AMBOY — The Amboy American Legion Post #453 will be holding its annual Memorial Day ceremony in Amboy at the Veterans Park at 10 a.m., on Monday, May 31.

The guest speaker for the annual ceremony will Mike Hickey. Included in the ceremony are prayer by Chaplain Tom Dickinson, Gettysburg address by Dana Merriman, and reading of General Logan's orders by Kelton Schwamberger. Merriman and Schwamberger will also perform Taps.

The Legion members will then head to Sublette for the Memorial Day ceremony at the Ellice Dinges Center at 11 a.m., on Monday, May 31.

### County votes down proposed self-storage facility

LEE COUNTY-The Lee County Board met in regular session on Thursday, May 20.

The petition from the zoning board to issue a special use ordinance for a property in Sublette for the purpose of constructing a Self-Storage Facility was rejected by the county board.

Several board members spoke against the ordinance. Horstman reported that al-

lowing the variance would be at odds with the village of Sublette's comprehensive plan. Another board member noted that the county board should honor the local authority. Proper drainage in the area was one concern. It was also noted that the village of Sublette has some say in what happens within a mile and a half of the village limits.

The roll call vote was 22 no and 1 yes.

### **Tarr named 2021 AHS** Student of the Year





Matt fought a courageous 13-year battle with brain cancer and spent his last few months participating in a clinical trial in hope of advancing the cause of conquering GBM. Matt fought this battle with an unbelievable amount of love and support from family, friends, co-workers, and the community.

Matt was born in Mendota, on Feb. 18, 1979 to Paul and Susan Henkel. He was raised in Sublette and spent the majority of his life raising his family in Amboy, before moving to Byron. He graduated from Amboy High School in 1997 and from Illinois State University in 2001. In 2002, he married Cammie Cook, his high school sweetheart and wife of nearly 20 years.

Matt's love of golf led him to a career in course management. He started as an intern at the Byron Forest Preserve and was promoted to assistant superintendent, before realizing his dream of becoming superintendent of PrairieView Golf Course in 2010. In 2018, Matt assumed the role of general manager/ superintendent before cancer tragically cut his career short. Matt embraced technology in the golf industry and was instrumental in bringing PrairieFire to life. 

#### Strange Land

To be an immigrant means to belong to two countries, but emotionally never quite be at home in either. In American author Jhumpa Lahiri's Pulitzer Prize-winning book of short stories, "The Interpreter of Maladies," the Indian immigrant narrator of the final story describes this indeterminate condition: "I have remained in this new world for nearly 30 years. I know that my achievement is quite ordinary. I am not the only man to seek his fortune far from home, and certainly I am not the first. Still, there are times I am bewildered by each mile I have traveled,

each meal I have eaten, each person I have known, each room in which I have slept. As ordinary as it all appears, there are times when it is beyond my imagination."

All nine stories are excellent; in seven, Lahiri charts the voyages, both physical and emotional, of Indian immigrants to Boston. Two stories take place in India, including "The Interpreter of Maladies." The interpreter is Mr. Kapasi, a tourist guide who is chauffeuring an American family to the Sun Temple at Konarak. He is a fastidious gentleman who tells them about his job translating the symptoms of

Gujarati patients for a doctor who doesn't know the Gujarati language. In his youth Mr. Kapasi "had dreamed of being an interpreter for diplomats and dignitaries, resolving conflicts between people and nations, settling disputes of which he alone could understand both sides." When the wife encourages Mr. Kapasi to elaborate, and even offers further contact after her return to America, he is thrilled, misinterpreting her casual flirtation: "In its own way this correspondence would fulfill his dream of serving as an interpreter between nations."

Children narrate two stories. "When Mr. Pirzada Came to Dine" takes place in Boston in 1971 when Bangladesh fought its war of independence against Pakistan. Every evening, Mr. Pirzada comes for dinner and the evening news. His wife had insisted that their seven daughters all have names beginning with the letter A. One day "Mr. Pirzada produces from his wallet a black-andwhite picture of seven girls at a picnic, their braids tied with ribbons, sitting cross-legged in a row, eating chicken curry off of banana leaves. 'How am I to distinguish? Ayesha, Amira, Amina, Aziza, you see the difficulty." Though our 10-year old narrator does not comprehend the war, she is aware that Mr. Pirzada's family is in grave danger.

