Housing advocates plan next steps amid pandemic economic uncertainty

□ COVID-19 pandemic shines new light on affordable housing issues

SPRINGFIELD-As economic uncertainty continues to linger one year into the COVID-19 pandemic, housing advocates across the state are planning next steps to protect tenants and landlords and create additional affordable housing opportunities.

Over the past several weeks, the General Assembly has considered various bills on the subject, including emergency rental assistance, lifting the state ban on rent control, and subsidizing future affordable housing construction in the state.

Advocates for affordable housing in Illinois, including Rep. Delia Ramirez, a Democrat representing the 4th House District in Chicago, say the pandemic has shed new light on an ongoing affordable housing crisis and sparked a new sense of urgency to support tenants and landlords struggling to afford rent and upkeep their properties.

"I've gotten calls from colleagues of mine and offices from all over the state asking what do we do if this pandemic has only made this crisis worse than ever," Ramirez said.

According to data from the National Council for State Housing Agencies, more than 540,000 Illinois households could not pay



rent as of September 2020, and the backlog of owed rent in the state as of January of this year totaled more than \$1.2 billion.

Michael Mini, executive vice president of the Chicago Apartment Association, said the pandemic has been difficult for property owners and landlords as well.

When the pandemic first hit, our members went into action and started reaching out to residents and did what they could to work with them on trying to keep them in their housing," Mini said. "It's been very challenging for residents and apartment owners and managers, no doubt about it."

'We have landlords who don't know how they're going to pay the utilities, their mortgages, and we have tenants who are going to work when they shouldn't when they have symptoms and should stay home, but they don't think they can afford to stay home because they'll be in the streets," Ramirez said.

Since the outset of the pandemic last year, Ramirez has been working on a bill now known as the COVID-19

Federal Emergency Rental Assistance Program Act. The bill has been reintroduced this legislative session as House Bill 2877.

While the bill as introduced originally would have implemented a statewide eviction moratorium until next year, it now aims to direct an estimated \$1.4 billion in federal emergency rental assistance to support tenants most at risk for eviction and small landlords in need of the most assistance.

"For us in this bill, prioritizing people that owe the most will really help stabilize them and prevent people being evicted or put on the street as a result of funds being exhausted," Ramirez said.

Another major provision of the bill includes sealing eviction records for individuals who may have been evicted as a result of pandemic-related economic hardship until March of next year, which Ramirez said would be key to "cleaning slate" for tenants and allowing them to find housing in the future.

"With any eviction record or bankruptcy, those are records that follow you for seven years," Ramirez said. "The bill will ensure that people are able to move and not have an eviction filing on

Gov. Pritzker signs mail ballot, curbside voting expansion into law

SPRINGFIELD - Gov. JB Pritzker signed into law last week a measure that expands vote-by-mail and curbside voting for all future

House Bill 1871, now law effective immediately, revises the state election code to allow election authorities to install drop box sites where voters can submit mail ballots without postage before and on Election Day. Election officials can also allow for curb-side voting for individuals to cast ballots from their car under the supervision of election judges from both parties and poll watchers.

The law, introduced in the Senate by state Sen. Julie Morrison, D-Lake Forest, would also require election authorities to accept mail-in ballots with insufficient or no postage.

"We saw during the November 2020 General Election how many people enjoyed having a more safe, accessible and easier way to vote," Morrison said in a statement. "Just because the pandemic is winding down,

State school board makes case for funding increase

SPRINGFIELD – State education officials made their case for a funding increase above and beyond what Gov. JB Pritzker has recommended, arguing that schools need the additional money to overcome the effects the COVID-19 pandemic has had on student

"While this recommendation does not represent the full need of education, and we clearly understand that, it's made in recognition of the state's current fiscal condition," Illinois State Board of Education chairman Darren Reisberg told lawmakers. "We strongly believe this budget recommendation is necessary to provide the resources our schools, educators and students need to continue to recover equitably from the COVID-19 pandemic."

ISBE officials made the case at a state Senate appropriations committee after appearing before a House committee last month.

Gov. JB Pritzker proposed



essentially flat funding for K-12 schools in the next fiscal year, with only a \$12.1 million increase for two districts - East St. Louis and North Chicago - that remain under state financial supervision.

ISBE, however, is seeking a \$406.5 million increase, or 4.6 percent, above current year spending. That would bring their total state funding to just over \$9.3 billion. That includes a \$362.1 million increase in evidence-based funding – a formula adopted in 2017 that aims to bring all districts up to 90 percent of adequacy by 2027.

