For the next three years, dues will be collected for membership in the IHSA. 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

OSF HealthCare unveils new vaccination scheduling tool

♦ Eligible patients can now self-schedule COVID- 19 vaccine appointments

MENDOTA - OSF HealthCare believes vaccinations against COVID-19 are our best shot to help end the pandemic. Because easy access to vaccines is imperative, they have announced that anyone age 16 and older can now self-schedule a COVID-19 vaccination on their website.

Those eligible can go to osfhealthcare.org/vaccine to schedule an appointment. After signing up, a confirmation code is generated, and an email or text with a unique link to schedule an appointment soon follows.

The day of vaccination, minors (age 16 and 17) must be accompanied by an adult (18 years or older). Written or verbal consent from a parent or guardian is necessary if they're unable to accompany the minor to the vaccine visit. Any consent forms needed prior to the appointment are available for download at osfhealthcare.org/vaccine.

Additional information

- 16 and 17 years olds can only schedule the Pfizer vaccine because it's the only vaccine the U.S. Food & Drug Administration has approved for people in that age group
- · Schedule your vaccination at least 14 days after receiving any other vaccination.
- · Schedule your vaccination at least 90 days after receiving any monoclonal antibodies (BAM IV infusion) or convalescent plasma as part of treatment for COVID-19.
- For the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, you need to be

available to receive a second dose in 21 and 28 days, respectively, following your first dose.

OSF embraces the opportunity to vaccinate their patients and communities. Still, they must rely on the vaccine rollout plan from local health departments, which determine how many vaccine doses OSF receives. Delays in vaccine shipments to local health departments may require OSF to reschedule vaccine clinic appointments due to a lack of inventory.

While the COVID-19 vaccine is free, health care providers are allowed to charge an administrative fee which helps cover costs associated with things such as wages for the health care workers who are giving

the shots and documenting patient information, and for storing and transporting the vaccine for use at vaccination clinics.

Sublette Board denies request for self-storage facility

SUBLETTE — Following the recommendation from the Sublette Planning Commission, the Sublette Village Board denied a zoning request for a special use permit to build a self-storage facility north of the village.

The Sublette Village Board met on April 12 in the Ellice Dinges Center. All members were present except Jeff Myers

Tim Hayden, a real estate broker from Rochelle, and owner of five self-storage facilities in northern Illinois, approached the board about requesting a special use permit to rezone from AG1, for the northeast corner of U.S. Route 52 and Green Wing Road.

The area of the special use permit is not in the village limits, but within the one-mile radius of the village.

Hayden told the board the self-storage facilities are low traffic use. He added that the facility would be gated and each tenant would have its own code to access the facility. This facility, he continued, would not be a 24-hour facility. Tenants would only have access to the facility during business hours. He said this facility would have a full-time maintenance person who goes around

PRINCETON - Learning Stage, the Education Committee of the Princeton Theatre Group, has Ameri-Corps positions open for the summer 2021 season. The successful applicants will be on site from June 1 through July 28. AmeriCorps Volunteers volunteer 300 hours and receive approximately \$3,000 separated into a living stipend and a college tuition waver. While anyone may apply, these AmeriCorps positions offer theater arts majors a way to build their resumes.

Camp 56 will be the primary responsibility for one volunteer, with another volunteer providing limited support. Camp responsibilities include programming, supervision of campers ages 8-18, paperwork, and communicating with parents and Festival 56 staff, another position will be dedicated to COVID-19 compliance, while still another will be primarily box office duties.

Additionally, volunteers will be responsible for multiple educational platforms. 



Summer School

The board approved moving ahead with plans for summer school at MHS. Aughenbaugh said they hope to offer Credit Retrieval, Summer Bridges for incoming freshmen, Driver Education, and Dual Credit Summer Speech with IVCC. Once final plans are announced in early May, students will be able to sign Graduation

The last day of school for seniors will be Friday, May 21 and graduation for the Class of 2021 is scheduled for Saturday, May 29. Further details on graduation will be announced later.

