### Gov. expecting to hit 100,000 daily vaccines in mid-March

SPRINGFIELD - Gov. JB Pritzker said the state expects to be receiving up to 100,000 doses of a COVID-19 vaccine daily by mid-March, up from the approximately 60,000 it is currently receiving on average.

for Emergency Use Authorization, which is the same approval given to the two existing vaccines. The analysis showed the vaccine is 66 percent effective against moderate to severe COVID-19 globally.

Pritzker said during a stop at a vaccination site in West Peoria that even without the new vaccine, White House projections and promises from vaccine manufacturers indicate the state will receive the 100,000 daily doses by mid-March. That number could be increased by 20 percent with approval of the new vaccine.

Peoria County Public Health Administrator Monica Hendrickson said the 66 percent effectiveness rate is less than the roughly 95 percent rate seen with the first two vaccines, but it's still more effective than the seasonal flu vaccine, which hits roughly 40-60 percent depending on the year. The Johnson & Johnson shot is also a onedose vaccine, unlike the two existing vaccines, which require two doses.

"You're looking at a distinction that from a clinical standpoint, or from an epidemiological standpoint, is very minor compared to what we really are hoping for, which is decreases in death and decreases in severe illness where they all match up between the three vaccines," she

### Legislation calls for rapid on-site visit policy after deadly outbreak at LaSalle Veterans' Home

☐ House resolution requests auditor general Mautino investigate LaSalle facility deaths

SPRINGFIELD -Republican lawmakers on March 1 unveiled legislation to strengthen internal policies at state-run veterans homes in the case of a disease outbreak, such as the COVID-19 outbreak at the LaSalle Veterans' Home that resulted in 36 resident deaths since the pandemic began.

The bill, sponsored by Republican Sen. Sue Rezin, defines an outbreak at a state veterans home as two or more staff or residents at the facility contracting an infectious disease within 48 hours of the first diagnosis.

Senate Bill 2251 would require the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs and Illinois Department of Public Health to conduct an on-site visit at a veterans home where an outbreak has occurred no later than the following business day after the home staff or administrator was notified.

Rezin, of Morris, said state officials with IDPH and IDVA were too slow to react at LaSalle because they did not conduct an on-site visit there until 12 days after the outbreak was reported on

showed 22 residents and seven staff were positive. By Nov. 8, 59 residents and 64 staff tested positive for COVID-19. The facility reported seven resident deaths on Nov. 11.

"I would say that if we were able to go on site immediately and recognize that mitigation protocol was not being followed, we could have slowed this outbreak,' Rezin said.

### Council awards bid for improvements to city's waste water treatment plant

MENDOTA - The Mendota City Council awarded a bid and handled several other items of business at its March 1 regular meeting.

Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick announced that four bids were received for disinfection improvements to the city's waste water treatment plant. The low bid from Whittaker Construction of Earlyille was accepted in the amount of \$507,150.

Fitzpatrick also informed the council that the Mendota incinerator burn pit will open for the season on Saturday, March 27. Burn pit hours this year are: Monday from 3-6 p.m.; Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. The incinerator burn pit is located south of Mendota near the sewage treatment plant. During Mayor David Boelk's report, he proclaimed that April will he Fair Housing Month in Mendota. This is the 53<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the passing of the Fair Housing Act. The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination by direct providers of housing, such as landlords and real estate companies as well as other entities, such as municipalities, banks or other lending institutions and homeowners insurance companies whose discriminatory practices make housing unavailable to persons because of race

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
### Aurora University to hold virtual discussion of school's Mendota origins

AURORA-Aurora University will present a virtual discussion of "Occupy till I Come: The Origins of Aurora University in Mendota, Illinois, 1893-1912" at 7 p.m. on March 9.

University president Rebecca L. Sherrick will lead the Zoom discussion with "Occupy" author Susan Palmer of Aurora, an Aurora College alumna, professor emerita of history and curator, Jenks Memorial Collection of Adventual Materials.

Palmer's book chronicles how Mendota College's leaders, faculty, students and supporters "occupied" - reconciled deeply held religious beliefs with a modernizing society

that called for clergy to be more highly educated. The book also tells how the college occupied financially - constantly struggling and sacrificing to make ends meet to preserve its religious mission.

