## **COVID-19** variant identified in Lee County case

This is a joint news release issued by the Northern Illinois Rockford Region Public Information Officers (NIR-PIO). NIR-PIO serves Boone, Carroll, DeKalb, Jo Daviess, Lee, Ogle, Stephenson, Whiteside, and Winnebago Counties.

NORTHERN ILLINOIS ROCKFORD **REGION** – The first case of the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) variant B.1.1.7 has been identified in the Northern Illinois Rockford Region, Region 1. The case is a resident of Lee County with unknown travel history as the disease investigation is ongoing.

The B.1.1.7 variant was first identified in the United Kingdom and has already been reported in other regions in Illinois including Chicago, Cook County, and Lake County. According to Cathy Ferguson-Allen, Department, "the identification of this variant in the region was anticipated as the variant is known to spread more easily and had already been identified in Illinois in nearby regions. This case is a reminder that the community must be vigilant in practicing prevention measures to protect themselves and each other from COVID-19. It also highlights the importance of following quarantine recommendations and to get tested if you've been in close contact with someone who has

tested positive for COVID-19."

- WASH-UP: Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds frequently.
- MASK-UP: Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover or mask.

- BACK-UP: Keep at least 6 feet apart from others.
- VAX-UP: When it is your turn, get vaccinated for COVID-19.

Early indications are that the vaccine offers protection against the B.1.1.7 variant, however, information is preliminary and evolving. Local Health Departments (LHDs) in the Northern Illinois Rockford Region (NIR-HDs) are working hard to get the community vaccinated with the resources that are available. The vaccine supply continues to be limited. While those in phase 1b, which includes

frontline essential workers and those 65 and older, are eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine, there is not enough vaccine available to vaccinate everyone that is eligible.

Those in Phase 1b should know the fol-

lowing about vaccinations:

- Check your local health department's website or social media page for instructions on how vaccines are being distributed in
- · While you may be eligible to get the vaccine, Phase 1b includes a large group of individuals, so it may take a while for your turn, but we will get to you.
- · Your patience allows the NIR-HDs to focus limited resources on administering vaccinations.

## Lee County COVID-19 **Update: Feb. 8, 2021**

LEE COUNTY — Between Feb. 2-8, the Lee County Health Department has reported a total of 37 new cases have been reported.

Here are the ages that were announced: 2 under the age of 12, 5 in his or her teens, 1 in his or her 20s, 1 in his or her 30s, 2 in his or her 40s, 9in his or her 50s, 3 in his or her 60s, and 1 in his or her 70s.

This brings the total number of cases to 2,972 as of Feb. 8. Of the 2,972 cases, 2,510 have recovered. They also reported as of Feb. 8, 5 residents have been hospitalized and 59 residents have died.

## up vaccine distribution

**SPRINGFIELD** – The state will soon start ramping up the distribution of COVID-19 vaccines as part of its effort to further limit the spread of

In addition to receiving increased shipments of vaccine from the federal government, the Illinois Department of Public Health announced that it plans to redirect 97,000 excess doses of vaccine from the federal Pharmacy Partnership program, which is in charge of administering vaccines to residents and staff at nursing homes, to make them available to people eligible under Phase 1B of the vaccination program.

Those efforts were announced one day after Illinois set a single-day record of 65,200 doses of vaccine administered, bringing the statewide total so far to nearly 1.1 million.

"In fact, Illinois is already running ahead of the Biden plan to reach 100 million vaccinations in 100 days," Gov. JB Pritzker said during a media briefing Wednesday. "Last week, we administered more than 110% of our fair share to reach that goal and that does not include the record day (Tuesday)."

Pritzker also noted that on Tuesday, the Biden administration announced that it will launch a pilot program to distribute vaccines directly to about 6,500 retail pharmacies around the country. Those shipments will be in addition to those going directly to states and to Walgreens and CVS, the two pharmacy chains involved in the federal partnership to administer vaccines in nursing homes.

"That means 39,000 more doses available each week to Illinoisans and that number will grow within that program," Pritzker said.

Illinois is currently operating in Phase 1B of the vaccination plan, which includes people over age 65 as well as frontline essential workers outside the health care setting. State officials estimate that about 3.1 million Illinois residents fall into that category.

That group also grew by 177 people on Wednesday after the Pritzker administration announced that state lawmakers can now be included in the Phase 1B group.

