of and barn on Lauer's property, the original stone walls have been uncovered in many areas, a steel beam that was used to shore up the building when another building was built next door still has the original recipients name, F. D. Kelley, painted on it.

The wooden arches behind the bar were found on the upper level, they had been painted and were in disrepair, but they are restored to their natural beauty for all to enjoy. Local historian, Scott Spangler, has provided a display of several photos and history pieces for visitors to check out. Many visitors have shared stories of the days of yesteryear in the Rooney building and the surrounding businesses.

Rooney's is a great place to stop by for a cold drink and visit with friends. They are open Monday thru Wednesday 11 a.m.-11 p.m. Thursday 11 a.m.-midnight, Friday and Saturday 11 a.m.-1 a.m. and Sunday 11 a.m.-10 p.m.

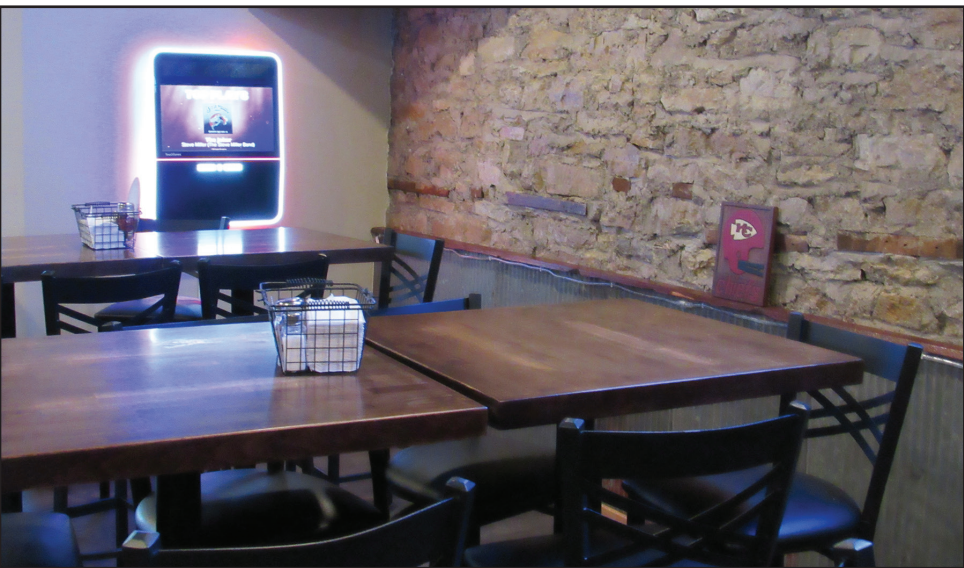
Future plans include a kitchen, which is scheduled to open in the fall. They partners are hoping to create an event space on the upper level of the building. It will be a spacious area, again steeped in local history, a perfect place for a small gathering of friends for a class reunion or a family get together.

They have also agreed to help revive the Summer Harvest Festival; they were approached by some of the committeemen after they had a very successful grand opening a few weeks ago. So look forward to hearing more about that in the coming weeks.