Mendota College was created in 1893 by the Western Advent Christian Publication Association, a publishing arm of the Advent Christian denomination, to prepare Advent Christians for the ministry. Including liberal arts courses with religious studies, Mendota College existed until 1912 when it moved to Aurora and became Aurora College. The college became Aurora University in 1985.

Palmer researched the Jenks Collection and catalogs, newspapers, photos, student publications and other source materials in the university's archives to write the book. A 1971 Aurora College graduate, she taught history at the college and university from 1973 to 2010. Palmer grew up in an Advent Christian home with Adventist roots going back four generations.

"I tried to put the history of the college, denomination and Millerism - named after William Miller, a New York farmer who founded the 1840s Millerite movement from which the Advent Christian denomination grew - in the broader context of American history," Palmer explained.

Volunteer blood donors are invited to support the local blood supply by scheduling an appointment to give blood. Please call the Community Health Services Department at (815) 539-1411 to schedule (appointments required) and bring a photo ID for use in donor registration.

Mississippi Valley Regional Blood Center is also accepting referrals from individuals who have recovered from a COVID-19 infection and would now like to be scheduled for plasma donation to help newly diagnosed patients fight the disease. Potential donors who can provide documentation of a laboratory-confirmed positive test for COVID-19 and meet other health and safety criteria, will be scheduled for a COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma (CCP) donation.

Individual donors and care providers may refer themselves or their patients via the referral form available at www.bloodcenter.org or by calling (833) 610-1025. For additional information, potential

donors or physicians may send inquiries to patientservices@ mvrbc.org.

CCP donors must be fully recovered from their COVID-19 infection and must meet all standard eligibility criteria for blood donation. Plasma will only be collected from donors with laboratory-confirmed tests showing they had a COVID-19 infection and must be at least 28 days from the last date

they experienced symptoms. These donors will have antibodies to help fight COVID-19 and will be scheduled for a plasma donation at a nearby donor center or mobile blood drive.

A group of young women from Smith College risk their lives in France at the height of World War I in this sweeping novel based on a true story – a skillful blend of "Call the Midwife" and "The Alice Network."

A scholarship girl from Brooklyn, Kate Moran thought she found a place among have her illusions dashed the summer after graduation. When charismatic alumna Betsy Rutherford delivers a rousing speech at the Smith College Club in April of 1917, looking for volunteers to help French civilians decimated by the German war machine, Kate is too busy earning her living to even think of taking up the call. But when her former best friend Emmeline Van Alden reaches out and begs her to take the place of a girl who had to drop out, Kate reluctantly agrees to join the new Smith College Relief Unit.

Four months later, Kate and 17 other Smithies, including two trailblazing female doctors, set sail for France. The volunteers are armed with money, supplies, and good intentions - all of which immediately go astray. The chateau that was to be their headquarters is a half-burnt ruin. The villagers they meet are in desperate straits: women and children huddling in damp cellars, their crops destroyed, and their wells poisoned.

Despite constant shelling from the Germans, French bureaucracy, and the threat of being ousted by the British army, the Smith volunteers bring welcome aid - and hope - to the region. But can they survive their own differences? As they cope with the hardships and terrors of the war, Kate and her colleagues find themselves navigating old rivalries and new betrayals which threaten the very existence of the Unit. With the Germans threatening to break through the lines, can the Smith Unit pull together and be truly a band of sisters?

said. "The most important thing, though, is that when these vaccines come on the market, if you have an option to any of these three, get one of them."

While Pritzker said nearly one in seven Illinoisans has had at least one dose of a vaccine, he said he could not predict when the state can progress from Phase 4 of reopening to Phase 5, which is essentially back to normal with larger public gatherings allowed.

Entering Phase 5 is dependent on a widely available vaccine or treatment, or the end of the virus' spread.

"I've said from early on that what we need is an effective vaccine that we can widely distribute or a very effective treatment that we could widely distribute and we're getting there," he said. "We need to get closer to herd immunity for everybody to feel that we are beyond Phase 4, and for us to actually be able to reopen everything

Database statistics show the state is 20th of all the 50 states in first doses given per capita, yet 49th for those having received two doses. Pritzker attributed that to the state's delay in opening up the vaccination effort to Phase 1B, noting officials intentionally remained in Phased 1A an extra week in what he said was an effort to ensure all health care workers received their first shot.

