

Getting to the root of the matter

Man traces geneaology of Ogle County families

In 1997, Roger Cramer saw some letters sent to his grandmother that showed a relationship to President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

This sparked what has become an interest in researching early settler in Ogle County and helping others in the county trace their roots.

Cramer was born in Oregon but moved to Rockford

as a young child. His parents had lived in Polo and he had family in Leaf River. He has retired to Arizona but has returned to Ogle County many times.

Cramer sat down to answer some questions about his interest in researching families from the area.

Question: What got you started in researching family ancestry?

Answer: I have been researching my family ancestry and all early Ogle Co. families since 1997. The spark that got me interested was some letters sent to my grandmother and other members of the Motter family in the 1950's that show a relationship to President Eisenhower. A family researcher was looking for information on family members that descend from those that came to Ogle Co. in the 1850's. No one to my knowledge in Ogle County ever researched the family connection accuracy. It didn't take me long to prove how the relationship was. Ike's great-grandfather was a brother of my third great-grandfather. found an article in a Leaf River newspaper from 1958 describing the letters sent to several family members in Ogle County and included greetings that were received by then President Eisenhower sent to members of the family reunion being held in Pennsylvania.

My wife and I, who were both born in Ogle County. quickly realized that all of our ancestors were early settlers of Ogle Co. One of my ancestors, John Light. founded the town of Lightsville which prospered until the railroad came through in about 1880. The village of Leaf River was formed about a mile south of Lightsville along the railroad and many businesses and residents then moved to Leaf River.

O: With the resources now available, do you miss the time when it was a little more difficult to track down ancestry information? Or do you enjoy the ease of the Internet?

A: Back in the early days of my research, there were very few online resources. I was fortunate to learn of a distant cousin who found early German church records and was able to translate and document my Matter/Motter

family back to the early 1600's through the time that some members came to America in 1751. This provided documentation for one of my family lines. found some documents that most likely would never appear in any online resource. Over the years we have made many treasured friendships with distant cousins that have lasted many years. I've been back to Pennsylvania three times for a reunion with family members from one of my family lines. We still get Christmas cards from family members we have met on our visits to France/Germany and Sweden. In continuing my re-

search of my other family lines, I visited Doris Vogel who was an early Ogle County family researcher and had a library in her home in Holcomb. I learned that the Leaf River Library had actual old copies of the Leaf River newspapers which included all issues from 1936-1969 and a few much earlier. I spent many Saturday's going through these newspapers copying many interesting articles and obituaries. I also spent time at the Ogle County Genealogical Society library where I copied all the local cemetery records and found other interesting items. My wife and I visited the Northern Illinois University Regional Archives Depository in DeKalb and the Latter-Day Saints Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City. I started researching early Leaf River Township families and gradually moved on to all other township

sible and genealogybank. com which has all old Rockford newspapers online and searchable going back to the 1850's. Over the years the newspapers contained a lot of Ogle County news and obit-Q: Ancestry sites have become very popular. Why do you think that is?

A: There has been an explosion of interest in family genealogy in recent years. I think it's likely became popular because people can more easily do research from their computer plus the availability of so many documents online. The advances in DNA technology has also generated a lot of family interest.

Q: What are some special things you have learned about Ogle County through your research?

A: I learned so much from my research, even of my own family. Reading news accounts of news and obituaries over the years have revealed a lot of likely forgotten events, i.e., bad storms, suicides, accidents, marriages, divorces, murders, gossip, etc. The older newspapers were more descriptive of many events than what is printed today.

I have all the Ogle County biographical books that have been published: 1878, 1896, 1899 and 1909. They are all copies except I have an original copy of the 1896 book. This was a big help in my being able to construct many family histories. We have several file cabinets full of records and correspondence collected over the years. I have gone through all Ogle Co. census records line by line proving and building family structure from over the years.

Q: Where can people

A: I maintain my personal genealogy website which includes information on ours and many Ogle County families and also have maintained the Ogle County Genealogy Site for over 20 years. The Ogle County site contains 100's of old biographies and obituaries plus much more. The addresses are:

I have created a database of over 280,000 names which include just about every Ogle County family with any roots or related to one that has. It became a retirement hobby after my wife and I retired and moved from Ogle County to Arizona. I have helped many people over the years with their research from all over our country and even have had a few international inquiries.

Sue also got interested in genealogy and has researched her family. We have both written books with our family history.

Q: Anything else you would like to add?

A: I use the Family Tree Maker program that allows me to generate family reports. I am happy to help anyone interested in their family history by sending you reports via e-mail.



