New substation in Rochelle

City officials break ground on \$13.8 million project

ROCHELLE – The City of Rochelle broke ground on a new \$13.8 million electrical substation project Friday at 1600 Ritchie Court.

The substation will be the city's third, which Mayor John Bearrows called "unheard of" for its size. The substation will increase reliability for nearby industry and reduce reliance on Rochelle's Caron Road substation.

The site is next to the old Nippon-Sharyo building, which will likely become the location of Project Jackpot in the future, a still-anonymous business that is said to be making a capital investment of over \$130 million and adding 150 jobs that pay an average of \$52,000 per year before benefits to the area.

City Manager Jeff Fiegenschuh said Project Jackpot will be Rochelle's largest electricity user. The substation will serve that and any other industrial growth going south. The

capacity of the new substation is 120 megawatts and it will be the city's largest.

"In the real estate world, they talk about 'location, location, location, Economic Development Director Jason Anderson said. "Rochelle has that. It's had it for 150 years. What most communities

don't have is 'infrastructure, infrastructure, infrastructure.' Rochelle is a community that is on fire with infrastructure."

Fiegenschuh said the city will be paying cash for the substation project. Last year Rochelle sold its transmission assets to ComEd and it will be using some of that money to fund the substation.

Bearrows noted the importance of not having to borrow money for the

"This project is an icon in my mind for the community," Bearrows said. "What that icon means is, there's many pieces in that long chain of what makes a thriving, successful community. This is one of those

links.' There have been "some times" in the past where industries in town have experienced brownouts, Bearrows said.

edge of construction and equipment," Executive Director Jackee Ohlinger said. "He's signed up for the certified pool course and playground safety."

Zeke Evans was also announced to the board as the district's new aquatic man-

ager. Evans has 10 years of experience in aquatics and is a certified lifeguard and pool operator. Current Aquatic Assistant Marianne Swanson will serve as interim manager while Evans gets acclimated, Ohlinger said.

In her report to the board Ohlinger said the Spring Lake construction project is nearing its end. Painting will occur this week, weather permitting.

meeting. "I've told students not to plan their parties for that day in case it gets moved or we have to wait around," Lewis said. "It will run in light rain if we have to. The alert now system with texts and social media posts will be used to convey plans to students. We will try again Sunday at 1 p.m. if it rains all day Saturday.

Due to the State of Illinois recently moving into the COVID-19 Bridge Phase, graduation tickets for each family have been increased from four tickets to seven.

Plans for masking and distancing guidelines have not been finalized yet and Lewis said the school is waiting for clearer guidance. Superintendent Jason Harper said other county schools have required masks in the stands, but not on the field due to the ability to distance.

RTHS students had their end of year assembly

May 18 virtually. Final assessments are May 20, 21 and 24. Students with an A, B or C in their courses are not required to take them, Lewis said. Harper said RTHS is waiting on guidance for what school will look like next year, which will likely come

"Originally in phase 5 of reopening it was supposed to be back to school with no restrictions," Harper

said. "There will be a new definition of phase 5. Things may be tied to vaccinations. We just got into 12-15-year-olds and there are clinical trials going on now of those younger than 12. We will dig through it and continue to plan.'

"We want all of our kids back for as many minutes and days as we can."

We need to make sure we educate ourselves

Dear Editor,

We see the latest media coverage about further rights infringement. Gun rights are a continuing target. In reading the on-line commentar-

ies to a recent Epoch Times article someone added a link to TacticalCivics.com. An intriguing title for a web site and invitational to me -Civics, Tactical?

The Tactical Civics approach is understanding who is in charge. I have been guilty of assuming those who are elected lead us and we must wait for the pulse of an election cycle to correct our problems by voting (meanwhile watching our culture go up for grabs). My mistake. Maybe our mistake too. Read the Preamble of our Constitution - We the People ... do ordain and establish. There it is, WE are the ultimate authority. Now, how do we exercise our authority? Article I Section 8 Clause 15 and 16 describes the militia, but not the one I thought I knew. Predating the constitution, it is We the People that composes the militia. We charged the States with training us (Clause 16) to a discipline prescribed by Congress (Clause 15). The Constitution says WE

can be called to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel invasions. After reading the Militia Act of 1792 and revised

by 1795, it became clear the intention of State Militia is to be trained and ready. Later, reading about its use in the Whiskey Rebellion, George Washington met with his cabinet officials and presented evidence of violence to Supreme Court Justice James Wilson who ruled military response was justified under the Militia Act. Washington assumed emergency powers to assemble 12,000 men from surrounding states as a federal militia. Now read the Second Amendment - A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

The right of the People to keep and bear arms, so WE can act as a militia, is necessary to the security of a free State and shall not be infringed. This amendment is no longer ambiguous. It is straight forward protection of an individual right so we can act as a lawful collective force to execute the Laws of the Union.