The state board also ex-

pects to receive a \$2.4 billion increase in federal funding, but a slight decrease in funding from other state funds. Combined, that would bring its total funding next year to just under \$16.1 billion, or 21.4 percent above this

year's level. The evidence-based funding formula uses factors such as a district's student headcount, poverty rate and class sizes to determine what an adequate level of funding would be. When it was first adopted, 168 school districts were funded at less than 60 percent of adequacy, but currently only 10 are at or below that level.

Still, Robin Steans, president of the education advocacy group Advance Illinois, said more than half of all students in Illinois attend districts that are less than 70 percent funded.

"And just so you underand that when we say over half of our students are in districts below 70 percent funded, that means that on average those districts have over \$4,500 per-kid funding gap," she said. "So as they're trying to meet needs, they're doing it with both hands tied behind their backs."


Reisberg said the additional funding is especially needed this year because the pandemic has deepened racial and economic inequities that have existed since long before the outbreak.

"State investment, we believe, is needed to ensure that our students who were hardest hit by the pandemic have the increased access to learning time, support, staffing and opportunities that they need to recover," he said.

Jack Beetz recognized as state FFA Proficiency winner

SPRINGFIELD - Mendota High School senior Jack Beetz was selected as the State FFA Proficiency winner



in Diversified Crop Production -Placement. Jack is a member of the Mendota FFA Chapter of the Illinois Association FFA.

Illinois FFA recognizes students in 50 different areas based on their work-based learning, also known as Supervised Agricultural Experiences or SAE. FFA members who demonstrate outstanding agricultural skills and competencies through record keeping, leadership, and scholastic achievement may be considered for this award. SAEs allow students to learn by doing by either owning and operating an agricultural business, working or serving an internship at an agriculture-based business or conducting an agriculture-based scientific experiment and reporting

Jack was selected as the state winner by a committee of agriculture teachers knowledgeable in this workbased area, who reviewed his records online and then conducted virtual interviews from their homes and offices throughout the state. Jack is the son of Brooke Beetz of Mendota and his SAE projects involved working for the family farming operation.

Receiving this honor now makes Jack eligible to compete in the National FFA Awards Selection process in July. He was previously chosen as the Chapter, Section 7 and District 2 awardee in this area, which involves working for a business that applies the best management practices available to efficiently produce and market crops from two or more of the following proficiency areas: grain production, fiber and oil crop production, forage production, specialty crop production (excluding floriculture production), vegetable production or fruit production. Jack has also been involved in

other agriculture education and FFA activities including demonstration of his leadership skills by serving as chapter Reporter, Treasurer, and currently as the Chapter President. He has attended the National FFA Convention & Expo as well as the BUILD Leadership Conference and competed in the Section 7 Agronomy and Agricultural Mechanics CDEs. He chaired the Mendota FFA Parliamentary Procedure team for three years, which recently won the Section 7 contest to advance to the District Level, and Jack was named the first place Chairman. He was also the 2019 Section 7 Proficiency winner in Forage Crop Production and the 2020 Section 7 winner in Specialty Crop Production. He was named the 2021 Section 7 Star in Agricultural Placement and has been recommended to receive his State FFA Degree at the 93rd Illinois FFA State Convention. 



He was preceded in death by his beloved maternal grandparents, Lloyd "Toad" and Audrey Lawrence and one uncle,





Outreach to vulnerable populations during the COVID-19 pandemic

♦ Advocates & community groups can help connect people with Social Security

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Social Security Administration has a long history of outreach and coordination with advocates and community-based organizations across the nation. During the COVID-19 pandemic, continuing to work with advocates and community-based organizations is essential to reaching the country's most vulnerable populations, including individuals with low income, limited English proficiency, mental illness, or those facing homelessness. The agency is fully committed to assisting people in gaining access to the information and services they need with a specific emphasis on applying for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits. "I made this issue a strategic agency priority and

focused resources to reach vulnerable communities and help them access our services and receive their benefits. I ask leaders in every community to share information about our programs with people and help them connect with us to apply for benefits," said Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security. "Social Security is working on many initiatives to reach vulnerable populations and I am pleased to share information about our national outreach campaign, developed in collaboration with leaders in the community, to raise awareness of the SSI and SSDI programs.' To ensure effective outreach to these vulnerable

populations who need access to agency programs, and to the advocates and organizations who can help to connect people with Social Security, the agency launched a national campaign to raise awareness of the SSI and SSDI programs and encourage people to apply. Campaign efforts include:

