First lady Biden discusses higher education investments in Illinois visit BY GRACE BARBIC

SPRINGFIELD—First lady Jill Biden

and U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona visited Sauk Valley Community College in Dixon on April 19 to discuss how the American Rescue Plan will support higher education in Illinois. After touring the facility, Cardona and the

first lady announced President Joe Biden's investment in higher education through the American Rescue Plan, the latest federal COVID-19 pandemic relief package, which includes \$40 billion for higher education infrastructure projects and programs to make education more accessible.

Gov. JB Pritzker was also in attendance for the visit on Monday, along with other Illinois lawmakers, but did not speak publicly.

As a professor at Northern Virginia Community College, Biden is a longtime advocate for education, especially community college

During her husband's former vice presidency, Biden was appointed by President Barack Obama as honorary chair of the College Promise program, a national initiative to make two-year community college education free.

"What starts in one community college classroom can create a chain effect that is eventually felt by every single American," Jill Biden said.

She announced at the news conference that Sauk Valley Community College will be launching its own College Promise program. Although the program was established six years ago, President Biden intends to build on this initiative to make higher education more attainable, according to the first lady. "(President Biden) is ready for big ideas

and bold action, so that all Americans can go to community college and have the support they need to finish and get good jobs," Jill Biden said. "Together we are going to get this done because community colleges are our future."

Cardona said the pandemic has had a significant impact on community college attendance, citing a 10 percent decline in community college enrollment this year.

"Most (community college) students are part-time students, part-time workers, parents, caregivers and displaced workers," Cardona said. "Community college plays such a critical role in addressing equity, and making sure that gaps, exacerbated by the pandemic, close."

In Illinois, 19 higher education institutions

will benefit from the American Rescue Plan funding, including Illinois State University, the University of Illinois System, Illinois Valley Community College and Illinois Eastern Community Colleges, to name a few.

Lee County COVID-19 **Update: April 26, 2021**

LEE COUNTY — Between April 20-26, the Lee County Health Department has reported a total of 70 new cases have been reported, including one from the Dixon Correctional Center and six from Jack Mabley. Here are the ages that were reported: 10 under the age of 12, 9 in his or her teens, 9 in his or her 20s, 13 in his or her 30s, 8 in his or her 40s, 9 in his or her 50s, 2 in his or her 60s, and 3 in his or her 70s.

GOP puts new twist on Illinois redistricting plan group of 37 cosponsors - more than the three-

of overcoming Democrats' claims that their plan would likely be found unconstitutional. The new twist, discussed Wednesday during a Statehouse news conference, would be to allow two different commissions – the

one they are proposing in legislation, and the one mandated after a certain point under the Illinois Constitution – to work side-by-side to come up with new legislative and congressional district maps. "The constitution has a commission that

exists. It can't be changed, it is what it is," said Rep. Ryan Spain, R-Peoria. "So how do we feed the correct information into that constitutional redistricting commission? ... We recommend the use of Senate Bill 1325 as the best way to gather input because there

are still legislators that are included on the constitutional commission." Republicans introduced SB 1325 in February. Its language is substantially similar to that of a proposed constitutional amendment that Democratic Sen. Julie Morrison, D-Lake

Forest, introduced in 2019 with a bipartisan

fifths majority needed for passage. It calls for establishing a 16-member

redistricting commission appointed by the chief justice of the Illinois Supreme Court and the next most senior justice from the other party. The commission would be made up of seven Democrats, seven Republicans and two independents and would "reflect the ethnic, gender, and racial demographics of Illinois. Since its introduction, though, Democrats

have argued that such a plan cannot be adopted through legislation, but only through a constitutional amendment. That's because the Illinois Constitution, as

it currently reads, already spells out a procedure for redistricting. It says lawmakers have until June 30 to approve maps, and if they fail to meet that deadline, the responsibility goes to an eight-member commission, divided evenly between Democrats and Republicans, with some members who are legislators and some who are not. Because the Republican plan is different

from what's provided in the constitution,

Democrats argue, it would almost certainly

be overturned by the Illinois Supreme Court.

The eligible institutions will be required to spend at least half of these allocated funds to provide direct relief grants to students to cover an array of student costs of attendance, such as housing, food and technology expenses, among other needs.