Commendations Aughenbaugh introduced MHS senior Jack Beetz, who is the State FFA Proficiency winner in Diversified Crop Production-Placement. Beetz was previously chosen as the Chapter, Section 7 and District 2 winner, which enabled him to advance to state. He is now eligible to compete in the National FFA Awards Selection process in July. "We are extremely proud of Jack and how he represented MHS," Aughenbaugh said.

Aughenbaugh congratulated 13 MHS students who have been named as Illinois State Scholars. They include Amanda Barrett, Amellia Bromenschenkel, Daisy Contreras, Mary DeFore, Samuel Lawrence, Grace Leifheit, Lily Linden, Twila Martinson, Ella Massey, Madi Mikolasek, Jenna O'Donnell, Madison Pappas and Rosevelia Rocha.

Illinois State Scholars are recognized for academic achievement based on their sixth semester class rank and their SAT exams.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Superintendent Jeff Pru-

sator said MHS expects to receive almost \$1.5 million in payments from the federal government due to loss of learning during the pandemic. The funds, which will be issued in three payments, are to be used in ways that best help all students make up for the learning loss they experienced. Although there is flexibility in how most of the money is used, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) has suggested ideas for the best use of the money.

Prusator said MHS currently has a committee meeting to discuss ideas for use of the money and their recommendations will be presented to the board. "All students had learning loss and there are a lot of different variables to impact the largest number of kids," he said. "The main thing they suggest is that schools avoid hiring additional staff because these funds are temporary revenue. But we do have quite a bit of flexibility with most of the money."

Prusator also noted that he welcomes input from parents and community members on how to best use the funds. School Fees

The board approved waiving fees for the coming school year. After the issue was tabled last month, Prusator said he looked at the numbers and found that MHS would receive a total of about \$50,000 in student fees. He explained that with the extra money coming from the federal government, the high school does not really need the money from fees at this time and it would be more helpful to families if it were waived for another year. **OTHER ITEMS**

- The board approved letting bus bids for two new school busses.
- Approval was given to move forward with a Three Circles Agriculture Grant that would provide 50 percent of the cost of hiring ag teacher Matt Meyer as a 12-month employee. This means he would work an extra 400 hours, not that he would be at school 12 months of the year, Prusator explained. MHS would be responsible for \$6,200 of the cost for the extra hours.
- A special board meeting to seat newly-elected board members and elect board officers will take place at the high school on Thursday, April 29 at 6 p.m.

The next regular board of education meeting will be held at the high school on Monday, May 17 at 6 p.m.

State sued over veteran's COVID-19 death at LaSalle Veterans' Home May 2017, according to the Nov. 12 by the Illinois Dedirector since Chapa La-

SPRINGFIELD — A wrongful death lawsuit on behalf of a Korean War veteran who contracted COVID-19 at the LaSalle Veterans' Home accuses the facility of negligent care that violated state law. Richard John Cieski Sr.

was one of 36 veterans who died last year during the COVID-19 outbreak at the LaSalle home that began in November. Lawyers for Cieski's es-

tate said this legal action is the first civil lawsuit seeking to hold the state, the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs and the LaSalle facility responsible for a COVID-19 related death at the state-run veterans home.

His estate seeks a \$2 million judgment for the alleged negligence that his lawyers argue violated state law and caused Cieski's death.

In a statement, a spokesperson for IDVA said, "We are deeply saddened by the deaths of our residents due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and our hearts are with their families. Unfortunately, we cannot comment further due to pending litigation."

