White warns residents to be aware of scams targeting Illinoisans

SPRINGFIELD — Secretary of State Jesse White is warning Illinois residents to be on alert for multiple texting and emailing scams claiming to be from the Secretary of State's office seeking personal information to defraud Illinoisans.

"I have zero tolerance for fraudsters who prey on people in desperate times," said White. "My office is working with the Illinois Attorney General's office to protect Illinoisans from falling victim to these fraudulent schemes." White is warning the public of scammers who are sending unsolicited text messages or emails claiming to be from the Illinois Secretary of State. In some instances, the scammers copy the Secretary of State website logos and masthead to appear official.

White says these texts and emails are scams and recipients should not click on any links or provide any information.



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


Margaret Reed of Topeka, Kansas.



Joy That Jesus Gives Is Eternal

oy" is a response that is mysterious and almost unknown in U the 21st century. We blather on about being "happy," or boast about being "fulfilled," or speak of being "satisfied." None of those experiences are states of "joy."

In Judaism, the Torah or what the Western World calls the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Old Testament, are read through from the pulpit of a synagogue on a yearly cycle. When the last text is read there is huge celebration, an observance known as "Simchat Torah" which means "rejoicing in the Torah." Whatever sacred scrolls of Torah a synagogue has custody of, they are taken out of their special "arks" and are handed out to members. These holy scrolls are held aloft while the congregation dances around them, celebrating their beauty, celebrating their truth, celebrating their goodness and the way they have informed the life and faith of the synagogue for yet another year. It is an unscripted act of "rejoicing." It is a moment for the entire faith community to focus on the "chedvah," the "joy of

Lord" that fills their hearts and souls. For Jesus "joy" is not a state of mind. Joy is a way of being in the world, a choice as much as an emotion. Like the conclusion of the annual reading of the Torah, you dance so that your "joy may be complete." That is the "joy" Jesus knew. That is the "joy" he wished for all of us, and all of creation, to know and celebrate. Scripture tells us that "...looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:2, ESV)

We often think of joy as happiness, which is a mistake. The joy that Jesus gives is eternal, not temporal. Often we seek happiness, but that can be disrupted by a change of circumstances in a relationship, a job, a medical diagnosis, or even a pandemic. Cornelia "Corrie" ten Boom was born in Haarlem, Netherlands, in 1892, and grew up in a devoutly religious family. During World War II, she and her family harbored hundreds of Jews to protect them from arrest by Nazi authorities. Betrayed by a fellow

Dutch citizen, the entire family was imprisoned. Her father died two weeks into his imprisonment. Corrie and her sister were placed in the infamous Nazi concentration camp Ravenswood. Her sister died shortly before Corrie was miraculously released and started a worldwide ministry and later told her story in a book entitled The Hiding Place. If anyone had reason to lose their joy, it was Corrie. Yet, she was able to say: "I have experienced His presence in the deepest hell that man can create. I have really tested the promises of the Bible, and believe me; you can count on them. When we are powerless to do a thing, it is a great joy that we can come and step inside the ability of Jesus." C.S. Lewis made this challenging statement about joy: "I sometimes wonder whether all pleasures are not substitutes for joy." I wonder what I am trying to find in pleasure to bring happiness that is fleeting, not realizing at every waking moment that I already have joy and it cannot be taken from me. I can only choose to forfeit it by searching for the fleeting when I already possess the eternal.

a proposal to allow voters to determine if they wanted an independent commission to draw maps, without partisan gerrymandering. But the court, in an opinion of 4 Democrats in the majority and 3 Republicans in the minority, blocked this opportunity, with probably the most contrived bit of jurisprudence since the Dred Scott decision, which prompted the Civil War.

Nor can the Illinois Supreme Court hide behind earlier decisions. Indeed, this court in 1989 declared a state legislative district invalid because it offended the compactness requirement of our state charter, and forced a redrawing. The districts proposed in the map you see here are as bad as that invalid district.

Also nearby, see a map of Chicago's neighborhoods, which are generally compact, as you would expect. I am sure that is what delegates to the 1970 Illinois Constitutional Convention had in mind.

Now, because of requirements that districts be equal in population, valid districts can't, of course, always be perfect squares. But, come on - the proposed, tortured district maps are the height of political arrogance. Democratic leaders obviously assume that the state high court will again play its partisan hand, as it did five years ago.

