Both houses pass election bill postponing 2022 primary to June

SPRINGFIELD-Largely on partisan lines, lawmakers passed an omnibus elections bill Monday that would push back the date of the 2022 primary elections amid other major changes to the state's election code.

The 156-page omnibus bill, an amendment to Senate Bill 825 filed by Rep. Maurice West, D-Rockford, would also strengthen the state's cybersecurity surrounding elections and make Election Day a holiday among other provisions.

The bill was filed Sunday night, passed the House 72-46 at about 6 p.m. Monday, then passed on a partisan 41-18 split in the Senate at about 10 p.m. It will need only a signature from the governor to become law.

Election dates Under the legislation, in 2022, early voting for primary elections would start May 19 and Election Day would be moved to June 28. State primaries are typically held in March. The dates for nominating petitions for primaries would also change, with those seeking office being able to circulate petitions starting Jan. 13. Congressional and judicial candidates must have petitions filed by March 14.

The provision changing these dates is set to expire at the start of 2023.

"The state has always had a really long window between the primary and the general, which makes the political season long and risky, negatively affecting public policymaking," West said to committee members Monday. "Our proposal is to do this one-time change just to see how it works and I think it will be beneficial to the state and then it can maybe be something we keep, moving forward."

The bill would also make

the date of the general election, November 8, a state holiday in 2022. It will be considered a legal school holiday, and any schools closing due to the holiday would "be made available to an election authority as a polling place for 2022 General Election Day." This provision would also expire at the start of 2023. Mail-in-ballots

One provision would also eate a permanent vote-by-

mail list. Under current law, voters must apply for a vote-by-mail ballot for every election. While that process would continue, election officials would also offer an application for permanent vote-bymail status. The application would allow voters choose to receive ballots for all partisan-locked elections, non-partisan-locked elections, or both.

Pritzker signs redistricting plans for state legislative, appellate court districts

SPRINGFIELD—Gov. JB Pritzker signed a pair of bills Friday that redraw state legislative and appellate court districts, despite the fact that official U.S Census data needed to ensure equal representation has not yet been delivered.

In a statement released Friday afternoon, Pritzker said he signed the measures after reviewing the maps to make sure they complied with state and federal law by ensuring

minority representation.

"Illinois' strength is in our diversity, and these maps help to ensure that communities that have been left out and left behind have fair representation in our government," Pritzker said in the statement. "These district boundaries align with both the federal and state Voting Rights Acts, which help to ensure our diverse communities have electoral power

and fair representation." Reaction to Pritzker's announcement was swift. House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch called the signing "a win for the people of

this great state." "With Governor Pritzker's signature, people of Illinois can be confident in a legislative map that is reflective of the diversity that we

see in every corner of our state," Welch said.

"Not only does this map adhere to state and federal laws, but it is a product of more than 50 public hearings where citizens came to tell us what their communities look like to them."

But Republican Sen. Jason Barickman, of Bloomington, the minority spokesman on the Senate Redistricting Committee, accused Pritzker of going back on his campaign pledge to support an independent mapmaking

"The people of Illinois deserve a fair, transparent process that allows them to choose their representatives in government," Barickman said. "Pritzker turned his back on them and chose instead to use his signature to further enshrine the broken status quo of politicians picking their voters."

The redistricting process is highly political, even in a normal year, because it gives the majority party the ability to draw district maps that will favor them for the next decade.

But it was especially heated in the General Assembly this year, not just because the release of detailed census data has been delayed, but because, as a candidate running in 2018, Pritzker supported creating an independent redistricting commission-the so-called "Fair Maps" proposal – and had vowed to veto any maps drawn by lawmakers or their staffs.

Sheriff's Office announces 'Click It or Ticket' campaign numbers

LEE COUNTY — The Lee County Sheriff's Office today announced it issued fifteen (15) citations during the recent Memorial Day "Click It or Ticket" enforcement period.

"Through the Memorial Day enforcement campaign, we helped make Illinois roads safer and spread the word that seat belts save lives," said Sgt. Derek Ranken.

While Illinois' 2020 seat belt compliance rate was 94.6 percent, unbelted occupants still account for over half of those killed in traffic crashes. The "Click It or Ticket" campaign aims to change the behavior of the millions of people who don't buckle up. Thousands of lives could be saved each year if every vehicle occupant was properly restrained when traveling.