Cieski died Nov. 15, at age 90, with COVID-19-related pneumonia listed as his cause of death, the lawsuit states. He has been living at the LaSalle facility since The lawsuit argues that

the facility was negligent in its medical care and treatment of Cieski in violation of the state Nursing Home Care Act. It claims that the LaSal-

le facility did not provide health care services consistent with guidance issued by the state and federal health authorities, did not adequately supply or properly use personal protective equipment, and did not take the necessary steps to provide medical care to patients with COVID-19 or to prevent further transmission of the virus. The lawsuit comes after a

joint report issued last month from two state agencies and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs that found all four of the state-run veterans homes lacked standardized infection prevention policies.

In addition to the outbreak at LaSalle, the veterans homes at Quincy and Manteno also experienced coronavirus outbreaks since the pandemic began that resulted in 27 and 19 resident deaths, respectively. The home in Anna has not reported any resident deaths resulting from COVID-19 related illnesses.

The joint report was commissioned after the first on-site visit to LaSalle on partment of Public Health, IDVA and the USDVA in response to the ongoing COVID-19 outbreak there. The initial report from the

Nov. 12 on-site visit documented multiple violations of COVID-19 protocols — including inappropriate uses of personal protective equipment, violations of social distancing requirements and the use of less effective non-alcohol-based hand The coronavirus outbreak

at LaSalle has prompted an independent investigation by the acting inspector general of the state Department of Human Services, as well as an investigation by the House Civil Judiciary Committee. The LaSalle home ad-

ministrator, Angela Mehlbrech, was fired in the aftermath of the outbreak. Last month, Gov. JB

Pritzker appointed Terry Prince, a 31-year U.S. Navy veteran, as the new IDVA director.

Prince will serve as acting director pending a confirmation vote of the state Senate. He replaces former director Linda Chapa LaVia, who resigned in January following calls for her to step down due to the department's handling of the outbreak at LaSalle. Peter Nezamis has been interim

Via's January resignation. Cieski's estate is represented by attorneys with

Levin & Perconti, a Chica-

go-based law firm known for representing victims in nursing home abuse and neglect cases. Levin & Perconti partner Michael Bonamarte said in a statement that Cieski's death

could have been avoided had LaSalle taken appropriate precautions. "After seeing what was happening with outbreaks at facilities nationwide,

LaSalle Veterans' Home had plenty of time to order enough PPE and properly staff the home to care for the residents," Bonamarte said in the statement. Margaret Battersby

Black, also a Levin & Perconti partner, said the lawsuit is about holding state officials accountable and ensuring that it never happens again.

'There were standards in place that should have been followed and practices that could have been enforced. An appropriately fast and comprehensive response to potential staff exposure to the virus could have saved lives, but, instead, the outbreak spread for 12 days before anyone from the state of Illinois even arrived to investigate it," Black said in a statement

Qualified immunity

SPRINGFIELD – State Rep. Curtis Tarver is a man on a mission to reform Illinois law enforcement by eliminating a special legal protection given cops.

The Chicago Democrat's Bad Apples in Law Enforcement Accountability Act passed out of committee three weeks ago and awaits a vote in the House.

The measure aims to remove the court doctrine of qualified immunity for officers, which would open them up to civil litigation if they participate in the "deprivation of any individual rights" guaranteed in the Illinois Constitution.

The top priority of Illinois law enforcement groups is to defeat this measure said Ed Wojcicki, executive director at the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police.

Such opposition makes passage of the measure far from certain. Tarver added some of his counterparts in the legislature fail to see the urgency of the reform.

"Many of my colleagues will never have to be a black male worried about whether a traffic stop becomes the end of their life. That said, some do see the immediacy of the problem. Even though they may not experience this themselves, they recognize the problem," he said. Last year, Tarver, who is Black, was pulled over

during a routine traffic stop. A Chicago cop asked if he had a gun with him. He said he did – along with a conceal carry permit.

Tarver ended up handcuffed, held for seven hours

and not allowed to call his attorney. It took nine months for the charges against him to be dropped.

If police officers would treat a person who is a lawyer

killed than whites.

It is rare for police officers to face criminal charges even when they inappropriately use deadly force.