• A new webpage, People Helping Others, at www. socialsecurity.gov/thirdparty is for anyone who could assist another person with accessing Social Security's programs and services;

 A new outreach website at www.socialsecurity.gov/ thirdparty/groups/vulnerable-populations.html where all partner groups can access informational materials to share through their networks, including resources tailored to specific vulnerable populations;

 An updated Faith-Based and Community Groups website at www.socialsecurity.gov/thirdparty/groups/ faithandcommunity.html with a new outreach toolkit and SSI and SSDI fact sheets. The agency coordinated this effort with the White House, and the White House Office of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships is helping to promote these resources; and • An upcoming national advertising campaign to

support all outreach efforts on TV, radio, and social media, with special emphasis on children with disabilities (see the recently redesigned website focused on SSI for children at www.socialsecurity.gov/benefits/disability/ apply-child.html). TV and radio PSAs highlighting SSI for children currently are being tested in the Dallas, Texas area to determine their impact.

The agency is now completing training videos for community-based caseworkers to help their clients with the SSI application process.

People can apply for SSI benefits and for other benefit programs through a telephone appointment with the agency, even while local offices are not able to accept walk-in visitors. More people need to be made aware of the SSI program and reminded that they can call toll-free 1-800-772-1213, or their local Social Security office, to make a phone appointment to apply for SSI. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call Social Security's TTY number, 1-800-325-0778.

the record and keeping them from accessing housing."

Michelle Gilbert, a housing attorney and director of the Chicago COVID-19 Eviction Prevention Project, said sealing eviction records until next year is an important step for protecting low-income renters and homeowners for the remainder of the

"Even with the moratorium, there are cases that are being filed every day," Gilbert said. "The eviction filing, even when the tenants win or get the case dismissed, isn't sealed. It impacts their ability to get housing long term.'

Ramirez, who is the chief sponsor of the legislation, saw her bill pass the Illinois House on March 18. The bill is now under consideration in the Senate with Sen. Omar Aquino, D-Chicago, serving as the lead sponsor.

This will be the second time the bill has been sent to the Senate, which did not call it for a vote at the conclusion of the lame duck session in January. Since then, Ramirez said she has worked with stakeholders in the banking and real estate industries on various concerns with the bill.

"We were able to resolve that in this new session, which I think makes it easier for the bill to move now in the Senate," Ramirez said. "I think the big question for us is how soon.

Regarding the initial concerns from property managers, Mini said the latest changes have caused the banking and real estate industries to take a neutral stance on the bill.

"It's been amended quite a bit from when it was initially brought up at the end of session last year," Mini said. "We still have concerns about the sealing of eviction records, but I think we've gotten to a place where if it's limited to addressing those that were affected by the pandemic, that's something that we can live with."

Ramirez said she remains "hopeful" the legislation could be called for debate in the Senate as early as next week, and that she expects the governor's office to view the bill as a priority.

During the course of the pandemic, Gov. JB Pritzker has issued successive monthly moratoriums on evictions due to financial hardship beginning in March of last year, with the most recent moratorium being issued on April 2.

"Our understanding with the governor's office is that they also see this as a priority bill that has certain specifics around the program of the disbursement of money that needs to be signed into law as soon as possible so that (the Illinois Housing Development Authority) can begin releasing the funds,' Ramirez said.

The governor's office did not return a request for comment on the bill.

Bob Palmer, policy director for Housing Action Illinois, said the steps taken by Ramirez's legislation, combined with the existing moratoriums at the state and federal level, are necessary to keep people in their homes for the time being.

"Our hope is if we can maintain the eviction moratorium, and the protections for homeowners that exist at the federal level are somewhat expanded by Representative Ramirez's bill long enough to get those most of those dollars out, we can avoid having a significant eviction and foreclosure crisis as the result of pandemic," Palmer said.

Palmer agreed the COVID-19 pandemic has helped draw an additional spotlight on housing issues in the state, but said more action is needed to close the gap in affordable housing in

"These issues don't address the pre-existing shortage of affordable housing that happened before the pandemic," Palmer said.

According to data from the National Low Income Housing Coalition, Illinois is facing a shortage of approximately 268,000 housing units for renters at or below the poverty line, and there are only 39 available units for every 100 renters at "extremely low income" levels, designated as earning less than 50 percent of their area median income.

Palmer said that in Illinois, more than two-thirds of extremely low-income renters are paying more than 50 percent of their annual income toward housing costs. "That doesn't leave you

much at the end of the month for other costs of living, and if you have that job loss or your hours are cut back, there's a good chance you're just not going to be able to afford the rent," Palmer said.