Similar to funding from previous federal relief packages, remaining funds can also be used by the institutions to cover lost revenue, technology costs due to remote learning, faculty and staff training, or payroll. The National Education

Association released a fact

sheet that outlines the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund included in the American Rescue Plan, which found that about 7.5 percent, or nearly \$3 billion of the \$40 billion in grants will be specifically dedicated to historically Black colleges and universities, tribal colleges and universities, minority-serving institutions and other under-resourced institutions.

Approximately \$36 billion will go to 3,500 public and private, nonprofit colleges and universities, and around \$395.8 million will be allocated for 1,630 for-profit institutions, according to the American Council on Education.

"My husband, our president, understands...if we want our communities to thrive, if we want our businesses to have more skilled workers that they need, if we want to prepare our economy for the future, there is no greater investment that we can make than in education," Biden said.

Cardona also noted an infrastructure proposal backed by the president would invest in community college facilities, and the discretionary budget proposed by the president "increases the maximum Pell Grant by \$400, the largest since 2009." Capitol News Illinois is a

The foundation also invests donor's money to grow in perpetuity to protect the future of the entire Starved Rock country region.

The council was told on April 5, that through the foundation, there are many ways for donors to donate including using the website and apps, and that each donation will get a thank you and also tax deductible paperwork. The council was also told that the endowment funds would be completely covered and insured.

Amboy Depot Commissioner Linda Disney told the council on April 5, that they have revied the engineers report regarding the costs to restore the museum and the highest bid was \$600,000. Cost for a temporary fix would be around \$50,000.

In regards to transferring the funds to Starved Rock Community Foundation, during the April 19 meeting, Amboy City Attorney Matt Keegan said first, the city had to make sure it had the authority to transfer money from the trust to the foundation. Then, he said, it becomes political.

"Does the city want to give up control of the funds," Keegan said, adding it's the city's decision to make. He added if the city agrees to give up control of the funds, then is Starved Rock Community Foundation the right candidate

Disney said that with the Starved Rock Community Foundation people would be able to donate to a 501c and that donors would know that the money donated would be going to the museum and not something else in the city.

Keegan said playing devil's advocate, that the city is responsible for the museum and what if there is a conflict over what the Starved Rock Community Foundation would do with the funds as opposed to what the city would do with the funds. He added that this would be another organization involved that the city doesn't have control over.

The board tabled the action item of transferring the funds to the Starved Rock Community Foundation.

Nuisance List/Violations

Amboy Police Officer Lisa Hart presented a list to the city council of 60 addresses that have been served for nuisance violations. These violations include inoperable vehicles and some form of property clean-up needed.

She told the council that she has had some compliance but the people who haven't complied, haven't for many years.

"Republicans know that this bill is nothing but a smokescreen," Sen. Rachelle Crowe, D-Glen Carbon, said during a recent redistricting hearing. "A bill cannot trump the constitution. There's no ifs ands or buts about that. A bill cannot trump the constitution." Asked to respond to that during Wednesday's news confer-

ence, Spain and other House Republicans, for the first time, argued that two commissions could work simultaneously, with the one created under legislation providing information and guidance to the one mandated under the constitution.

"I think that we're at a critical point in which changing the constitution is just not going to happen at this point, because the Democrats will not allow that question to be placed on the ballot," said House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, of Western Springs. "And so we are looking for any way to be able to find an alternative.'

At issue in this year's redistricting process is not just who draws the maps, but what population data will be used

Due to the pandemic, as well as a number of natural disasters last year, the U.S. Census Bureau will be late producing the detailed, neighborhood-level data needed for legislative redistricting. The Census Bureau has said it will have that data in an old, "legacy" format by the end of August, but it won't be available in a more user-friendly format until late September.

Since the Illinois Constitution requires lawmakers to complete the task by June 30, Democrats have suggested using alternative data sources, including the American Community Survey, which Republicans argue is not intended to be used for redistricting purposes.

"Look, ACS data is a very small sample of the entire state, number one," said Rep. Tim Butler, R-Springfield. "It is a snapshot over several years, and it does not accurately reflect the communities in our state. It is good data to use for a variety of things, but even the Census Bureau themselves says that ACS data should not be used for redistricting."

Democrats, meanwhile, have said they are considering all possible sources of population data, not just the ACS. But they have also said it is their intent to complete the redistricting process before the June 30 deadline.

Durkin, however said Republicans will consider filing a legal challenge to any maps that are based on anything other than official census data.

"We are discussing that possibility," he said. "And if that is the way that the Democrats are going to draw the districts, that is an option that we're considering, absolutely.