Health departments are now receiving a majority of second doses, he said.

The state is also planning on expanding Phase 1B eligibility to include individuals older than 16 years of age who have comorbidities and preexisting conditions.

who is impartial on this and not being paid or hired by the governor," Welter said. Both Welter and Rezin

represent districts that include the LaSalle home.

During the initial Nov. 12 visit at the LaSalle home, a U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs official noted several violations of protocols mandated by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, including the use of hand sanitizer containers that had a non-alcohol-based product.

That site visit report also documented examples of staff failing to follow proper protocol for personal protective equipment. In one instance, staff were seen eating with masks below their chins in the kitchen within six feet of one another. In another example, staff were observed touching patients and multiple surfaces without using a new pair of disposable gloves.

Rezin said the legislation she filed is meant to enforce the recommendations made in the March 2019 Auditor General's report on the outbreak of Legionnaires' disease at the Quincy Veterans Home, which resulted in 13 resident deaths at Quincy between 2015 and 2018. Two of those recom-

mendations are that IDPH and IDVA "ensure that State facilities, such as the Quincy Veterans Home, implement all recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control following confirmed outbreaks such as Legionnaires' disease," and that IDPH "revisit its policies and determine what response timeframe is adequate to conduct onsite monitoring visits in response to a confirmed disease outbreak such as Legionnaires' disease."

She said Gov. JB Pritzker

failed to follow those recommendations.

"It's very troubling to both Rep. Welter and I that these recommendations have not been implemented to date with this administration. If it had, we would have been in the site on day three at the LaSalle Veterans Home and caught all of these errors that were happening within the home. And we could have stopped the outbreak within the home, and we could have saved veterans' lives,' Rezin said.

A spokesperson for the governor said in a statement Monday evening "the administration will work with lawmakers to both strengthen the emergency response to pandemic-related outbreaks at our veterans homes and ensure IDPH has the resources it needs to rebuild their hollowed out state agency that has been on the front lines of this pandemic response."

In the statement, the governor's office indicated an independent investigation is underway into the pandemic response at the veterans homes and a report will be made public when it is completed. Pritzker has said all those who did not follow proper procedures and protocols will be held accountable, the statement said.

As it pertains to the audit specific to Legionnaire's disease, the governor's office said, IDPH has implemented all recommendations from the Quincy Veterans Home, including a site visit from the agency within 24 hours of when legionella was

### Giving help Down Under

#### By Scott Reeder

SPRINGFIELD - At first, Olivia Hayse received an email from a stranger in Australia that claimed he wanted to donate more than \$15,000 to her Springfield employer - but first he needed their bank account and check routing numbers.

"We thought this is a scam for sure and just ignored it. More emails came. And they ignored them too.

Hayse works for the James Project, a Springfield charity that helps foster children. And she couldn't imagine why a couple they didn't know, in a country on the other side of the planet would want to send them

But the Aussies became more persistent and kept leaving messages on the office phone.

"He had a thick Australian accent and we didn't know what to think," Hayse said,

Finally, they connected with the fellow.

"It turns out that his family wants to start a ministry that helps foster families in Australia and they wanted to call it the 'James Project.' When they googled the name, they found out there was a ministry in Springfield with the same name that is essentially doing the same thing they want to do. They prayed about it and said they felt called to first give to our ministry before starting their own."

The Springfield ministry affiliated with more than a dozen area churches has since received a check for \$15,800 from the family Down Under, who has said they wish to remain anonymous.

Both the James Projects in Springfield and Brisbane are named after the Bible verse James 1:27 which says: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted

One of the folks who have taken this verse to heart is Kasey Miller.

Both she and her husband, Ryan, first fostered and then adopted four children, now between the ages of 2 and 6, who they are rearing along with their 13-year-old

"There is no way we would be able to do this without the assistance of the James Project," she said. "We didn't have a house big enough for this many kids. But the James Project provides us with a five-bedroom, three-bathroom house rent free," she said.

Kasey is a teacher at Calvary Academy and Ryan is youth pastor at Clear Lake Church of Christ.