And qualified immunity makes it difficult to sue police officers even when they have violated a person's constitutional rights, said Joanna Schwartz, a University of California – Los Angeles law professor.

"Qualified immunity as the Supreme court has created it over the years is a really nonsensical and unjust defense," she said. "It protects officers from being found liable in cases so long as, as the case law from the courts is not clearly established. What that means in practice is that there has to be a prior court decision with virtually identical facts in order for a plaintiff to get past the qualified immunity defense."

For example, in a 2014 Nashville, Tenn., case police officers sicced a dog on a man sitting on the ground with his hands up. He sued for excessive force after being bitten. His lawyers cited a similar case in which a court had ruled against law enforcement after police had ordered a dog to attack a man lying on the ground.

But a Tennessee judge ruled qualified immunity protected the officers in the more recent case because in the earlier case the person was lying down and in the more recent case the man was sitting.

This sort of bogus, protect police officers at all costs, thinking leaves some believing they can get away with murder.

Look no further than what has been in the news this past week.

A former Minneapolis police officer is on trial for the murder of George Floyd after kneeling on his neck for about nine minutes. Another Black Minnesotan was killed during a routine traffic stop after a cop apparently confused her pistol and taser. And a newly released video showed a Black Army officer being needlessly tear gassed by two Virginia police officers.

Tarver said by eliminating the qualified immunity defense, municipalities will be more selective in who they hire, less likely to succumb to union pressure when greater job protections are demanded and more likely to fire bad cops.

Last year, Colorado eliminated qualified immunity for police officers. Last month, the New York City Council voted to eliminate the special protection for cops. And earlier this month New Mexico ended qualified immunity for all government workers.

These are steps in the right direction. We need greater accountability in law enforcement.

Schwartz said the biggest misconception about eliminating qualified immunity is that it leaves individual police officers vulnerable to being bankrupt by lawsuits. She noted that in more than 99 percent of cases that she has studied in which qualified immunity was found not to apply, the municipality employing the officer paid the judgement, not the officer.

In the handful of cases in which individual officers were found liable, the average judgement was only \$2,000, she said.

It's time for Illinois lawmakers to protect its most vulnerable citizens by holding in check those who would misuse their authority.

Hard roads a priority for farmers – 1925

Backtracks

There was reason to be optimistic about road-building in the spring of 1925. Among farmers, 'cement roads' were the principal topic of conversation.

Where will the roads go?
Will they build a road this

The Reporter expressed the hope that some of the paved stretches would be

done soon—"while people are driving."

There had been a setback when a bridge west of Mendota had been completed and then had to be blown out and replaced. The subcontractor in charge had not been informed that an agreement had been reached with a landowner to make the bridge wide enough for a cattle runway. The unsatisfactory bridge was four feet wide; its replacement was six feet wide.

The Reporter admonished farmers who were "holding out" and thus "standing in their own light." The advantages of the hard road for all were too obvious.

It is asset to any community to have a cement road run through it.

On Sunday, April 12, 1925, Kakusha Park on the northwest edge of Mendota opened for its second season. Music by Dart's Troubadors demonstrated "more pep and ginger than ever before." There was a new dance floor for the new season and a crowd of 2,000 was on hand.

The annual city cleanup was scheduled to begin April 20. Citizens were requested to put their rubbish in alleys or in locations convenient for city employees to load it into wagons. There were some restrictions.

We will not haul brickbats or the like.

In a city election on April 21, 1925, Ralph Madden was elected mayor for a second term and Carl Yost, whose ice cream parlor had been destroyed by fire the previous year, was first elected city clerk, an office to which he was re-elected many times.

There was a small ballot on which to vote for a tiny tax to finance improvements in the city parks – the so-called

City Park downtown and Blackstone Park on the east side. Although it passed in every ward, it failed by 26 votes in the total count of 810 in favor, 836 opposed.