White warns eesidents to be aware of two scams targeting Illinoisans

SPRINGFIELD — Secretary of State Jesse White is warning Illinois residents to be on alert for a pair of scams seeking to defraud Illinoisans.

"I have zero tolerance for fraudsters who prey on people in desperate times," said White. "My office is working with the Illinois Attorney General's office to protect Illinoisans from falling victim to these fraudulent schemes. In addition, we have notified the Federal Trade Commission and the FBI."

In the first scam, White is warning the public of scammers who are sending unsolicited text messages, claiming to be from the Illinois Secretary of State. The text messages contain vague references to "Problems with your information" and another reference to "*IL* Secretary of State." Each text also contains a link attributed to "uipendingcases.org."

White says the text is a scam and recipients should not click on the link or provide any information. Visiting the website could place malware on the recipients' devices or trick them into disclosing sensitive personal information. The Secretary of State's office never requests personal information, like a Social Security number, via text message.

"Delete the text," said White. "Do not click on it and do not provide any of your personal

In the second scam, fraudulent websites are offering online vehicle registration renewals for license plate stickers and then charging residents an additional fee for the registration.

White warns Illinoisans that one particular website—IllinoisCarReg.com, is misleading customers with an unauthorized website promoting online license plate sticker renewals. Once the customer provides personal information, the sham company charges the customer a fee of \$39.99, in addition to the sticker fee. This company, which has websites for multiple states, is misleading residents across the nation. The Federal Trade Commission is investigating the company in an effort to shut it down over concerns of how the company may be using the personal data that it obtains from customers.

White strongly urges Illinois residents who wish to renew their license plate stickers to make sure they are visiting www.cyberdriveillinois.com before proceeding to renew their stickers online. The process is simple and easy. Residents need their registration ID and PIN, which are located on the renewal notice and registration card — which most people keep in their vehicle's glove compartment. Vehicle owners may then visit www.cyberdriveillinois.com and click on "License Plates Renewal" under Online Services.

IDOA accepting specialty crop block grant proposals

SPRINGFIELD – In an effort to expand the availability of fresh, locally-grown produce and strengthen the competitiveness of Illinois' specialty crop industry, the Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) is now accepting Specialty Crop Block Grant Proposals. The application can be found in the IDOA website and must be returned to the Department by 4 p.m., on May 24.

Eligible applicants include non-profit organizations, local and government entities, trade and commodity associations, public and private colleges/universities. All projects must begin in calendar year 2022. Illinois encourages applications that benefit small farms and ranches, new and beginning farmers and ranchers, socially disadvantaged producers, military veterans and underserved

To encourage further expansion of the specialty crop industry and to take full advantage of the allocated federal funds, the Department invites the development of projects pertaining to the following issues:

- Enhancing food safety
- Improving the capacity of all entities in the specialty crop distribution chain to comply with the requirements of the Food Safety Modernization Act, for example, by developing "Good Agricultural "Practices," "Good Handling Practices" and "Good Manufacturing

Practices" and in cost-share arrangements for funding audits of such systems for small farmers, packers and processors

- Investing in specialty crop research, including research focused on conservation and environmental outcomes
- · Supporting the growth of organic specialty crops
- · Developing new and improved seed varieties and specialty crops
 - Improving pest and disease control
- · Increasing child and adult nutrition knowledge and consumption of specialty
- Improving efficiency and reducing costs of distribution systems

Projects that benefit a particular commercial product or provide a profit to a single organization, institution, or individual are ineligible. Farmer's markets, roadside stands and community-sponsored agriculture programs should consider submitting proposals to the USDA's Farmers' Market and Local Food Promotion Program.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service defines specialty crops as "fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits and horticulture and nursery crops (including floriculture)." There are more than 3,200 producers devoting more than 90,000 acres of Illinois farmland to specialty crops production.



Big Sky

ritish author Kate Atkinson is a prize-winning novelist who has also written highly entertaining crime novels featuring her private investigator Jackson Brodie. In "Big Sky," the latest installment, Brodie is by far the most unassuming character amidst a large group of misfits, trophy wives, and evildoers. "He tried not to use the term 'private detective' - it had too many glamorous

connotations (or sleazy, depending on how you looked at it). It raised people's expectations."