The James Project also pays for enrichment activities. For example, for the Miller children, the organization

pays for gymnastics, karate and piano lessons. We are saving during this period that they have no

rent or mortgage payments. We hope to use those savings to someday build a house for our family," Kasey said. The James Project provides four families with houses to live in at no cost and is in the process of providing

a fifth house. Since 2014, the ministry has helped 78 foster children. They also provide clothes, toiletries, beds, diapers and other items for foster families. "This donation came through at a critical time for

foster families," Hayse said. "A year ago, there were 515 foster kids in Sangamon County. Today there are 625. At the same time, we have fewer families willing to foster because of the demands of home schooling during COVID and other pandemic-related issues."

Hayse said the Springfield ministry is providing guidance to the Australian family as they work to form their outreach.

"They are really a wonderful family who feels called by God to help. And we are happy to help them," she said. (Scott Reeder is a veteran statehouse journalist. He

Birthday cake was donated by the Lions Club, first sponsor of the youth recreation center. It was served by Maralyn Ashley, Kanteen president in 1949. Advisor was Mrs. A.E. (June)

The octagon house at 1208 Washington St. was included in a book describing 88 historic Illinois houses. Published in 1949, "Old Illinois Houses," by John Drury, was sent without charge to members of the Illinois State Historical Society to celebrate its 50th anniversary.

The Mendota octagon house was built in 1854 by Warren Clark. Current owner is Betty Durham.

Richard J. Leiser, editor of The Mendota Reporter, was invited to take part in the first School Public Relations Conference held at Illinois State University in Normal on March 6, 1949 Eleven representatives of public schools attended and 18 newsmen - 12 from weeklies, six from dailies. Theme of the conference was "Improvement of School Press Relations.'

#### It was voted to make the conference an annual event.

With better understanding of press deadlines, it was hoped schools would be better able to publicize their concerns.

At a city council meeting on March 7, 1949, bids were opened for a concrete floor in the section of the city building where fire trucks were housed. Lobbins & Bauman entered a bid on 1500-square feet of cement for \$972.40, but did not include installation of drains or removal of the old floor. Henry Zolper's Sons entered a bid

of \$795, but excluded a section of the floor, 11 feet by 13 feet, which they didn't think needed replacing. Because of these variations, the bids were placed with the Buildings & Grounds Committee for further discussion and a report at the next meeting.

It was found that a street between 15th and 16th streets in Rust's addition did not have a name. It was voted to investigate records in Ottawa to determine if it was given a name when the property was platted.

In Cub Scout news, Ron Jones reported for Pack 109, Den 4. In a walking race, Jerry Merritt was fastest. In a checker tournament, Jerry Galloway was the winner. In the broad jump, Frank Metzen made the longest jump.

At the State Theatre, March 3-4, 1949, the feature was "Mr. Peabody & The Mermaid," starring William Powell and Ann Blyth.

### Press swapped the script on Cuomo vs. DeSantis

Throughout the pandemic, the press has been excoriatingly harsh on a governor who was slow to act, unnecessarily endangered the lives of the elderly, alienated experts and

It just thought the governor in question was Florida's Ron DeSantis rather than New York's Andrew Cuomo.

After it has become clear that Cuomo's handling of the pandemic was not just criminal in the metaphorical sense, but perhaps in the literal sense, the press has begun, only reluctantly and belatedly, to abandon its long-running Cuomo hagiography.

It never made any sense to lionize Andrew Cuomo at the expense of Ron DeSantis, except that one had a "D" after his name and the other didn't, and one hated Trump and the other didn't. The national media also labors under the assumption that New York must be competent while the Sunshine State is the preserve of the embarrassingly boorish "Florida Man."

Finally, the media loved the way Cuomo talked about the pandemic at his take-charge press conferences. This was taken as the opposite of Trump's approach, which it was -- Cuomo talked a good game, while utterly botching the substance of the response, while Trump talked irresponsibly about the pandemic, while handling the substance pretty well (or, certainly, not as badly as advertised).

All this meant that the press made both Cuomo and De-Santis into something they were not -- a hero and a villain, respectively -- when it should have been obvious all along that this wasn't remotely justified From the outset of the pandemic, New York state has had the

highest number of deaths of any state and still does (47,000), and the second highest deaths-per-million of anywhere in the country. In contrast, Florida is right around the national average for deaths-per-million. Journalists brushed right by

narrative-building. They erupted in outrage when DeSantis was allegedly slow to close the beaches last March, but didn't dwell much on Cuomo saying, when the virus was already spreading

these top-line numbers in the interest of their tendentious

throughout his state: "The facts defeat fear. Because the

reality is reassuring."