George Boisdorf, an ardent supporter of MTHS football and basketball teams, hosted a "dancing party" for members of the 1924-25 teams in the Knights of Columbus club rooms on April 16, 1925 from 8:30-10:30 p.m. Eddie Bieser's seven-piece orchestra provided music. The room was decorated in purple and white streamers, the school colors. (Gold must have replaced white at a later time.) About 30 attended.

They declared George a "capital entertainer."

A large auto bus carrying young ladies from Eureka College stopped to "take oil" at the Central Oil Co. in Mendota. It resembled a small street car and attracted much attention as it drove through our streets.

A few years later, future president, Ronald Reagan, enrolled at Eureka and graduated there.

Leroy Stremlau, brother of Joseph Stremlau, was building a radio station in Hummer's furniture store in LaSalle. On April 16, 1925, a heavy wind destroyed much of the wiring, but repairs were made in time for the May 5 opening of LaSalle Radio WJBC. Leroy Stremlau was the announcer and was referred to as "the 17-year-old radio wizard of the Illinois Valley."

Black Bros. bought machinery owned by Winnebago Tractor Co. at a receiver's sale and moved it to Mendota from Dixon, where the Rockford company had briefly relocated. It was believed this machinery could eventually double production of the woodworking equipment manufactured by Black Bros.

In its first interschool debate, Princeton affirmative met Mendota negative in Mendota on April 10, 1925. On the same day, Mendota affirmative met Princeton negative in Princeton. S.S. Knapp coached the Mendota teams. Sadly, the topic for debate was not reported. It developed that in each case, the teams supporting the negative were winners. In Mendota, the team included Webster Gilman, Arthur Bush and Perry Lewis. The Mendota affirmative team was composed of Robert Allen, William Wenninger and Robert Gardner.

The building in which Inderrieden would be canning sweet corn in 1925 was nearing completion in April Farmers who had signed up to raise the corn were picking up their seed.

Showing at The Strand of April 19-20, 75 years ago, was Rin Tin Tin in "The Lighthouse by the Sea." Described as a "peerless fighting dog," Rin Tin Tin guarded those he loved. In this film, he "snarled, bit, lunged and won."

Miss Whitford and her domestic science class at MTHS were escorted through the Federal Bakery on April 21, shortly after 8 a.m. The bakers were at work and the girls had a chance to see the large oven baking the bread. The owner of Federal Bakery, Mr. Splon, invited the class to be seated and served than a "dainty lunch."

George "Chuch" Elsesser was trying to organize a local baseball team to compete with teams in nearby towns. It was uncertain if a Mendota team would be able to use the fairgrounds and it was speculated that Kakusha Park management might be willing to lay out a diamond on the Kakusha grounds. A few locals who had indicated interest in playing were Richard Stenger, William Neilson, Herman Kutter Jr., Norval and Ralph Truckenbrod, Oren Dewhart, C. Middleton and Leroy Marquardt.

They hoped to get Bernie Coss to manage the team. However, he was later quoted as saying he thought the high school should have a team represent the town.

According to Stengel, the Russians had mounted "an unprecedented attack against the very foundation of our democracy."

The Russians were amateurs, though. If they really knew what they were doing, they'd spread rank lies about election reforms passed by an American state, make the deceptions so pervasive that the president of the United States would casually repeat them, unjustifiably dredge up memories of a terrible period of repression in America, relentlessly racialize the debate, and intimidate corporate America into thoughtlessly entering the partisan fight and discrediting itself with a significant segment of the population.

No, Russian trolls operating somewhere in St. Petersburg didn't undertake this highly successful information operation against the Georgia election law -- Stacey Abrams and her allies in media and politics did.

If the Russians had the requisite skill, they'd spread the

false story that a talented American governor had sold out his citizens by letting a campaign contribution distort his distribution of COVID-19 vaccines, suppressing all facts to the contrary and stoking yet more conspiratorial thinking about the governor among his political opponents.