That decision drew sharp criticism from Republicans in the General Assembly who have also criticized Pritzker for including prison inmates in the 1B group.

unemployment insurance (UI) benefits in 2020, the Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES) announced today. Claimants who collected UI benefits last year need the 1099-G tax form from IDES to complete state and federal tax returns. The form is necessary for individuals who received state or federal UI benefits. This includes claimants who received regular UI benefits and/or benefits under the new federal pandemic relief programs, including Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA), Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC), Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC), Lost Wages Assistance (LWA), and state Extended Benefits

Claimants who opted to receive their 1099-G tax form electronically, which is an option available when to access the document from the IDES website. Claimants who opted not to receive their 1099-G tax form electronically will receive a paper form via regular mail; these claimants may also access and print their 1099-G form online by visiting the IDES website (login required). Previous years' 1099-G information is also available for claimants online for the prior seven years. Additional information about the 1099-G form is

They are inundated with calls and messages, and when people double check, it slows us down even more. There will be vaccine available for anyone who wants it eventually. The Lee County Health Department also asks if you qualify based on your profession, please check with your employer before registering, because we are currently coordinating with many employers for all their staff who want the vaccine.

After fraudulent activity has been reported, the Department will investigate the matter and work with victims to get them a corrected form. Victims of identity theft will not be held responsible for repaying any benefits that may have been administered in their name by fraudsters, nor will they be held responsible for tax implications resulting from a fraudulent claim. To date, IDES has stopped more than 962,000

fraudulent unemployment claims since March 1, 2020.

IDES understands the urgency associated with tax season and is committed to ensuring Department resources are available to assist individuals with questions regarding the 1099-G tax form and filing process. For tax filing information, individuals are encourage to call the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) at 800.829.1040 or visit their website at IRS.gov.

## Illinois DCFS offers college scholarships to current and former youth in care

CHICAGO - The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services is currently accepting applications for the 2021 DCFS Scholarship Program. Through the program, 53 academic scholarships will be awarded to current and former youth in care for the upcoming school year, with four awards reserved for the children of veterans.

Scholarship recipients receive up to five consecutive years of tuition and academic fee waivers to be used at participating Illinois state community colleges and universities, a monthly grant of \$1,235 to offset other expenses and a medical card. On average, the department receives 200 application packets each year, and has awarded over 1,400 scholarships since the program began in 1971.

"It is imperative that every youth in our care has the tools they need to succeed," said Illinois DCFS Acting Director Marc D. Smith. "These scholarships give our youth the ability to concentrate on their studies and prepare for their futures without the stress of worrying about how they are going to pay for school."

The DCFS Scholarship Program is open to youth who have an open DCFS case, whose cases were closed through adoption or guardianship or who aged out of care at 18 or older. Youth who are at least 16 years old and not yet 21 on March 31 may apply.

"The information I received from the DCFS Scholarship Program about buying books, school contacts and job opportunities made my transition to college life much easier," said Maya, a 2020 scholarship recipient. "I am very grateful to have been selected as a recipient of the scholarship award. With this scholarship I don't have to worry about trying to manage a lot of work hours and my school schedule. The scholarship allows me to focus on my classes and study time and has made me more financially responsible. I review my expenses, pay my bills on time and balance my monthly budget."

Scholarship recipients are selected based on their scholastic record and aptitude, community and extracurricular activities, three letters of recommendation from non-relatives and a written statement illustrating their purpose for higher education.

Due to pandemic-related limited availability of ACT and SAT testing sites, ACT and SAT test scores will not be considered for any applicants in the 2021 selection process.

### **Carbon monoxide safety** is key to staying safe and warm this winter

**SPRINGFIELD** — Cold winter winds continue to bring a chill to the state meaning many Illinoisans will be turning up their thermostats to stay warm for the rest of the winter season. The Office of the State Fire Marshal encourages residents to have their furnaces checked, change furnace filters and to make sure carbon monoxide (CO) and smoke detectors are functioning properly.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), heating equipment is a leading cause of home fires in the United States. Local fire departments responded to an average of 52,050 fires involving heating equipment each year in 2012-2016, accounting for 15% of all reported home fires during that time. Annually, these fire lead to the loss of 490 civilians' lives, 1,400 civilian injuries and account for around \$1 Billion in direct property damage. Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of December, January and February.

In 2019 according to National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS), Illinois Fire Departments responded to over 23,000 calls about carbon monoxide in 2019 and were able to determine a CO leak at nearly 11,000 of those locations.