During the enforcement period, Lee County wrote one citation for seat belt violations and took the following additional actions:

- One DUI arrest
- Three suspended/revoked licenses
- Two uninsured motorists
- Three speeding citations

COVID-19 positivity rate, hospitalizations push new lows ahead of Friday reopening

SPRINGFIELD - The state's COVID-19 metrics continued to improve Monday, June 7 ahead of Friday's planned

Gov. JB Pritzker's office confirmed last week that Phase 5 will begin Friday, June 11, essentially lifting all of the COVID-19 capacity restrictions that have been in place for over one year. That means businesses, large-scale events, conventions, amusement parks and seated-spectator venues can all return to full capacity beginning Friday.

That announcement came as the state's COVID-19 case positivity rate – a disease spread indicator that has been widely used to determine what level of restrictions would be in place throughout the pandemic – continued to plummet, hitting a new low of 1.1 percent Monday.

That's far from the recent 4.4 percent peak from April 12 and well below its 13.2 percent height since June 2020, when testing became more widespread.

"After a tremendously challenging year, Illinois has now reached a defining moment in our efforts to defeat COVID-19," Pritzker said in a news release Friday. "Thanks to the hard work of residents across the state, Illinois will soon resume life as we knew it before - returning to events, gatherings, and a fully reopened economy, with some of the safety guidelines we've adopted still in place."

While businesses will still be allowed to have stricter masking and social distancing policies than the state, the new guidance follows the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommendation that face coverings are not needed indoors for vaccinated individuals.

Masks are still "recommended" for unvaccinated individuals, according to the governor's office. Masks will still be required for people traveling on public

transportation, in congregate settings, in health care settings, as well as in schools, day cares and educational institutions, according to the governor's office.

"This pandemic has robbed us of many of our freedoms such as going to ball games and concerts, celebrating graduations, weddings, and birthdays, going to dinner with friends, and even sharing a hug with loved ones we don't live with," Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said in a news release. "The vaccine is giving us our freedoms back and allowing us to move to Phase 5. Let's keep the vaccination momentum going so we can put this pandemic in the rearview mirror and not look back.

According to IDPH, more than 11.6 million vaccine doses have been administered in the state, with 50.3 percent of the state's aged-12-and-older population having been fully vaccinated. About 60 percent of those 12 and older have received at least one dose, while that number increases to 62.5 percent for those 18 and older and 82 percent for those 65 and over.

On a seven-day average, however, about 38,975 vaccines were administered as of Monday, meaning the pace of those being vaccinated has slowed substantially.

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

The legislation would have voters who apply to be on the list remain on it until they request to be removed, change their registration or register to vote in another county. A witness representing the Kane County Clerk told the committee that county clerks receive death certificates and notice of address changes and would remove voters from the rolls in those instances as well. The bill also tasks the Illinois State Board

of Elections with looking into the possibility of electronic vote-by-mail for voters with disabilities. By the end of 2021, ISBE must submit legislation to the General Assembly creating a method for disabled voters to independently and privately mark a ballot using assistive technology.

Before submitting the legislation, ISBE must hold at least two public hearings on the subject.

Cybersecurity

After high-profile cybersecurity breaches involving the Illinois State Board of Elections and the attorney general's office, the bill would also require election authorities to beef up cybersecurity measures including monthly vulnerability scans, risk assessment every two years and use protection from the Department of Innovation and Technology or a third-party vendor within one year of its passage.

Attorney General Kwame Raoul addressed the April breach of his office's network earlier in May, telling lawmakers that federal investigators were looking into the incident. A February audit conducted before the attack had concluded his office lacked necessary cybersecurity safeguards.

ISBE's former executive director Steve Sandvoss, who has been on leave since April, is set to resign on June 30 after being the target of an online extortion attempt.

While an internal investigation on the extortion attempt was completed, ISBE and the Illinois State Police have not released any details on the case or the nature of the extortion. According to that internal investigation,

no voter data or ISBE systems were com-

promised.

Jail polling stations

The bill also allows election authorities to create temporary polling places in the jails of smaller counties.

Under current law, a county with 3 million or more residents - which applies exclusively to Cook County – is required to make a temporary branch polling place in the county jail, allowing residents of that county who are in custody but have not been convicted of the arresting offense to vote.

The election omnibus allows sheriffs in all other Illinois counties the option of establishing a temporary polling place in their county jail.

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

That number was over 130,000 in mid-April and over 86,000 in early May. But as the vaccination pace has slowed, so have the number of new COVID-19 cases recorded each day and the number of people hospitalized for the disease. For 12 straight days, there have been fewer than 1,000 new cases reported each day.

The death toll of the virus had reached

22,963 in Illinois as of Monday, with 14 deaths reported over the previous 24 hours. Thus far in June, the number of daily COVID-19-related deaths have hovered between six and 42 each day. At the pandemic's height in December, 238 died in one day.