The Russians couldn't pull this off -- yet "60 Minutes" did, in a laughably dishonest report about Florida Gov. Ron

DeSantis using the most popular grocery store chain in the state to get the vaccine in the arms of Floridians.

If the Russians were devious enough, they'd take a god-awful mass shooting, ignore all of the evidence about the perpetrator's motives to define it as a crime driven by racial hatred, and undermine faith in the local police and FBI when they presented the facts.

The Russians couldn't manage this, either -- but a veritable army of media commentators and progressive politicians could. They insisted against the available evidence that the Atlanta spa shooter must have been driven by hatred of Asians, while Democratic senators openly dissented from the FBI director's statement that the shooting wasn't a hate crime.

If the Russians had the power or know-how, they'd spin a story of American law enforcement as a racist occupying force that should be resisted in "largely peaceful" protests all over the country, putting the cops on their back foot and creating an environment of spiraling disorder and violence in some of the most iconic U.S. cities.

Of course, the Russians also had nothing to do with this -- Black Lives Matter and the media did all of the hard work and have largely managed to ignore the rising tide of crime that is undoing one of the signal America domestic accomplishments of the past several decades.

None of this is to dismiss the pernicious influence of Russian information operations and cyber strikes, especially overseas, or to minimize the hideousness of the Putin regime. But it is galling to see the same people who sounded the klaxons about Russians undermining faith in the American system for years themselves spread -- or at least casually accept -- progressive narratives based on poisonous lies about our own country.

The Russians are never going to stop running their information campaigns against the West, which date back to the Soviet Union. But they must occasionally be tempted to stand back in envy and awe at all that the U.S. promoters of woke narratives have been able to accomplish without them.

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First lady Biden discusses higher education investments in visit to Dixon

☐ Touts benefits to higher ed institutions from federal pandemic relief funding

SPRINGFIELD—First lady Jill Biden and U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona visited Sauk Valley Community College in Dixon on April 19 to discuss how the American Rescue Plan will support higher education

After touring the facility, Cardona and the first lady announced President Joe Biden's investment in higher education through the American Rescue Plan, the latest federal COVID-19 pandemic relief package, which includes \$40 billion for higher education infrastructure projects and programs to make education more accessible.

Gov. JB Pritzker was also in attendance for the visit, along with other Illinois lawmakers, but did not speak publicly.

As a professor at Northern Virginia Community College, Biden is a longtime advocate for education, especially community college

During her husband's former vice presidency, Biden was appointed by President Barack Obama as honorary chair of the College Promise program, a national initiative to make two-year community college education free.

"What starts in one community college classroom can create a chain effect that is eventually felt by every single American," Jill Biden said.

She announced at the news conference that Sauk Valley Community College will be launching its own College Promise program. Although the program was

established six years ago, President Biden intends to build on this initiative to make higher education more attainable, according to the first lady.

"(President Biden) is ready for big ideas and bold action, so that all Americans can go to community college and have the support they need to finish and get good jobs," Jill Biden said. "Together we are going to get this done because community colleges are our future."

Cardona said the pandemic has had a significant impact on community college attendance, citing a 10 percent decline in community college enrollment this year.

"Most (community college) students are part-time students, part-time workers, parents, caregivers and displaced workers," Cardona said. "Community college plays such a critical role in addressing equity, and making sure that gaps, exacerbated by the pandemic,

In Illinois, 19 higher education institutions will benefit from the American Rescue Plan funding, including Illinois State University, the University of Illinois System, Illinois Valley Community College and Illinois Eastern Community Colleges, to name a few.

The eligible institutions will be required to spend at least half of these allocated funds to provide direct relief grants to students to cover an array of student costs of attendance, such as housing, food and technology expenses, among other needs.

Similar to funding from previous federal relief packages, remaining funds can also be used by the institutions to cover lost revenue, technology costs due to remote learning, faculty and staff training, or payroll.