Symptoms of CO poising are very similar to the flu and include headache, fatigue, shortness of breath, nausea and dizziness. Other signs of possible CO presence include condensation on walls and windows, house pets becoming sluggish and chronic odors from malfunctioning appliances. If you suspect you may be experiencing these symptoms, smell natural gas leaking in your home, or if your CO alarm activates, if you can evacuate the building, do so immediately. Only open windows on your way out if they are easily accessible. If someone is unable to leave the building, or is unconscious, open doors and windows to the outside in the area the person is located and stay as near to the open window or door as possible until first responders arrive. Close any doors that open to other areas of the building to isolate the room the person is in. Turn on any exhaust fans that may be present. Once you evacuate, then call 9-1-1 from outside your home or a neighbor's house.

Space heaters lead to countless fires due to improper use during the winter months. It's important to plug space heaters directly into wall outlets and not extension cords.

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



#### No Mercy

hough the seventeenth century was known as the Age of Reason, it was also the age of massive witchcraft persecution. Around 100,000 persons were accused of practicing witchcraft, and 40,000-50,000 persons were executed, most of them by fire at the stake. One of the most intense persecutions took place in Finnmark, a county of 3,000 inhabitants in the extreme northeast of Norway, specifically in a hamlet called Vardo. Located on an Arctic Circle island, Vardo became notorious for executing 91 people (77 women and 14 men) in the course of the persecutions. Kiran Millwood Hargrave's very fine book "The Mercies" is a fictionalized account of what happened in Vardo.

It all began on Christmas Eve of 1617. The men of Vardo, forty in all, were fishing when a monster storm swallowed them in a matter of minutes. The women were watching the catastrophe from shore, among them Maren Magnusdatter who lost her father, brother, and fiance. The women were left to fend for themselves. In their desperation they did the unthinkable. They took up fishing. When Maren's mother refused to eat the fish, Maren replied, "Grief cannot feed you, though it fills you."

The women of Vardo quickly learned the skills they needed to survive, including hunting and butchering reindeer. They were led by the charismatic Kirsten who wore men's trousers because you cannot butcher a reindeer in a skirt. Moreover, some of the women "slipped back into the old ways, grasping for anything solid." The forbidden old ways were those of the indigenous Sami people. But in 1617, King Christian IV, a rabid witch hunter, issued a decree whereby a witch was defined as one who was bonded to the Devil and who "shall be cast down on fire and incineration."

The storm had attracted the authorities and soon a Commissioner named Absalom Cornet appeared with his teenage wife in tow. He was there to root out the magic that he was certain caused the storm and continued to corrupt the women of Vardo. He was from Scotland where he had made a name for himself for burning witches. His wife Ursa who described him as "brutishness made palatable by touches of fineness and manners," happily befriended Maren and by the end of the novel their friendship had blossomed into romance.

Cornet looked for "oddities" and naturally arrested Kirsten. She was tortured for weeks, ending with the water test in which they broke the ice and then threw Kirsten into the sea with her hands and feet bound. Water, considered a sacred element, was thought to repel evil. Thus sinking was a sign of innocence and floating an indication of guilt. Kirsten floated. When she was burned at the stake, the women of Vardo chanted "Breathe deep, breathe deep" to have the smoke and not the fire kill her.

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

## How do we teach our children not to repeat our mistakes?

t's not our problem.

I hate those four words more than any others strung together in the English

It's an excuse for looking away.

Decades ago, when I was a young reporter, I had just taken a new job with a newspaper and the staff was excited to soon be moving into a new building. One cold December night, a desperate woman called. She was in labor, and in that era before cell phones, couldn't get a hold of her husband who was working construction in the building we were moving into.

It was past midnight and she didn't know if we could reach him. I told my boss that I was caught up with my work and could drive the three blocks to the construction site to get him.

The boss looked at me and said, "It's not our problem." He ordered me to tell her we

More than three decades later, I'm haunted by that conversation. I had been on the job for all of six weeks or so. I should have told the boss "no." But I didn't. Instead, I sat at my desk until 1 a.m. knowing I had betrayed not only my own values, but those in which I had been reared.

I grew up in a home where I never heard that phrase. Early on, my parents taught my siblings and me that we are our brother and sister's keeper.

I remember when I was a teenager, my Dad was driving through a rough neighborhood in my hometown of Galesburg. He saw an older woman lying on a sidewalk. Cars were buzzing by her prone form. He stopped and found she had

labor? I have no idea. That's what happens when you look away. You don't know how the story ends. As for the editor who said "It's not our problem"

he was out of journalism within a year. My Millennial friends like to talk about "trigger words" that resurrect past traumas. I'll be honest, I've long thought that was New Age gobbledygook.