Another bill recently introduced by Ramirez and co-sponsored by Rep. Tom Demmer, R-Dixon, is House Bill 3123, also known as the Build Illinois Homes Tax

That measure would use federal dollars to offer a state tax credit to developers who build affordable housing developments or include affordable housing as part of projects.

Proponents of the bill said it would aim to create an additional 3,500 affordable housing units in the state per year.

"I think it's a great opportunity for us to incentivize investment in affordable housing both in urban communities and rural communities," Demmer said during a House Revenue and Finance Committee Hearing on April 1. "I think all across the state, this bill has benefits."

While questions and uncertainty remain over the status of affordable housing in Illinois, housing advocates across the state plan to continue their work addressing disparities in housing availability and supporting tenants and landlords.

'Now we need to look at what do you do to provide additional subsidy support? How do you preserve the affordable housing you already have? And how do you bring additional relief to homeowners and small landlords? I think that's really what we're thinking about right now," Ramirez said.

New data tracker shows decline in small business as lawsuits proceed

SPRINGFIELD — Hospitality jobs in Illinois have declined nearly 52 percent since the pandemic began, according to new data, as lawsuits continue against the governor's orders to close

nonessential businesses.

While leisure and hospitality jobs were hit the hardest, the number of small businesses open in Illinois overall has fallen by about 36.5 percent, as of March 20, compared to last January, based on data compiled by Opportunity Insights, a nonprofit group at Harvard University.


Opportunity Insights' data shows a significant number of closures following the governor's stay-at-home order, which took effect in March and continued to the end of May. The percentage of small business closures in Illinois was about 5 percent in early March 2020, and reached more than 42 percent on March 29, according to

The decline in Illinois' small businesses is similar to the national trend for the same time period. Nationally, the number of small businesses decreased by about 34 percent, with about a 51 percent decline in leisure and hospitality jobs, according to the data.

The data is based on small business transactions and revenues from Womply, "a company that aggregates data from several credit card processors to provide analytical insights to small businesses and other clients,' according to the study.

The data also shows that small business revenue overall in Illinois fell by nearly 28 percent from January 2020 to March 20. The amount of total revenue from hospitality and leisure businesses specifically saw a 57.9 percent decrease in that time period.

Nationwide, small businesses overall experienced a 24 percent decrease in revenues, with revenues for leisure and hospitality busi-



cases were reported last March, Gov. JB Pritzker issued his first stay at home order March 20, ordering nonessential businesses like restaurants and some retail stores — to close. The order was extended through the end of May, with some restrictions on in-person dining in bars and restaurants lifted in June.

In mid-May, a group of individuals and businesses — including a car repair shop, restaurant and pet groomer — sued Pritzker in federal district court in Chicago. They argued Pritzker's executive orders violated the 'takings' clause of the 5th Amendment, and violated their rights to due process.

The takings clause states the government is prohibited from taking private property for public use, without just compensation.

Based on these claims, they asked the court to award them monetary damages for lost revenue and profits.

Last week, a federal judge dismissed the case. Judge Franklin U. Valderrama found the businesses' claims were barred by the 11th Amendment, which provides general immunity to states from lawsuits by individuals.

Because state officials, like Pritzker, who are sued in their official capacities

are considered the "state," Valderrama ruled that Pritzker is protected from the lawsuit's claims under the 11th Amendment.

Closed

A separate group of lawsuits were filed by restaurants and bars that were forced to close following Pritzker's reinstatement of the indoor dining ban in November. The businesses argued that Pritzker lacked the authority under the state law to impose an order forcing restaurants to close indoor dining.

One Kane County restaurant, FoxFire, has continued to pursue its lawsuit in Sangamon County court, and even appealed to the Illinois Supreme Court, which has not accepted the case.

Lawyers for FoxFire, which has remained open to indoor service despite the order, have asked the governor to produce discovery, or evidence, to support his ban on indoor dining.

The governor's lawyers have filed a motion to dismiss to FoxFire's lawsuit. A judge in Sangamon County recently heard arguments on that motion. The judge said she expects to issue a ruling in that case within two weeks.

In addition to the increase in base funding for K-12 schools, ISBE is also seeking a \$50 million increase in funding for early childhood education, enough to open an additional 9,400 slots for children from birth to age 5. "Research shows that

providing a high-quality education for children before they turn 5 yields significant medium- and long-term benefits for students," State Superintendent of Education Carmen Ayala said. "Children in early childhood education programs are less likely to repeat a grade, they're less likely to be identified as having special needs, more prepared academically for later grades, more likely to graduate from high school and are higher earners in the workforce.'