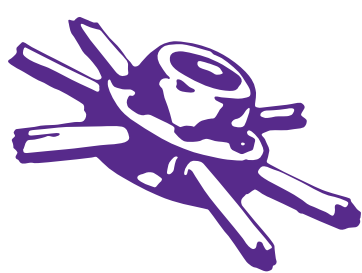

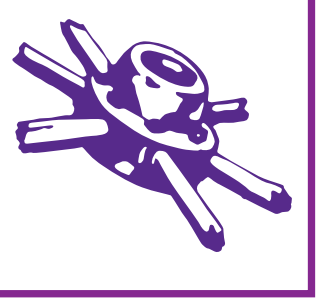

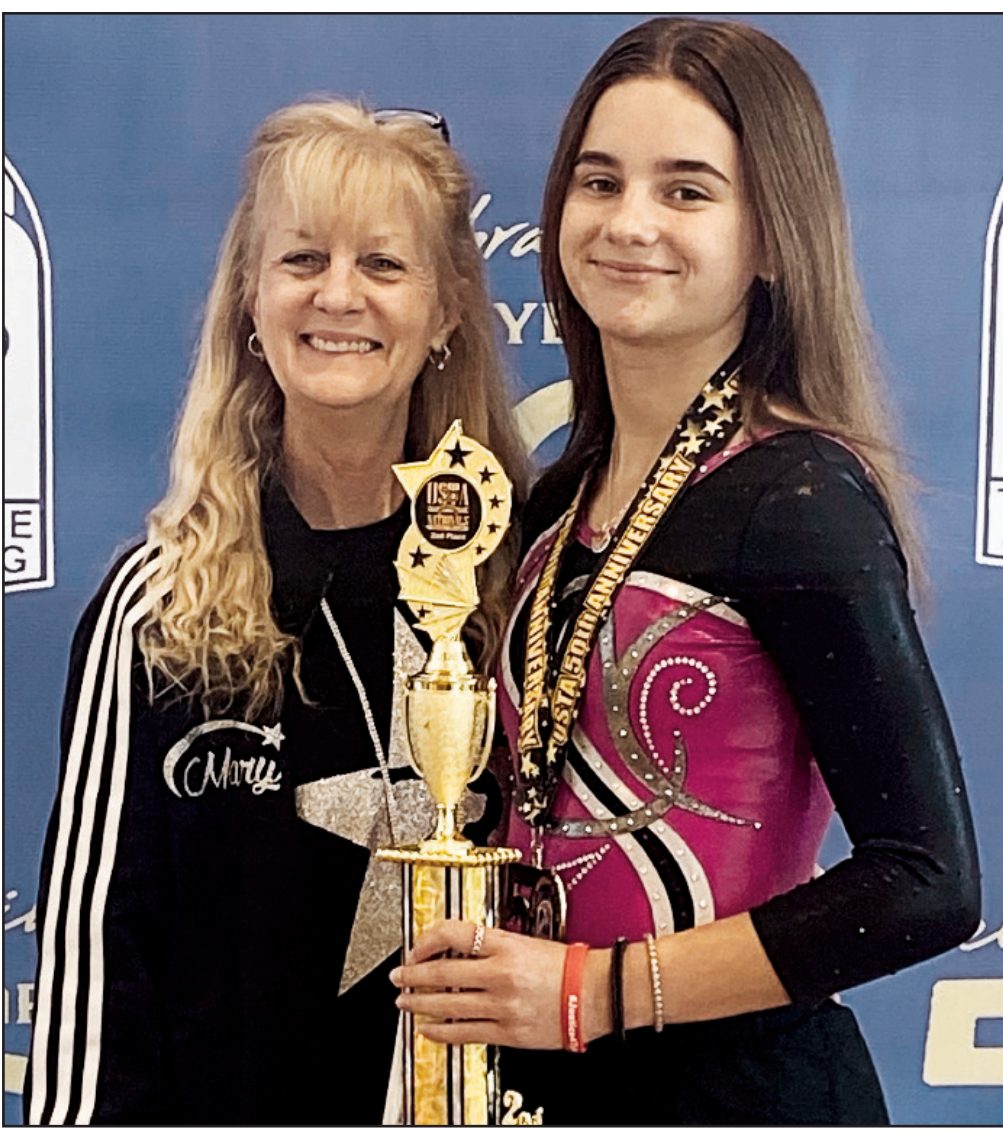

Neece takes second at 2021 USTA Nationals

THIRTEEN-year-old tumbler Alexandra Neece focused on executing her routine and blocking out the crowd as she looked to follow up her championship performance from two years ago during the 2021 United States Tumbling Nationals in Rochester, Minnesota this past month.

With her family in attendance, Neece scored 18.7 points on the first of her two tumbling passes, which included a whip back, two handsprings and a back tuck. The Rochelle tumbler followed with 19.1 points on her second pass, which features either a roundoff or a barani, six back handsprings and a back tuck. Despite a minor deduction for her first landing, Neece finished with 37.8 points to take second place in the 13-14 Intermediate Girls Division.

"I'm proud of myself and I know I could have finished first, but I had a tiny step on my first landing," Neece said. "I stayed straight and spaced my flips out perfectly. I was a little nervous, but I tried to stay focused while competing and I tried not to be distracted by the crowd... I was really happy that all of my family members were there to watch

me. Because of COVID-19, we were worried that we were only going to be allowed one spectator to watch me compete."

Tumbling is a gymnastics discipline in which athletes perform a series of acrobatic skills down a long sprung track, a type of flooring that absorbs shock and gives athletes a softer feel. Each pass comprises several elements in which the tumbler jumps, twists and flips while placing only their hands and feet on the track. Tumblers are then scored based on difficulty and form.

Neece, who won the 2019 USTA Nationals in the 11-12 Novice Girls Division, finished second out of 38 tumblers in the 13-14 Intermediate Girls Division this year, landing only 0.6 points behind champion Ava Nolan. Neece, who has been tumbling since third grade, will be working on some new skills for next year as she prepares to move up to the next difficulty level.