They accused DeSantis of unnecessarily endangering seniors when the Florida governor took steps to protect the nursing homes, and Andrew Cuomo, infamously, ordered nursing homes to accept COVID-19 patients.

They claimed DeSantis was rejecting the "science" by, among other things, pushing to reopen the schools, an approach that has proved out. Meanwhile, experts have fled the New York public health bureaucracy in response to Cuomo's highhandedness.

They bought the bogus story of a Florida data manager who was supposedly persecuted for blowing the whistle on the state's manipulation of its COVID numbers, when, of course, this is exactly what Cuomo was doing.

And so, the media's anointed hero of the pandemic -- who wrote a book on his own exemplary pandemic response, who won a Grammy, who was elevated to an authority with the standing to comment on how the country was handling COVID-19 -- is facing calls to resign or face impeachment and is the subject of multiple investigations, while his routine bullying of critics is now out in the open.

Not only are none of these things happening to Ron DeSantis, his policy of avoiding strict lockdowns, which occasioned so much criticism, has avoided the educational and economic downsides of Cuomo's policies. According to Florida data, the state offers more in-person education than any other state and it has a lower unemployment rate than the national average and other populous states. This matters greatly to the well-being of Floridians. All of this said, the virus has presented enormous challenges

and excruciating choices to policymakers around the country. It's not healthy to be overly invested in red state versus blue state comparisons. But the media gleefully went all-in on this game -- and managed to pump up the wrong governor and run down the wrong one, in a failure for the ages.

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

The conference, now in its ninth year, will feature keynote speaker Jason Medows, host of the popular Ag State of Mind podcast. Medows' presentation will be "MENTAL HEALTH: What it is, how it affects us in agriculture and what we can do to improve." Using real-life examples from his own experience, he will discuss the mental health challenges faced in agriculture. His focus will be on strategies and solutions for improving mental health and he will conclude by speaking directly to women about how they can positively influence the men in their lives.

Medows was born and raised on his family's cow calf operation outside of Cuba, Mo. He grew up playing football and baseball and was involved in his local 4-H. In 2002, he left the farm for St. Louis College of Pharmacy. After graduating with his Doctor in Pharmacy in 2008, he returned home to work at a local hospital and continue the cow-calf operation he started in college. In 2019, Medows began his podcast Ag State Of Mind, in which he combined his medical background with his passion for agriculture to help break the stigma surrounding mental health in agriculture.

The conference will wrap up with Rita Frazer, Director of Network and Audio Services for the RFD Radio Network, and Adam Nielsen, Director of National Legislation and Policy Development in the Governmental Affairs and Commodities Division of the Illinois Farm Bureau. Frazer and Nielsen's topic will be "Advancing Farm Bureau's Issues in the 117th Congress" with a discussion on how to effectively communicate agriculture's message with a new administration.

Frazer and her team gather farm news and information and cover issues that are important to the Illinois Farm Bureau. She is a 30-year member and immediate past president of the National Association of Farm Broadcasting and an award-winning broadcaster who has covered farm news and events on a state and national basis. 
### C. W. Dickey



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

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

Deer hunters in Illinois took more deer during the 2020-21 seasons than last year.

### Deer hunters take preliminary total of 162,575 deer in Illinois

SPRINGFIELD - Hunters in Illinois harvested a preliminary total of 162,575 deer during all 2020-21 archery and firearm seasons, which concluded Jan. 17, 2021. The total preliminary deer harvest for all seasons compares with a total harvest for all seasons of 153,174 deer in 2019-20.

During the 2020-21 deer seasons, hunters took 45.4 percent does and 54.6 percent males. • Archery: Archery deer hunters in Illinois

took a preliminary total of 75,544 deer (new record) during the season which began on Oct. 1, 2020 and concluded on Jan. 17, 2021. The total archery harvest during the 2019-20 season was 67,743 deer.