Brodie is an ex-cop whose career has dwindled to following an adulterous couple while he tries to spend time with his moody teenage son at a ramshackle Yorkshire seaside town. Brodie's constant companion is Dido, an ancient Labrador Retriever, who belongs to Brodie's ex-partner Julia. When Dido growls at some rowdy teenage boys, Brodie asks her: "Really? You and what wolf?" What is so remarkable about "Big Sky" is that its style

is comical yet the subject matter is the unspeakable malevolence of human trafficking and child abuse. Atkinson pulls it off by creating fully realized lives for each of her large cast of characters. We follow their ordinary lives, though in an interview, Atkinson mentions that each of them has committed a crime, usually to survive, but for the evil men to brutalize young women and children in what Brodie calls "One more battle in the war on women." There are Nadja and Katja, two Polish sisters, Skyping

with a man from an employment agency called Anderson Price Associates, who is arranging to fly them to London to take up glamorous jobs in hospitality. His "office" in an old trailer is a desk and a tape of background office voices.

One of the most appealing characters is Crystal, who, having escaped her abusers, ends up a hooker, but in the end, transforms herself into the perfect trophy wife. She dresses her little daughter Candy in Disney princess outfits, and hires Brodie because she fears someone is following her. There is sad-sack Vince, who, having lost everything, wants to end it all on a cliff, only to be rescued by do-gooder Brodie who talks him down using country and western lyrics.

Two young policewomen, Ronnie and Reggie, go about making inquiries about an old pedophile ring and wind up with increasing frequency in the middle of the action. These two tiny, novice cops are so tough that they earn the nickname "the Kray Twins," after two of Britain's most notorious killers.

Unlike most crime stories and mysteries, where the resolution is the point of the novel, "Big Sky" is one of those rare detective novels one could enjoy a second time around. Perhaps that is the point of the curiously enigmatic scene of Chapter 1, which is repeated in the novel's closing chapter.

The Lady Clippers concluded the season with an 8-5 overall record and a 6-2 conference mark.





A bipartisan proposal for creating more affordable housing in Illinois

These are incredibly challenging L times for middle-class and working families all across our state. The COVID-19 pandemic and its devastating aftermath are only adding to the pain. In the city of Chicago

and Illinois' more populous areas, the housing crisis is all too real and frightening. We have been battling dwindling stock of affordable housing for years. What used to rent for \$700 a month a few years ago now costs \$1,500 a month. Property taxes have quadrupled. People have jobs and the incomes to live somewhere reasonably priced, but there is nowhere to turn.

In Illinois' more rural areas, the problems are almost reversed, yet equally



frustrating. Populations have declined and jobs are scarce. Families with some security stay in their homes for many years, and developers simply do not have the means or the resources to build affordable homes and apartments. Those who must find a place to live often end up traveling long ways from home to make ends meet.

The pandemic has made



all of these problems worse. We face a massive eviction crisis, landlords owed thousands of dollars in back rent and barely making it themselves, and too many people facing homelessness.

We know that when people struggle to find a safe, affordable place to call home, the rest of their lives are chaotic: Their physical and mental health declines, their

children struggle in school, and it's hard to keep a job – if they can find one.

Despite all this, we are coming together as a Democrat and Republican in the Illinois Legislature to push for the hope we see ahead.

Hundreds of millions of dollars in rental and landlord assistance and other aid is on the way from Washington, and we will work together to ensure it reaches the people most in need today. To ensure we are investing in our state's affordable housing future for tomorrow, we are pushing for the Build Illinois Homes Tax Credit. The federal Low-Income

Housing Tax Credit has helped finance many affordable homes and apartments in recent years, but the need far outweighs the available resources. Many good developments that need just a little funding support to get off the ground remain stagnant. In House Bill 3123, we are

The best news? While the tax credit comes with an estimated annual \$35 million price tag, Illinois will see zero expenses until the projects are complete and the housing occupied. We will see the direct benefits of today's investment at no cost to taxpayers until more people have a place to call home. We must credit the leadership of the Illinois Housing Council and its coalition of supporting partners for helping us push for this long-term solution.

We view many of our problems and their solutions differently. But we are in complete agreement on affordable housing: It's time to give more Illinoisans help to live better lives, and the Build Illinois Homes Tax Credit is an easy investment in that shared vision for a better future.

Healing from the pandemic starts at home. We're ready to fight in Springfield for making sure more Illinoisans have that affordable place to call their own.

Need for organ donations remains great

att Creemens went on Face-Lbook looking for a babysitter and ended up losing a kidney.

The 47-year-old Springfield computer programmer and married father of four was looking for a teenager from his church to watch his kids. As he perused various social media posts, he came across a link concerning the health challenges of one of his church's pastors. Steve Patzia, co-lead pas-

tor at Cherry Hills Church, was born with a rare kidney disease and found himself nearing organ failure in 2019.

