### County no longer has region's highest COVID positivity

Ogle County no longer has the highest COVID-19 positivity rate in Region 1.

Ogle County Health Department Public Administrator Kyle Auman revealed that in his monthly presentation to the Ogle County Board at its May meeting. The county is now at 4.3 percent positivity. On May 6, it was at 8.5 percent. Auman said county bed availability has improved, and 32 percent is the best he's seen in months.

"We're happy to see numbers improving," Auman said.

As of May 18, 35,862 total COVID-19 vaccine doses had been given in Ogle County. 17,102 people are fully-vaccinated, making up 33.58 percent of the population.

The OCHD is doing various vaccination events itself and in conjunction with partners. Auman said his department is working to get more Pfizer does in order to get 12-17-year-olds vaccinated, an age group that recently became eligible for the vaccine.

"We have limited supplies of Pfizer," Auman said. "Handling and storage of that vaccine is more complicated than the others. We want to plan and vaccinate that population."

Auman said the current state restrictions that allow those that are vaccinated to go mask less in some public places. Masks are still required for those that are unvaccinated. Auman said he hopes those rules are followed to keep case counts down.

The state's bridge phase, which took effect May 14, allows some events with gathering to happen. Auman said he hopes numbers continue to improve so the state can enter phase 5 as planned on June 11, which has been referred to in the past as a full reopening.

The OCHD is working with school districts and other organi-

zations such as county employees to implement newer COVID-19 testing procedures with quick turnaround on results.

"These will be great tools along with vaccines to keep COVID-19 out of our schools," Auman said. "We have also been working to keep regular testing moving with our hospital partners."

After calling Ogle County a COVID-19 hot spot and noting residents being less cooperative on May 6, Auman said he was happy to report lower numbers.

"We're really starting to see positive results," Auman said. "A lot of which we believe are due to vaccinations."



# LOCAL NEWS Crop marketing webinar June 16

The Lee, Carroll, Ogle and Whiteside County Farm Bureaus along with COUNTRY Financial will host a virtual crop marketing webinar on the evening of June 16, at the Days Inn, in Rock Falls.

"Managing Crop Price Risks in Uncertain Times" is a two-hour seminar designed specifically for producers to help them manage risk associated with the current low commodity markets and identify market conditions to capture profit margins through this year into next.

Dr. Steve Johnson, Iowa State University Extension Farm Management Specialist, will facilitate the program. Steve has served as the Farm & Ag Business Management Specialist in Central Iowa for Iowa State University Extension and Outreach since 1999.

He specializes in topics related to government farm programs, crop insurance, crop marketing, grain contracts, farmland leasing and other crop risk management strategies. In the past year, he has conducted more than 120 meetings, workshops, seminars and conferences across the Corn Belt with nearly 15,000 in attendance.

Steve uses web sites such as ISU Ag Decision Maker and Polk County Extension Farm Management along with various print and electronic media.

Annually he reaches more than 200,000 producers, landowners and other agribusiness professionals.

During the two hour program producers will examine the following topics:

\* Supply Demand and Crop Price Outlook

\* Marketing Strategies & Tools

\* Implementing Strategies


\* Consider Your Cash Flow Needs

This presentation will assist producers in designing and implementing a marketing plan that is specific to their own operation.

# **Koch receives teaching honor**

CHANA — Therese Koch, Elementary Program teacher at Chana Education Center (CEC), was recently awarded the Illinois Principal Association's Teacher Leadership Award for the Northwest Region.

Chana Education Center is a therapeutic day school program of Ogle County Education Cooperative. Koch was selected out of thirty-five strong and deserving nominations for the region. Koch has over nine years of experience in Special Education, with seven years served at CEC.

During her time at CEC, Koch has proven to be a master of incorporating proactive, positive social-emotional and behavioral supports for students into the everyday school routine and academic curriculum. Her first goal when working with a new student is to ensure that they feel cared about, accepted, and a part of a school family. She is dedicated to ensuring that her classroom is a safe and welcoming place for students of all needs. She teaches and leads with the philosophy that a disconnected child is a discouraged child, and that discouraged children need to feel supported through connection and relationship in order to excel in their academic growth.