The National Education Association released a fact sheet that outlines the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund included in the American Rescue Plan, which found that about 7.5 percent, or nearly \$3 billion of the \$40 billion in grants will be specifically dedicated to historically Black colleges and universities, tribal colleges and universities, minority-serving institutions and other under-resourced institutions.

Approximately \$36 billion will go to 3,500 public and private, nonprofit colleges and universities, and around \$395.8 million will be allocated for 1,630 for-profit institutions, according to the American Council on Education.

"My husband, our pres-

ident, understands...if we want our communities to thrive, if we want our businesses to have more skilled workers that they need, if we want to prepare our economy for the future, there is no greater investment that we can make than in education," Biden said.

Cardona also noted an infrastructure proposal backed by the president would invest in community college facilities, and the discretionary budget proposed by the president "increases the maximum Pell Grant by \$400, the largest since 2009."



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
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

FOID, concealed carry permits extended again by Illinois State Police By PETER HANCOCK Capitol News Illinois

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois State Police has given another 150-day extension to people whose Firearms Owners Identification cards or Concealed Carry Licenses have expired due to a backlog in processing renewal applications.

A panel of state lawmakers gave approval last week to that emergency rule after ISP officials assured them that the agency had made significant progress toward clearing a backlog of renewal applications.

"I wouldn't say we're over the hump. We're on top of it," ISP Lt. Greg Hacker, who heads the agency's Firearms Services Bureau, told the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. "Over the past three months, our metrics have shown us that we are starting to bend the curve in our direction."

Under the emergency rule, a FOID card or CCL that has expired since the start of the pandemic is still considered valid as long as the holder has applied for renewal, paid the required fees, and the card is not subject to revocation, meaning the person has not committed an offense that would otherwise disqualify them from holding the permit.

Yvette Loizon, ISP's general counsel, said that in the month of March alone, the agency received 14,847

renewal applications, and it approved 67,847 applications, the largest number of approvals in a single month in more than a year.

ISP saw a huge increase in renewal applications last year, Hacker said, in part because FOID cards are issued on 10-year renewal cycles and the 2019-2020 period marked the end of the program's first 10-year cycle.

But the program has been beset by funding and personnel shortages, officials have said. The application and renewal process involves extensive criminal background checks that are paid for with the fees paid by applicants. But that fee fund was often "swept" during the state's two-year-long budget impasse, so the agency did not have enough staff to handle the flood of renewal applications that came in last year.

Hacker said ISP began 2020 with only 21 "firearms eligibility analysts," or FEAs, who are trained to process applications. Since then, he said, the agency has hired an additional 29 FEAs and it plans to hire another five or six by July. In addition, ISP has hired another 25 contractual employees to conduct background checks for both new and renewal applications.

But Hacker said it has been a slow process to get all of those new employees fully operational because the training process generally takes about six months.

the applicants' constitutional right to bear arms. That case is still pending, according to court documents.

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Distracted Driving

Illinois law prohibits the use of handheld cellphones, texting or using other electronic communications while operating a motor vehicle. Hands-free devices or Bluetooth technology is allowed for persons age 19 and older.

Illinois law prohibits the use of headsets while driving. Headsets are defined as any device, other than a hearing aid, that allows a person to hear or receive electronic communications. The use of a single-sided headset or earpiece with a wireless/cellphone device is permitted while driving. Motorcycle, motor-driven cycle and moped operators may use intercom helmets, which permit a driver and/or passengers to speak to one another.

Using hands-free technology such as a headset or voice activated controls is considered a distraction while driving and can be dangerous. If a driver must make a phone call, even with hands-free technology, it is recommended the driver pull off to the side of the road before making the call. Using a cellphone while holding the device and utilizing the speaker phone is not considered hands free and is a violation of Illinois law.