"It was strange, I found myself staring at that page and I couldn't make my hand move. The Holy Spirit was leading me. It is a difficult thing to describe but I not only felt compelled to move forward but also was very much at peace," Creemens said.

The two men, who are both in their 40s, did not know each other particularly

"I don't remember ever speaking with Steve one-onone before this, but I listened to his sermons, so we had that connection," he said.

When Creemens began the process, he underwent several medical tests to see if his kidney would be a good match for Patzia. But he didn't inform his pastor that he was having the test done or contemplating being a donor.

"I kept taking tests and I kept proving to be a good match. Finally, the doctors said I needed to tell Steve."

Creemens' inspiration to donate a kidney came from words of John the Baptist in the Gospel of Luke: "Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has

Creemens said he believed that admonition could apply as easily to someone with two kidneys as someone with a

shocked when Creemens made the offer.

"I just knew that he had called the church and sched-

uled a private meeting with me. I didn't know what it was about – but I wasn't looking forward to it," he said. Creemens laughed and

said, "When someone wants to meet in private with the pastor, a lot of times it's about something really bad. So, I think I took him a bit

April is Donate Life Month in the United States. The two men illustrate the need and generosity present in today's transplant network. State and health officials say the need for organ donors remains high.

In August 2019 Patzia and Creemens underwent their surgeries at Barnes-Jewish Hospital in St. Louis.

"Some of my earliest memories were of being in the hospital at the University of Minnesota. This disease is something I had lived with my entire life," Patzia said. "When I woke up from surgery, I remember thinking, 'So this is what normal feels

Almost immediately after surgery his pallor gained a healthy glow, debilitating muscle cramps disappeared and urinary issues became normal.

"The biggest thing I noticed was that I wasn't tired all of the time. Before the surgery I needed 12 or 13 hours of sleep every day. After the surgery, I could get by with a normal seven or eight hours," Patzia said.

Creemens was released from the hospital after just remains great said, Dr. Marc one day.

'I was ready to go back to work about after two weeks. I ran a half marathon a few months after surgery," he said.

Patzia, who has two children with his wife Peggy, recovered at home over four months. When he returned to the pulpit, the congregation gave both he and Creemens a standing ovation.

"They were celebrating, being part of something bigger and that is what the church is all about," Patzia said. "We're all about community. We're all about loving each other, supporting one another. That's something Cherry Hills is amazing at doing, not just for their pastor, but for whoever's going through a difficult time or a difficult situation."

Patzia added he found spiritual significance in the transplant.

"Somebody who's willing to literally take the risk to give their kidney for the sake of another helped me see the cross in a whole new light,"he said. "Jesus is not only willing to give a kidney, but gave his entire body so that we may have a new life. In the same way, Matt gave his kidney so that I could have new life."

Of the 18,000 individuals who donated organs in the United States in 2020 about 6,000 were living donors according to the Organ Procurement and Transplantation

"I learned more about this program being the secretary of state, then I did being a state lawmaker," he said. "I realized now that an individual can get a second chance at life or they can improve the quality of someone's life if they step up and say, 'Yes, I want to give this person a second chance at life. I want to give them an organ that will allow them to live a long and productive life."







Clipper Highlights: #14 Brad Considine

'd like to begin by making it known that LI have never personally met this former Clipper. However, I've spoken to him on several occasions since the creation of this group and have had some of the greatest conversations with him about our program. From all of the stories I've heard of his days as a Clipper, I cannot help but see similarities in my Clipper career that followed 28 years later and how we continue to feel about Amboy Football.

Without further delay, it's my great honor to announce this week's Clipper, fellow Clipper Quarterback, fellow Mark Smith Award winner, #14, Brad Considine.

Brad was a 1981 graduate of Amboy High School. It's my opinion Brad is one of our top Clipper Field Generals, even though he only started his Senior season.

Brad's Junior season he spent as the second team Quarterback and Safety for the 1979, State Runner-Up, Clippers. For some of the younger members of this group, that may not know, Brad only was second team because his older brother Rick was the starter. Though playing time throughout the 1979 season was scarce, Brad was a front row student of the game. Watching opposing defenses, picking up their tendencies, and watching brother Rick calling his own plays was a great apprenticeship as he would lead the Clippers in 1980.