Democratic leaders in Springfield have overplayed this one badly. Mike Madigan would not have been so brazen.

Visiting these various fraudulent websites could place malware on the recipients' devices or trick them into disclosing sensitive personal information. The Secretary of State's office never requests personal information, like a Social Security number, via text message or email.

"Delete the text or email," said White. "Do not click on them and do not provide any of your personal information." White encourages people to take steps to protect their personal information:


• Delete emails and texts that promise or offer access to driver's licenses or state ID cards, and do not click on any links contained in such emails or text messages, as they may place malware on your devices.

• Hang up on any calls, including robocalls, which ask individuals to take immediate action or provide personally-identifiable information, such as your Social Security number or bank account number.

• Ask to use other types of identifiers besides your Social Security number.

• Keep your software up to date, including your phone and computer operating systems and antivirus protection programs. Most phones, computers and antivirus software can be set to update automatically when new software versions are released.

The Searcher

n Tana French's suspense novel, "The Searcher," a tough, retired Chicago cop is looking for a small house in a small town in a small country. He finds his dream

on the Internet: a ramshackle cottage in a peaceful, remote hamlet in western Ireland. French, who lives in Dublin, modelled her story on John Ford's classic Western "The Searchers." Like the movie's John Wayne character, French's hero Cal Hooper is a loner, an outsider who is drawn into a compulsive search for a teenager who has vanished. In the process, he exposes ugly secrets, pervasive cruelty, and as in all good Westerns, murderous vigilantes.

A strong-willed adolescent named Trey Reddy, who lives up the mountain with his mother and five siblings, wants Cal to find out what happened to his brother Brendan who disappeared months ago. The Reddy's are considered shiftless troublemakers by both the villagers and the Garda, the Irish

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police, and are therefore not worth the time and trouble to find the boy. Against his better judgment, Cal agrees to look for Brendan. But he is soon outmatched by the villains abetted by the ravishing landscape: "He feels like this specific beauty is central to the illusion that lulled him into stupidity, turned him into the peasant gazing slack-jawed at this handful of gold coins till they melt into dead leaves in front of his eyes."

"The Searcher" is nearly 400 pages long, much of it taken up with extravagant and often wearying descriptions of the Irish countryside and its weather. French acknowledges that plot is not her strong suit. Whatever suspense the novel's premise holds is dissipated by oft-repeated cataloguing of Cal's grocery list, his meals, the chatter of the rooks in his tree, and his restoration of an old cabinet to mint condition. I am not sure that a loving description of how to skin a rabbit contributes much to the plot line. A great deal of violence peppers the narrative, all transcribed in fine, gory detail.

Cal Hooper is French's first American protagonist. "I was reluctant to touch on the U.S. side of this at all," she said. "I'm not convinced that I have any right to speak about that." She gives Cal a backstory in which he regrets his role in a near-fatal shooting, when his partner fired at a fleeing Black teenager and Cal corroborated his partner's story that the teen was reaching for something in his pocket.

Soon after, Cal retires from the Chicago police force. French said, "The morality involved in his job was much too complex and jagged and all wrong for him to feel like he could do it and be a good person any longer." But in that Irish hamlet, the idea that a hero is automatically a good person is anything but clear.

Is my water safe?

We are pleased to present this year's Annual Water Quality Report (Consumer Confidence Report) as required by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). This report is designed to provide details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. This report is a snapshot of last year's water quality. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

Do I need to take special precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Source water assessment and its availability

To determine Amboy's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, information obtained during a Well Site Survey performed by the Illinois Rural Water Association on April 15, 1998 was reviewed. Based on this information, five potential sources of contamination were identified within proximity of this water supply's wells. The Illinois EPA does not consider the supply's source water susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydro been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and a sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should minimize the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination. Hence, well hydraulics were not evaluated for this groundwater supply.

Why are there contaminants in my drinking water?

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791). The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity: microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses; organic Chemical Contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems; and radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Description of Water Treatment Process

Your water is treated by filtration and disinfection. Filtration removes particles suspended in the source water. Particles typically include clays and silts, natural organic matter, iron and manganese, and microorganisms. Your water is also treated by disinfection. Disinfection involves the addition of chlorine or other disinfectants to kill bacteria and other microorganisms (viruses, cysts, etc.) that may be in the water. Disinfection is considered to be one of the major public health advances of the 20th century.

Additional Information for Lead

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Amboy Water Treatment is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested.