ISBE's presentation was substantially the same as the one it made to a House committee in March. The hearing was for informational purposes only and the Senate committee took no action on the request.

Lawmakers typically begin putting the budget together late in the legislative session, and the final budget bill is usually one of the last to pass the General Assembly in late May.

doesn't mean expanded voters' rights have to."

Also under the bill, Illinois can use federal funds distributed to states for election administration through the 2002 Help America Vote Act to create and maintain secure collection sites for mail ballots.


The changes to the election code went into effect immediately after being signed into law, meaning they applied to the April 6 consolidated municipal elections.



A horse named Ramona

SPRINGFIELD – I was in the third grade sitting on the sofa, reading a book with my grandparents when my grandma glanced out the window and gasped.

The horse in our pasture had given birth to a foal. The problem was no one knew she was pregnant.

Moments later we stood in the grass gawking at the newborn filly, wondering where and when the mare encountered a stallion and what on earth we ought to name this little horse.

I glanced at the novel in my hand, "Ramona the Brave" and said, "let's call her 'Ramona.""

Beverly Cleary, the author of "Ramona the Brave," and 39 other books, died last week just two weeks shy

She revolutionized children's literature.

"Before Beverly Cleary, children were portrayed as very proper. Beverly Cleary changed that. The kids in her books could be messy and would fuss. She never denigrated any of her characters, but she didn't portray them as perfect either," said Michelle H. Martin, a University of Washington professor specializing in children's literature.

Nikki Kalantzis said she was nicknamed "Ramona" as a child because of the Cleary books.

"I'm 33 and my Dad still calls me 'Ramona.' It was so great reading a book with a character who was like me: a tomboy who wore overalls, annoyed her sister and got into trouble. And now, I have a 3-year-old of my own and I'm reading those books to him, said Kalantzis, a Chicago yoga instructor.

The misadventures in Cleary's books are ordinary

"My favorite story was when Ramona saw her family had bought a bunch of apples and to find out which one tasted the best she took a bite out of each one. The family's response was, 'Oh well, we'll just make apple sauce.'

I could identify with Ramona as well. She was the kindergartener who struggled to write her name. When her teacher told her to put a cat's tail on the letter "O" to form the "Q" in her last name of "Quimby," Ramona liked the tail so much that she gave the letter cat ears and whiskers, too.

The teacher was not impressed.

I suspect I was a bit like Ramona growing up-always pushing the boundaries with the adults around me and wanting to know: why?

As I've mentioned in the past, I'm dyslexic. So, school was often a struggle for me. Too often teachers hold children with learning differences in contempt. They can't quite understand why some youngsters don't respond in the same ways as "typical" children.

I certainly felt that educator disdain when I was in the third grade. That's also when I began reading Cleary's books with the adults in my life. I could relate to the Ramonas of the world because I was one.

Cleary wrote her first book in 1950 when a little boy came into the library, where she worked, and demanded books "about kids like us."

Her first book was about Henry Huggins, a fictional boy who saved for a new football by collecting worms and selling them to fishermen for a penny a piece. (It was the sort of entrepreneurial activity I could easily see my father suggesting for me.)

Politically charged terms like "cancel culture" are often bandied about these days regarding older texts. But that hasn't been the case with Cleary's works.

They remain popular – and delightfully dated

In the books, Ramona and her sister still walk six blocks unchaperoned to the park. Henry Huggins goes to the butcher to buy horse meat for his dog. And no, there isn't a cell phone or video game in sight.

But the challenges faced by families aren't all that different. For example, when Ramona's mother took a fulltime job, becoming the family's sole breadwinner, she didn't have time to sew her daughter's Christmas pageant costume. So, Ramona showed up in pajamas.

It's a tale most any working parent can relate to.

When dealing with a child such as Ramona, you just don't know what to expect.

So what better name to give a horse no one antici-

Cannon placed in park – April 3, 1948

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from April 1, 1998.)

It was 50 years ago that the Ordnance Department of the U.S. Army donated a cannon to American Legion Post 540 in Mendota. It was a replacement for a cannon contributed to the WWII scrap drive in September 1942.

It was described as a 138 Howitzer, 13 cm, 25 feet long, seven feet wide, six and one-half feet in height, weighing six tons. It was mounted on two rubber-tire wheels, 13 feet in circumference, four feet in diameter and one foot across.