"I will be working on my full twist, my punch front forward flip and my layout back flip," Neece said. "I might try out for the USTA Elite Team which would be a cool experience. I think that practicing four to six hours per week will help me reach my goals... I enjoy the feeling of flipping, but I mostly enjoy having the opportunity to practice with my friends."

Hubs ready to build on five-win season

Eight varsity players eligible to return

ROCHELLE — Despite missing an entire season due to COVID-19, the Rochelle Hub varsity tennis team showed no signs of rust or taking steps backward. Instead, head coach Kristy Eckardt watched as the team enjoyed one of its more successful seasons in recent history.

Rochelle finished with a 5-11 record this season, earning three Interstate 8 Conference wins including two over LaSalle-Peru and one against Kaneland. The Hubs also scored non-conference victories over Mendota and Freeport. Rochelle ended the season by taking third in the Interstate 8 Varsity Championships and finishing fourth in the IHSA 1A Geneseo Sectional.

“We had a lot of kids who hadn’t played in a high school meet before,” Eckardt said. “We didn’t know what to expect, but the kids were in every match and we won more conference matches than we’ve ever had since I started coaching here. I was really impressed with what I saw from the kids this season and I’m really excited because we won’t be losing any seniors.”

The Hubs saw two players win singles matches at the IHSA 1A Geneseo Sectional including sophomore David Wanner and junior Alex Gilbert, who will each be eligible to return next season. Wanner and Gilbert both medaled at the Interstate 8 Conference tournament, with Wanner taking second place at No. 1 singles and Gilbert finishing third at No. 2 singles.

“I thought the kids developed a lot more consistency,” Eckardt said. “We were able to stay in each game and each match a lot longer than we used to and we were more aggressive rather than defensive. The kids began to trust that they knew where their shots would go and I’d like the kids to continue progressing and believing that we’re capable of winning.”

Rochelle fielded three juniors in doubles including Peter Forsberg, Devansh Patel and Jason Zheng, who can all return next season. The Hubs will also have three underclassmen in Owen Haas, John Green and

Parker Lenkaitis eligible to come back next year. The Haas-Forsberg and Green-Lenkaitis combos each medaled at the Interstate 8 Conference tournament. With no seniors graduating from this year’s roster, expectations will be higher for next season.

“We want the kids to do better than we did this year,” Eckardt said. “We want to win more meets and we want to win more conference matches. I think we can score higher in the conference and we have the potential to get a few kids through to the state meet.”

Three seniors graduating from 2021 roster

ROCHELLE — A winless start to the 2021 season didn’t prevent the Rochelle Lady Hub varsity soccer team from coming together and scoring two victories near the end of the season. With only three seniors graduating from this year’s roster, head coach Brad Male and the Lady Hubs will look to turn their fortunes around and bounce back with a better season next year.

Rochelle finished 2-11-1 this season, recording wins against Oregon and Plano while drawing Stillman Valley in nonconference play. The Lady Hubs scored 10 goals this season, with four goals coming from freshman Kara Martinez and three from sophomore Kyra Rimstidt. Junior Lizbeth Milan, sophomore Jasmin Hernandez and senior Vianey Perusquia each added one goal.

“We have a lot of talented girls, but we unfortunately lost a year of development because of COVID-19 and they didn’t have that chemistry at the start of the season,” Male said. “They really came together toward the end of the season and I think we need to improve on that and continue building on the camaraderie they started to show at the end of the season.”

The Lady Hubs will lose one senior from each level including All-Conference First Team forward Ayah Sbeih, Perusquia (midfield) and Nadia Castillo (defense). Rochelle will have several defenders eligible to return including freshman Danica Ward, who totaled 114 saves this season. All-Conference First-Team defender Milan and All-Conference Honorable Mention Lucy Monroy are both eligible to return and anchor the Lady Hub defense next season.

“Our team chemistry

really came around toward the end of the season,” Male said. “We continued to move the ball around and I hope we can keep building on that. We moved a lot of players around and put them in positions they weren’t used to, but they adjusted well. I think our versatility, rather than sticking to just one position, will be a key for us next season.”

Several juniors could return to the Lady Hubs next season including defenders Ceci Vargas and Michelle Ocampo as well as midfielders Madison Ost and Gracie Kelchner. Sophomores Rimstidt, Kailey Harris and Abigail Tarvestad all showed promise in the midfield, while Martinez will headline Rochelle’s eligible returning players at the forward position.

“I think Liz will have a big role on our team,” Male said. “We had a lot of young players who showed their abilities and I look forward to seeing them grow.”