Hospitalizations continue to push past their lowest points in the pandemic as well, with 788 hospital beds in use by

COVID-19 patients as of Sunday night, a decrease of more than 300 from a week ago. That number peaked at more than 6,000 in November.

On a weekly average, the period from Monday to Sunday was the lowest it has been throughout the pandemic with 915 beds in use on average daily over the seven-day period.

"No one twisted his arm to say what he said," Republican Congressman Rodney Davis, R-Taylorville, said during a news conference Thursday in Springfield. "No one told him, 'You have to make this pledge.' No one told Gov. Pritzker when he was campaigning, that he needed to campaign and be in favor of a fair map process.'

During a separate interview Thursday afternoon, however, Pritzker said the opportunity to create an independent commission had passed and that Republicans were trying to delay the process for their own political advantage.

"They (the General Assembly) took off the table a constitutional amendment for an independent redistricting commission. That never happened in the legislature," Pritzker said in a phone interview with Capitol News Illinois. "So then you're left with, the two sides really need to work together, whether that was in a construct of an independent

commission or just working in a bipartisan fashion. The Republicans seemed

not to be interested in doing that." 'What they really wanted was a map that favors them," Pritzker continued. "You know, they don't like to say that, but that's what they were after."

Under the Illinois Constitution, lawmakers have until June 30 to approve a redistricting plan. After that, the process goes to an eight-member bipartisan commission.

Thinking beyond the 7th Generation

BY PASTOR JOHN KALEBAUGH love hearing a good story. Most people that I know do. And it doesn't seem to matter what age a person is, either. My grandson's favorite story at this time seems to be, "The Three Little Pigs" – complete with sound effects which include lots of "huffing and puffing." Our minds seem to be created by God in such a way that we remember stories and often learn valuable lessons from them. Maybe this is why the Bible contains so many of them. Stories about real events and people like you and me.

An interesting thing about Scripture is the writers did not "clean up" the stories in order to make the people in them seem better than they were. No, God made sure to include both the good and the bad parts of their lives. The successes and failures. Because this is what real life is like! Both then and now. Psalm 71:17-18 says, "O God, You have taught

me from my youth; and to this day I declare Your wondrous works. Now also when I am old and gray-headed, O God, do not forsake me, until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to everyone who is to come.'

It could be while sitting around the table having coffee. Or maybe as you are out walking the dog. Or making a run to the grocery store. Any of these times and a host of others may be that opportunity when God causes someone's path to coincide with yours in order for them to hear a part of your story of God's faithfulness toward you.

It may very well be that its something they need to hear to bring them encouragement and hope for that day in their life. For their story... God bless you.

The Old Stories

ark Haddon's brilliant novel "The Porpoise" (2019) opens and closes with scenes of terrible violence. A beautiful Swedish actress named Maja, who is 37 weeks pregnant, is killed when her private plane crashes in France. The inexperienced pilot is so enamored by her blue, blue eyes and the small scar on her cheek, he pays little attention to the gathering storm clouds he flies into. Miraculously the baby is born alive.

Philippe, the obscenely rich, grieving widower who boasts that his family has been "part of a global aristocracy" since ancient Greece, devotes himself to his daughter Angelica. Before she turns six, Philippe begins to visit her every night: "She is made from his body ... How could there be a boundary of any kind between them?" He rapes her night after night. When Angelica turns sixteen, a handsome playboy, Darius, appears, and she sees her chance for escape. Darius, having intuited the truth, returns to the estate to rescue her. Philippe savagely attacks him and Darius, badly wounded, escapes and with his friends boards a yacht, the Porpoise, and sails home to Greece.

During the night, Darius wakes, his head full of someone else's memories. He finds himself on an ancient ship whose sailors call him Pericles. He has sailed out of contemporary Britain into ancient mythology, to be precise, into Shakespeare's play "Pericles, Prince of Tyre." In the play, Pericles vies for the hand of King Antiochus's daughter but flees when he discovers the king's incestuous secret. Pursued by assassins, he sails off to have his adventures.

Haddon follows Shakespeare's plot, but instead of having the female characters keep their place, silent and obedient, he gives them a voice and fully realized lives. Thus Pericles' wife Chloe is every bit his equal. Their marriage brims with youthful infatuation and lust, but also with respect and understanding. Their daughter Marina, raised by others, thinks bitterly about how "she has been told to be soft so that men will always have a means by which they can hurt and control her. That ring through the nose which men call femininity." She finds shelter with a priestess, Emilia with blue, blue eyes and a tiny scar on her cheek. Emilia, whose tempestuous life has finally subsided, muses about her vocation, "When all the ceremony and the theology are peeled away, prayer is a serious stillness in which one talks quietly to one's own best self."