The cannon was shipped from the Aberdeen Ordnance Depot in Maryland on March 26, 1948 and arrived in the Burlington yards in Mendota on April 2. It was set up in Library Park on April 3. Equipment used in moving the cannon from the yards to the park was donated by Mr. Possley of R.C. Service Co. The cannon that had been donated

to the scrap drive had been on display in the park from April 1926 until September 1942. The Legion Post had been notified in December 1925 that it was to receive an Austrian cannon. But when it arrived in April 1926, it proved to be a Krupp gun, made in Germany in 1915. It had been captured in the Argonne in November 1918.

The shield shows it had been pierced with bullet holes and repaired many times.

The Legion Post arranged to place it on a cement foundation in what was then City Hall Park. An earlier cannon, which had been fired on special occasions, exploded during one of those firings. Two Civil War cannons - one at

Lincoln School and one in Blackstone Park – were not donated to the scrap drive when the World War I cannon was contributed.

A referendum on the annexation of the Troy Grove school was on the April 10 ballot in 1948. Among the advantages listed were bus transportation for students, a share in Mendota's "three-quarter million educational plant," extension of school nurse service to annexed area as well as access to courses in music and agriculture. Meriden, Ophir and Brooklyn townships were also discussing annexation to Mendota.

On Easter Sunday 1948, the Mendota Kiwanis Club sponsored an Easter egg

The Troy Grove annexation referendum was rejected, 183-40.

Sidetracks hunt on the high school athletic field. Over 300 children swarmed over the

Every child was fortunate in finding at least one Easter egg.

On April 2, 1948, the State Theatre offered a two-hour comedy-cartoon matinee. The first 200 children to arrive received Easter eggs. Admission was 25 cents, including tax.

A "last opportunity" to see "Gone With the Wind" was advertised for April 1. Admission was 50 cents, including tax, and the single showing began at 7:30 p.m.

Speaker at a Mendota Athletic Boosters Society banquet on April 5, 1948, was Robert Voigts, football coach at Northwestern University. A Trojan head medal signifying outstanding athletic ability during four years at MHS, as well as good sportsmanship, was awarded for the first time. Al Loach was the recipient. Presentation was made by Pete Cresto, MABS manager.

A card party to benefit Blackstone School attracted 40 tables to the Elks with Mrs. Irving Karger general chairman. Contract and auction bridge and games of 500 were played. The games were followed by an auction of homemade pies and cakes, eggs, nylon hose (in great demand) and gloves. Irving Karger represented a glove manufac-

Charles D. Powell retired from the grade school board of education after 27 continuous years of service. He declared that Blackstone School, in its 90th year, was in good condition, with sturdy exterior walls and "large, bright, pleasant, well-lighted classrooms.

It should give service for a number more years until a modern building can be erected.

A new Blackstone School was completed in 1951.

During Powell's tenure, a new Lincoln School had been built at a cost of \$132,368. Powell had been privileged to lay the cornerstone.

At MHS, Hazel Payne conducted a battery of psychological and educational tests in connection with a new guidance program. Intelligence, mechanical ability, vocational interest, home, health, social and emotional factors were

Miss Payne is promoter and executer of this new plan. It is she who deserves the credit.

Nancy Doermann assisted Miss Payne by doing typing and checking the tests.

A Kanteen Carnival with 16 con-

cessions was a financial success. A fortune-telling booth was popular as was a burlesque tent. However, the dart and balloon booth won a prize as biggest money maker. It was handled by Harry Phalen, Jesse King, Bob McCully and John Keller.

Farmers were warned to protect feed for their laying hens when applying DDT in the hen house. Egg production and hatchability could be harmed.

A drive for funds to combat cancer was launched April 1, 1948, by the Mendota Lions Club. Dr. R.H. Musick was chairman. • The drive for funds to build a community hospital continued. Although \$200,000 had been raised, \$250,000 more was required. • The Red Cross Drive, chaired by George W. Nisley, with Al Elsesser as drive treasurer, had gone over its quota with receipts totaling \$3,894 for Mendota, Troy Grove, Ophir, Earlville, Leland and Northville. Meriden's contributions were divided between Earlville and Mendota.

An ISNU circus was presented as a fundraiser for the hospital and other community projects. It was held in the MHS gym. Louise Magnusson was crowned queen and was accompanied by her court – Carol Pohl, Jo Ann Fuller, Nancy Reeser and Jean Van Etten. Crown bearer and flower girls were Karen Doenier, Judy Fry and Marilyn Schlesinger.

expanding weekend voting. The old Jim Crow was disenfranchising voters en masse based on their race; the new Jim Crow is limiting ballot drop

boxes to places they can't be tampered with. It's hard to believe that one real voter is going to be kept from voting by the new rules.