But then I heard someone say, "It's not our problem," and memories of that cold December night in 1989 returned to me. The most offensive part of that phrase is "our." It identifies a person with a group, a clan, a race, an employer – that sets itself apart from others. The inference in the statement is if the person was part of "our" group, they'd deserve help. But otherwise, "It's not 'our' problem."

helping others, it's about reaching across racial, cultural and economic boundaries to aid those from groups other than

Today, I carry two gallons of gasoline, a jack and host of tools in the back of my pickup to assist stranded motorists.

Sometimes I'm able to help change a tire or give someone enough gas to make it to a service station. One time, I just sat with a young man while his car was engulfed in flames alongside Interstate 55. I couldn't help him much, but at least he knew someone cared.

When I think back 32 years to that woman whom I didn't help, I'm haunted by my inaction. A sin of omission is as bad as one of commission.

How do we teach our children not to repeat the kind of

mistake I made? I've been wrestling with that as part of my 2021 resolutions. So, I asked my daughters if they would like to help stock mini-pantries or "blessing boxes" around Springfield. They embraced the idea with enthusiasm. During this

pandemic, many hard-working families are in need. Those who can, should help out.

Beginning this week, I'll take my girls to the grocery store to buy food that we'll leave at small stands across the city for families to anonymously use. Why am I doing this? Well, we want to help others. But

I also don't want my children to grow up to ever say, "It's not 'our' problem.'







# Clipper Highlights: #7 Eric McLaughlin

This week we go back into the Quarterback family as we highlight one of our "Top Notch" Clipper Gunslingers. I'm honored to announce our Clipper Highlight, #7, Eric McLaughlin.

Eric was a 1999 graduate of Amboy High School, two year Varsity starter at Quarterback, and multi sport athlete. Eric was the prototypical pocket passer with his 6'2" 170lb frame.

Eric's Clipper journey began his sophomore season as he and his family moved to Amboy from Oregon. Clipper Country not only gained quality athletes but quality people

Eric's Junior season he took over as starting quarterback during Week 3.

"We had really good weapons that season and we tried to spread it around the field," Eric stated of the '97 Clippers' offensive philosophy.

The '97 Clippers had, I would argue, one of the most grueling schedules in our history. Playing juggernauts and perennial power's such as Stillman Valley, Newman, Burlington Central, Fulton, Morrison, and Riverdale it made for a playoff like opponent week in and week out.

Eric's Senior season the Clippers faced another rigorous regular season schedule, swapping Burlington Central for St. Bede.

"We had many close games our Senior year, we just couldn't find a way to finish on top," Eric stated.

To put the caliber of competition in perspective during Eric's Senior season, Newman was the State Runner-Up in 1A, Stillman Valley lost in the Semi-finals in 2A by two points, Fulton lost in the first round in 2A to Morrison, and Morrison lost in the second round in 2A to Paxton Buckley-Loda.

Eric recalled his favorite memory of Amboy Football that he got to play his Senior season with his younger brother Jason as Jason was called up to Varsity.

In true Clipper fashion, Eric spoke highly of all his former teammates, one in particular, "Tony Magnafici, one of our tackles, was one of the best lineman we have

Eric finished the season earning 2nd Team All Conference at Safety and Honorable Mention All Conference at Quarterback.

After high school, Eric coached in the Jr. Tackle program for three seasons. Eric coached, mentored, and influenced an entire new generation of Amboy Football. His commitment and care for Amboy Football could be seen in the way he coached. For someone who had only been in the Amboy community for a handful of years, Eric's impact was immense.

Klein not only worked with Eric for 8-9 years but the two would also marry into the same family.

Klein stated, "On a side note, I don't know how family Thanksgiving is going to be this year, being the only son/son-in-law not to be highlighted for Clipper of the Week."

Always good fun and proof the bond remains.

The bond we have as Clippers would rival any great football town in the state. The only greater bond two Clippers could share is playing side by side with a brother on the gridiron. Jason shared his memories of playing with Eric during his Sophomore season. "I loved playing with Eric,

it was one of the highlights of my career. I wanted to make him proud and not let him down his Senior season," Jason said. "I remember we lost to Erie/Prophetstown in a close game and we both were devastated. Eric threw me three touchdown passes that game, all on the 42 option pass. It was McLaughlin to McLaughlin all night, but the announcer couldn't pronounce are name right, he kept saying McGlocklin."

Eric and his Varsity teams may have not had the success of other Clipper teams but their contributions are just as equally important. Eric and his teams continued the tradition of toughness, hard work, and never quit. Those are the same qualities that Eric has built his successful business around. I know of many former Clippers who were fortunate to work for Eric during the summer months prior to the start of the season. Those opportunities fortified the hard working, disciplined, blue collar mentality that's been a constant in