Haddon's writing is both precise and luxuriant and best described by Angelica: "Her favorite stories are the old ones, those that set deep truths ringing like bells, that take the raw materials of sex and cruelty, of fate and chance, and render them safe by trapping them in beautiful words.

Policy restricts public access rather than expanding it

hicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot landed Guest Column in a maelstrom of controversy last 'month when she said she only would allow "journalists of color" to interview her for pieces about her first two years in office.

Fox News provocateur Tucker Carlson called Lightfoot a "racist" and a "monster" when he learned of the mayor's position. A conservative news outlet, the Daily Caller, is suing the mayor saying its First Amendment rights were violated.

If I've learned anything in the last 33 years as a journalist, it's that sources will talk to whom they want to. Is the mayor's policy: Discriminatory? Cer-

tainly. Bigoted? Perhaps. Racist? Nope. Why isn't it racist? After all, that's a term

that's being bandied about quite a bit to describe her actions.

Well, racism is discrimination on steroids, powered by privileges given to those in the culturally dominant race. In the United States it's a bias with a pickax. It's a prejudice with the weight of 400 years of slavery, Jim Crow laws and history behind it.

That's a distinction that has sometimes been hard for white people, myself included, to discern.

This latest dustup with the mayor had me thinking about a fellow by the name of Ennis Williams, an assistant high school principal I knew when I was a young education reporter in Galveston, Texas.

Mr. Williams was a wonderful source for a first-year reporter. I went to him regularly for guidance as I attempted to cover a community scarred by years of racial hatred. We were less than 20 years removed from segregated

schools, libraries and other institutions in that small city. Of course, when you are 22 or 23 years old you think 20 years is almost an eternity. My generation of journalists was the first at the newspaper

not to have been educated in segregated schools. None of us remembered the once ubiquitous "whites only" and "colored" signs that marred the community.

The newspaper's track on race was dismal. It editorially supported Jim Crow laws during the Civil Rights Era. Up until the 1970s, it wouldn't run Black and white obituaries on the same page. And when I started at the paper in 1988, there wasn't a single Black or brown face in the entire newsroom -- in a community that was a majority minority.

Older reporters would dismissively refer to the Black neighborhood north of Broadway as "The Jungle." The managing editor would determine how prominently crime stories were played based in part on whether the victim was Black or white.

Despite this institutional legacy, I routinely went to Mr. Williams, who was Black, for guidance on how to cover the entire community. He was always gracious and helpful. And then his brilliant daughter Elicia became

enmeshed in a controversy through no fault of her own. Elicia had the highest grade point average in her class and was selected to be the first Black valedictorian at the historically white A school administrator, who was Ennis Williams' boss,

came forward and announced that he made a mistake when publishing how grades would be weighted to determine class rank. Because of this he said that Elicia would only be a co-valedictorian along with a white girl.

All heck broke loose in the community. Recriminations were fired across the town's racial divide. Many Black people perceived that it was an attempt to diminish the accomplishments of one of their own. I called Mr. Williams for comment and he wouldn't speak

with me. But the next day a Black reporter from the Houston Post had an interview with him. A mid-level editor chewed me out for not landing the interview. I was hurt as only a 23-year-old striving reporter with little life experience can be. I kept thinking the only reason Mr. Williams wouldn't

speak to me is because I'm white. That's reverse discrimination. That's wrong.

More than three decades later, I view this situation dif-

A person can speak or not speak with whomever they want. That's life. But more importantly, Mr. Williams perceived the systematic racism in the community, which included a newspaper that didn't employ anyone who looked like him.

Also, while I could sympathize with the struggles Mr. Williams faced, I could not empathize.

After all, I never knew the pain of not being able to check out a book from the "white library" as he did while growing up. No social convention expected me to step into the gutter when meeting a woman of a different race on the sidewalk. But for Mr. Williams -- and millions of other African Americans – that was their life experience.

But more significantly, it wasn't just about historic wrongs. The newspaper's racial shortcomings were readily apparent to anyone who cared to look.

In the three decades since then, I've had time to ponder a difficult topic: white privilege. Please note that it's an advantage that is not necessarily sought and it doesn't mean one hasn't had struggles in their life. It just means one of those struggles hasn't been related to the color of their skin. Over the years, I've seen sources who have consistently

shared information with me and other white reporters suddenly become mum around my Black colleagues. It's not right, but it's an unsought advantage bestowed nonetheless. So, when Mayor Lightfoot said she would only speak to journalists of color as a means of encouraging greater

diversity in the city hall press corps, my thoughts are these: I don't like it because it is needlessly polarizing and it restricts public access rather than expanding it. That said, while I don't like the policy, I understand where

it's coming from.