This fundamental right, coupled with another institution that predates government, the Grand Jury, is an activating force to combat criminals in our midst. Both of these institutions are recognized in law. The grand jury once summoned by the state is beholden to no one - not a judge, not a prosecutor, not a sheriff. They can receive presentations, investigate, subpoena, and indict unlike career government officials who may fear who they anger. No waiting for an election cycle. Both these institutions can be lawfully introduced at the county level of government (thank you 10th Amendment).



Morris sweeps series with Hubs

ROCHELLE — Junior Braden Alfano threw all seven innings and allowed only four hits, but the Rochelle Hub varsity baseball team was unable to get the bats going Monday evening, when Morris came to town looking to complete a two-game Interstate 8 Conference

The Hubs struggled to find any offense against Redskin starter Matt Lawton, who struck out 14 Rochelle hitters over six innings as Morris defeated the Hubs 4-1. Rochelle fell to 6-7 overall and 3-6 in the Interstate 8 with the loss. Alfano struck out six batters in his complete-game effort on the mound.

"I thought we were in both ball games and Braden did a great job today," head coach Jarrod Reynolds said. "We couldn't get the big hit when we needed it... Our pitching has been pretty good, but we haven't had the run support we've needed and we're going to work on that so we can hopefully score some more runs."

An error from the Hubs led to an RBI single that put Morris ahead 1-0 in the top of the second inning. The Redskins added two runs in the top of the fifth inning, scoring one on an outfield error by Rochelle and another on an RBI infield single.

Senior Spencer Warborg broke the scoreless drought for the Hubs, cracking a solo home run off Lawton to make it a 3-1 game in the bottom of the sixth inning. Morris plated an insurance run in the top of the seventh inning on an RBI groundout. Rochelle put two runners on base in the bottom of the seventh, but a strikeout ended the game.

Rochelle earned one run back in the top of the second inning, scoring on an RBI single from senior Mark Hopkins before juniorAndy Buskohl tied the game at 2-2 with an RBI double to left in the top of the third inning.

Two run-scoring singles put Morris ahead 5-2 in the bottom of the third inning. Both teams went scoreless over the fourth and fifth innings, but the Redskins added two runs on passed balls in the bottom of the sixth inning. Buskohl started on the mound for the Hubs, throwing four innings and striking out three before junior Eric Briseno took over in relief, striking out

Catholic's Marvel Zhang handed Wanner a 6-4, 2-6, 6-10 loss at No. 1 singles.





Porter commits to Beloit College

HROUGHOUT her four years with the Rochelle Township High School track and field team, Lady Hub senior Kiya Porter has grown more confident in her throwing abilities and improved her focus during competitive meets. Porter has ascended to become one of Rochelle's top throwers this season, and she'll be continuing her track and field career with Beloit College next year.

"I chose Beloit College because of the small class sizes and the one-on-one LSAT preparation course," Porter said. "Continuing my athletic career with their track and field program was a bonus. I met the head coach and his biggest priority was giving his athletes the structure to achieve in both academics and athletics... I want to be challenged and pushed to my limits and I believe that competing at the college level will give me the opportunity to be challenged."

A shot put and discus thrower for the Lady Hubs, Porter has achieved new personal records in both field events this season. Porter threw 79 feet 7 inches to take third in the discus competition against Sandwich and Serena, while her 29-foot, 1-and-1/2-inch mark in Rochelle's Senior Night matchup with Rock Falls was enough


for third place. Porter has compiled three second-place finishes and three third-place finishes in the throwing events this season.

"Kiya has really earned the opportunity to blossom this year," Rochelle Lady Hub head coach Alison Vrana said. "We've been stacked in the throwing events over the last few years, so she didn't have many chances to compete, but she's been one of our top point earners this year. It's really great to see what she's given to the program,

especially during her senior season. Porter said she plans to study political science in order to eventually obtain a degree, enter law school and become a public defender. Under the tutelage of Rochelle throwing coach Zach Miller, Porter said she's learned how to not only correct her mistakes in the circle, but help others improve their skills as well. 

