mation and send you a new Voter ID," Cook explained. "If there is a forwarding address on the returned card that is out of our jurisdiction, we will also send an R-26 to your new address. Please fill out your new address and return the R-26 to us or register in your new jurisdiction and that jurisdiction will notify and we will cancel your voter registration in our system.

Cook added that individuals in the system who do not reply to the R-26, do not update their address within our jurisdiction, and do not vote for two General Elections, will be inactive in the Ogle County system. After 30 days, voters whose cards have been returned to us will be inactivated. Inactive status requires the voter to re-register to vote. Voters need to be correctly registered so they are placed in the correct voting districts and voting precincts.

The County Clerk's Office mailed new voter registration cards to every registered voter in Ogle County the week of May 17.

"Once you receive your new voter registration card, please review the printed information for accuracy," Cook urged. "If you are registered and do not receive a card or if you notice a discrepancy, please call the office at 815-732-1110."

#### Obituaries Lloyd Funk


**BYRON** – Lloyd C. Funk, age 96, died peacefully on Friday, May 14, 2021 at the Morning Star Village in Rockford, IL.

### Free summer lunches for kids 1 to 18

**MT. MORRIS** — All children aged one to 18 years in the greater Mt. Morris area are eligible for free boxed lunches every weekday this summer, beginning June 1.

There are two distributions sites in Mt. Morris: Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, 308 E. Brayton Road, and Kids Club/Lot 12 at Hauck Home Mobile Park. Both organizations are partnering with the Northern Illinois Food Bank (NIFB), which will provide the meals. Due to COVID concerns, they will be "grab and go" boxed meals.

Trinity will distribute the free meals Monday through Friday, 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., June 1 until school starts in the fall. You don't need to pre-register or give your name. Volunteers will hand out boxed breakfasts and lunches to anyone who walks, drives or bikes up Trinity's circle driveway on Ogle Street. Monthly menus will be posted outside the church, on Trinity's website at www.trinitymmil. net and their Facebook page at www. facebook.com/tlcmm. This is the eighth year that Trinity has partnered with the Northern Illinois Food Bank to offer the Summer Lunch Program. Kids Club/Lot 12 will distribute the same meals Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from noon to 1 p.m., June 2 through August 12. They are asking people to sign up for meals in order to estimate the number needed each day. Lot 12 Summer Kids and Mentoring Program became a supplemental food program in 2020 due to the pandemic. This year they will once again offer reading, craft and outdoor activities, but are partnering with the Northern Illinois Food Bank to offer free meals.

Program was developed in 2009 to help children in the Hauck Home Mobile Park retain knowledge and skills learned in school during the summer break. It has grown into a year-round program of activities and support that serves all young people and families in the park. Although coordinated by the Disciples United Methodist Church, it is not religion-based and welcomes all volunteers, children and families to the Kids Club/ Lot 12 clan. For more information please drop by the Lot 12 mobile home when open, or drop a note in their mail box.

Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church is celebrating its 175th anniversary in 2021. Their mission, "Believing in Christ, we are called to grow and sent to serve," is lived through local and global service projects that run the gamut from creating health kits and guilts for world relief programs to providing free pajamas to area families at Christmas. ### **DRIVE TIME** How to protect your car from sun damage

People know to protect their skin and eyes from the sun. Sun exposure can be dangerous for the body, but the sun's rays also can damage automobiles.

Leaving a vehicle exposed to sunlight for extended periods of time increases the risk of damage to its interior and exterior. It's important that car and truck owners recognize this so they can mitigate the potential problems sun and heat may cause. Testing conducted at the State Farm<sup>®</sup> Vehicle Research Facility found interior vehicle air temperatures have been recorded well in excess of 145 F. Interior surfaces exposed to direct sunlight have been recorded at temperatures in excess of 195 F.

The automotive repair service Fix Auto says the sun's ultraviolet rays can cause the vehicle's paint to peel and fade over time. UV rays break down the molecules in the paint and make it appear dull. The company says red paint is particularly susceptible because red paint mole-



cules deteriorate faster in the sun than other paint colors.

To prevent potential sun-related damage, take these precautions.

• Avoid direct sunlight. Park in the shade as much as possible.

 Crack a window. If it is safe to do so, lower interior air temperature and equalize air pressure by opening up car windows a little.

• Use a windshield protector. Reflect sunlight away and keep the vehicle cool with a windshield sun protector that unfolds and slides into place.

• Use a protectant wax. A layer of wax can offer another layer of protection against the sun's ultraviolet rays.

• Wash the car frequently. Washing and hand-drying the vehicle helps to remove dirt and other debris which can cause micro-scratches in the paint.

• Install seat covers. Seat covers can protect

leather and fabric upholstery. A leather conditioner can help prevent cracks and tears from sunlight and heat.

These easy steps are simple preventative measures that protect vehicles against sun damage.

# **DRIVE TIME** What noisy brakes may be telling you

**HE** only noises many drivers ever want to hear coming from their vehicles are the sounds of their favorite songs blasting from their car stereos. But cars sometimes make noises that aren't nearly as inviting as music.

Noises that seem to pop up when applying the brakes can be especially scary for motorists. No one wants to drive a vehicle with faltering or suspect brakes, so learning to distinguish between the two most common brake noises can be a wise move for drivers.

#### Grinding brakes

The automotive retailer Pep Boys® notes that grinding noises indicate a serious problem with the braking system. According to CarsDirect.com, there are two major causes

behind the grinding noise made by brakes. If the grinding sound is audible when pressing on the brake pedal, this likely because the rotor disc is coming into contact with part of the caliper. This typically occurs because the brake pads or rotors are extremely worn down, causing the steel backing of the worn out pad to grind against the rotor.

In such instances, Pep Boys<sup>®</sup> recommends replacing the brake pads immediately.

If the grinding noise is audible while the vehicle is in motion, debris might be stuck inside the brakes. Drivers might be able to dislodge this debris by repeatedly moving their cars forward and backward in a safe place, such as a driveway. If that does not work, have the brakes serviced by a qualified mechanic.



#### Squealing

Many drivers are familiar with the high-pitched squealing sound that comes from

their vehicles or those of fellow motorists. That squeal, while certainly not music to the ears, might be a good

thing. That's because Pep Boys<sup>®</sup> notes that some brake pads are equipped with small steel clips that serve as

wear indicators. When brake pads have worn down, these devices produce a squealing sound to let drivers know it's time to get new brake pads.

But squealing can be indicative of other things as well. Squealing noises are sometimes heard immediately after brake pads or rotors have been replaced. In such instances, the noise typically subsides within a day or two once the pads have been broken

Glazed pads also can create a squealing sound. When calipers stick, the brakes stay partially applied, producing excessive friction or heat. The heat causes the brake pads to glaze.