To better ensure the security, the law requires that voters provide a driver's license or state ID number to apply for a ballot and one of those numbers (or the last four digits of a Social Security number) when returning the ballot.

The law narrows the window for requesting absentee ballots, although still allows plenty of time. A voter can request a ballot as early as 11 weeks prior to an election or as late as 11 days prior (any later risks the completed ballot not getting delivered in time).

Ballot drop boxes were a pandemic-era innovation in Georgia. The law keeps them, while limiting their location to early voting sites.

After getting blowback over proposed limits on weekend early voting when Black churches run their "Souls to the

Polls" events, Georgia lawmakers expanded the potential for weekend voting.

The law gives the State Election Board more authority to take over local election operations, but there's no doubt that election officials in Fulton County, where metro Atlanta is located and long lines at the polls are common, have been incompetent.

Perhaps most controversially, it bans people from distributing food or drink to voters standing in line, an effort to keep partisans from trying to sway voters near polling places. But poll workers can provide food and drink for general use.

The deeper point is that in the contemporary United States, with such wide and ready access to the ballot, changes around the edges don't disenfranchise people.

Georgia considered limiting no-excuse absentee voting to voters 65 and over. Even this wouldn't have dissuaded anyone from voting. A study published by the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research found that turnout increased in 2020 just as much in states without no-excuse absentee voting as in states with it.

Strict voter ID laws have long been denounced as voter suppression. It's not true. According to a 2019 working paper for the National Bureau of Economic Research, "strict ID laws have no significant negative effect on registration or turnout, overall or for any subgroup."

And Democrats issued dire warnings about the effects of the Supreme Court in 2013 ending so-called preclearance that required federal approval of changes in the rules in certain jurisdictions.

This, too, was wrong. A paper by a Ph.D. candidate at the University of Oregon concludes, "The removal of preclearance requirements did not significantly reduce the relative turnout of eligible Black voters." None of the facts, though, can possibly overcome the

attachment that Biden and other Democrats have to their emo-



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

Animals-Pet Waste Ordinance

- The purpose of this section is to establish requirements for the proper disposal of pet solid waste in the City of Mendota so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for failure to comply.
- Requirement for disposal. All pet owners and keepers are required to immediately and properly dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on any property, public or private, not owned or possessed by that person.
- Exemptions. Any owner or keeper who requires the use of a disability assistance animal shall be exempt from the provisions of this section while such animal is being used for that purpose.
- Violations and penalties. Any person(s) who is found to have violated the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of no less than \$25 and no more than \$75.

Trojan comeback bid falls short to Oregon

Hawks hang on in 4th for 30-26 victory

MENDOTA – Mendota nearly erased a three-touchdown deficit in the fourth quarter, but came up short to Oregon, 30-26, on April 2 at the MHS field.

When Oregon's bruising fullback Wylee Rice rambled 31 yards to the end zone at the 9:46 mark of the fourth period, the Hawks went up 30-12 and looked to have a victory in the bag.

But the Trojans quickly responded, and a little less than two minutes later, quarterback Ted Landgraf connected with Andres Castaneda on a 21-yard touchdown strike, and after an unsuccessful two-point run, Mendota was down 30-18 with 7:50 left.

On Oregon's ensuing possession, the Trojans got what they needed - a turnover-as Mendota's Anthony Childs intercepted a Breccan Burns pass in the end zone with just over a minute left in the contest.

Another rapid drive by the Trojans culminated in a touchdown when Damien Magallanes tossed a 4-yard touchdown pass to Landgraf on a halfback option play, followed by a two-point conversion run by Uzi Angulo to make it 30-26.

Unfortunately, only seven seconds remained on the clock, and a Mendota onside kick attempt was recovered by Oregon to end the game. The contest started out

with the Hawks taking the opening kick and putting together an impressive 13play, 76-yard drive that was capped off by a 1-yard TD plunge by Berns. The drive took seven and a half minutes off the clock. The two-point pass attempt was incomplete.

The Trojans countered with an even more remarkable drive that used up the remainder of the first quarter and over four minutes of the second. Mendota ran 18 plays to cover 80 yards, with Landgraf darting into the end zone from 5 yards out to tie the game at 6-6.