Hub dominance continues

Rochelle matmen extend win streak with Polo-North Boone sweep

ROCHELLE — Hub senior Ivan Pineda has worked hard to hone his wrestling techniques over the last four years. A few of those moves showed up during Saturday morning's meet with Polo and North Boone, where the Rochelle lightweight earned two wins and helped lead the Hub varsity wrestling team to resounding victories over both the Marcos and the Vikings.

Rochelle's matmen combined for eight pins against North Boone, dominating the Vikings 60-6 before adding eight more pins in their 58-24 win over Polo. Pineda wrestled at 113 pounds in the North Boone dual, needing only one takedown before pinning Kylan Hughes at the 1:45 mark. Pineda moved up to 120 pounds against Polo, outlasting McKeon Crase with a 16-8 major decision behind three takedowns, two near falls, two

escapes and one reversal. "I feel like we've been wrestling really well, especially since we don't have anybody at a few of our weight classes." Pineda said. "We've done well everywhere else and I think we've all been putting the hard work in and kicking our opponents' butts. My double and my scarf were working well for me today, especially when I had my opponents on the ground. We just need to keep doing what we're doing and we need to make sure we're keeping the right mindset."

Rochelle (9-1) has won seven consecutive duals. The Hubs will host Genoa-Kingston and Rockford East on Wednesday before facing Oregon and Fulton at home on Saturday.

North Boone

Rochelle scored 60 consecutive points to open the dual against the Vikings. Junior Matt Eyster received a forfeit at 160 pounds before senior Ben Harvey took down and pinned Garrett Louis at 182 pounds. Senior Noah Messer and sophomore Jaden Cook immediately followed with pins at 220 pounds and 285 pounds, respectively, with Messer defeating Connor Runnells in the first period and Cook needing only 30


seconds in his victory over Ethan Delgado.

"We're really gotten into a rhythm," Cook said. "We're putting a lot of work in right now. My headlocks and throws have been working well for me. We have a couple of gaps in our roster right now, but if we can fill those gaps, I think we'll have a chance to win the conference title."

After freshman Riley Damask took a forfeit at 106 pounds and Pineda won at 113 pounds, sophomore Josey Weber stepped into the ring for the Hubs, showing dominance against Kole Olsen with a 25-seconds takedown-to-pin at 120 pounds. Sophomore Weldon Nay kept Rochelle's pin streak going at 126 pounds, defeating Joey Brown in only 35 seconds.

With Rochelle leading 48-0, sophomore Wesley Brown scored another Hub pin at 132 pounds, taking down Logan Witte before senior Grant Thompson recorded a second-period pin against Juan Galarza at 138 pounds.

Lady Hubs outlast Oregon for first victory

Rochelle snaps six-match winless streak with 3-1 win over Hawks

OREGON—After six consecutive losses to open the season, Rochelle's Lady Hub varsity soccer team earned its first win on Saturday, defeating the Oregon Hawks 3-1 and improving to 1-6 overall. Junior Lizbeth Milan, sophomore Jasmin Hernandez and freshman Kara Martinez each scored goals in the victory, while freshman Danica Ward recorded six saves.

"I'm really proud of my teammates and how well we communicated," Milan said. "We kept our positive energy throughout the match and we didn't get down on ourselves after they scored the first goal. We talked to each other throughout the match, which is something we haven't done consistently."

Rochelle outshot Oregon 25-9 and the Lady Hubs edged the Hawks 11-8 in shots on goal. Oregon emerged with the early lead, scoring in the 13th minute to earn a 1-0 advantage, which stood at halftime. The Lady Hubs scored all three goals in the second half, with Martinez finding the net in the 48th minute to even the match

Hernandez then broke through the Oregon defense in the 57th minute, scoring to give the Lady Hubs a 2-1 lead and their first advantage of the season. Milan sealed Rochelle's victory in the 80th and final minute, putting the ball into the Oregon net and sealing the highestscoring game of the season for the Lady Hubs.

"It reminds us that we're capable of scoring and winning games," Milan said. "We have to keep pushing through and we have to want to win and score goals. We have to stay motivated to pass and talk with each other."

Sycamore The Rochelle Lady Hub varsity soccer team hosted Sycamore for Interstate 8 Conference play on Monday, falling 10-0 and moving to 1-7 on the season. Rochelle will face Plano on the road Wednesday before hosting Stillman Valley on Friday at 4:15

The Spartans outshot Rochelle 38-2 and held a 22-2 advantage over the Lady Hubs in shots on goal. Sycamore earned four corner kicks in the match, while Rochelle was held without one. Freshman Danica Ward recorded 12 saves in net for

the Lady Hubs in the loss.