Lahiri's immigrants are husbands and wives who cope with crises, who have affairs with married men, let themselves in for sketchy friendships, and try to assimilate in an alien world. I came to America with my family when I was 14. The bewilderment, the urge to fit in, the sheer incomprehension are all familiar. A visiting German friend summed it up: "America is so much stranger than I could ever have imagined."

## Measure won't help a single dog or cat

well-intentioned, but really dumb, bill pending before the Legislature would allow pet shops to sell dogs and cats only if they are obtained from a pound or rescue group. The idea behind House

Bill 1711 is to put so-called "puppy mills" out of business That's a noble goal.

Unfortunately, the mea-

sure won't help a single dog or cat and the only establishments it will cause to fold are reputable pet stores. Under this bill, consumers

could buy dogs from breeders. But pet stores would be prohibited from purchasing from them. "This bill is being driven

by emotion, not facts. If this bill passes it will put us out of business," said Ana Soskic, president of Furry Babies, which has pet stores in Rockford, Aurora and Lombard. Soskic noted that folks

who shop at her stores usually are looking for a specific dog breed.

"They want to buy purebred dogs and if our stores are getting dogs from animal shelters, we aren't going to be able to provide them with what they want," she said.

Soskic said she carefully vets the breeders who supply to her stores to ensure that all of the puppies and kittens have been raised in humane conditions. She added she would wholeheartedly support legislation to more stringently regulate breeding facilities.

"I got into this business because I love dogs," she said. "By selling dogs in our stores, we are helping customers so they won't have to drive 700 or 800 miles to buy directly from breeders. This bill does nothing to address the conditions at places where animals are born."

The measure has been approved by the House and is pending in the Senate.

It has drawn opposition

from the Illinois State Veter-

inary Medical Association. "We support families being able to obtain pets from a shelter, animal control, pet stores or private breeders," said Dr. Colleen Lewis, president of the state veterinary association.

"We support consumer choice and this bill limits their choices," she added. "If a family wants to buy a specific breed of dog or cat, they should be able to buy what is best for their family.'

Here is how the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals defines "puppy mill:" "A puppy mill is a large-scale commercial dog breeding operation that places profit over the well-being of its dogs."

But this legislation essentially lumps most breeders into that category.

There are bad dog breeders out there just like there are unethical physicians, sloppy plumbers and dishonest accountants. But most breeders, like most people in any given profession, do a good job.

In fact, most of the dog breeders I've met are nice people who love animals and are committed to finding them good homes.

I too love animals. And I can't bear the thought of any dog or cat living in less than humane circumstances. But that shouldn't be surprising. I'm the son and husband of veterinarians.

Over the years, we have opened our home to many

Some of these creatures have special needs. For example, there was the kitten born without eyes that we took in and cared for a dozen years. There was the elderly (and grumpy) mongrel we adopted when its owner entered hospice care.

And, yes, over the years we also have bought some purebreds from reputable breeders. Dog breeders, are mostly mom-and-pop business owners. In fact, most

I bought Hershey, a Labrador retriever puppy, from an older woman in Rio, Ill., who was battling multiple sclerosis and living on Social Security.

Despite her physical ailments, she made sure the dogs were clean and well-cared for.

In the years after our purchase, she periodically would inquire how her "baby" was getting along.

She certainly didn't get rich raising dogs. But it helped her make ends meet. And she found loving homes for hundreds of puppies. But the bill before the Legislature would prohibit pet stores from buying from businesses such as hers.

A better approach for Illinois would be to follow Ohio's example and pass more stringent health regulations for animal breeders because the current legislation is unfair to reputable breeders, well-run pet stores and, most importantly, to consumers who want choices.