Gloria Jean Svanda

Gloria Jean Svanda died early in the morning on Friday, June 4, 2021, aged 70. She was at home, her sanctuary. Private gatherings to celebrate her will follow later this summer, in Rockford, and in Marquette, Mich. Gloria was a farm girl

in her heart, raised on the farm where her parents grew sweet corn for Del-Monte. She fondly recalls work days at harvest time to shuck, cut, blanche, and freeze surplus corn. The land seemed 'right' when it was productive, as in the farms of the Midwest. She believed in making your own little corner as wonderful as it could be, and lived that through her avid gardening and planting trees, or maybe even by tearing out a garden when the grandkids just need a sandpit! Gloria was married

to David Svanda for 16

years, and had a daughter

Tracy. They lived a time in New York state, and then settled in Marquette, Mich. It mattered to them to work for the good of their community, from Gloria's role in early childhood education, to David's in city government. She was a natural homemaker, with a knack for creating welcoming and workable spaces. Her kitchen churned out huge trays of holiday cookies for all who worked at City Hall; her table saw countless projects prepared for preschool kids by a teacher's capable hands. She made home a nurturing place for her family, and fostered in her daughter a deep sense of belonging. She eventually returned to her childhood home, northern Illinois, and has lived in Rockford

young age she had a talent in working with kids, and earned a Bachelor's in Early Child Development from Western Illinois University. Her career included the Marquette Cooperative Preschool, after school programming, and the Discovery Center Children's Museum in Rockford. She was a respected guide to parents of a whole generation of kids coming through 'The Co-op' in Marquette, and

until the present day.

Gloria knew from a



made friendships there that stuck for her whole life. At the Discovery Center, she got into messy science education – the perfect preparation for her curious grandkids. Gramma Gloria and Herman spent hours experimenting with cornstarch and water, maybe baking soda and vinegar, 'seeing what happens'. The way she could connect with kids was truly rare. Her mind saw the world, or a moment, through a child's eyes. She was always ready to play!

Her greatest fulfillment was having grandkids, and seeing her house turn from 'Gloria's house' to 'Gramma's house'. Her cherished Herman and Liona adored being silly with Gramma Gloria, and they could feel that she would rather play with them than do anything else in the world.

Doing site supervision

for after school programs brought her into the lives of kids who sometimes had a rougher time. She kept the daily chaos (up to 100 elementary kids!) on track with her high expectations. She was proud that on field trips, the people they visited would comment on her kids' good manners. When there was conflict, she would find accountability by asking the kids to 'back up, back up' to the start of the problem. Her staff of group leaders remember her for baking a homemade treat for each of their birthdays, every year. She retired having affected the lives of so many kids.

Too often, her health stood in the way of what she would have liked to do and give. She weathered Wegener's disease (a rare autoimmune condition) with all of its complications, brave every time to fight the attacks on her body, and move through recovery to a 'new

normal'. The transplanted kidney she received from her brother Dan stayed strong her whole life. Fibromyalgia frustrated her by stealing away energy. It was ultimately colon cancer that took the last of her fight.

Gloria grew up in the

Monroe Center Union Church, where her parents served as pillars. She took her own turn in service at Grace United Methodist Church in Marquette, giving generously both in the church machinery and as a trusted friend to all, from college students to the most elderly of the congregation. She feels respect for all faiths and has in more recent years drawn comfort from Native American beliefs about the spirits held within the Earth. "I believe we have a deity that creates spirits that come to us to help us, whether it's for strength, or perspective. Like the spirit of peace. I think spirits are open and don't lock into a form. The presence of the spirits and the way I believe in them gives me peace."

Her steadfast sister Sue describes a 'well spring of determination.' Gloria knew how to get things done, and especially when it took some problem solving and creative thinking. When she did ask for help, Gloria went above and beyond to show appreciation. She will be missed.

Gloria is survived by her daughter, Tracy (Joshua Morse); grandkids, Herman Grant (5) and Liona Lucille (2); sister, Sue Wick; brother, Dan Adamson; beloved friends; neighbors; and extended family; and her faithful kitty, CallaLily.

She is predeceased by her parents J. Grant and Lorraine Adamson; and brother Larry Adamson.



MOMENTS IN TIME

- * On June 29, 1613, the Globe Theatre, where most of Shakespeare's plays debuted, burns down. The Globe was built by Shakespeare's acting company, the Lord Chamberlain's Men, in 1599 from the timbers of London's very first permanent theater, Burbage's Theater, built in 1576.
- *On July 2, 1776, the Second Continental Congress, assembled in Philadelphia, formally adopts Richard Henry Lee's resolution for independence from Great Britain. The vote was unanimous, with only New York abstaining.

- * On July 3, 1989, Martha Ann Johnson is arrested in Georgia for the 1982 murder of her oldest child after an Atlanta newspaper initiated a new investigation into the suspicious death. Her three other children had also mysteriously died. Johnson's case sparked a trend in which authorities look closely into the sudden deaths of young children.
- * On June 28, 1997, Mike Tyson bites Evander Holyfield's ear in the third round of their heavyweight rematch. Though Holyfield was in obvious pain, the fight resumed after a brief stoppage, and then Tyson bit Holyfield's other ear. Tyson was disqualified from the match and later suspended from boxing.

the vaccine for others even if you don't want it for yourself. No one is forcing you to get it.