The only time an Illinois driver can use a cellphone that is not hands free is:

- To report an emergency situation.
- While parked on the shoulder of a roadway.
- While stopped due to normal traffic being obstructed and the vehicle is in neutral or park.

Scott's Law, the Move Over Law

Scott's Law, named after Lieutenant Scott Gillen of the Chicago Fire Department who was struck and killed while assisting at a crash on the Dan Ryan Expressway, requires that, when approaching any emergency vehicle stopped along the roadway (including construction vehicles and equipment), you must reduce your speed, change lanes if possible, and proceed with caution.

Safety Belt Law, Child Passenger Protection Act

Safety belts save thousands of lives each year. Illinois law requires all drivers and passengers to buckle up, regardless of where they sit in a vehicle.

The Child Passenger Protection Act requires all children under age 8 be properly secured in an appropriate child safety restraint system. This includes the use of booster seats, which must only be used with a lap/shoulder safety belt. If the back seat of the vehicle is not equipped with lap/shoulder type safety belts, a child weighing more than 40 pounds may be transported in the back seat without a booster seat, secured with a lap belt only. Effective January 1, 2019, Illinois law requires children to be properly secured in a rear-facing child restraint system until age 2 unless they weigh more than 40 pounds or are more than 40 inches tall.

Don't Drink and Drive

Alcohol is a factor in nearly half of all fatal motor vehicle crashes. If you plan to drink, designate a driver who won't drink.

Avoid impaired drivers. If you notice a vehicle straddling the center line, weaving, making wide turns, stopping abruptly or responding slowly to traffic signals, the driver may be impaired. Steer clear of the vehicle by pulling off the side of the road or exiting at the nearest intersection or exit. If it appears that an oncoming vehicle is crossing into your lane, pull over, sound your horn and flash your lights. If you encounter a suspected impaired driver, safely pull off to the side of the road and contact police immediately.

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

Q: What can you tell us about Tyrus on "The Greg Gutfeld Show" on Fox? Did he play pro

towering 6-foot-8 Tyrus was born George Murdoch. He was a big star with wrestling's WWE when he went by the names Brodus Clay and The Funkasaurus. After departing the WWE, he joined Total Nonstop Action Wrestling as Tyrus, the moniker he went by as a contributor on Fox News' "The Greg Gutfeld Show."

Murdoch didn't play professional football, but he did play as an offensive lineman for the University of Nebraska at Kearney, where he majored in education. His dreams of going to the NFL ended when his appendix ruptured and some nerve endings were reportedly severed during the surgery, resulting in a limp in his gait. His first brush with fame, though, was as Snoop Dogg's bodyguard.

If you're wondering what happened to "The Greg Gutfeld Show" on Saturday nights, it's now airing weeknights and is simply called "Gutfeld!" Tyrus, along with Katherine "Kat" Timpf and Tom Shillue, are among the on-camera personalities on Fox News' version of the late-night talk show.

As a writer and director, he's shepherded several movies to the top of the American Film Institute's list of best comedies, holds a coveted EGOT status (meaning, he has won Emmy, Grammy, Oscar and Tony awards) and boasts multiple films in the National Film Registry, a list of culturally significant films that are worthy of preservation by the Library of Congress. - Historical retelling gets its own Brooks treatment in 1981's "History of the World: Part 1," which skewers the Stone Age to the French Revolution. Brooks' roles range from Moses (who brings God's 15 ... I mean 10 Commandments to the people), to Torquemada in a musical salute to the Spanish Inquisition.

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
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There were many years when I went to church faithfully every week, yet my private life was pathetic. Rider TAR is applicable to Rate Zone II (formerly the AmerenCILCO service territory) and Rider GEA is applicable to Rate Zones I and III (formerly the AmerenCIPS and AmerenIP services territories, respectively). This reconciliation may result in changes to the Company's rates and charges with respect to gas delivery service charges throughout the Company's territories in Illinois. The changes in rates and charges will take effect after hearings and after the Commission issues its

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
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