## Clipper Highlights: Coach Don Wyzgowski

t's another big week this week as we high-Llight our first Clipper Coach. For most Clippers, you played under him, learned under him, and grew under him. For other members, around my age, we knew him as our Junior High School Principal. It gives me great pride and honor this week to announce our Clipper, the late Coach Don Wyzgowski. I spoke to Don's son,

Mark, prior to this article. Mark shared the following, "My dad grew up in Peru and went to St. Bede High School. When he got into coaching he first was an assistant at St. Bede. We then moved into the Tinley Park area as he accepted a teaching and assistant coaching job. We weren't in there long as my dad didn't like the suburbs. The Amboy head coaching job was open and dad took a teaching position there and the head coaching job. I loved that my dad was the head coach because I got to be involved in the program from such an early age all the way through my time as a Clipper. My dad didn't say much about emotions and kept them to himself but you could definitely see the pride in his eyes for his players. He didn't just coach them on the game of football he impacted them to all be better young men too. Connecting with his players and rallying the community is what dad loved

Coach Wyzgowski started his career in Amboy in 1974. He brought football knowledge, a strong desire to win, and a deep care for people to a town and program thirsty for gridiron glory.

and had a lasting effect on."

Due to not being around during the era of Coach Wyzgowski's tenure, I reached out to a former Clipper Coach and eight of some of the Best Clippers to play under Coach Wyzgowski. Here are their statements.

"It would be an honor

to talk about Don Wyzgowski," Coach Mike Mc-Cracken said. "When Don approached me about being on the football staff, we had already known each other for many years. I was a frosh-soph boys coach at the time and had many years been part of the junior high flag football program. I was happy to join the staff and be a part of something that had put Amboy on the map in so many ways. I got to be the frosh-soph assistant to Jim Mahar and be an assistant to everyone on the staff. Denny Weidman was the Central principal at the time and came late most days because of school matters. What I loved about the most was how Don would include all coaches and scouts in his post game parties. Another thing was how he took my

sometimes. It was surprising that a coach of his stature would agree and use my ideas. It was scary the first time. Don was a great guy to work under. He was a great coach who had Coach Jones and Coach Mahar that was part of a well-oiled machine. Many, many players loved playing on his teams and were lucky to be part of such a great program."

"I played for a lot of coaches and Coach Wyzgowski was as fun of a guy to play for as any," Rick Considine said. "He was tough and demanding but knew how to have fun and joke around too. He was so organized he knew how to delegate work which led to creating a great culture and environment. It was fun being a quarterback in his system. He gave us the freedom to make our own decisions. He was a key component to our program's success and his impact on the program was felt even several years after his retirement."

"Coach Wyzgowski came in with a great knowledge of offensive strategy. He knew how to set plays up and put us in a position to be successful offensively," Mark Kaleel said. "I always had a lot of respect for him. He built our program. He went door to door when he first started to recruit the athletes to go out for football. That's never easy in a small town, especially back then. After our Senior year and success, there were 100 kids out for football the next year, freshman through Senior. He never swore, was hardly ever negative, and listened to his players."

"Coach Wyzgowski ran an incredibly thorough program top to bottom. He picked his assistants and managed them very well along with listening to their ideas," Brad Considine said. "He was a positive leader if something didn't work he studied it to correct it he didn't blame or become negative. He wanted to win and wanted success but never pushed that on us he knew it had to be our choice, as players we had to want it too. He was a great players

Low and behold he took what I had said and used it in practice. One of the idiosyncrasies he left on me...especially early in my coaching career, were his superstitions. He would not get a hair cut, would always wear the exact same outfit, etc. When I first started coaching I would wear the same exact clothes after a at the beginning of each season and he would follow them exactly throughout the year," Dennis Nauman said.

"He was a guy that said exactly what he meant. It was all about accountability and consequences for your choices. For those that missed a practice they missed the game too. So even if you were hurt you still were out there on the field watching practice. He gave his teams a lot of freedom and trust in calling their own plays in a time period when that coaching philosophy wasn't heard of. He did it with success. He came into the perfect scenario in Amboy. He brought the 'hard-nosed,' athletic, gotta work for it attitude to our program. His superstitions were great too and rubbed off on us as players even. The partnership between Amboy Football and Coach Wyzgowski was as perfect as it can get and so fitting for our blue collar, hard working community. He knew what it took to be successful, placed others in positions to succeed, and coached young men on life not just football.

So, to the late Coach Don Wyzgowski, thank you for your contributions to Amboy Clipper Football. Without what you brought to our program, I don't know if I would be writing this or any

The men you coached and taught, that grew into some of the most successful men that I know, became role models, on and off the field, for an entire new generation of Amboy Football. From all of us Clippers, again Coach, thank you. Sail on!