"He was so intelligent on the field. If he lacked in other areas, he sure made up for in intelligence. He knew how to set plays up. Nothing was more evidential than his first play call of the game at Galena where he threw a touchdown on a 42 option pass," brother, Rick Considine, shared.

Rick concluded, "he was a great leader and communicator on the field and would always welcome the opinions and insights of his teammates.'

For Brad, the competitiveness began well before his junior year. "Rick and I would game

plan together, we pushed each other. Growing up we were always competing," Brad shared.

Entering his Senior season, Brad was surrounded by great, experienced talent. Brad struggled during the first two contests of the season, Mendota and Spring Valley Hall.

"I believe I was something like 3-22 passing our first two games that season. It took a little while for things to click," Brad stated about the slow start to the 1980 season.

The rest of the season, Brad and the Clippers would gain momentum with each weekly victory. Brad was mentioned in a news article prior to the Week 3 contest

against Newman. The article was previewing the matchup and mentioned each team struggled at the Quarterback position. Not just Brad, but the entire Clipper team took the comments personally because they knew the caliber football player Brad was. Faced with that adversity and criticism, Brad, exploded against Newman and led the Clippers to a 42-14 conference win. The following week, against Fulton, Brad had his best statistical game. The numbers read: 5-9 passing for 108 yards and 3 passing touchdowns of 55, 12, and 32 yards; 44 rushing yards on 5 rushes with 1 touchdown run. Brad also threw for a 2-point conversion, putting the finishing touch on the Clippers' 42-24 victory over the, previously, undefeated Steamers.

That performance earned Brad the Rockford Register Star Player of the Week. Brad finished the Runner-Up season with 13 touchdown passes, 918 passing yards, eight touchdown runs, and 525 yards rushing. As impressive as those numbers are, Brad is the type of Clipper to trade every touchdown, two-point conversion, and yard for one more victory each of his two Varsity seasons. Individual success is, to this day, something Brad is hesitant to acknowledge. Winning was the only care Brad was concerned with as a Clipper.

"To come home with Rick after our State loss my Junior year and then following our State loss my Senior year, it



was a deep seeded pain felt by our whole household," Brad shared.

A two-time State Runner-Up, Mark Smith team award recipient, 1st Team All Conference Quarterback, 2nd Team All Area Quarterback, and RR Star Special Mention All Area Quarterback were the well deserved awards that followed Brad's Senior season as a Clipper.

Friend and former teammate, George Schwamberger, shared, "Brad was so smart. He called all of our plays in the huddle and knew how to set things up. He ran the entire offense about as perfect as you could, especially the option. He was a great leader and had such a great attitude that was looked up to."

Friend and former Center and Teammate, Greg King provided, "Brad was one of the most underrated QBs in Amboy football history. He had to follow in the footsteps of his brother who was probably the best athlete to grace Amboy. Brad was Brad though. He made it his. He ran the option to perfection. He made those around him better. He was a good thrower

and a great faker. No greater example than the first play at Galena. They had given up five points all year. We ran an option pass play on first play of the game. The DBs and LBs came up so fast it was an easy throw. Galena never recovered. He was also so cool under pressure. We had some turnovers against Havana in the semis but Brad never flinched. He took command of the huddle and helped bring everyone into focus and we went back to

Brad continued his Football career at Illinois State University as a walk-on his Freshman season. Brad did not continue his collegiate career after his Freshman season, by his own choice. No matter the length of his collegiate career, it gives our program great pride to add a Quarterback to the list of Division I athletes.

the State Championship."

Clipper Football continues to hold a special place in Brad's heart. When he looks at his scrapbook he's taken back to the best time in our history. He is by far, one of our most gracious Clippers. During our conversation, Brad shared his appreciation for everyone involved in our program, top to bottom. To this day, Brad compli-

ments the system in place, "From the hard work and mental toughness that was hammered into each Clipper, to the 'on-field' strategics of allowing Quarterbacks to call their own plays, that was what I really admired and enjoyed about our program."

Brad concluded, "Growing up you don't appreciate how special it is. Our community has always had a very 'in it together' attitude. Combine that with the other characteristics and values our program teaches along with the team concept and it will surely promote success later in life. I am so thankful for the experience. It was great fun, two years of great fun."

So, to my fellow Quarterback/Mark Smith Award winner, #14, Brad Considine, thank you for your contributions to Clipper football. Although we have never personally met, based on the stories I've heard, the great substance of our conversations about Clipper Football, and love you continue to show for your former teammates you've become one of my favorite Clippers. Sail on!