Each team's defense came up big on the next two possessions as it stopped the opposition on fourth down. After Mendota's stop at the 50, Landgrafhit Emilio Perez on a 38-yard pass play down to the Oregon 12. The Trojans were then on the verge of taking the lead on a Landgraf run when he fumbled at the 1-yard line, but teammate Sean Figueroa recovered just outside the goal line with 13 seconds left before halftime.

Mendota elected to try an 18-yard field goal, but Oregon defenders broke through the line and blocked the attempt. The ball was scooped up by the Hawks' Isaac Reber, who raced 90 yards for a score with no time left on the clock. Rice ran for the two-pointer to give Oregon a 14-6 halftime lead.

A Trojan fumble on their first possession of the second half set up Oregon on a seven-play, 47-yard scoring drive that ended on a Berns 13-yard run. Andrew Herbst ran for the two-pointer.

On the ensuing kickoff, Magallanes returned the kick 42 yards to the Oregon 33. The Trojans picked up a big first down on a 4th-and-11 pass play to Magallanes to the Hawk 10. Moments later, Castaneda gathered in a Landgraf offering from 5 yards out to make it 22-12, setting the stage for the thrilling fourth quarter.

Mendota (0-2) finished with 270 total yards, 30 less than Oregon. Landgraf completed 13 of 23 passes for 167 yards. Perez caught six passes for 93 yards, Castaneda had four receptions for 40 yards and Magallanes had three catches for 34 yards.

Oregon had two 100-yard rushers – Rice (20 for 136) and Berns (17 for 103).

IDNR launches new website to encourage habitat protection

□ CICADA provides guidance to landowners, developers for voluntary conservation efforts

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) announced the launch of the new CICADA (Conservation Inclusive Construction and Development Archive) website, an online resource which aims to engage the public and private sectors in habitat protection, restoration, and biodiversity conservation through voluntary actions.

The site, which can be viewed at https://cicada-idnr.org, serves as a onestop-shop for residential and private landowners, as well as commercial and industrial sectors, to find guidance and ideas to make their properties or development projects more wildlife friendly.

"With approximately 97 percent of land in Illinois in private ownership, it will take everyone working together to help address these challenges," said IDNR Director Colleen Callahan. "From adding small pollinator gardens and

nest boxes in backyards, to improving habitat on larger private properties, to implementing environmentally-responsible construction practices, CICADA has something for everyone to engage in habitat conservation.'

"The IDNR and partners developed CICADA in recognition that habitat loss, degradation, and biodiversity conservation are major challenges fac-

ing current generations in Illinois and around the world," said Nathan Grider, manager of the IDNR Impact Assessment Section, which spearheaded the project. "Together, we pulled information from a variety of IDNR and partner programs to make the site as accessible and user-friendly as possible."

The website features a clean, modern design organized by various audiences and topic areas. Within each conservation topic, those who click onto CICADA will find short, fun-to-read introductions and "how-to" conservation and habitat management guidance documents, as well as more in depth, technical documents.

CICADA users also will be linked to assistance programs for landowners, conservation tax-deductible donation opportunities through the Illinois Conservation Foundation, and

much more. The CICADA website also features a project showcase page where habitat-friendly projects can be submitted by the public for consideration and viewed by website visitors to provide inspiration and share ideas. Information also is provided on how to certify habitat projects with vari-

ous organizations. "The CICADA website has something for everyone to engage more in conservation and have fun doing it," Grider said. "The timing couldn't be better with so much increasing public interest in these important topics."

IDNR partnered with The National Great Rivers Research and Education Center, a division of Lewis and Clark Community College, and 2WAV software developers for the project. Funding was provided through the Illinois Wildlife Preservation Fund dedicated for preserving, protecting, perpetuating, and enhancing non-game wildlife in the state.

How you can grow in Christ

But as I studied God's Word, I saw that my behavior toward my husband, Dave, was wrong. The Lord was asking me

to walk in love with Dave in my speech, attitudes and actions. This was easier said than done! But God always gives us the grace to do what He is asking us to do. He doesn't expect us to do it all on our own.

So, little by little, by God's grace, I began to change. The Lord transformed me from being rude, critical, harsh and rebellious into someone who has real peace, love and joy. But it was a process—it didn't happen overnight.

Second Corinthians 3:18 says we "are constantly being transfigured into His very own image in ever increasing splendor and from one degree of glory to another."

The Lord changes us a little at a time. None of us will ever be perfect until we get to Heaven, and that's okay. But as long as we're here on this earth, God desires for us to continually learn more about Him and grow in our faith.

As we do—as we continue to grow spiritually—we will experience the amazing peace, joy and fulfillment that only

God can give us. And we will show the world what God is really like.