Koch has made many area connections with her students in order to grow their sense of community. Students in her room connect with individuals from the Mount Morris Senior Center during monthly events called C.A.S.T. (Children and Seniors Together). Her students join with reading buddies at the Chana Methodist Church to read and share books together. She regularly invites local professionals to come in and visit with students to talk about their roles in the community and their jobs. While COVID-19 has made it a challenge



to provide these connections in-person with her students, Koch has arranged for these opportunities of connection to continue through virtual and other ways.

Koch creates opportunities for students to find that learning often involves taking healthy risks and accepting responsibility when mistakes are made. She differentiates her lessons to hone in on the specific strengths and interests of each student, while still challenging each student to grow in their targeted areas of struggle. She incorporates fun activities and hands-on projects that help her students find the fun in school. Often the elementary students are scavenging the building for a special clue to answer a mystery puzzle, researching ciphers to break secret codes, or building creations to solve a problem.

A statement by one of her students sums it up succinctly. "Sometimes I don't even know I'm learning because I'm having so much fun. Mrs. Koch makes it so we can learn AND have fun at the same time."



Trust in the oldest surviving democracy in the world is at a new low. The Pew Research Center reported last September that only 20 percent of the American public "say they trust the government in Washington to 'do the right thing' just about always or most of the time." That percentage was in the 70's in the late 1950's and early 1960's.

The sources of this loss of faith run beneath personalities and political parties, down into basic institutions. I've written about this problem before, one piece at a time. This time I'll try to put it all together, and do justice to its scope and depth.

It's hard to approach this issue without seeming to be partisan, because the current system helps one of the major political parties more than the other. But everyone's freedom is in danger, as all three branches of the government in Washington drift ever further away from the democratic principles of representation and accountability.

That drift was evident when Republican Presidential candidates lost the popular vote in all but one of 5 elections before the most recent one, but nevertheless occupied the White House for 12 out of 20 years. Similarly, Republican Senatorial candidates haven't collectively won a majority of the popular vote since 1998, according to Ed Kilgore

(nymag.com, 2-25-21), and yet have controlled the Senate during 7 out of 11 sessions.

These disparities result from the extra voting powers allotted to states with small populations, which tend to favor the Republican party, in Presidential and Senatorial elections. They're likely to grow, as people move out of rural states and into more highly populated ones. Political scientist David Birdsell has estimated that, if present trends continue, 70 percent of the people will live in 15 states, but they'll be represented by only 30 out of 100 Senators.

The Senate's detachment from the people intensified in the 1970's, when changes to the filibuster made it extremely easy for a minority to prevent proposed laws from coming to a vote. The Brennan Center for Justice, in a 2012 report, revealed that the number of bills passed by the Senate is now at the lowest level since at least World War II. This minority stranglehold on most law-making leaves voters unable to hold their own Senators accountable when campaign promises fail to produce laws.

The disconnection between government and governed reaches even into our courts. Five of nine sitting Supreme Court Justices were appointed by Presidents who entered office after losing the popular vote, and then were confirmed by an equally unrepresentative Senate. The resulting conservative majority will deeply affect American politics for many years into and beyond future elections.

Supporters of the minority's perquisites in the Presidency, Senate, and courts insist that the rights of the majority are protected in the House of Representatives, which is elected by popular vote. Unfortunately, skillful and energetic gerrymandering at the state level has left the majority at a disadvantage there too.

It produced a bonus of 59 seats on average for Republicans in the House during the three sessions from 2013 to 2019, according to a report from the Center for American Progress last May. Republicans need to gain only a handful of seats to take control of the House with a minority of the popular vote in the next election. Gerrymandering is by nature self-perpetuating, so this advantage is likely to last well into the future.

Defenders of unequal representation insist that it protects us from the tyranny of the majority. Evidence that it actually accomplishes that purpose is hard to find. Equally questionable is the implication that majorities are more prone than minorities are to tyranny.

The government's lack of accountability to the people is further intensified in our primary elections. Jonathan Rauch and Ray la Raja, in the December 2019 Atlantic, describe a system in which politicians win nominations while earning fewer than half the votes. Mainstream voters in the following general election then find themselves with no choice that represents their true beliefs.

These fixtures are deeply entrenched in our politics and difficult to reform. We've risen to such challenges in the past: abolishing slavery, granting the vote to women, and expanding civil rights beyond anything that could have been foreseen when our nation was founded. The alternative is a government that grows less and less democratic until, perhaps, it isn't a democracy at all.