· Youth: Youth deer hunters harvested a preliminary total of 2,321 deer during the three-day Illinois Youth Deer Season (Oct. 10-12, 2020), compared to 3,774 in 2019. Traditional Firearm Season: Hunters took

a preliminary total of 76,579 deer during the Illinois Firearm Deer Season on Nov. 20-22, 2020 and Dec. 3-6, 2020, compared with 75,417 deer taken during the 2019 firearm

· Muzzleloader: Hunters using muzzleloading rifles harvested a preliminary total of 3,447 deer during the Muzzleloader-Only Deer Season on Dec. 11-13, 2020, compared with harvest of 3,076 deer in the 2019 muzzleloader season.

· Late-Winter Seasons: The 2020-21 Late-Winter Antlerless-Only and Special CWD deer seasons concluded on Jan. 17, 2021 with a combined preliminary harvest total for both seasons of 4,684 deer, compared with a harvest of 3,164 deer taken during those seasons in 2019-20. Season dates for the seven-day Late-Winter and CWD seasons were Dec. 31, 2020-Jan. 3, 2021 and Jan.

There were 15 northern Illinois counties open to the Special CWD Season, which is used to assist in slowing the spread of chronic wasting disease in the Illinois deer herd.

There were 20 counties open for the Late-Winter Antlerless Season in 2020-21. Counties that are at or below their individual deer population goal for two consecutive years may be removed from the Late-Winter season.

I used to live with a constant, underlying sense of guilt. Because I was sexually abused by my father during my childhood, I grew up feeling that something must be wrong with me for him to want to do the things he did to me. This damage in my soul caused me to become ashamed of myself.

Guilt and shame are dangerous. Because

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when you live this way, you aren't just ashamed of something you've done or that's been done to you, you're ashamed of yourself. And it poisons everything else in your life.

But Romans 8:1 says, "There is now no condemnation [no guilty verdict, no punishment] for those who are in Christ Jesus [who believe in Him as personal Lord and Savior]" (AMP). This means it is not God's will for us to live with guilt and shame every day of our lives!

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#### Facing the Truth That Led Me to Freedom

Giving up guilt and shame was not easy for me. I had a really hard time believing that God loved me and that He wanted me to love myself. I don't mean that He wanted me to love myself in a selfish, self-centered, prideful way, but I had to accept God's love for me and love myself in a healthy way before I could love others.

I came to realize that most of the problems I had—the personality issues and unhealthy relationships—stemmed from the fact that I was ashamed of myself. The truth is when you don't like yourself, it's very difficult to get along with anyone else.

It was a life-changing revelation when God showed me that it was religion—not relationship with Christ—that makes us believe that it's right or good to feel bad about ourselves... to beat ourselves up for our mistakes and weaknesses.

God doesn't want us to live under the burden of guilt and condemnation because all this does is make us believe that we need to pay for our sin. And Jesus has already paid



for it!

### The Path to Move Forward

Second Corinthians 5:17 says, "If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" (NIV). And verse 21 says that "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

When we come to God and confess our sin, asking Him to forgive us, we become new creations in Him because of what Jesus has done. Jesus, who was perfect and never sinned, took the punishment for our sin so we could be made right with God and have a personal relationship with Him.

So when we refuse to give up guilt and shame by believing in what He's done for us, we're essentially saying, "Jesus, I don't think You did a good enough job, so I need to add my effort to try and make up for the mistakes I've made and get over this guilt."

Our way of "paying" is feeling miserable and guilty.

The tragedy is as

The tragedy is, as long as we live this way, we will never enjoy the freedom we can have in Christ of being forgiven of our sin, and enjoy the good life He came to give us (John 10:10). *The Power to Change* 

The key to pressing past guilt and shame was discovering the power in God's Word to overcome it. Eventually, as I spent time in prayer and Bible study, the truth renewed my mind and set me free (Romans 12:2; John 8:32).

I want to encourage you to read the scriptures I've shared in this teaching. Pray and ask God to help you agree with what He says more than how you feel or what you think about yourself based on your past. Study verses about His love for you, like John 3:16-17 and 1 John 4:8-16. Confess what God says about you: He loves you; He forgives you; He created you to be a unique, special, one-of-a-kind individual; and He has a wonderful plan for your life! (See Psalm 139:13-14; Jeremiah 29:11; Ephesians 2:8-10.)

If you will embrace who you are as a new creation in Christ and do your best each day to grow in your faith in God by studying His Word and seeking Him in prayer, you will make progress in becoming everything He made you to be. You will be free from guilt and shame... and have the life Jesus died to give you!

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

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
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
